A formal public hearing will be conducted by the Kansas Water Office for those who wish to comment on the proposed revisions to the Riparian and Wetland subsections of the 1986 State Water Plan. Copies of the final drafts will be available for examination at local conservation districts and extension offices. The hearing is an opportunity for groups and individuals to have formal input into the structuring of the Riparian and Wetland Protection subsections which, if approved, will become part of the existing state water plan.

The hearing is scheduled for 10 a.m. Monday, January 13, in the ESSI Building, 1309 S. Topeka, Topeka. Parking is available in the rear of the ESSI Building, on the south lot.

Following the hearing, the Riparian and Wetland Protection subsections will be redrafted, if necessary, before they are submitted to the Kansas Water Authority for approval. If approved by the Authority, these subsections will be incorporated into the existing state water plan and submitted to the governor and legislature.

**TEMPORARY ADMINISTRATIVE
REGULATIONS**

(Effective December 11, 1985. Expire May 1, 1986.)

Article 12.—SPECIAL EDUCATION

91-12-71. Educational advocates; qualifications and powers. (a) Any person appointed as an educational advocate shall:

- (1) Be at least 18 years of age;
- (2) have completed a training program respecting the powers, duties and functions of a lawful custodian; and
- (3) have presented three references for appointment as an educational advocate.

(b) Any person appointed as an educational advocate shall:

- (1) Vigorously protect the child's rights in the education and decision-making process including the identification, evaluation and placement of the child;

(2) comply with applicable confidentiality requirements imposed by state and federal law;

(3) actively participate in the development of the child's individualized education program; and

(4) diligently exercise all the other rights given to lawful custodians under the special education for exceptional children act. (Authorized by and implementing L. 1985, ch. 237, § 2; effective, T-86-41, Dec. 11, 1985.)

91-12-72. Guidelines for appointment of educational advocates. (a) An educational advocate shall be appointed for a child who is in custody of the secretary of social and rehabilitation services pursuant to K.S.A. 1984 Supp. 38-1501 *et seq.* and who is known to be or is suspected of being exceptional if:

(1) The parental rights of the parents of the child have been terminated; or

(2) the child's lawful custodian is unknown or unavailable.

(b) The secretary of social and rehabilitation services shall appoint each educational advocate. Each educational advocate shall meet the qualifications prescribed in K.A.R. 91-12-71. In appointing each educational advocate, the secretary shall observe the following rules:

(1) If a child is in a state institution, the appointed educational advocate shall not be a social and rehabilitation services employee;

(2) if a child is in a permanent foster care placement, the educational advocate may be the foster care provider;

(3) if a child is in a constant foster care placement and is expected to remain in that placement for one year, the educational advocate may be the foster care provider; and

(4) if a child is not in a state institution, the educational advocate may be a social and rehabilitation services social worker. (Authorized by L. 1985, ch. 237, § 2; implementing L. 1985, ch. 237, §§ 1 and 2; effective, T-86-41, Dec. 11, 1985.)

TEMPORARY ADMINISTRATIVE
REGULATIONS

(Effective December 11, 1985. Expire May 1, 1986.)

Article 2.—DEFINITIONS

1-2-25. Compensatory time credits. Compensatory time credits are:

(a) leave credits given to employees who work on holidays and who are compensated for such holiday work by receiving time off at a later date, at the rate of one and a half hours off for one hour worked; or

(b) leave credits for compensatory time off given pursuant to K.A.R. 1-5-24. (Authorized by K.S.A. 75-3747, as amended by 1985 HB 2125; effective May 1, 1979; amended, T-86-17, June 17, 1985; amended, T-86-36, Dec. 11, 1985.)

Article 5.—COMPENSATION

1-5-5. Employees to be paid within range; part-time employees.

(a) Except as provided otherwise in these regulations, each employee in the classified service shall be paid within the salary range adopted for his or her class of position and at the salary step within the range as prescribed by these regulations.

(b) Whenever an employee works, or is otherwise in pay status, in a pay period fewer than the regularly established number of hours for his or her position, the amount paid shall be proportionate to the time actually worked or otherwise in pay status.

(c) For the purpose of this regulation, "in pay status" means time worked, and time off work but for which the employee is compensated because of a holiday, because of use of any kind of leave with pay, because of use of compensatory time credits. (Authorized by K.S.A. 75-3747, as amended by 1985 HB 2125; implementing K.S.A. 75-2938; effective May 1, 1979; amended May 1, 1981; amended, T-86-17, June 17, 1985; amended, T-86-36, Dec. 11, 1985.)

1-5-24. Overtime. (a) Except as otherwise provided by the statutes or regulations, employees of the state who are eligible to receive overtime pay under the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938, as amended, shall be compensated for overtime as provided in that act. State employees in agricultural positions shall also be eligible for overtime payment. The director shall make the final determination as to eligibility to receive overtime pursuant to this subsection for all classified employees and all unclassified employees whose salaries are subject to approval by the governor under K.S.A. 75-2935b and amendments thereto.

(b) The rate at which any eligible employee is to be compensated for overtime worked shall be one and a half times the employee's regular rate of pay; this rate shall not include premium pay for holidays worked or any call-in and call-back compensation paid for hours not actually worked.

(c) Each appointing authority shall be responsible

for control of overtime in the agency. Overtime, to the extent possible, shall be authorized in advance by the responsible supervisor.

(d) The director may authorize eligibility for overtime for a class or position that is not eligible for overtime under subsection (a).

(e) In determining whether an employee in a position or class determined to be eligible for overtime pay has worked any overtime in a given workweek or work period, all time in pay status shall be considered as time worked. For the purpose of this regulation, "in pay status" shall be defined as in K.A.R. 1-5-5(c).

(f)(1) In lieu of paying an employee at the time and a half rate for overtime worked, an agency may elect to compensate an employee for overtime worked by granting compensatory time off, at the rate of one and a half hours off for each hour of overtime worked, at some time after the workweek or work period in which the overtime was worked.

(2) An employee may accrue a maximum of 240 hours of compensatory time for overtime hours worked. Any employee who has accrued 240 hours of compensatory time off shall, for any additional overtime hours of work, be paid overtime compensation.

(3) If compensation is paid to an employee for accrued compensatory time off, such compensation shall be paid at the regular rate earned by the employee at the time the employee receives the payment.

(4) An employee who has accrued compensatory time off authorized under this subsection shall, upon termination of employment, be paid for the unused compensatory time at a rate of compensation not less than:

(A) the average regular rate received by such employee during the last three years of the employee's employment; or

(B) the final regular rate received by such employee, whichever is higher.

(5) An employee who has accrued compensatory time off authorized under this subsection, and who has requested the use of compensatory time, shall be permitted by the appointing authority to use such time within a reasonable period after making the request if the use of the compensatory time does not unduly disrupt the operations of the agency.

(g) When an employee who is eligible for overtime works additional time that could result in overtime hours, that employee's agency may give the employee equivalent time off, on an hour for hour basis, in the workweek or work period in which the additional time is worked if:

(1) the agency notifies the employee of the change in the employee's normal work schedule for that workweek or work period at least five calendar days in advance of the day in which the employee's normal work schedule is first changed; or

(2) the agency has furnished the employee a written statement of the circumstances under which the employee may be required to take equivalent time off, on an hour for hour basis, in the workweek or work period in which additional time is worked; or

(3) the employee requests or agrees to take equivalent

lent time off during the workweek or work period in which additional time was worked, and the agency determines that this arrangement is not detrimental to the operations of the agency.

In any case, the equivalent time off shall be taken at a time agreeable with the agency during the workweek or work period in which the additional time is worked. Article 9.—HOURS; LEAVES; EMPLOYEE-MANAGEMENT RELATIONS

1-9-13. Payment for accumulated vacation leave and compensatory time credits upon separation. (a) Except as provided in subsection (b), any employee who resigns or is otherwise separated from the service shall be paid for that employee's accumulated vacation leave and compensatory time credits at the same time the employee is paid for the last day at work. Pay for vacation leave or compensatory time to the employee's credit shall be calculated on the same basis as the pay for the days that the employee actually worked in the pay period that includes the last day worked, except as provided in K.A.R. 1-5-24(f). Pay for such vacation or compensatory time credit shall be a lump sum addition to the employee's last paycheck.

(b) Each employee who retires from the service shall be paid for that employee's accumulated vacation leave and compensatory time credits. For the purpose of calculating the payment to any employee for leave credit earned as provided for in this regulation, the date of the employee's retirement from the service may be the employee's last day actually worked, or if the employee chooses, the last day in pay status.

(1) If the employee elects to use the last day actually worked, pay for vacation leave, holiday pay, or compensatory time to the employee's credit as of the date of retirement shall be calculated on the same basis as the pay for the hours actually worked in the pay period that includes the last day worked, except as provided in K.A.R. 1-5-24(f).

(2) If the employee elects to use the last day in pay status, the employee shall continue to accrue leave and holidays and shall be paid in the regular manner until all vacation leave, holiday pay, or compensatory time is exhausted. TEMPORARY ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS

(Effective December 11, 1985. Expire May 1, 1986.)

Article 2.—LICENSING OF SOCIAL WORKERS

102-2-7. Code of professional responsibility. (a) Each social worker shall maintain the level of conduct herein or shall be subject to disciplinary action pursuant to K.S.A. 74-7507. The board may refuse to renew, may suspend, or may revoke the license of any social worker whom the board finds guilty of unprofessional conduct, negligence, or wrongful actions.

(b) The following acts shall be evidence of unprofessional conduct, negligence, or wrongful actions:

(1) Making a materially false statement in, or failing to disclose a material fact requested in connection with application for licensure;

(2) failing to notify the board of having a license, certificate, permit, or registration granted by this or any other state for the practice of social work that has been limited, restricted, suspended or revoked, or of having been subject to other disciplinary action by a licensing or certifying authority or professional association;

(3) knowingly allowing another person to use one's license;

(4) impersonating another person holding a license issued by this board;

(5) conviction of a crime resulting from or relating to the licensee's professional practice of social work;

(6) furthering the application for social work licensure of another person who is known by that social worker to be unqualified in respect to character, education, or other relevant attributes;

(7) knowingly aiding or abetting a person who is not a licensed social worker in representations of that person as a social worker in this state;

(8) failing to notify the board of a social worker who, in the judgment of the social worker, is practicing or teaching social work in violation of the laws or regulations regulating social work;

(9) refusing, upon request, to cooperate in a timely manner with the board's investigation of complaints lodged against any applicant or social worker licensed by the board. Persons taking longer than 30 days to provide requested information shall have the burden of demonstrating excusable neglect;

(10) misrepresenting professional competency by performing, or offering to perform, services clearly inconsistent with training, education, and experience;

(11) practicing inhumane or discriminatory treatment toward any person or group of persons;

(12) engaging in professional activities, including advertising, involving dishonesty, fraud, deceit, or misrepresentation;

(13) failing to advise and explain to each client the joint rights, responsibilities, and duties involved in the social work relationship;

(continued)

(14) failing to provide each client with a description of what the client may expect in the way of tests, consultation, reports, fees, billing, therapeutic regimen, or schedule;

(15) failing to provide each client with a description of possible effects of proposed treatment when there are clear and established risks to the client;

(16) failing to inform each client of any financial interests that might accrue to the social worker for referral to any other service, or for the use of any tests, books, or apparatus;

(17) failing to inform each client that the client is entitled to the same services from a public agency, if the social worker is employed by that public agency, and also offers services privately;

(18) failing to inform each client of the limits of confidentiality, the purposes for which information is obtained, and how it may be used;

(19) revealing a confidence or secret of any client, except:

(A) as required by law;

(B) after full disclosure of the information to be revealed and the persons to whom the information will be revealed, and after obtaining consent of the client; and

(C) if necessary to defend the social worker or employees or associates against an accusation of wrongful conduct made by that client;

(20) using a confidence or secret of any client to the client's disadvantage;

(21) using a confidence or secret of any client for the advantage of the social worker or a third person, without obtaining the client's consent after full disclosure of the purpose;

(22) failing to obtain written, informed consent from each client, or the client's legal representative or representatives, before electronically recording sessions with that client, before permitting a third party observation of their activities, or before releasing information to a third party concerning a client;

(23) when providing any client with access to that client's records, failing to protect the confidences of other persons contained in that record;

(24) failing to exercise due diligence in protecting the confidences and secrets of the client from disclosure by employees, associates, and others whose services are utilized by the social worker;

(25) making sexual advances toward or engaging in physical intimacies, or sexual activities with, any client, patient or student of that social worker;

(26) practicing social work while using alcohol or other drugs in an abusive manner;

(27) exercising undue influence on any client, patient, or student, including promotion of the sales of services, goods, appliances or drugs in a manner that will exploit the patient, client, or student for the financial gain or personal gratification of the practitioner or of a third party;

(28) directly or indirectly offering, giving, soliciting, receiving, or agreeing to receive any fee or other consideration to or from a third party for the referral of the client or patient or in connection with the performance of professional services;

(29) permitting any person to share in the fees for professional services, other than a partner, employee, an associate in a professional firm, or a consultant authorized to practice social work;

(30) soliciting the clients of colleagues or assuming professional responsibility for clients of another agency or colleague without appropriate communication with that agency or colleague;

(31) making claims of professional superiority which cannot be substantiated by the social worker;

(32) guaranteeing that satisfaction or a cure will result from the performance of professional services;

(33) claiming or using any secret or special method of treatment or techniques which the social worker refuses to divulge to the board;

(34) continuing or ordering tests, treatment, or use of treatment facilities not warranted by the condition of the client;

(35) failing to maintain the confidences shared by colleagues in the course of professional relationships and transactions with those colleagues;

(36) taking credit for work not personally performed whether by giving inaccurate information or failing to give accurate information;

(37) if engaged in research, failing to consider carefully the possible consequences for human beings participating in the research, failing to protect each participant from unwarranted physical and mental harm, failing to ascertain that the consent of the participant is voluntary and informed, and failing to treat information obtained as confidential;

(38) knowingly reporting distorted, erroneous, or misleading information;

(39) when termination or interruption of service of the client is anticipated, failing to notify the client promptly and failing to seek continuation of service in relation to the client's needs and preferences;

(40) abandoning or neglecting a client under and in need of immediate professional care, without making reasonable arrangements for continuation of that care, or abandoning an agency, organization, institution, or a group practice without reasonable notice and under circumstances which seriously impair the delivery of professional care to clients;

(41) failing to terminate the social work relationship when it is apparent that the service no longer serves the client's needs;

(42) failing to maintain a record for each client which accurately reflects the client contact with the social worker. Unless otherwise provided by law, all client records shall be retained for at least two years after the date of termination of the contact or contacts;

(43) failing to exercise appropriate supervision over persons who are authorized to practice only under the supervision of a social worker;

(44) practicing social work in an incompetent manner; or

(45) practicing social work after expiration of his or her license. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-7507; effective May 1, 1982; amended, T-85-36, Dec. 19, 1984; amended May 1, 1985; amended, T-86-39, Dec. 11, 1985.)

102-2-9. Examinations. (a) Each applicant for licensure by the board shall take an examination approved by the board. The pass criterion score shall be:

(1) One standard deviation below the national norm for those applicants who take the examination offered by Educational Testing Service or Professional Examination Testing Service; and

(2) at the criterion reference cut-off score for those applicants who take the Assessment Systems, Inc., examinations. Each applicant shall be notified of the results in writing.

(b) The usual and customary examination shall be a written examination. Special arrangements shall be made for applicants with a physical handicap or handicaps when requested by the applicant.

(c) Waiver of examination. The written examination requirement may be waived for any applicant, other than an applicant for reinstatement of a revoked or suspended license, if the applicant successfully passed the written portion of an examination deemed by the board to be substantially equivalent to that used in Kansas at a level equal to or greater than the criterion pass score.

(d) Each applicant for licensure who fails the examination shall submit the fee required by K.A.R. 102-2-3 for each subsequent examination which the applicant attempts to pass. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7507; implementing K.S.A. 75-5351; K.S.A. 75-5354; effective, T-85-36, Dec. 19, 1984; effective May 1, 1985; amended, T-86-39, Dec. 11, 1985.)

102-2-11. Renewal. (a) Each licensed social worker shall renew the license by submitting a renewal form to the executive secretary together with the renewal fee prescribed in K.A.R. 102-2-3.

(b) At or prior to the time of the renewal, each licensed social worker shall submit evidence of satisfactory completion of 60 hours of continuing education as defined in K.A.R. 102-2-4a and 102-2-5.

(c) If the licensee has not satisfactorily completed the continuing education, the licensee may request a temporary permit. A temporary permit may be granted for a period not to exceed six months from the date of expiration of the license provided the licensee submits the following materials at the time of the request:

(1) Full payment of the license fee;

(2) documentation of continuing education credit earned to date; and

(3) a statement of intent to complete the continuing education requirement. This statement shall include the courses or seminars the licensee intends to take, and the time period in which the requirement will be met.

(d) Each individual who holds a social work license but who fails to renew the license on or before the date of expiration, and who thereafter applies for renewal of the license, shall certify to the board in writing that the individual has not practiced in Kansas as a social worker or held forth as performing the services of a social worker after expiration of the license. If the board has evidence that the individual continued to practice in Kansas as a social worker or

hold themselves out to the public as a social worker after the expiration date of the license, the individual may be requested to appear before the board. The board shall determine the individual's eligibility for renewal of the license. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7507; implementing K.S.A. 75-5358, 75-5359; effective, T-85-35, Dec. 19, 1984; effective May 1, 1985; amended, T-86-39, Dec. 11, 1985.)
