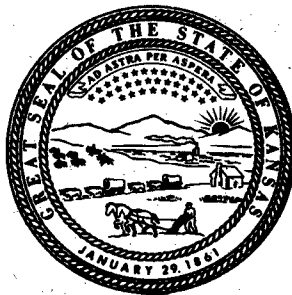

OPINION NO. 84-117

Bonds and Warrants—Cash-Basis Law—Lease or Installment-Purchase Agreements. Robert L. Earnest, Russell City Attorney, Russell, November 27, 1984.

Under the provisions of K.S.A. 10-1116b, a municipality may enter into an installment-purchase agreement which provides for payments extending beyond its current budget year, provided that the agreement specifically states that the municipality is obligated only to pay periodic payments or monthly installments as have been provided for in the budget of the municipality for the current budget year, or which can be paid from funds derived from a lawfully operated revenue producing source. Since the obligation of the municipality under such an agreement is limited by the specific statement required by K.S.A. 10-1116b, the agreement does not violate either the budget law or the cash-basis law. Monroe, St. John, KS, at which time all interested persons will have an opportunity to be heard regarding the adoption of a temporary and a permanent amended rule and regulation promulgated under authority of the Water Appropriation Act, K.S.A. 82a-701 *et seq.*, and the Groundwater Management District Act, K.S.A. 1983 Supp. 82a-1028(o), as a temporary and permanent rule and regulation of the Division of Water Resources, Kansas State Board of Agriculture. Public Law 94-566, section 505(d) enacted in 1976 and Public Law 97-35 enacted in 1981, established section 1616(e) of the Social Security Act, commonly known as the "Keys Amendment."

The Keys Amendment, as implemented by the federal regulations 45 CFR Part 1397, requires each state to make available for public review a summary of the standards used in regulating residential facilities in which recipients of Supplemental Security Income (SSI) reside or are likely to reside.

Standards for some types of facilities are set by the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services (SRS) while the Department of Health and Environment (H&E) sets standards for others. The summary of all standards or further information about the full standards set by SRS may be obtained by writing to: Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services, Anita Favors, Commissioner of Adult Services, Biddle Building, First Floor, 2700 W. 6th, Topeka, KS 66606.

Compliance with the standards assures that facilities provide a safe and healthy environment for SSI recipients and other disadvantaged persons in need of continuous protective oversight. **NOTICE OF REVIEW OF KANSAS
WATER QUALITY STANDARDS.**

The Water Quality Assessment Section of the Bureau of Water Protection, Kansas Department of Health and Environment, pursuant to Section 303 of the Clean Water Act and 40 CFR, Section 131.20 is in the process of reviewing and revising the current Kansas Surface Water Quality Standards (K.A.R. 28-16-28). Water quality standards include: 1) the designation of particular uses of water bodies in Kansas, and 2) the adoption of criteria on water quality parameters that protect these uses. KDHE has solicited the assistance of members of interested government and private groups for the review and revision of these standards. KDHE will meet with task force members in November and December to assemble proposed water quality standards.

These proposed standards and information pertaining to them will be presented at six public meetings held in February and early March, 1985, in Hays, Dodge City, Salina, Wichita, Chanute and Lawrence. At the final task force meeting in April, 1985, KDHE will discuss with the members comments and issues raised during the public meetings, and the final proposed water quality standards will be produced. A public hearing will be held in October, 1985 to present the final proposed standards. These will then be adopted through the formal State of Kansas regulation adoption procedure and become effective in 1986.

Information on the current water quality standards, the review process, and pertinent issues may be obtained from the KDHE six district offices and the central Topeka office listed below. **Article 10.—TAX SHELTERED ANNUITY
PROGRAM**

88-10-1. Purchase of annuities; conditions. A program for the purchase of voluntary tax-sheltered annuities is hereby established for the members of the faculty and other eligible employees, as defined in K.S.A. 74-4925(1)(a), and any amendments thereto. The maximum amount to be contributed on behalf of each participating employee, including the contributions for employer-purchased annuities for the retirement plan described in K.S.A. 74-4925(1)(b) and K.S.A. 74-4925(1)(c), and any amendments thereto, shall be limited by the provisions of the internal revenue code of 1954 as amended. Such voluntary tax-sheltered annuities shall be purchased by the board of regents for those eligible employees who voluntarily reduce their salaries to provide the funds with which to purchase such annuities. The board of regents shall designate one or more basic retirement plan providers. The contributions dedicated to the plan as provided for in K.S.A. 74-4925(1)(b) and K.S.A. 74-4925(1)(c), and any amendments thereto, shall continue to be maintained for all present employees and all eligible new employees.
