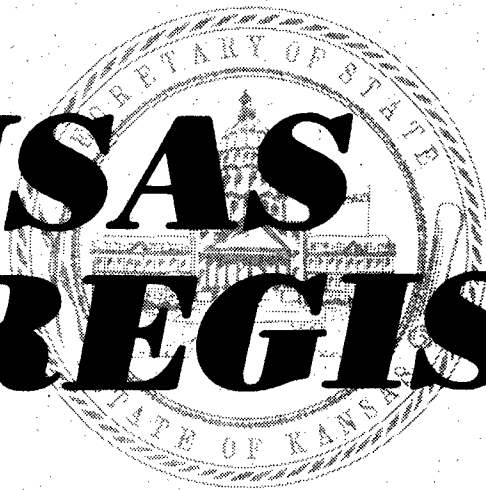

OPINION NO. 83-11

**Counties and County Officers—Hospitals—Simulta-
neous Holding of Another Office by Trustee, January
31, 1983.**

**Counties and County Officers—County Commission-
ers—Eligibility to Serve Simultaneously as County
Hospital Trustee. John E. Bremer, Decatur County
Attorney, Oberlin.**

Even though Charter Resolution No. 3 of Decatur
County has made inapplicable to said county that
portion of K.S.A. 19-1803 which, *iter alia*, precludes a
trustee of a county hospital from holding another
county office, a person who holds the office of county
hospital trustee is rendered ineligible to the office of
county commissioner by virtue of K.S.A. 19-205, which
is uniformly applicable to all counties and, thus, not
subject to a county's charter resolution.

While the common law doctrine of incompatibility
of offices also would preclude one person from simul-
taneously holding the offices of county hospital trustee
and county commissioner, and it would result in the
forfeiture of the first of these offices so held, this
doctrine is inapplicable to the situation where a person
who holds the office of county hospital trustee is
elected to the office of county commissioner, since
K.S.A. 19-205 precludes such person from acquiring
legal title to the office of county commissioner. Nev-

ertheless, where such person commences upon the duties of the office of county commissioner without resigning the office of county hospital trustee, there exists a vacancy in the county commissioner position to which such person was elected. However, where such person has served in the capacity of county commissioner as a *de facto* officer, such person's acts in that capacity are as valid and effectual where they concern the public or the rights of third persons, to the same extent as if such person were an officer *de jure*. OPINION NO. 83-12

Taxation—Limitations on Tax Levies—Limitation on Certain Tax Levies in Cities of the Third Class. David K. Clark, Buffalo City Attorney, Fredonia, January 31, 1983.

The maximum tax levy which a city of the third class may be compelled to certify, in any one year, to satisfy a judgment entered against it, is limited to an amount which a court determines to be reasonable and not oppressive. Cited herein: K.S.A. 12-151, 79-1953, 79-5011. TRH

OPINION NO. 83-13

Waters and Watercourses—Water Plan Storage—Contracts for Withdrawal and Use of Water Held by State; Adjustment of Terms. Senator Charlie L. Angell, Thirty-Eighth District, Plains, February 1, 1983.

Pursuant to the State Water Plan Storage Act, K.S.A. 82a-1301 *et seq.*, the Kansas Water Resources Board and its successor, the Kansas Water Office, are empowered to enter into contracts for the withdrawal and use of waters held in storage by the state. Waters so withdrawn and used by a purchaser are subject to a charge fixed by the respective state agency not less than 5 cents nor more than 10 cents per one thousand gallons of water. Such contracts, which may have a term of up to 40 years, must contain a provision by which such charges are reviewed at least every ten years, although the parties to the contract can agree to a more frequent review. Although the Water Office may establish on an annual basis the rate used for all contracts entered into during that year (K.S.A. 82a-1308), such rate may not be altered thereafter, except as provided by the contract. Accordingly, the provisions of 1983 Senate Bill No. 61 which provide for annual adjustments of the water charge may not be applied to contracts entered into and approved by the legislature prior to the effective date of the bill.
