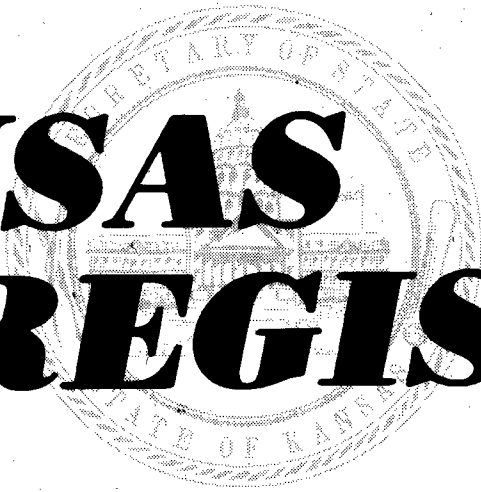

KANSAS PUBLIC DISCLOSURE COMMISSION

Opinion No. 85-15

Written September 18, 1985 to Robert D. Myers, City Attorney, 120 W. 6th, Suite 192, Newton, KS 67114.

This opinion is in response to your letter of August 29, 1985, in which you request the opinion of the Kansas Public Disclosure Commission concerning the local conflict interests law, K.S.A. 75-4301 *et seq.*

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as city attorney for the city of Newton, Kansas, on behalf of a city commissioner.

You advise us that the city commissioner is considering becoming a bail bondsman through the city's municipal court.

You ask whether a city commissioner may conduct business as a bail bondsman with the city's municipal court.

It is our opinion under K.S.A. 75-4304, so long as the city commissioner abstains in his official capacity as a member of the city commission in any contracts for bond between the city and his private business as a bail bondsman, that the situation you have described is permissible. When the commissioner establishes his business, he should also file a statement of substantial interest disclosing the new business.

Opinion No. 85-16

Written September 18, 1985 to Albert C. Liebert, 315 W. 8th, Coffeyville, KS 67337.

This opinion is in response to your letter of June 13, 1985, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Public Disclosure Commission concerning the local conflict of interest law, K.S.A. 75-4301 *et seq.*

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as a member of the Coffeyville City Commission. You also advise us that you are the owner of a local electrical service and supply company. Historically, the city has purchased services and supplies from your company. The procedure involved was simply that a decision would be made by a department head that a purchase was necessary and the purchase would be made. Later the purchase would be ratified by the city commission's approving the payment. The purchases involved are minimal in amount as large purchases are let after competitive bidding.

You indicate that the city normally approves all such purchases on a bimonthly basis and does not currently have a method for line item abstention. In phone conversations with our general counsel, you have indicated that you believed a line item abstention on purchases from your company would be appropriate.

Having reviewed the applicable law, it is our opinion that you should abstain from participating in the approval of payments to your own company and that line item abstention would be a most appropriate method of obtaining that goal.

Opinion No. 85-127

Cities and Municipalities—Code for Municipal Courts; Proceedings After Arrest and Prior to Trial—Municipal Court Diversion; Factors To Be Considered Before Diversion Offer. David K. Martin, Mission City Attorney, Overland Park, September 23, 1985.

Under the provisions of K.S.A. 1984 Supp. 22-2908 (as amended by L. 1985, ch. 48, § 16) and K.S.A. 12-4415 (as amended by L. 1985, ch. 48, § 11), a county attorney or city attorney is not prohibited from entering into a diversion agreement in lieu of further criminal proceedings if a defendant (charged with an alcohol related offense) has been convicted of or pleaded *nolo contendere* to a violation of an alcohol related offense in a state other than Kansas. However, a previous conviction in another state must be considered in determining whether diversion of a defendant is in the interest of justice. State Departments; Public Officers and Employees—State Moneys—Interest Credited to General Fund; Exceptions.

State Departments; Public Officers and Employees—Department of Health and Environment—Crippled and Chronically Ill Children; Advisory Commission; Special Bequest Fund. Charles V. Hamm, Special Assistant to the Secretary of the Department of Health and Environment, Topeka, September 23, 1985.

Pursuant to Executive Reorganization Order No. 15 (L. 1977, ch. 283), the powers, duties, functions and property of the Crippled Children's Commission were transferred to the secretary of health and environment. Such transfer included any moneys which had been received by the commission from private individuals in the form of gifts or bequests. These moneys are now contained in a special bequest fund, with expenditures made by the secretary of health and environment subject to the approval of the advisory commission for crippled and chronically ill children. The corpus of any private bequest may be invested by the state treasurer pursuant to K.S.A. 75-4201 *et seq.*, with any interest credited to the special bequest fund and not to the general fund of the state (K.S.A. 75-4210a). A public hearing will be conducted at 7:30 p.m. Friday, October 18, at the Canterbury Inn King Room, Wichita, to consider the adoption of proposed rules and regulations of the Kansas Fish and Game Commission.

All interested parties may submit written comments at anytime prior to the hearing by addressing them to the Director, Kansas Fish and Game Commission, Route 2, Box 54A, Pratt 67124. Following the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered by the Commission as the basis for making any changes to the proposed regulations.

A summary of the proposed regulations follows:

23-1-12. Spring turkey season—a temporary regulation that establishes the season dates, open areas and permit numbers for spring turkey season. No fiscal impact.

23-2-16. Coyote seasons—a temporary regulation that opens coyote season during portions of the firearms deer season. This is new authority granted by the 1985 legislature. No fiscal impact.

23-3-13. Taking of bait fish or minnows—revised to add a citation to regulation 23-8-2 (wildlife area; restrictions). No fiscal impact.

23-8-2. Wildlife areas—redefines wildlife areas. No fiscal impact.

23-12-11. Furbearing animals and coyotes; field trials—defines sanctioned or licensed field trials and is edited for clarity. No fiscal impact.

23-18-1. License fees—implements license fees increases for calendar year 1987 and brings the fees to the statutory maximum. This regulation would increase revenue for the agency by \$90,000 the first year and approximately \$400,000 each year after.

23-16-1. Importation and possession of certain wildlife—prohibits importation and possession of Asian racoon dogs. No fiscal impact.

23-1-13. Waterfowl; steel shot—requires the use of steel shot for waterfowl hunting statewide in 1987. Implements Commission policy on steel shot adopted November 15, 1984. No fiscal impact.

23-8-34. Wildlife areas; steel shot—requires the use of steel shot for all shotgun hunting on Marais des Cygnes, Neosho, Cheyenne Bottoms, Jamestown and Texas Lake wildlife areas. Requires the use of steel shot for waterfowl hunting on all other wildlife areas. The regulation on the use of steel shot on the five areas was implemented this season by posting. The second portion will be implemented in 1986. Like regulation 23-1-13, this regulation implements Commission policy on steel shot adopted November 15, 1984. No fiscal impact.

23-8-19. Marais des Cygnes Wildlife Area—changes the permit requirement for waterfowl hunting. No fiscal impact.

23-2-14. Antelope and deer; season restrictions—changes the definition of legal firearms and is edited for clarity. No fiscal impact.

23-8-11. Wildlife areas; use restrictions—specifies the removal of all blinds from wildlife areas at the close of the season. No fiscal impact.

23-6-2. Beaver taking by state revocation. Depredation statutes give landowners the necessary authority to deal with problem animals. No fiscal impact.

23-8-26. Cheyenne Bottoms Wildlife Area—special hunting area—revocation. These areas can be described by posting pursuant to 23-8-18 and 23-8-11. No fiscal impact.

23-8-24. Field trial events; special use permits—strikes the list of wildlife areas where events may be held and gives the Director authority to issue permits on any wildlife area open to hunting. No fiscal impact.

23-8-18. Cheyenne Bottoms Wildlife Area—changes the permitting requirements. No fiscal impact.

23-1-10. Turkey season restrictions—legalizes decoys and nonelectronic turkey calls for hunting turkeys. No fiscal impact.

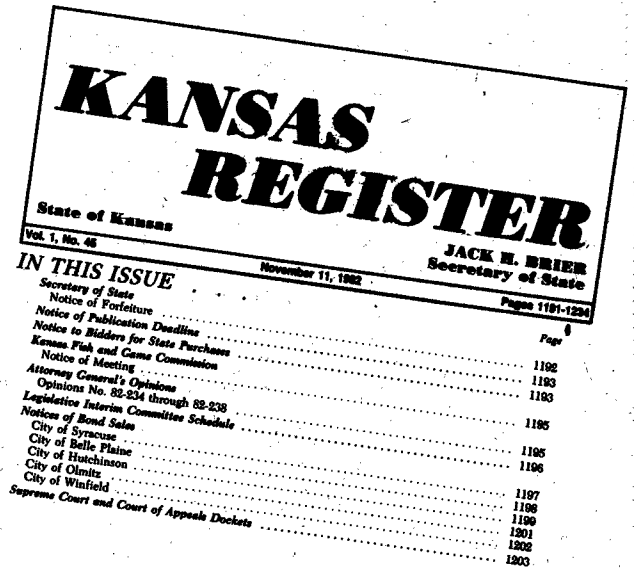
