ATTORNEY GENERAL**Opinion No. 89-6**

Contracts and Promises—Regulation of Pawnbrokers and Precious Metal Dealers—Report of Property Pledged or Purchased. Representative David J. Heinemann, 123rd District, Garden City, January 27, 1989.

Section 5-514 of the Dodge City Municipal Code prescribes that pawnbrokers shall obtain the right thumb print of any person pledging or selling personal property, except where the pawnbroker personally knows such person by correct name. In our opinion, this requirement does not violate the constitutional rights of the pawnbroker or his customers. Cited herein: K.S.A. 16-706; 16-715; U.S. Const., Fifth and Fourteenth Amend. TRH

Opinion No. 89-7

Drainage and Levees—Drainage Districts Within Counties or Cities—Position of Director of Drainage District Not Incompatible With That of State Representative. Representative Herman G. Dillon, 32nd District, Kansas City, January 31, 1989.

Neither Kansas statutes nor the common law doctrine of incompatibility of offices precludes one person from holding the position of drainage district director simultaneously with that of state representative. Cited herein: K.S.A. 24-401. TRH

NOTICE OF HEARING
ON PROPOSED
ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Monday, March 13, in the third floor conference room of the Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed permanent regulations of the Kansas Insurance Department.

Copies of the full text of the regulations and the economic impact statements may be obtained by writing to the Commissioner of Insurance, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka 66612. The following is a summary of the economic impact statements and the regulations:

40-1-28: Insurance holding companies; information required; disclaimer of affiliation; termination of registra-

tion; acquisition of control. This regulation relates to the National Association of Insurance Commissioners' Insurance Holding Company System Model Regulation. The proposed amendment is a technical correction to specify that 30 days is the maximum length of time that must elapse before an extension of time for filing information can be deemed granted by the commissioner.

40-1-34: Unfair claims settlement practices. The proposed amendments to this regulation are intended to clarify its application. Such clarification is particularly designed to address situations involving persons or entities to whom insurance benefits have been assigned; situations where claims have been approved but payment is withheld because of insurer attempts to negotiate discounts with persons or entities providing the service for which insurance benefits are payable; and to specifically note that section 9(a) of the NAIC model unfair claims settlement regulation applies to both first party and third party losses.

40-1-34a: Unfair claims settlement practices; after market parts; requirements; disclosure. This regulation consists of the proposed adoption of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners' After Market Parts Model Regulation.

40-1-37: Insurance companies; audited financial reports; filing requirements. This regulation would implement L. 1988, Ch. 150 (H.B. 2722), which authorizes the commissioner to require independent CPA audits of insurers *et al.*

40-2-12: Replacement of life insurance and annuities. The proposed amendment to this regulation requires insurers replacing one life insurance policy with another to give credit for any portion of a contestable period that has already been served under the replaced policy.

40-3-5. Fire and casualty insurance; rating organizations; filing of forms. The amendments to this regulation are simply editorial in nature and are needed for clarification.

40-3-44: Automobile insurance; underwriting information; restrictions. This proposed regulation would limit the use of information regarding motor vehicle convictions or traffic violations for underwriting purposes to the information required to be maintained by the Division of Vehicles.

40-4-35: Medicare supplement policies; minimum standards; requirements. This regulation proposes the adoption of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners' Model Regulation to Implement the NAIC Medicare Supplement Insurance Minimum Standards. This regulation is currently in effect on a temporary basis; however, the addition to Section 13 has been modified to require the availability of a buy-back of credit for any deductible, waiting periods, probationary periods and so forth. In addition, the permanent regulation will adopt Section 14 of the NAIC model as directed by the Health Care Financing Administration.

40-4-35a: Medicare supplement policies; P.L. 100-360, transitional requirements. This regulation consists of the proposed adoption of the National Association of Insurance Commissioners' Model Regulation to Implement Transitional Requirements for the conversion of Medicare supplement insurance on a permanent basis.

40-4-38: Accident and health insurance policies; limited benefits; notice required. This regulation would require accident and sickness policies that provide limited benefits to include a notice advising the policyholders that the policy is a limited policy and should be read carefully.

40-5-108: Same; refunds. The amendment to this regulation is necessary to correct an error in its current language and intent regarding the calculation of the charge for credit insurance.

40-7-7: Agents; procedure for obtaining licenses and company certification. The amendments to this regulation are necessary to bring it into conformity with the changes in the agents licensing laws that were incorporated in 1988 House Bill No. 3055.

40-7-11: Agents; cancellation of licenses or certification; procedure. This regulation has been amended to recognize that insurance agencies will be licensed on and after May 1, 1989, and that certification of such agencies will include certification of all agents in the agency.

40-7-13: Agents; scope, subclassification; type and conduct of examinations; re-examination. This regulation has been amended to incorporate May 1, 1989, as the beginning date for agents' licensing examination registration to have an effective life of 90 days.

40-7-20: This regulation is being revoked because the statutes regarding minimum education requirements for life and accident and health agents have been repealed.

40-7-20a: Agents; brokers; continuing education; approval of courses; requirements. This is a new regulation establishing criteria and requirements necessary to implement the insurance agents continuing education process established by 1988 House Bill No. 3126.

40-7-21: Agents; examination fee; amount. This regulation amends the fees to be charged for agents licensing examinations to correspond with the new examination system permitted by 1988 House Bill No. 3055.

None of these proposed regulations or amendments will have a significant measurable economic impact on the public, the Kansas Insurance Department or the insurance industry. However, any such impact will be reflected in the economic impact statement available for each of the proposals.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Commissioner of Insurance. The period of time between the date of publication of this notice and the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing.

Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed rules and regulations 44-11-113, 44-11-121, and 44-11-123 of the Kansas Department of Corrections. These regulations will become effective 45 days after their publication in the *Kansas Register* unless a specific date is contained in the regulation.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Charles E. Simmons, Chief Counsel, Kansas Department of Corrections, 4th Floor, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations. In order to give all parties an opportunity to express their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit oral presentation to five minutes.

This 30-day notice constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations.

A summary of K.A.R. 44-11-113, 44-11-121, and 44-11-123 follows:

44-11-113. Clarifies that correctional needs specified by the Secretary of Corrections shall be considered by the local advisory board in preparing a comprehensive plan.

44-11-121. Clarifies that the audit of grant funds shall be conducted in the time period and manner specified by statute.

44-11-123. Contains a technical amendment specifying a 5 percent limit for grant reallocation purposes.

These regulations provide for the receipt, expenditure, and accounting for grants received under the community corrections act. The regulations are procedural in nature. Grants to counties will continue to be determined as provided by K.S.A. 75-52,101 and will be within appropriations made for the community corrections program.

The bonds will bear interest at rates to be determined when the bonds are sold as hereinafter provided, which interest will be payable semiannually on March 1 and September 1 in each year, beginning March 1, 1990.

The environmental tax is imposed whether or not the taxpayer is subject to the alternative minimum tax. The environmental tax, which is effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1986, may subject certain bondowners to additional taxation for interest earned on the bonds.

The code also requires property and casualty insurance companies, for taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 1987, to reduce the amount of their deductible underwriting losses by a percentage of the amount of tax-exempt interest received or accrued on obligations after August 7, 1986.

All expenses in relation to the assignment and printing of CUSIP numbers on the bonds will be paid by the city.

KANSAS DENTAL BOARD

PERMANENT ADMINISTRATIVE
REGULATIONS

Article 2.—SPECIALISTS

71-2-1. Time for filing applications. Each applicant for a specialist's certificate shall be required to file an application with the Kansas dental board at least 60 days before the examination. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1427; effective Jan. 1, 1966; amended, E-77-9, March 19, 1976; amended Feb. 15, 1977; amended May 1, 1980; amended March 27, 1989.)

71-2-2. Branches of dentistry. Recognized branches of dentistry for which application may be made for a specialist's certificate are as follows: Oral and maxillofacial surgery; orthodontics; prosthodontics; pediatric dentistry; periodontics; public health dentistry; and endodontics.

The branches of dentistry set forth above are defined as follows:

"Oral and maxillofacial surgery" means that branch of dentistry concerning the diagnosis, surgical and adjunctive treatment of disease, injuries and defects of the oral and maxillofacial region.

"Orthodontics" and "Dentofacial Orthopedics" means that branch of dentistry concerning the diagnosis, supervision, guidance and treatment of the growing and mature dentofacial structures, including those conditions that require movement of teeth and the treatment of malrelationships and malformations of the craniofacial complex. It includes the correction of relationships between and among teeth and facial bones, the application of forces, including orthopedic and functional forces, and the diagnosis and treatment in conjunction with orthognathic surgery to attain and maintain optimal physiological health and esthetic harmony of the patient.

"Prosthodontics" means that branch of dentistry concerning the restoration and maintenance of oral function, comfort, appearance and health of the patient by restoring natural teeth or replacement of missing teeth and contiguous oral or maxillofacial tissues with artificial substitutes, by means of removable prosthodontics, fixed prosthodontics and maxillofacial prosthetics which includes restoration or replacement of the stomathognathic and associated facial structures with prostheses that may be removed on a regular or elective basis.

"Pediatric Dentistry" means that branch of dentistry concerning the practice and teaching of comprehensive preventive and therapeutic oral health care for children from birth through adolescence. It shall be construed to include care for special patients beyond the age of adolescence who demonstrate mental, physical or emotional problems.

"Periodontics" means that branch of dentistry concerning the diagnosis, and treatment of diseases and conditions of the supporting and surrounding tissues of the teeth or their implanted substitutes.

"Public health dentistry" means that branch of dentistry relating to the preparation, promotion, initiation, and execution of dental programs designed to prevent or control diseases and anomalies of the teeth, their supporting structures, and other tissues of the mouth based on public health principles in research, education, and care.

"Endodontics" means that branch of dentistry concerning the morphology, physiology and pathology of the human dental pulp and periradicular tissues. Its study and practice encompasses the diagnosis, prevention and treatment of diseases and injuries of the pulp and associated periradicular conditions. Endodontics includes, but is not limited to, the differential diagnosis and treatment of oral pain of the pulp or periradicular origin, vital pulp therapy such as pulp capping and pulpotomy, root canal therapy such as pulpectomy, non-surgical treatment of root canal systems, selective surgical removal of pathological tissues resulting from pulpal tooth structure such as apicoectomy; hemisection; root amputation; endodontic implants; bleaching of discolored dentin and enamel (teeth); re-treatment of teeth previously treated endodontically; and the treatment procedures related to the coronal restoration by means of posts and cores involving the root canal space.

"Oral Pathology" means that branch of dentistry concerning the nature, identification and management of diseases affecting the oral and maxillofacial regions, including the investigation of the causes, processes and effects of such diseases through research; diagnosis using clinical, radiographic, microscopic, biochemical or other examinations; and management of patients. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1427; effective Jan. 1, 1966; amended, E-77-9, March 19, 1976; amended Feb. 15, 1977; amended May 1, 1980; amended March 27, 1989.)

71-2-3. Committee for specialists examination. After the election of officers of the board each year, an examining committee for each of the recognized branches of dentistry shall be appointed by the board. Each committee shall consist of two members, each of whom shall be licensed dentists holding a specialist's certificate in the specialty for which the committee is appointed. Each committee shall conduct the specialists' examination in its specialty. One of the committee members shall be designated chairman of the committee by the board. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1427; effective Jan. 1, 1966; amended May 1, 1980; amended March 27, 1989.)

71-2-4. Manner of processing applications. When an application is filed with the board, the application shall be sent by the secretary to the chairman of the appropriate specialty committee. The committee shall confirm the qualifications of the applicant, and shall examine the applicant, unless it determines the applicant is not qualified for examination.

The committee shall prepare and, subject to board approval, administer examinations, that shall thoroughly test the qualifications of the applicant. The committee shall report the results of the examination or its determination that the applicant is not qualified for examination to the board.

After receiving the report of the committee, formal action shall be taken by the board upon the committee report. The board may grant a specialist's certificate; refer the applicant to the committee for examination or re-examination; or not grant a specialist's certificate. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1427; effective Jan. 1, 1966; amended May 1, 1981; amended March 27, 1989.)

(continued)

71-2-5. Qualifications and requirements of an applicant for certification as a specialist. (a) Each applicant shall be licensed to practice dentistry in the state of Kansas.

(b) Each applicant shall have successfully completed a graduate program in the specialty for which certification is sought in a dental school, college or other dental specialty training program approved by the board and which the board determines has standards of education not less than that required for accreditation by the commission on dental accreditation of the American dental association, or its equivalent, applicable for the year in which the training was completed.

(c) In the event any dentist who holds a Kansas license also holds a specialist certificate granted by a duly authorized licensing agency of another state and has actively practiced in that specialty for a period of five years before application for licensure in Kansas, or is a diplomate of the American board of that specialty, a Kansas specialist certificate in the same specialty may be issued by the board. Further examination of the applicant as to the applicant's qualifications within such specialty may be conducted by the board as though the applicant held no such certificate. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1427, 65-1434; effective Jan. 1, 1966; amended May 1, 1979; amended May 1, 1980; amended May 1, 1981; amended March 27, 1989.)

71-2-6. Fee for specialty examination. At least 60 days before the date of the examination, each applicant shall return the application blank properly filled out and supported by the records and documentary proof required by the board. Each application shall be accompanied by a check or money order made payable to the Kansas dental board in the amount of the examination fee determined by the board. The board may retain all or any part of the amount to defray expenses it has incurred in processing the application, even if the applicant fails to qualify for examination. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1427; effective Jan. 1, 1966; amended May 1, 1979; amended May 1, 1980; amended May 1, 1985; amended March 27, 1989.)

71-2-7. Additional requirements and qualifications for specialist. In addition to the foregoing requirements, the applicant shall submit the following:

(a) A transcript of all education qualifications, together with affidavits of at least three practicing dentists who have personal knowledge of the applicant's experience and qualifications.

(b) Each applicant shall pass an examination prescribed by the board. The examination may be both theoretical and practical. A theoretical examination shall be in writing and shall include those subjects significant to the specialty in which the applicant seeks certification. Written examinations, at the discretion of the committee, may be supplemented by oral examinations, subject to the approval of the board.

(c) Each applicant may be required to demonstrate practical skills in an examination of the applicant's knowledge of diagnosis and the practice of the specialty in which the applicant is seeking certification. This examination may consist of certain clinical procedures on patients or laboratory work or both and is to be performed with sufficient skill to satisfy the board as to the applicant's qualifications. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1427; effective Jan. 1, 1966; amended May 1, 1979;

amended May 1, 1980; amended May 1, 1981; amended March 27, 1989.)

71-2-9. Specialist examinations. Each applicant for a specialist's certificate shall pass an examination developed in accordance with the following procedures and approved by the board:

(a) Each specialty committee shall develop an examination summary and an examination for qualification of persons to be issued a specialist's certificate in the committee's specialized discipline. The examination summary shall include the following:

(1) a statement of examination objectives;

(2) a summary of the examination standards to be applied by the committee;

(3) a statement of the components of the specialty examination, methods of examination to be used and the relative weight to be assigned to each component;

(4) specific information as to the methods of scoring the examination and the basis for evaluation;

(5) if the committee is engaged in the joint development of an examination with another state, the summary shall set out the specific elements of such examination, including all those items discussed in paragraphs (1) through (5);

(6) proposed dates and the examination facilities to be utilized; and

(7) a requirement that each applicant show evidence of professional liability insurance in amounts deemed adequate by the board if the applicant is to perform any clinical procedure on a patient during the course of an examination;

(b) The examination shall include:

(1) all questions to be included in written or oral portions of the examination;

(2) a description of the procedures to be performed by applicants if clinical testing is to be relied upon;

(3) where presentation of clinical studies is required, the examiners shall describe to the board the specific requirements imposed upon the applicant and the standards for evaluation of the presentation; and

(4) The grading of the presentation of clinical studies and other forms of oral examination shall be conducted in the following manner:

(A) Each examiner shall independently complete a written evaluation and scoring of the applicant's performance immediately after the presentation or examination is completed.

(B) The evaluations shall include the assignment of numerical scores from one to 10 for each of at least five weighted elements of the examination including, but not limited to, applicant responsiveness, knowledge of subject matter, knowledge of literature, correctness of response, correctness of diagnosis, description of treatment procedure. The examiner shall total and average the scores in each category and then report the result. The scores of all of the examiners shall be averaged. A passing score is a cumulative seven and one-half.

(C) The grading categories shall be specified by the committee as part of the examination summary submitted pursuant to subsection (a)(4) of this regulation.

(c) The examination summary and examination shall be submitted to the board at least 90 days before the proposed examination date. Both the summary and the examination shall be reviewed and approved by the board before use of the examination by the specialty committee.

Review shall be completed and notice of board action sent not less than 45 days before the proposed examination date. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1427; effective January 1, 1966; amended May 1, 1980; amended March 27, 1989.)

71-2-11. Revocation of specialist certificate. A dental specialist's certificate shall be revoked upon the revocation of the holder's license to practice dentistry in Kansas. A dental specialist's certificate may be revoked for the following reasons:

(a) as a part of a disciplinary proceeding pursuant to K.S.A. 65-1436 et seq.;

(b) upon a finding by the board that a court of competent jurisdiction has limited the right of a dental specialist to practice in a given specialty.

(Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1427; effective Jan. 1, 1966; amended March 27, 1989.)

71-2-12. Evidence supporting qualifications. Each case history model, thesis, or any other evidence submitted to the board in support of an applicant's qualifications for the granting of a specialist's certificate in any of the specialties listed in K.A.R. 71-2-2 shall be supported by a certificate verifying the accuracy and completeness of all evidence submitted and identifying that portion of the material submitted prepared personally and exclusively by the applicant and those portions prepared by others, naming them, and stating that the evidence constitutes a complete and unaltered record of dental diagnosis, care and treatment provided by or under the supervision of the applicant. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1427; effective Jan. 1, 1966; amended March 27, 1989.)

71-2-13. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-1427; effective Jan. 1, 1966; revoked March 27, 1989.)

Article 4.—CONTINUING EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS

71-4-1. Continuing education credit hours required for renewal license of dentist and dental hygienist. (a) Each dentist licensee shall submit to the board, with the license renewal application, evidence of satisfactory completion of a minimum of 30 hours of continuing dental education courses that qualify for credit. Each dentist licensee who holds a specialist certificate shall provide evidence satisfactory to the board that at least 20 of the required minimum of 30 hours of continuing education are in courses in the specialty for which the licensee holds a specialist certificate. Each required course hour shall have been completed in the 12-month period immediately preceding the date of expiration of such license. The term "courses" as used in Article 4 includes courses, institutes, seminars, programs and meetings.

(b) Each dental hygienist licensee shall submit, with the license renewal application, evidence of satisfactory completion of a minimum of 15 hours of continuing dental education courses that qualify for credit. Each course shall have been completed in the 12-month period immediately preceding the date of expiration of the dental hygienist license.

(c) A waiver or extension of time to complete the dental educational requirements may be granted by the board if the licensee demonstrates a good cause, including sickness, disability, financial hardship or another good cause

beyond the control of the licensee as the board may determine.

(d) Upon request, any licensee may complete the required hours of continuing dental education courses for any year at any time during the one year period immediately preceding or following the expiration date of the license. Continuing dental education hours shall not apply to or reduce the number of hours required during any subsequent year. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-1406 and K.S.A. 65-1431; implementing K.S.A. 65-1431; effective May 1, 1978; amended May 1, 1986; amended March 27, 1989.)

Article 8.—EXAMINATIONS

109-8-1. Examinations. (a) The examinations approved by the board for first responder certification and each level of attendant certification shall be the examinations in effect on April 14, 1988 except that the examination approved by the board for EMT-D certification shall test all authorized activities.

(b) Each applicant for certification shall obtain a minimum score of 70% on each portion of the written examination and shall demonstrate competency in all authorized activities as determined by the administrator or the administrator's designee. (Authorized by and implementing L. 1988, Ch. 261, Sec. 10; effective T-109-9-12-88, Sept. 12, 1988; effective T-109-1-19-89, Jan. 19, 1989.)

Article 9.—INSTRUCTOR/COORDINATOR

109-9-1. Instructor-coordinator certification. (a) Each applicant for certification as an instructor-coordinator shall, upon application:

- (1) Be certified for at least one year as an attendant;
- (2) demonstrate at least one year of field experience with an ambulance service;
- (3) make application to the board upon forms provided by the administrator; and
- (4) have successfully completed an instructor-coordinator training program approved by the university of Kansas medical center before April 14, 1988 or a program approved by the board if completed after that date.

(b) Each instructor-coordinator requesting endorsement by the board to instruct and coordinate any level of attendant certification and continuing education, other than crash injury management technician and emergency medical technician, shall upon application:

- (1) Have been certified for at least one year as a mobile intensive care technician or at the level of certification for which the applicant is requesting endorsement; and
- (2) have successfully completed an appropriate course of instruction approved by the university of Kansas medical center prior to April 14, 1988 or a course approved by the board if completed after that date.

(continued)

(c) The certificate shall be valid through December 31 of the year following the year in which it was initially issued and may be renewed thereafter for a period of one year if the instructor-coordinator completes the continuing education requirements prescribed by the board. (Authorized by and implementing L. 1988, Ch. 261, Sec. 10; effective T-109-9-12-88, Sept. 12, 1988; effective T-109-1-19-89, Jan. 19, 1989.)

109-9-2. Instructor-coordinator authorized activities.

(a) Any person who has been certified by the board as an instructor-coordinator may:

(1) Instruct and coordinate first responder, crash injury management technician, and emergency medical technician programs as approved by the board; and

(2) provide continuing education for first responders and attendants as approved by the board. (Authorized by and implementing L. 1988, Ch. 261, Sec. 10; effective T-109-9-12-88, Sept. 12, 1988; effective T-109-1-19-89, Jan. 19, 1989.)

109-9-4. Instructor-coordinator training. (a) Each applicant for training as an instructor-coordinator shall:

(1) Have been certified for at least one year as an attendant;

(2) demonstrate at least one year of field experience with an ambulance service;

(3) make application to the board upon forms provided by the administrator; and

(4) provide letters of recommendation from a person licensed to practice medicine and surgery, the director of the ambulance service that serves the community in which the applicant resides, and the administrator of a hospital that serves the community in which the applicant resides.

(b) Each applicant who meets these requirements shall successfully complete an evaluation of knowledge and skills as determined by the board.

(c) The administrator shall accept applicants for training based on an assessment of state and community needs using criteria developed by the board. (Authorized by and implementing L. 1988, Ch. 261, Sec. 10; effective T-109-1-19-89, Jan. 19, 1989.)

Article 10.—CURRICULA

109-10-1. Curriculum approval. (a) The approved curriculum for first responder programs shall be the department of transportation curriculum HS 900 025 as modified by the board and as in effect on January 1, 1989.

(b) The approved curriculum for crash injury management technician programs shall be the emergency medical training program of the board curriculum in effect on January 1, 1989.

(c) The approved curriculum for emergency medical technician programs shall be the department of transportation curriculum HS 900 075 as modified by the board and as in effect on January 1, 1989.

(d) The approved curriculum for emergency medical technician-intermediate programs shall be the department of transportation curriculum HS 900 090 in effect on January 1, 1989.

(e) The approved curriculum for emergency medical technician-defibrillator programs shall be the emergency medical training program of the board curriculum in effect on January 1, 1989.

(f) The approved curriculum for mobile intensive care

technician programs shall be the department of transportation curriculum HS 900 088 as modified by the board and as in effect on January 1, 1989.

(g) The approved curriculum for instructor-coordinator programs shall be the department of transportation curriculum HS 900-085 in effect on January 1, 1989. (Authorized by L. 1988, Ch. 261, Sec. 10 and 11; implementing L. 1988, Ch. 261, Sec. 11, 29 and 42; effective T-109-9-12-88, Sept. 12, 1988; effective T-109-1-19-89, Jan. 19, 1989.)

Article 11.—COURSE APPROVALS

109-11-1. First responder course approval. (a) Only an instructor-coordinator shall apply for course approval.

(b) The instructor-coordinator shall submit an application to the administrator that includes the following:

(1) The name, address, and telephone number of the instructor-coordinator;

(2) the location of the course;

(3) the name of the sponsoring organization;

(4) the name, address, and telephone number of a contact person for the sponsoring organization;

(5) the name, address, and telephone number of the medical director;

(6) the dates the course will begin and end;

(7) the times and duration of scheduled classes;

(8) the number of students anticipated; and

(9) a summary of the course.

(c) Each application shall be submitted not later than 15 days before the first scheduled class. Each incomplete application shall not be accepted.

(d) Each approved first responder course shall:

(1) Meet or exceed the curriculum described in K.A.R. 109-10-1 (a);

(2) consist of a minimum of 45 hours of training, including training in all authorized activities of a first responder.

(e) Each instructor-coordinator shall use a text or texts approved by the board.

(f) Each instructor-coordinator shall, within 10 days of the first class session, provide the administrator with a complete list of all students enrolled in the course and an enrollment form from each student.

(g) Any approved class may be monitored by the administrator or the administrator's designee. (Authorized by L. 1988, Ch. 261, Sec. 10; implementing L. 1988, Ch. 261, Sec. 42; effective T-109-9-12-88, Sept. 12, 1988; effective T-109-1-19-89, Jan. 19, 1989.)

109-11-2. Crash injury management technician course approval. (a) Only an instructor-coordinator shall apply for course approval.

(b) The instructor-coordinator shall submit an application to the administrator that includes the following:

(1) The name, address, and telephone number of the instructor-coordinator;

(2) the location of the course;

(3) the name of the sponsoring organization;

(4) the name, address, and telephone number of a contact person for the sponsoring organization;

(5) the name, address, and telephone number of the medical director;

(6) the dates the course will begin and end;

(7) the times and duration of scheduled classes;

(8) the number of students anticipated; and

(9) a summary of the course.

(c) Each application shall be submitted not later than 15 days before the first scheduled class. Each incomplete application shall not be accepted.

(d) Each crash injury management technician course shall:

(1) Meet or exceed the curriculum described in K.A.R. 109-10-1 (b); and

(2) consist of a minimum of 72 hours of training.

(e) Each instructor-coordinator shall use a text or texts approved by the board.

(f) Each instructor-coordinator shall, within 10 days of the first class session, provide the administrator with a complete list of all students enrolled in the course and an enrollment form from each student.

(g) Any approved class may be monitored by the administrator or the administrator's designee. (Authorized by L. 1988, Ch. 261, Sec. 10; implementing L. 1988, Ch. 261, Sec. 29; effective T-109-9-12-88, Sept. 12, 1988; effective T-109-1-19-89, Jan. 19, 1989.)

109-11-3. Emergency medical technician course approval. (a) Only an instructor-coordinator shall apply for course approval.

(b) The instructor-coordinator shall submit an application to the administrator that includes the following information:

(1) The name, address, and telephone number of the instructor-coordinator;

(2) the location of the course;

(3) the name of the sponsoring organization;

(4) the name, address, and telephone number of a contact person for the sponsoring organization;

(5) the name, address, and telephone number of the medical director;

(6) the dates the course will begin and end;

(7) the times and duration of scheduled classes;

(8) the number of students anticipated;

(9) a summary of the course;

(10) a description of the clinical rotation; and

(11) letters from the medical adviser of the ambulance service providing ambulance service to the community in which the class is taught, the director of that ambulance service, and the administrator of the hospital in which the clinical rotation is provided indicating their willingness to provide the support as defined in the curriculum.

(c) The application shall be submitted not later than 15 days prior to the first schedule class. Each incomplete application shall not be accepted.

(d) Each approved emergency medical technician course shall:

(1) Meet or exceed the curriculum as described in 109-10-1 (c);

(2) consist of a minimum of 120 hours of training, including at least:

(A) Twelve hours of instruction by appropriate medical personnel as defined in the curriculum;

(B) ten hours of clinical experience at a hospital and ambulance service including orientation to all areas of the hospital and ambulance service; and

(C) thirty hours of laboratory instruction, including instruction on all equipment which the emergency medical technician is authorized to use.

(e) Each instructor-coordinator shall use a text or texts approved by the board.

(f) The instructor-coordinator shall, within 10 days of

the first class session, provide the administrator with a complete list of all students enrolled in the course and an enrollment form from each student.

(g) Any approved class may be monitored by the administrator or the administrator's designee. (Authorized by L. 1988, Ch. 261, Sec. 10; implementing L. 1988, Ch. 261, Sec. 29; effective T-109-9-12-88, Sept. 12, 1988; effective T-109-1-19-89, Jan. 19, 1989.)

109-11-4. Emergency medical technician-intermediate course approval. (a) Only an instructor-coordinator who holds current board endorsement to instruct and coordinate this level of training shall apply for course approval.

(b) The instructor-coordinator shall submit an application to the administrator which includes the following information:

(1) The name, address, and telephone number of the instructor-coordinator;

(2) the location of the course;

(3) the name of the sponsoring organization;

(4) the name, address, and telephone number of a contact person for the sponsoring organization;

(5) the name, address, and telephone number of the medical director;

(6) the dates the course will begin and end;

(7) the times and duration of scheduled classes;

(8) the number of students anticipated;

(9) a summary of the course;

(10) a description of the clinical rotation; and

(11) letters from the medical adviser of the ambulance service providing ambulance service to the community in which the class is taught, the director of that ambulance service, and the administrator of the hospital in which the clinical rotation is provided indicating their willingness to provide the support as defined in the curriculum.

(c) The application shall be submitted not later than 15 days before the first scheduled class. Each incomplete application shall not be accepted.

(d) Each approved emergency medical technician-intermediate course shall:

(1) Meet or exceed the curriculum as described in K.A.R. 109-10-1 (d); and

(2) consist of a minimum of 40 hours of training, including at least:

(A) Fifteen hours of instruction by appropriate medical personnel as defined in the curriculum; and

(B) twenty-one hours of clinical experience at a hospital and ambulance service including orientation to all areas of the hospital and ambulance service.

(e) Each instructor-coordinator shall use a text or texts approved by the board.

(f) Each instructor-coordinator shall, within 10 days of the first class session, provide the administrator with a complete list of all students enrolled in the course and an enrollment form from each student.

(g) Any approved class may be monitored by the administrator or the administrator's designee. (Authorized by L. 1988, Ch. 261, Sec. 10; implementing L. 1988, Ch. 261, Sec. 29; effective T-109-9-12-88, Sept. 12, 1988; effective T-109-1-19-89, Jan. 19, 1989.)

109-11-5. Emergency medical technician-defibrillator course approval. (a) Only an instructor-coordinator who holds current board endorsement to instruct and

(c) Each application shall be submitted not later than 15 days before the first scheduled class. Each incomplete application shall not be accepted.

(d) Each approved mobile intensive care technician course shall:

(1) Meet or exceed the curriculum as described in K.A.R. 109-10-1 (f);

(2) consist of a minimum of 1200 hours of training including at least:

(A) Four hundred hours of instruction by appropriate medical personnel as defined in the curriculum;

(B) four hundred hours of clinical training at a hospital; and

(C) four hundred hours of field internship with a Type I ambulance service.

(e) Each instructor-coordinator shall use a text or texts approved by the board.

(f) Each instructor-coordinator shall, within 10 days of the first class session, provide the administrator with a complete list of all students enrolled in the course and an enrollment form from each student.

(3) demonstrate all practical skills to the satisfaction of the instructor-coordinator.

(b) The instructor-coordinator shall provide written approval within 15 days of the final class when these requirements are met.
