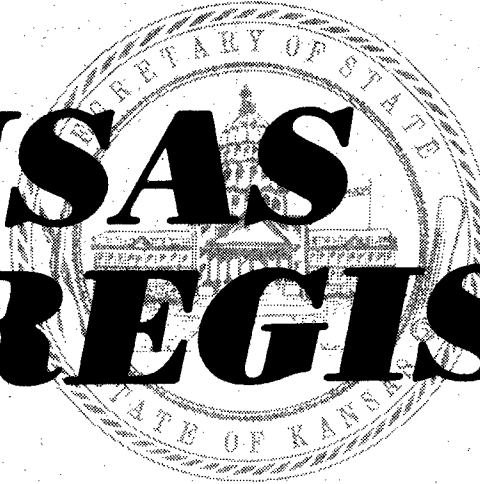

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 83-61

OFFER OF REWARD

WHEREAS, Paul Duffield, age 15, resident of Olathe, Johnson County, Kansas, was brutally beaten on or about January 28, 1983; and

WHEREAS, Kelly Duffield, age 17, and Janelle Duffield, age 12, residents of Olathe, Johnson County, Kansas, were killed on or about January 28, 1983; and

WHEREAS, said beatings and killings appear to have been heinous crimes and assaults or homicides in violation of the laws of the State of Kansas.

NOW, THEREFORE, by virtue of the authority vested in me by K.S.A. 75-113, I, John Carlin, Governor of the State of Kansas, do hereby offer a reward of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for information leading to the apprehension and conviction of the perpetrators of these crimes.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 83-61, and shall become effective immediately.

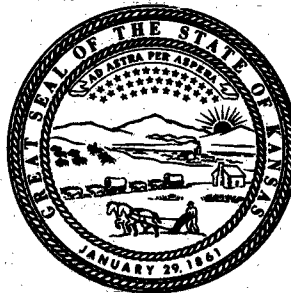

OPINION NO. 83-14

Taxation—Local Option Gross Earnings (Intangibles) Tax—Repeal Thereof. E. A. Mosher, Executive Director, League of Kansas Municipalities, Topeka, February 3, 1983.

The governing body of a county, city or township, which has chosen to impose the local gross earnings tax without a vote of the electorate, may determine subsequently that the tax should not be imposed and, without a vote of the electorate, may repeal the tax. Under such circumstances, the governing body must act, before November 1 of the year for which the tax is imposed, to eliminate the tax. Any attempt to act after this date comes too late. State Departments; Public Officers, Employees—Licensing of Social Workers—Licensure Requirements of Federal Employees and Social Work Designees.

State Boards, Commissions and Authorities—Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board—Social Work Licensure Requirements for Federal Employees and Social Work Designees.

Mentally Ill, Incapacitated, Dependent Persons—Adult Care Homes—Social Work Licensure Requirements for Social Services Designees. Mary Ann Gabel, Executive Secretary, Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board, Topeka, February 3, 1983.

A person practicing social work in a Veterans Administration hospital does not have to be licensed by the State of Kansas, absent such a requirement being imposed by the hospital administrator.

The current provisions of paragraphs 2 and 3 of K.A.R. 1982 Supp. 28-39-76(11) and the provisions of K.A.R. 1982 Supp. 28-39-94(b) are inconsistent with the provisions of K.S.A. 1982 Supp. 75-5348. Thus, notwithstanding the provisions of these administrative rules and regulations, persons who are social services designees under these rules and regulations, but who are not licensed under the Licensure of Social Workers Act, K.S.A. 75-5346 *et seq.*, and who engage in social work practice, or who participate in the delivery of social work services while not under the supervision of a licensed social worker, are engaged in activity violating K.S.A. 1982 Supp. 75-5348(a). absence of a charter ordinance providing otherwise) is 12:00 o'clock noon of the Tuesday preceding by 10 weeks the first Tuesday in April. Said deadline is mandatory, and the only recourse for a candidate, who was prevented from filing for a city office because of the failure of the city clerk to keep his or her office open until 12:00 o'clock noon on the prescribed date, is to seek relief from a court of law. OPINION NO. 83-17

Criminal Procedure—Code; Preliminary Proceedings—Form of Warrant or Summons. Dennis W. Moore, District Attorney, Tenth Judicial District, Olathe, February 9, 1983.

The clerk of the court may properly be the signatory on an arrest warrant only (a) when the warrant is based upon an indictment returned by a grand jury pursuant to K.S.A. 22-3011, or (b) in a misdemeanor case when the prosecution is commenced by the filing of an information, which is verified positively or accompanied by affidavits setting forth the facts of the crime, and a judge has expressly made the requisite findings of probable cause. A bench warrant for failure to appear must be signed by a magistrate in accordance with K.S.A. 22-2304. Cited herein: K.S.A. 22-2301, 22-2302, 22-2303, 22-2304. JEF

Taxation—Kansas Retailers' Sales Tax—Exempt Sales. Representative Don M. Rezac, Sixty-First District, Topeka, February 9, 1983.

The production of dogs and cats, through breeding and raising the same, does not constitute an "agricultural use" which exempts sales of natural gas, electricity, heat and water to be consumed for such use from the Kansas retailers' sales tax. Bonds will bear interest at the rates to be determined when said bonds are sold as hereinafter provided and said interest will be payable on March 1, 1984, and semi-annually thereafter on the first days of September and March of each year until said principal sum shall have been paid. Both principal of and interest on said bonds will be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the office of the State Treasurer in Topeka, Kansas.

Bids will be received on bonds bearing such rates of interest as may be specified by the bidders subject to the following conditions: Not more than five different interest rates shall be specified. Interest rates shall be in a multiple of one-eighth or one-twentieth of one percent and shall not exceed Kansas legal rate. No bid less than par and accrued interest will be considered.

Bids shall be sealed and accompanied by a cashier's or certified check on a bank located in the United States of America in the amount of two percent of the total par value of the bonds being sold, payable to the order of the County of Shawnee, Kansas. Each bidder must certify to the correctness of the computations. The award will be made on the basis of the lowest net interest cost to the County. The County of Shawnee, Kansas reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

The purchase price, together with any premium and accrued interest from date of bonds to date of delivery, must be paid at delivery or bidding check will be forfeited.

All of said bonds will constitute General Obligations of the County payable both as to principal and interest from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limitation as to rate or amount upon all the taxable, tangible property within said County.

The County of Shawnee will furnish the bonds, properly printed, without cost to the successful bidder, and said bonds will be subject to the approving opinion of Nichols and Wolfe Chartered, Topeka, Kansas, whose final approving opinion will be furnished and paid for by the County and delivered with the bonds together with a certified copy of the transcript of proceedings authorizing said bonds.

The County is requesting CUSIP identification numbers be printed on the Series 1983-1 and Series 1983-2 Bonds, neither the failure to print such numbers on any Bond nor any error with respect thereto shall constitute cause for a failure or refusal by the purchaser thereof to accept delivery of and pay for the Series 1983-1 and Series 1983-2 Bonds in accordance with the terms of the purchase contract. All expenses in relation to the printing of CUSIP numbers on the Bonds shall be paid for by the County; provided, however, that CUSIP Service Bureau charge for the assignment of said numbers shall be the responsibility of and shall be paid for by the purchaser.

Bonds will be delivered no later than sixty (60) days from the date of sale at any bank in Topeka, Wichita or Kansas City, Missouri at the expense of the County, or the successful purchaser may designate another place for delivery, the expense of which will be paid by the purchaser.

Assessed value of all tangible taxable property within Shawnee County as certified for determining

the statutory limitations on bonded indebtedness is \$506,059,502.

The total bonded indebtedness of the County at the date hereof, including this proposed issue of bonds in the amount of \$1,987,381.00 is in the amount of \$16,520,176.79. Included in said bonded indebtedness, the County has Temporary Notes outstanding in the total principal amount of \$2,106,250.00 all of which shall be retired in part from proceeds of the bonds, and in part from special assessments which have been collected in cash.

Redemption of the Bonds

If any Bonds are called for redemption and payment prior to maturity, the City shall publish once in the *Kansas Register* a notice of the intention of the City to call and pay said Bonds, the same being described by number and maturity, said notice to be published not less than 30 days prior to the date on which said Bonds are called for payment. The City will also give written notice of its intention to call and pay such Bonds on a specified date, the same being described by number and maturity, said notice to be mailed by United States registered mail addressed to the Paying Agent, to the State Treasurer of Kansas and to the original purchaser of the Bonds, each of said notices to be mailed not less than 30 days prior to the date fixed for redemption. All Bonds so called for redemption and payment as aforesaid shall cease to bear interest from and after the date for which such call is made, provided funds are available for the payment of such Bonds at the price hereinbefore specified.

Place of Payment

Both principal and interest on the Bonds will be payable in lawful money of the United States of America at the Office of the State Treasurer in the City of Topeka, Kansas.

Security for the Bonds

The Bonds will be general obligations of the City, payable as to both principal and interest in part from special assessments levied upon the property benefited by such improvements and, if not so paid, from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limitation as to rate or amount on all the taxable tangible property within the City, the balance payable from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limitation as to rate or amount on all taxable tangible property within the City.

Conditions of Bids

Bids will be received on the Bonds bearing such rate or rates of interest as may be specified by the bidders, subject to the following conditions: The Bonds will be sold in one block on an "all or none" basis. The same rate shall apply to all Bonds maturing in the same year. Not more than five different interest rates shall be

specified, but a rate may be repeated. Each interest rate specified shall be a multiple of 1/8 or 1/20 of 1%. No interest rate shall exceed a rate equal to the 20 bond index of tax exempt municipal bonds published by *The Weekly Bond Buyer*, in New York, New York, on the Monday next preceding the day on which the Bonds are sold, plus 2%, and the difference between the highest and lowest interest rates specified in any bid shall not exceed 2%. No bid less than the principal amount of the Bonds plus accrued interest thereon to the date of their delivery will be considered, and no bid providing for supplemental interest coupons will be considered.

Basis of Award

Each bid shall specify the total interest cost to the City during the life of the Bonds on the basis of such bid, the premium, if any, offered by the bidder, the net interest cost to the City on the basis of such bid, and the average annual net interest rate on the basis of such bid. The net interest cost to the City shall be determined by subtracting the amount of the premium, if any, from the total interest cost to the City and shall be stated as a dollar amount in the bid. The City shall be entitled to rely upon such dollar amount as stated in the bid as the basis for determining the lowest net interest cost bid. If there is any discrepancy between said net interest cost and the average annual net interest rate specified, the specified net interest cost shall govern and the coupon rates specified in the bid shall be adjusted accordingly.

Delivery of and Payment for the Bonds

The City will pay for printing and registering the Bonds and will deliver the same properly executed and registered to the successful bidder within 45 days from the date of sale at such bank or trust company located in Kansas or Missouri, as may be specified by the successful bidder, without cost to the successful bidder or elsewhere at the expense of the successful bidder. Payment for the Bonds shall be made in federal funds or other funds which shall be available to the City on the same day the Bonds are delivered to the successful bidder. The successful bidder will be furnished with a certified transcript evidencing the authorization and issuance of the Bonds and the usual closing proofs, which will include a certificate that there is no litigation pending or threatened at the time of the delivery of the Bonds affecting their validity.

Legal Opinion

HOUSE BILL No. 2024

AN ACT concerning the metropolitan Topeka airport authority; relating to elections for the approval of the issuance of bonds.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. Any election which was held prior to the effective date of this act for the approval of the issuance of general obligation bonds of the metropolitan Topeka airport authority to pay the costs of constructing, equipping and furnishing a new commercial air terminal in accordance with K.S.A. 1982 Supp. 27-334 and which had notice thereof first published 17 days prior to the election instead of 21 days prior to the election is hereby validated. The board of directors of the airport authority may issue the bonds in the amount and for the purpose approved by the voters at the election. The bonds shall be legal and binding obligations of the airport authority.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.
