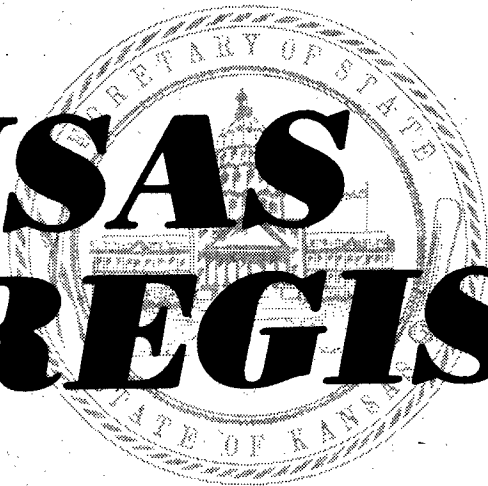

## Opinion No. 85-71

**Public Health—Hospitals and Other Facilities; Licensing, Inspection and Regulation—Moratorium on Construction of General or Special Hospital Licensed by Department of Health and Environment.**

**State Departments; Public Officers and Employees—Social and Rehabilitation Services—Licensing of Psychiatric Hospital. Senator August Bogina, Jr., Tenth District, Lenexa, June 27, 1985.**

The provisions of 1985 House Bill No. 2627, which impose a one-year moratorium on the construction of any general or special hospital in Kansas, apply to institutions which are licensed by the Department of Health and Environment under K.S.A. 65-425 *et seq.* In that psychiatric hospitals are licensed by the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services pursuant to K.S.A. 75-3307b, the moratorium imposed by the bill does not apply to such hospitals. ## Opinion No. 85-72

**State Departments; Public Officers, Employees—Kansas Tort Claims Act—Costs for Defense of Municipalities or Its Employees; Special Liability Expense Fund, Establishment and Maintenance. Ronald S. Reuter, Roeland Park City Attorney, Overland Park, July 1, 1985.**

A city may use moneys credited to a special liability expense fund to purchase tort liability insurance, but may not use such moneys to construct a "holding pond" on city property. While a city may reduce or eliminate the tax levy authorized by subsection (c) of K.S.A. 75-6110, it may not transfer tax moneys in the special liability expense fund to the general fund of the city. ## Opinion No. 85-73

**Insurance—Health Care Provider Insurance—Professional Liability Insurance; Self-Insurance of Residents by University of Kansas Medical Center. Fletcher Bell, Commissioner of Insurance, Topeka, July 1, 1985.**

1985 Senate Bill No. 362 permits the University of Kansas Medical Center to be a self-insurer under the Health Care Provider Insurance Availability Act, K.S.A. 1984 Supp. 40-3401 *et seq.*, for persons who are residents at the Medical Center. Coverage provided by the Medical Center for its residents is professional liability insurance of the same type as is offered by a private insurer, and accordingly extends to activities of the residents whenever they act as health care providers, either at the Medical Center itself or elsewhere. ## Opinion No. 85-74

**Public Health—Uniform Vital Statistics Act—Disclosure of Records; Effect of Kansas Parentage Act on Issuance of Birth Certificates. Charles V. Hamm, General Counsel, Department of Health and Environment, Topeka, July 1, 1985.**

The Kansas Parentage Act, contained in 1985 House Bill No. 2012, amends K.S.A. 65-2422 to require that no information regarding the birth of a child shall be released in a manner which allows determination of the marital status of the parents. This amended statute may be read so as to be consistent with K.S.A. 65-2423, which allows adopted persons to obtain an original of their birth certificate upon demand once they obtain the age of 18. In any other circumstances, however, the intent of the legislature is to prevent access to such information, with this prohibition including those birth certificates filed in the past which contain questions regarding the legitimacy of the birth. Such certificates may be released only after the prohibited information is removed or obscured in such a way as to be unintelligible. ## Opinion No. 85-75

**Labor and Industries—Minimum Wage and Maximum Hours—Fair Labor Standards Act; Applicability to Sheriff's Department. Keith Hoffman, Dickinson County Attorney, Abilene, July 3, 1985.**

As a result of the decision in *Garcia v. San Antonio Metropolitan Transit Authority*, the Dickinson County sheriff's department is subject to the federal Fair Labor Standards Act. Department employees who meet the qualifications of 29 C.F.R. § 553.4 are entitled to the exemption from overtime in 29 U.S.C.A. § 207(k) if the employer so elects. As the department has more than four employees who are law enforcement officers, it is therefore not eligible for the exemption in 29 U.S.C.A. § 213(b)(20). Law enforcement employees who are subject to § 7(k) may work a maximum of 171 hours in a 28 day pay period. Following April 15, 1985, overtime is required to be paid to such employees to the Act for any hours over this amount. Study the Kansas civil service system with particular emphasis on vacation and sick leave payments to retiring employees, procedures for reclassification of employees, duration of the probationary period for new employees, performance evaluation procedures, process for declassifying positions; number of eligibles which comprise an eligible roster, employee layoff procedures, and monitoring the implementation of the FY 1986 pay plan.

A public hearing will be at 10 a.m., Friday, July 26, 1985, at the Alcoholic Beverage Control office, 2nd Floor, Jayhawk Tower, 700 Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing rules and regulations and proposed new rules and regulations of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Division.

All interested parties may submit written comments at any time prior to the hearing by addressing them to John A. Lamb, Director, Alcoholic Beverage Control Division, Kansas Department of Revenue, Topeka, KS 66625. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views, orally, in regard to the adoption of the proposed regulations.

Following the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered by the Director of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Division and the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board of Review as a basis for making changes to these proposed regulations.

Copies of the proposed regulations and fiscal impact statement may be obtained by contacting the Alcoholic Beverage Control Division, Kansas Department of Revenue, Topeka, KS 66625, (913) 296-2946.

A summary of the regulations follows:

**K.A.R. 14-6-2b. Capacities of containers.** The proposed change allows the Director of ABC to approve or disapprove requests for new container sizes in Kansas after a 30 day public comment period.

**K.A.R. 14-18-31. "Meal" defined.** Proposed new regulation defines what constitutes a "meal."

**K.A.R. 14-18-32. Clubs must charge the same price for the same drink all day; day defined.** Proposed new regulation defines a business day.

**K.A.R. 14-20-7. Temporary memberships; granting, records and billing.** Proposed change amends the regulation to provide that each class B club that enters into a contract with a hotel has proper guest verification from the hotel before "temporary membership" is issued.

The city of Kingman, Kansas will receive sealed bids at the office of the City Clerk, City Hall, 324 N. Main, Kingman, KS 67068, until 7:30 p.m., C.D.T., July 25, 1985, for \$308,429.65 par value general obligation bonds of the city, at which time and place such bids will be publicly opened. No oral or auction bids will be considered.

The Series 1985 Bonds will be dated as of August 1, 1985, and shall mature on September 1 in each of the years and in the amounts set forth below. Such bonds shall consist of fully registered certificated bonds, each in the denomination of \$5,000.00 or integral multiples thereof not exceeding the principal amount of bonds maturing in each year, except one bond in the denomination of \$3,429.65. Interest will be payable semiannually, commencing March 1, 1986, and each March 1 and September 1 thereafter. #### Interest Rate

Proposals will be received on not less than all the bonds bearing such rate or rates of interest as may be specified by the bidder. The same rate shall apply to

all bonds of the same maturity. Each interest rate specified shall be in an even multiple of one-eighth ( $\frac{1}{8}$ th) or one-twentieth ( $\frac{1}{20}$ th) of one percent (1%). The difference between the highest and lowest coupon rates specified in any bid shall not exceed three percent (3%). No interest rate shall exceed the maximum interest rate allowed by Kansas law, said rate being the 20 bond index of tax exempt municipal bonds published by the *Weekly Bond Buyer* in New York, New York on the Monday next preceding the day on which the bonds are sold (July 22, 1985), plus 2%, and no bid of less than par and accrued interest will be considered. Bids for less than the entire issue of bonds will not be considered.

#### Bid Form and Good Faith Deposit

Bids shall be submitted on the official bid form furnished by the county, and shall be addressed to the Board of County Commissioners, Sedgwick County Courthouse, Wichita, KS 67203, and shall be plainly marked BOND BID. All bids must state the total interest cost of the bid, the premium, if any, the net interest cost of the bid, and the average annual interest rate, all certified by the bidder to be correct, and the county will be entitled to rely on the certificate of correctness of the bidder. Each bid must be accompanied by a certified or cashier's check equal to two percent (2%) of the total par amount of the bonds, and shall be payable to Treasurer, Sedgwick County, Kansas. In the event a bidder whose bid is accepted shall fail to carry out his Contract of Purchase, said deposit shall be retained by the county as liquidated damages. The checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned promptly.

#### Award of Bonds

The sealed bids for the bonds shall be opened publicly and only at the time and place specified in this notice, and the bonds will be sold to the best bidder. The county reserves the right to reject any and/or all of the bids, and to waive any irregularities. Unless all bids are rejected, the bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose proposal results in the lowest net interest cost to the county, and the net interest cost will be determined by deducting the amount of any premium paid from the aggregate amount of interest upon all of the bonds from their date until their respective maturities.

#### Delivery of the Bonds

The bonds, duly printed, executed and registered, will be furnished and paid for by the county. The Series C, 1985, Series D, 1985, and Series E, 1985 Bonds will be sold subject to the unqualified approving opinion of WILLIAM P. TIMMERMAN, Attorney and Bond Counsel, 400 North Woodlawn, Wichita, Kansas 67208. The Series F, 1985 Bonds will be sold subject to the unqualified approving opinion of Gaar & Bell, Bond Counsel, 800 One Main Place, Wichita, KS 67202. The number, denomination of bonds, and names of the initial registered owners to be initially printed on the bonds shall be submitted in writing by the successful bidder to the bond registrar not later than August 14, 1985. The purchaser will be furnished with a complete Transcript of Proceedings evidencing



the authorization and issuance of the bonds, and the usual closing proofs, which will include a certificate that there is no litigation pending or threatened at the time of delivery of the bonds affecting their validity. Payment for the bonds shall be made in immediately available funds. Delivery of the bonds will be made to the successful bidder on or before August 28, 1985, at any bank in the state of Kansas or Kansas City, Missouri, New York City, San Francisco, Los Angeles, or Chicago at the expense of the county. Delivery elsewhere will be made at the expense of the purchaser.

*Legal Opinion*

Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified approving opinion of William P. Timmerman, Bond Counsel, Wichita, Kansas, on the Series C, D & E, 1985 Bonds and Gaar & Bell, Bond Counsel, Wichita, Kansas on the Series F, 1985 Bonds, a copy of which opinions will be printed on the reverse side of each bond and manually signed originals will be furnished without expense to the purchaser of the bonds at the delivery thereof. The cost of the legal opinions and the expense of printing the bonds and legal opinions will be paid by the county. Said legal opinions, with respect to the Series C, D & F, 1985 Bonds, will state in part substantially that the bonds will constitute general obligations of the county, payable as to both principal and interest from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limitation as to rate or amount upon all taxable tangible property within the territorial limits of the county, and with respect to the Series E, 1985 Bonds, will constitute general obligations of the county, payable as to both principal and interest from the collection of special assessments which have been levied on benefited property, but if not so paid, then said principal and interest will be payable from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limitation as to rate or amount upon all of the taxable tangible property within the territorial limits of the county; and that, under existing law, the interest on said bonds is exempt from present federal income taxation and the bonds are exempt from intangible personal property taxes levied by Kansas cities, counties and townships.

*Purpose of Issue*

The Series C, 1985 Bonds are being issued for the purpose of paying the cost of road and bridge improvements under the authority of K.S.A. 1984 Supp. 68-5,103 and 68-1106 and K.S.A. 68-1103. The Series D, 1985 Bonds are being issued for the purpose of acquiring a site and designing a public building under the authority of K.S.A. 19-3601a and 3601b. The Series E, 1985 Bonds are being issued for the purpose of paying the cost of street and drainage improvements in a certain benefit district under the authority of K.S.A. 68-728 and 729, and any amendments thereto. The Series F, 1985 Bonds are being issued for the purpose of paying a portion of the cost of a public building under the authority of K.S.A. 1984 Supp. 19-15,116.

*CUSIP Identification Numbers*

CUSIP identification numbers will be printed on

said bonds. All expenses in relation to printing of CUSIP numbers on said bonds and the expenses of CUSIP Service Bureau for the assignment of said numbers shall be the responsibility of and shall be paid for by the county.

*Bonded Indebtedness*

The total bonded indebtedness of the county of Sedgwick, state of Kansas, as of the date of sale, including this \$3,146,500 proposed issue of bonds, is in the amount of \$35,791,075. In addition, the county has \$2,718,900 of Temporary Notes outstanding, of which \$134,200 will be retired from the proceeds of the bonds, special assessments which have been collected in cash, and other available funds.

*Ratings*

The county has applied for ratings on the bonds to Moody's Investors Service, Inc. and Standard and Poor's Corporation, who have rated previous general obligation issues of the County at "Aa" and "AA" respectfully. The "AA" rating of Standard and Poor's Corporation is defined as follows: "Debt rated AA has a very strong capacity to pay interest and repay principal and differs from the higher rated issues only in small degree." This rating may be changed, suspended, or withdrawn as a result of changes in or unavailability of information.
