NOTICE OF HEARING ON PROPOSED TEMPORARY REGULATIONS

A public hearing will be held on Monday, August 2, 1982 at 10:00 a.m. in the Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th Street, Topeka, Kansas to consider the adoption of proposed temporary regulations of the Insurance Department.

All interested parties may submit written comments at any time prior to the hearing by addressing them to the Commissioner of Insurance, 420 S.W. 9th Street, Topeka, Kansas 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing.

Copies of the full text of the regulations and the fiscal impact statement may be obtained by writing to the Commissioner of Insurance, 420 S.W. 9th Street, Topeka, Kansas 66612. The following is a summary of

the regulations:

K.A.R. 40-8-2: Amendments to this regulation eliminate a duplication of the prohibition contained in House Bill No. 2789 (1982) relative to the placement of risks with non-admitted insurers based on rate alone. Other changes in the regulation are editorial in nature

for purposes of clarity and simplification.

K.A.R. 40-8-7: Amendments to this regulation are necessary to properly implement the change in the excess lines gross premium tax. Specifically, it provides for the application of the 2% tax rate in effect prior to July 1 to excess lines business placed between December 31, 1981 and July 1, 1982. The 4% tax rate included in House Bill No. 2789 (1982) will be applied only to risks placed or premium received on and after July 1, 1982.

K.A.R. 40-8-8: Amendments to this regulation are necessary to accommodate the new notice requirements contained in House Bill No. 2789 (1982).

K.A.R. 40-8-11: Amendments to this regulation require the retention of evidence that persons insured by a non-admitted company were provided the information and consented to being placed with a non-admitted company in accordance with House Bill No. 2789 (1982).

NOTICE OF BOND SALE \$6,003,000 **IOHNSON COUNTY, KANSAS Sewer Bonds** Series 1982A

(General Obligations Payable from Unlimited Ad Valorem Taxes)

Sealed bids will be received by the Board of County Commissioners of Johnson County, Kansas (the "County"), in the Commissioners' Hearing Room, Johnson County Courthouse, Kansas Avenue and Santa Fe Street, Olathe, Kansas 66061, until 10:30 o'clock A.M., C.D.T., on

Thursday, July 29, 1982 at which time said bids will be publicly opened for the purchase of seven issues of Sewer Bonds, Series 1982A, of the County, aggregating the principal amount of \$6,003,000 (the "Bonds").

All of the Bonds will be negotiable coupon bonds dated August 1, 1982, and will be in the denomination of \$1,000 or \$5,000 each. The Bonds will mature in the principal amounts on September 1 in each year as follows:

Interest on the Bonds will be payable semiannually on March 1 and September 1 in each year commencing March 1, 1983. Both principal of and interest on the Bonds will be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the Office of the State Treasurer in the City of Topeka, Kansas, or, subject to the County's approval of the paying agency charges, at a Kansas bank having trust powers as defined by statute. The purchaser may also request designation, subject to the same County approval, of any bank having trust powers as defined by statute and located in a federal reserve city as a co-paying agent with the Kansas bank so designated.

The Bonds maturing in the year 1998 and thereafter may, at the option of the County, be called for redemption and payment prior to maturity as a whole or in part in inverse numerical order on September 1, 1997, or on any interest payment date thereafter at the principal amount of the Bonds so called for redemption, together with accrued interest thereon to date of

All of the Bonds will constitute general obligations of Johnson County, Kansas payable as to both principal and interest from special assessments or ad valorem taxes levied against property benefited in the County and, if not so paid, from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limitation as to rate or amount on all the taxable tangible property within the County.

Bids will be received on the aggregate amount of Bonds bearing such rate or rates of interest as may be specified by the bidders subject to the following conditions: The same rate shall apply to all Bonds maturing in the same year. Not more than five different rates shall be specified, the repetition of a rate not being considered a different rate. Each interest rate specified shall be a multiple of 1/8 or 1/20 of 1%. No rate shall exceed the 20 Bond Index of tax exempt municipal bonds published by the weekly Bond Buyer, in New York, New York on July 26, 1982, plus 2%. The difference between the highest rate specified and the lowest rate specified in any bid shall not exceed 2%. No bid providing for supplemental coupons will be considered.

No bid of less than the aggregate principal amount of the Bonds plus accrued interest thereon to the date of their delivery will be considered. Each bid shall specify the total interest cost to the County during the life of the Bonds on the basis of such bid, the premium, if any, offered by the bidder, the net interest cost to the County on the basis of such bid, and the average annual net interest rate on the basis of such bid. The best interest cost shall be determined by subtracting the amount of the premium, if any, from the total interest cost. The County shall be entitled to rely on the stated net interest cost in awarding the Bonds. If there is any discrepancy between the net interest cost and the average annual net interest rate, the specified net interest cost shall govern and the coupon rates specified in the bid shall be adjusted accordingly.

The Bonds are being issued pursuant to the authority of K.S.A. 19-27,169 and K.S.A. 19-2704a to 19-2715a, inclusive, and all acts amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto, for the purpose of providing funds to pay the cost of sewer improvements in certain sewer

districts in the County.

The County will pay for printing and registering the Bonds and will deliver the same properly executed and registered to the successful bidder on or before September 3, 1982, at such bank or trust company located in the United States as may be specified by the successful bidder. The Bonds will be sold subject to the final approving opinion of Gaar & Bell, Overland Park, Kansas, Bond Counsel, which will be furnished and paid for by the County and will be printed on the Bonds. The successful bidder will be furnished with a certified transcript of the proceedings evidencing the authorization and issuance of the Bonds and the usual closing proofs, which will include a certificate that there is no litigation pending or threatened at the time of delivery of the Bonds affecting their validity.

At the request of the successful bidder, CUSIP identification numbers will be printed on the Bonds, but neither the failure to print such number on any of the Bonds nor any error with respect thereto shall constitute cause for a failure or refusal by the successful bidder thereof to accept delivery of and pay for the Bonds in accordance with the terms of its bid and this

Notice of Bond Sale. All expenses in relation to the printing of CUSIP numbers on the Bonds shall be paid for by the County.

Payment for the Bonds shall be made in Federal Reserve or equivalent funds, to be immediately available on the day of delivery of the Bonds to the suc-

cessful bidder.

Each bid shall be accompanied by a good faith deposit in the form of a cashier's or certified check in the amount of \$120,060 made payable to the order of the Treasurer of Johnson County, Kansas. Such check will be held by the County pending payment for and delivery of the Bonds to the successful bidder. In the event a bidder whose bid is accepted shall fail to carry out its contract of purchase, the amount of said deposit shall be retained by the County as liquidated damages. No interest will be paid on the deposit made by the successful bidder.

All bids must be submitted on forms which may be obtained from the undersigned. No additions or alterations in such forms shall be made, and any erasures may cause rejection of any bid. The County reserves the right to waive irregularities and to reject any or all

The adjusted equalized assessed valuation of all tangible taxable property in Johnson County, Kansas, according to the assessment as of August 25, 1981, is \$1,026,044,259. The total outstanding bonded indebtedness of Johnson County, Kansas, as of this date, including the Bonds of the County herein offered for sale, is \$59,583,871.13. In addition, the County has outstanding, as of this date, \$37,331,511 of temporary notes, of which \$5,568,050 will be retired from the proceeds of the Bonds and paid assessments. The corresponding amount of indebtedness of said County as of August 1, 1982, the date of the Bonds herein offered for sale, is projected to remain substantially the same.

The outstanding general obligation bonds of Johnson County, Kansas, are rated "Aa" by Moody's Investors Service, Inc., and said County has applied for a rating on the Bonds herein offered for sale.

SUMMARY OF TEMPORARY ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS ADOPTED AT A MEETING OPEN TO THE PUBLIC HELD ON JUNE 8, 1982

(Approved by the State Rules and Regulations Board July 1, 1982. Will expire May 1, 1983.)

A. Public Assistance Program

- 1. 30-4-57. Employment registration requirements. This regulation is being amended to delete the work registration exemption for those persons who are at least six months pregnant. (Federal Mandate)
- 2. 30-4-75. ADC work incentive program registration requirements. This regulation is being

amended to delete the WIN registration exemption for those persons who are at least six months pregnant. (Federal Mandate)

- 3. 30-4-80. Eligibility factors specific to the ADC-FC program. This regulation is being amended to require that each ADC-FC case have a case plan and that the case status be reviewed on at least a six month basis by a panel to determine whether the child should be returned to the parent, continued in foster care for a specified period, placed for adoption, or continued in foster care on a permanent or long-term basis. (Federal Mandate)
- 4. **30-4-97.** Eligibility factors specific to the TA program. This regulation is being amended to restrict the transportation provision to assist transients to the closer of their place of residence or the nearest major city of the adjoining state in the direction of the individual's residence.
- 5. **30-4-101.** Standards for persons in own or other family home. This regulation is being amended to reflect a 3% increase in the basic and shelter standards.
- 6. **30-4-102.** Standards for persons in room, board, specialized living or care. This regulation is being amended to reflect a 2% increase in the foster family care rates.
- 7. **30-4-109.** Personal property. The list of exempted personal property is being amended to: (1) add equipment and machinery if the annual adjusted gross income from their use is at least forty percent (40%) of their gross market value. Adjusted gross income shall be determined by deducting from the gross income the expenses of cost of maintenance and cost of purchase; and (2) clarify that tools in use must be necessary for the maintenance of house or garden.
- 8. **30-4-110.** Income. This regulation is being amended to:
 - a. Require, for the purposes of retrospective budgeting, that income be of a continuous nature in order for it to be counted in determining eligibility and the amount of payment for the first and second retrospective months.
 - b. Modify the lump sum income policy to include the needs of any person whose income is being considered in establishing a period of ineligibility when such person is not included in the assistance plan. If a step-parent whose needs are not included in the assistance plan receives a lump sum payment, the step-parent's income deductions and disregards will be deducted prior to determining the period of ineligibility. (Federal Mandate)
- 9. **30-4-111:** Applicable income. This regulation is being amended to require the counting of any earned income tax credit that a step-parent is receiving in determining the amount of applicable income. (Federal Mandate)
- 10. **30-4-123.** Special allowances for recipients of transient assistance. This regulation is being amended to limit the amount of the TA allowance

- for necessary transportation to the closer of the recipient's place of residence or the nearest major city of the adjoining state in the direction of the individual's residence.
- 11. **30-4-140.** Payment amounts. This regulation is being amended to require that an overpayment or underpayment adjustment be made if the earned income tax credit received by a recipient varies from the amount reflected in the monthly assistance grants received by the recipient in the previous calendar year. (Federal Mandate)
- B. Medicaid (Medical Assistance) Program—Client Eligibility
- 1. **30-6-41.** Assistance planning. This regulation is being amended to delete the provision authorizing medical payments to an unborn child even if the mother did not meet program eligibility requirements. (Federal Mandate)
- 2. 30-6-57. Employment registration requirement. This regulation is being amended to delete the work registration exemption for those persons who are at least six months pregnant. (Federal Mandate)
- 3. 30-6-103. Determined eligibles; protected income levels for medicaid and non-FFP-FC determined eligibles. This regulation is being amended to:
 - a. Add those persons who are receiving services under the community based services program to the group of persons whose financial eligibility is determined using the protected income level for independent living.
 - b. Increase the protected income levels to reflect the effects of the July 1, 1982 increase in SSI benefits and PA basic and shelter allowances on the PIL. The new Protected Income Levels are as follows:

- 4. 30-6-109. Personal property. Adjusted gross income shall be determined by deducting from the gross income the expenses of cost of maintenance and cost of purchase; and (2) clarify that tools in use must be necessary for the maintenance of house or garden.

STATE CORPORATION COMMISSION

TEMPORARY ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS

(Approved by the State Rules and Regulations Board July 1, 1982. Will expire May 1, 1983.)

82-2-216. Gas conservation assessment. An assessment to pay the conservation division expenses and other costs in connection with the administration of the gas conservation regulations not otherwise provided for shall be made as follows: (a) A charge established by the commission shall be assessed on each one thousand cubic feet of gas sold or marketed, each month. The assessment shall apply only to the first purchase of gas.

(b) The first purchaser of the production, shall, before paying for the production, deduct an amount equal to the assessment for every one thousand (1,000) cubic feet of gas produced and removed from the lease

each month. The purchaser shall remit the amounts deducted to the conservation division of the commission at the same time and period as the purchasers make their regular gas payments.

(c) The remittances may be made each month in a single check if the purchaser desires and no accounting by the purchaser shall be required except to show all deductions on the regular payment statements to producers and royalty owners or other interested parties.

(d) The assessment established by the commission shall not apply to gas which is being returned to the ground for repressuring purposes within the field, but shall apply to gas that is produced and removed from the lease and returned to the ground for storage purposes. (Authorized by K.S.A. 55-704, implementing K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 55-711; effective, E-72-4, Jan. 1, 1972; effective Jan. 1, 1973; amended E-76-38, Sept. 1, 1975; amended May 1, 1976; amended T-83-14, July 1, 1982.)

82-2-311. Licenses; application approval and renewal. (a) Application shall be made by every operator and contractor to the commission on a form prescribed, prepared and furnished by the commission and accompanied by a fee of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) plus twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) for each rig operated by the applicant. Upon approval by the commission a license and tags as required by statute shall be issued to applicant.

(b) The application shall be verified and filed with

the commission.

(c) The application shall be signed and verified by the applicant if a natural person, by a partner or a member if a partnership or association, and by an executive officer if a corporation.

(d) Upon approval of the application, the commission shall issue a license which shall be in full force and effect for one year unless surrendered, suspended

or revoked by the commission.

(e) Upon revocation of a license, no new license shall be issued to applicant until after the expiration of

one year from the date of revocation.

(f) Application for renewal of a license shall be made yearly to the commission on forms provided for that purpose. Any application for renewal shall be accompanied by a fee of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) plus twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) for each rig operated by applicant. (Authorized by Sec. 3 of 1982 Sub. 1-18-1a. Mileage rates. (a) Subject to the provisions of subsection (d), an employee who has been authorized to use a privately-owned conveyance to engage in official business for an agency is entitled to reimbursement for use of a privately-owned conveyance at the following rates:

(1) ten cents (10¢) per mile for the use of a pri-

vately-owned motorcycle;

(2) twenty-two cents (22¢) per mile for the use of a privately-owned automobile;

(3) thirty-four cents (34¢) per mile for the use of a

privately-owned airplane; or

(4) thirty-four cents (34¢) per mile for the use of a specially equipped van for the physically handicapped.

(b) In addition to the mileage allowance authorized under subsection (a) of this regulation, the employee

may be reimbursed for:

(1) parking fees at commercial transportation terminals when on an extended trip;

(2) toll road and toll bridge costs; and (3) airplane landing and tie-down fees.

(c) When an employee travels by privately-owned airplane, reimbursement may be made for one round trip in a privately-owned automobile or taxi fares charged in travel: (1) between the official station or domicile and the airport in the city in which the official station or domicile is located, and;

(2) between the airport at destination city and the

place of official business.

(d) Exceptions to the mileage rates prescribed in subsection (a) are as follows: (1) When a mode of transportation is available and is less costly than transportation by privately-owned conveyance, mileage payments for use of a privately-owned conveyance shall be limited to the cost of such other mode of

transportation.

(2) An agency may pay a specified mileage rate that is lower than prescribed by subsection (c) when an employee's travel is not required by the agency and the employee is informed of the specified rate in advance of the travel. 75-6-24. Adjustment in dollar amounts. The dollar amounts of three hundred dollars (\$300) and one thousand dollars (\$1,000) in K.S.A. 1979 Supp. 16a-2-401 (2) shall be changed to five hundred forty dollars (\$540) and one thousand eight hundred dollars (\$1,800).

The provisions of this section shall be effective on and after July 1, 1982. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1981 16a-2-401a and 16a-6-104 (1) (e); effective E-79-9, April 20, 1978; effective May 1, 1979; amended E-81-15, June 25, 1980; amended May 1, 1981; amended T-83-16, July 1, 1982.)

75-6-27. Earned finance charge by the actuarial method. The amount of the earned portion of the precomputed finance charge, and any deferral charges, on a consumer credit transaction that is entered into on or after July 1, 1982, and payable according to its original terms over more than 61 months, shall be determined by applying the contract rate according to the actuarial method to: (a) the unpaid balances and

time as originally scheduled for the period preceding prepayment. The period preceding prepayment shall be full days between prepayment date and the beginning of the computational period in which prepayment occurs, and all fully expired computational periods preceding prepayment date; or

(b) the actual unpaid balances of the amount financed for the actual time the unpaid balances were outstanding. Any delinquency or deferral charges collected before the date of prepayment shall be applied to reduce the amount financed as of the date collected. (Authorized by K.S.A. 16a-6-104 (e); implementing K.S.A. 16a-2-510 (4); effective T-83-16, July 1, 1982.)

75-8-3. Acceptable assets. An investment company shall not invest in or own assets, or incur liabilities which are not inherent to the principal business of a licensed lender under the Kansas uniform consumer credit code, except: (a) loan contracts when the proceeds of the loan are used for business or agricultural purposes; (b) installment sales contracts or leases of personal property when used for agricultural or business purposes; or (c) the purchase of commercial paper. This restriction shall not apply to the owning of real or personal property necessary to the accommodation of that business. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 16-629 (b); effective E-82-23, December 9, 1981; effective May 1, 1982; effective T-83-16, July 1, 1982.)

75-8-13. Investments. An investment company shall not purchase or own commercial paper which does not have a quality rating by Standard and Poor's Corporation of A1 or A2 or by Moody's Investors Services, Inc. of Prime-1 or Prime-2.
