EXECUTIVE ORDER No. 82-56

**ESTABLISHING THE GOVERNOR'S
COMMITTEE ON CRIME PREVENTION**

WHEREAS, crime is probably the most widely discussed social problem in the United States today; and

WHEREAS, Kansans are fortunate to have been spared the waves of violent criminal activity that have occurred in more urbanized states, yet our citizens are likewise alarmed by the growing incidence of theft, vandalism, assault, and robbery; and

WHEREAS, criminal activity has literally robbed us of our property and destroyed the sense of security to which we are entitled; and

WHEREAS, if we are to begin finding solutions, we must focus our attention on preventive solutions; and

WHEREAS, every sheriff and police chief understands the most effective weapons available in the fight against property crime are the eyes and ears of citizens who care about their neighbors and are willing to participate in a systematic process of monitoring their neighborhood and reporting suspicious activity to law enforcement personnel.

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor and chief executive of the State of Kansas, I hereby create and establish the Governor's Committee on Crime Prevention composed of not more than fifteen members, who shall be appointed by the Governor and include individuals generally representative of the following sectors:

- A. Law Enforcement;
- B. Prosecuting Attorneys;
- C. The Judiciary;
- D. The Business Community; and
- E. The Public at Large.

The Governor shall designate one of the members as Chairperson. The Committee shall meet on call of the Chairperson. The Committee shall have the following charges:

- (1) Examine current crime prevention programs to determine which are most effective;
- (2) Determine the appropriate role for State government in prevention activities;
- (3) Establish a liaison between law enforcement, the business community, and the citizenry as it relates to crime prevention;
- (4) Determine how best to generate an individual sense of responsibility for crime prevention; and
- (5) Enhance and support existing local crime prevention projects and programs through coordination.

The Committee shall serve without compensation at the pleasure of the Governor. Staff support shall be provided by the Department of Administration, the Governor's Committee on Criminal Administration and such other agencies as may be designated by the Governor. Expenses of the Committee, including the costs of publication of this Order, shall be paid by the Department of Administration upon vouchers approved by the Secretary or his designee and the Governor or his designee.

The Committee shall report to the Governor at least twice annually its Report and Recommendations.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 82-56 and shall become effective immediately.

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION**NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING****TO ALL TEACHERS, ADMINISTRATORS, BOARDS OF EDUCATION, TEACHER TRAINING INSTITUTIONS, SCHOOL DISTRICTS, AND ALL OTHER PERSONS WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:**

You are hereby notified that the Kansas State Board of Education will hold a public hearing in the first floor conference room of the Kansas State Board of Education, Kansas State Education Building, 120 East Tenth Street, Topeka, Kansas 66612 on the 9th day of March, 1982, beginning at 2:00 p.m. of said day to consider the distribution formula for allocations of funds for use as set forth in Chapter 2 of Title V of the Omnibus Reconciliation Budget Act of 1981, Consolidation of Federal Programs for Elementary and Secondary Education, to be resolved and adopted by said board at its regular meeting, March 10, 1982, with application made by it to the Federal Secretary of Education as soon thereafter as it can be prepared.

Sec. 565(a)(4) of said act provides for timely public notice and public dissemination of the information provided pursuant to Paragraphs (2) and (3) of said section.

As required by Paragraph (2) of Sect. 564(a), a State advisory committee was appointed by the Governor to broadly represent the educational interests and the general public of the State. Said advisory committee has transmitted its recommendations to the state board regarding a proposed formula for the distribution of not less than 80% of the block grant to local districts in fiscal year 1983 and on the proposed expenditure of not more than 20% of the grant for State administration and other authorized programs and projects.

The advisory committee recommended that the funding for local school districts (or 80% of the allocated funds) be distributed based on a formula using the enrollments of the public and nonpublic schools within a district, adjusted by three categories of students whose education imposes a higher than average cost per student: (1) students in special education programs, (2) students from low-income families, and (3) students living in sparsely populated districts. These student units will be given the following weights in the formula: 1.0 for the enrollment in the public and nonpublic schools within a district, 0.2 for special education students, 0.5 for low income students, and 0.2 for students in districts having 0.75 students per square mile or less (sparsity of population). The committee also recommended that the amount available to the State Department of Education (or 20% of the allocated funds) be spent as allocated in the budget for fiscal year 1983.

Copies of this public hearing notice (along with the state board's public hearing procedures and guidelines) are being mailed to all chief school administrators in the state and may be reviewed in their offices by interested persons. Copies of said notice are also being mailed to the clerks of local school boards for the attention of school board members. Copies of said advisory committee recommendations may be ob-

tained by contacting the secretary of the state board of education, Kansas State Education Building, 120 E. 10th Street, Topeka, Kansas 66612, prior to March 1, 1982.

On the date of said hearing all interested persons shall be given reasonable opportunity to be heard and to present their views or arguments, orally or in writing, on said advisory committee recommendations. Individuals or organizations that cannot appear at the hearing may, prior to March 4, 1982, submit to the secretary of the state board of education their written reactions in favor of or in opposition to said recommendations, and any other matters, suggestions, or proposals they may have relating thereto, and such reactions will be read into the record and considered by the board. Said hearing shall be conducted in compliance with the public hearing procedures and guidelines of the state board of education.

ATTORNEY GENERAL**OPINION NO. 82-21**

Public Health—Solid and Hazardous Waste—Restrictions on Local Authorities. Robert E. Davis, Leavenworth County Attorney, Leavenworth, February 4, 1982.

A county may not limit the use of a county sanitary landfill to local county refuse sources by virtue of the prohibition in K.A.R. 1981 Supp. 28-29-1 against local agencies enforcing a requirement which would impede interstate or intrastate transportation or disposal of solid waste. Cited herein: K.S.A. 65-3401, K.A.R. 1981 Supp. 28-29-1. BLH.

OPINION NO. 82-22

Public Health—Nursing—Schools of Nursing; Accreditation of Programs in Area Vocational Technical Schools and Community Colleges. Dean Prochaska, Department of Education, Topeka, February 5, 1982.

K.S.A. 65-1119 requires that any institution desiring to conduct an accredited program in any field of nursing education must meet the standards of the state board of nursing as to curriculum and other matters. In addition to those standards established by statute, there exist administrative guidelines (at K.A.R. 60-2-101) which must also be followed. One such guideline provides that the individual educational institution be approved by the "appropriate state agency." In the case of area vocational technical schools or community colleges, this agency is the state department of education. However, such approval refers to the institution itself, and does not apply to the specific programs of nursing instruction, which must be approved by the state board of nursing. Cited herein: K.S.A. 65-1119, 71-801, 74-1106, K.A.R. 60-2-101. JSS.

OPINION NO. 82-23

Taxation—Miscellaneous Provisions—Delinquent Taxes and Assessments. David F. Louis, State Representative, Shawnee, February 5, 1982.

Where uniformly applicable statutes impose a duty upon a county officer to approve plats or to issue building permits, a county may not utilize home rule power to require a county officer to collect all delinquent taxes and special assessments owed on unrelated parcels of land before approving plats or issuing building permits to the landowner. Where the statutes are non-uniform, however, the county may act by charter resolution to impose such requirements. Cited herein: K.S.A. 12-401, K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 19-101a, K.S.A. 58-2001, 58-2005, K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 79-2401a. BLH.

OPINION NO. 82-24

Taxation—Sales of Liquor by Clubs—Local Alcoholic Liquor Fund; Use of Revenues for Special Alcohol Programs. J. D. Euler, Wathena City Attorney, Troy, February 5, 1982.

Pursuant to K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 79-41a04, a city is

entitled to receive certain moneys from the local alcoholic liquor fund, which fund is disbursed by the state after having been collected by private clubs located in the city. One-third of the moneys so distributed shall be credited to a special alcohol programs fund, and may be expended only for specified purposes set out by subsection (d) of K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 79-41a04, one of which is the establishment of alcoholism prevention and education programs. Cited herein: K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 79-41a02, 79-41a03, 79-41a04. JSS.

OPINION NO. 82-25

State Boards, Commissions and Authorities—Board of Examiners of Psychologists—Payment to Psychologists for Services Rendered by Uncertified Assistants. Representative Mike Meacham, Eighty-Third District, Wichita, February 5, 1982.

A certified psychologist may legally receive payment for psychological services rendered by supervised, uncertified assistants, but not for unsupervised uncertified assistants. The supervision of these assistants must comply with the requirements set forth in K.A.R. 102-2-10 (Temporary). Cited herein: K.S.A. 74-5340, K.S.A. 74-5344, K.A.R. 102-2-10 (Temporary). BLH.

OPINION NO. 82-26

Taxation—Sales of Liquor By Clubs—Local Alcoholic Liquor Fund; Use of Revenues for Special Alcohol Programs. Thomas J. Burgardt, City Attorney, Garden City, February 5, 1982.

Pursuant to K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 79-41a04, a city is entitled to receive certain moneys from the local alcoholic liquor fund, which fund is disbursed by the state after having been collected by private clubs located in the city. One-third of the moneys so distributed shall be credited to a special alcohol programs fund, and may be expended only for specified purposes set out by subsection (d) of K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 79-41a04. Accordingly, a city is without the authority to use a portion of the fund for the enforcement of prescribed substances statutes. Cited herein: K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 79-41a02, 79-41a03, 79-41a04. JSS.

OPINION NO. 82-27

Roads and Bridges—County and Township Roads—Laying of Pipelines and other Public Utility Uses of Roadways. John V. Black, Pratt County Counselor, Pratt, February 5, 1982.

Oil and gas pipeline companies and public utility companies have the authority to construct and maintain lines over, upon and under public roads by virtue of their statutorily-granted powers of eminent domain. However, such use may not interfere with the use of the road for highway purposes. Cited herein: K.S.A. 17-618, K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 17-4604. BLH.

OPINION NO. 82-28

State Boards, Commissions and Authorities—Crime Victims Reparations Board—Record of Formal Hearing. Mr. John Lamb, Director, Crime Victims Reparations Board, Topeka, February 5, 1982.

(continued)

The Crime Victims Reparations Board is required to record proceedings in the event of a disputed claim, and such record of proceedings is available for inspection upon the request of any citizen. However, unless information retained by the Board regarding a claimant is included in such a record of proceedings, the Board is not required to make such information available for public inspection. Cited herein: K.S.A. 74-7307, K.S.A. 1980 Supp. 45-201. KJS.

OPINION NO. 82-29

Cities and Municipalities—County and City Retailers' Sales Taxes—Procedure For Adoption. Ann Gottberg, Lindsborg City Administrator, Lindsborg, February 8, 1982.

The formula for apportioning revenue from a countywide retailers' sales tax, as prescribed by K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 12-192, may not be altered through the exercise of home rule powers by a city or county.

The question of imposing a countywide retailers' sales tax, and the question of imposing a city retailers' sales tax, may be included on the same ballot, provided the ballot meets the segregation requirements imposed by K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 10-120.

A city may not provide for the "automatic repeal" of a city retailers' sales tax upon the adoption of a countywide retailers' sales tax, since such a provision would be in obvious conflict with subsection (e) of K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 12-187.

Once an election is called to submit the proposition of imposing a city retailers' tax to the voters, and notice of such election is published pursuant to K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 10-120, the election must proceed pursuant to the provisions of K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 12-187(e), and a city may not withdraw the proposition and abort the election process. OPINION NO. 82-30

Militia, Defense and Public Safety—Emergency Preparedness For Disasters—Regulations Regarding Flood Insurance. James Van Sickel, Division of Emergency Preparedness, Office of the Adjutant General, Topeka, February 8, 1982.

The Adjutant General may not exercise his rule-making powers inconsistent with powers granted the governor regarding federally-subsidized flood insurance, pursuant to K.S.A. 48-938. Cited herein: K.S.A. 48-904, 48-907, 48-923, 48-938, 42 U.S.C.A. § 5121, Pub. L. 93-288 (1974). BJS.

OPINION NO. 82-31

Townships and Township Officers—Hospitals—Expenditure of Hospital District Funds for Recruitment by Paying for Medical Education. Wayne M. Stallard, Community Hospital District No. 1, Onaga, February 8, 1982.

A hospital Board of Directors acting pursuant to K.S.A. 80-21,101 *et seq.* is without authority to expend hospital district funds to provide for a medical education in return for a promise to practice medicine in a

certain area. Cited herein: K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 80-21,101, 80-21,111. BJS.

OPINION NO. 82-32

Counties and County Officers—Hospitals—Power of Board of Trustees to Finance Medical Education. Susan Marshall, Lincoln County Attorney, Lincoln, February 8, 1982.

The county hospital enabling laws do not authorize a hospital board of trustees to expend hospital funds to pay for the education of a medical student for the purpose of obtaining that student's promise to practice in a certain area. However, county home rule power pursuant to K.S.A. 19-101a may be used to enable the county hospital board of trustees to contract with a medical student for future services. Cited herein: K.S.A. 19-101a, 19-1801 and 19-1804. BJS.

OPINION NO. 82-33

Automobiles and Other Vehicles—Evidence of Alcoholic Content of Blood of Operator—Refusal by Operator to Submit to Test—Revocation of Operator's License Hearings. Alan F. Alderson, General Counsel, Department of Revenue, Topeka, February 8, 1982.

The sole issue to be resolved at an administrative hearing held under the "implied consent" law (K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 8-1001) is the reasonableness of a person's refusal to submit to a request to take a blood-alcohol test. At the hearing, the only testimony needed from the arresting officer is the sworn report required in the statute, and if the sworn report addresses the necessary issues, there is no need for the officer to attend the hearing. However, if the sworn report fails to discuss whether the licensee was capable of making a voluntary response to the request to submit to a blood-alcohol test, and it appears that this issue will be raised in the administrative hearing, the testimony of the arresting officer is essential and the attendance of the arresting officer may be compelled by subpoena [K.S.A. 8-255(b)]. Interest shall become due and payable on March 1 and September 1 of each year, until paid, commencing March 1, 1983. Both principal and interest on the bonds will be payable at the office of the State Treasurer in Topeka, Kansas.

The interest rates will be supplied by the bidder at the lowest rate or rates at which bidder will pay not less than par and accrued interest. Not more than five different rates shall be specified in any bid, and one rate shall apply to all bonds of the same maturity. The bonds will be delivered to the purchaser at any bank in the City of Topeka or Wichita, Kansas, or Kansas City, Missouri, to be named by the bidder, at the University's expense, on or before April 9, 1982, and the successful bidder will be notified definitely of such date. Payment of the unpaid balance of the bond purchase price will be made at the time of delivery of the bonds by Federal Reserve Funds or the equivalent thereof.

At the request of the successful bidder, CUSIP identification numbers will be printed on said bonds, but neither the failure to print such number on any bond nor any error with respect thereto shall constitute cause for a failure or refusal by the purchaser thereof to accept delivery of and pay for said bonds in accordance with the terms of the purchase contract. All expenses in relation to the printing of CUSIP numbers on said bonds will be paid for by the issuer. The CUSIP Service Bureau charge for the assignment of said numbers will be the responsibility of and must be paid for by the purchaser.

The proceeds of the bonds will be used to pay a portion of the costs of constructing, equipping and furnishing buildings on the campus of Washburn University to be used as an Allied Health Center, as authorized by Article I of Chapter 10 and Article 13a of Chapter 13, Kansas Statutes Annotated, as amended. The bonds will constitute the general obligations of Washburn University of Topeka, payable from taxes, limited as to rate and amount, levied upon all the tangible taxable real and personal property subject to such tax located in the City of Topeka, Kansas.

The assessed valuation of all tangible property within the City of Topeka subject to tax, including the estimated tangible valuation for motor vehicles, for the year 1981 is \$340,206,103. The University presently has a bonded debt consisting of \$140,000 of limited general obligation bonds. The total bonded indebtedness of Washburn University of Topeka, including the bonds submitted hereby for bids will be \$2,440,000.

A good faith deposit by cashier's or certified check in the amount of 2% of the total par value of the bonds will accompany each bid, and in case a purchaser whose bid is accepted shall fail to carry out his contract of purchase, the deposit will be forfeited to the City.
