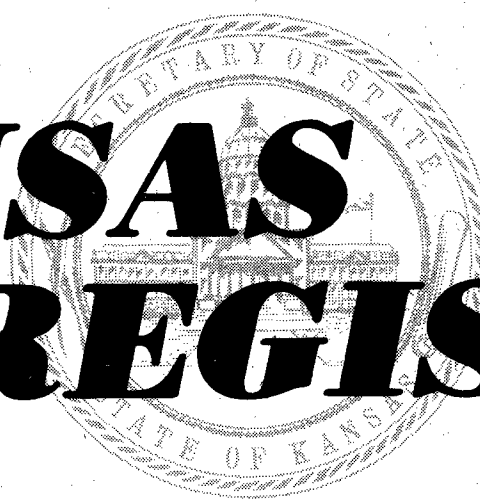

Advisory Opinion No. 82-1

Written January 13, 1982 to R. Michael Keeble, Controller, University of Kansas Medical Center, 39th and Rainbow Blvd., Kansas City, Kansas 66103.

This opinion is in response to your letter of December 4, 1981, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Public Disclosure Commission concerning K.S.A. 47-247.

We understand you ask for this opinion in your capacity as Controller for the University of Kansas Medical Center. You describe the situation where some employees who have a scheduled salary of less than \$20,000.00 on an annual basis might receive income in calendar year 1982 slightly in excess of \$20,000.00 due to a pay schedule by which 1981 earnings will be received in the 1982 calendar year.

We understand you to ask whether those persons who would receive in excess of \$20,000.00 in 1982 solely because of the receipt of 1981 earnings in the 1982 calendar year are required to file a statement of substantial interest pursuant to K.S.A. 46-247(c).

K.S.A. 46-247(c) requires state officers and employees, "receiving compensation from the State at a rate of \$20,000.00 per year, or more," to file statements of substantial interests. "Compensation" is defined in K.S.A. 46-216 to include the economic benefit conferred on one. As we view the situation, the "compensation" was conferred on the employee in 1981 and those earnings should not be attributed to 1982 for the purposes of determining the threshold for reporting under K.S.A. 46-247(c).

Advisory Opinion No. 82-2

Written January 13, 1982 to Marcia K. Ricklefs, S.R.S.—105, P.O. Box 1424, Topeka, Kansas 66601.

This opinion is in response to your letter of De-

ember 7, 1981 in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Public Disclosure Commission.

We note at the outset that the Commission's jurisdiction on this matter is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* and K.S.A. 25-4301 *et seq.*, the latter of which does not apply here. Thus, whether some other common law, statutory system, or rule and regulation applies to your question is not covered by this opinion.

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as an Income Maintenance Worker with the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services. In that capacity a portion of your caseload deals with clients in the aged, blind and disabled categories whose last names fall within the "A" to "GUN" portion of the alphabet.

You describe for us a program for Adult Family Home Services which is administered by S.R.S. The program consists in part of the provision by individuals of room and board to an aged, blind or disabled person. Providers are paid a monthly fee for the service.

Based on this factual situation, you ask whether it would be permissible for you to be a provider of services under the Adult Family Home Services program so long as the aged, blind or disabled person is not one of your clients.

We have reviewed K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* in its entirety and so long as you do not participate in any manner in your capacity as a state employee in the process by which you are approved as a provider or in which recipients of the service are selected, or in the preparation of any contracts relating to the provision of such service, we find no conflict of interest to exist under the factual situation provided to us.

OFFICE OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL**OPINION NO. 82-3**

Taxation—Miscellaneous Provisions—Interest Charges on Delinquent Special Assessments. David F. Louis, State Representative, Eighteenth District, Shawnee, January 13, 1982.

The provisions of K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 79-2004 grant the authority for the charging of interest upon delinquent special assessments, when said special assessments, by law, are to be collected in the same manner as other taxes. Cited herein: K.S.A. 79-1804, K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 79-2004, 79-2968. RJB

OPINION NO. 82-4

Taxation—Collection of Taxes—Notice of Taxes "Charged"; Publication Fees. John E. Lang, Pottawatomie County Counselor, Wamego, January 13, 1982.

The provisions of K.S.A. 79-3001 (as amended by L. 1981, ch. 173, § 78), relating to the collection of a \$5 fee, were inserted, by inadvertence, in that statute. Consequently, those provisions are meaningless and should be disregarded. Cited herein: K.S.A. 19-547 (as amended by L. 1981, ch. 173, § 55), 79-2001 (as amended by L. 1981, ch. 173, § 78), 79-2301, 79-2302. RJB.

OPINION NO. 82-5

Crimes and Punishments—Identification and Detection of Criminals—Duty of University of Kansas to Assist Law Enforcement Officers and Coroners. Michael G. Moroney, Counsel to the Sheriff of Wyandotte County, Kansas City, January 13, 1982.

The provisions of K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 21-2502 do not require the University of Kansas Medical Center to provide free medical service to prisoners in a county jail. Cited herein: K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 21-2502. WRA.

OPINION NO. 82-6

Townships and Township Officers—Hospitals—Medical Clinics. Jerry M. Smetana, Plainville Rural Hospital District No. 1, Plainville, January 13, 1982.

A hospital district organized pursuant to K.S.A. 80-2113 *et seq.*, may purchase an existing medical clinic, except that such purchase may not be made with moneys drawn from the hospital's operating fund. The medical clinic may be leased to physicians following its purchase. Cited herein: K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 10-1116b, K.S.A. 79-2925, 80-2113, K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 80-2125 (as amended by L. 1981, ch. 394, § 2), 80-2127 and K.S.A. 80-2128. BJS.

OPINION NO. 82-7

Taxation—Rules for Valuing Property—Duty to View and Inspect Real Property. Larry J. Clark, Crawford County Appraiser, Girard, January 13, 1982.

The requirement of K.S.A. 79-501, that the appraisal of real property be based upon an actual view and inspection of the property, carries with it the implied authority for the appraiser to enter upon real property to perform these functions, without such action constituting a trespass. Due to such implied authority, the prior permission of the taxpayer to enter upon the real property, for the limited purposes of viewing and inspecting the same, is not required.

If, however, the appraiser's entry upon real property is opposed by a taxpayer, the appraiser's paramount duty is to preserve the public peace. In such situations, the appraiser may proceed, through legal channels, to assure fulfillment of the legal duty to appraise the real property by an actual view and inspection thereof. OPINION NO. 82-8

Counties and County Officers—County Commissioners—Incompatibility of Offices. Norman J. Manley, Butler County Counselor, El Dorado, January 13, 1982.

A person may not serve simultaneously as a county commissioner and as a school board member, because of the common law doctrine of incompatibility of offices, nor may a county commissioner serve as a city police officer or as a reserve deputy sheriff because of the statutory prohibition of K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 19-205. Cited herein: K.S.A. 15-204, K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 19-205. BLH.

OPINION NO. 82-9

Public Health—Nursing—Authority of Student Nurses to Practice Nursing. Steven L. Ruddick, University of Kansas, Kansas City, January 20, 1982.

Pursuant to K.S.A. 65-1124, student nurses enrolled in accredited schools of professional or practical schools of nursing are not prohibited from practicing nursing. That statute was intended to allow a student nurse to practice nursing in conjunction with the clinical education requirement of a nursing education. However, it was not intended to allow a student nurse to practice nursing while employed in a program offered by a university hospital, wholly outside the nursing school curriculum. Cited herein: K.S.A. 65-1113, 65-1124, L. 1949, ch. 331, K.A.R. 60-2-101. JLY.

OPINION NO. 82-10

Counties and County Officers—Parks, Museums, Lakes and Recreational Grounds—Competitive Bid Procedures. A. C. Cooke, Johnson County Park and Recreation District, Prairie Village, January 20, 1982.

Competitive bid statutes are to be strictly construed regarding procedures to be followed. Therefore, a park board, having only those powers expressly granted by statute or necessarily implied therefrom, may not adopt a procedure for submission and tabulation of bids which deviates from the competitive bid procedure

prescribed for the board by statute. Cited herein: K.S.A. 19-2881. BLH.

OPINION NO. 82-11

Townships and Township Officers—Township Treasurer—Vacancy; Disability. Mickey Carl Moorman, Meade County Attorney, Meade, January 20, 1982.

The physical or mental disability of a township treasurer does not result in a vacancy which can be filled by the county commission in accordance with K.S.A. 25-1606. However, such inability to perform the duties of the office is grounds for recall in accordance with K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 25-4301 *et seq.* Therefore, after successful completion of a recall election there would be a vacancy which the county commission could fill. Cited herein: K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 25-4301, 25-4302, 25-4304, K.S.A. 25-1606, 80-202. JSS.

OPINION NO. 82-12

Oil and Gas—Cementing Surface Pipe—Avoidance of Water Pollution; Criminal Penalties for Non-Observance. Gayle Mollenkamp, Logan County Commissioner, Russell Springs, January 20, 1982.

K.S.A. 55-136 *et seq.* require the surface pipe of any oil or gas well to be cemented below the fresh water strata, in order to protect such strata from pollution, and apply both to wells drilled with rotary equipment or cable tools. The act is supplemented by rules and regulations adopted by the Kansas Corporation Commission, and contains criminal penalties for any person, firm, association or corporation who violates any of the sections thereof. While responsibility for the enforcement of such criminal penalties lies with district and county attorneys, insofar as the act is uniformly applicable to all counties, a county may not employ its home rule authority to enact a resolution on this same subject. Cited herein: K.S.A. 55-136, 55-137, 55-138, K.A.R. 82-2-123, Kansas Constitution, Article 12, Section 5. JSS.

OPINION NO. 82-13

Counties and County Officers—County Surveyor or Engineer—Costs of Official Survey. John Eyer, Washington County Attorney, Washington, January 20, 1982.

A county may not assess the costs incurred in establishing government corners in conducting a legal survey; however, a county may adopt a resolution pursuant to K.S.A. 19-101a which would permit the county to assess the costs incurred in establishing boundaries to the benefitted landowners. Cited herein: K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 19-101a, K.S.A. 19-1423, 19-1427 (repealed). BLH.

OPINION NO. 82-14

Bonds and Warrants—Cash-Basis Law—Creation of Indebtedness; Estimate of Liability Provided for in Budget

Cities and Municipalities—General Provisions—Uniform Procedure for Payment of Claims. Jack Alexander, Water Commissioner, Topeka, January 20, 1982.

The City of Topeka may contract with an insurance company for the payment of claims filed by the employees of the city for health services covered by their employment agreements. Provided the city commission makes an adequate budget estimate of its probable liability to pay claims filed by its employees, and its levies accord therewith, the provisions of the Cash Basis Law, K.S.A. 10-1101 *et seq.*, are not violated by such a contract. A self-insurer arrangement of this type could likewise be made consistent with the Uniform Procedure for Payment of Claims Act, K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 12-105a *et seq.*, provided the procedures therein (*i.e.*, approval of claims by the city commission following an audit by a financial officer of the city) are followed. Cited herein: K.S.A. 10-802, 10-803, 10-1112, 10-1113, K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 12-105a, 12-105b, K.S.A. 13-2108. JSS.

Sealed bids will be received by the undersigned City Clerk of the City of Tonganoxie, Kansas at the Meeting Room of the City Hall in said City until 7:30 p.m., Central Standard Time, on Monday, February 8, 1982, at which time bids will be publicly opened for the sale of \$155,000 General Obligation Bonds, Series 1982-1 of the City of Tonganoxie, Kansas.

Said issue shall consist of 25 negotiable coupon bonds, each in the denomination of \$5,000. All of said bonds shall be dated March 1, 1982, and shall mature on September 1 in each year as follows:

Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate or rates to be determined as hereinafter provided, and said interest shall be payable on March 1, 1983, and thereafter semiannually on September 1 and March 1 in each year. Both principal of and interest on said bonds shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the State Treasurer of the State of Kansas, in the City of Topeka, Kansas.

Bids will be received on bonds bearing such rate or rates of interest as may be specified by the bidders subject to the following conditions: Not more than five different interest rates shall be specified and the same rate shall apply to all bonds of the same maturity. The repetition of an interest rate shall not constitute one of said maximum number of rates. Each interest rate shall be a multiple of one-eighth of one percent (1/8 of 1%) or one-twentieth of one percent (1/20 of 1%). The difference between the highest and lowest coupon rates specified in any bid shall not exceed three percent (3%) and no rate shall exceed twelve percent (12%). No supplemental interest coupons will be authorized and no bid of less than par and accrued interest will be considered. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the bonds will be considered.

Each bid shall specify the total interest cost to the City during the life of the bond issue on the basis of such bid, the premium, if any, offered by the bidder, and the net interest cost to the City on the basis of such bid. The net interest cost to the City shall be determined by subtracting the amount of the premium, if any, from the total interest cost to the City and shall be stated as a dollar amount in the bid. The City shall be entitled to rely on such dollar amount as stated in the bid for the basis of determining the lowest net interest bid. If there is any discrepancy between said net interest cost and the average annual net interest rate specified, the specified net interest cost shall govern

and the coupon rates specified in the bid shall be adjusted accordingly.

It is anticipated that CUSIP identification numbers will be printed on said bonds, but neither the failure to print such number on any bond nor any error with respect thereto shall constitute cause for a failure or refusal by the purchaser thereof to accept delivery thereof and to pay for said bonds in accordance with the terms of the purchase contract. Expenses related to the printing of CUSIP numbers on said bonds will be paid for by the City.

The City will furnish the bonds properly printed, without cost to the successful bidder, and said bonds will be subject to the approving opinion of Nichols and Wolfe—Chartered, Topeka, Kansas, whose unqualified approving opinion will be furnished and paid for by the City and delivered with the bonds together with a certified copy of transcript of proceedings authorizing said bonds.

Immediately following the sale of the bonds described, the City will proceed to have the bonds prepared and executed and will deliver such bonds to the successful bidder at any bank in the State of Kansas or Missouri designated by the successful bidder, or elsewhere at the expense of said bidder, within 45 days of sale date.

Payment for the bonds shall be made in lawful money of the United States of America, upon delivery to the successful bidder.

Bids shall be accompanied by a cashier's check or certified check on a bank located in the United States of America in the amount of \$2,500, payable to the order of the City Clerk, Tonganoxie, Kansas to secure the City from any loss resulting from the failure of the bidder to comply with the terms of his bid. No interest will be paid upon the deposit made by the successful bidder. The checks of the unsuccessful bidders will be returned promptly.

Bids must be made on forms which can be procured from the undersigned and should be addressed to Harriett Hughes, City Clerk, City Hall, 321 South Delaware, Tonganoxie, Kansas, 66086, and marked "Bids for Purchase of Bonds."
