ON PROPOSED****ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS**

A public hearing will be conducted at 11 a.m. Wednesday, November 29, in Room 553 of the Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of a new regulation and proposed changes in existing rules and regulations of the Board of Healing Arts. The proposed permanent rules and regulations will become effective 45 days after their publication in the *Kansas Register*.

This 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Richard G. Gannon, Executive Director, Board of Healing Arts, Suite 553, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. For persons intending to present testimony at the hearing, prior notice to this office would be helpful in arranging the agenda. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

These regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of proposed regulations and their economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 100-38-1. Fees. Changes in this regulation increase the annual renewal fees for physical therapists and physical therapy assistants registered and certified by the Board of Healing Arts.

The changes in the renewal fees made by this regulation would increase the revenue of this agency by approximately \$5,905.

This regulation increases annual renewal fees by \$5 and reinstatement fees by \$10. A separate application fee of \$40 is created and the examination and re-examination fees are changed.

Other governmental agencies, private citizens and consumers will not be affected by this change.

K.A.R. 100-54-4. Fees. Amendments to this regulation provide for an increase of annual renewal fees for occupational therapists and occupational therapy assistants registered by the Board of Healing Arts.

This regulation would increase the revenue of the agency by approximately \$3,620. The economic impact to the registrants will be an additional \$10 each for an estimated 362 registrants who timely renew their annual registration and an additional \$5 for late renewals.

Other governmental agencies, private citizens and consumers will not be affected by this change.

K.A.R. 100-55-4. Fees. Changes in this regulation increase the annual renewal fees for respiratory therapists registered by the Board of Healing Arts.

The changes in the renewal fees made by this regulation would increase the revenue of the agency by approximately \$8,320. The economic impact to the registrants will be an additional \$10 each for an estimated 832 registrants who timely renew their annual registration and an additional \$5 for late renewals.

Other governmental agencies, private citizens and consumers will not be affected by this change.

K.A.R. 100-60-1. Fees. Amendments to this regulation provide for an increase of initial registration and annual renewal fees for physicians' assistants registered by the Board of Healing Arts.

This regulation would increase the revenue of the agency by approximately \$4,800. The economic impact to the registrants will be an additional \$40 each for an estimated 120 registrants who timely renew their license. Initial registrations will also be increased by \$20. New fee categories are also created for temporary registration, late renewal, reinstatement and copies of registration.

Other governmental agencies, private citizens and consumers will not be affected by this change.

K.A.R. 100-60-15. Expiration of Registration. Establishment of this regulation would provide for the expiration of registration of all physicians' assistants to be on December 31 of each year.

There will not be any change in the fiscal impact to the individual registrants.

Other governmental agencies, private citizens and consumers will not be affected by this change.

Article 35.—CENSUS ADJUSTMENT

7-35-1. Adjustment of federal census data. Before July 31, 1991, responses from student and military questionnaires shall be used by the secretary of state to compute the number of persons to be added to or subtracted from each election precinct's population totals from the 1990 decennial census conducted by the U.S. bureau of the census. (Authorized by L. 1989, Ch. 257, § 5; implementing Article 10, Section 1 of the Kansas Constitution; L. 1989, Ch. 257, § 3; effective Dec. 11, 1989.)

7-35-2. Questionnaires. In accordance with chapter 257 of the 1989 session laws of Kansas, questionnaires for all students enrolled during the spring semester of the 1989-1990 academic year at a college or university in the state of Kansas, and for military personnel stationed and located in the state of Kansas, shall be provided by the secretary of state. Completed questionnaires shall be returned by college and university officials and military officers to the secretary of state prior to June 1, 1990. (a) The questionnaire shall require each college or university student to:

(1) provide last name, first name and middle initial, and student identification number;

(2) provide the name of the college or university and the name of the city in which the college or university is located;

(3) state whether enrolled in nine or more credit hours for the spring semester of 1990 or seeking an academic degree;

(4) if the student answers yes to point (3), state whether the student's college address is the student's permanent residence;

(5) if the student answers no to point (4), indicate whether the student is a resident of the state of Kansas with a present intent to remain a permanent Kansas resident;

(6) if the student answers no to point (4), indicate to which race the student belongs;

(7) if the student answers no to point (4), indicate whether the student is of Spanish/Hispanic origin;

(8) if the student answers no to point (4), indicate

whether the student was (or will be) 18 years or older by April 1, 1990; and

(9) if the student answers no to point (4), provide permanent residence address and college address.

(b) The questionnaire shall require each military person stationed and located in Kansas to:

(1) provide last name, first name and middle initial;

(2) provide the name of the military installation to which the military person is assigned at the time the person fills out the questionnaire;

(3) indicate to which race the military person belongs;

(4) indicate whether the military person is of Spanish/Hispanic origin;

(5) indicate whether the military person was 18 years or older on April 1, 1990;

(6) provide the military person's permanent home of record and current home address;

(7) indicate whether the military person is a resident of the state of Kansas with a present intent to remain a permanent Kansas resident;

(8) if the military person declares Kansas to be the military person's place of permanent residence, indicate address of permanent residence; and

(9) state whether the military person has already completed a 1990 census adjustment questionnaire as a student at a Kansas college or university, and if so, provide the name of the college or university.

(c) In cases where individual military personnel are unavailable to fill out their questionnaires on April 1, 1990 because their military duties require them to be temporarily absent from the installation to which they are assigned, the military officer responsible for providing census adjustment data to the secretary of state may provide such persons an opportunity to complete their questionnaires at some time after April 1, 1990.

(d) After the enrollment process is complete for the spring semester of 1990, each college or university in Kansas shall provide to the secretary of state a list of names and addresses of all students enrolled during the spring semester of 1990. The list shall not be used to determine the permanent residence of any individual.

(e) Questionnaires shall be distributed to all college and university students enrolled during the spring semester of the 1989-1990 academic year by officials at each institution who shall be designated by their respective administrators. The questionnaires shall be completed on or after April 1, 1990 whenever possible, to coincide with the official census data of the U.S. bureau of the census, or at another time during the 1990 spring semester that is administratively expedient.

(f) Every military officer in charge of more than 50 persons in the military service shall provide to the secretary of state a list of names and addresses of all military personnel under that officer's command on April 1, 1990. The list shall not be used to determine the permanent residence of any individual. (Authorized by L. 1989, ch. 257, § 5; implementing Article 10, Section 1 of the Kansas Constitution; L. 1989, Ch. 257, § 3; effective Dec. 11, 1989.)

Article 8.—SENIOR CARE ACT

26-8-1. Definitions. (a) "Activities of daily living" means basic activities necessary for daily self care, including eating, self bathing, dressing, toileting, and transferring self to and from bed.

(b) "Instrumental activities of daily living" means basic activities necessary for daily self care, including meal preparation, laundry, housecleaning, budgeting and shopping.

(c) "Senior Care Act" means 1989 Senate Bill 60 passed by the Kansas legislature which establishes a program of in-home support services for persons 60 years of age and older and:

(1) provides for requirements for and limitations on such programs; and

(2) provides for the administration of the program. (Authorized by and implementing Senate Bill 60; effective T-26-10-17-89, Oct. 17, 1989.)

26-8-2. Eligibility for services. Each person eligible for services under the senior care act of 1989 shall have physical or mental limitations which restrict the ability to perform one or more activities of daily living or instrumental activities of daily living. (Authorized by and implementing Senate Bill 60; effective T-26-10-17-89, Oct. 17, 1989.)

26-8-3. Level of payments to providers. The level of payments to providers shall be established through purchase of service contracts with service providers. (Authorized by and implementing Senate Bill 60; effective T-26-10-17-89, Oct. 17, 1989.)

26-8-4. Fees. (a) The fee schedule shall be determined by the department and shall be a percentage of the cost for a service based upon:

- (1) the number of persons within a family, and
- (2) the monthly gross income;

(b) Services provided to a recipient under this act may be terminated by the service provider for nonpayment. Prior to termination of services for nonpayment the service provider shall give written notice to the recipient of the termination and the reason therefore, as well as the effective date of the termination of services. In no event shall termination be effective less than seven days subsequent to the date of the notice. (Authorized by and implementing 1989 Senate Bill 60; effective T-26-10-17-89, Oct. 17, 1989.)

26-8-5. Reporting requirements. Each area agency on aging and each contractee or grantee providing services under the 1989 senior care act shall comply with the reporting requirements of K.A.R. 26-3-6. (Authorized by and implementing Senate Bill 60; effective T-26-10-17-89, Oct. 17, 1989.)

26-8-6. Level of local match. (a) During state fiscal year 1990, each area agency shall provide a 33 $\frac{1}{3}$ cents local cash contribution for each state dollar received.

(b) For each fiscal year thereafter, each area agency shall provide a dollar-for-dollar match.

(c) Program income generated by the senior care act program may be used as match. However, no state or federal funds shall be used as match. (Authorized by and implementing Senate Bill 60; effective T-26-10-17-89, Oct. 17, 1989.)

26-8-7. Preference of eligible persons with greatest social need. Preference shall be given to providing services to eligible persons with the greatest social needs, with particular attention to minority individuals. (Authorized by and implementing Senate Bill 60; effective T-26-10-17-89, Oct. 17, 1989.)

26-8-8. Funds spent for each client. The maximum monthly dollar amount incurred for senior care act services provided to any consumer shall not exceed an amount determined by the department. (Authorized by and implementing Senate Bill 60; effective T-26-10-17-89, Oct. 17, 1989.)

26-8-9. Screening and assessment mechanism. Each senior care act service provider shall use an instrument prescribed by the department to screen and assess applicants to determine eligibility for senior care act services. (Authorized by and implementing Senate Bill 60; effective T-26-10-17-89, Oct. 17, 1989.)

26-8-10. Priority of services. Consistent with available appropriations, services shall be provided in the following priority: (a) homemaker and attendant care services;

(b) respite and chore services;

(c) care management services; and

(d) transportation for care services. (Authorized by and implementing Senate Bill 60; effective T-26-10-17-89, Oct. 17, 1989.)

Article 9.—RETIRED SENIOR
VOLUNTEER PROGRAM (RSVP)

26-9-1. Definitions. (a) "RSVP" means the program authorized under Title II, Part A of the domestic volunteer service act of 1973, as amended (P.L. 93-113) to provide a variety of opportunities for retired persons age 60 years or over to participate more fully in their community through significant volunteer service.

(b) "ACTION" means the federal government agency providing financial support to the department for RSVP. (Authorized by and implementing 1989 House Bill 2029; effective T-26-10-17-89, Oct. 17, 1989.)

26-9-2. Reporting Requirements. Each RSVP grantee shall submit program and financial reports to comply with the federal requirements: (a) to the department by the quarterly due date; and

(b) on forms prescribed by the department. (Authorized by and implementing 1989 House Bill 2029; effective T-26-10-17-89, Oct. 17, 1989.)

26-9-3. RSVP funding. (a) The RSVP state funds distributed from the department to the grantee shall only be used for the expenses of the volunteers and shall not be used for administration or any other indirect expenses of the volunteers.

(b) The grantee shall use the cash request method for obtaining RSVP funds from the department on forms required by the department. (Authorized by and implementing 1989 House Bill 2029; effective T-26-10-17-89, Oct. 17, 1989.)

26-9-4. RSVP. Each grantee shall comply with the federal employment program and its requirements as referenced in: (a) the action agency for volunteer service grants management handbook for grantees number 2650.2, effective August 13, 1981; and

(b) the RSVP Operations Handbook number 4405-92, effective August 15, 1983. (Authorized by and implementing 1989 House Bill 2029; effective T-26-10-17-89, Oct. 17, 1989.)

Article 16.—WATER POLLUTION CONTROL

28-16-137. Environmental review. (a) The Kansas environmental review procedure for the Kansas water pollution control revolving loan program, dated February, 1989 is adopted by reference as the required environmental procedure for an equivalency project.

(b) For an equivalency project, 40 CFR, 6.508(a), 6.511(b) and 6.512 as in effect on July 1, 1988, are adopted by reference.

(c) Those members of the public who participate in the environmental review process shall have the right to appeal the decisions made within that process. All such appeals shall be conducted pursuant to the Kansas administrative procedures act and the act for judicial review set forth in K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 77-501 et seq. and K.S.A. 77-601 et seq., respectively.
