HEARING ON PROPOSED
ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS**

The Board of Accountancy will conduct a public hearing at 11 a.m. Wednesday, October 11, in conference room 108, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, for the purpose of amending Kansas Administrative Regulation 74-12-1 (fees) to incorporate the \$50 fee established by the board for issuance of temporary permits to practice to out-of-state CPAs to do business in Kansas not incidental to their regular practice in another state.

Adoption of this amendment will comply with H.B. 2384, which was passed by the 1989 Legislature. Since this is the first time the board will have charged and issued temporary permits to out-of-state CPAs to practice in Kansas, it is not known how many applicants will apply; therefore, it is not possible to know how much additional revenue will be generated into the board's fee fund or the state general revenue. The amendment will give the board some control over out-of-state CPAs doing work for the citizens of Kansas where previously there was none.

This notice constitutes a 30-day public written comment period. Anyone wishing to comment about, or to receive a copy of, this proposed regulation amendment may do so by writing to the board at its offices in Suite 907 of the Landon State Office building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka 66612. Anyone wishing to make public comments at the hearing should notify the board office so ample time may be allocated.

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 89-117

**ESTABLISHING THE GOVERNOR'S COMMISSION
ON A PUBLIC AGENDA FOR KANSAS**

WHEREAS, the Special Commission on a Public Agenda for Kansas was created in 1985 to identify issues critical to the future of Kansas and policy choices available to Kansas in responding to those issues;

WHEREAS, the report of the Special Commission, entitled Kansas Policy Choices, has served as a useful guide to state policymakers in analyzing the policy choices facing Kansas;

WHEREAS, the 1989 session of the Kansas Legislature resolved many important, longstanding issues on the legislative agenda, including the enactment of a comprehensive highway program of historic proportions, the establishment of dedicated funding for the state water plan—for the first time in Kansas history, a commitment to build a new, high-security correctional facility—the first since early statehood, and the completion of tax reform—the most significant overhaul of the state income tax since its enactment fifty years ago;

WHEREAS, the resolution of major policy issues on the legislative agenda now makes it timely to look forward, to begin identifying those issues which should comprise the Kansas agenda in the years ahead, and to initiate discussion on those issues;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, MIKE HAYDEN, Governor of the State of Kansas, in order to initiate timely identification and discussion of the issues which should comprise the future public agenda for Kansas, do hereby establish the Governor's Commission on a Public Agenda for Kansas and charge this Commission with the following assignments:

1. to identify issues critical to the future of Kansas;
2. to solicit views from the public at large on what these public issues are;
3. to identify policy choices available to Kansas in responding to these issues;
4. to draw upon leadership and expertise within Kansas to analyze these public issues and policy choices; and
5. to report the findings of the Commission by August 15, 1990.

Membership of the Governor's Commission shall be limited to nineteen Kansans broadly representative of the Kansas citizenry. Members of the Governor's Commission shall serve without compensation. Travel expenses of the members shall be reimbursed in accordance with applicable regulations for expenses incurred in connection with their service on the Commission. Appointments to the Commission shall take effect by official certificate of appointment signed by the Governor and filed with the Secretary of State.

The Governor shall chair the Commission and the Lieutenant Governor shall be the vice-chairman.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 89-117.

NOTICE OF HEARING ON PROPOSED ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS

A public hearing will be conducted at 9:30 a.m. Monday, October 9, in Conference Room A of the Kansas State Board of Agriculture, 109 S.W. 9th, Topeka, at which time all interested persons will have an opportunity to be heard regarding the adoption of proposed permanent rules and regulations of the Kansas State Board of Agriculture. The proposed permanent rules and regulations will become effective 45 days after their publication in the *Kansas Register* unless a specified date is contained in the regulation.

All interested persons may attend the hearing and those attending will be given an opportunity to express comments either orally or in writing, or both. In addition, the period of at least 30 days notice constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving public comments on the proposed rules and regulations.

Written comments and requests for copies of the regulations and the complete economic impact statement should be sent to Kenneth M. Wilke, Chief Counsel, Kansas State Board of Agriculture, 109 S.W. 9th, Topeka 66612, at or before the time of the hearing. If you intend to present testimony in person at the hearing, prior notice to this office would be helpful in arranging the agenda. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

A summary of the proposed regulations is as follows:

K.A.R. 4-8-27 will update the "official musk thistle control program" adopted by reference by the agency.

K.A.R. 4-8-29 will update the "official field bindweed control program" adopted by reference by the agency.

K.A.R. 4-7-900 specifies contents of a complaint for assessment of a civil penalty.

K.A.R. 4-7-901 specifies contents of an answer to the complaint.

K.A.R. 4-7-902 specifies ranges for amount of civil penalty for violations of K.S.A. 65-701 *et seq.*

K.A.R. 4-7-903 specifies criteria for setting dollar amount of proposed civil penalty.

K.A.R. 4-7-904 provides for informal settlement in civil penalty cases.

K.A.R. 4-7-905 provides for adjustment of amount of civil penalty.

Regarding the implementation of K.A.R. 4-8-27 and K.A.R. 4-8-29, there will be minimal, if any, fiscal or economic impact on this agency, other governmental agencies, individuals, private businesses or the general public.

Regarding the proposed civil penalty regulations, K.A.R. 4-7-900, 4-7-901, 4-7-902, 4-7-903, 4-7-904, and 4-7-905, there should be no economic impact on the State Board of Agriculture, other governmental agencies, private businesses, individuals or the general public except those dairy manufacturing plants against which civil penalties are assessed or are proposed to be assessed.

KANSAS INSURANCE DEPARTMENT

PERMANENT ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS

Article 3.—FIRE AND CASUALTY INSURANCE

40-3-42. Title insurance; unfair inducements; prohibited acts. (a) As used in this regulation:

(1) "Title entity" means a title insurance company, title insurance agent, title insurance agency or any other organization directly involved in the sale, underwriting, or servicing of title insurance.

(2) "Producer of title business" means any natural person, firm, association, organization, partnership, business trust, corporation, or other legal entity engaged in this state in the trade, business, occupation, or profession of:

(A) buying or selling interests in real property;

(B) making loans secured by interests in real property;

or

(C) acting as broker, agent, representative, or attorney of natural persons or other legal entities that buy or sell interests in real property or that lend money with such interests as security.

(b) The following acts constitute rebates or unlawful inducements in the marketing of title insurance on property located in this state:

(1) The disbursement, on behalf of a customer or prospective customer, of funds prior to the actual deposit thereof with the escrow or closing agent;

(2) disbursement of escrow funds before the conditions of the escrow have been met;

(3) making a charge for any title commitment which does not have a reasonable relation to the cost of production of the commitment or is less than the minimum fee or charge for the type of policy applied for, as set forth in the agent's filed schedule of fees and charges. This provision does not apply where a title commitment is furnished in good faith in furtherance of a bona fide sale, purchase or loan transaction which for good reason is not consummated;

(4) paying a producer of title business to make an inspection of property;

(5) any transaction in which any person receives, or is to receive, securities of the title entity at prices below the normal market price, or bonds or debentures which guarantee a higher than normal interest rate, whether or not the consummation of the transaction is directly or indirectly related to the number of escrows or title orders coming to the title entity through the efforts of such person;

(6) charging a subdivision discount rate which is not applicable in the particular transaction because the vol-

ume required to qualify for the discount includes ineligible lots or parcels;

(7) paying for, or offering to pay for, the cancellation fee, the fee for the preliminary title report or other fee on behalf of any producer of title business before or after inducing such producer of title business to cancel an order with another title entity;

(8) giving, receiving or guaranteeing, or offering to give, receive or guarantee, either directly or indirectly, any loan with any producer of title business, regardless of the terms of the note or guarantee;

(9) guaranteeing, or offering to guarantee, the performance of escrow services or any other undertaking by any producer of title business;

(10) providing, or offering to provide, either directly or indirectly, a "compensating balance" or deposit in a lending institution either for the express or implied purpose of influencing the extension of credit by such lending institution to any producer of title business, or for the express or implied purpose of influencing the placement or channeling of title insurance business by such lending institution;

(11) paying for, or offering to pay for, the fees or charges of an outside professional including but not limited to an attorney, engineer, appraiser, or surveyor whose services are required by any producer of title business to structure or complete a particular transaction;

(12) providing, or offering to provide, without reasonable charge non-title services including but not limited to escrow services, computerized bookkeeping, forms management, computer programming, or any similar benefit to any producer of title business;

(13) furnishing, or offering to furnish, without reasonable charge all or any part of the time or productive effort of any employee of the title entity including but not limited to office manager, escrow officer, secretary, clerk or messenger to any producer of title business. However, messenger service normally provided by a title entity in the ordinary course of its title insurance business shall not constitute a violation of this provision;

(14) paying for, or offering to pay for, all or any part of the salary of an employee of any producer of title business;

(15) paying for, or offering to pay for, the salary or any part of the salary of a relative of any producer of title business which payment is in excess of the reasonable value of work performed by such relative on behalf of the title entity;

(16) paying, or offering to pay, any fee to any producer of title business for making an inspection or appraisal of property unless the fee bears a reasonable relationship to the services performed;

(17) paying for, or offering to pay for, services by any producer of title business which services are required to be performed by the producer of title business or title agency in his or her capacity as a real estate or mortgage broker or salesman or agent including but not limited to the drafting of documents that are required for the initiation of an escrow;

(18) furnishing or offering to furnish, paying for or offering to pay for, furniture, office supplies, telephones,

(continued)

facsimile machines, computer and other business equipment or automobile to any producer of title business, or paying for, or offering to pay for, any portion of the cost of renting, leasing, operating or maintaining any of the aforementioned items;

(19) paying for, furnishing, or waiving, or offering to pay for, furnish, or waive, all or any part of the rent for space occupied by any producer of title business;

(20) renting, or offering to rent space:

(A) from any producer of title business that does not serve a necessary purpose;

(B) at a rental rate which is excessive when compared with rental rates for comparable space in the geographic area; or

(C) paying, or offering to pay, rent based in whole or in part on the volume of business generated by any producer of title business;

(21) furnishing or offering to furnish, paying for or offering to pay for, any economic opportunity, gift, gratuity, special discount, favor, hospitality, or service to any producer of title business having an aggregate value of \$25 or more in any calendar year where a purpose of the donor is to influence any producer of title business in the placement of channeling of title insurance business. Hospitality in the form of incidental food and beverages are presumed not to be given to influence such producer of title business in the placement or channeling of title insurance business except when a particular transaction is conditioned thereon;

(22) paying for, or offering to pay for, money prizes or other things of value for any producer of title business in any kind of a contest or promotional endeavor. This prohibition applies whether or not the offer or payment of a benefit relates to the number of title orders placed or escrows opened with a title entity or group of such entities;

(23) paying for, or offering to pay for, any advertising for the benefit of the title entity through any advertising medium, the end result of which is the substantial subsidization of a product, service or publication used by, or published or printed by or for the benefit of, any producer of title business, building or financing businesses or any association or group of such persons. In determining whether there has been a violation of this subsection "substantial subsidization" will exist whenever 50 percent or more of the advertising revenue or printing costs, whichever is less, of any pamphlet, program, announcement, register, directory, index, book, brochure, periodical, newsletter, bulletin, information sheet or printed matter of any kind intended for distribution or circulation is paid for by one or more title entities;

(24) paying for, or furnishing, or offering to pay for or furnish, any advertising effort made in the name of, for, or on behalf of, any producer of title business through any advertising medium, whether or not the advertising is used, or is intended to be used, in connection with the promotion, sale or encumbrance of real property;

(25) paying for or furnishing, or offering to pay for or furnish, any business form to any producer of title business other than a form regularly used in the conduct of the title entity's business;

(26) giving of trading stamps, cash redemption coupons

or similar items to any producer of title business;

(27) advancing or paying into escrow, or offering to advance or pay into escrow, any of the title entity funds;

(28) buying from or selling to, or exchange with, or offering to buy from or sell to, or exchange with, any producer of title business, shares of stock, promissory notes or other securities in any title entity or any other business concern owned by, or affiliated with, a title entity, regardless of the price or relative value except for purchases or exchanges made through a general public offering. This prohibition also applies to the furnishing, or offer to furnish, legal or other professional services by any title entity to any producer of title business or group of persons to assist such producer(s) of title business in the formation of a title entity. The burden will be placed on any existing title entity that invests in a title entity formed by one or more of such producer(s) of title business to show that such investment does not represent a benefit coming within the prohibition of this subsection; or

(29) charging, contracting or offering to contract with any producer of title business to perform services for which the title entity is making a charge either directly or indirectly. (Authorized by K.S.A. 40-103 and 40-2404a; implementing K.S.A. 40-2404(14) as amended by L. 1989, Ch. 139, Sec. 1; effective Oct. 23, 1989.)

Article 56.—IGNITION
INTERLOCK DEVICES

92-56-1. Ignition interlock device; application for certification. (a) Each manufacturer of an ignition interlock device desiring to market the device in this state shall apply to the division of vehicles for certification of the device. Each manufacturer shall submit a separate application for each model of the device that varies in any manner of operation. Only devices certified by the division may be used in this state. The manufacturer shall provide the following information:

- (1) The name and address of the manufacturer;
- (2) the name and model number of the device;
- (3) a general description of the device, including instructions for installation and operation;
- (4) a detailed description of the accuracy of the device, its data collection, security, and tamper detection systems, and any other information affecting the operation of the device;
- (5) a general description of the manufacturer's partial service plans for distribution of the device within the state;
- (6) an affidavit from the manufacturer stating that the device offered for use within the state complies with all requirements of the regulations in this article;

(7) the name of an insurance carrier authorized to do business in this state which has committed to issue a liability insurance policy for the manufacturer in the amounts specified in K.A.R. 92-56-2; and

(8) an affidavit containing evidence that the device will function properly under the climatic conditions present in the state.

(b) Each certification issued by the division shall continue in effect until the manufacturer requests in writing that the certification be discontinued or until the division informs the manufacturer in writing that the certification is suspended or revoked. If a manufacturer modifies a certified device, the manufacturer shall notify the division of the exact nature of the modification. An application for recertification of the device may be required by the division.

(c) Each manufacturer of a certified device shall notify the division of the failure of any device to function as designed. The manufacturer shall provide an explanation of the reasons for the failure and shall identify the actions taken by the manufacturer to correct the malfunctions. Reports required by this subsection shall be filed with the division on January 1 and July 1 of each year. (Authorized by K.S.A. 8-234b; implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 8-1016; effective Oct. 23, 1989.)

92-56-2. Insurance; policy limits. (a) Each manufacturer submitting an application for certification of a device shall obtain a policy of product liability insurance from a carrier authorized to do business in the state of Kansas. The policy shall contain minimum liability limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence with an aggregate coverage of \$3,000,000. The policy of insurance shall cover all liability arising from defects in design and materials including the manufacture of the device, its calibration, installation and removal.

(b) Each insurance carrier shall provide 30 days notice to the division prior to cancelling any policy of insurance.

(c) The cancellation of insurance coverage by a carrier shall be a basis for revoking the certification for the device. (Authorized by K.S.A. 8-234b; implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 8-1016; effective Oct. 23, 1989.)

92-56-3. Calibration standards; installation. (a) Each device installed at the direction of a court pursuant to K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 8-1013 *et seq.* and amendments shall satisfy the following criteria.

(1) The device shall be designed and constructed to measure a person's breath alcohol concentration by utilizing a sample of the person's breath blown directly into the device.

(2) The device shall be designed and constructed in such a manner as to disable the motor vehicle's starter each time the device registers a breath alcohol concentration in a person's breath sample of greater than .04.

(3) The device shall not affect the normal operation of the vehicle once the vehicle has been started.

(b) Each device approved by the division shall be installed by the manufacturer or vendor in accordance with the instructions provided by the manufacturer. Each person installing the device shall inform the court which authorized the installation of the device of the date upon which the device was installed and the dates upon which the device is to be inspected and calibrated, if necessary.

(Authorized by K.S.A. 8-234b; implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 8-1016; effective Oct. 23, 1989.)

92-56-4. Inspection and Calibration. (a) Each device certified by the division shall be calibrated bi-monthly to the specifications of the manufacturer. The calibration shall be performed by the manufacturer or an agent of the manufacturer. An inspection and calibration record shall be maintained by the manufacturer or person installing the device. The following information shall be maintained in the record:

- (1) The name of the person performing the calibration;
- (2) the date of the inspection and calibration;
- (3) the method by which the calibration was performed;
- (4) an identification of the device calibrated;
- (5) a description of the vehicle in which the device is installed, including license plate number, make, model, year and color; and

(6) a statement by the installer indicating whether there is any evidence that attempts have been made to circumvent the device.

(b) Each person restricted to driving a vehicle equipped with an ignition interlock device shall keep a copy of the inspection and calibration records in the vehicle at all times. The record shall be readily available for presentation to the court authorizing the use of the device. The manufacturer shall retain the original records for each current program participant. (Authorized by K.S.A. 8-234b; implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 8-1016; effective Oct. 23, 1989.)

92-56-5. Revocation of Certification. (a) A certification for any device may be revoked if:

(1) The device fails to comply with specifications set forth by the division;

(2) the policy of product liability insurance required by K.A.R. 92-56-2 and amendments is cancelled or nonrenewed;

(3) the manufacturer has failed to make adequate provisions for the maintenance, inspection, calibration and repair of installed devices;

(4) the manufacturer has failed to comply with any of the requirements imposed by the division;

(5) the manufacturer is no longer in the business of manufacturing devices; or

(6) the manufacturer fails to pay the cost of the initial testing of the device to insure compliance with specifications.

(b) Each manufacturer shall reimburse any cost incurred by the division in approving or disapproving the device. (Authorized by K.S.A. 8-234b; implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 8-1016; effective Oct. 23, 1989.)

Article 1.—CEREAL MALT BEVERAGES

116-1-1. Definitions. (a) "Fairgrounds" means the property owned by the State of Kansas generally referred to as the Kansas state fairgrounds, located in the City of Hutchinson, Reno County, Kansas.

(b) "Board" means the Kansas state fair board.

(c) "General manager" means the general manager of the Kansas state fair.

(d) "Cereal malt beverage" means any fermented but undistilled liquor brewed or made from malt or from a mixture of malt or malt substitute, but does not include any such liquor which is more than 3.2% alcohol by weight.

(e) "Retailer" means any person who sells or offers for sale any cereal malt beverage for use or consumption and not for resale in any form and who has contracted with the Board for a space contract.

(f) "Space contract" means a contract between a retailer and the board for space or a location that has been designated as a space or location on the fairgrounds for the sale and consumption of cereal malt beverages. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-523; effective T-116-8-22-89, Aug. 22, 1989.)

116-1-2. Sale and consumption of cereal malt beverages on fairgrounds. (a) Cereal malt beverages shall be sold or consumed or both on the fairgrounds only at spaces or locations designated by the board through its general manager.

(b) Applicants for a space contract to sell cereal malt beverages on the fairgrounds shall complete an application on a form prepared and provided by the board.

(c) Applicants for a space contract to sell cereal malt beverages on the fairgrounds shall hold a retailer's license issued by the city of Hutchinson to sell cereal malt beverages.

(d) Retailers who hold a space contract with the board shall comply with all Kansas statutes and administrative regulations concerning cereal malt beverages.

(e) No person shall possess or consume cereal malt beverages on the fairgrounds except at those spaces or locations designated on the fairgrounds for that purpose. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-523; effective T-116-8-22-89, Aug. 22, 1989.)

Article 2.—FAIRGROUNDS

116-2-1. Pets. (a) No dogs, cats, or other pets, except seeing-eye dogs, shall be permitted on the fairgrounds during the annual state fair, except in areas designated by the board. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-523; effective T-116-8-22-89, Aug. 22, 1989.)

Article 7.—CRIME VICTIMS ASSISTANCE GRANTS

16-7-1. Definitions. (a) "Crime victims assistance fund" means the fund created by 1989 HB 2200, §29.

(b) "Grant funds" means funds credited to the crime victims assistance fund and available for support of existing programs or assistance in establishing new programs which provide services to the victims of crime. Grant funds do not include monies in the crime victims assistance fund set aside by the victims' rights coordinator to fund programs having statewide impact.

(c) "Program period" means the period for which each program is funded with monies from the crime victims assistance fund, normally 12 months (one fiscal year) unless special consideration is requested and approved.

(d) "Victims' rights coordinator" means the individual appointed by the attorney general to administer the crime victims assistance fund pursuant to 1989 HB 2200, §32. (Authorized by and implementing H.B. 2200, §29; effective T-16-8-22-89, Aug. 22, 1989.)

16-7-2. Application deadlines. (a) Applications for grants during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1990 shall be submitted to the victims' rights coordinator on or before November 1, 1989. Applicants demonstrating need to the satisfaction of the grant committee may be granted emergency funding before the November 1 deadline.

(b) Beginning with the fiscal year July 1, 1990 through June 30, 1991, each grant application shall be submitted to the victims' rights coordinator no later than 60 days before the beginning of each fiscal year.

(c) Applications for receipt of unobligated grant monies remaining in the victims assistance fund after the initial annual grant pursuant to subsections (a) or (b) may be submitted at any time. (Authorized by 1989 HB 2200, §29; implementing 1989 HB 2200, §§29, 32; effective T-16-8-22-89, Aug. 22, 1989.)

16-7-3. Application requirements. (a) Each grant application shall include:

(1) a summary cover page;

(2) a program narrative;

(3) a budget summary;

(4) a budget narrative;

(5) certified assurances;

(6) any evidence of local government support (preferably including support of the district or county attorney in the area to be served);

(7) an audit schedule; and

(8) a designation of the applicant's EEO contact.

(b) Each summary cover page shall provide quick reference to important elements of the grant application.

(c) Each program narrative shall address:

(1) needs assessment and documentation;

(2) program expectations;

(3) program methodology;

(4) program monitoring and evaluations;

(5) audit concerns;

- (6) community support of program activities;
- (7) staffing patterns; and
- (8) dissemination of victims' rights information. (Authorized by 1989 HB 2200, §29; implementing 1989 HB 2200, §§29, 32; effective T-16-8-22-89, Aug. 22, 1989.)

16-7-4. Application review. (a) Each grant application shall be evaluated using the following criteria:

- (1) the degree to which the proposal focuses on the problems of victims of crime;
- (2) the quality of the needs assessment and documentation in terms of proposed services for victims;
- (3) the record of successful implementation of services to the victims of crime through this or similar programs;
- (4) the degree of community support for the program;
- (5) the adequacy of budget information;
- (6) the efficacy of evaluative components, both programmatic and fiscal; and
- (7) any receipt of other state assistance.

(b) The crime victims coordinator may require an applicant to be present during the application review process to provide necessary clarification of the application. (Authorized by 1989 HB 2200, §29; implementing 1989 HB 2200, §§29, 32; effective T-16-8-22-89, Aug. 22, 1989.)

16-7-5. Notification of decision. (a) Each applicant applying for grant funds before the fiscal year ending June 30, 1990 shall be notified in writing of the grant decision on or before December 1, 1989, except each applicant applying for grant funds pursuant to the emergency provisions of subsection (a) of K.A.R. 16-7-2 or pursuant to subsection (c) of K.A.R. 16-7-2 shall be notified not later than 15 days after the date on which the application is reviewed.

(b) Beginning with the fiscal year July 1, 1990 through June 30, 1991, each applicant shall be notified in writing of the grant decision not later than 30 days before the beginning of each fiscal year, except applicants applying for grant funds pursuant to subsection (c) of K.A.R. 16-7-2 shall be notified not later than 15 days after the date on which the application is reviewed. (Authorized by 1989 HB 2200, §29; implementing 1989 HB 2200, §§29, 32; effective T-16-8-22-89, Aug. 22, 1989.)

16-7-6. Funding limits. (a) Each applicant may receive up to \$25,000 in grant funds, but no more than 50 percent of the applicant's total budget before the grant award.

(b) Funds not attributable to grant awards, at least 25 percent of the program budget, may emanate from local appropriations or federal grants; however, federal funds may only be used for match if unmatched by state funds. Other state funds shall not be used to match grant funds awarded from the crime victims assistance fund. The required match must be in cash. (Authorized by 1989 HB 2200, §29; implementing 1989 HB 2200, §§29, 32; effective T-16-8-22-89, Aug. 22, 1989.)

16-7-7. Limitations on fund use. (a) Grant funds may be used to enhance or expand existing programs or to create new programs.

(b) Grant funds shall not supplant other state or local funding.

(c) Grant funds shall not be used to offset more than 75 percent of the proposed program.

(d) Grant funds shall not be used for any of the following:

- (1) purchase of equipment and hardware unless necessary and incidental to the program's success;
- (2) general salaries and personnel costs unless necessary and incidental to the program's success;
- (3) costs of construction or land acquisition;
- (4) ineffective programs which offer a low probability of improving services to the victims of crime as determined by fiscal and programmatic audits;
- (5) indirect costs; or
- (6) administrative costs including costs incurred in:
 - (A) applying for the grant funds;
 - (B) administering the grant funds; and
 - (C) auditing the program funded by the grant. (Authorized by 1989 HB 2200, §29; implementing 1989 HB 2200, §§29, 32; effective T-16-8-22-89, Aug. 22, 1989.)

16-7-8. Reporting requirements. (a) Each grant recipient shall submit to the victims' rights coordinator:

(1) quarterly expenditure reports providing fiscal information on expenditures during the previous three-month period; and

(2) a program narrative report providing a narrative description of program activities during the program period.

(b) Each grant recipient shall submit a quarterly expenditure report within 30 days after the close of each calendar quarter, on March 31, June 30, September 30 and December 31.

(c) Each grant recipient shall submit a program narrative report within 30 days after the close of the fiscal year.

(d) Each grant recipient shall submit to the victims' rights coordinator, at least 30 days before actual need, cash draw down reports to request advancement of approved grant funds.

(e) Each grant recipient shall maintain program receipts for a period of three years after the close of the program period. (Authorized by 1989 HB 2200, §29; implementing 1989 HB 2200, §§29, 32; effective T-16-8-22-89, Aug. 22, 1989.)

16-7-9. Grant committee. A committee of nine persons, appointed by and including the attorney general, may assist the attorney general in determining applicant awards from the crime victims assistance fund. The grant committee shall be chaired by the attorney general or his designee. (Authorized by and implementing 1989 HB 2200, §29; effective T-16-8-22-89, Aug. 22, 1989.)

Article 4.—INDIVIDUAL GAME RULES

111-4-100. Name of Drawing. The Kansas Lottery shall conduct a series of instant ticket drawings entitled "State Fair Drawings." The dates of the drawings shall coincide with the 1989 Kansas State Fair in Hutchinson, Kansas. The times and dates of the drawings shall be as follows:

111-4-101. Definitions. (a) All definitions contained in the Kansas lottery act (K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 84-98-1 *et seq.*) and lottery regulations are hereby incorporated by reference and govern unless otherwise indicated.

(b) "Kansas State Fair" or "State Fair" means the annual fair held in Hutchinson, Kansas, scheduled in 1989 from September 8 through 17, 1989.

(c) "Kansas Lottery State Fair Drawings" or "State Fair Drawings" means the acts of drawing prizes conducted by the Kansas Lottery at the state fair in which participants are selected to win various prizes as described in K.A.R. 111-4-104.

(d) "Co-sponsor drawings" means an act of drawing for prizes which may be held at the state fair subsequent to the "State Fair Drawings."

(e) "Co-sponsor(s)" means the person, retailer or organization designated by the executive director to assist in organizing the "Kansas Lottery State Fair Drawings."

(f) "Non-winning ticket" means any valid Kansas instant game lottery ticket not eligible to win a prize under any instant game rules.

(g) "Receptacle" or "drum" means a container in which non-winning Kansas instant game lottery tickets are placed and from which the "State Fair Drawings" are made. Receptacles or drums shall be sealable and capable of being rotated for the purpose of mixing.

(h) "Bare arm technique" means a type of drawing where the person drawing the winning ticket from the receptacle or drum wears a short-sleeved (sleeve not extending past the elbow) or a no-sleeve shirt which exposes the drawer's bare arm. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-8710; effective T-111-9-7-88, Sept. 7, 1988; amended T-111-8-24-89, Aug. 18, 1989.)

111-4-102. Location of Drawings. "State Fair Drawings" shall be held in the Kansas Lottery building on the state fairgrounds in Hutchinson, Kansas, from September

8 through September 17, 1989. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-8710; effective T-111-9-7-88, Sept. 7, 1988; amended T-111-8-24-89, Aug. 18, 1989.)

111-4-104. Prizes. The winners selected at the 2:00 p.m. and 6:00 p.m. "State Fair Drawing" locations on September 8-17 shall receive one hundred dollars (\$100). The winner selected at the 6:00 p.m. "State Fair Drawing" on Saturday, September 9, 1989, and the 8:00 p.m. "State Fair Drawing" on Wednesday, September 13, 1989, and the 6:00 p.m. "State Fair Drawing" on Saturday, September 16, 1989, shall receive one-thousand dollars (\$1,000). All prize awards are subject to lottery validation, set offs and deductions as provided by law. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-8710; effective T-111-9-7-88, September 7, 1988; amended T-111-8-24-89, Aug. 18, 1989.)

111-4-105. Entry into Drawing. Entry into the "State Fair Drawing" is accomplished by the process detailed in the following sub-paragraphs:

(a) Obtain a valid Kansas instant lottery ticket;

(b) Determine if the ticket is a winning ticket in accordance with any instant game rules. If the ticket is a winning ticket, it is not eligible for the "State Fair Drawing" and shall be redeemed in accordance with the instant game rules;

(c) If the ticket is a valid non-winning ticket, the ticket is eligible for winning the drawing and the holder of the ticket may enter the "State Fair Drawings."

(d) The holder of the non-winning ticket must complete the information form on the back of the ticket in a legible manner and sign it. Unsigned tickets shall not be considered valid entries in any drawing conducted by the lottery;

(e) The holder of the non-winning ticket must take the non-winning ticket with the completed information form to the location of the "State Fair Drawing" and place it in the receptacle provided;

(f) The receptacle or drum shall be available and entries may be made at the following times:

(g) The holder of the ticket must personally attend the "State Fair Drawing" and be present at the time of the drawing to be determined a winner;

(h) The drawing will be conducted at the approximate times listed in K.A.R. 111-4-100.

(i) There is no limit to the number of entries a participant may make. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-8710(b); effective T-111-9-7-88, Sept. 7, 1988; amended T-111-8-24-89, Aug. 18, 1989.)

111-4-160. Entry into Trip Drawing. (a) A player whose instant ticket reveals three matching jet symbols after the latex covering the play area has been removed qualifies for a drawing to determine winners for a trip and cash worth \$7,000.

(b) Drawings of valid entry tickets shall take place on Thursdays at Lottery Headquarters starting June 22 through Thursday, August 31, 1989, winners will be notified by the Lottery. A twelfth and final drawing will be held two weeks after the announced end of game date.

(c) The holder of a winning "Jet" ticket must fill in the information requested on the back of the ticket and mail entry ticket to "James Bond Vacation," c/o Kansas Lottery, P.O. Box 0007, Topeka, KS 66652. Entry tickets shall not be mailed to the Lottery in "Grand Prize Draw" envelopes. All valid entry tickets received will be included in the next scheduled drawing following receipt. Deadline for entries into trip drawing shall be 12:00 o'clock noon on the second Tuesday following the announced end of game. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-8710(b)&(c); implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-8710(b)&(c) and 74-8720; effective T-111-8-24-89, Aug. 18, 1989.)

111-4-181. Name of Game. The Kansas Lottery shall conduct an instant winner lottery game entitled "The Money Game" commencing on August 24, 1989. The specific rules for the "The Money Game" are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-181 through 111-4-184. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-8710; effective T-111-8-24-89, Aug. 18, 1989.)

111-4-182. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "The Money Game" instant lottery game:

(a) "Play symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the play symbols are printed in black ink in 10 pt. Archer. A play symbol appears in each of six play spots within the play area. Each play symbol for this instant game is one of the following: FREE - \$2 - \$5 - \$10 - \$15 - \$20 - \$50 - \$5,000.

(b) "Play symbol captions" are the words or portions of words printed beneath each play symbol in the play area and are used to repeat or explain the play symbol. The play symbol caption associated with each play symbol is as follows:

(c) "Ticket validation number" means a unique number appearing on each ticket which is used to validate winning tickets. For this instant game, the ticket validation number is a 10-digit number which appears under the "Void If Removed" spot on the bottom right center portion of the front of each instant ticket.

(d) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. For this instant game, the book-ticket number is an 8-digit book number followed by a dash and than a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000 and end with 299. The book-ticket number is printed in black ink on the bottom right portion of the front of each instant game ticket.

(e) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. In this instant game, the retailer validation code is a two letter code printed and appearing in two of five varying locations among the play symbols. The codes and their meanings are as follows: AA = FREE TICKET; DD \$2.00; KK = \$5.00; JJ = \$10.00; HH = \$15.00; NN = \$20.00. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-8710; effective T-111-8-24-89, Aug. 18, 1989.)

111-4-183. Determination of Instant Prize Winners. An instant prize winner is determined for this instant game when the player removes or "scratches off" the removable layer of material covering the play area to reveal the six play symbols and captions. If any three play symbols match, the player wins a prize. Prizes a player may win are as follows:

This is done by marking one of the multi-draw boxes designated by 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, or 10 on the play slip. The additional draw period(s) for which the ticket is valid will then appear on the computer generated ticket given to the player by the retailer.

(b) A player must pay an additional \$1.00 per two (2) boards for each additional drawing in which he or she wishes to play.

(c) Starting September 13, 1989, unless one of the multi-draw boxes is marked and the additional amount paid, the play will only be eligible for the current drawing up to 7:59 p.m. the day of the drawing.

The date of "Drawings" will coincide with the on-line Cash Lotto game of the Kansas Lottery and shall take place on Wednesdays and Saturdays between 8:16 p.m. and 8:45 p.m. Central Daylight Time during the state fair in Hutchinson, Kansas. Bond Details

The bonds will consist of fully registered bonds without coupons in the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof. The bonds will be dated October 1, 1989, and will become due serially on October 1 in the years as follows:

The bonds will bear interest at rates to be determined when the bonds are sold as hereinafter provided, which interest will be payable semiannually on April 1 and October 1 in each year, beginning on April 1, 1990.

Place of Payment and Bond Registration

The principal of and interest on the bonds will be payable in lawful money of the United States of America by check or draft of the Kansas State Treasurer, Topeka, Kansas (the paying agent and bond registrar). The principal of the bonds will be payable at maturity or upon earlier redemption to the registered owners upon presentation and surrender of the bonds at the office of the paying agent. Interest on the bonds will be paid by check or draft mailed by the paying agent to the persons in whose names the bonds are registered on the registration books maintained by the bond registrar at the close of business on the record date for such interest, which shall be the 15th day (whether or not a business day) of the calendar month next preceding such interest payment date.

The city will pay for the fees of the bond registrar for registration and transfer of the bonds and will also pay for printing a reasonable supply of registered bond blanks. Any additional costs or fees that might be incurred in the secondary market, other than fees of the bond registrar, will be the responsibility of the bondholders.

Redemption of Bonds Prior to Maturity

At the option of the city, bonds maturing on October 1, 1998, and thereafter will be subject to redemption and payment prior to maturity on October 1, 1997, and thereafter in whole or in part on any interest payment date (bonds of less than a single maturity to be selected by lot in multiples of \$5,000 principal amount by the paying agent and bond registrar in such equitable manner as it shall designate), at the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest to the redemption date, without premium.

Whenever the city is to select the bonds for the purpose of redemption, it shall, in the case of bonds in denominations greater than \$5,000, if less than all of the bonds then outstanding are to be called for redemption, treat each \$5,000 of face value of each such fully registered bond as though it were a separate bond of the denomination of \$5,000.

If the city shall elect to call any bond for redemption and payment prior to the maturity thereof, the city shall give written notice of its intention to redeem and pay said bonds on a specified date, the same being described by number and maturity, said notice to be mailed by United States registered or certified mail addressed to the registered owners of said bonds, to the paying agent and bond registrar, and to the manager or managers of the underwriting account making the successful bid, each of said notices to be mailed at least 30 days prior to the redemption date. If any bond be called for redemption and payment as aforesaid, all interest on such bond shall

cease from and after the date for which such call is made, provided funds are available for its payment at the price hereinbefore specified.

Conditions of Bids

Proposals will be received on the bonds bearing such rate or rates of interest as may be specified by the bidders, subject to the following conditions: The same rate shall apply to all bonds of the same maturity. Each interest rate specified shall be a multiple of $\frac{1}{8}$ or $\frac{1}{20}$ of 1 percent. No interest rate shall exceed the index of treasury bonds published by the weekly *Credit Markets* in New York, New York, on the Monday next preceding the day on which the bonds are sold, plus 2 percent. The difference between the highest rate specified and the lowest rate specified shall not exceed 2 percent. No supplemental interest payments will be authorized. No bid of less than the principal amount of the bonds and accrued interest will be considered. Each bid shall specify the total interest cost to the city during the life of the bond issue on the basis of such bid, the premium, if any, offered by the bidder, and the net interest cost to the city on the basis of such bid. Each bid shall also specify the average annual net interest rate to the city on the basis of such bid. Bidders shall specify in the bid form the prices (exclusive of accrued interest), expressed as a dollar price, at which the bidder intends that each maturity amount of the bonds shall be initially offered to the public (the initial reoffering prices).

Basis of Award

The award of the bonds will be made on the basis of the lowest net interest cost to the city, which will be determined by subtracting the amount of the premium bid, if any, from the total interest cost to the city. If there is any discrepancy between the net interest cost and the average annual net interest rate specified, the specified net interest cost shall govern and the interest rates specified in the bid shall be adjusted accordingly. If two or more proper bids providing for identical amounts for the lowest net interest cost are received, the city shall determine which bid, if any, shall be accepted, and its determination shall be final.

Authorization, Purpose and Security for the Bonds

The bonds are being authorized and issued to permanently finance various internal improvements to the city. The bonds will be general obligations of the city, a portion of which is payable as to both principal and interest in part from special assessments levied upon specially benefited property and, if not so paid, from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limitation upon all the taxable tangible property, real and personal, within the territorial limits of the city. The balance of the principal of and interest on the bonds is payable from ad valorem taxes which may be levied, without limitation as to rate or amount on all the taxable tangible property, real and personal, within the territorial limits of the city.

Internal Revenue Code of 1986

The Internal Revenue Code of 1986 imposes requirements on the city that must be met subsequent to the issuance of the bonds by the city and, as a result, the

city will and does hereby covenant that it will diligently undertake those steps necessary to maintain the tax-exempt status of the bonds. The city's failure to comply with such requirements could adversely affect the tax-exempt status of the bonds. Purchasers of the bonds should be aware that should the bonds lose their status as tax-exempt obligations as a result of the city's failure to comply with such requirements, the bonds are neither callable nor will the rate of interest on the bonds be adjusted to reflect such circumstances.

The code includes interest on tax-exempt obligations, such as the bonds, in the adjusted net book income of certain corporations for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1986, and includes, through 1989, in the calculation of alternative minimum taxable income one-half of the excess of a corporation's adjusted net book income over its alternative minimum taxable income (determined without regard to this adjustment and prior to reduction for certain net operating losses). After 1989, the use of "book income" will be replaced by "adjusted current earnings," with certain other adjustments. Furthermore, Section 59A of the code, as added by the Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act of 1986, provides for a new environmental tax generally based on corporate alternative minimum taxable income. The amount of the tax is equal to 0.12 percent of the excess of alternative minimum taxable income, without regard to net operating losses and the deduction for this tax, over \$2 million. The environmental tax is imposed whether or not the taxpayer is subject to the alternative minimum tax. The environmental tax, which is effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1986, may subject certain bondowners to additional taxation for interest earned on the bonds.

The code also requires property and casualty insurance companies, for taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 1987, to reduce the amount of their deductible underwriting losses by a percentage of the amount of tax-exempt interest received or accrued on obligations acquired after August 7, 1986.

With the exception of certain "qualified tax-exempt obligations," the code provides that banks and thrift institutions may not deduct any portion of the interest cost of purchasing or carrying tax-exempt obligations such as the bonds if such interest cost is incurred in taxable years ending after December 31, 1986, with respect to obligations acquired after August 7, 1986. The city does not intend to designate the bonds as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" under Section 265 of the code.

Legal Opinion

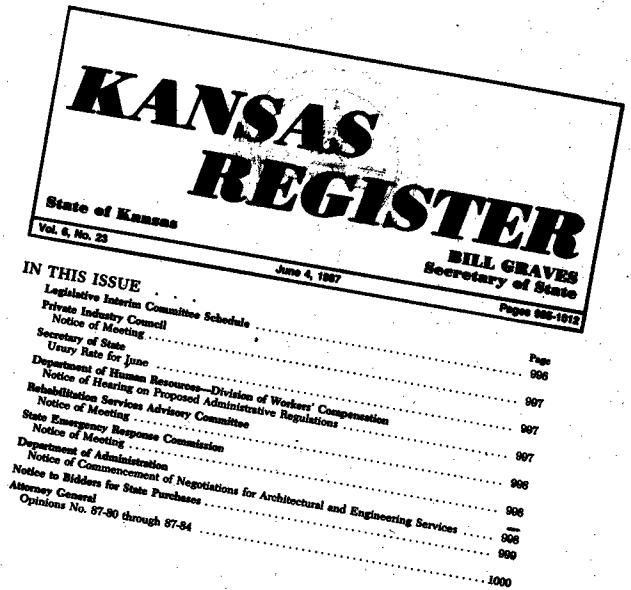
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
