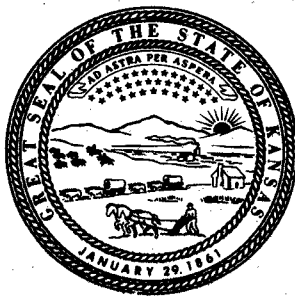

SOCIAL AND REHABILITATION SERVICES**INVITATION FOR BIDS**

The State Economic Opportunity Office of the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services invites social and educational research and evaluation agencies to submit bids to carry out a qualitative and quantitative evaluation of seven community social service agencies which serve as prime sponsors of the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) program. The seven agencies cover a service area of 24 counties in the eastern one-third of the state.

The purpose of the Community Services Block Grant program is to ameliorate the causes of poverty in the community. The evaluation should focus on the degree to which prime sponsors are addressing the purpose of the Act.

The study should include, but not be limited to, the following points:

- A. nature and extent of poverty in each service area;
- B. the manner in which prime sponsors determine and respond to the poverty needs in their service areas with CSBG funds;
- C. profile of the population served by prime sponsors with CSBG funds;
- D. types of activities carried out;
- E. effects of activities on clients;
- F. unduplicated number of clients served;
- G. project successes, problems and spin-offs; and
- H. cost effectiveness of the project in relation to the number of clients served and results obtained.

In analyzing project activities the evaluation should pay particular attention to those activities which:

- A. ameliorate the cause of poverty;
- B. lessen the effects of poverty;
- C. develop skills in clients which help them overcome their economic condition; and
- D. provide a one time or short term temporary remedy or relief.

The evaluation should study and report on each agency's service delivery system, criteria for serving clients, uniformity in the application of eligibility to clients, limitations on the provision of services to

clients, procedures and practices governing the distribution of services to clients.

The evaluation should indicate if the quantity and nature of services rendered are reasonable in relation to the poverty problems in the area.

The methodology should consist of on site visits of two-to-four days at each of the seven agencies, questionnaire interviews with staff and clients. This will require the development of evaluation instruments, travel to agencies, conduct of questionnaires, analysis and interpretation of data and development of a final report.

Agencies wishing to submit bids must also submit a proposal and timelines to Barbara Huppee, State Economic Opportunity Office, 535 Kansas Avenue, Topeka Kansas 66603, no later than September 17, 1982. The agency submitting the lowest bid which meets the specifications established here will be awarded the evaluation contract. The awarding of this contract is subject to the availability of funds.

ATTORNEY GENERAL**OPINION NO. 82-184**

Agriculture—Conservation Districts—Discretion of County to Provide Funds. Representative W. Edgar Moore, Twenty-Sixth District, Olathe, September 1, 1982.

The provisions of K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 2-1907b are permissive with respect to the payment of county moneys for the operation of soil conservation districts, and boards of county commissioners are not required by this statute to make such payments. Cited herein: K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 2-1907b. RVE

OPINION NO. 82-185

Automobiles and Other Vehicles—Serious Traffic Offenses—Driving While Under Influence of Alcohol; Use of Prior Convictions in Sentencing of Violators. Honorable Pauline Schwarm, District Magistrate Judge, Greensburg, September 1, 1982.

K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 8-1567, relating to the operation of a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol, was extensively amended by section 5 of L. 1982, ch. 144. Changes made included increasing the penalties for those convicted of a violation, eliminating plea bargaining, standardizing diversion programs, authorizing community service in lieu of a fine and revising the procedures for license revocation. Despite such changes, the behavior proscribed by the statute prior to July 1, 1982 (the effective date of the amended statute) remains proscribed after that date. Accordingly, a person found to have violated the section subsequent to that date should be regarded as a second-time or multiple offender if a prior conviction or convictions occurred under the statute within five years prior to the 1982 amendments. STATE FIRE MARSHAL**NOTICE OF HEARING ON
PROPOSED ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS**

The Office of the State Fire Marshal will hold a public hearing September 28, 1982 at 9:00 a.m. at the Shawnee County Health Department Building, 1615 W. 8th, Topeka, Kansas, for the purpose of receiving public comments on proposed changes to K.A.R. 22-6-7, 22-6-11, 22-6-16, 22-7-1, 22-7-4, 22-8-3, 22-8-4, 22-8-5 and 22-10-1 through 22-10-14.

K.A.R. 22-6-7, 22-6-11 and 22-6-16 relate to fireworks. The proposed changes will eliminate the testing requirements of all fireworks by the State Fire Marshal as a condition precedent to their sale, eliminate the fee provisions for registering as a bottle rocket manufacturer or wholesaler and replace the terms "approved fireworks" with "permitted fireworks." The hearing on these regulations will commence at 9:00 a.m.

K.A.R. 22-7-1 and 22-7-4 relate to flammable and combustible liquids. The 1977 edition of NFPA pamphlet no. 30 will be replaced with the 1981 edition and the color coding requirements for tank openings will be revoked. The hearing on these regulations will commence at 9:30 a.m.

K.A.R. 22-8-3, 22-8-4 and 22-8-5 relate to LP-Gas motor fuel equipment installations. New provisions will specify the placement location of the check list seal and provide a procedure for obtaining a replacement seal. The hearings for these regulations will commence at 10:00 a.m.

K.A.R. 22-10-1 through 22-10-14 relate to installation and certification standards for extinguishing devices. The proposed changes are pursuant to an amendment to K.S.A. 31-133a (L. 1982, ch. 169). The certification of persons and employees will be eliminated, a fee will be charged for certified businesses ranging from twenty-five dollars (\$25) to fifty dollars (\$50). A certificate will be valid from January 1 through December 31 requiring renewal applications to be submitted by November 30. The 1981 edition of NFPA pamphlet no. 10 will replace the 1978 edition, the 1980 edition of NFPA pamphlet no. 96 will replace the 1978 edition and the 1980 edition of NFPA pamphlet no. 17 will replace the 1975 edition. The hearing on these regulations will commence at 11:00 a.m.

STATE BOARD OF AGRICULTURE**TEMPORARY ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS**

(Approved by the State Rules and Regulations Board August 25, 1982. Will expire May 1, 1983.)

4-7-800. Butterfat tax for creameries, cheese factories, condensories, milk or cream brokerages, evaporated milk and milk powder plants. The tax for butterfat purchased by creameries, cheese factories, condensories, milk or cream brokerages, evaporated milk plants and milk powder plants shall be ten cents (\$.10) for each one thousand pounds (1,000) or fraction thereof of butterfat purchased during the three (3) preceding calendar months. This regulation shall be effective on and after October 1, 1982. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-708 as amended by Section 14 of 1982 Senate Bill 877 and 75-1401; implementing K.S.A. 65-708 as amended by Section 14 of 1982 Senate Bill 877; effective, T-83-25, Oct. 1, 1982.)

4-7-801. Taxes for the freezing of ice cream and ice milk. The tax on ice cream factories and ice milk factories established by K.S.A. 65-708 and the fee imposed on ice cream and ice milk imported into the state, established by K.S.A. 65-719, shall be one dollar (\$1.00) for each one thousand (1,000) gallons or fraction thereof of ice cream or ice milk as applicable. This regulation shall be effective on and after October 1, 1982. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-708 as amended by Section 14 of 1982 Senate Bill 877, K.S.A. 65-719 as amended by Section 15 of 1982 Senate Bill 877 and K.S.A. 75-1401; implementing K.S.A. 65-708 as amended by Section 14 of 1982 Senate Bill 877 and K.S.A. 65-719 as amended by Section 15 of 1982 Senate Bill 877; effective, T-83-25, Oct. 1, 1982.)

4-7-802. Grade A milk fees. The fees required by K.S.A. 65-745 shall be one cent (\$.01) for each one hundred (100) pounds of: (a) milk produced by milk producers under Kansas grade A inspection;

(b) packaged grade A pasteurized milk or milk products sold in Kansas at retail to the final consumer or sold to any person for resale in Kansas at retail to the final consumer by a milk distributor; or

(c) packaged grade A pasteurized milk or milk products which are processed by a milk processor in Kansas for distribution outside the state. This regulation shall be effective on and after October 1, 1982. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-745 as amended by Section 16 of 1982 Senate Bill 877 and K.S.A. 75-1401; implementing K.S.A. 65-745 as amended by Section 16 of 1982 Senate Bill 877; effective, T-83-25, Oct. 1, 1982.)

4-7-803. Fees for dairy licenses and permits. (a) For a butter manufacturer's license, for an ice cream, ice cream mix, ice milk, or ice milk mix manufacturer's license, for a license to manufacture cheese or for a license to manufacture evaporated, condensed, or powdered milk, the fee shall be seventy dollars (\$70.00).

(b) For a license to operate an establishment to freeze ice cream mix or ice milk mix for sale at retail, the fee shall be forty dollars (\$40.00).

(continued)

(c) The fee for a field superintendent's license shall be sixteen dollars (\$16.00).

(d) The fee for a station license issued to a milk buying or cream buying station shall be sixteen dollars (\$16.00).

(e) The application fee for a milk or cream handler's license shall be fifty dollars (\$50.00).

(f) The milk or cream brokerage license fee shall be twenty dollars (\$20.00).

(g) The fee for a license to operate a public dairy shall be fifty dollars (\$50.00).

(h) The fee for each of the tester permits established by K.S.A. 65-708 shall be ten dollars (\$10.00).

(i) The fees in this regulation shall be effective for all licenses and permits that become effective after December 31, 1982.

(j) This regulation shall be effective on and after October 1, 1982. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-708 as amended by Section 14 of 1982 Senate Bill 877 and K.S.A. 65-719 as amended by Section 15 of 1982 Senate Bill 877 and K.S.A. 75-1401; implementing K.S.A. 65-708 as amended by Section 14 of 1982 Senate Bill 877 and K.S.A. 65-719 as amended by Section 15 of 1982 Senate Bill 877; effective, T-83-25, Oct. 1, 1982.)

4-15-1. Inspection and certification fees for plant nurseries. (a) The fee for certification of plant nurseries shall be thirty dollars (\$30.00).

(b) The inspection fee for plant nurseries shall be four dollars (\$4.00) per acre or fraction thereof of field grown nursery stock. The same inspection fee shall be applied for each one quarter ($\frac{1}{4}$) acre or fraction thereof of container grown nursery stock and for each ten thousand (10,000) square feet or fraction thereof of greenhouse grown nursery stock which requires inspection. This regulation shall be effective on and after October 1, 1982. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2-2126 and 2-2118 as amended by Section 5 of 1982 Senate Bill 877; implementing K.S.A. 2-2118 as amended by Section 5 of 1982 Senate Bill 877; effective, T-83-25, Oct. 1, 1982.)

4-15-2. Fees for the inspection and certification of plant or plant products for other than plant nurseries. Whenever any person, other than a plant nursery, owns or possesses plants or plant products and wishes to have those plants or plant products inspected and certified for out of state shipment the fee shall be: (a) thirty dollars (\$30.00) per hour for the time actually required to make the inspection plus the mileage expenses incurred by the inspector in traveling to and from the inspection site; or

(b) if a compliance agreement is involved, the sum of fifty dollars (\$50.00) plus five dollars (\$5.00) for each certificate issued to cover the shipment of plants or plant products which have been inspected. The applicable fee shall be determined by the quantity and type of plants or plant products being inspected and the point of destination. Mileage expenses shall be governed by the mileage allowance rate prescribed by the rules and regulations adopted pursuant to K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 75-3203a or amendments thereof. This regulation shall be effective on and after September 1, 1982. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2-2126 and 2-2118 as amended

by 1982 Senate Bill 877; implementing K.S.A. 2-2118 as amended by 1982 Senate Bill 877; effective, T-83-25, Sept. 1, 1982.)

4-15-3. Nursery dealer license fee. The application fee for a nursery dealer's license shall be forty dollars (\$40.00). This regulation shall be effective on and after September 1, 1982. (Authorized by K.S.A. 2-2126 and 2-2120 as amended by Section 6 of 1982 Senate Bill 877; implementing K.S.A. 2-2120 as amended by Section 6 of 1982 Senate Bill 877; effective, T-83-25, Sept. 1, 1982.)

5-9-10. Application fee for a temporary permit. The fee for an application for a temporary permit or extension of a temporary permit shall be twenty-five dollars (\$25.00). This regulation shall be effective on and after September 1, 1982. (Authorized by K.S.A. 82a-727 as amended by Section 19 of 1982 Senate Bill 877; implementing K.S.A. 82a-727 as amended by Section 19 of 1982 Senate Bill 877; effective, T-83-25, Sept. 1, 1982.)

5-10-1. Application fee for a permit to appropriate water for beneficial use. The fee for an application for a permit to appropriate water for beneficial use shall be:

more than 320	\$100.00 plus 7.50 for each additional 200 acre feet or any part thereof

TEMPORARY ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS

(Approved by the State Rules and Regulations Board August 25, 1982. Will expire May 1, 1983.)

28-4-76. Licensing procedures. (a) Any person, corporation, firm, association or other organization desiring to conduct a residential center shall apply for a license to do so on forms provided by the Kansas department of health and environment.

(b) No person, corporation, firm, association or other organization shall conduct a residential center for children under 16 years of age or a maternity home, unless the person, corporation, firm, association or other organization has been issued a license to do so by the Kansas department of health and environment.

(c) The application for a license shall be accompanied by a written proposal which details the purpose of the center, the administration, financing, staffing and services to be offered including age range and sex of residents to be served. This proposal shall be approved by the Kansas department of social and rehabilitation services before a full license is issued by the Kansas department of health and environment.

(d) Plans for all buildings to be used as a residential center shall be submitted to the Kansas department of health and environment for approval, as prescribed in K.A.R. 1981 Supp. 28-4-86.

(e) A full license shall be issued if the secretary finds that the applicant is in compliance with the requirement of K.S.A. 65-501 *et seq.* and amendments thereof and the rules and regulations promulgated pursuant to those statutes, and has made full payment of the license fee required by the provisions of K.S.A. 65-505 and amendments thereof. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-508; implementing K.S.A. 65-501, 65-503, 65-504 as amended by L. 1982, ch. 258, § 3; 65-505 as amended by L. 1982, ch. 259, § 1; 65-508; effective E-76-36, July 14, 1975; effective May 1, 1976; amended May 1, 1979; amended T-83-24, Aug. 25, 1982.)

28-4-92. License fees. (a) When application is made for a license, and when application is made for the renewal of a license, the applicant shall send to the secretary of the Kansas department of health and environment the appropriate license fee specified below:

Licensed Day Care Home or Group Boarding Home	\$ 5.00
Detention Center, Child Placing Agency Maternity Center, or Day Care Referral Agency	\$15.00
Child Care Center, Preschool or Residential Center for 60 or fewer children	\$15.00
Child Care Center, Preschool or Residential Center for 61 or more children	\$25.00

(b) A full license shall be issued if the secretary finds that the applicant is in compliance with the requirements of K.S.A. 65-501 *et seq.* and amendments thereof and the rules and regulations promulgated pursuant to those statutes and has made full payment of the license fee required by the provisions of K.S.A. 65-505 and amendments thereof. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-505 as amended by L. 1982, ch. 259, § 1; effective T-83-24, Aug. 25, 1982.)

28-4-200. Definitions. (a) "Child care center" means a facility in which care is provided for 10 or more children two weeks to 16 years of age for more than three hours and less than 24 hours per day and includes day-time, evening, and night-time care. A facility caring for fewer than 10 children may be licensed as a center if the program and facility meets child care center regulations.

(b) "Corporal punishment" means any method of physical discipline of a child, including spanking with the hand or any implement, slapping, swatting, pulling hair, yanking by the arm, or any similar activity involving physical contact.

(c) "Evening care" means care provided between six o'clock p.m. and one o'clock a.m. the following day.

(d) "Full license" means a document issued by the Kansas department of health and environment, which is valid for one year, and which authorizes a person, corporation, firm, association or other organization to operate and maintain a licensed child care center or preschool.

(e) "Infant" means a child who is under 12 months of age, or who has not learned to walk.

(f) "In-service training" means training related to the job responsibilities of the staff at the facility. (See K.A.R. 28-4-210(f) and (g).)

(g) "Mother's Day Out" means a program operating more than five consecutive hours per session or more than one day per week and in which any one child is enrolled not more than one session per week.

(h) "Night-time care" means care after six o'clock p.m. and extending beyond one o'clock a.m. of the following day.

(i) "Preschool" means a facility which provides learning experiences to children who have not attained the age of eligibility to enter kindergarten prescribed in K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 72-1107(c) and any amendments thereto, and who are 30 months of age or older, which conducts sessions not exceeding three hours per ses-

(continued)

sion, which does not enroll any child more than one session per day, and which does not serve a meal. The term "preschool" shall include educational preschools, Montessori schools, nursery schools, church-sponsored preschools, and cooperatives. A preschool may have fewer than 10 children and be licensed as a preschool if the program and facility meet regulations.

(j) "Program" means a comprehensive and coordinated plan of activities providing for the education and development of children who attend, or are provided care, at a preschool or a child care center.

(k) "Program director" means the staff member of a child care center or preschool who meets the requirements of K.A.R. 28-4-210(h), (i) or (j) and who is responsible for implementing and supervising the program.

(l) "School-age" means kindergarten age or older as set forth in K.S.A. 1981 Supp. 72-1107(c) and amendments thereof, but not 16 years of age or older.

(m) "Self-contained unit" means an area separated by permanent or movable partitions, which contains indoor learning materials for the maximum number of children permitted in one group. (See K.A.R. 28-4-210(b)(1).)

(n) "Summer camp for school-age children" means a summer program in which school-age children are enrolled for more than three hours daily for more than two consecutive weeks.

(o) "Temporary license" means a document issued by the Kansas department of health and environment granting authority to a person, association, corporation or other organization to operate and maintain a licensed child care center or preschool pending final approval or disapproval of the application for a day care facility license by the secretary of social and rehabilitation services.

(p) "Toddler" means a child who has learned to walk, and who is between 12 months and 30 months of age. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-508; effective Jan. 1, 1973; amended May 1, 1975; amended Feb. 15, 1977; amended May 1, 1979; amended T-83-24, Aug. 25, 1982.)

28-4-203. Licensing procedures. (a) Any person, corporation, firm, association or other organization desiring to conduct a child care center or pre-school shall apply for a license to do so on forms provided by the Kansas department of health and environment.

(b) No person, corporation, firm, association or other organization shall conduct a child care center or pre-school unless the person, corporation, firm, association or other organization has been issued a license to do so by the Kansas department of health and environment.

(c) Children shall not be enrolled in any child care center or pre-school, until an application for a license for the child care center or pre-school has been processed by the Kansas department of health and environment, and a temporary or full license has been issued for the child care center or pre-school.

(d) A full license shall be issued if the secretary finds that the applicant is in compliance with the requirements of K.S.A. 65-501 *et seq.* and amendments thereof and the rules and regulations promulgated pursuant to those statutes and has made full payment

of the license fee required by the provisions of K.S.A. 65-505 and amendments thereof. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-508; implementing K.S.A. 65-501, 65-503, 65-504, as amended by L. 1982, ch. 258, § 3; 65-505 as amended by L. 1982, ch. 259, § 1; 65-508; effective Jan. 1, 1973; amended May 1, 1975; amended Feb. 15, 1977; amended May 1, 1979; amended T-83-24, Aug. 25, 1982.)

28-4-210. General staff requirements (a) Facilities with enrollment requiring only one adult shall have two additional adults on call in case of illness or emergency. Names and phone numbers of these adults shall be posted at the facility, and their health certificates shall be on file.

(b) The ratio between teaching staff and children shall be determined by the age of children and services provided. Only persons who spend at least 75% of their time when at the facility working directly with children shall be counted in the following adult child ratios:

(1) Preschools and child care centers:

Age of children	Adult ratio	Maximum per unit
Infants (2 weeks to 12 months)	1 to 3	9
Toddlers (12 months to 2½ years if walking alone)	1 to 5	10
2½ to kindergarten entrance	1 to 10	20

Mixed age group:

(2) Programs providing evening and night-time care:

(A) Day-time adult-child ratio shall be followed during meal, bath and dressing hours as provided in K.A.R. 28-4-210(c)(1); and

(B) Two adults shall be present at all times, one of whom shall be awake. Not more than one adult shall sleep in room with children.

(3) Programs serving handicapped children:

Age of children	Adult-child ratio (Mild disability)	Adult-child ratio (Severe disability)
Under 3 years	1 to 3	1 to 2
3 years to 8 years	1 to 7	1 to 4
8 years to 16 years	1 to 9	1 to 5

(c) Staffing and grouping patterns shall be developed to provide children with a consistent relationship with an adult and an opportunity for close friendships with other children.

(1) A plan shall be presented to the licensing representative which indicates the facility's plan for staff and grouping of children.

(2) When volunteers and part-time employed staff are used, they shall be responsible to the program director. Staff time shall be planned for orientation and supervision of volunteers.

(d) Time shall be provided for staff meetings, in-service or academic training, breaks, and contact with parents in a manner which will not detract from attention to children.

(e) Every facility or self-contained unit shall have at least one staff person on duty at all times who:

(continued)

- (1) is 18 years of age or older;
 - (2) has a minimum of a high school diploma or its equivalent;
 - (3) is knowledgeable about child development, methods of guidance, and education of children;
 - (4) is sensitive to the needs of individual children;
 - (5) has skills in human relations necessary to relate to other staff, parents and community; and
 - (6) is of good moral character.
- (f) All staff in multiple staff facilities shall participate at least monthly in staff meetings or in-service training provided by the facility, professional organizations or local early childhood associations.
- (g) Program directors shall obtain five clock hours of in-service training each year, separate from the in-service training event or events conducted at their facilities.
- (h) Facilities licensed for 12 or fewer children shall have a staff person who meets the training requirements through one of the following options:
- (1) Six months teaching experience in a licensed facility with children of the same age as those children enrolled in the present facility; or
 - (2) (A) Five sessions of observation for not less than 2½ consecutive hours per observation in an approved facility enrolling children of the same age as those children enrolled in the present facility. Applicants for child care centers shall plan their observations so that all daily activities (morning, lunch, nap, late afternoon) can be observed; and
 - (B) Ten clock hours of workshops, conferences, or professional meetings approved by the state licensing staff; or
 - (3) (A) A minimum of three semester hours of academic study or equivalent training courses in child development and curriculum resources; and
 - (B) Supervised student observations in high school or college, or three months work experience with children of the same age as those children enrolled in the present facility; or
 - (4) A child development associate credential.
- (i) Facilities licensed for not less than 13 and not more than 24 children shall have a program director who meets the training requirements through one of the following options:
- (1) (A) Five sessions of observation for not less than 2½ consecutive hours per observation in licensed facilities enrolling children of the same age as those children enrolled in the present facility. Applicants for child care centers shall plan their observations so that all daily activities (morning, lunch, nap, late afternoon) can be observed; and
 - (B) One year of teaching experience in a licensed facility with children of the same age as those children enrolled in the present facility; or
 - (2) Seven to nine semester hours of academic study or equivalent training courses in child development, curriculum resources, nutrition, guidance and education for young children, and three months teaching experience in a licensed facility with children of the same developmental age as those children enrolled in the present facility; or
 - (3) Child development associate credential.

(j) Facilities licensed for more than 24 children shall have a program director who meets the training requirements through one of the following options:

(1) Twelve semester hours of academic study or equivalent training courses in child development, curriculum resources, guidance of young children, human relations, early childhood administration, parent education, or practicum, and one year teaching experience in a licensed facility with children of the same age as those children enrolled in the present facility;

(2) Child development associate credential, and one year teaching experience in a licensed facility with children of the same age as those children enrolled in the present facility;

(3) Associate of arts degree or two year certificate in child development and one year teaching experience in a licensed facility with children of the same age as those children enrolled in the present facility;

(4) A.B. or B.S. degree in child development or early childhood education and three months teaching experience in a licensed facility with children of the same age as those children enrolled in the present facility;

(5) A.B. or B.S. degree in a field related to child development or early childhood education and 12 hours of academic study or equivalent training courses in human relations, child development, curriculum resources, parent education, or practicum, and administration of programs for children of the same age as those children enrolled in the present facility, and three months teaching experience in a licensed facility enrolling children of the same age as those children enrolled in the present facility.

(k) Multi-unit facilities shall employ one adult per unit who meets the requirements prescribed in K.A.R. 28-4-210(i) or (j), as applicable, depending on the size of the unit.

(l) Facilities may employ additional persons as assistant teachers who meet the following minimum requirements:

(1) Are 16 years or older; and

(2) Have high school or college academic study in child development or equivalent training courses.

(m) Volunteers may serve as staff if they are 14 years of age or older and agree to participate in in-service training programs under the direction of the program director.

(n) Facilities serving infants and toddlers shall employ teaching staff who meet the requirements outlined in K.A.R. 28-4-210(h), or who have a nursing degree and six months work experience in pediatrics or in a licensed child care center serving infants and toddlers.

(o) Facilities providing programs for school-age children shall employ teaching staff who meet the requirements in K.A.R. 28-4-210(h), (i), or (j), or who have an A.B. or B.S. degree and three months experience working with school-age children.

(p) Facilities providing a kindergarten shall have a teacher who is certified by the Kansas department of education as an early childhood teacher or as a kindergarten teacher.

(q) Facilities providing programs for handicapped children shall have staff who meet the requirements in K.A.R. 28-4-210(h), (i), (j), or (o), and who:

(continued)

(1) Shall not be the parent of a child enrolled in the unit; and

(2) Shall have additional academic course work or equivalent training courses in the understanding of handicapped children, and the knowledge to develop a specialized program to meet the needs of individual children enrolled in the facility.

(r) Consultants shall meet the educational requirements of their professions.

(s) (1) Facilities enrolling over 24 children shall have a part or full-time administrator who may be the owner, or a volunteer, a paid employee or a teacher utilized not more than 25% of the time as administrator. The administrator shall have:

(A) Knowledge of programs for young children;

(B) Human relations skills to relate to the board of directors, parents and the community; and

(C) Training or experience in administration.

(2) Facilities serving three or more units of children shall have a program director separate from the classroom teaching staff who meets the requirements of K.A.R. 28-4-210(j).

(3) Facilities serving more than five units shall designate an assistant director who meets the training requirements of K.A.R. 28-4-210(j).

(4) The program director shall spend a minimum number of hours per week in the facility while the children are in attendance, as follows:

(A) Child care center director—eight hours per week, four hours of which shall be between 9:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m.; and

(B) Preschool director—five hours per week.

(5) A program director who meets the training requirements of K.A.R. 28-4-210(j)(4) or (j)(5) may serve as program director for a maximum of three separate facilities, if the requirement of K.A.R. 28-4-210(s), (4) is met.

(t) Facilities serving a meal prepared on site to more than 12 children shall employ a staff person who meets the following requirements:

(1) Has knowledge of nutritional needs of children;

(2) Understands quantity food preparation and service;

(3) Practices sanitary methods of food handling and storage;

(4) Is sensitive to individual and cultural food tastes of children; and

(5) Is willing to work with the program director in planning learning experiences for children relative to nutrition.

(u) Facilities shall be cleaned daily. The facility shall be left in a clean condition at the end of each session.

(v) All employed staff members shall provide personal and work references, college transcripts and certificates of training at time of application for employment. These records are to be retained in the employee's file at the facility or at the administrative office. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-508; implementing K.S.A. 65-501, 65-503, 65-504 as amended by L. 1982, ch. 258, § 3; 65-505 as amended by L. 1982, ch. 259, § 1; 65-508; effective Jan. 1, 1973; amended May 1, 1975; amended Feb. 15, 1977; amended May 1, 1979; amended T-83-24, Aug. 25, 1982.)

28-4-251. Licensing procedures. (a) A child shall not be placed in a group boarding home by any placing agent unless that home is in possession of a license issued by the Kansas department of health and environment.

(b) A person, corporation, firm, association or other organization shall not conduct a group boarding home unless the person, corporation, firm, association or other organization has been issued a license to do so by the Kansas department of health and environment.

(c) Any person, corporation, firm, association or other organization desiring to conduct a group boarding home shall apply for a license to do so on forms provided by the Kansas department of health and environment.

(d) The application for a license shall be accompanied by a written proposal which details the purpose of the group boarding home, the administration, financing, staffing, and services to be offered including age range and sex of residents to be served. This proposal shall be approved by the Kansas department of social and rehabilitation services before a license is issued by the Kansas department of health and environment. Any changes in the services shall be approved by the Kansas department of social and rehabilitation services before implementation.

(e) Plans for all buildings to be used as a group boarding home shall be submitted to the Kansas department of health and environment for approval, as prescribed in K.A.R. 1981 Supp. 28-4-262.

(f) A full license shall be issued if the secretary finds that the applicant is in compliance with the requirements of K.S.A. 65-501 *et seq.* and amendments thereof and the rules and regulations promulgated pursuant to those statutes, and has made full payment of the license fee required by the provisions of K.S.A. 65-505 and amendments thereof. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-508; implementing K.S.A. 65-501, 65-503, 65-504 as amended by L. 1982, ch. 258, § 3; 65-505 as amended by L. 1982, ch. 258, § 1; 65-508; effective July 14, 1975; amended T-83-24, Aug. 25, 1982.)

28-4-312. The license. (a) Any person desiring to conduct a family foster home shall apply for a license to do so on forms provided by the Kansas department of health and environment.

(b) Inconsequential care shall not require a license.

(c) A family foster home shall be licensed for a maximum of four foster children, not more than two of whom shall be under 18 months of age, with a total of six children in the home including the applicant's own children under 16 years of age. Approval may be granted to care for two additional foster children in order to meet the needs of sibling groups or other special needs of foster children.

(d) Licenses shall not be issued concurrently for more than one type of child care or for child and adult care in the same family foster home.

(e) A license shall be issued if the secretary finds that the applicant is in compliance with the requirements of K.S.A. 65-501 *et seq.* and amendments thereof and the rules and regulations promulgated pursuant to these statutes.

(continued)

(f) Exceptions.

(1) The applicant or licensee may request an exception to a regulation from the Kansas department of health and environment. Such exceptions may be allowed when it is in the best interest of a child or children and when the exception does not violate statutory requirements.

(2) Written notice from the Kansas state department of health and environment stating the nature of the exception and its duration shall be posted with the license.

(g) The applicant may terminate the license by notifying the Kansas department of health and environment if the licensee no longer wishes to maintain a family foster home.

(h) A copy of the "regulations for licensing family foster homes for children" shall be kept on the premises of the family foster home at all times. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-508; implementing K.S.A. 65-501, 65-503, 65-504 as amended by L. 1982, ch. 258, § 3; 65-505 as amended by L. 1982, ch. 259, § 1; 65-508; effective E-81-27; Aug. 27, 1980; effective May 1, 1981; amended T-83-24, Aug. 25, 1982.)

28-4-351. Licensing procedures. (a) A person, corporation, firm, association or other organization shall not conduct a detention center for children under 16 years of age, unless the person, corporation, firm, association or other organization has been issued a license to do so by the Kansas department of health and environment.

(b) Any public agency or private individual, corporation, firm, association or other organization desiring to conduct a detention center shall apply for a license to do so on forms provided by the Kansas department of health and environment.

(c) Detention centers and other foster care facilities operated by or receiving support from county or municipal governments shall meet the same requirements for licensure as facilities operated by nongovernmental entities.

(d) The application for a license shall be accompanied by a written proposal which details the purpose of the center, the administration, financing, staffing, and services to be offered including age range and sex of residents to be served. This proposal shall be approved by the Kansas department of social and rehabilitation services before a license is issued by the Kansas department of health and environment.

(e) Plans for all buildings to be used as a detention center shall be submitted to the Kansas department of health and environment for approval, as prescribed in K.A.R. 1981 Supp. 28-4-359.

(f) A full license shall be issued if the secretary finds that the applicant is in compliance with the requirements of K.S.A. 65-501 *et seq.* and amendments thereof and the rules and regulations promulgated pursuant to those statutes, and has made full payment of the license fee required by the provisions of K.S.A. 65-505 and amendments thereof. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-508; implementing K.S.A. 65-501, 65-503, 65-504 as amended by L. 1982, ch. 258, § 1; 65-505 as amended by L. 1982, ch. 258, § 1; 65-508; effective May 1, 1979; amended, T-83-24, Aug. 25, 1982.)

28-4-371. Licensing procedures. (a) Any person, corporation, firm, association or other organization desiring to conduct a maternity center shall apply for a license on forms provided by the Kansas department of health and environment.

(b) The application shall be accompanied by a written proposal detailing the following:

(1) Description of services offered;

(2) Staff number and qualifications for the various staff positions;

(3) Equipment and supplies maintained at the center;

(4) Admission and discharge criteria;

(5) Criteria for transfer to the hospital with which the center has an agreement;

(6) Outline of prenatal education curriculum completed by professional staff and prenatal education plan;

(7) Plan for care of newborn;

(8) Hospital service agreement;

(9) Ambulance service agreement;

(10) Agreements with a pediatrician and an obstetrician or a group of such practitioners for emergency service; and

(11) The establishment of a community advisory board.

(c) Plans for any building to be used as a maternity center shall be submitted to the Kansas department of health and environment, as prescribed in K.A.R. 1981 Supp. 28-4-377.

(d) A full license shall be issued if the secretary finds that the applicant is in compliance with the requirements of K.S.A. 65-501 *et seq.* and amendments thereof and the rules and regulations promulgated pursuant to those statutes, and has made full payment of the license fee required by the provisions of K.S.A. 65-505 and amendments thereof. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-508; implementing K.S.A. 65-501, 65-503, 65-504, as amended by L. 1982, ch. 258, § 3; 65-505 as amended by L. 1982, ch. 259, § 1; 65-508; effective May 1, 1981; amended T-83-24, Aug. 25, 1982.)
