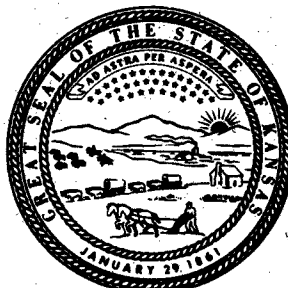

PERMANENT ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATION**

In the Vol. 8, No. 40, October 5, 1989, issue of the *Kansas Register*, the following subsection (2)(B) of K.A.R. 1-5-24 (page 1474) concerning overtime contained an error. The subsection should read as follows:

(B) Upon written request by an appointing authority, a higher maximum accumulation of compensatory time may be approved by the secretary of administration for a class or a group of eligible employees within that agency, provided that the maximum accumulation shall not exceed 240 hours.

ON PROPOSED
ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS**

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Monday, January 29, in the SRS board room, sixth floor, Docking State Office Building, 915 Harrison, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing rules and regulations on a temporary and permanent basis.

This 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written com-

ments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of Social and Rehabilitation Services, Room 603-N, Docking State Office Building, 915 Harrison, Topeka 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

The temporary regulations are proposed for adoption and are scheduled to become effective February 1, 1990. The permanent regulations are proposed for adoption and are scheduled to become effective April 1, 1990. A summary of proposed regulations and their economic impact follows.

The phrase "Federal Mandate" following an item indicates that the change is required by federal policy. Optional changes in regulations related to federal programs are subject to approval by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

TEMPORARY REGULATIONS**Article 4.—PUBLIC ASSISTANCE PROGRAM**

30-4-34. Program. This regulation is being amended to delete reference to the General Assistance Unrestricted (GAU) program. This change is being made because of the elimination of the General Assistance (GA) program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: None.

30-4-40. Agency responsibility to applicants and recipients. This regulation is being amended to delete the public list requirement for GA cash recipients. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

30-4-41. Assistance planning. This regulation is being amended to delete reference to the GA program in the mandatory filing unit definition. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: None.

This regulation is also being amended to remove the definition of "nonessential person." This change is being made because such persons are eligible for GA cash benefits and the GA program is being eliminated effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

30-4-50. Assistance eligibility, general. This regulation is being amended to delete reference to the GA program. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: None.

This regulation is being further amended to delete the provision which permits the secretary to waive certain eligibility requirements and adopt additional requirements for the purpose of utilizing special project funds or grants or for the purpose of conducting special demonstration or research projects. This change is based on an opinion of the Attorney General's office that such provision is self-regulatory and should not be in regulation.

Economic Impact: None.

30-4-54. Citizenship, alienage and residence. This regulation is being amended to delete the residency requirement regarding motor vehicle registration for GA clients. Other technical changes also have been made. These changes are being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

30-4-58. Potential employment. This regulation is being revoked as it pertained only to the GA program. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

30-4-59. Strikes. This regulation is being amended to delete reference to a GA adult. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: None.

30-4-63. KanWork program requirements. This regulation is being amended to delete the provisions regarding acceptance of a statement from a vocational rehabilitation counselor in determining incapacity for GA. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

This regulation is being further amended to delete reference to the GA program and a GA potential employment penalty in the provisions regarding KanWork penalties. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

30-4-64. Work program requirements. This regulation is being amended to delete the provision regarding acceptance of a statement from a vocational rehabilitation counselor in determining incapacity for GA. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

This regulation is being further amended to delete reference to the GA program and a GA potential employment penalty in the provisions regarding work program penalties. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

30-4-90. Eligibility factors specific to the GA-unrestricted (GAU) program. This regulation is being revoked to eliminate the GAU program effective February 1, 1990. This change is necessary because of shortfalls in the agency's budget for the remainder of fiscal year 1990.

Economic Impact: It is estimated that the elimination of the GAU program will result in a decrease in expenditures for the remainder of fiscal year 1990 of \$5,013,000, of which \$4,753,000 is state general fund money. If this program elimination continues in effect for the following fiscal year, the total yearly savings would be \$15,671,000, of which \$13,932,000 is state general fund money.

30-4-100. Payment standards for budgetary requirements in the ADC, ADC-FC, APW, and GA-FC pro-

grams. This regulation is being amended to delete reference to the GA program in the title. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: None.

This regulation is being further amended to delete provisions regarding budgeting of GAU cases with one or more children included in the assistance plan, for single persons, and for married couples with no children. Other technical changes have also been made. These changes are being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

30-4-102. Standards for children in foster care. This regulation is being amended to delete reference to using the foster care standard in the GAU program. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

30-4-105. Resources. This regulation is being amended to delete reference to the GA program. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: None.

30-4-106. General rules for consideration of resources, including real property, personal property, and income. This regulation is being amended to delete a GA-related K.A.R. cross-reference. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: None.

30-4-108. Real property. This regulation is being amended to remove the provisions regarding exempted real property for GA. Other technical changes have been made. These changes are being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

30-4-111. Applicable income. This regulation is being amended to delete reference to providing a \$30 and one-third earned income disregard to children in a GAU assistance plan. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

30-4-120. Special allowances and requirements for applicants and recipients of ADC, ADC-FC, APW, and GA-FC. This regulation is being amended to delete reference to the GAU program in the title. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: None.

30-4-130. Types of payments. This regulation is being amended to delete reference to subsistence allowances for GA clients. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

This regulation is being further amended to delete reference to the GA program in regard to protective pay-

ments. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: None.

30-4-140. Payments. This regulation is being amended to delete reference to the GA program as it relates to reduction of assistance payments as a means of overpayment recovery. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

Article 6.—MEDICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM— CLIENTS' ELIGIBILITY FOR PARTICIPATION

30-6-40. Agency responsibility to applicants and recipients. This regulation is being amended to delete reference to the GA program in disclosing confidential information. This change is being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

30-6-65. Automatic eligibles. This regulation is being amended to delete the reference to general assistance adults in the provision regarding qualifying for automatic eligibility for medical assistance through receipt of public assistance. This change is also being made because of the elimination of the GA program effective February 1, 1990.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

This regulation is being further amended to delete the provision regarding coverage of non-ADC children who meet the income and resource requirements of the ADC program. This provision allowed for federally-funded medical coverage of children who were receiving GA cash benefits. Due to the elimination of the GA program, this provision is no longer necessary. Other technical changes also have been made.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

30-6-106. General rules for consideration of resources, including real property, personal property, and income. This regulation is being amended to increase the maximum income allowance that can be provided to a community spouse from \$1,500 per month to \$1,565 per month. This increase reflects a 4.3 percent increase in the consumer price index for 1989. (Federal Mandate.)

Economic Impact: Estimated increased expenditures of \$19,500 (\$8,622.90 state general funds).

This regulation is being further amended to increase the minimum and maximum property allowances that an institutionalized spouse may make available to the community spouse to \$12,516 and \$62,580 respectively. These increases reflect a 4.3 percent increase in the consumer price index for 1989. (Federal Mandate.)

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

PERMANENT REGULATIONS

Article 4.—PUBLIC ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

30-4-73. Deprivation in ADC. This regulation is being amended to clarify that participation in the KanWork or work program is an eligibility criteria in the ADC-Unemployed Parent Program unless the individual is exempt.

Economic Impact: None.

This regulation is being further amended to clarify that if the unemployed parent is exempt from either the KanWork or work program due to remoteness, he or she must register for employment with the State Job Services Center.

Economic Impact: None.

30-4-85a. Eligibility factors specific to the EA program. This regulation is being amended to clarify that each applicant or recipient must meet the requirements of K.A.R. 30-4-59 regarding strikes. Persons participating in strikes are not eligible for emergency assistance.

Economic Impact: None.

30-4-96. Eligibility factors specific to the burial assistance (BA) program. This regulation is being amended to expand the six-month application filing date so that the application can be filed within six months from either the date of death or the date the body is released by a county coroner. Other technical wording changes also have been made.

Economic Impact: Estimated increased expenditures of \$6,900 (all state general funds).

Article 6.—MEDICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM— CLIENTS' ELIGIBILITY FOR PARTICIPATION

30-6-41. Assistance planning. This regulation is being amended to delete the mandatory filing unit provisions in the medical programs. Persons in the family group may now be included or excluded at the applicant's or recipient's request without a mandate that certain persons be included. (Federal Mandate.)

Economic Impact: Estimated increased expenditures of \$13,384.80 (\$5,918.75 state general funds).

30-6-74. Persons whose needs are to be considered with the needs of the ADC child. This regulation is being amended to delete the requirement that the needs of an ADC child's siblings be included in determining eligibility. The needs of the child's parents shall, however, continue to be included. This change is necessitated by the elimination of the mandatory filing unit provisions in K.A.R. 30-6-41. (Federal Mandate.) Other technical changes have been made.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-6-41.

30-6-79. Non-ADC child determined eligibles. This regulation is being amended to delete the requirement that the needs of all non-ADC siblings be included in determining eligibility. This change is necessitated by the elimination of the mandatory filing unit provisions in K.A.R. 30-6-41. (Federal Mandate.)

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-6-41.

30-6-106. General rules for consideration of resources, including real property, personal property, and income. This regulation is being amended to eliminate consideration of the income of a stepparent or parent of a minor parent. (Federal Mandate.) Other technical changes have also been incorporated.

Economic Impact: Estimated increased expenditures of \$446,160 (\$197,291.95 state general funds).

This regulation is being further amended to eliminate consideration of the resources of an alien sponsor. (Federal Mandate.)

Economic Impact: Estimated increased expenditures of \$6,692.40 (\$2,959.38 state general funds).

This regulation is being further amended to adopt on a permanent basis the temporary regulation that will become effective February 1, 1990, which increased the maximum income allowance a community spouse can receive from an institutional spouse to \$1,565 per month. (Federal Mandate.)

Economic Impact: Estimated increased expenditures of \$19,500 (\$8,622.90 state general funds).

This regulation is being further amended to adopt on a permanent basis the temporary regulation that will become effective February 1, 1990, which increased the amount of the minimum and maximum property allowances a community spouse can receive to \$12,516 and \$62,580 respectively. (Federal Mandate.)

Economic Impact: None.

30-6-111. Applicable income. This regulation is being amended to delete the provisions regarding the stepparent and parent of minor parent income disregards. (Federal Mandate.) Other technical changes also have been incorporated.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-6-106.

This regulation is also being amended to delete the section regarding attribution of an alien sponsor's income. (Federal Mandate.)

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-6-106.

Article 10.—ADULT CARE HOME PROGRAM OF THE MEDICAID (MEDICAL ASSISTANCE) PROGRAM

30-10-15a. Reimbursement. This regulation is being amended to add that payment for therapeutic beds must be prior authorized.

Economic Impact: None.

Article 51.—ADULT ABUSE, NEGLECT OR EXPLOITATION

1. 30-51-1 to 30-51-5. These regulations are being revoked.

Economic Impact: None.

The principal amount of the above described 1984 bonds shall become due and payable on February 1, 1990, at a redemption price equal to the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest thereon to said redemption date, together with a premium equal to 1 percent of the principal amount of the bonds so called for redemption and payment.

NOTICE CONCERNING PROPOSED PERMIT ACTION

The Secretary of Health and Environment is proposing to issue a permit in accordance with K.A.R. 28-19-14 (permits required) for the construction and operation of a sun-cured alfalfa pelleting mill in Harper.

This mill consists of a tub grinder with a cyclone, two pellet mills with coolers and cyclones, and conveyors, elevator legs, bins, receiving and load-out areas, and a diesel generator set to provide power for the mill. Production capacity is approximately five ton per hour. The cyclones have been observed to operate adequately within the emission limits of applicable Kansas pollution control regulations.

The mill must demonstrate, while operating at a production rate at which it expects to run, that it can meet the dust-control regulations in order for this permit to be valid.

Written materials, including the application and information related to the application submitted by Soilquest, the draft permit, permit summary and the analysis of KDHE describing the basis for the proposed permit, are available for public inspection during normal business hours through January 29 by contacting David Butler, KDHE Regional Office, 1919 Amidon, Suite 130, Wichita 67203, (316) 838-1071. The materials also can be reviewed at the Bureau of Air and Waste Management offices, Building 740, Forbes Field, Topeka 66620. Questions concerning the proposed permit should be directed to L.C. K.S.A. 65-3008 provides that any person affected by the issuance of a permit can request a public hearing prior to issuance of the permit. The request must be in writing and addressed to the secretary. If the secretary determines there is sufficient reason in the request, a public hearing will be conducted. The place, date and time of the hearing will be announced in this publication. NOTICE CONCERNING KANSAS WATER POLLUTION CONTROL PERMIT

In accordance with state regulations 28-16-57 through 63 and 28-18-1 through 4, and the authority vested with the state by the administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, tentative permits have been prepared for the water pollution abatement facilities for the feedlots described below. The tentative determinations for permit content are based on preliminary staff review, applying the appropriate standards and regulations of the state of Kansas and the EPA. The permit requires control of any existing or potential discharges to achieve the goal of "no discharge" whenever possible. The permit upon issuance will constitute a state water pollution control and national pollutant discharge elimination system permit.

PERMANENT ADMINISTRATIVE
 REGULATIONSArticle 21.—KANSAS ETHNIC MINORITY
 SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

88-21-1. Definitions. (a) "Parent" means a guardian or any person who is legally responsible for the maintenance, care, or support of a dependent who is an applicant under this program.

(b) "Parent's contribution" means the amount parents can reasonably be expected to contribute from their income and assets toward education costs for a dependent. This amount shall be determined based upon criteria approved by the board and established by the financial needs analysis agency selected by the board.

(c) "Independent student" means a student who demonstrates independence from a parent's support to the satisfaction of the board. Documentation that will meet U.S. department of education guidelines for an independent student may be required from the applicant, applicant's parent or parents, or guardian to verify emancipation from the parent or parents.

(d) "Student contribution" means the amount a student can contribute from the student's own work and resources toward a year's college education costs. This amount shall be determined based upon criteria approved by the board and established by the financial needs analysis agency selected by the board. The student contribution shall not be less than \$450.

(e) "Student resources" means assets, earnings, income or benefits from other sources, and any grant or loan coming directly to the student from non-college sources, as defined by the U.S. department of education in 34 C.F.R. 674.14, effective February 2, 1988, which is hereby adopted by reference.

(f) "Family contribution" means the sum of parents' contribution and student contribution.

(g) "Full-time enrollment" means a course load of a minimum of 12 semester credit hours.

(h) "Board of regents" or "board" means the state board of regents provided for in the constitution of this state.

(i) "Kansas ethnic minority scholarship offer" means the annual amount offered to an ethnic minority scholar under this program, rounded to the nearest \$10. Each ethnic minority scholarship offer shall be the lesser of the following amounts:

- (1) \$1,500;
- (2) the financial need of the ethnic minority scholar; or
- (3) the pro-rata amount determined by the board. (Authorized by L. 1989, Ch. 224, Sec. 4; implementing L. 1989, Ch. 224, Sec. 1-6; effective Feb. 12, 1990.)

88-21-2. Ethnic minority scholar selection. The board shall select ethnic minority scholars according to criteria of scholastic ability set forth in K.A.R. 88-21-3(e). (Authorized by L. 1989, Ch. 224, Sec. 4; implementing L. 1989, Ch. 224, Sec. 2; effective Feb. 12, 1990.)

88-21-3. Applicant eligibility. To be eligible for an ethnic minority scholarship offer, each applicant shall demonstrate to the executive director of the board that the applicant: (a) Qualifies as a resident of the state of Kansas for fee purposes at a state educational institution according to K.S.A. 76-729 and K.A.R. 88-3-1, *et seq.*;

- (b) is a member of an ethnic minority group;
- (c) is initially accepted or enrolled at an eligible Kansas postsecondary institution;
- (d) is an undergraduate who has never received a baccalaureate degree;

(e) has demonstrated scholastic ability through achievement of any one or more of the following:

- (1) recognition by the national merit scholarship corporation as a finalist, semi-finalist, national achievement finalist, Hispanic scholar, or commended scholar;
- (2) high school grade point average of 3.0 or higher, on a scale where an A equals 4.00, in the board of regents recommended high school curriculum;
- (3) competitive performance on the ACT assessment;
- (4) competitive performance on the SAT; or

(5) rank in upper one-third of high school graduating class;

(f) having received a Kansas ethnic minority scholarship and having completed the initial enrollment at an eligible postsecondary educational institution, has attained the academic standard of a cumulative 2.0 grade average for all postsecondary academic terms or semesters. The average shall be calculated on a 4.0 scale where an A equals four points;

(g) having received federal financial assistance, does not owe a refund on any federal financial assistance and is not in default on any such federal financial assistance; and

(h) has otherwise complied with the requirements of 34 C.F.R. 692.40(b), effective February 2, 1988, which is hereby adopted by reference. (Authorized by L. 1989, Ch. 224, Sec. 4; implementing L. 1989, Ch. 224, Sec. 2; effective Feb. 12, 1990.)

88-21-4. Application eligibility. Each application shall be eligible for consideration only if it: (a) Is submitted by an eligible applicant;

(b) meets all deadlines of the board listed on the application; and

(c) includes all required documentation and information. Only one application will be accepted from each eligible student. (Authorized by L. 1989, Ch. 224, Sec. 4; implementing L. 1989, Ch. 224, Sec. 4, 5; effective Feb. 12, 1990.)

88-21-5. Examination of income tax forms. Each individual whose financial data is required for a Kansas ethnic minority scholarship shall certify in writing that the individual will release copies of the individual's state or federal income tax returns to the executive officer of the board or the executive officer's designee upon request. If the request is denied or if discrepancies are found between the application and the copy of the tax return, the application may be declared ineligible. (Authorized by L. 1989, Ch. 224, Sec. 4; implementing L. 1989, Ch. 224, Sec. 4, 5; effective Feb. 12, 1990.)

88-21-6. Confidentiality of information. All financial information received from each applicant, parent, or spouse shall remain confidential and shall be released only in anonymous statistical groupings, except as provided in 88-21-5. (Authorized by L. 1989, Ch. 224, Sec. 4; implementing L. 1989, Ch. 224, Sec. 4, 5; effective Feb. 12, 1990.)

88-21-7. Available funds. If available funds are insufficient to fully fund all eligible applicants, awards may be pro-rated by the executive officer of the board or the executive officer's designee on a percentage basis to each eligible applicant. (Authorized by L. 1989, Ch. 224, Sec. 4; implementing L. 1989, Ch. 224, Sec. 4; effective Feb. 12, 1990.)

88-21-8. College certification. Upon the enrollment of Kansas ethnic minority scholarship recipients, each eligible postsecondary institution shall certify to the board that each recipient attending its institution: (a) is a resident of the state of Kansas for fee purposes at a state educational institution according to K.S.A. 76-729 and K.A.R. 88-3-1, *et seq.*;

(b) is providing a minimum of \$450 from the recipient's own work and resources;

(c) is not receiving more financial aid than the recipient's unmet need;

(d) is a full-time undergraduate student in good standing who is responsible for paying full tuition and required fees;

(e) has met the Kansas ethnic minority scholarship academic standard of a cumulative 2.0 grade point average for recipients participating in the Kansas ethnic minority scholarship program;

(f) has reported accurate parent or student income data, as verified by a copy of the income tax return for the most recent tax year or through other verification of income criteria as provided in 34 C.F.R. 668.51-668.58, effective April 29, 1986, which is hereby adopted by reference;

(g) for an independent grantee, that the grantee meets the U.S. department of education guidelines for an independent student as provided in 34 C.F.R. 668.2, effective February 2, 1988, which is hereby adopted by reference, and as verified by the institution;

(h) where applicable, is in compliance with the eligibility requirements of 34 C.F.R. 692.40, effective February 2, 1988, which is hereby adopted by reference; and

(i) if selected for verification review by the federal government, has successfully completed that review process. (Authorized by L. 1989, Ch. 224, Sec. 4; implementing L. 1989, Ch. 224, Sec. 4; effective Feb. 12, 1990.)

88-21-9. Scholarship offer.
