 ON PROPOSED
 ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS**

The State Board of Accountancy will conduct a hearing at 11 a.m. Wednesday, January 25, in Conference Room 108, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, for the purpose of amending three administrative regulations. K.A.R. 74-5-202, Auditing Standards, and 74-5-203, Accounting Principles, are being amended to include the date of the most recent AICPA and FASB technical manuals referenced in the regulations. This amendment is required by Kansas statutes to be made every year since the dates of the manual updates change every year. Regulation 74-12-1, Fees, is being amended to increase permit (license) to practice fees for certified public accountants from \$80 to \$90 per biennial.

Adoption of these three regulation amendments is not expected to have any economic impact on anyone except licensed CPAs, and is not expected to have any fiscal impact on any other state agencies or the general public. The fee increase is necessary to cover board operations and could provide an additional \$12,000 to the board's fee fund and \$3,000 to the state's general revenue fund.

This notice of hearing is being given at least 30 days in advance of the hearing and constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written comments about the proposed regulations. Opinion No. 88-166

Contracts and Promises—Investment Certificates of Investment Companies—Registration of Investment Certificates of Investment Companies; Restriction on Investments Not Inherent to Principal Business of Licensed Lender. Judith Bravence-Stringer, Consumer Credit Commissioner, Topeka, December 1, 1988.

K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 16-601i authorizes the investment of funds obtained from the sale of investment certificates in a majority-owned affiliate or subsidiary of the issuer as long as the affiliate/subsidiary is engaged in the same type of business as the issuer and does not itself issue investment certificates. Based on the historical background of the investment certificate act and the rules of statutory construction, it is our opinion that this provision would not preclude the acquisition of the majority stock of a savings and loan association with funds obtained from the sale of investment certificates. However, the Consumer Credit Commissioner has the discretion to prohibit such an investment if her determination is reasonably based on other provisions of the act. **NOTICE OF HEARING
ON PROPOSED
ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS**

The Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board will conduct a public hearing at 10 a.m. Monday, January 30, in Room 858-S of the Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed temporary and permanent rules and regulations of the board.

The adoption of K.A.R. 102-4-1 and K.A.R. 102-4-3 through 102-4-11 are new temporary and permanent regulations that establish the credentials, renewal, and practice standards for registration as a master level psychologist.

Each registrant bears the cost of application, renewal of registration, and continuing education. The cost to the general public to provide the services of this group of mental health care providers will be assessed in the form of fees to the clients or subsidized through state general funds, the total dollar amount of which is unknown by the board.

The adoption of permanent amendments to K.A.R. 102-2-1a provide for a new definition of client or patient. The board does not anticipate any economic impact as a result of this amendment.

The adoption of permanent amendments to K.A.R. 102-1-7 requires the licensee to surrender his license and

wallet-size card to the board within 30 days of expiration or surrender of the psychology license. The board does not anticipate any economic impact as a result of this amendment.

The adoption of permanent amendments to K.A.R. 102-1-15 enables licensees to combine continuing education credits by collapsing five categories into three categories, requiring hours in two of three categories rather than three in five categories, and increasing the maximum number of hours per category from 50 to 75. The economic impact to licensees may result in lower costs for fulfillment of the continuing education requirement. The economic impact to the board may result in less time required to review the continuing education documentation submitted by licensees. The economic impact to the general public is unknown.

The time period between the publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations.

All interested parties may submit comments prior to the hearing to the address above. All interested parties will also be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views orally or in writing concerning the adoption of the proposed rules and regulations.

Following the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted will be considered by the board prior to formal adoption.

This sworn statement shall be in the form of an affidavit executed and sworn to by the bidder before a person who is authorized by the laws of the state to administer oaths. The required form of the affidavit will be provided by the state to each prospective bidder. Failure to submit the sworn statement as part of the bid-approval package will make the bid nonresponsive and not eligible for award consideration.

HAZARDOUS WASTE DELISTING PETITION

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is announcing its intent to deny approval of a hazardous waste delisting petition (#82-4), currently held by the Boeing Military Airplane Company, 3801 S. Oliver, Wichita.

On September 3, 1982, the Boeing Military Airplane Company, EPA I.D. Number KSD007237241, filed a petition to exclude from regulation a listed hazardous waste generated at its Wichita facility. The petitioned waste contains sludges from electroplating operations (EPA Waste Code F006).

The petition was filed in accordance with the procedures outlined in 40 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Sections 260.20 and 260.22, as adopted by K.A.R. 28-31-3. Analytical data to support the petitions were also submitted. KDHE reviewed the petition and the data and found that the waste did not exhibit any of the hazardous waste characteristics for which the waste was listed (EP toxic cadmium, hexavalent chromium, nickel and complexed cyanide).

A combine EPA/KDHE approval of Boeing's petition was granted on October 1, 1982. The approval allowed Boeing to manage the waste as a non-hazardous waste. Boeing elected to manage the delisted waste in on-site landfills at its Wichita facility.

On November 8, 1984, the Hazardous and Solid Waste Amendments (HSWA) to the federal Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) became law. Section 3001(f) of HSWA required the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to use more extensive criteria to evaluate hazardous waste delisting petitions. The new criteria was designed to address situations where a specific waste may not contain the hazardous constituents that caused the waste to be listed as hazardous, while still containing other hazardous constituents at levels harmful to human health and the environment.

HSWA required EPA to re-evaluate all previous petitions that were granted temporary approvals, but did not require EPA to re-evaluate any final state delisting decisions. Instead, this responsibility was left with the states. On September 24, 1985, KDHE adopted the HSWA delisting criteria as state regulations. In January 1986, a determination was made by EPA that Boeing's original 1982 petition had received a final approval from KDHE. On February 6, 1986, EPA delegated the responsibility for re-evaluating Boeing's petition to KDHE.

KDHE initiated re-evaluation of Boeing's petition on March 3, 1986. Boeing submitted analytical data and process information to KDHE on October 1, 1986. Additional data was required in order to make a final decision. Additional data was submitted on August 27, 1987. Evaluation of the August 27, 1987 data indicated that the waste may contain concentrations of chromium that are hazardous to human health and the environment.

On October 8, 1987, Boeing notified KDHE that a sludge dewatering system was to be added to the waste

treatment plant. KDHE requested additional waste analysis, once the dewatering system was on line. Boeing submitted additional waste analysis on September 13, 1988. Evaluation of the data found that the waste contains concentrations of chromium, lead and tetrachloroethylene that may be hazardous to human health and the environment. KDHE is, therefore, announcing its intent to deny Boeing's hazardous waste delisting petition #82-4 for F006.

The procedures and criteria used to evaluate Boeing's waste sludges were developed by EPA for use in the federal delisting program. These procedures use a vertical-horizontal spread (VHS) groundwater model and an organic leachate model (OLM) to predict hazardous waste constituent concentrations in a water well located directly down gradient from the waste disposal site. The predicted concentrations are compared to established drinking water standards and/or cancer risk standards. If any of the predicted concentrations exceed these established standards, the petition is denied and the waste must be managed as hazardous waste.

KDHE believes that the VHS model, along with the OLM, represent a reasonable worst case waste disposal scenario for Boeing's waste; and that a reasonable worst case scenario is appropriate when evaluating whether a waste should be relieved of the protective constraints of the Kansas Hazardous Waste Management Act, K.S.A. 65-3430 *et seq.* and regulations K.A.R. 28-31-1 through 28-31-14.

KDHE is specifically requesting public comment on the appropriateness of using the VHS model and the OLM to evaluate Boeing's hazardous waste delisting petition.

A detailed explanation of the VHS model and the OLM is contained in the February 26, 1985, the November 27, 1985, and the November 13, 1986 *Federal Registers*, page numbers 7882 to 7900, 48866 to 48967, and 41082 to 41103, respectively. Background information on the model's development, including definition of associated parameters, public comments received and EPA responses to these comments also are contained in the above *Federal Registers*.

This public notice for request for comments is being made in accordance with 40 CFR 260.20 as adopted by K.A.R. 28-31-3. The complete administrative record on this action is available for public review and comment from December 22, 1988, until January 21, 1989, from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday, at the KDHE central office, Building 730, Forbes Field, Topeka; at the KDHE south central district office, 3244 E. Douglas, Wichita; and at the U.S. EPA Region VII Office, 726 Minnesota Ave., Kansas City, Kansas.

All bids will be publicly opened and read at said time and place and will be acted upon by the board of education immediately thereafter. No oral or auction bids will be considered.

Bond Details

The bonds will consist of fully registered bonds in denominations of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof, dated February 1, 1989, and becoming due serially on March 1 in the years as follows:

The bonds will bear interest from the date thereof at rates to be determined when the bonds are sold as hereinafter provided, which interest will be payable semiannually on March 1 and September 1 in each year, beginning March 1, 1989.

Place of Payment and Bond Registration

The principal of and interest on the bonds will be payable in lawful money of the United States of America by check or draft of the Kansas State Treasurer, Topeka, Kansas (the paying agent and bond registrar), to the registered owners thereof whose names are on the registration books of the bond registrar as of the 15th day of the month preceding each interest payment date. The bonds will be registered pursuant to a plan of registration approved by the district and the Kansas Attorney General.

The district will pay for the fees of the bond registrar for registration and transfer of the bonds and will also pay for printing a reasonable supply of registered bond blanks. Any additional costs or fees that might be incurred in the secondary market, other than fees of the bond registrar, will be the responsibility of the bondowners.

The number, denominations of the bonds and the names, addresses and Social Security or taxpayer identification numbers of the registered owners shall be submitted in writing by the successful bidder to the district and bond registrar at least two weeks prior to the closing date. In the absence of such information, the district will deliver one bond per maturity registered in the name of the manager of the successful bidder. The initial reoffering price to the public by the original purchaser shall be furnished to the district at least one week prior to the closing date. A certificate setting forth such reoffering price to the public shall be furnished to the district at closing.

Redemption of Bonds Prior to Maturity

Bonds maturing in the years 1991 to 1995, inclusive, shall become due without option of prior payment. At the option of the district, bonds maturing in the years 1996 and thereafter may be called for redemption and payment prior to maturity in whole or in part in inverse order of maturity (selection of bonds within the same maturity to be by lot by the district in such equitable

manner as it may determine) on March 1, 1995, or on any interest payment date thereafter at the redemption price of 101 percent (expressed as a percentage of the principal amount), plus accrued interest to the redemption date.

Whenever the district is to select the bonds for the purpose of redemption, it shall, in the case of bonds in denominations greater than \$5,000, if less than all of the bonds then outstanding are to be called for redemption, treat such \$5,000 of face value of each such fully registered bond as though it were a separate bond of the denomination of \$5,000.

If the district shall elect to call any bonds for redemption and payment prior to the maturity thereof, the district shall give written notice of its intention to call and pay said bonds on a specified date, the same being described by number and maturity, said notice to be mailed by United States registered or certified mail addressed to the registered owners of said bonds, to the Kansas State Treasurer, Topeka, Kansas, and to the manager or managers of the underwriting account making the successful bid, each of said notices to be mailed not less than 30 days prior to the date fixed for redemption. If any bond be called for redemption and payment as aforesaid, all interest on such bond shall cease from and after the date for which such call is made, provided funds are available for its payment at the price hereinbefore specified.

Authority, Purpose and Security

The bonds are being issued pursuant to K.S.A. 72-6761 *et seq.*, as amended, for the purpose of acquiring land, repairing, remodeling and making additions to existing school buildings, constructing additional school buildings, and equipping and furnishing these school buildings within the unified school district. The bonds and the interest thereon will constitute general obligations of the district, payable from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limitation as to rate or amount upon all the taxable tangible property, real and personal, within the territorial limits of the district.

Submission of Bids

Bids must be submitted in sealed envelopes addressed to the undersigned clerk and marked "Bond Bid." Bids may be submitted by mail or delivered in person to the undersigned at the office of the board of education and must be received by the undersigned prior to 7 p.m. C.S.T. on January 10, 1989.

Bid Forms

All bids must be made on forms which may be procured from the clerk or the bond counsel. No additions or alterations in such forms shall be made and any erasures may cause rejection of any bid. The district reserves the right to waive irregularities and to reject any and all bids.

Conditions of Bids

Proposals will be received on the bonds bearing such rate or rates of interest as may be specified by the bidders, subject to the following conditions: The same rate, shall apply to all bonds of the same maturity. Each interest rate specified shall be a multiple of $\frac{1}{8}$ or $\frac{1}{20}$ of 1 percent. No interest rate may exceed a rate equal to the index of treasury bonds published by *Credit Markets* in New York,

New York, on the Monday next preceding the day on which the bonds are sold, plus 2 percent. The difference between the highest rate specified and the lowest rate specified shall not exceed 2 percent. No bid of less than the entire par value of the bonds and accrued interest thereon to the date of delivery will be considered and no supplemental interest payments will be authorized. Each bid shall specify the total interest cost to the district during the life of the bonds on the basis of such bid, the premium, if any, offered by the bidder, and the net interest cost to the district on the basis of such bid—all certified by the bidder to be correct—and the district will be entitled to rely on the certificate of correctness of the bidder. Each bid shall also specify the average annual net interest rate to the district on the basis of such bid.

Basis of Award

The award of the bonds will be made on the basis of the lowest net interest cost to the district, which will be determined by subtracting the amount of the premium bid, if any, from the total interest cost to the district. If there is any discrepancy between the net interest cost and the average annual net interest rate specified, the specified net interest cost shall govern and the interest rates specified in the bid shall be adjusted accordingly. If two or more proper bids providing for identical amounts for the lowest net interest cost are received, the board of education shall determine which bid, if any, shall be accepted, and its determination shall be final. The district reserves the right to reject any and all bids and to waive any irregularities in a submitted bid. Any bids received after 7 p.m. C.S.T. on the date the bids are due will be returned to the bidder unopened.

Good Faith Deposit

Each bid shall be accompanied by a cashier's or certified check drawn on a bank located in the United States of America equal to 2 percent of the total amount of the bid payable to the order of the district. If a bid is accepted, said check, or the proceeds thereof, will be held by the district until the bidder shall have complied with all of the terms and conditions of this notice. If a bid is accepted by the district and it shall fail to deliver the bonds to the bidder in accordance with the terms and conditions of this notice, said check or the proceeds thereof will be returned to the bidder. If a bid is accepted but the bidder defaults in the performance of any of the terms and conditions of this notice, the proceeds of such check will be retained by the district as and for liquidated damages. No interest will be paid upon the successful bidder's good faith check.

Delivery and Payment

The district will pay for printing the bonds and will deliver the same properly prepared, executed and registered without cost to the successful bidder on or before February 28, 1989, at such bank or trust company in the state of Kansas or Kansas City, Missouri, as may be specified by the successful bidder. The successful bidder will also be furnished with a certified transcript of the proceedings evidencing the authorization and issuance of the bonds and the usual closing proofs, which will include a certificate that there is no litigation pending or threatened at the time of delivery of the bonds affecting their validity.

Payment for the bonds shall be made in Federal Reserve funds, immediately subject to use by the district.

CUSIP Numbers

It is anticipated that CUSIP identification numbers will be printed on the certificated bonds or assigned to uncertificated bonds, but neither the failure to print such number on or assign such number to any bond nor any error with respect thereto shall constitute cause for failure or refusal by the purchaser thereof to accept delivery of and pay for the bonds in accordance with the terms of the purchase contract. All expenses in relation to the assignment and printing of CUSIP numbers on the bonds will be paid by the district.

Assessed Valuation and Indebtedness

The total assessed valuation of the taxable tangible property within the district, for the year 1988, is as follows:

The total general obligation indebtedness of the district as of the date of the bonds, including the bonds being sold, is \$298,655, plus this \$3,700,000 issue.

Opinion and Tax Exemption

The bonds will be sold subject to the legal opinion of William P. Timmerman, Wichita, Kansas, bond counsel, whose approving legal opinion as to the validity of the bonds will be furnished and paid for by the district, printed on the bonds and delivered to the successful bidder as and when the bonds are delivered.

All matters incidental to the authorization and issuance of the bonds are subject to the approval of the bond counsel.

In the opinion of bond counsel, under existing law, the interest on the bonds: (a) is excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes, and (b) is not an item of tax preference for purposes of federal alternative minimum tax imposed on individuals and corporations; however, it should be noted that with respect to corporations (as defined for federal income tax purposes), such interest is taken into account in determining adjusted net book income (adjusted current earnings for taxable years ending after 1989) for the purpose of computing the alternative minimum tax imposed on such corporations. The opinion set forth in clause (a) above is subject to the condition that the district comply with all requirements of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, that must be satisfied subsequent to the issuance of the bonds in order that interest thereon be (or continue to be) excluded from gross income for federal income tax purposes. Failure to comply with certain of such requirements could cause the interest on the bonds to be so includable in gross income retroactive to the date of issuance of the bonds. The district has covenanted to comply with all such requirements.

Prospective purchasers of the bonds should be aware that: (i) Section 265 of the code denies a deduction for interest on indebtedness incurred or continued to purchase or carry the bonds, except with respect to certain financial institutions (within the meaning of Section

265(b)(5) of the code); (ii) with respect to insurance companies subject to the tax imposed by Section 831 of the code, for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1986, Section 832(b)(5)(B)(i) reduces the deduction for loss reserves by 15 percent of the sum of certain items, including interest on the bonds; (iii) for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1986, and before January 1, 1992, interest on the bonds earned by some corporations could be subject to the environmental tax imposed by Section 59A of the code; (iv) for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1986, interest on the bonds earned by certain foreign corporations doing business in the United States could be subject to a branch profits tax imposed by Section 884 of the code; (v) passive investment income, including interest on the bonds, may be subject to federal income taxation under Section 1375 of the code for Subchapter S corporations that have Subchapter C earnings and profits at the close of the taxable year, if greater than 25 percent of the gross receipts of such Subchapter S corporation is passive investment income; and (vi) Section 86 of the code requires recipients of certain Social Security and certain railroad retirement benefits to take into account in determining gross income, receipts or accruals of interest on the bonds.

The bonds are "qualified tax-exempt obligations" within the meaning of Section 265(b)(3) of the code, and in the case of certain financial institutions (within the meaning of Section 265(b)(5) of the code), a deduction is allowed for 80 percent of that portion of such financial institution's interest expense allocable to interest on the bonds.

Bond counsel expresses no opinion regarding other federal tax consequences with respect to the bonds.

The bonds are exempt from intangible personal property taxes levied by Kansas counties, cities or townships and interest on same are now exempt from Kansas income taxes.

DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS

PERMANENT ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS

Article 11.—COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS

44-11-111. Definitions. (a) The term "secretary" means the secretary of corrections.

(b) The term "planning unit" means any county or group of cooperating counties that has established a local corrections advisory board for the purpose of developing a comprehensive plan.

(c) The term "comprehensive plan" means the working document developed annually by a local corrections advisory board setting forth the objectives and programs planned for a local community corrections system.

(d) The term "corrections advisory board" means a board appointed by a board or boards of county commissioners in a planning unit to develop and oversee a comprehensive plan.

(e) The term "community corrections system" means the structure that exists or is proposed to exist within a planning unit to deliver the community corrections services outlined in a comprehensive plan.

(f) The term "program" means a community corrections activity directed by a public or private agency to deliver services to victims, offenders or the community.

(g) The term "community corrections grant funds" means funds made available to a planning unit by the department of corrections, pursuant to the Kansas community corrections act, K.S.A. 75-5290 *et seq.*

(h) The term "grant year" means the year covered in an annual comprehensive plan. This year will begin at the start of a calendar year.

(i) The term "primary programs" means those services which directly reduce the existing or prison bound population.

(j) The term "secondary programs" means those services which do not directly impact upon the prison bound population. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 75-5291, 75-5294; effective May 1, 1981; amended Feb. 6, 1989.)

44-11-113. Comprehensive plan; background information. The initial comprehensive plan shall include background information defining the planning unit's correctional problems and needs. The information shall be updated annually and the plan shall describe trends that are evolving or anticipated. The information shall include:

(a) The number and types of reported offenses;

(b) the number of adult and juvenile arrests, by offense;

(c) the disposition of adult and juvenile arrests, by offense;

(d) the local correctional and related resources currently available, extent of use, and potential for increased use; and

(e) primary correctional needs as identified by the

(continued)

corrections advisory board. The set of primary correctional needs specified annually in the month of July by the secretary shall be addressed by the comprehensive plan. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 75-5292, 75-5294, 75-52,102; effective May 1, 1981; amended Feb. 6, 1989.)

44-11-114. Comprehensive plan; corrections program. (a) Each comprehensive plan shall describe the programs proposed to meet the primary correctional needs identified by the corrections advisory board and the secretary of corrections. The comprehensive plan shall include primary programs, including either intensive supervision and residential programs, or both. A planning unit may propose secondary programs, including but not limited to victim witness, restitution, and diversion programs. Each program shall include:

- (1) Specific goals and objectives, stated in measurable terms for each service proposed;
- (2) the type of service to be provided;
- (3) the target group to be served, including characteristics and the projected number of offenders that will be diverted or reintegrated from prison;
- (4) number and function of staff; and
- (5) a detailed budget including a narrative describing each line item.

(b) Each planning unit desiring to enter into a contract for the provision of community corrections services to other counties shall include the proposed contract in the comprehensive plan. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 75-5292, 75-5294, 75-52,102; effective May 1, 1981; amended Feb. 6, 1989.)

44-11-116. Comprehensive plan; budget. Each comprehensive plan shall include a budget that itemizes the proposed expenditures for each program in the comprehensive plan.

The proposed budget shall include a narrative describing each line item. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 75-5292, 75-5294, 75-52,104; effective May 1, 1981; amended Feb. 6, 1989.)

44-11-119. Local programs. (a) A comprehensive plan may provide for community corrections programs to be administered by public or private agencies. A planning unit may enter into a contractual or other written agreement with a private agency to operate programs identified in the comprehensive plan or to provide specialized services to program participants.

(b) An annual program audit of all programs identified in the comprehensive plan shall be conducted by the secretary. The program audit shall be conducted according to program standards and the general outline for the comprehensive plan.

(c) Each agency that operates community corrections programs shall meet the following requirements.

(1) Each agency shall develop and distribute to appropriate referral sources written policies describing program eligibility criteria and intake procedures.

(2) Each agency shall maintain clear, concise, and accurate case records in compliance with report requirements established by the secretary. (Authorized

by and implementing K.S.A. 75-5294, 75-5296; effective May 1, 1981; amended Feb. 6, 1989.)

44-11-121. Fiscal management. (a) Each planning unit shall designate one person to be responsible for the supervision of all fiscal matters related to the community corrections grant funds received. This person shall comply with state and county rules governing the management of county funds and shall provide information to the corrections advisory board and the secretary on a monthly basis on forms provided by the secretary.

(b) A monthly financial status report shall be submitted to the secretary within 10 days after the end of each month, including certified statements detailing the amounts expended and cost incurred for correctional services.

(c) Each county receiving grant funds shall submit to the secretary a quarterly financial report within 10 days after the end of each calendar quarter. The quarterly financial report shall include the amount of funds received to date, the amount expended to date, and the amount of funds needed for program operations during the next quarter based on the approved operational budget.

(d) Each county shall be required to submit a final financial status report to the secretary within 60 days after the end of each calendar year. The total amount of unexpended funds for each county receiving grant funds shall be determined by the secretary by March 1st of each calendar year.

(e) Each county shall arrange for an annual independent fiscal audit to be completed no more than 90 days following the close of the fiscal year of any community corrections grant funds authorized by the secretary. The audits shall be forwarded to the secretary for review by April 1st of each year. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 75-5294, 75-5296; effective May 1, 1981; amended Feb. 6, 1989.)

44-11-122. Submission of plan, response by secretary. (a) An initial comprehensive plan shall be submitted to the secretary at least 30 days before the start of the calendar quarter for which funds are requested. Each subsequent comprehensive plan shall be submitted by December 1 of each year.

(b) The comprehensive plan shall be submitted by December 1 according to established program standards and the general outline for development of a comprehensive plan.

(c) A program review committee consisting of institutional and field service representatives shall be appointed by the secretary to review each comprehensive plan. The committee shall make a recommendation to the secretary.

(d) Any plan may be accepted, rejected or accepted by the secretary subject to specified modifications. Any plan rejected may be revised and resubmitted to the secretary for review. Each county shall be notified by the secretary of approval or disapproval of the comprehensive plan by December 31. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 75-5294, 75-5296; effective May 1, 1981; amended Feb. 6, 1989.)

44-11-123. Changes in the comprehensive plan and budget. When a planning unit wishes to change the comprehensive plan during the grant year, it may do so by either amendment of the plan or transfer of funds. (a) Amendments.

(1) The comprehensive plan shall be amended any time funded programs or administrative activities are being added to or deleted from a comprehensive plan or whenever community corrections grant funds in excess of \$5,000 or five percent 5% of the total annual grant, whichever is less, are being reallocated within or between funded program items in the comprehensive plan.

(2) Each amendment to the comprehensive plan shall be adopted by the corrections advisory board and the board of county commissioners and submitted to the secretary for approval.

(b) Transfers.

(1) A transfer of funds shall be required whenever community corrections grant funds less than \$5,000 or 5% of the total annual grant, whichever is less, are being reallocated within or between funded items in the comprehensive plan. The total amount transferred within or between fund items shall not exceed \$5,000 or 5% of the total grant, within that grant year.

(2) Transfers shall be approved by the community corrections administrator, where appointed, or by the corrections advisory board and shall be reported to the secretary on the monthly financial report for the period in which the transfer was made. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 75-5294, 75-5296; effective May 1, 1981; amended Feb. 6, 1989.)

44-11-125. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 75-5294, 75-52,104, 75-52,105; effective May 1, 1981; amended, T-84-6, March 29, 1983; amended May 1, 1984; amended May 1, 1986; revoked Feb. 6, 1989.)

44-11-128. Transfer to calendar year. The grant year for each planning unit shall be adjusted to coincide with the calendar year. (a) To make that adjustment, a planning unit may lengthen or reduce by up to

two quarters the period of time to which the comprehensive plan applies in the year of adjustment.

(b) Planning units shall continue to be eligible for a percentage increase based on 12-month periods according to K.S.A. 75-52,101. The increases in percentage of the grant to which they are entitled shall continue to proceed by 12-month periods based on the starting date of the first year plan.

(c) The comprehensive plan of each planning unit that is adjusting to the calendar year by reducing the period of time to which the comprehensive plan applies shall be submitted to the department not less than 30 days before the beginning of the calendar year.

(d) Requests by planning units to adjust to the calendar year by lengthening the period of time to which the latest comprehensive plan applies shall be submitted to the department not less than 30 days before the end of the year to which the latest comprehensive plan applies. These requests shall be accompanied by a summary of progress toward goals and objectives and a detailed budget for the quarters to be added to the period covered by the comprehensive plan. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 75-5296 and 75-52,105; effective May 1, 1984; amended Feb. 6, 1989.)

44-11-129. Unexpended funds. Unexpended funds may be transferred by the secretary to another county or counties. Any county may make application to the secretary for the unexpended funds. The county shall provide the secretary with a budget narrative describing the proposed services and measurable goals and objectives. The county shall be notified by the secretary of approval or disapproval of the application within 30 days after receipt of the request. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 75-52,103(d), as amended by L. 1988, Ch. 349; effective Feb. 6, 1989.)
