FOR JAIL OFFICER TRAINING**

The Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services, in cooperation with the Department of Corrections, is requesting proposals to provide training to local jail officers. Proposals must address the following:

1. Conduct an assessment of jail officer training currently available in Kansas;
2. Conduct a needs assessment of the type of jail officer training required to raise the standards of jailing policies and procedures;
3. Conduct an inventory of training needs and establish a training curriculum and format;
4. Develop training schedules and determine regional training sites and implement training sessions. (Additional funds will be available to pay the participant, presenter, and training facility costs and should not be included in the response to this request);
5. Establish a list of training resources (state, federal and local agencies, universities, private concerns and individuals) to provide technical assistance to jails; and
6. Evaluate program effectiveness.

One successful proposal will be funded in an amount not to exceed \$15,000. All costs must be justified in a detailed budget. The format for the narrative description is open ended, but should not exceed 20 typed, double-spaced pages.

The project period will be from February 13 to September 30. The end date is non-negotiable due to funding limitations.

These proposed new regulations in general are mandated by the U. S. Environmental Protection Agency as a prerequisite to awarding the capitalization grants to Kansas as appropriated by Congress and are needed to implement the Kansas Water Pollution Control Act of 1988 (SB 472). The federal Construction Grant Program is being phased out. A substitute for financing the capitalization grant program may be implemented by the states as revolving loan programs for constructing water pollution control facilities. Up to 4 percent of the federal capitalization grant awarded to Kansas may be used by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment to operate the program. The authorization within the 1987 amendments of the Federal Clean Water Act includes \$74.33 million capitalization grants for Kansas in federal fiscal years 1989 through 1994. These capitalization grants with the required 20 percent state match will be the basis for a low interest perpetual \$10-\$15 million annual revolving loan fund to aid the planning, design and construction of water pollution control facilities. EPA's regulations and the federal law set out significant limitations on how the fund can be used. However, these annual loan amounts will be a significant financial help to Kansas communities.

The time period between the publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed amended rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit such comments prior to the hearing to Robert Nicholson, Bureau of Water Protection, Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Forbes Field, Bldg. 740, Topeka 66620. All interested parties will also be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views, orally or in writing, concerning the adoption of the proposed program. In order to give all persons an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to limit oral presentations to five minutes.

Following the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered as the basis for making changes in these proposed documents.

In accordance with state regulations 28-16-57 through 28-16-63 and 28-18-1 through 28-18-4, and the authority vested with the state by the administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, a tentative permit has been prepared for the water pollution abatement facilities for the feedlot described below. NOTICE OF ARTS IN EDUCATION DEADLINES

All interested groups and individuals are advised that the Kansas Arts Commission is accepting applications for Arts in Education (AIE) funding support during fiscal year 1990.

Artists have until February 1 to apply to the KAC/AIE Residency Program for residencies in Kansas schools, community organizations and institutions during 1989-1990.

An eligible applicant to sponsor a residency must be a not-for-profit, tax-exempt organization or public agency. Not-for-profit organizations must be incorporated in the state of Kansas and must have applied for tax-exempt status with the federal Internal Revenue Service.

Eligible institutions, organizations and communities interested in sponsoring AIE residencies must apply before March 1 for funding support. These applications will be evaluated by the education advisory panel on Monday, March 20, at the Lawrence Arts Center, 9th and Vermont, Lawrence.

Residencies may last for two weeks, one month, one semester, or one year (nine months). Opportunities are available in the visual arts, folk arts, music, theatre, dance, creative writing, film/video, and architecture.

Qualified artists will be evaluated during February, March, and April by KAC advisory panels on the basis of quality, educational background, experience in classroom situations, and professional background.

The eligible sponsors will interview and select the artists for their residencies during a conference May 5 at the Lawrence Arts Center.

The KAC/AIE Arts in Basic Education Program also provides grants to school systems, institutions and other not-for-profit, tax-exempt cultural organizations or public agencies. Collaborative proposals from schools and cultural organizations or institutions of higher learning are acceptable. All applications must be received before March 1.

These grants are for advancement of the arts as a part of basic education and to encourage development of sequential arts curricula, teaching materials, and methods of evaluating and measuring student progress in the arts within the K-12 curriculum in the public schools.

All KAC/AIE grants are matched dollar-for-dollar on the cash basis of each project. Sponsoring agencies are encouraged to overmatch. Arts in Basic Education grants will not exceed \$9,000.

The Kansas Arts in Education Program is administered by the Kansas Arts Commission, with cooperation from the Kansas Department of Education. Funding is provided by the state and by the National Endowment for the Arts, a federal agency.

All interested groups and individuals are advised that the Kansas Arts Commission is accepting applications for major grant funding support during fiscal year 1990.

All applications must be received in the KAC by February 1. Late applications will not be accepted.

The KAC staff will review the applications during February and March. Advisory panels of the KAC will evaluate the applications during April. The commission will act upon the panel recommendations at the quarterly meeting in May, and the grant award amounts and recipients will be announced in June.

An eligible applicant must be a not-for-profit, tax-exempt organization, institution or public agency. Not-for-profit organizations must be incorporated in the state of Kansas and must have applied for tax-exempt status with the federal Internal Revenue Service.

The KAC has established four major grant categories. An eligible applicant may request one grant in one category for up to 50 percent funding of certain expenses:

1. Project Support for non-profit or government organizations planning one-time or stand-alone arts activities.
2. Basic Program Support for institutions that produce or present arts events.

3. Local Arts Agency Support for community-based arts agencies engaged in multi-disciplinary arts programming.

4. Regional/Statewide Service Organization Support for arts service organizations that serve a regional or statewide arts constituent base.

During a fiscal year, an eligible applicant also may request one Special Opportunity Grant of up to \$750, under circumstances that made it impossible to meet the major grant deadline.

The KAC is the sole state agency empowered to grant funds appropriated by the Kansas Legislature and the National Endowment for the Arts, a federal agency.

Figures through December 31, 1987, as used in this notice of bond sale and in the official statement, have been obtained from the "City of Wichita, Kansas, Annual Financial Report for 1987," which report has been audited by an independent firm of certified public accountants appointed by the city's governing body.

Authority, Purpose and Security for Bonds

The bonds shall be issued under the authority of the constitution and laws of the state of Kansas, including K.S.A. 10-101 *et seq.*, as amended and supplemented, and each series of bonds shall be authorized by a bond ordinance which shall be adopted by the governing body after the awarding of the bonds.

The proceeds of the Series 718 Bonds shall be used, together with special assessments which have been collected in cash and other available funds, and the proceeds of the Series 719 Bonds shall be used, together with other available funds, for the purpose of permanently financing the costs of constructing various internal improvements in the city.

The Series 718 Bonds and the interest thereon shall constitute general obligations of the city, and shall be payable as to both principal of and the interest thereon, in part, from the collection of special assessment taxes which have been levied against certain properties in the city, and the remainder of said principal and interest, and any part of the specially assessed portion not so paid, shall be paid from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limitation as to rate or amount upon all of the

taxable tangible property within the territorial limits of the city. The Series 719 Bonds and the interest thereon shall constitute general obligations of the city, and shall be payable as to both the principal of and the interest thereon from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limitation as to rate or amount upon all of the taxable tangible property within the territorial limits of the city.

Legal Opinion and Tax Exemption

All matters relating to the authorization and issuance of the bonds are subject to the approving opinion of Hinkle, Eberhart & Elkouri, bond counsel, Wichita, Kansas. Bond counsel's opinion shall be printed on the bonds and a manually signed original opinion shall be furnished without expense to the successful bidder concurrently with delivery of the bonds. All fees and expenses of bond counsel shall be paid by the city. Certain legal matters shall be passed upon for the city by Thomas R. Powell, city attorney and director of law.

In the opinion of bond counsel, assuming continued compliance by the city with the particular terms of the respective bond ordinances, under existing law, the interest on the bonds: (i) is excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes, and (ii) is not an item of tax preference for purposes of the federal alternative minimum tax imposed on individuals and corporations. However, it should be noted that with respect to corporations (as defined for federal income tax purposes), such interest is taken into account in determining adjusted net book income (adjusted current earnings for taxable years ending after December 31, 1989) for the purpose of computing the alternative minimum tax imposed on such corporations. The exclusion mentioned in the preceding clause (i) is subject to compliance by the city with all requirements of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, which must be satisfied subsequent to issuance of the bonds in order for the interest thereon to qualify for such exclusion. Failure to comply with certain of such requirements could cause the interest on the bonds to be so included in federal gross income retroactive to the date of delivery of the bonds. The city will covenant to comply with all such requirements. Bond counsel expresses no opinion regarding other federal tax consequences arising with respect to the bonds.

The bonds are exempt from intangible personal property taxes levied by Kansas counties, cities and townships, and the interest on the bonds is excludable from the computation of Kansas adjusted gross income for taxable years commencing after December 31, 1987.

Related Federal Tax Matters

Prospective bidders for purchase of the bonds should be aware that: (i) Section 265 of the code denies a deduction for interest on indebtedness incurred or continued to purchase or carry the bonds or, in the case of a financial institution within the meaning of Section 265(b)(5) of the code, that portion of a bondholder's interest expense allocable to the interest on the bonds; (ii) with respect to insurance companies subject to the tax imposed by Section 831 of the code, for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1986, Section 832(b)(5)(B)(i) of the code reduces the deduction for loss reserves by 15 percent of the sum of certain items, including interest on the bonds;

(iii) for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1986, and prior to January 1, 1992, interest on the bonds earned by some corporations could be subject to the environmental tax imposed by Section 59A of the code; (iv) for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1986, the interest on the bonds earned by certain foreign corporations doing business in the United States could be subject to a branch profits tax imposed by Section 884 of the code; (v) passive investment income, including the interest on the bonds, may be subject to federal income taxation under Section 1375 of the code for Subchapter S corporations that have Subchapter C earnings and profits at the close of the taxable year if more than 25 percent of the gross receipts of such Subchapter S corporation is passive investment income; and (vi) Section 86 of the code requires recipients of certain Social Security and railroad retirement benefits to take into account in determining gross income, receipts or accruals of interest on the bonds. The foregoing categories of prospective bondowners should consult their own tax advisors as to the applicability of any of these consequences.

Assessed Valuation

The 1988 assessed valuation of taxable tangible property in the city is \$1,071,284,622.

Bonded Indebtedness; Pending Indebtedness

The total outstanding general obligation bonded indebtedness of the city, upon the issuance of and including the series of bonds described herein and the pending issue

of temporary notes hereafter mentioned, will be \$284,495,000. This amount does not include the city's currently outstanding temporary notes, which will be redeemed and paid upon the issuance of the bonds either from the proceeds thereof together with special assessments which have been collected in cash and other available funds, or from the proceeds of the said pending issue of temporary notes.

The city expects to sell on or about the same date as the bonds described herein \$14,200,000 principal amount of its temporary notes. With the exception of said temporary notes, however, neither the city, nor Sedgwick County, Kansas, nor Unified School District 259 (the Wichita public school system) presently contemplates the issuance of any additional general obligation indebtedness within the next 30 days.
