EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 89-114

**ESTABLISHING A SUBSTANCE ABUSE
POLICY AND AWARENESS PROGRAM
FOR STATE EMPLOYEES**

WHEREAS, the Governor and the State of Kansas have a commitment to working Toward A Drug-Free Kansas;

WHEREAS, employees are the State's most valuable asset and the health of employees is paramount to carrying out their responsibilities;

WHEREAS, substance abuse can have a serious adverse effect on users, their productivity, their health and safety, and their dependents, co-workers and the general public;

WHEREAS, state government has a responsibility to its employees and the citizens of Kansas to achieve and maintain a workforce free of substance abuse;

WHEREAS, state government should be a leader in promoting a drug-free workforce and preventing substance abuse by employees;

WHEREAS, the enactment of the Federal Workplace Act of 1988 places restrictions on state governments which receive federal grants and requires them to maintain a drug-free workplace;

NOW, THEREFORE, under the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, it is hereby ordered as follows:

I. The State of Kansas shall have a goal to increase employee awareness about substance abuse and to achieve and maintain a workplace free of drug and alcohol abuse. The State shall have a policy which:

a. prohibits the illegal use, possession, sale or manufacture of controlled substances by state employees at the worksite or while conducting official state business;

b. prohibits working or reporting to work for the state while impaired by or under the influence of illegal drugs or alcohol;

c. encourages rehabilitation, when possible, for substance abuse by employees; and

d. promotes substance abuse awareness for state employees.

II. The Secretary of Administration shall establish and implement the substance abuse policy and awareness program for state employees. The policy and awareness program shall be applicable to all state employees and meet the requirements of the 1988 Federal Drug-Free Workplace Act.

III. All state agencies shall carry out the provisions of the established substance abuse policy and awareness program. Each state agency shall make a good faith effort to maintain a workplace free of substance abuse.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 89-114, and shall become effective immediately.

The Kansas Water Office will conduct a public hearing at 10 a.m. Monday, May 8, in Room 106, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, on permanent rules for administration of the Water Assurance Program Act, K.S.A. 82a-1330 *et seq.* This 30-day notice period constitutes a public comment period.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the director of the Kansas Water Office, 109 S.W. 9th, Topeka 66612-1215. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views orally in regard to the adoption of the proposed regulations. In order to give all parties an opportunity to express their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit oral presentation to five minutes.

Following the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered by the directors of the Kansas Water Office and the Kansas Water Authority as the basis for making changes to the proposed regulations.

The Kansas Private Industry Council of Service Delivery Area III is submitting a modification of its two year Job Training Plan to the governor of the state of Kansas through the Department of Human Resources. Funding for this plan is through Title IIA of the Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA), which is designed to provide training to disadvantaged youth and adults. The respective program years are July 1, 1988, to June 30, 1989, and July 1, 1989, to June 30, 1990.

The funding level for program year 1989 is \$1,699,482. The SDA plans to serve over 500 eligible participants during this program year. The plan modification will become effective July 1, 1989. The purpose of the program is to prepare youth and unskilled adults for entry into the labor force and to afford job training to economically disadvantaged individuals and other individuals facing serious barriers to employment.

The Kansas Private Industry Council of Service Delivery Area III also is submitting to the governor of the state of Kansas, through the Department of Human Resources, a modified Summer Youth Employment and Training Plan, as a sub-part of the Title IIA two-year plan. The respective program years are October 1, 1987, to September 30, 1988, and October 1, 1988 to September 30, 1989.

The funding level for program year 1989 is \$838,229. The SDA plans to serve over 700 eligible youth during this program year. Funding for this plan is through Title IIB of the Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA), which is designed to provide training for disadvantaged youth. The purpose of the proposed programs and activities is to afford job training to economically disadvantaged youths, ages 14-21, facing serious barriers to employment.

The Kansas Private Industry Council of Service Delivery Area III also will submit to the governor through the Department of Human Resources a Title III Economic Dislocation and Worker Adjustment Assistance Plan, as a sub-part of the Title IIA two-year plan. The respective program year will be July 1, 1989, to June 30, 1990.

The funding level for program year 1989 is \$137,298. The SDA plans to serve approximately 40 eligible participants during this program year. The plan will become effective July 1, 1989. The purpose of the program is to reassess and reconfigure services to meet the needs of workers who have been terminated, laid off or have received a notice of termination or layoff due to a permanent closure or substantial layoff at a plant or facility.

There is a 30-day review and comment period for the plan modification.

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment will conduct a public hearing at 10 a.m. Wednesday, May 10, in Room 106 of the Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed permanent regulations concerning adult care homes.

The regulation to be considered, K.A.R. 28-39-87, includes proposed permanent amendments that change the effective date of mandatory licensed nurse staffing at all times from July 1, 1989, to October 1, 1990. It is proposed this be done by adopting federal regulations so that a waiver from the requirement may be granted. The department is also proposing to delete certain medical evaluation requirements for use of restraints applicable only to intermediate care facilities for mental health.

The department does not identify that adult care homes will bear any direct or indirect costs resulting from these amendments.

REGULATIONS****Article 5.—CODE OF PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT**

74-5-202. Auditing standards. (a) A certified public accountant or a licensed municipal public accountant shall not permit his or her name to be associated with financial statements in such a way as to imply that the accountant is acting as an independent certified public accountant or licensed municipal public accountant with respect to the financial statements unless the accountant has complied with the applicable, generally accepted auditing standards.

(b) Statements on auditing standards issued by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, in Volumes A and B, dated June 1, 1988, and the minimum standard audit program of the Kansas state municipal accounting board, shall be considered to be interpretations of the generally accepted auditing standards. Any accountant who does not conform to those standards shall provide justification for such a departure. 74-5-203. Accounting principles. (a) A certified public accountant or a licensed municipal public accountant shall not express an opinion that financial statements are presented in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles if the financial statements contain any departure from those accounting principles that has a material effect on the financial statements taken as a whole. However, any certified public accountant or licensed municipal public accountant may express such an opinion if the accountant can demonstrate that, due to unusual circumstances, the financial statements would otherwise have been misleading. In those cases, the accountant's report shall describe the departure, the approximate effects, if practicable, and the reasons why compliance with the principle would result in a misleading statement.

HOUSE BILL No. 2139

AN ACT concerning fees and salaries in certain counties; amending K.S.A. 28-701 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 28-701 is hereby amended to read as follows: 28-701. That All officers and employees herein mentioned in counties of this state having a population of over one hundred eighty thousand (180,000) and not more than two hundred fifty thousand (250,000) other than counties designated as an urban area by K.S.A. 10-2654, of Wyandotte county shall receive for their services the compensation herein provided.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 28-701 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.
