Opinion No. 85-92

Insurance—Health Care Provider Insurance—Maintenance of Insurance as Condition to Rendering Services in State.

Public Health—Healing Arts—Persons Deemed Engaged in the Practice of Healing Arts. Donald G. Strole, General Counsel, Board of Healing Arts, Topeka, August 1, 1985.

A health care provider who ceases to render professional services in Kansas and who receives an inactive license from the Board of Healing Arts is not required to maintain liability insurance under K.S.A. 1984 Supp. 40-3402, as amended by L. 1985, Ch. 166, § 2, or pay the annual surcharge under K.S.A. 1984 Supp. 40-3404, as amended by L. 1985, Ch. 166, § 3. A health care provider renders professional services in Kansas within the meaning of K.S.A. 1984 Supp. 40-3402(a), as amended, by performing in Kansas any services which are not incidental and irregular in his or her capacity as a physician. Cited herein: K.S.A. 1984 Supp. 40-3401; 40-3402, as amended by L. 1985, Ch. 166, § 2; 40-3404, as amended by L. 1985, Ch. 166, § 3; K.S.A. 65-2802; 65-2868; 65-2877. KG

Counties and County Officers—Licenses—Transient Merchant Licensing Act; Exemptions. Representative Elaine R. Hassler, Sixty-Eighth District, Abilene, August 1, 1985.

"Flea markets" are exempt from the licensure requirements imposed by the Transient Merchant Licensing Act [L. 1985, ch. 94, § 3(j)]. An antique show sponsored by a non-profit organization where out-of-state dealers sell antiques is a type of "flea market," and such dealers need not be licensed as transient merchants in order to transact business, nor does the organization itself need to be licensed. Opinion No. 85-94

Intoxicating Liquors and Beverages—Licensing and Regulation of Clubs—Licensing of Premises. John A. Lamb, Director, Alcoholic Beverage Control Division, Department of Revenue, Topeka, August 2, 1985.

Attorney General Opinion No. 85-37 concluded that the Private Club Act, K.S.A. 41-2601 *et seq.*, does not prevent a private club from including one or more rooms in a facility which also has areas open to the general public. The scope of Opinion 85-37 does not encompass licensing, as a single club, an area on one floor of a building and another area on a different floor. - Public hearing concerning proposed temporary administrative regulations. The proposed regulations are set forth below. The secretary intends to adopt the proposed regulations to become effective on a temporary basis when approved by the State Rules and Regulations Board.

A. Youth Services.

1. The secretary is promulgating a new regulation concerning adoption—genetic and medical history of parents. The text of the proposed regulation is set forth below:

30-45-1. Adoption—genetic and medical history of parents. (a) Each person, other than a stepparent, filing a petition to adopt a minor shall file with the petition the following information regarding the genetic and medical history of the child's biological parents on forms prescribed by the secretary:

- (1) A physical description;
- (2) dental history;
- (3) sensory disorders;
- (4) psychological/emotional disorders;
- (5) mental retardation/learning disabilities;
- (6) metabolic/endocrine disorders;
- (7) allergies;
- (8) contagious/infectious diseases;
- (9) digestive disorders;
- (10) respiratory disorders;
- (11) cardiovascular disease;
- (12) hematopoietic disease;
- (13) kidney disease;
- (14) neuromuscular disease;
- (15) substance abuse; or
- (16) cancer.

(b) The date of birth and sex of any of the child's siblings shall be provided, if known.

(c) Additional information as to the age and cause of death of the parents, grandparents, siblings, aunts and uncles of the adoptee shall be furnished, if available.

2. The secretary is promulgating a new regulation concerning adoption—medical history of child. The text of the proposed regulation is set forth below:

30-45-2. Adoption—medical history of child. The medical history of the child filed with the adoption petition shall include the following information on forms prescribed by the secretary: (a) Facts about the child's birth, including but not limited to:

- (1) The date, time, place of the birth and the name of the attending physician;
- (2) whether the child was full-term or premature;
- (3) the child's weight and length at birth;
- (4) type of delivery; and
- (5) whether there were any complications during pregnancy or at birth;
- (b) a history of immunizations and tests;
- (c) a history of any childhood diseases;
- (d) a history of any significant illnesses or hospitalizations since birth;
- (e) a history of any chronic health problems, diseases or disabilities affecting the child; and
- (f) a record of the child's developmental milestones.

3. The secretary is promulgating a new regulation concerning adoption—social history. The text of the proposed regulation is set forth below:

30-45-3. Adoption—social history. The following information shall be filed with the petition as the social history of the biological parents on forms prescribed by the secretary: (a) Each parent's employment history;

- (b) each parent's religious background;
- (c) each parent's educational background;
- (d) each parent's ethnic background;

(continued)

- (e) a description of each parent's personality; and
 (f) a history of each parent's significant life events.

4. The secretary is promulgating a new regulation concerning adoption—procedures for updating histories. The text of the proposed regulation is set forth below:

30-45-4. Adoption—procedures for updating histories. (a) If genetic or medical information becomes known to the biological parent or parents subsequent to the adoption, such information shall be forwarded to the department of social and rehabilitation services, youth services, 2700 West 6th, Smith-Wilson building, Topeka, Kansas, 66606, to be permanently filed with the child's case record.

(b) The party filing the adoption petition shall provide written notification to the biological parent or parents of their responsibility to notify social and rehabilitation services of any new genetic or medical information which might affect the child.

(c) The party filing the adoption petition shall advise the adoptive family in writing that genetic and medical information is permanently filed with social and rehabilitation services, youth services, 2700 West 6th, Smith-Wilson building, Topeka, Kansas, 66606.

A copy of the proposed regulations and fiscal impact statement may be obtained prior to September 3 by contacting Mary Slaybaugh, Legal Division, State Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services, 6th Floor, State Office Building, Topeka, KS 66612, (913) 296-3969. Written comments may be submitted prior to such date. KANSAS LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES

Located in the heart of the nation, Kansas is a 208 by 411 mile rectangle. It rises from less than 700 feet above sea level in its southeastern corner to more than 4,100 feet at its western border and has a total of 82,264 square miles. Kansas ranks 14th among the states in geographic size. Because of its distance from east to west Kansas has a great variation of climate, terrain, soil, native plants and animals, although most of the state lies within a region generally called the Great Plains.

The original Kansas Territory included portions of what is now Colorado west to the Continental Divide. Pike's Peak was in Kansas at that time.

The geographic center of the contiguous 48 states of the United States is located near Lebanon, in Smith County in north central Kansas. Of more scientific interest is the North American geodetic datum, established in Osborne County, forty miles south and east of the historic geographical center. This geodetic datum is the controlling point for all land surveys in the United States, Canada and Mexico.

Kansas has a varied climate with an average annual temperature of 55 degrees. Normal annual precipitation ranges from slightly more than 40 inches in the southeastern counties to less than 20 inches in the western counties. From 70 to 77 percent of the annual precipitation falls between April 1 and September 30. The overall average annual rainfall for the state is about 27 inches a year.

Although Kansas is often considered a dry state, it has five river systems, and over 50,000 streams which are large enough to be named. The Missouri, the Kaw and the Arkansas Rivers are considered navigable, although the Missouri is the only river in Kansas on which there is a considerable amount of river traffic. A number of springs in the state were important sources of water for early travelers through Kansas. There are many lakes in the state, most of which are man-made. Osage County is the only county in the U.S. which has two federal reservoirs.

Kansans enjoy as many as 300 clear or partly clear days over the western half of the state and around 275 such days in the eastern half.

Kansas is a windy state. Dodge City in western Kansas is the windiest city in the United States with an average wind speed of 14 m.p.h.

The Flint Hills extend north and south across the east central part of the state, covering an area about 50 miles wide. Bluestem grass growing in the Flint Hills makes it a unique grazing land, and the area also contains oil and gas.

The soils of Kansas are among the best in the world. These soils have come from decomposition of underlying rock formations or have been transported into the region by water, wind or ice.

Kansas ranks among the top 10 mineral-producing states in the nation. There is an abundance of petroleum and natural gas—Kansas ranks seventh in the nation in petroleum production. Leading mineral resources in Kansas, by total dollar value of production: petroleum, natural gas, propane, helium, cement, salt,

coal, building stone, sand and gravel, and clay and shale products.

Limestone is an important resource in Kansas and has been used extensively for buildings and early day fenceposts. Limestone is also the basis for a large cement manufacturing industry.

One of the most extensive beds of pre-historic ocean fossils is located in Kansas in the chalk beds of Logan and Gove counties.

The Grassland of the Great Plains was a natural habitat for the buffalo, or American Bison, whose numbers in early historic times have been estimated at 60 to 75 million. By 1830, after gunpowder had begun to take its toll, an estimated 40 million buffaloes remained. Early explorers reported sighting herds containing as many as three or four million buffaloes.

The buffalo was the supermarket for the Indians of the Great Plains. Food, shelter, clothing, fuel, and some war materials could be fashioned from a buffalo carcass. The Plains Indian followed the buffalo for his livelihood. Market hunters in later years slaughtered buffaloes for their hides, often leaving the carcasses to rot. However, many explorers, fur trappers and others enjoyed buffalo meat.

Today, Kansas hunters enjoy the opportunity to harvest a wide variety of game within the state. Because there is almost no wasteland, there are few areas outside those held by federal or state agencies as wildlife management areas in which wildlife receive prime consideration. Kansas boasts the largest flock of prairie chickens on the North American Continent, and ranks among the top five states in quail, pheasant, prairie chicken and dove hunting. Also extensively sought by hunters are turkey, duck, geese, coyote, deer, rabbit, squirrel, and other fur-bearing animals.

Fur trapping is carried on for beaver, bobcat, raccoon, opossum, skunk, muskrat, mink, badger, fox and coyote.

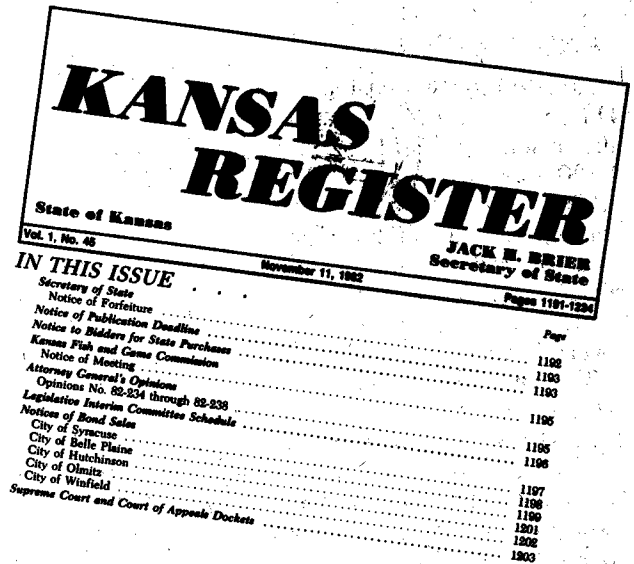
There are now more than 304,000 acres of public hunting and wildlife management lands in Kansas. These units are scattered throughout the state within short driving distances for most sportsmen and outdoor enthusiasts.

Good fishing abounds in Kansas, with a great variety of species found in the state's lakes and reservoirs. Largemouth Bass, Crappie, Channel Catfish, White Bass, Bluegill, Flathead Catfish, Kentucky or Spotted Bass, Striped Bass, Walleye and Wipers are all available from Kansas lakes and streams. Kansas' 24 beautiful federal reservoirs, together with many well-established state, county and city lakes, provide ample opportunity for angling enjoyment.

Kansas has 22 state parks located throughout the state with campsites which can be enjoyed overnight or for a longer period of time. Many of the more than 100 privately owned and operated campsites are located near lakes or streams and provide facilities for fishing, swimming, boating, skiing, picnicking, hiking, and all types of outdoor recreation. Many have restaurants, grocery stores and boat rental.

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
