From Hazardous Waste Regulations

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment is providing public notice that on November 20, 1989, Safety-Kleen Corporation, 600 E. Trail, Dodge City, submitted a request for a renewal of a variance from specific hazardous waste regulations. The current variance expired on December 31, 1989. The request for a variance has been submitted in accordance with K.A.R. 28-31-13(a).

The variance is requested from K.A.R. 28-31-8 and 40 CFR 265.176, which requires that storage of containers holding ignitable hazardous waste must be located at least 15 meters (50 feet) from the facility's property line.

Safety-Kleen Corporation stores ignitable hazardous waste, which is collected from other firms that generate this waste. The hazardous waste is stored prior to being shipped off-site for reclamation. Safety-Kleen Corporation proposes to store this waste in a 300 square foot storage area located in the northeast corner of the warehouse approximately 10 feet from the east property line in an area zoned for heavy industrial use. KDHE has reviewed the variance request, and concluded that the variance is justified.

In accordance with K.A.R. 28-31-13(b), public notice is being provided of the tentative decision to grant renewal of the variance. Copies of the variance request will be available for review until February 3 from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. weekdays at the KDHE, Building 730, Forbes Field, Topeka, and at the KDHE district office, 302 W. McArthur Road, Dodge City.

Comments concerning this variance request may be directed to Glynis Perry, Hazardous Waste Section, KDHE, Topeka 66620. Comments must be submitted in writing prior to February 3. Requests for additional information may be made by contacting KDHE at (913) 296-6898.

Upon the written request of any interested person, a public meeting may be held to consider comments on this tentative decision. The person requesting a meeting shall state the issues to be raised and shall explain why written comments would not suffice to communicate the person's views. If a decision is made to conduct a public meeting, a separate public notice detailing the date and place of a public meeting will be issued.

After evaluating all public comments, a final decision will be made by the secretary and a notice of the final decision will be published in the *Kansas Register*. If approved, any conditions or time limitations needed to comply with all applicable state or federal laws or to protect human health or safety or the environment shall be specified by the secretary. A date upon which the variance will no longer be valid shall be prescribed in the final decision.

The Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services is soliciting applications for implementation of Stewart B. McKinney Emergency Shelter Grant Programs (ESGP). Grants will be made to units of local government to help improve the safety and quality of existing emergency shelters for the homeless; make available additional accommodations for the homeless; meet the costs of operating emergency shelters; provide new or additional essential services to the homeless; and prevent the incidence of homelessness.

New rules and regulations were published for the ESGP in the *Federal Register*, Volume 54, No. 214, Tuesday, November 7, 1989. Copies of the new rules and a summary of changes will be provided to all applicants as part of the application materials.

SRS wishes to ensure funds for this program provide services and activities that will result in long term benefits to the homeless population in Kansas. Since applications for funding may exceed available monies, SRS will fund requests as follows:

- A. Fifty percent of available funding will be granted for Conversion, Renovation, and Major Rehabilitation Projects. Within this category, preference will be given in the following order:
 1. Projects that improve the safety of an existing emergency shelter for the homeless, e.g. security systems, smoke/fire detection systems, and systems

(heating/cooling, plumbing, and electrical) found to be unsafe and "red tagged" by local building inspectors or utility companies;

2. projects that create new or increase existing sleeping/living accommodations, e.g. creating a new emergency shelter, adding new rooms onto an existing emergency shelter, or converting existing rooms into sleeping facilities;
 3. projects that improve living conditions of an existing emergency shelter, e.g. replacement heating/cooling equipment, attic fans, and remodeling of kitchen and bath facilities.
- B. Thirty percent of available funding will be granted for Operations and Maintenance Projects. Within this category, preference will be given in the following order:
 1. Projects that provide for the purchase of equipment and furnishings, e.g. kitchen appliances, replacement beds, blankets, and bedding;
 2. projects that provide for the payment of operating expenses, e.g. utility, lease, and insurance payments. Up to 50 percent of operating expenses will be awarded, based on documented prior year costs.
 - C. Twenty percent of available funding will be granted for Essential Services and Homeless Prevention Projects. Within this category, preference will be given in the following order:
 1. Projects that provide new or increased existing services to the homeless, e.g. education, literacy training, and employment counseling;
 2. projects that prevent families from becoming homeless, e.g. subsidies to help defray rent arrearages.

SRS reserves the right to reallocate funds that are not requested or granted within any category. Remaining amounts will be reallocated to categories in which applications exceed available funds. Moreover, maximum individual grant amounts may be established for any categorical preference.

All applications for Emergency Shelter Grant Program funds must be submitted by units of local governments (city or county) no later than February 2. Shelter operators and homeless service providers may request and complete applications for their local government.

Notice of Hearing
 on Proposed
 Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Wednesday, February 7, in the third floor conference room of the Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed regulations of the Insurance Department.

Copies of the full text of the regulations and the economic impact statements may be obtained by writing to the Commissioner of Insurance, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka 66612. The following is a summary of the economic impact statements and the regulations:

K.A.R. 40-3-35: The amendment to this regulation is an editorial correction of the statutory citation referenced in the first paragraph of section (a).

This correction will have no economic impact on the insurance industry, the insuring public or the Insurance Department.

K.A.R. 40-4-35a: The amendments to K.A.R. 40-4-35a will accomplish the first step toward accommodating the recent repeal of the Catastrophic Health Insurance Act of 1988. The most important requirement contained in the regulation is the notice that must be provided policyholders of the changes in medicare coverage, medicare supplement coverage and applicable premium adjustments.

The amendments to this regulation will have no economic impact on policyholders, insurers or the Insurance Department because the premium adjustments, notice requirements and other fiscal effects are a direct result of the change in federal law.

K.A.R. 40-4-38: This is a new regulation that is designed to protect purchasers of accident and sickness policies covering specified diseases. Specifically, the regulation will prevent insurers from taking advantage of insurance consumers by constantly replacing a specified disease policy and thereby constantly subjecting insureds to new waiting periods of one kind or another that effectively prevents coverage from ever becoming effective. In addition, the regulation requires that credit for any time already served under such waiting periods be credited to the insured if he or she purchases an additional specified disease policy since the primary purpose of waiting, elimination, probationary and similar time periods would have been realized under the original policy.

This regulation will have an adverse economic impact on insurers and a favorable economic impact on insurance consumers by requiring the payment of benefits in cases where they are now excluded. Such economic impact cannot be quantified. It will have no impact on the Insurance Department.

K.A.R. 40-7-11: The amendment to this regulation is necessary to recognize the fact that insurance agencies are now licensed as agents and certification of an agency by an insurer automatically extends to each licensed agent employed by the agency.

This regulation will have no economic impact on in-

surers, insurance agents, insurance consumers, or the Insurance Department.

K.A.R. 40-7-22: This is a new regulation that is designed to prevent insurers from circumventing the intent of the agents' licensing laws by appointing and assuming responsibility for only certain agents within an agency when it is clear that all agents in the agency can and will be producing business.

This regulation will have an adverse economic impact on insurers or agencies who are presently not paying a certification fee for all agents in an agency. Depending on the number of companies and agents involved, this economic impact could be significant in amount but a dollar estimate cannot be calculated. The economic impact on the Insurance Department and consumers will be favorable because disputes about which agent is responsible for which insurance contract will be minimized.

K.A.R. 40-7-23: This regulation simply identifies the name to be used by insurance agencies seeking a license if they do business under a name different than that used for their corporate or "legal" identity.

This regulation will have no economic impact on insurers, insurance agents, insurance consumers or the Insurance Department.

K.A.R. 40-7-24: This is a new regulation which recognizes that people as opposed to impersonal business entities solicit insurance. Therefore, it requires that each insurance agency employ at least one licensed individual agent. The exception for credit insurance is necessary to accommodate the special statutory provisions applicable to persons who arrange for the inclusion of insurance in connection with a credit transaction.

This regulation should have no economic impact on insurers, insurance agents, insurance consumers or the Insurance Department.

K.A.R. 40-7-25: This regulation simply clarifies the underlying statutory provisions since the automatic certification of all agents in an agency is dependent upon the agency having a contract and agency appointment by the certifying company. Thus, if the agency contract is terminated, certification of all agents in the agency will be automatically terminated as provided by the regulation.

This regulation would have no economic impact on the insurers, insurance agents, insurance consumers or the Insurance Department.

K.A.R. 40-14-1: The amendment to this regulation specifies a certain time (30 days) within which the sale of controlling interest in a premium finance company must be reported to the commissioner.

This regulation would have no economic impact on the insurers, insurance agents, insurance consumers or the Insurance Department.

K.A.R. 40-14-4: The amendment to this regulation specifies the style of type that must be used in printing premium finance agreements that are to be used on and after January 1, 1991.

The amendment to this regulation will have an adverse economic impact on premium finance companies who do not currently print their premium finance agreements in 10-point, pica-style type. However, because the requirement for pica style type does not become effective until

(continued)

January 1, 1991, the ability to deplete existing supplies should minimize the fiscal effect. The amendment will have no direct economic impact on insurance consumers and, except for the review and filing of the new forms, no economic impact on the Insurance Department.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Commissioner of Insurance. The period of time between the date of publication of this notice and the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing.

Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 6.—RECRUITING AND STAFFING

1-6-32. Applicant drug screening test for safety-sensitive positions. (a) A drug test shall be administered to an applicant only when that applicant has been given a conditional offer of employment for a safety-sensitive position.

(b) A conditional offer of employment for purposes of this regulation means the offer is contingent upon participating in the drug screening program established under K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 75-4362.

(c) Failure to participate in the required drug screening test or a confirmed positive result based upon a test sample obtained from the applicant shall make the conditional offer of employment null and void.

(d) All applicants who have been given a conditional offer of employment shall be informed of the provisions of subsection (b) in writing and shall sign a statement agreeing to participate in the test prior to the test being administered. Failure to accept this condition shall make the conditional offer of employment null and void.

(e) Each applicant required to submit to a drug screen shall be advised of:

- (1) the methods of drug screening which may be used;
- (2) substances which may be identified;
- (3) consequences of a refusal to submit to a drug screening test or of a confirmed positive result; and
- (4) reasonable efforts to maintain the confidentiality of results and any medical information which may be provided.

(f) Procedures and testing personnel used in collecting, analyzing and evaluating test samples shall meet the standards established by the director. Drug screening tests may screen for any substances listed in the Kansas controlled substances act. The substances to be identified by the tests and the threshold level of those substances shall be determined by the director.

(g) Any applicant who has reason to believe that technical standards were not adhered to in deriving the applicant's confirmed "positive" result may appeal the result in writing to the director within 14 calendar days of receiving written notice of the result.

(h) A retest by the original or a different laboratory on the same or a new specimen may be authorized only by the director, if the director determines that the technical standards established for test methods or chain-of-custody procedures were violated in deriving a confirmed "positive" result or there is other appropriate cause to warrant a retest.

(i) Any applicant who intentionally tampers with a sample provided for drug screening, violates the chain-of-custody or identification procedures or falsifies test results shall have the conditional offer of employment withdrawn and such actions shall be grounds for disqualification for all positions in state service in accordance with K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 75-2940.

(j) If the result of a drug screening test warrants disqualification action, an applicant shall be afforded due process in accordance with K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 75-2940 and K.A.R. 1-6-7 before any final action is taken.

(k) (1) Individual test results and medical information shall be considered confidential and shall not be disclosed publicly in accordance with K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 75-4362. An applicant shall be granted access to the applicant's information upon written request to the director.

(2) Each agency shall be responsible for maintaining strict security and confidentiality of drug screening records in that agency. Access to these records shall be restricted to the agency personnel officer, or a designee, persons in the supervisory chain of command, the agency legal counsel, the agency appointing authority, or a designee, the secretary of administration, or a designee, department of administration legal counsel and the director, or a designee. Further access to these records shall not be authorized without the express consent of the director. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 75-4362; effective T-1-10-28-88, Oct. 28, 1988; effective Dec. 19, 1988; amended Feb. 19, 1990.)

Article 9.—HOURS; LEAVES; EMPLOYEE- MANAGEMENT RELATIONS

1-9-19a. Drug screening test for employees in safety-sensitive positions. (a) Any employee in a safety-sensitive position may be required to submit to a drug screening test in accordance with K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 75-4362 based upon reasonable suspicion of illegal drug use by that employee.

(1) Reasonable suspicion involves a judgment, supported by specific articulable facts or plausible inferences, made regarding the employee's behavior or evidence found or reported that indicate drug use by the employee. Reasonable suspicion may be based on, among other circumstances, one or more of the following:

(A) an on-the-job accident or occurrence where there is evidence to indicate:

(i) the accident or occurrence was in whole or in part the result of the employee's actions or inactions;

(ii) the employee exhibited behavior or in other ways

demonstrated that the employee may have been using drugs or under the influence of drugs; or

(iii) a combination of these factors;

(B) an on-the-job incident that could be attributable to drug use by the employee including, but not limited to, a medical emergency;

(C) direct observation of behavior exhibited by the employee which may render the employee unable to perform the employee's job, in whole or part, of which may pose a threat to safety or health;

(D) information that the employee:

(i) may be using drugs or is under the influence of drugs and such is affecting on-the-job performance; or

(ii) exhibits behavior that may render the employee unable to perform the employee's job or may have posed a threat to safety or health. Such information shall be supported by documentation which has been verified by a person with the authority to determine reasonable suspicion;

(E) physical on-the-job evidence of drug use by the employee or possession of drug paraphernalia;

(F) documented deterioration in the employee's job performance that could be attributable to drug use by the employee; and

(G) any other circumstance providing an articulate basis for reasonable suspicion.

(2) Agencies may ask a current employee in a designated safety-sensitive position to submit to a drug screening test under the circumstances of reasonable suspicion as a condition of employment. Refusal to comply with these requirements shall be considered the equivalent of receiving a confirmed positive result for referral or disciplinary purposes.

(b) Each employee required to submit to a drug screening test shall be notified of that requirement in writing. Each employee required to submit to a drug screen shall be advised of:

(1) the methods of drug screening which may be used;

(2) substances which may be identified;

(3) consequences of a refusal to submit to a drug screening test or a confirmed positive result; and

(4) reasonable efforts to maintain the confidentiality of results and any medical information which may be provided.

(c) Procedures and testing personnel used in collecting, analyzing and evaluating test samples shall meet the standards established by the director. Drug screening tests may screen for any substances listed in the Kansas controlled substances act. The substances to be identified by the tests and the threshold levels of those substances shall be determined by the director.

(d) Any employee who has reason to believe that technical standards were not adhered to in deriving the employee's confirmed "positive" result may appeal the result in writing to the director within 14 calendar days of receiving written notice of the result.

(e) A retest by the original or a different laboratory on the same or a new specimen may be authorized only by the director, if the director determines that the technical standards established for test methods or chain-of-custody procedures were violated in deriving a confirmed "positive" result or has other appropriate cause to warrant a retest.

(f) An employee who receives a confirmed "positive" drug screen result shall be subject to dismissal in accordance with K.S.A. 75-2949d, K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 75-4362 and K.A.R. 1-10-8 as follows.

(1) The employee shall not be subject to dismissal solely on the basis of the confirmed positive result if the employee has not previously had a confirmed positive result or the equivalent and the employee successfully completes an appropriate and approved drug assessment and recommended education or treatment program.

(2) The employee shall be subject to dismissal pursuant to K.A.R. 1-10-8 if the employee is on probation, other than for a promotional appointment, at the time the employee was given written notice of the drug screen requirement.

(3) The employee shall be subject to dismissal in accordance with K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 75-2949f if the employee fails to successfully complete an appropriate and approved drug assessment and recommended education and treatment program.

(4) The employee shall be subject to dismissal, in accordance with K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 75-2949f, if the employee has previously had a confirmed "positive" result or the equivalent.

(5) This regulation shall not preclude the agency appointing authority from proposing disciplinary action in accordance with K.S.A. 75-2949d for other circumstances that occur in addition to a confirmed "positive" result and which are normally grounds for discipline.

(g) Any current employee who intentionally tampers with a sample provided for drug screening, violates chain-of-custody or identification procedures or falsifies a test result shall be subject to dismissal pursuant to K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 75-2949f.

(h) If the result of a drug screening test warrants disciplinary action and before any final action is taken, a permanent employee shall be afforded due process in accordance with K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 75-2949 and K.A.R. 1-10-6 and a probationary employee shall be afforded due process in accordance with K.A.R. 1-10-8.

(i) (1) Individual results and medical information shall be considered confidential and shall not be disclosed publicly in accordance with K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 75-4362. An employee shall be granted access to the employee's information upon written request to the director.

(2) Each agency shall be responsible for maintaining strict security and confidentiality of drug screening records in that agency. Access to these records shall be restricted to the agency personnel officer, or a designee, persons in the supervisory chain of command, the agency legal counsel, the agency appointing authority, or a designee, the secretary of administration, or a designee, department of administration legal counsel and the director, or a designee. Further access to these records shall not be authorized without the express consent of the director. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 75-4362; effective T-1-10-28-88, Oct. 28, 1988; effective Dec. 19, 1988; amended Feb. 19, 1990.)

Topeka Blvd., Topeka, to consider the proposed change in an existing rule and regulation of the Board of Healing Arts. The proposed permanent regulation will become effective 45 days after its publication in the Kansas Register.

This 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rule and regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Richard G. Gannon, Executive Director, Board of Healing Arts, Suite 553, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. For persons intending to present testimony at the hearing, prior notice to the board office would be helpful in arranging the agenda. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

This regulation is proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of the proposed regulation and its economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 100-49-4. Fees. Amendment to this regulation provides for an increase of the examination fee for podiatrists licensed by the Board of Healing arts.

This regulation would not increase the revenue of the board. The increase is a result of the board decision to change the examination from one prepared by the board to an examination prepared by a national testing organization. This new board-approved examination is provided at a higher cost than the examination previously approved and prepared by the board. The economic impact to the licensees will be an additional \$270 each for an estimated eight applicants who annually apply to be licensed to practice podiatry in the state of Kansas.

Other governmental agencies, private citizens and consumers will not be affected by this change.
