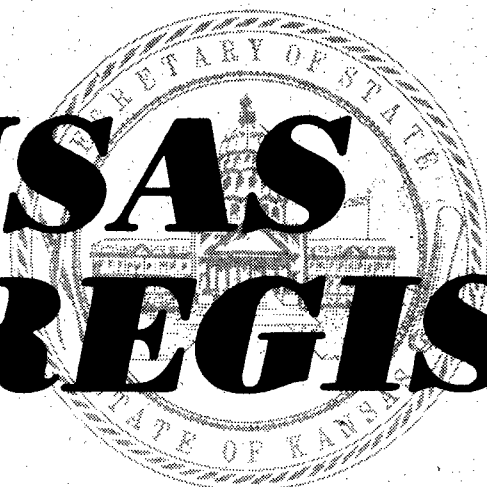

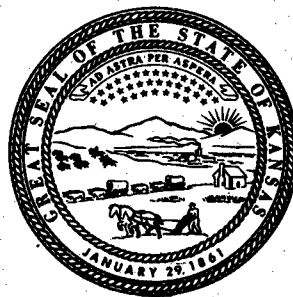

REVENUE BONDS**

**TO: ALL PERSONS CONCERNED AND
INTERESTED**

You are hereby notified that the Board of Trustees of the Pratt Community College District, Pratt County, Kansas, did on November 19, 1984, duly adopt a Resolution declaring it necessary to and authorizing the construction of a student dormitory for the Pratt Community College District by building and equipping an additional dormitory building or buildings to be located on the campus of the Pratt Community College, in the City of Pratt, Kansas, at a total estimated cost of \$400,000 under the authority of K.S.A. 76-6a12 to 76-6a25, inclusive, as amended and supplemented.

You are hereby further notified that said Resolution of the Board of Trustees of the Pratt Community College District, Pratt County, Kansas, declares it necessary to and authorizes the issuance and sale of dormitory system revenue bonds of the Pratt Community College District, Pratt County, Kansas, in an amount not to exceed \$400,000, in order to pay the costs of building and equipping said dormitory building or buildings, said bonds to be issued alone or in conjunction with or as part of a series of bonds to refund existing revenue indebtedness of the District.

You are hereby further notified that unless an action to contest the legality of the proposed revenue bonds of the Pratt Community College District, Pratt County, Kansas, shall be filed in a court of law within 30 days of the date of publication of this Notice, the right to contest the legality of any revenue bonds issued in compliance with the aforesaid Resolution and other proceedings duly and legally had and taken by said Board of Trustees prior to the date of publication of this Notice, and the right to contest the validity of the provisions of such proceedings, shall cease to exist, and no court shall thereafter have the authority to inquire into such matters; and that after the expiration of said 30 days from the date of publication of this Notice, no one shall have any right to commence an action contesting the validity of such revenue bonds or the provisions of such proceedings of the Board of Trustees and all such revenue bonds shall be conclusively presumed to be legal and no court shall thereafter have the authority to inquire into such matters.

(Approved by the State Rules and Regulations Board
November 14, 1984. Effective December 1, 1984.
Will expire May 1, 1985.)

**Article 10.—ADULT CARE HOME PROGRAM
OF THE MEDICAID (MEDICAL
ASSISTANCE) PROGRAM**

30-10-7. Certification and recertification by physicians. (a) Certification. At the time of admission to an adult care home or at the time any adult care home resident applies for medical assistance under the medicaid/medikan program, a physician shall certify that the services are required to be given on an inpatient basis. Services shall be furnished under a plan established by the physician before authorization of payment. Before reimbursement is approved, a screening team designated by medical programs shall review the physician's certification and shall certify that services in an adult care home are the most appropriate services available for the individual. The certification of need shall become part of the individual's medical record. The date of certification shall be the date the case is approved for payment and the certification is signed.

(b) Recertification.

(1) Each adult care home shall be responsible for obtaining a physician's or physician extender's recertification as follows:

(A) For each recipient in skilled nursing facilities:

(i) On the 30th, 60th, and 90th days following admission; and

(ii) every 60 days thereafter;

(B) for each recipient in intermediate care facilities or intermediate care facilities for mental health:

(i) On the 60th day, 180th day, 12th month, 18th month, 24th month following admission; and

(ii) every 12 months thereafter; and

(C) for intermediate care facilities for the mentally retarded, at least once every year.

(2) The recertification shall be included in the recipient's medical record. Recertification statements may be entered on or included with forms, notes, or other records a physician or physician extender normally signs in caring for a recipient. The statement

shall be authenticated by the actual date and signature of the physician or physician extender.

(c) If the appropriate professional refuses to certify or recertify because, in the professional's opinion, the recipient does not require skilled nursing care or intermediate care services on a continuing basis, the services shall not be covered. The reason for the refusal to certify or recertify shall be documented in the recipient's records. The effective date of this regulation shall be December 1, 1984. KANSAS FACTS

STATE BUILDINGS

THE KANSAS CAPITOL

On January 29, 1861, Kansas became the 34th state. Topeka was selected as the capital in an election held in November, 1861. In that election Topeka received 7,996 votes, Lawrence 5,291, and 1,184 votes were cast for other cities. This selection followed a time of bitter struggle over location of the capital. The territorial capital had been Fort Leavenworth, Shawnee Mission, Pawnee, Shawnee Mission, again, Leecompton and Lawrence.

The State Capitol stands on 20 acres of ground donated to the state by Cyrus K. Holliday. The Legislature accepted the block of land by joint resolution approved February 7, 1862.

The Board of Statehouse Commissioners approved, in 1866, the construction of the east wing of the Capitol. On October 17, 1866, cornerstone ceremonies were held. The sandstone foundation was erected, but because of both a severe winter and the fact that sandstone is a form of shale, it had crumbled to a mass of mud by 1867. A new foundation was constructed of limestone from Geary County.

When the east wing of the statehouse was completed, it was necessary for both the Senate and House of Representatives to meet in the hall now used as the Senate Chamber. The first legislative session was held in the building in 1870. The Board of Statehouse Commissioners was recreated in 1879 and work was started on the west wing. The Legislature appropriated \$60,000 and provided a one-half mill levy for west wing construction. By 1880, this wing was enclosed and the House of Representatives met in the new, although unfinished hall in 1881. A covered

wood bridge, referred to as "Cave of the Winds," was built from the Senate to the House for messages to be taken from one to the other. The cost of the west wing was about \$300,000 compared to \$500,000 for the east wing. The difference in the cost of the two wings, which were substantially the same size and design, was attributed to the depreciation of the currency after the great rebellion.

The 1881 Legislature authorized the construction of the central portion of the Capitol. The excavations for the foundation which support the dome extend more than 25 feet into the ground to a bearing strata of natural bedrock. Workmen doing the excavation work discovered a spring which still flows in the rock beneath the Capitol.

The Capitol is one of which every Kansan can be proud. While there are a number of capitols in the United States that are more costly and ornamental, there are few that present a grander view. The building is 399 feet north and south, 386 feet east and west, and 304 feet to the top of the dome. The interior consists of a basement and five floors in the central portion of the building and a basement and four floors in the east and west wings.

STATE OFFICE BUILDING

The 12-story building of steel frame construction with basement and sub-basement has exterior walls of red granite on the first floor and Kansas limestone and Virginia greenstone on upper floors. Floors are of cellular steel covered with concrete to provide for underfloor electric and telephone wiring. Ceilings are of aluminum panels backed by sound absorbing pads and office and corridor partitions are of movable steel. The building has numerous windows, but is air-conditioned throughout. There are six passenger elevators and one freight elevator.

Bernard Frazier is the sculptor of the three high relief panels on the east, south and west sides of the building. They depict various phases of the history of this section of the country—the fur trappers and the French influence, the Spanish explorers from Mexico, and the pioneers' westward movement.

The building contains about 540,000 square feet of space, approximately 300,000 of which is rentable office space. Among the special features and facilities in use by the nearly 3,000 employees housed in the building are a cafeteria, mailing room, post office, banktype security vault and a central telephone exchange.

There also are an auditorium with approximately 5,600 square feet having accordion folding partitions to provide for smaller meeting rooms; conference rooms; refreshment areas; and storage space.

Total construction cost of the building was approximately \$8,600,000. The legislature appropriated some funds for the building and parking facilities, but the major portion of the cost was raised by the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$7,500,000. Because of the heavy traffic on Harrison street—the street between the state capitol and the office building—a walking

tunnel connects the two buildings. The 500 foot long tunnel is 7½ feet wide and 8 feet high, is lighted and ventilated, and is built of concrete and lined with glazed tile. The office building is located in the center of a square block of land adjoining the state capitol on the west. Although the office building is tall, it does not overshadow the statehouse across the street. The capitol dome rises 304 feet above the lawn; the office building is 180 feet tall.

KANSAS STATE PRINTING PLANT

The Kansas State printing plant was established by an act of the 1905 legislature following an amendment to the constitution in 1904 providing for the election of the state printer. An appropriation of \$68,000 provided for building and equipping a plant. This was supplemented in 1913 with an additional \$135,000 to enlarge the facility and improve the equipment. The 1919 legislature appropriated further funds for plant expansion. The building now has over 60,000 square feet of floor space. On June 8, 1966, the plant was heavily damaged by a devastating tornado. Restoration financed principally through federal funds from the Office of Emergency Planning was completed within 12 months at a cost of approximately \$131,000 for the building and \$42,000 for equipment and supplies.

Approximately \$3.8 million was appropriated by the 1984 legislature for construction of a new printing plant. Construction of the plant, which will be located at Second and Storey Streets in Topeka, is scheduled to begin this fall. The estimated completion date is December, 1985.

KANSAS STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Organized in 1875, the Kansas State Historical Society is one of the largest state historical societies in America. It includes an unusually fine library of Western and Indian history, with a catalog of more than 300,000 separate card entries relating to Kansas subjects alone. It owns one of the largest newspaper collections in the country, consisting of approximately 82,000 bound volumes and more than 26,000 reels of microfilm. The society is an official depository for U.S. government documents. The total number of books, bound volumes of magazines and pamphlets in the library is approximately 400,000.

The society is the archives department of the state. The official correspondence of most governors and the records of other state departments are placed here for permanent preservation. The original constitution of the state, known as the Wyandotte Constitution, written in longhand in 1859 and signed by members of the convention, is on display in the Memorial Building.

The archives contains correspondence from the files of most Kansas governors since 1854, original census reports since the first enumeration of 1855, territorial election returns, territorial and state court records and thousands of other official documents which are irreplaceable and invaluable. There are more than 12,000 cubic feet of archival materials.

Few states possess so complete a history in the form

of private letters, diaries and memoirs as Kansas. Among the more important collections are the correspondence books of William Clark, of the Lewis and Clark Expedition, superintendent of Indian Affairs at St. Louis in 1812 and later and account books of the Missouri Fur Company which he helped organize.

There are 27 document boxes of the letters of Isaac McCoy, pioneer missionary and surveyor; the journal of Jotham Meeker, Kansas' first printer; a large collection of John Brown letters; correspondence of Edward Everett Hale and the official correspondence of the New England Immigrant Aid Company; letters of John J. Ingalls, John R. Brinkley, Dwight Eisenhower and hundreds more; and many diaries of soldiers, cowboys, homesteaders, missionaries and merchants—the men and women who made Kansas.

The society possesses more than 144,000 pictures, mostly of Kansas subjects, ranging from tintypes less than an inch in size to the more than life-size oil painting of territorial governor Andrew H. Reeder. The society also owns more than 13,000 maps, atlases and charts.

The historical society also administers the following historic sites:

Shawnee Indian Mission in Fairway, a suburb of Kansas City; Kaw Indian Mission at Council Grove; the First Territorial Capitol of Kansas on the Fort Riley Military Reservation; the Funston Memorial Home just north of Iola; Fort Hays Frontier Historical Park at Hays; the Iowa, Sac and Fox Indian Mission in Highland; John Brown Museum in Osawatimie; Marais des Cygnes Massacre Memorial Park in Linn County; Pawnee Rock in Barton County; Hollenberg Pony Express Station near Hanover; Pawnee Indian Village Museum in Republic County; Grinter Place near Muncie; Goodnow Memorial Home in Manhattan; Mine Creek Civil War Battlefield in Linn County; Pottawatomie Baptist Indian Mission in Topeka; Tobias Archeological Site near Lyons; Souders Historical Farm/Museum in Cheney; and the J. Fenton Pratt Ranch in Sheridan County.

In recent years the historical society has offered several outreach programs, including archival assistance to Kansas cities and counties, folklife coordination to any organized and interested group within the state, and lectures, slide talks, and traveling educational trunks from the museum.

The society is the Kansas State Historic Preservation office and as such administers properties placed on the National Register of Historic Places as well as those on the Register of Historic Kansas Places. This office offers counsel to owners of historic properties who wish to maintain them according to accepted preservation standards and also monitors activities for both the federal and state governments to protect cultural resources from destruction by government activated, financed or licensed projects.

The historical society is also engaged in an active publication program and issues "Kansas History, A Journal of the Central Plains" four times a year as well as a bimonthly newsletter and occasional book length publications. Publications are also issued in the form

of microfilm, particularly of newspapers from its large collection.

MEMORIAL BUILDING

The Memorial Building at 120 W. 10th in Topeka was completed in 1914 at a cost of more than \$600,000, the bulk of the money coming from the federal government in settlement of Civil War claims. The building commemorates the services of soldiers and sailors of Kansas and serves as a monument to the pioneers of the state. Its four floors and basement are occupied by the Kansas State Historical Society as a Center for Historical Research.

KANSAS MUSEUM OF HISTORY

The Kansas Museum of History at 6425 W. 6th in Topeka was completed in 1983. The museum is scheduled to open on a limited basis on June 23, 1984, with a special exhibit on "Samples of Our Heritage." Beginning in the spring of 1985 permanent exhibits will be opened on a periodic basis until the entire museum is completed.

The Kansas Museum of History is one of the finest museum structures existing in the United States. Its collections and exhibit areas are environmentally controlled to preserve fragile historic artifacts. It includes three outstanding conservation laboratories, an excellent exhibit design and construction facility, as well as ample room for educational programs.

The "Great White Buffalo," a statue by the late Lumen Martin Winter, was dedicated at the entrance to the museum on October 18, 1983. The statue was obtained through a bequest from the late Clyde N. Degginger of Kansas City, MO.

KANSAS JUDICIAL CENTER

The Kansas Judicial Center, directly south of the Capitol, houses the Attorney General and the state courts. The modern three-story structure, with 162,000 square feet of space, was completed in 1978.

Constructed of native Kansas cottonwood limestone, the building has been called one of the finest examples of contemporary architecture in the state. The \$14 million structure, featuring contemporary columns and entablature, is done in a "modern monumental" style of architecture.

Building of the Judicial Center was authorized by the 1973 Legislature. Former Chief Justice of the Supreme Court Harold Fatzer played an active role in designing of courtroom space and other planning for the building.

HALL OF JUSTICE

The public area in the Judicial Center has been named the "Hall of Justice." The area, a 60-foot cube of space, is three stories high and features oak, Vermont marble and South Dakota granite: enduring materials which are intended to symbolize the permanence of justice. However, the most prominent item in

the hall is a large sculpture titled "Justice." The sculpture is a half-kneeling woman holding aloft a prairie falcon, native to Kansas. A bronze plaque in front of the sculpture notes that the prairie falcon is the "swiftest creature on earth" and has vision power eight times that of the human eye. The sculpture was designed by the late Bernard E. "Poco" Frazier, sculptor-in-residence at the University of Kansas. Frazier selected marble for the project in Carrara, Italy, but he died soon after the rough carving was begun. His son, Malcolm Frazier, was selected to complete the work. The sculpture was financed by a gift from Mr. A. B. Hudson of Maple Hill.

A message on the north wall of the Hall of Justice reads, "Within these walls the balance of justice weighs equal." Those words were written by Beckie Godsey of Dodge City, and her phrase was selected from messages submitted in a statewide competition for high school students.

CEDAR CREST

Cedar Crest, the state-owned governor's residence, is in northwest Topeka on a hill overlooking the Kansas River. The residence has a beautiful natural setting, including 244 acres of timbered, sloping land.

Frank P. MacLennan, founder and former publisher of the Topeka State Journal, built Cedar Crest in 1928 for \$60,000. He died a short time later, but his wife, Madge, lived there until her death in 1955. At that time, her will bequeathed the mansion to the State of Kansas for use as the governor's residence. The Legislature accepted the property, and in 1961 appropriated funds for remodeling. Following renovation, the residence was occupied by the governor. The home replaced the previous governor's residence near downtown Topeka.

Cedar Crest is of light beige stucco with stone, and is of the French Norman design. The 12-room residence has three stories and a basement. It was designed by the late W. D. Wight of the architectural firm Wight and Wight of Kansas City, Mo.

A thistle and the name Cedar Crest are carved above the great door. The thistle is one of many Scottish motifs in wood, stone and plaster throughout the house. These are symbolic reminders of the builder's Scottish heritage.

The floors in the living room and entry hall are random width, walnut-pegged oak planks spaced with strips of walnut. In the dining room and sun room there are oak parquet floors laid in nine-inch squares. Area rugs for the various rooms were planned to enhance the furnishings. The color scheme is peach, light navy and ivory with rust accents.

An Indian oriental rug featuring colors of peach, light navy and ivory with wheat-colored accents was selected for an area of the living room. Two large ivory sofas flank the fireplace. The bay window on the north side of the living room provides a made-to-order framework for the antique Duncan Phyfe sofa done in mid-blue with peach doubleweave fabric. The blue

strongly emphasizes the blue in the antique Tiffany lamp.

Matching loveseats covered in impressionistic tapestry and a Duncan Phyfe quartet pedestal table with four miniature Queen Anne wing-back chairs in light rust cut velvet complete the living room. Tables compatible with the decor have been used.

The area rug in the dining room has a field of peach with a thin border of rust, a wider border of ivory and a finishing border of peach. The 12 chairs are covered in ivory silk damask with backs of beautiful needlepoint featuring Kansas wildflowers. These fine examples of needlepoint art were done by 12 Kansans who signed their work with their name and hometown.

The sun room has an oriental rug and a small Victorian grouping done in peach velvet, as well as a Steinway baby grand piano. The walls are peach, and the water lily print draperies are backed by sheer panels of off-white.

The library is carpeted in light navy. In addition to the massive antique desk, two large, old wing-back chairs covered in a dramatic flame stitch are used. The antique loveseat is covered in a tweed texture fabric of complementary tones. Roman shades are rust with a minute navy pattern.

The small powder room on the first floor is done entirely in blue and white. The lighting above the vanity is recessed, the fixtures are white, the floor is covered in blue and the walls are upholstered in blue on white Meissen print fabric. The wall treatment gives importance to the small room and is very effective.

The main stairway and second-floor hall are carpeted in peach with an inset border of light navy. Portraits of all the first ladies of Kansas hang on the east wall of the stair landing and are identified by their given, maiden and married names. The 200-year-old French tapestry on the west wall faces the portrait grouping.

The second and third floors of the executive residence are left to the discretion of the first lady. The master bedroom at the west end of the second floor is a large room and accommodates bedroom furniture as well as two sitting areas. Three other bedrooms are on the second floor.

The third floor houses the residence office and the guest room. Some personal furniture is used on the second floor, but the majority of the furnishings for all three floors at Cedar Crest belong to the house, much of it having been moved from the old governor's mansion.

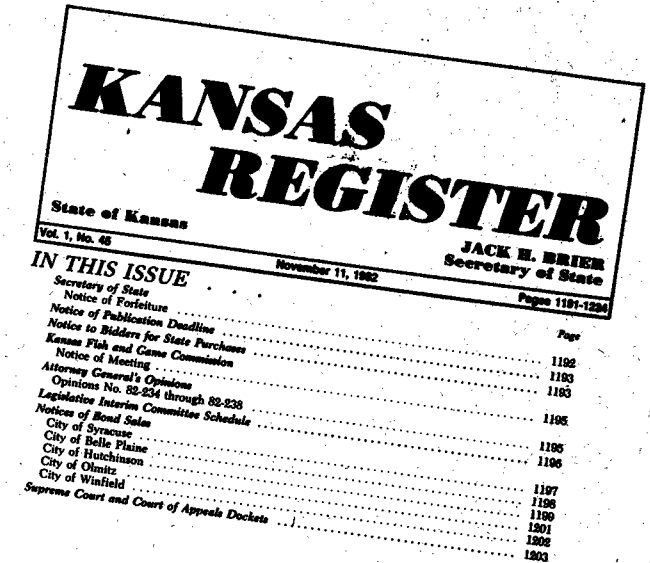
The Friends of Cedar Crest Association, a not-for-profit publicly-supported organization, has a walnut secretary-bookcase which was built in St. Louis for Thomas Carney, a Leavenworth businessman and the second governor of Kansas. It was built in 1860 and shipped to Leavenworth by steamboat. The association also purchased a glass-fronted cabinet that was the property of Ben Paulen, Fredonia, the 23rd governor of Kansas. It is in the dining room at Cedar Crest and holds much of the silver from the Battleship Kansas.

The entire third floor was once a ballroom, but it has been converted in recent years to a bedroom and an office for handling the official duties of the first lady and for managing the residence.

The basement features a recreation room with an antique pool table, a green leather sofa that had been in Senator Capper's office and a green leather wing chair which was a gift from Virginia Docking Rice. Murals representing Kansas were painted on the walls of the room some years ago by an inmate of the Kansas State Penitentiary.

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
