GRAIN INSPECTION DEPARTMENT**NOTICE OF HEARING
ON PROPOSED TEMPORARY
AND PERMANENT****ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS**

The Kansas State Grain Inspection Department will conduct a public hearing regarding the adoption of the following temporary and permanent administrative regulation due to an oversight in Senate Bills 300 and 380, as amended, which failed to include the Wichita Bank for Cooperatives in defining those institutions eligible to issue standby Letters of Credit.

The term "financial institution" as defined in Section 1 of 1985 SB 300, as amended by SB 380, shall be interpreted to include "banks for cooperatives" created under Title III of the Farm Credit Act of 1971. Such banks for cooperatives are specifically established under federal law to act as federal instrumentalities that are authorized to provide services to eligible cooperative warehousemen, including issuance of standby Letters of Credit. (Session Laws of 1985, Chapter 137 & Chapter 138, effective, _____).

The hearing will be held at 2 p.m., Thursday, July 11, 1985, in the conference room of the Grain Inspection Department, 235 S. Topeka, Topeka, KS.

Opinion No. 85-64

Townships and Township Officers—Hospitals and Health Care Facilities—Levy for Hospitals. Larry D. Tittel, Attorney for Ness County Hospital District No. 2, Ness City, June 14, 1985.

K.S.A. 80-2516 provides that a hospital board governed by its terms may determine and fix an annual tax to be levied for the purpose of operating, equipping, maintaining and improving the hospital. In accord with the law applicable to all taxing subdivisions, the hospital board certifies the levy to the appropriate county clerk who collects the tax in the district and pays the money so collected over to the treasurer of the hospital district. Militia, Defense and Public Safety—Emergency Preparedness for Disasters—Authority to Accept Ser-

vices, Gifts, Grants and Loans. Colonel Mahlon G. Weed, Deputy Director, Division of Emergency Preparedness, Adjutant General's Office, Topeka, June 14, 1985.

Pursuant to regulations of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), cities and counties participating in the Emergency Management Assistance program must be "serviced" by a merit system in employing emergency management personnel. However, such cities and counties need not follow the State of Kansas civil service salary plan in compensating emergency management personnel. Cited herein: K.S.A. 48-916(a); 5 C.F.R. § 900.603, 44 C.F.R. § 302.3. TRH

Opinion No. 85-66

Automobiles and Other Vehicles—Act Regulating Traffic; Arrests, Citations, Penalties—Failure to Comply With Citation; Suspension of License. Charles H. Apt, City Attorney, Iola, June 17, 1985.

Prior to enactment of 1985 House Bill No. 2451, a driver's failure to appear before a municipal court could not, in the absence of a bench warrant under K.S.A. 12-4301, result in suspension of his or her license by the Division of Vehicles of the Department of Revenue. However, provisions of the bill amend K.S.A. 1984 Supp. 8-2110 to now provide for such suspension after a failure to appear before either a district or a municipal court. Attorney General Opinion No. 84-43, which was issued prior to the amendment of K.S.A. 1984 Supp. 8-2110, is hereby withdrawn. Cities and Municipalities—Municipal Courts; Prosecution and Arrest—Complaint; Issuance and Service. Charles D. Clinker, Chief of Police, Goodland, June 19, 1985.

A complaint which alleges a violation of a city traffic ordinance is not effective until filed with the municipal court, and may be served upon the accused person either before or after being filed. (K.S.A. 12-4201, 12-4203.) If the complaint is filed initially with the court, a notice to appear shall be issued by the city attorney and may be served pursuant to K.S.A. 12-4207 by either personal service on the accused person, by leaving it at the person's residence, or by mailing it to the person's last known address. Consider the merits of creating an indemnity fund to protect grain depositors in instances of grain warehouse insolvency and the need for use of qualified accountants to examine public grain warehouse records.

Proposal No. 2—Grain Dealer Licensure and Regulation
