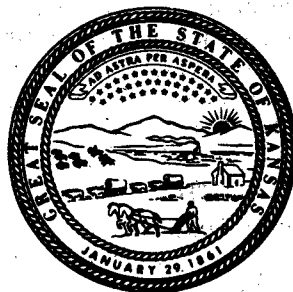

**PRIVATE INDUSTRY COUNCIL****NOTICE CONCERNING JOB  
TRAINING PLAN**

The Kansas Private Industry Council of Service Delivery Area III is submitting a modification of its two year Job Training Plan to the Governor of the State of Kansas through the Department of Human Resources. Funding for this plan is through Title IIA of the Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA), which is designed to provide training to disadvantaged youth and adults.

The respective program years are July 1, 1988, to June 30, 1989, and July 1, 1989, to June 30, 1990. The funding level for program year 1989 is \$2,054,642. The SDA plans to serve over 800 eligible participants during this program year. The plan modification will become effective January 1, 1990.

The purpose of the program is to prepare youth and unskilled adults for entry into the labor force and to afford job training to economically disadvantaged individuals and other individuals facing serious barriers to employment.

The Kansas Private Industry Council of Service Delivery Area III also is submitting to the Governor through the Department of Human Resources a revised Summer Youth Employment and Training budget, as a sub-part of the Title IIA two-year plan. The funding level for the program year beginning October 1, 1989, and ending September 30, 1990, is based on the previous year's allocation and is estimated to be \$838,229. The SDA plans to serve over 700 eligible youth during this program year.

Funding for the Summer Youth Employment and Training program is through Title IIB of the Job Training Partnership Act, which is designed to provide training for disadvantaged youth. Planning summaries are not being submitted at this time since upcoming JTPA amendments to Title IIB will result in major changes to the existing summer youth program.

The Kansas Private Industry Council of Service Delivery Area III also will submit to the Governor through the Department of Human Resources a modification to its Title III Economic Dislocation and Worker Adjustment Assistance Plan, as a sub-part of the Title IIA two-year plan. The respective program year will be July 1, 1989, to June 30, 1990. The funding level for program year 1989 is \$162,669. The SDA plans to serve approximately 47 eligible participants during the program year.

The purpose of the program is to reassess and reconfigure service to meet the needs of workers who have been terminated, laid off or have received a notice of termination or layoff due to a permanent closure or substantial layoff at a plant or facility. There is a 30-day review and comment period for the plan modification.

NOTICE OF HEARING  
ON PROPOSED  
ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS

A public hearing will be conducted at 9:30 a.m. Friday, November 17, in Conference Room A of the Kansas State Board of Agriculture, 109 S.W. 9th, Topeka, at which time all interested persons will have an opportunity to be heard regarding the adoption of proposed permanent rules and regulations of the Kansas State Board of Agriculture. The proposed permanent rules and regulations will become effective 45 days after their publication in the *Kansas Register* unless a specified date is contained in the regulation.

All interested persons may attend the hearing and those attending will be given an opportunity to express comments either orally or in writing, or both. In addition, the period of at least 30 days notice constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving public comments on the proposed rules and regulations.

Written comments and requests for copies of the regulations and the complete economic impact statement should be sent to Kenneth M. Wilke, Chief Counsel, Kansas State Board of Agriculture, 109 S.W. 9th, Topeka 66612, at or before the time of the hearing. If you intend to present testimony in person at the hearing, prior notice to this office would be helpful in arranging the agenda. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

A summary of the proposed regulations is as follows:

K.A.R. 4-13-4. Conforms to contents of new regulation 4-13-4a.

K.A.R. 4-13-4a. Clarifies the statutory requirements for information contained in contracts or statements of service.

K.A.R. 4-13-5. Conforms to contents of new regulation 4-13-4a.

K.A.R. 4-13-6. Deletes prohibition against use of magnetic signs and makes other technical changes.

K.A.R. 4-13-7. Will be revoked.

K.A.R. 4-13-7a. Updates termite control procedures to replace K.A.R. 4-13-7.

K.A.R. 4-13-8. Makes technical changes to clarify language.

K.A.R. 4-13-15. Requires a certified commercial applicator who applies pesticides for a pesticide business to carry proof of certification.

K.A.R. 4-13-26. Prohibits preconstruction application of termiticides at any dosage concentration or rate that is not specified on the label.

K.A.R. 4-13-27. Establishes requirements for certificates of insurance.

K.A.R. 4-13-28. Establishes conditions under which pesticides may be applied to control a pest that is not listed on the pesticide's label.

K.A.R. 4-20-3. Changes record keeping requirements to include total number of acres chemigated, the type of crop chemigated, the name of the target pest and whether animal wastes have been applied.

K.A.R. 4-20-5. Specifies the location of the waterline check valve.

K.A.R. 4-20-6. Prohibits application of any pesticides at a rate exceeding label rate and provides requirements for anti pollution equipment for application of animal wastes.

K.A.R. 4-20-7. Establishes standards for vacuum relief devices and automatic low pressure drains.

K.A.R. 4-20-8. Specifies location of chemical injection line and checkvalve.

K.A.R. 4-20-11. Establishes civil penalty procedure.

K.A.R. 4-20-12. Establishes certification examination requirements.

K.A.R. 4-20-13. Requires chemigation equipment operators to carry proof of certification.

K.A.R. 4-20-14. Requires reporting of address changes by certified chemigation equipment operator.

Regarding the implementation of K.A.R. 4-13-4, 4-13-4a, 4-13-5, 4-13-6, 4-13-7a, 4-13-8, 4-13-15, 4-13-26, 4-13-27 and 4-13-28, and the revocation of K.A.R. 4-13-7, there will be minimal, if any, fiscal or economic impact on this agency, other governmental agencies, individuals, private businesses or the general public.

Regarding the implementation of K.A.R. 4-20-3, 4-20-5, 4-20-7, 4-20-8, 4-20-11, 4-20-12, 4-20-13, and 4-20-14, there will be minimal, if any, fiscal or economic impact on this agency, other governmental agencies, individuals, private businesses or the general public except for K.A.R. 4-20-11, when agency costs for assessing civil penalties may vary depending upon whether hearings are requested, in which case witness fees and court reporter fees will vary on a case by case basis.

Regarding the implementation of K.A.R. 4-20-6, there will be minimal, if any, fiscal or economic impact upon this agency, other governmental agencies, individuals, private businesses or the general public except those who choose to chemigate. Chemigators who apply fertilizers or other chemicals will incur costs of \$30 per well plus the cost of one or more calibration devices at \$10-\$100 each. For application of pesticides, an air bleeder valve costing about \$15 and a positive displacement injection pump costing about \$600-\$2,000 also must be installed.

HEARING ON PROPOSED  
ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS**

A public hearing will be conducted at 7 p.m. Thursday, November 16, in Rooms 1, 2, and 3 of the Wheat Lands Motor Inn, 1311 E. Fulton, Garden City, to consider the adoption and revocation of several department regulations. If necessary, the public hearing will continue at 9 a.m. Friday, November 17, in Room 1 at the same location. A workshop meeting on upcoming business and regulations will follow the conclusion of the public hearing. The public is also invited to attend the workshop.

This 30-day notice period prior to the hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the regulations.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the chairman of the commission, Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks, Suite 502, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to express their views orally in regard to the adoption of the proposed regulations and the proposed revocations. During the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered by the commission as a basis for approving, amending or rejecting the proposed regulations and revocations.

The following is a brief summary of the proposed exempt and permanent regulations and permanent regulations proposed for revocation:

**K.A.R. 115-2-2. Motor vehicle permit fees.** This proposed permanent regulation would establish fees for annual, temporary and additional motor vehicle permits. It would replace K.A.R. 33-2-4, which is proposed for revocation. The temporary permit is reduced from \$3 to \$2.50 and would be valid until noon the following day instead of 10 a.m. as is specified under K.A.R. 33-2-4. The \$1 fee for duplicate vehicle permits is discontinued as a standard \$3 duplicate fee has been established for all department issues in K.A.R. 115-2-1.

**Economic Impact Summary:** The reduction from \$3 to \$2.50 will have no impact on permit purchasers or department revenues as the \$0.50 service charge for each permit would cause the cost of the permit to remain the same. Extending the effective period by two hours is not anticipated to have significant economic impact on the public or the department. It is proposed primarily as a convenience to park patrons. There were 1,007 duplicates issued in 1988, thus the \$2 increase would have a small impact on the public and the department.

**K.A.R. 115-2-3. Other fees and charges.** This proposed permanent regulation would establish fees for camping, utilities, private boat dock and cabin rentals, boat dock and vessel towing, and special event permits. It would replace provisions of K.A.R. 33-3-3, which is proposed for revocation. Daily group shelter rental fee of \$25 would be discontinued and replaced with a \$25 special events permit. An overnight camping permit would expire at noon on the day following purchase. The \$1 fee for du-

PLICATE annual camping permits is discontinued as a standard \$3 duplicate fee has been established for all department issues in K.A.R. 115-2-1.

**Economic Impact Summary:** All fees for current issues, except duplicates, remain unchanged and will result in no economic impact. There were only 114 duplicates issued in 1988, thus the \$2 increase will have minor overall impact on the public and the department. The economic impact of the special events permit is unknown at this time as regulations defining special events and requirement are currently in the discussion and development stages. Establishing a noon expiration for overnight camping is not expected to have any economic impact.

**K.A.R. 115-3-2. Rabbits, hares and squirrels; legal equipment, taking methods and possession.** An amendment to this permanent regulation is proposed that would authorize the use of box traps as a legal means of taking rabbits for noncommercial purposes during established rabbit hunting seasons.

**Economic Impact Summary:** Economic impact on the public and the department would be minor. The amendment would provide for additional recreational opportunity.

**K.A.R. 115-4-1. Turkey; legal equipment, taking methods, reports, tags and general provisions.** This proposed permanent regulation continues provisions of K.A.R. 23-1-10, which is proposed for revocation. In addition, it would specify steel shot size in addition to lead shot size for those hunters choosing to use steel shot, and it would authorize landowner-tenants to receive a hunt-on-your-own-land permit if unsuccessful in the regular season drawing.

**Economic Impact Summary:** The steel shot provision provides for an expanded choice by hunters for steel shot size and is considered as a restriction relaxation. It is not anticipated to have any economic impact. The provision for hunt-on-your-own-land permits would provide a benefit but would have no economic impact until the permits are specifically authorized for a season under a season-setting regulation.

**K.A.R. 115-12-1. Game breeders; operational requirements.** This proposed permanent regulation addresses reporting requirements for game breeders as required by statute. It also provides for bill of sale issuance to persons purchasing wildlife from a game breeder. Game breeders would be authorized to submit copies of the bills of sale in lieu of the report.

**Economic Impact Summary:** Economic impact on game breeders will be minimal but will require report preparation time. Department impact will be with preparation and distribution of report forms and handling of received reports.

**K.A.R. 115-25-6. Turkey; spring season, bag limit and permits.** This proposed permanent regulation provides for a spring hunting season, establishes a bag limit and sets permits. Permits would be limited in the southwest unit and unlimited in the rest of the state. An additional 1,500 permits would be authorized in a southcentral portion of the state. Hunt-on-your-own-land permits would be offered in unit 1.

**Economic Impact Summary:** It is estimated that 16,500 spring turkey hunting permits will be issued in 1990. Revenues to the department of approximately \$308,625



would occur. That amount represents an expenditure by the public (permit purchasers). Public participation is voluntary.

**K.A.R. 115-25-14. Fishing; creel limit, size limit, possession limit and open season.** This proposed exempt regulation would provide for continuance of creel, size and possession limits and for open fishing season with the following changes noted: a reduction in creel for trout, walleye, sauger and saugeye (from eight to five and establishment of a wiper creel limit of two.

**Economic Impact Summary:** No direct economic impact is anticipated due to creel changes. Indirectly, the public will benefit from an improved fishery as will the department.

The following regulations are proposed for revocation:

**K.A.R. 23-1-10. Turkey; season restrictions.** Provisions of this permanent regulation are contained in proposed regulation K.A.R. 115-4-1. Changes are discussed under the summary statement for K.A.R. 115-4-1.

**Economic Impact Statement:** No economic impact would occur as a result of revocation.

**K.A.R. 23-3-2. Fishing; creel limit, size limit and possession limit.** Provisions of this exempt regulation are contained in proposed regulation K.A.R. 115-25-14. Changes are discussed under the summary statement for K.A.R. 115-25-14.

**Economic Impact Summary:** No economic impact would occur as a result of revocation.

**K.A.R. 33-2-4. Schedule of motor vehicle permit fees.** Provisions of this permanent regulation are contained in proposed regulation K.A.R. 115-2-2. Changes are discussed under the summary statement for K.A.R. 115-2-2.

**Economic Impact Summary:** No economic impact would occur as a result of revocation.

**K.A.R. 33-3-3. Schedule of fees and charges.** Provisions of this permanent regulation are contained in proposed regulation K.A.R. 115-2-3. Changes are discussed under the summary statement for K.A.R. 115-2-3.

**Economic Impact Summary:** No economic impact would occur as a result of revocation.

**Article 24.—REHABILITATION**

**51-24-4. Qualifications and duties of a vendor.** Each person, firm or corporation proposing to qualify as a vendor in vocational rehabilitation cases under the Kansas

workers compensation act shall file an application with the director. The application shall be updated as changes occur which may affect the standing for the applicant to become or remain qualified and shall include: (a) a statement that the person, firm or corporation will maintain an office in the state of Kansas or in the metropolitan Kansas City area, staffed with personnel capable of responding to written or telephone inquiries regarding cases referred to that vendor;

(b) the addresses and telephone numbers of the offices within and without the state of Kansas from which vocational rehabilitation services will be performed for cases under the Kansas workers compensation act;

(c) a listing of each person employed to perform services as a medical manager, counselor, evaluator or job placement specialist for cases referred to that vendor and an indication of each person's discipline;

(d) a statement that the person, firm or corporation will employ or contract with one or more persons qualified to perform work as a medical manager, counselor, evaluator or job placement specialist as necessary to carry out the purpose of the referral;

(e) a statement that the person, firm or corporation will be responsible for the appropriateness and timeliness of the service delivery by each medical manager, counselor, evaluator and job placement specialist employed or under contract to carry out the purpose of the referral;

(f) a statement indicating whether the person, firm or corporation wants to be included in the list of vendors qualified and requesting to receive referrals from employers or the director;

(g) a statement that the person, firm or corporation will report, in a form prescribed by the director, to the vocational rehabilitation administrator each referral received from an employer or insurance carrier and the date of the referral;

(h) a statement that the person, firm or corporation will report the status of the evaluation 30 days after the referral and the status of the evaluation and plan on each occasion changes occur which affect the evaluation or plan. These reports shall be in a form prescribed by the director;

(i) a statement that the person, firm or corporation will provide copies of all vocational assessments, plans and progress reports to all parties involved, including attorneys for claimant and respondent, if it is a litigated case; and

(j) a statement that the person, firm and corporation will provide objective and impartial assessments of the injured workers need for rehabilitation services. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 44-573; implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 44-510g, as amended by 1989 SB 354, Sec. 1; effective, T-88-20, July 1, 1987; effective May 1, 1988; amended Nov. 27, 1989.)

**51-24-5. Qualifications for counselor, evaluator, and job placement specialist.** (a) Each person seeking to qualify as a vocational rehabilitation counselor for cases under the Kansas workers compensation act shall:

(1) furnish proof to the director that the person has:  
(A) a masters degree from a nationally accredited program in rehabilitation counselor education; or

(continued)

(B)(i) a masters degree in counseling, guidance and counseling, clinical psychology, counseling psychology, clinical social work or any related field which includes nine hours of graduate course work in counseling; and

(ii) one year of experience as a vocational rehabilitation counselor or completion of a nationally accredited rehabilitation counselor internship program from a college or university; or

(C) 32 graduate hours form an accredited rehabilitation counseling program, including coursework from at least nine of the following graduate courses:

- (i) Medical aspects of disability;
- (ii) counseling theories;
- (iii) individual and group appraisal;
- (iv) career information service;
- (v) evaluation techniques in rehabilitation;
- (vi) placement process in rehabilitation;
- (vii) psychological aspects of disability;
- (viii) case management in rehabilitation;
- (ix) utilization of community resources;
- (x) survey of rehabilitation;
- (xi) supervised practicum in rehabilitation; or

(1) a bachelors degree in rehabilitation services and three years of experience as a vocational rehabilitation counselor;

(2) furnish the director with the addresses and telephone numbers of that person's offices and the names of the vendors with whom that person is affiliated;

(3) acknowledge that the person's qualification may be suspended or revoked if the person performs work in a rehabilitation discipline other than a discipline in which that person has been found to be qualified by the director; and

(4) acknowledge that the person's qualification may be suspended or revoked if the person repeatedly fails to file reports with the director in a timely manner or fails to comply with the regulations adopted by the director.

(b) Each person seeking to qualify as a vocational rehabilitation evaluator shall:

(1) furnish proof to the director that the person has:

(A) a masters or doctoral degree in vocational evaluation, rehabilitation counseling or work adjustment, and one year of experience as a vocational evaluator; or

(B) a masters degree in counseling, psychology, adult education or any related field which includes at least nine graduate hours in testing, evaluation and assessment and one year of experience as a vocational evaluator; or

(C) one year of experience as a vocational evaluator and 32 graduate hours from an accredited rehabilitation counseling program, including coursework from at least nine of the following graduate courses:

- (1) Medical aspects of disability;
- (ii) counseling theories;
- (iii) individual and group appraisal;
- (iv) career information service;
- (v) evaluation techniques in rehabilitation;
- (vi) placement process in rehabilitation;
- (vii) psychological aspects in disability;
- (viii) case management in rehabilitation;
- (ix) utilization of community resources;
- (x) survey of rehabilitation; and
- (xi) supervised practicum in rehabilitation; or

(1) a bachelors degree in vocational rehabilitation evaluation, psychology, special education or rehabilitation services and three years of experience as a vocational evaluator under the supervision of a masters degree vocational evaluator;

(2) furnish the director with the addresses and telephone numbers of that person's offices and the names of the vendors with whom that person is affiliated;

(3) acknowledge that the person's qualification may be suspended or revoked if the person performs work in a rehabilitation discipline other than a discipline in which that person has been found to be qualified by the director; and

(4) acknowledge that the person's qualification may be suspended or revoked if the person repeatedly fails to file reports with the director in a timely manner or fails to comply with the regulations adopted by the director.

(c) Each person seeking to qualify as a vocational rehabilitation job placement specialist shall:

(1) furnish proof to the director that the person has:

(A) a masters or bachelors degree in vocational rehabilitation counseling, vocational counseling, rehabilitation services or job placement; or

(B) a bachelors degree in counseling, sociology, psychology or any related field and one year of experience as a job placement specialist for disabled individuals; or

(C) at least two years of college level education and three years of experience as a job placement specialist for disabled individuals; or

(D) qualified as a vocational rehabilitation counselor under K.A.R. 51-24-5;

(2) furnish the director with the addresses and telephone numbers of the person's offices and the names of the vendors with whom that person is affiliated;

(3) acknowledge that the person's qualification may be suspended or revoked if the person performs work in a rehabilitation discipline other than a discipline in which that person has been found to be qualified by the director; and

(4) acknowledge that the person's qualification may be suspended or revoked if the person fails to file reports with the director in a timely manner or fails to comply with the regulations adopted by the director.

(d) Each person employed by or working under contract as a counselor, evaluator or job placement specialist for the Kansas department of rehabilitation services or other state or federal vocational rehabilitation agency shall be considered qualified in that person's discipline while working for that agency. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 44-573; implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 44-510g, as amended by 1989 SB 354, Sec. 1; effective T-88-20, July 1, 1987; effective May 1, 1988; amended Nov. 27, 1989.)

## Article 4.—EXPLOSIVE MATERIALS

**22-4-2. Explosive and blasting agent storage permits.**

(a) All contractors operating in the State of Kansas shall obtain explosive storage site permits before moving, storing or using any explosives or blasting agents at any job site within the state. The appropriate permit shall be issued after the contractor has submitted a completed application form to the authority having jurisdiction in the geographic area in which the contractor is operating. The application form shall be signed by the contractor or designee and the authority having jurisdiction or designee. Application forms shall be available from the state fire marshal's office. The authority having jurisdiction in the geographic area in which the contractor is operating shall issue either a temporary or a permanent explosive storage site permit as applicable.

(b) Before either explosive storage site permit will be issued, the contractor must have a valid explosive user's permit issued by the state fire marshal in accordance with K.A.R. 22-4-1 and any explosive permit required by the U.S. treasury department, bureau of alcohol, tobacco and firearms.

(c) Contractors intending to store in excess of 50 lbs., but not more than 500 lbs. of explosives or blasting agents and who shall be engaged in blasting at a location 90 days or less shall be issued a temporary explosive site permit. Contractors intending to store in excess of 500 lbs. of explosives or blasting agents or engaged in blasting at a location more than 90 days shall be issued a permanent explosive storage site permit.

(d) All storage of explosives or blasting agents shall be in a magazine designed for that purpose as specified in NFPA pamphlet 495 as adopted in K.A.R. 22-4-1. Explosive magazines shall be located on the explosive storage site in accordance with the American table of distances as specified in NFPA pamphlet 495 as adopted in K.A.R. 22-4-1.

(e) Contractors shall notify the authority having jurisdiction at least 24 hours before the delivery of explosives or blasting agents to a storage site or moving explosives from a storage site to the blasting site, and at least 24 hours before vacating the storage site.

(f) Each magazine within the explosive storage site shall be surrounded by a fence or acceptable equivalent approved by the authority having jurisdiction. Weather resistant signs measuring no less than 36 inches in length and 18 inches in height shall be mounted at the explosive storage site in a manner to cause the signs to be visible from all directions to any person entering the site. The signs shall be lettered with six inch fluorescent characters on a white background to read: EXPLOSIVES—KEEP OFF. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 31-133; effective Nov. 27, 1989.)

**22-4-3. Definitions.** (a) The term "contractor" means and includes any person, company or corporation that engages in the manufacture, purchase, inventory, storage

and use of explosives or blasting agents within the State of Kansas.

(b) The term "authorities having jurisdiction" means the respective fire department, police department and sheriff's department having jurisdiction over the area where the explosive storage site is located as well as the state fire marshal's office. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 31-133; effective Nov. 27, 1989.)
