Pursuant to K.S.A. 77-421, as amended, a public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Friday, November 6, in the business offices of the Kansas Board of Dental Examiners, 4301 Huntoon, Topeka.

The Dental Board will allow all licensed dentists, dental hygienists and all other interested parties a reasonable opportunity to present their views and arguments concerning the proposed new regulation 71-1-15 and the revocation of regulation 71-1-14, which are to be considered by the board at the public hearing. These regulations are summarized as follows:

Proposed new regulation 71-1-15—This regulation deals with conduct detrimental to the public health, safety or welfare and sets out the standards to be applied for the maintenance of adequate records for each patient, justifying the course of treatment.

Revocation of 71-1-14—This regulation deals with advertising guidelines. The Dental Board proposes to revoke the regulation in its entirety.

All interested parties will be given the opportunity to present oral or written testimony in presenting their views and arguments in favor of or in opposition to the proposed regulations.

The proposed amendment of K.A.R. 50-4-2 refines disclosure requirements of information secured pursuant to the administration of the Employment Security Law.

These proposed amendments will have a minimal or no fiscal impact on the residents of Kansas, state agencies or small businesses.

Opinion No. 87-149

Laws, Journals and Public Information—Records Open to Public—Correspondence Received by Members of Public Bodies. Jerry Williams, Lenexa City Attorney, Overland Park, October 9, 1987.

A letter from a private attorney to a city council member in the possession of a public agency is a public record. Such a record, however, is not subject to mandatory disclosure as it falls within one of the exceptions listed in the Kansas Open Records Act, correspondence between a private individual and a public agency. Therefore, the public agency has discretion whether to make the letter available to the public. Cited herein: K.S.A. 45-215; 45-216; 45-217; 45-221, as amended by L. 1987, ch. 176, § 4. RLN

Opinion No. 87-150

Crimes and Punishments—Crimes Against the Public Morals—Use of Live Lures. The Honorable Ginger Barr, State Representative, 51st District, Auburn, October 13, 1987.

The prohibition against the use of live lures in the "training" of racing greyhounds includes the use of such lures in instructing, exercising, drilling and teaching of greyhounds to race regardless of racing experience. K.S.A. 80-2506, as amended, requires a hospital board member to be a resident of the territory included in the taxing district of the hospital. Accordingly, a board member who moves his or her residence outside of the hospital's taxing district may not remain on the hospital board. Advisory Opinion No. 87-21

Written September 17, 1987 to Jan Hopkins, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of August 12, 1987, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Public Disclosure Commission.

We note at the outset that this opinion is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* Thus, whether some other statutory system, common law, or agency rule or policy relates to your question is not covered by this opinion.

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as a state employee with the Department of Revenue. You indicate that you also serve as a chaplain at a county jail and do volunteer work with inmates. You ask whether you may seek employment with the Department of Corrections.

We have reviewed the conflict of interests law in its entirety and find no prohibitions dealing with the situation you have described.

Advisory Opinion No. 87-22

Written September 17, 1987 to Jan Hopkins, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of August 12, 1987, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Public Disclosure Commission.

We note at the outset that this opinion is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* Thus, whether some other statutory system, common law, or agency rule or policy relates to your question is not covered by this opinion.

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as a state employee with the Department of Revenue. You advise us that you intend to organize a travel club for state employees and charge a modest fee to those who participate.

We understand you to ask whether you may organize such a club during your tenure as a state employee.

It is our opinion, so long as the enterprise is conducted outside of state duty hours and does not involve the use of state materials or equipment, that the enterprise you contemplate is permissible.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment will conduct a public hearing at 1 p.m. Friday, November 13, in Conference Room A, Building 740, Forbes Field, Topeka, to consider the adoption of amended permanent Department of Health and Environment rules and regulations K.A.R. 28-31-1 through 28-31-4, 28-31-6, 28-31-8, 28-31-8a, 28-31-9 and 28-31-10, pertaining to hazardous waste management standards. The proposed amendments adopt by reference the federal regulation changes.

K.A.R. 28-31-14 is a new regulation pertaining to land disposal restrictions and adopting by reference the federal regulation changes.

The fiscal impact of these revised regulations is minimal or none except for two regulations. K.A.R. 28-31-4 will require generators of hazardous waste to install secondary containment around all hazardous waste storage tanks. Depending upon the size of the tank, costs for installation of containment systems could be a minimum of \$100 to thousands of dollars. It is estimated that a maximum of 100 tanks would need to meet these requirements.

The second regulation with a fiscal impact is K.A.R. 28-31-10. This regulation would allow hazardous waste generators that reclaim waste onsite to recover substantial amounts of either energy or materials to be exempt from monitoring fees for that specific hazardous waste being reclaimed. By allowing this additional exemption an estimated \$5,000 of monitoring fees that were paid in fiscal year 1987 would not be collected by the Department of Health and Environment.

A hearing will be conducted at 9:30 a.m. Friday, November 6, in the Board of Regents conference room, Suite 609, Capitol Tower, 400 S.W. 8th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of temporary rules and regulations, modifications to existing permanent administrative rules and regulations, and additions to the permanent administrative rules and regulations of the State Board of Regents.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Ted D. Ayres, General Counsel, State Board of Regents, 400 S.W. 8th, Suite 609, Topeka 66603. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to orally present their views in regard to the adoption of the proposed regulations and amendments. In order to give all parties an opportunity to express their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit oral presentation to five minutes.

All written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered in assessing the merits of the adoption of the proposed regulations and amendments.

A copy of the full text of the regulations and fiscal impact statements may be obtained by writing the Board of Regents at the address above.

The following is a summary of the proposed temporary regulations and additions and amendments to the permanent regulations:

K.A.R. 88-3-10 provides for a waiver of non-resident tuition for certain individuals who have graduated from an accredited high school in Kansas within 12 months of their enrollment at a Regents institution.

K.A.R. 88-3-11 provides for a waiver of non-resident tuition for certain individuals who established a domiciliary residence in the state of Kansas for purposes of accepting or retaining employment with a Kansas employer.

K.A.R. 88-8-1 sets forth various definitional terms relating to the Kansas Career Work-Study Program administered by the Board of Regents.

K.A.R. 88-8-2 sets forth various criteria to be used by eligible institutions to determine the eligibility of students to participate in the Kansas Career Work-Study Program.

K.A.R. 88-8-3 relates to the determination of the amount of compensation which can be earned by students participating in the Kansas Career Work-Study Program and the source of such compensation.

K.A.R. 88-8-4 sets forth the requirements for a uniform contractual agreement to be used with reference to the Kansas Career Work-Study Program.

K.A.R. 88-8-5 describes the steps which eligible institutions are to take in making certain that the Kansas Career Work-Study Program is reasonably

available for all students who wish to participate in the program.

K.A.R. 88-8-6 sets forth the criteria for determining the eligibility of employees to participate in and be a part of the Kansas Career Work-Study Program.

K.A.R. 88-8-7 provides for the percentage of the program funds which may be allocated to the administrative expenses of the participating institutions.

K.A.R. 88-8-8 requires each institution participating in the Kansas Career Work-Study Program to be prepared to submit information to the Board of Regents so that the board may properly inform the governor and the legislature about the operation of the program.

K.A.R. 88-10-6 is being amended to give the Board of Regents greater flexibility in dealing with companies and agents who sell and service tax-sheltered annuities to its employees pursuant to K.S.A. 74-4925.

K.A.R. 88-11-7 is being amended to give the Board of Regents greater flexibility in dealing with companies and agents who sell and service tax-sheltered annuities to its employees pursuant to K.S.A. 74-4925b.

K.A.R. 88-14-1 sets forth various definitional terms relating to the Community Resource Program administered by Kansas State University.

K.A.R. 88-14-2 describes the membership, meetings and duties of the review committee which will assist in administration of the Community Resource Program.

K.A.R. 88-14-3 deals with the required content of applications for grants in aid pursuant to the Community Resource Program administered by Kansas State University.

K.A.R. 88-14-4 sets forth the criteria to be used in reviewing and evaluating applications for grants in aid from Community Resource Program funds.

K.A.R. 88-17-2 deals with the responsibilities of the Board of Regents in administering the ROTC tuition waiver program authorized by K.S.A. 74-3256. The modifications proposed are to delete references to the waiver of fees and to standardize the form of the regulation.

K.A.R. 88-17-3 sets forth the responsibilities of ROTC institutions in relation to the ROTC tuition waiver program. The modifications proposed are to delete references to the waiver of fees, to provide for more flexibility with reference to the selection of participating students, and to standardize the form of the regulation.

K.A.R. 88-17-4 sets forth the responsibilities of the adjutant general with reference to the ROTC tuition waiver program. The modifications proposed are to delete references to the waiver of fees and to standardize the form of the regulation.

Conditions of Bids

Proposals will be received on the bonds bearing such rate or rates of interest as may be specified by the bidders, subject to the following conditions: The same rate shall apply to all bonds of the same maturity. Good Faith Deposit

Each bid shall be accompanied by a cashier's or certified check drawn on a bank located in the United

If a bid is accepted, said check or the proceeds thereof will be held by the city until the bidder shall have complied with all of the terms and conditions of this notice. Official Statement

The city has prepared an official statement dated October 19, 1987, copies of which may be obtained from the city clerk or from the financial advisers. Upon the sale of the bonds, the city will furnish the successful bidder with a reasonable number of copies thereof without additional cost upon request. Additional copies may be ordered at the successful bidder's expense.

Delivery and Payment

The city will pay for printing the bonds and will deliver the same properly prepared, executed and registered without cost to the successful bidder on or before December 18, 1987, at such bank or trust company in the state of Kansas or Kansas City, Missouri, as may be specified by the successful bidder. The successful bidder will also be furnished with a certified transcript of the proceedings evidencing the authorization and issuance of the bonds and the usual closing proofs, which will include a certificate that there is no litigation pending or threatened at the time of delivery of the bonds affecting their validity. CUSIP Numbers

The total general obligation indebtedness of the city as of the date of the bonds, including the bonds being sold, is \$15,378,000. Temporary notes in the principal amount of \$604,392 will be retired out of proceeds of the bonds and other available funds.

Legal Opinion and Tax Exemption

All matters incidental to the authorization and issuance of the bonds are subject to the approval of Gilmore & Bell, Wichita, Kansas, bond counsel.

In the opinion of bond counsel, under existing law, the interest on the bonds (a) is excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes and (b) is not an item of tax preference for purposes of the federal alternative minimum tax imposed on individuals and corporations; however, it should be noted that with respect to corporations (as defined for federal income tax purposes), such interest is taken into account in determining adjusted net book income (adjusted current earnings for taxable years ending after 1989) for the purpose of computing the alternative minimum tax imposed on such corporations. The opinion set forth in clause (a) above is subject to the condition that the city comply with all requirements of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, that must be satisfied subsequent to the issuance of the bonds in order that interest thereon be (or continue to be) excluded from gross income for federal income tax purposes. Failure to comply with certain of such requirements could cause the interest on the bonds to be so includable in gross income retroactive to the date of issuance of the bonds. The city has covenanted to comply with all such requirements.

Prospective purchasers of the bonds should be aware that (i) Section 265 of the code denies a deduction for interest on indebtedness incurred or continued to purchase or carry the bonds or, in the case of a financial institution (within the meaning of Section 265(b)(5) of the code), that portion of a holder's interest expense allocable to interest on the bonds; (ii) with respect to insurance companies subject to the tax imposed by Section 831 of the code, for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1986, Section 832(b)(5)(B)(i) reduces the deduction for loss reserves by 15 percent of the sum of certain items, including interest on the bonds; (iii) for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1986 and before January 1, 1992, interest on the bonds earned by some corporations could be subject to the environmental tax imposed by Section 59A of the code; (iv) for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1986, interest on the bonds earned by certain foreign corporations doing business in the United States could be subject to a branch profits tax imposed by Section 884 of the code; (v) passive investment income, including interest on the bonds, may be subject to federal income taxation under Section 1375 of the code for Subchapter S corporations that have Subchapter C earnings and profits at the close of the taxable year, if greater than 25 percent of the gross receipts of such Subchapter S

corporation is passive investment income; and (vi) Section 86 of the code requires recipients of certain Social Security and certain railroad retirement benefits to take into account, in determining gross income, receipts or accruals of interest on the bonds.

Bond counsel expresses no opinion regarding other federal tax consequences with respect to the bonds.

The bonds are exempt from intangible personal property taxes levied by Kansas counties, cities or townships.

A form of bond counsel's opinion, which will be printed on the bonds and paid for by the city, is contained in the official statement of the city with respect to the bonds.
