In accordance with K.S.A. 65-34,173, the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) reports the following summary on behalf of the Voluntary Cleanup and Property Redevelopment Program for year 2024. During this annual reporting period, KDHE received 11 applications with a cumulative total of 808 applications. The categories of applicants include agriculture (25%), industry (26%), commercial (16%), oil and gas (23%), government (3%), and private citizens (13%). A total of two sites were remediated in 2024 with a cumulative total of 160 sites remediated. A total of nine (9) sites were issued No Further Action (NFA) Determination Letters in 2024. A cumulative total of 420 sites have been issued NFA letters.

Notice of Hearing

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) is proposing a Lead Maintenance Plan as a revision to the Kansas Air Quality State Implementation Plan (SIP) for the partial Saline County, Kansas area designated by the United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) in November 2011 as a nonattainment area for the 2008 Lead National Ambient Air Quality Standards (NAAQS). The geographic lead nonattainment boundary surrounded the Stryten Salina, LLC (formerly Exide Technologies) lead acid battery manufacturing facility located in the city of Salina, Kansas. Air pollution control measures and requirements were subsequently established and implemented in the nonattainment area that resulted in measured ambient lead concentrations meeting the federal lead standard for the following three-year periods: 2017-2019, 2018-2020, and 2019-2021. Pursuant to federal Clean Air Act (CAA) Sections 107(d)(3)(D) and (E), the KDHE will request that the EPA concurrently approve a Lead Maintenance Plan, in accordance with CAA Section 175A, as a revision to the SIP and redesignate the partial Saline County lead nonattainment area to attainment status with respect to the 2008 Lead NAAQS. The maintenance plan not only is designed to ensure that the area maintains the 2008 Lead NAAQS for at least ten years after redesignation but also contains contingency measures that were required for the nonattainment area and will be implemented if a violation of the federal lead standard occurs following redesignation of the area to attainment.

The proposed SIP revision does not include any rulemaking action. However, a federally enforceable Air Emission Source Construction Permit, most recently modified on December 27, 2018, for the implementation and enforcement of additional control strategy improvements at the Stryten Salina, LLC facility, in addition to an attainment demonstration modeling, are included with the proposed maintenance plan and redesignation request for approval by the EPA. Scope of Work

Project is in Longton, Kansas on proposed track expansion coming off an existing main track between crossings at Harvest Road and 66 Road. - Crossbuck replacement four (4) each will be replaced by others at existing crossbuck locations at each crossing. Road crossing, barriers, and signage meeting local protection, at all times to maintain public safety required by state, local, and federal regulations.
- Site cleanup following completion of work is captured as a lump sum item. Any pre-existing rail, ties, or OTM that is removed when installing switch components, must be removed and disposed of according to all state, local, and federal regulations. Any salvageable material shall be provided to railroad at location designated by railroad at no additional expense.

Insurance

Contractor shall purchase coverage and submit for verification a Certificate of Insurance to meet all requirements demanded of the site, local, and state regulating agencies.

Materials

Opinion 2024-4

Re: Taxation – Income Tax – Tax credit for graduates of aerospace and aviation-related educational programs and employers of program graduates; definitions

Synopsis: To be a “qualified employer” for purposes of the Kansas Aviation/Aerospace Tax Credit, an entity’s “principal business activity” must “involve[] the aviation sector.” This means that an entity’s primary or predominant business activities must be closely related to the aviation sector. The fact that Wichita State University has some connections to the aviation sector does not make it a “qualified employer” when those ties do not predominate over its other business activities. Cited herein: K.S.A. 79-32,290; 79-32,293. Issued July 2, 2024. KK/DC

Re: Vacancy in office of commissioner; Vacancies created by increase in number of districts; Governor; Election options

Synopsis: The expedited process in subsections (b) and (c) of the former version of K.S.A. 19-203a only applied when county commissioner vacancies were to be filled at a special election. Issued July 23, 2024. KK/DB

Re: Elections; Independent and Other Nominations Certificates; Acceptance of Multiple Nominations Prohibited; Acceptance of One Nomination

Synopsis: According to K.S.A. 25-306(a) no person is eligible to accept the nomination of more than one party for the same office. Moreover, according to K.S.A. 25-306e, if a person is nominated by more than one party, the person must designate which party nomination the person accepts. Issued August 15, 2024. KK/AP

Re: Cities and Municipalities – Additions, Vacation and Lot Frontage – Annexation by Cities – Definitions – Conditions Which Permit Unilateral Annexation – Exceptions

Synopsis: Absent the consent of the land owner, a city may not annex any un-platted tract of agricultural land that is part of a larger tract of land of at least 21 acres. Cited herein: K.S.A. 12-519; 12-520. Issued September 6, 2024. KK/KW

Re: Cities of the Third Class – Government by Mayor and Council and General Laws Applicable to Cities of the Third Class – General Provisions; Cities of Third Class

Cities of the Second Class – Government by Mayor and Council and General Laws Applicable to Cities of the Second Class – General Provisions; Change in Classification of City from City of Third Class to City of Second Class

Cities of the First Class – Government by Mayor and Council and General Laws – General Provisions; Change in Classification of City from City of Second Class to City of First Class

Synopsis: K.S.A. 15-101, K.S.A. 14-101, and K.S.A. 13-101 do not provide for reclassifying a city based on a decrease in

population. But K.S.A. 14-901 does allow for a city of the second class to be reclassified as a city of the third class if the population falls to 1,000 or less and a majority of voters approve of the reclassification. There is no similar mechanism for reclassifying a city of the first class to a city of the second class.

We are unaware of any circumstances under which a city might have become a city of the first class without having attained a population of 15,000. It appears that every existing city of the first class has been determined to have had a population of more than 15,000 at some point in its history.

In appropriate circumstances, an action in mandamus or quo warranto could be brought in the name of the State to challenge a city's classification. In addition, the question of a city's classification could be raised in a declaratory judgment action by a party with standing or in the context of another dispute.

The enactment of K.S.A. 13-101 in 1903 did not require existing cities of the first class to recertify that they had a population of over 15,000 and obtain a new gubernatorial proclamation in order to maintain their status as cities of the first class.

Board of Nursing Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 17.—ADVANCED NURSING PROGRAM

60-17-101. Definitions. Each of the following terms, as used in this article of the board's regulations, shall have the meaning specified in this regulation:

(a) An "advanced nursing program" may be housed within a part of any of the following organizational units within an academic institution:

- (1) A college;
- (2) a school;
- (3) a division;
- (4) a department; or
- (5) an academic unit.

(b) "Academic equivalent" means the proportionate credit for formal academic coursework if that coursework is completed on the basis of trimester or quarter credit hours rather than semester credit hours.

(c) "Affiliating agency" means an agency that cooperates with the advanced nursing program to provide facilities and resources for selected student experiences.

(d) "Clinical learning experience" means an active process in which the student participates in advanced nursing activities while being guided by a member of the faculty.

(e) "Contractual agreement" means a written contract signed by the legal representatives of the advanced nursing program and the affiliating agency.

(f) "Criteria for unscheduled survey or site visit" means indications that the advanced nursing program no longer meets the requirements in the nurse practice act or the board's regulations.

(g) "Debriefing" means an activity that follows simulation and is led by a facilitator. Participants' reflective thinking is encouraged and feedback is provided regarding the participants' performance while various aspects of the completed simulation are discussed. Participants are encouraged to explore emotions and question, reflect, and provide feedback to one another in order to facilitate the transfer of learning to future situations.

(h) "Loss of approval" means the status that results when the board withdraws its approval of an advanced nursing program.

(i) "Online or distance learning" means the acquisition of knowledge and skills through information and instruction provided by means of a variety of technologies.

(j) "Practice hour" means 60 minutes of clinical learning experience.

(k) "Preceptor" means an advanced practice registered nurse or a physician supervising a student in the clinical setting and is not employed as nursing faculty. Any practice hours over 750 may be precepted with a licensed interdisciplinary professional with a health science degree at a master's level or above. The preceptor

provides oversight of each student's patients and gives feedback to the student and clinical instructor. The nursing program faculty shall not be required to be in the affiliating agency's facilities but shall be immediately available.

(l) "Program evaluation plan" means an advanced nursing program's written systematic methodology or plan for measuring and analyzing student learning outcomes and program outcomes against defined standards and timelines to determine effectiveness and provide for ongoing program improvement.

(m) "Satellite program" means an existing, approved advanced nursing program that is offered at a location geographically separate from the parent advanced nursing program. The students may spend a portion or all of their time at the satellite location. The curricula in all locations shall be the same, and each credential shall be conferred by the parent institution.

(n) "Semester credit hours" means at least 13 clock-hours of formal, didactic classroom instruction that occurs over the course of an academic semester and for which the applicant receives formal academic credit.

(o) "Simulation" means a teaching strategy utilizing technology to replace or amplify clinical situations with guided experiences that evoke or replicate substantial aspects of the real world in a fully interactive manner.

(p) "Survey or site visit" means an in-person assessment of all components of an advanced nursing program to validate information submitted by the advanced nursing program or to follow up on the board's determination that there is consistent evidence reflecting deficiencies in meeting the requirements.

(q) "Student learning outcomes" means the achievement of expected knowledge, skills, and attributes demonstrated by students at course and program levels. Student learning outcomes are measured in classroom and experiential settings and are reported in individual and aggregate formats, including retention and graduation rates, performance on certification examinations, and employment rates.

(r) "Transfer student" means an individual who is permitted to apply advanced nursing courses completed at another institution to a different advanced nursing program.

(s) "Quarter credit hour" means two-thirds of a semester credit hour. Quarter credit hours shall be rounded as follows:

(1) One quarter credit hour equals .7 semester hours.

(2) Two quarter credit hours equal 1.3 semester hours.

(3) Three quarter credit hours equal 2.0 semester hours.

(4) Four quarter credit hours equal 2.7 semester hours.

(5) Five quarter credit hours equal 3.3 semester hours. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2023 Supp. 74-1106; implementing K.S.A. 65-1133; effective March 31, 2000; amended May 18, 2012; amended Feb. 7, 2025.)

60-17-102. Requirements for initial approval. (a) Administration and organization.

(1) Each advanced nursing program or the institution of which it is a part shall be a legally constituted body. The controlling body shall be responsible for general policy and shall provide the financial support for the advanced nursing program.

(2) Authority and responsibility for administering the advanced nursing program shall be vested in the dedicated nurse administrator who has sufficient administrative time and support to achieve and maintain positive program and student outcomes.

(3) The advanced nursing program shall be accredited, be part of an institution that is accredited, or be in the process of being accredited by an agency that is approved by the United States department of education.

(b) Application. Each proposed advanced nursing program shall submit an initial application at least 60 days before a scheduled Kansas state board of nursing board meeting. The application shall include all of the following:

- (1) The course of study and credential to be conferred;
 - (2) the name and title of the administrator of the advanced nursing program;
 - (3) the name of the controlling body;
 - (4) the name and title of the administrator of the controlling body;
 - (5) the organizational chart;
 - (6) all sources of financial support, including a three-year budget;
 - (7) a proposed curriculum, indicating the total number of hours of both theoretical and clinical instruction;
 - (8) the program objectives or outcomes;
 - (9) the number, qualifications, and assignments of faculty members;
 - (10) the faculty policies;
 - (11) the admission requirements;
 - (12) a copy of the current school bulletin or catalog;
 - (13) a description of clinical facilities and client census data;
 - (14) each contractual agreement, which shall be signed at least three months before the first date on which students may enroll. Each hospital and agency serving as an affiliating agency providing facilities for clinical experience shall be licensed or accredited by the appropriate credentialing groups;
 - (15) the program evaluation plan; and
 - (16) a proposed date of initial admission of students to the advanced nursing program.
- (c) Each advanced nursing program shall have a site visit to validate information submitted in the program's application before granting approval, with the exception of nurse anesthesia programs, as determined by K.A.R. 60-13-103.

(1) During each site visit, the nurse administrator shall make available all of the following:

- (A) Administrators, prospective faculty and students, affiliating agencies, representatives, preceptors, and support services personnel to discuss the advanced nursing program;
- (B) faculty meeting minutes;
- (C) faculty and student handbooks;
- (D) policies and procedures;
- (E) curriculum materials;

(F) a copy of the advanced nursing program's budget; and

(G) contractual agreements.

(2) The nurse administrator or designated personnel shall take the site visit team to inspect the nursing educational facilities, including satellite program facilities and library facilities.

(3) Upon completion of the site visit, the nurse administrator shall be asked to correct any inaccurate statements contained in the site visit report, limiting these comments to errors, unclear statements, or omissions.

(d) Each institution wanting to establish an advanced nursing program shall have a site visit and be approved by the board before the admission of any students.

(e) If an advanced nursing program fails to meet the requirements of the board within a designated period of time, the advanced nursing program shall be notified by the board's designee of the board's intent to deny approval. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2023 Supp. 74-1106; implementing K.S.A. 65-1133; effective March 31, 2000; amended April 20, 2007; amended April 29, 2016; amended Feb. 7, 2025.)

60-17-103. Reapproval requirements. (a) Each advanced nursing program shall be reviewed for reapproval by the board every two years.

(b) Each advanced nursing program shall have a survey or site visit every five to 10 years.

(1) A survey or site visit may be conducted if there is evidence indicating any deficiency in meeting requirements.

(2) A survey or site visit of each nurse anesthesia program shall be conducted as required by K.A.R. 60-13-103.

(3) If the advanced nursing program is accredited by a national nursing accreditation agency, the survey or site visit may be made in coordination with a national nursing accreditation agency visit. Each advanced nursing program without national nursing accreditation shall have a survey or site visit every five years.

(c) The nurse administrator of each advanced nursing program shall make available all of the following information during a survey or site visit:

(1) Data about the advanced nursing program, including the following:

(A) The number of students;

(B) the legal body responsible for establishing advanced nursing program policies;

(C) an organizational chart; and

(D) a description of the budgetary process;

(2) a description of the nurse administrator's responsibilities;

(3) information about the faculty and preceptors, including the following:

(A) A description of the responsibilities of each position;

(B) the selection policies;

(C) the orientation plan;

(D) faculty organization by-laws; and

(E) the number of full-time and part-time faculty and nonnursing faculty with academic credentials and assignments;

(4) the faculty degree plan, if applicable;

(5) a copy of the current curriculum with the date of last revision;

(6) a description of education facilities, including classrooms, offices, library, and computers;

(7) a list of clinical facilities;

(8) the number of students enrolled; and

(9) policies for students as listed in K.A.R. 60-17-108.

(d) During a survey or site visit, the nurse administrator of the advanced nursing program shall make available all of the following:

(1) Educational institution administrators, faculty, support services personnel, preceptors, and students;

(2) staff at selected clinical facilities;

(3) faculty meeting minutes for at least the previous three years;

(4) faculty and student handbooks;

(5) student records;

(6) policies and procedures;

(7) curriculum materials;

(8) a copy of the advanced nursing program's budget;

(9) contractual agreements;

(10) an audited fiscal report covering the previous two years, including a statement of income and expenditures; and

(11) the testing process, with test analysis and the written test procedure.

(e) The nurse administrator of the advanced nursing program or designated personnel shall take the survey or site visit team to the nursing educational facilities, including satellite program facilities, library facilities, and affiliating or clinical facilities.

(f) Upon completion of the survey or site visit, the nurse administrator shall correct any inaccurate statements contained in the survey or site visit report, limiting these comments to errors, unclear statements, or omissions.

(g) If an advanced nursing program fails to meet requirements of the board within a designated period of time, the advanced nursing program shall be notified by the board's designee of the board's intent to deny reapproval. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2023 Supp. 74-1106; implementing K.S.A. 65-1133; effective March 31, 2000; amended April 20, 2007; amended Feb. 7, 2025.)

60-17-104. Administrator, faculty and preceptor qualifications. (a) Each nurse faculty member shall be

licensed as a registered professional nurse in Kansas.

(b) Each preceptor shall be licensed in the state in which the preceptor is currently practicing. Each preceptor can be a physician, advanced practice registered nurse, or licensed interdisciplinary professional with a health science degree at a master's level or above. Each preceptor shall complete a preceptor orientation that includes information about the pedagogical aspects of the student-preceptor relationship and course information.

(c) For advanced nursing programs in the role of nurse anesthesia, each nurse faculty member shall have the following academic preparation and experience:

(1) The dedicated nurse administrator who is responsible for the development and implementation of the advanced nursing program shall have had successful experience in administration or teaching and shall have a graduate degree in nursing. The program administrator shall have sufficient administrative time and support to achieve and maintain positive program/student outcomes.

(2) Each nurse faculty member who is assigned the responsibility of a course shall hold a graduate degree in nursing.

(3) Each nurse faculty member responsible for clinical instruction shall possess a license as an advanced practice registered nurse and a graduate degree in nursing.

(d) For advanced nursing programs in any role other than nurse anesthesia, each nurse faculty member shall have the following academic preparation and experience:

(1) The nurse administrator who is responsible for the development and implementation of the advanced nursing program shall have had experience in administration or teaching and shall have a graduate degree in nursing.

(2) Each nurse faculty member who is assigned the responsibility of a course shall hold a graduate degree. Each person who is hired as a nurse faculty member shall have a graduate degree in nursing, except for any person whose graduate degree was conferred before July 1, 2005.

(3) Each nurse faculty member responsible for coordinating clinical instruction shall possess a license as an advanced practice registered nurse in the role for which clinical instruction is provided and shall have a graduate degree. Each person who is hired as a nurse faculty member shall have a graduate degree in nursing, except for any person whose graduate degree was conferred before July 1, 2005.

(4) Each adjunct faculty member shall be licensed as an advanced practice registered nurse or shall be licensed as a physician in the state in which the individual is currently practicing.

(e) The nonnursing faculty of each advanced nursing program shall have graduate degrees in the area of expertise.

(f) The nurse administrator of each advanced nursing program shall submit to the board a faculty qualification report for each faculty member who is newly employed by the advanced nursing program. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2023 Supp. 74-1106 and K.S.A. 65-1164; implementing K.S.A. 65-1133 and K.S.A. 65-1152; effective March 31, 2000; amended April 20, 2007; amended May 18, 2012; amended Feb. 7, 2025.)

60-17-105. Curriculum requirements. (a) The faculty in each advanced nursing program shall fulfill these requirements:

(1) Identify the competencies of the graduate for each role of advanced nursing practice for which the advanced nursing program provides instruction;

(2) determine the approach and content for learning experiences;

(3) direct clinical instruction as an integral part of the advanced nursing program; and

(4) provide for learning experiences of the depth and scope needed to fulfill the objectives or outcomes of advanced nursing courses.

(b) The curriculum in each advanced nursing program shall include all of the following:

(1) Role alignment related to the distinction between practice as a registered professional nurse and the advanced role of an advanced practice registered nurse as specified in K.A.R. 60-11-101;

(2) theoretical instruction in the role or roles of advanced nursing practice for which the program provides instruction;

(3) the health care delivery system;

(4) the ethical and legal implications of advanced nursing practice;

(5) three semester credit hours or the academic equivalent in advanced pharmacology;

(6) three semester credit hours or the academic equivalent in advanced pathophysiology and three semester credit hours or the academic equivalent in advanced health assessment for licensure as an advanced practice registered nurse in a role other than nurse anesthesia and nurse midwifery;

(7) for any advanced nursing program completed after July 1, 2009, three semester credit hours or the academic equivalent in advanced pathophysiology and three semester credit hours or the academic equivalent in advanced health assessment; and

(8) clinical instruction in the area of specialization, which shall include the following:

(A) Performance of or ordering diagnostic procedures;

(B) evaluation of diagnostic and assessment findings; and

(C) the prescription of medications and other treatment modalities for client conditions.

(c)(1) Each advanced nursing program shall consist of at least 45 semester credit hours or the academic equivalent.

(2) The clinical component shall consist of at least 260 practice hours. After January 1, 2003, the clinical component shall consist of at least 500 practice hours. After July 1, 2009, the clinical component shall consist of at least 500 practice hours in each clinical track, or the advanced nursing program shall provide documentation of the overlap if any clinical track consists of less than 500 practice hours. After March 1, 2025, the clinical component shall consist of at least 750 practice hours in each clinical track. The advanced nursing program shall provide documentation if any clinical track consists of less than 750 practice hours. Practice hours of 750 or less must be precepted with a physician or advanced practice registered nurse. Any practice hours over 750 may be precepted with a licensed interdisciplinary professional with a health science degree at a master's level or above.

(d) Each nurse administrator shall meet the following requirements:

(1) Develop and implement a program evaluation plan; and

(2) submit any major revision to the curriculum of advanced nursing courses for board approval at least 30 days before a meeting of the board. The following shall be considered major revisions to the curriculum:

(A) Any significant change in the plan of curriculum organization; and

(B) any change in content.

(e) Each nurse administrator shall submit all revisions that are not major revisions, as defined in paragraph (d) (2), to the board or the board's designee for approval. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2023 Supp. 74-1106; implementing K.S.A. 65-1133; effective March 31, 2000; amended April 20, 2007; amended May 18, 2012; amended Feb. 7, 2025.)

60-17-106. Clinical resources. (a) Each advanced nursing program shall have contractual agreements. Each contractual agreement shall be kept on file in the advanced nursing program office.

(b) Clinical learning experiences and sites shall be selected to provide learning opportunities necessary to achieve the student learning outcomes.

(c) Faculty shall facilitate and evaluate student learning experiences in the clinical area.

(d) Preceptors shall be responsible for assessing performance in the clinical setting.

(e) The advanced nursing program shall provide verification that each agency used for clinical instruction has clinical facilities that are adequate for the number of students served in terms of space, equipment, and other necessary resources, including an adequate number of patients or clients necessary to meet the student learning outcomes.

(f) The advanced nursing program shall contract with an adequate number of appropriate affiliating agencies so that there will be appropriate clinical learning experiences to meet curriculum objectives or outcomes. The advanced nursing program faculty shall provide the affiliating agency staff with the organizing curriculum framework and either the objectives or outcomes for that clinical learning experience. A sufficient number and variety of patients representing appropriate age groups shall be available to provide clinical learning experiences to meet student learning outcomes. If more than one advanced nursing program uses the same affiliating agency, each advanced nursing program shall document the availability of appropriate clinical learning experiences for all of its students. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2023 Supp. 74-1106; implementing K.S.A. 65-1133; effective March 31, 2000; amended Feb. 7, 2025.)

60-17-107. Educational facilities. (a) Classrooms, laboratories, and conference rooms shall be available at the time needed and shall be adequate in size, number, and type, according to the number of students and the educational purposes for which the rooms are to be used.

(b) The advanced nursing program shall provide all of the following:

(1) A physical facility that is safe and conducive to learning;

(2) space for counseling students in private that is available and adequate in size and number;

(3) secured space for nursing student records; and

(4) current technological resources and student support services for online or distance learning if online or distance learning is provided.

(c) Library holdings, instructional media, and materials shall be of sufficient recency, pertinence, level of content, and quantity as indicated by the curriculum to meet the needs of nursing students and faculty and shall be available to online or distance learning students. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2023 Supp. 74-1106; implementing K.S.A. 65-1133; effective March 31, 2000; amended April 20, 2007; amended Feb. 7, 2025.)

60-17-108. Student policies. (a) Each advanced nursing program shall have clearly defined written student policies for all of the following:

- (1) Admission, including a requirement that each student in the advanced nursing program must have a current license to practice as a registered professional nurse in the United States or any of its territories;
 - (2) transfer students;
 - (3) readmission;
 - (4) counseling and guidance;
 - (5) progression criteria;
 - (6) student representation in faculty governance;
 - (7) graduation;
 - (8) oral and written English proficiency as specified in K.A.R. 60-3-106;
 - (9) the difference between the student role and the employee role;
 - (10) refund policies governing all fees and tuition paid by the student; and
 - (11) ethical practices for the performance of activities, including recruitment, admission, and advertising.
- (b) Each advanced nursing program shall have a written policy providing information to all students regarding licensure denial pursuant to K.S.A. 65-1120, and amendments thereto. The information shall be provided to each student before admission to the advanced nursing program. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2023 Supp. 74-1106; implementing K.S.A. 65-1133; effective March 31, 2000; amended April 20, 2007; amended Feb. 7, 2025.)

60-17-109. Reports. (a) Each advanced nursing program shall submit an annual report to the board on or before June 30 of each year, which shall include all of the following data:

- (1) Any changes in advanced nursing program policies, the organizing framework for the curriculum, and advanced nursing program objectives or outcomes and all curriculum changes as specified in K.A.R. 60-17-105;
- (2) faculty responsibilities for required advanced nursing courses;
- (3) the name, license number, academic credentials, employment date, and full-time or part-time status of each member of the advanced nursing program faculty;
- (4) the name, license number, academic credentials, professional experience, and place of practice for each preceptor;
- (5) the nurse administrator's teaching responsibilities;
- (6) the name and address of each affiliating agency;
- (7) student enrollment, retention, and graduation statistics;
- (8) faculty hiring, retention, and separation statistics;
- (9) the total number of library holdings and the number of holdings regarding nursing;
- (10) for the most recent year, the budget spent on library and audiovisual acquisitions for the advanced nursing

program;

(11) a response to the recommendations and requirements identified by the board based on the advanced nursing program's last annual report or the last site visit;

(12) any proposed changes to the advanced nursing program;

(13) an audited fiscal report covering the previous two years, including a statement of income and expenditures;

(14) any complaints involving KSBN educational statutes and regulations;

(15) a description of the practices used to safeguard the health and well-being of students; and

(16) a copy of the school's current catalog.

(b) If the advanced nursing program fails to meet requirements of the board or to submit required reports within a designated period of time, the advanced nursing program shall be notified and given the opportunity for a hearing regarding the board's intent to remove the program from the list of approved advanced nursing programs. Kansas Lottery Temporary Administrative Regulations

Article 23.—SPECIFIC eINSTANTS RULES

111-23-9. “Jayhawk Riches” eInstant ticket lottery game. (a) The Kansas lottery may conduct an eInstant lottery game entitled “Jayhawk Riches.” The rules for this game are contained in K.A.R. 111-22-1 et seq. and 111-23-9.

(b) The “play symbols” for this game are the numbers one through 39, expressed in a two-digit format, and a Jayhawk mascot instant win symbol. Prize symbols shall be randomly assigned at the time of purchase and may appear in any combination that equals any prize described in paragraph (j).

(c) For this game, six “Winning Numbers” and 20 “Your Numbers” shall appear in the game area.

(d) Each pool shall consist of 10,000,000 tickets.

(e) The price of tickets for this game shall be \$1.00, \$2.00, \$5.00, \$10.00, \$20.00, and \$30.00.

(f) “Jayhawk Riches” is a key number match game with an instant win feature. The player may purchase a ticket by pressing the “Play” icon. The player may reveal the play and prize symbols by manually clicking on each symbol, or by clicking on the “Reveal All” icon. If the player matches any “Winning Number” to any “Your Number,” the player wins the prize shown below that symbol. If the player reveals a Jayhawk mascot symbol, the player wins the prize shown under that symbol automatically.

(g) The total number of prizes in any winning game may be variable but shall equal any prize described in paragraph (j).

(h) Approximately 60,000,000 tickets shall be ordered initially for this eInstant game. Additional ticket orders shall have the same prize structure, the same number of prizes per prize pool of 10,000,000 tickets, and the same odds as were contained in the initial ticket order.

(i) Each prize shall be calculated by multiplying the prize multiplier by the ticket cost. The expected number of prizes in this game shall be as follows:

(c) For this game, six “Winning Numbers” and 20 “Your Numbers” shall appear in the game area.

(d) Each pool shall consist of 10,000,000 tickets.

(e) The price of tickets for this game shall be \$1.00, \$2.00, \$5.00, \$10.00, \$20.00, and \$30.00.

(f) “Wildcat Riches” is a key number match game with an instant win feature. The player may purchase a ticket by pressing the “Play” icon. The player may reveal the play and prize symbols by manually clicking on each symbol, or by clicking on the “Reveal All” icon. If the player matches any “Winning Number” to any “Your Number,” the player wins the prize shown below that symbol. If the player reveals a Powercat mascot symbol, the player wins the prize shown under that symbol automatically.

(g) The total number of prizes in any winning game may be variable but shall equal any prize described in paragraph (j).

(h) Approximately 60,000,000 tickets shall be ordered initially for this instant game. Additional ticket orders shall have the same prize structure, the same number of prizes per prize pool of 10,000,000 tickets, and the same odds as were contained in the initial ticket order.

Article 301.—SPECIFIC LOTTERY FACILITY GAMES AT LOTTERY GAMING FACILITIES

111-301-41. Definitions. The following definitions, when used in the Southwest Kansas Lottery Gaming Zone and when pertaining to the game of “TriLux” or “21 + 3,” shall have the following meanings unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

- (a) A “blackjack” shall mean an ace and any card having a point value of 10 dealt as the initial two cards to a player or a dealer, except that this shall not include an ace and a ten point value card dealt to a player who has split pairs.
- (b) “Burned” shall mean to remove a card from play.
- (c) “Dealer” shall mean the person responsible for dealing the cards at a Blackjack table.
- (d) “Discard rack” shall mean the receptacle into which cards are placed after each round of decisions is rendered in a game.
- (e) “Flush” shall mean three cards in the same suit.
- (f) “Hard total” shall mean the total point count of a hand which contains no aces or which contains one or more aces that are each counted as having one point in value.
- (g) “Mini-royal” shall mean an ace, king and queen all in the same suit.
- (h) “Push” or “tie” shall mean the player does not lose or win the hand played.
- (i) “Shoe” shall mean the receptacle into which cards are placed to be held for dealing to the players and dealer.
- (j) “Soft total” shall mean the total point count of a hand containing an ace when the ace is counted as having 11 points in value.
- (k) “Straight” shall mean three cards in consecutive rank order.
- (l) “Straight flush” shall mean three cards in consecutive rank order that are all in the same suit.
- (m) “Three-of-a-kind” shall mean three cards of the same rank. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2024 Supp. 74-8710 and 74-8748; implementing K.S.A. 2024 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-5-16-12, April 11, 2012; amended, T-111-12-31-24, Dec. 11, 2024.)

111-301-43. Wagers. (a) Prior to the first card being dealt for each round of play, each player at the game of “21 + 3” or “TriLux” shall make a wager against the dealer which shall win if:

- (1) The score of the player is 21 or less and the score of the dealer is in excess of 21;
- (2) The score of the player exceeds that of the dealer without either score exceeding 21; or

(3) The player has achieved a score of 21 in two cards and the dealer has achieved a score of 21 in more than two cards.

(b) Except as otherwise provided in these rules a wager made in accordance with this section shall be void when the score of the player is the same as the dealer; provided, however, that a player's wager shall be lost when the dealer has a blackjack and the player has a score of 21 which is not a blackjack.

(c) Except as otherwise provided in these rules, no wager shall be made, increased or withdrawn after the first card of the respective round has been dealt.

(d) All wagers at blackjack shall be made by placing gaming chips on the appropriate areas of the "21 + 3" or "TriLux" layout.

(e) After each round of play is complete, the dealer shall collect all losing wagers and pay off all winning wagers. All winning wagers against the dealer made in accordance with these rules shall be paid at odds of one to one with the exception of a blackjack which shall be paid at odds of three to two.

(f) Once the first card of any hand has been removed from the shoe by the dealer, no player shall handle, remove or alter any wagers that have been made until a decision has been rendered and implemented with respect to that wager except as permitted by these rules.

(g) Once a wager on the insurance line, a wager to double down, or a wager to split pairs has been made and confirmed by the dealer, no player shall handle, remove or alter such wagers until a decision has been rendered and implemented with respect to that wager except as permitted by these regulations.

(h) A double down wager shall win if the total of the player's cards exceeds the total of the dealer's cards without exceeding a total of 21. A double down wager shall push if the player's hand and the dealer's hand are equal. A double down wager shall lose if the total of the player's cards exceeds 21 or is less than the total of the dealer's cards, provided the total of the dealer's cards does not exceed 21. A double down wager shall be paid at the rate of one to one on both the original wager and the double down portion of the wager. A player may double down after splitting pairs, except a player may not double down after splitting aces.

(i) A split bet shall win if the total of the player's cards exceeds the total of the dealer's cards without exceeding a total of 21. A split bet shall lose if the total of the player's cards exceeds 21 or is less than the total of the dealer's cards. A split bet shall push if the player's hand and the dealer's hand are equal. A split bet shall be paid at the rate of one to one on both the original wager and the split wager.

(j) The following describes a list of the permissible wagers, payout odds, and what constitutes a win or loss for three-card wagers:

(1) An optional three-card wager may be made by the player prior to the first card of the hand being removed from the shoe in an area on the table layout designated for the three-card wager. The player must make an original blackjack wager in order to place the three-card wager. The minimum and maximum three-card wager will be posted at the table.

(2) An additional three-card wager may be made as a tip for the dealer.

(3) A three-card wager will win if the dealer's card turned face up and the player's original two cards combined equal a mini-royal, flush, straight, three-of-a-kind, or straight flush.

(4) A three-card wager will lose if the dealer's card turned face up and the player's original two cards combined do not equal a flush, straight, three-of-a-kind, straight flush or mini-royal.

(5) Winning three-card wagers will be paid out as follows:

(A) When the player's original two cards and the dealer's card turned face up combined equal a flush, the hand will be paid at the rate of 5 to 1;

(B) When the player's original two cards and the dealer's card turned face up combined equal a straight, the hand will be paid at the rate of 10 to 1;

(C) When the player's original two cards and the dealer's card turned face up combined equal a three-of-a-kind, the hand will be paid at the rate of 20 to 1;

(D) When the player's original two cards and the dealer's card turned face up combined equal a straight flush, the hand will be paid at the rate of 30 to 1;

(E) When the player's original two cards and the dealer's card turned face up combined equal a mini-royal, the hand will be paid at the rate of 50 to 1; and

(F) All three-card wagers will be taken or paid before the blackjack portion of the game continues.

(k) If the optional TriLux Super 3 side wager is offered at the gaming table, the following describes a list of the permissible wagers, payout odds, and what constitutes a win or loss for TriLux Super 3 wagers:

(1) Prior to the first card of the round of play being dealt, a TriLux Super 3 wager may be made by the player in an area on the table layout designated for the TriLux Super 3 wager. The player may be required to make a three-card wager in order to place the TriLux Super 3 wager. The minimum and maximum TriLux Super 3 wager and whether the three-card wager is required in order to make the TriLux Super 3 wager will be posted at the table and/or on the gaming table layout.

(2) An additional TriLux Super 3 wager may be made as a tip for the dealer.

(3) A TriLux Super 3 wager will win if the dealer's card turned face up and the player's original two cards combined equal a three-of-a-kind with all three cards in the same suit, straight flush or three of a kind and not all three cards are in the same suit.

(4) A TriLux Super 3 wager will lose if the dealer's card turned face up and the player's original two cards combined do not equal a three-of-a-kind with all three cards in the same suit, straight flush or three of a kind and not all of the cards are in the same suit.

(5) Winning TriLux Super 3 wagers will be paid out as follows:

(A) When the player's original two cards and the dealer's card turned face up combined equal a three-of-a-kind with all three cards in the same suit, the wager will be paid at the rate of 270 to 1;

(B) When the player's original two cards and the dealer's card turned face up combined equal a straight flush, the wager will be paid at the rate of 180 to 1; and

(C) When the player's original two cards and the dealer's card turned face up combined equal a three-of-a-kind and all three cards are not in the same suit the wager will be paid at the rate of 90 to 1.

(6) All TriLux Super 3 wagers will be taken or paid before the blackjack portion of the game continues.

111-401-35. Method of play. The Hollywood Casino at Kansas Speedway may designate certain poker games

to participate in the Bad Beat Jackpot. The jackpot will be funded from each pot reaching a minimum of \$20. When the pot for a game reaches \$20, \$1 is placed in the Bad Beat drop box (a box located at each game table designated for the receipt of chips or cash). The contents of each Bad Beat drop box will be taken to the count room during the regular table games drop (the removal of chips and money from the gaming tables). The contents of each Bad Beat drop box will be counted daily and the amount will be added to the existing Bad Beat jackpot amount by a poker supervisor. The following additional rules shall apply to the Bad Beat jackpot:

(a) A minimum of \$20 (including pot money and rake) must be in the pot for that hand in order for the hand to qualify for the Bad Beat jackpot.

(b) All Bad Beat funds collected will be credited to the "primary fund," "secondary fund," "tertiary fund," and "promotional fund" according to any of the following sets of percentages as requested by the casino manager and pre-approved by the Kansas lottery:

(1) Set one:

(a) Three percent (3%) shall be credited to the primary fund;

(b) one percent (1%) to the secondary fund;

(c) one percent (1%) to the tertiary fund; and,

(d) ninety-five percent (95%) to the promotional fund.

(2) Set two:

(a) Three percent (3%) shall be credited to the primary fund;

(b) one percent (1%) to the secondary fund:

(c) zero percent (0%) to the tertiary fund; and,

(d) ninety-six percent (96%) to the promotional fund.

(3) Set three:

(a) Five percent (5%) shall be credited to the primary fund;

(b) one percent (1%) to the secondary fund:

(c) zero percent (0%) to the tertiary fund; and,

(d) ninety-four percent (94%) to the promotional fund.

(4) Set four:

(a) Seven percent (7%) shall be credited to the primary fund;

(b) one percent (1%) to the secondary fund:

(c) zero percent (0%) to the tertiary fund; and,

(d) ninety-two percent (92%) to the promotional fund.

(c) The primary fund shall be used to pay winners of the Bad Beat jackpot as set forth in these rules.

(d) The secondary fund shall be transferred to the primary fund after a Bad Beat jackpot has been paid.

(e) The tertiary fund shall be transferred to the secondary fund after the secondary fund has been transferred to the primary fund.

(f) The promotional fund will be used to pay for promotional and marketing activities related to the game of poker, including but not necessarily limited to free giveaways, no entry fee tournaments, food and beverages, and other poker player related activities offered from time to time by the Hollywood Casino at Kansas Speedway.

(g) Distribution of the Bad Beat Jackpot shall be as follows:

(1) Fifty percent (or equal portions of fifty percent if more than one player is holding a qualifying Bad Beat hand) of the Bad Beat jackpot total for the game in which the Bad Beat occurred will be given to the holder(s) of the Bad Beat (losing) hand.

(2) Twenty-five percent (or equal portions of twenty-five percent if more than one player is holding the winning hand) of the Bad Beat jackpot total in which the Bad Beat occurred will be given to the holder(s) of the winning hand.

(3) The remaining twenty-five percent of the Bad Beat jackpot for the game in which the Bad Beat occurred will be split among the remaining players at the table who were dealt a hand in that game.

(4) All payouts will be rounded up to the nearest dollar, adjusting the remaining jackpot balance accordingly.

(h) A minimum of four players must be dealt in a hand in order for the hand to qualify for the Bad Beat jackpot.

(i) Bad Beat money will not be taken from a game in which fewer than four players are dealt cards.

(j) Should there be a deviation (for example a misdeal, a missing card, two cards of the same rank and suit, extra cards, cheating) the jackpot may be declared null and void by the poker supervisor or higher ranking casino official. Article 501.—SOUTH CENTRAL GAMING ZONE

111-501-44. Rules of the game and bet definitions. (a) The stickperson, boxperson, table games supervisor or a higher-ranking casino employee shall have the authority to invalidate a roll of the dice by calling “no roll” for any of the following reasons:

(1) If the wrong player picks up the dice and throws or rolls them.

(2) If the dice do not hit the end of the table opposite the shooter.

(3) The dice do not leave the shooter’s hand simultaneously.

(4) Either or both of the dice come to rest on the chips constituting the craps bank (the chips in front of the boxperson).

(5) Either or both of the dice come to rest in the dice bowl in front of the stickperson or on one of the rails surrounding the table.

(6) Either or both of the dice go off the table.

(7) Whenever one die comes to rest on top of the other.

(8) The shooter does not have either a pass or don't pass bet.

(9) Either or both of the dice do not move with forward motion.

(10) If the player shooting the dice removes either one or both dice from the view of the boxperson or table games supervisor or higher-ranking casino official immediately before he shoots them.

(11) If the player attempts to deface the dice purposely or unintentionally immediately before the player shoots the dice.

(b) Whenever new dice are put into the game or existing dice are returned to the game, they shall be inspected by the boxperson before being put into the dice bowl.

(c) Permissible wagers shall be as follows:

(1) "Pass bet" shall mean a wager placed on the pass line of the layout immediately prior to the come-out roll.

(2) The "pass bet" shall win if, on the come-out roll a total of 7 or 11 is thrown, or a total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown and that total is again thrown before a total of 7 appears.

(3) The "pass bet" shall lose if, on the come-out roll a total of 2, 3 or 12 is thrown, or a total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown and a 7 subsequently appears before that total is thrown again.

(4) "Don't pass bet" shall mean a wager placed on the don't pass line of the layout immediately prior to the come-out roll.

(5) The "don't pass bet" shall win if, on the come-out roll a total of 2 or 3 is thrown, or a total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown and a 7 subsequently appears before that total is again thrown.

(6) The "don't pass bet" shall lose if, on the come-out roll a total of 7 or 11 is thrown, or a total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown and that total is again thrown before a 7 appears.

(7) The "don't pass bet" shall be void if, on the come-out roll a total of 12 is thrown.

(8) "Come bet" shall mean a wager placed on the come line of the layout at any time after the come-out roll.

(9) The "come bet" shall win if, on the roll immediately following placement of such bet a total of 7 or 11 is thrown, or a total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown and that total is again thrown before a 7 appears.

(10) The "come bet" shall lose if, on the roll immediately following placement of such bet a total of 2, 3, or 12 is thrown, or a total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown and a 7 subsequently appears before that total is again thrown.

(11) "Don't come bet" shall mean a wager placed on the "don't come" area of the layout at any time after the come-out roll.

(12) The "don't come bet" shall win if, on the roll immediately following placement of such bet a total of 2 or 3 is thrown, or a total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown and a 7 subsequently appears before that total is again thrown.

(13) The "don't come bet" shall lose if, on the roll immediately following placement of such bet a total of 7 or 11 is thrown, or a total of 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, or 10 is thrown and that total is again thrown before a 7 appears.

(14) The "don't come bet" shall be void if, on the roll following placement of such bet a total of 12 is thrown.

(15) "Place bet to win" shall mean a wager that may be made at any time on any of the numbers 4, 5, 6, 8, 9 or 10 which shall win if the number on which wager was placed is thrown before a 7 and shall lose if a 7 is thrown before such number. All place bets shall be active on any roll, except the come-out roll, unless called "on" by the

player and confirmed by the dealer through placement of an “on” button on top of such player’s wager.

(16) “Buy bets” shall mean a wager that may be made at any time, on the 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, and 10. A buy bet shall win if the particular number is thrown before a 7 is thrown and shall lose if a 7 is thrown before that number is thrown. In addition to the payout odds set forth in these rules for place bets on 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, and 10, the player may also be offered the option of receiving true odds on these bets in return for the player paying at the time of making the bet an amount not to exceed five percent of such wager.

(17) “Lay bets” shall mean a wager that may be made at any time, against any of the numbers 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, and 10. A lay bet shall win if a 7 is thrown before the particular number against which the wager is placed and shall lose if a particular number against which the wager is placed is thrown before a 7 is thrown. The player may also be offered true odds on these bets, for which the player may be charged a fee not to exceed five percent on the amount to be won.

(18) “Four the hardway” shall mean a wager, that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 4 is thrown the hardway (i.e., with 2 appearing on each die, before a 4 is thrown in any other way and before a 7 is thrown).

(19) “Six the hardway” shall mean a wager, that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 6 is thrown the hardway (i.e., with 3 appearing on each die before 6 is thrown in any other way and before a 7 is thrown).

(20) “Eight the hardway” shall mean a wager, that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 8 is thrown the hardway (i.e., with 4 appearing on each die before 8 is thrown in any other way and before a 7 is thrown).

(21) “Ten the hardway” shall mean a wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if a total of 10 is thrown the hardway (i.e., with 5 appearing on each die before 10 is thrown in any other way and before a 7 is thrown).

(22) “Field bet” shall mean a one-roll wager that may be made at any time which shall win if any of the totals of 2, 3, 4, 9, 10, 11, or 12 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such bets and shall lose if a total of 5, 6, 7, or 8 is thrown on such a roll.

(23) “Any seven” or “big red” shall mean a one-roll wager that may be made at any time which shall win if a total of 7 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such a bet and shall lose if any other total is thrown.

(24) “Any craps” shall mean a one roll wager that may be made at any time which shall win if a total of 2, 3, or 12 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other total is thrown.

(25) “Two Craps,” “aces,” or “low” shall mean a one-roll wager that may be made at any time which shall win if a total of 2 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other total is thrown.

(26) “Three Craps” or “ace-deuce” shall mean a one-roll wager that may be made at any time which shall win if a total of 3 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other total is thrown.

(27) “Twelve Craps,” “high,” or “boxcars” shall mean a one-roll wager that may be made at any time which shall win if a total of 12 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other total is thrown.

(28) “Eleven” or “yo” shall mean a one-roll wager that may be made at any time which shall win if a total of 11 is

thrown on the next roll and shall lose if any other total is thrown.

(29) "Horn bet" shall mean a one-roll wager that may be made at any time which shall win if a total of 2, 3, 11, or 12 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other total is thrown.

(30) "Horn high bet" shall mean a one-roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if any one of the totals 2, 3, 11, or 12 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose, if any other total is thrown. A horn high bet will be placed in units of five, with four units wagered as a horn bet and an additional unit wagered on one of the totals 2, 3, 11, or 12.

(31) "World bet" shall mean a one-roll wager that may be made at any time, which shall win if any one of the totals 2, 3, 7, 11, or 12 is thrown on the roll immediately following placement of such bet and shall lose if any other total is thrown. A world bet shall be placed on the lower line of the any seven-wager area in units of five with one unit wagered on each of the totals 2, 3, 7, 11, or 12.

(32) "3-way craps" shall mean a one-roll wager, that may be made at any time, which shall win, if any one of the following totals 2, 3, or 12 is thrown on the roll immediately following the placement of such bet and shall lose if any other total is thrown. A "3-way craps" bet will be placed with one unit wagered on each of the totals 2, 3, or 12. The dealer shall place such a wager touching the "C" of the any craps wager area and the horn or horn high wagering area.

(33) "Hop bet" means a one-roll wager that may be made at any time on a specific combination designated by the player which will win if the combination is thrown on a roll immediately following placement of such bet and will lose if any other combination is thrown.

(34) "Hop bet all others" means a one-roll wager that may be made at any time on an allowable specific combination designated by the player that will win if the combination is thrown on a roll immediately following placement of such wager and will lose if any other combination is thrown. The allowable specific combinations include 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, or 10 but do not include any hardway wagers.

(35) "Hop bet hard" means a one-roll wager that may be made at any time on an allowable specific combination designated by the player that will win if the combination is thrown on a roll immediately following placement of such wager and will lose if any other combination is thrown. The allowable specific combinations include four the hardway, six the hardway, eight the hardway, and ten the hardway.

(36) "Big six" or "big 6" means a wager placed in the area of the layout marked "big six" or "big 6," which shall win if a total of 6 is thrown before a 7 and shall lose if a 7 is thrown before a 6.

(37) "Big eight" or "big 8" means a wager placed on the area of the layout marked "big eight" or "big 8" and shall win if a total of eight is thrown before a 7 and shall lose if a 7 is thrown before an 8.

(38) "Split bet" means a one-roll wager that is placed on the line or area between two proposition bets. One half of the split bet is being bet on each side. Both bets will be left up and a net payoff is made to the player.

(39) "Craps-eleven" or "C and E" means a one-roll split bet on any craps and eleven.

(40) "High-low" means a one-roll split bet aces (2) and twelve (12).

(41) "Ace deuce-any craps" means a one-roll bet which is unique because if ace deuce (3) rolls, both sides of the bet win.

(42) "Put bets" are bets that are made directly on any number at any time, including the point, after the come-out roll has already been made. Put bets are allowed full odds as well.

(43) "All small" is an optional wager that may be offered on selected craps tables that is placed before the point is established by a new shooter and may also be placed after a winning all small wager is rolled. The wager will win if each of the totals 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 are all rolled by the shooter before a 7 is rolled. The totals 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 may be rolled in any order, the same total may be rolled more than once, and rolling the totals 8, 9, 10, 11, or 12 are irrelevant to the wager. The wager will lose if a 7 is rolled before each of the totals 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 are all rolled by the shooter.

(44) "All tall" is an optional wager that may be offered on selected craps tables that is placed before the point is established by a new shooter and may also be placed after a winning all tall wager is rolled. The wager will win if each of the totals 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12 are all rolled by the shooter before a 7 is rolled. The totals 8, 9, 10, 11, or 12 may be rolled in any order, the same totals may be rolled more than once, and rolling the totals 2, 3, 4, 5, or 6 are irrelevant to the wager. The wager will lose if a 7 is rolled before each of the totals 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12 are all rolled by the shooter.

(45) "Make 'em all" is an optional wager that may be offered on selected craps tables that is placed before the point is established by a new shooter and may also be placed after a winning make 'em all wager is rolled. The wager will win if totals 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12 are all rolled by the shooter before a 7 is rolled. The totals 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12 may be rolled in any order and the same total may be rolled more than once. The wager will lose if a 7 is rolled before totals 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, 10, 11, and 12 are all rolled by the shooter.

(46) "Hot shooter jackpot" is an optional wager that may be offered on selected craps tables that is placed by a player prior to the come-out roll after a seven out is rolled. The minimum and maximum amounts of the wager allowed to be made, if any, shall be posted at the gaming table. A player shall win the wager if, beginning with the next roll and continuing for at least seven more rolls thereafter, a seven out is not rolled. A player shall lose the wager if beginning with the next roll of the dice a seven out is rolled in seven or fewer rolls. For all winning wagers the number of rolls made prior to a seven out and payout odds are as follows:

- (A) eight to fifteen rolls pays one times the wager;
- (B) sixteen to twenty-three rolls pays three times the wager;
- (C) twenty-four to thirty-one rolls pays five times the wager;
- (D) thirty-two to thirty-nine rolls pays seven times the wager;
- (E) forty to forty-four rolls pays twelve times the wager;
- (F) forty-five to forty-nine rolls pays thirty times the wager; and
- (G) fifty or more rolls pays one-hundred times the wager.

Only the highest amount for which the wager qualifies shall be paid.

(47) "Power odds" may be offered on selected craps tables. Power odds may be randomly applied to one or more of the following wagers: any craps; craps; any seven; eleven; hop; horn; and all hardway wagers. Power odds shall only apply to wagers for the roll immediately following activation of the indicator light. An indicator light on the table game layout shall appear when power odds are active, but the indicator light shall not appear until after the time allowed for making wagers has expired. The lottery gaming facility manager shall pre-select either payable one or payable two, below. Winning wagers to which power odds apply shall be paid at the following odds:

- (A) Paytable one:
 - (1) any craps or craps pays ten to one;

- (2) any seven pays thirteen to two;
- (3) eleven, hop bet all others, or horn with a 3 and 11 pays twenty-two to one;
- (4) horn with a 2 and 12 pays forty-six to one;

- (6) four the hardway pays ten to one;
- (7) six the hardway pays thirteen to one;
- (8) eight the hardway pays thirteen to one; and
- (9) ten the hardway pays ten to one.

(B) Paytable two:

- (1) any craps or craps pays fourteen to one;
- (2) any seven pays eighteen to two;
- (3) eleven, hop bet all others, or horn with a 3 and 11 pays thirty to one;
- (4) horn with a 2 and 12 pays sixty-two to one;
- (5) hop bet pairs pays sixty-two to one;
- (6) four the hardway pays fourteen to one;
- (7) six the hardway pays eighteen to one;
- (8) eight the hardway pays eighteen to one; and
- (9) ten the hardway pays fourteen to one.
