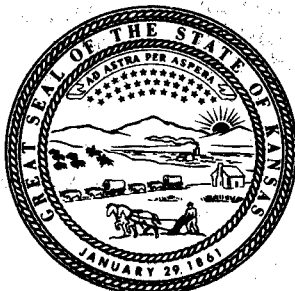

**OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR****EXECUTIVE ORDER No. 82-58  
OFFER OF REWARD**

WHEREAS, Gerald Short, age 15, resident of Gas, Allen County, Kansas, was beaten on or about August 20, 1982; and

WHEREAS, Adeline Fisk, age 59, and Steven Mangus, age 17, residents of Gas and Iola, Allen County, Kansas, were killed on or about August 20, 1982; and

WHEREAS, Thomas J. Walsh, age 17, a resident of Iola, Allen County, Kansas, was killed and his body was found on August 21, 1982; and

WHEREAS, said beatings and killings appear to have been heinous crimes and assaults or homicides in violation of the laws of the State of Kansas.

NOW, THEREFORE, by virtue of the authority vested in me by K.S.A. 75-113, I, John Carlin, Governor of the State of Kansas, do hereby offer a reward of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for information leading to the apprehension and conviction of the perpetrators of these crimes.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 82-58, and shall become effective immediately.

## OPINION NO. 82-177

**Bonds and Warrants—Cash Basis Law—Records. Representative Charles F. Laird, Fifty-Ninth District, Topeka, August 19, 1982.**

K.S.A. 10-1117 requires certain records "of" the municipality to be open for public inspection including records of "indebtedness, contracts creating a liability against the municipality, . . . each order, warrant check or checks, drawn on the treasury and paid." Private records of a business or corporation are not available for inspection under this statute. K.S.A. 10-1117 directs the clerk or secretary of the municipality to keep and make available these records and does not place any legal obligation upon any employee of a private business or corporation to disclose any records. Cited herein: K.S.A. 10-1117. BJS

## OPINION NO. 82-178

**Drainage and Levies—Watershed Districts—Meetings of Directors; Proxy Voting. Dwaine Waite, Secretary of Middle Walnut Joint Watershed District No. 60, Winfield, August 19, 1982.**

In that a watershed district organized pursuant to K.S.A. 24-2101 *et seq.*, is a quasi-municipal corporation, a quorum may be established, and any votes taken by the board of directors, only with those directors who are present, thus precluding the use of voting by proxy. Cited herein: K.S.A. 24-1201, 24-1209, 24-1210. JSS

## OPINION NO. 82-179

**Cities and Municipalities—Cemeteries—Care and Control; Police Power to Relocate Remains From Mausoleum. C. W. Naab, Mayor, Nickerson, August 19, 1982.**

A city which operates a cemetery pursuant to the provisions of K.S.A. 12-1401 *et seq.* has full power to make and enforce all necessary rules and regulations pertaining to the care of such cemetery. This grant of power includes the ability to remove and reinter remains which are contained in a mausoleum that has become structurally unsound. In order to avoid potential liability, notice should be provided if possible to relatives of those persons whose remains are so transferred. However, a city is not required to obtain such relatives' consent prior to effecting such removal and reinterment. Cited herein: K.S.A. 12-1402, 17-1326. JSS

## OPINION NO. 82-180

**Cities and Municipalities—Libraries—Library District; Donation of Moneys by Township. John Trivison, Chairman of Library Board, Louisburg Library District No. 1, Louisburg, August 19, 1982.**

A library district may be established as provided by K.S.A. 12-1236 *et seq.* Financial support of such a district is provided by a mill levy of up to 1½ mills upon all property located within the district pursuant

to K.S.A. 12-1247. In the absence of any express authority by statute or authority under home rule, a township which is contained within the district's boundaries cannot contribute moneys to the district or to a civic organization formed in support thereof. However, if the township lies outside the boundaries of the district, it may enter into an agreement with the district for the furnishing of library services. Such an agreement would be within the implied power of the township under K.S.A. 12-1219 to provide library services to residents. ## OPINION NO. 82-181

**Contracts And Promises—Pawnbrokers And Precious Metal Dealers—Licensure. Jerry Smith, Chief of Police, Junction City, August 19, 1982.**

K.S.A. 16-707 contemplates licensure of pawnbrokers and precious metal dealers as separate entities. Therefore, a licensed pawnbroker must also obtain a precious metal dealer's license prior to transacting business as a precious metal dealer. Jewelers who purchase precious metals, or used articles containing such metals, for resale purposes must be licensed as precious metal dealers. Coin dealers who purchase coins for their numismatic value, rather than their metal content, are not required to be licensed as precious metal dealers. Cited herein: K.S.A. 16-706, 16-707, 16-710, 16-712, 16-714, 16-715, 16-716, 16-719, 16-720. MBM

## OPINION NO. 82-182

**Automobiles and Other Vehicles—Serious Traffic Offenses—Driving While Under Influence of Alcohol; Use of Prior Convictions in Determining Sentence. Alan F. Alderson, General Counsel, Department of Revenue, Topeka, August 19, 1982.**

As amended by Laws of 1982, Chapter 144, K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 8-1567(h) provides that a court shall, prior to sentencing a person who has been convicted of a violation of the statute or who has entered a plea of *nolo contendere*, request and receive from the department of revenue, division of vehicles, a record of all prior convictions of that person for violations of any of the motor-vehicle laws of Kansas. Additionally, the sentencing provisions found in subsections (c), (d), (e) and (i) of the amended statute make reference to convictions of a violation of only the statute or an ordinance which prohibits the same acts. In view of this specific language, convictions under a statute of another state are excluded from consideration at time of sentencing. While the Legislature has included reference to the laws of other states in some Kansas statutes (*see, e.g.* K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 8-285, as amended by L. 1982, ch. 144), it did not choose to do so in the statute governing driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor or drugs. ## OPINION NO. 82-183

**Automobiles and Other Vehicles—Serious Traffic Offenses—Driving While Under Influence of Alcohol; Performance of Public or Community Service Work by Convicted Violators. Representative Ed C. Rolfs, Sixty-Fifth District, Junction City, August 19, 1982.**

As amended by L. 1982, ch. 144, § 5, K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 8-1567 provides that a person convicted of a violation of the offense of operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol may be required to perform public or community service work as an alternative to incarceration or payment of a fine. In assigning the work to be performed, a judge or court services division would be exercising judicial and discretionary functions, respectively, and would be exempt from liability under the Tort Claims Act, K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 75-6101 *et seq.* However, as noted by Attorney General Opinion Nos. 81-98 and 82-157, the recipient organization (including local governments and nonprofit corporations) may be liable for injuries and damages inflicted or suffered by persons acting within the scope of their designated community service duties. Cited herein: K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 8-1567 (as amended by L. 1982, ch. 144, § 5), K.S.A. 21-4610, K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 75-6102, 75-6104. JSS
