Taxation—Limitation on Tax Levies—Townships; Extermination of Prairie Dogs.

Townships and Township Officers—Prairie Dogs, Moles and Gophers—Tax Levy. Laurence A. Taylor, Thomas County Attorney, Colby, November 16, 1989.

While the governing body of a township has authority to implement a prairie dog eradication program, the tax levy for such program must be authorized by the board of county commissioners. Minors—Kansas Juvenile Offenders Code—New Trial. Nola Foulston, Sedgwick County District Attorney, Wichita, November 20, 1989.

District courts appear to have the authority to entertain a motion for new trial in a juvenile proceeding if the motion is timely filed and if double jeopardy problems would not arise. A juvenile does not, however, have a statutory or constitutional right to a new trial. State Boards, Commissions and Authorities—Public Employees Retirement Systems; Elected State Officers—Definitions; Contributions; Retirement Benefits. Representative L. V. Roper, 4th District, Girard, November 20, 1989.

Despite the fact that a former member of the legislature is included in the definition of "elected state official" under K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-4998b, years of state service after leaving the legislature are not included in the "elected state official's years of credited service" under K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-4998d. The definition serves merely

as a listing of those individuals that may elect to become special members of the Kansas public employees retirement system. Also, a former member is exempt from making the contributions required under K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-4998c. Cited herein: K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-4998a; 74-4998b; 74-4998c; 74-4998d. RDS

Cities and Municipalities—Buildings, Structures and Grounds; Public Building Commission—Authorized.

Constitution of the State of Kansas—Corporations—Cities' Powers of Home Rule. Michael K. Schmitt, Horton City Attorney, Hiawatha, November 20, 1989.

K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 12-1758, as amended by L. 1989, ch. 62, § 2, K.S.A. 12-1759 (as amended) and K.S.A. 12-1763 (as amended) are part of an enactment (L. 1989, ch. 62) that is not uniformly applicable to all cities. Accordingly, a city may by charter ordinance exempt itself from the provisions of those statutes and adopt substitute and additional provisions on the same subject, in accordance with article 12, section 5 of the Kansas Constitution. However, substitute and additional provisions in charter ordinance no. 10 of the city of Horton, which would authorize a public building commission to lease and operate a correctional facility for 1,000 inmates, have a substantial impact on residents outside the territorial limits of the city of Horton. Recognizing that impact, it is our opinion that the substitute and additional provisions prescribed by charter ordinance no. 10 of the city of Horton do not fit within the "local affairs and government" language of article 12, section 5 of the Kansas Constitution and are outside the authority granted by that constitutional provision. The Keys Amendment, Public Law 94-566, section 505(d) enacted in 1976 and Public Law 97-35 enacted in 1981, established section 1616(e) of the Social Security Act, as implemented by the federal regulations 45 CFR Part 1397, requires each state to make available for public review a summary of the standards used in regulating residential facilities in which recipients of Supplemental Security Income (SSI) reside or are likely to reside.

Standards for some types of facilities are set by the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services, while the Department of Health and Environment sets standards for others. The summary of all standards or further information about the full standards, enforcement procedures, waivers and violations set by SRS may be obtained by writing the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services, Jan Allen, Commissioner of Adult Services, West Hall, 300 S.W. Oakley, Topeka 66606.

The Secretary of the Kansas Department of Health and Environment is proposing to issue a permit in accordance with K.A.R. 28-19-14 (permits required) and K.A.R. 28-19-17 (new source permit requirements for designated attainment and unclassified areas) to the city of Russell to install and operate two additional reciprocating engine-driven generators at the municipal power plant at 9th and Elm Streets. This project will result in the power plant having the potential to emit pollutants at a rate that classifies it as a major modification to an existing major stationary source under provisions of K.A.R. 28-19-17.

Written materials, including the application and information relating to the application submitted by the city, the draft permit, permit summary and analysis of KDHE describing the basis for the proposed permit, are available for public inspection during normal business hours through December 29 by contacting Peter Denning, Bureau of Air and Waste Management (BAWM), 2501 Market Place, Salina, (913) 827-9639. PERMIT ACTION**

The Secretary of the Kansas Department of Health and Environment is proposing to amend the conditional permit issued to the Empire District Electric Co. by the Bureau of Air and Waste Management (BAWM) on May 11, 1988, for installation and operation of two combustion turbine-driven electric generators (turbines), designated Unit No.'s 10 and 11, at the Riverton Station. The permit was issued in accordance with K.A.R. 28-19-14 (permit required) and K.A.R. 28-19-17 (new source permit requirements for designated attainment and unclassified areas). The amended permit would allow Empire to operate Unit No.'s 10 and 11 the number of hours per year stipulated in the conditional permit, after the results of source emission testing and the best available control technology (BACT) requirements for nitrogen oxides (NO_x) and carbon monoxide (CO) have been evaluated.

Subsequent to the conditional permit issuance and initiating operation of Unit No.'s 10 and 11, source emission testing was conducted by Empire on Unit No.'s 10 and 11 to determine the NO_x and CO emission rates. Testing was a requirement of the conditional permit. The test data showed that the emission concentration of NO_x required by the conditional permit was being met and that the CO emissions were greater than the conditional permit application indicated. The high CO emission rate was attributed to the water injected system on both turbines required by BAWM in the conditional permit as BACT for NO_x emissions. The water injection system caused a degradation of turbine combustion efficiency.

After consideration of the costs that Empire would incur and the minimal ambient effects of the increase in CO emissions, the BAWM is proposing that Empire be permitted to operate Unit No.'s 10 and 11 the number of hours stipulated in the conditional permit.

AND AGENTS

81-3-2. Broker-dealer, investment adviser and agents; fees. (a) The fee for original registration of each broker-dealer and each investment adviser, other than an individual investment adviser who does not have custody of customers' moneys, securities or other property, shall be \$100 and the fee for renewal of each broker-dealer registration and each such investment adviser shall be \$100.

(b) The fee for both original registration and for renewal shall be \$25 for:

(1) an individual investment adviser who does not have custody of customers' moneys, securities or other property; and

(2) an agent. (Authorized by K.S.A. 17-1270(f); implementing K.S.A. 17-1254; effective, E-82-24, Dec. 9, 1981; effective May 1, 1982; amended T-87-41, Dec. 8, 1986; amended May 1, 1987; amended T-81-9-12-88, Sept. 12, 1988; amended October 25, 1988; amended Jan. 15, 1990.)

Article 5.—EXEMPTIONS

81-5-6. Uniform limited offering exemption. (a) Any transaction involving the offer or sale of securities made in compliance with the federal securities act of 1933, regulation D, rules 230.505 or 230.506 except paragraph (b)(2)(ii), or both, including any offer or sale made exempt by application of Rule 508(a), as made effective in federal securities act of 1933 release nos. 33-6389, 33-6663, 33-6758, and 33-6825, and which satisfies the conditions, limitations, and requirements of this regulation, shall be exempt from the registration provisions of the Kansas securities act.

(1) No commission, finders fee, or other remuneration shall be paid or given, directly or indirectly, for soliciting any prospective purchaser, or in connection with the sale of securities in reliance on this exemption, unless the recipient is appropriately registered in this state as a broker-dealer, agent or investment adviser.

(2) Any exemption under this regulation shall not be available if the issuer, any of its directors, officers, general partners, beneficial owners of 10% or more of any class of its equity securities, any of its promoters currently connected with it in any capacity, or any person, other than a broker-dealer currently registered under K.S.A. 17-1254, who has been or will be paid or given, directly or indirectly, any commission or similar remuneration for solicitation of any prospective purchaser or in connection with sales of securities in reliance on this regulation:

(A) Has filed a registration statement which is subject to a currently effective stop order entered pursuant to any state law within five years prior to the commencement of the offering;

(B) has been convicted, within five years prior to com-

mencement of the offering, of any felony or misdemeanor in connection with the purchase or sale of any security or any felony involving fraud or deceit including, but not limited to, forgery, embezzlement, obtaining money under false pretenses, larceny or conspiracy to defraud;

(C) is currently subject to any state administrative order or judgment entered by a state securities administrator within five years prior to the commencement of the offering or is subject to any state administrative order or judgment in which fraud or deceit was found and the order of judgment was entered within five years prior to the commencement of the offering;

(D) is currently subject to any state administrative order or judgment which prohibits the use of any exemption from registration in connection with the purchase or sale of securities;

(E) is subject to any order, judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction temporarily or preliminarily restraining or enjoining, or is subject to any order, judgment or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction entered within five years prior to the commencement of the offering permanently restraining or enjoining, that person from engaging in or continuing any conduct or practice in connection with the purchase or sale of any security or involving the making of any false filing with any state.

(3) An issuer shall not be disqualified from use of this exemption if the issuer did not know and in the exercise of reasonable care could not have known that a disqualification under paragraph (2) existed.

(4) Paragraphs (2)(A) through (2)(C) above shall not apply if the party or interest subject to the disqualifying order is duly licensed to conduct securities-related business in the state in which the administrative order or judgment was entered against that party or interest.

(5) Any disqualification caused by paragraph (2) shall be automatically waived if the state which created the basis for disqualification determines, upon a showing of good cause, that it is not necessary under the circumstances to deny the exemption.

(6) The issuer shall file with the commissioner a notice on federal SEC Form D 17 CFR 239.500, as made effective by Release No. 33-6663, October 2, 1986, which may be obtained from the commissioner. The notice shall be filed not later than 15 days after the first sale of securities in an offering under this exemption.

(7) Every notice on form D shall be manually signed by a person duly authorized by the issuer.

(8) The notice shall contain an undertaking by the issuer to furnish the commissioner, upon written request, the information furnished by the issuer to offerees.

(9) The availability of this exemption shall not be denied an issuer offering and selling securities in reliance on this regulation and section 3(a)(11) of the federal securities act of 1933, if:

(A) The issuer does not file with the securities and exchange commission a notice pursuant to rule 230.503 of regulation D; and

(B) the issuer files a notice with the commissioner in compliance with paragraph (a)(6) of this rule.

(10) In any sale to a nonaccredited investor the investment shall be suitable or, the issuer and any person

acting on its behalf shall have reasonable grounds to believe, and after making reasonable inquiry shall believe, that the investment is suitable for the investor. Suitability shall be based upon the facts disclosed by the investor as to the investor's other security holdings, financial situation and needs. For the limited purpose of this condition only, it may be presumed that if the investment does not exceed 20% of the investor's net worth, excluding a principal residence, its furnishings and personal automobiles, it is suitable.

(11) A failure to comply with a term, condition or requirement of section (a)(1), (6), and (10) of this regulation will not result in loss of the exemption for any offer or sale to a particular individual or entity if the person relying on the exemption shows:

(A) The failure to comply did not pertain to a term, condition or requirement directly intended to protect that particular individual or entity;

(B) the failure to comply was insignificant with respect to the offering as a whole; and

(C) a good faith and reasonable attempt was made to comply with all applicable terms, conditions and requirements of section (a)(1), (6), and (10).

(12) Where an exemption is established only through reliance on section (a)(11) of this regulation the failure to comply shall nonetheless be actionable by the commissioner under K.S.A. 17-1266.

(b) Offers and sales which are exempt under this regulation shall not be combined with offers and sales exempt under any provision of the Kansas securities act or any regulations promulgated thereunder.

(c) In any proceedings involving this regulation, the burden of proving the exemption or an exception from a definition or condition shall be upon the person claiming it.

(d) In view of the objective of this rule and the purposes and policies underlying the Kansas securities act, this exemption shall not be available to any issuer with respect to any transaction which, although in technical compliance with this regulation, is part of a plan or scheme to evade registration or the conditions or limitations explicitly stated in this regulation.

(e) Upon showing of good cause, any of the conditions of paragraph (a)(2) of this exemption may be waived by order of the commissioner.

(f) The issuer shall be required to maintain, for a period of five years, a written record of all information furnished by it to all offerees.
