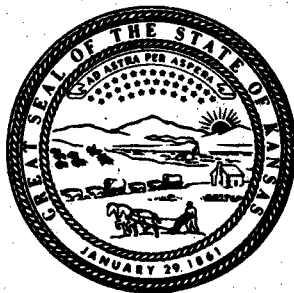

Opinion No. 90-34

Public Health—Central Interstate Low-Level Radioactive Waste Compact—Central Interstate Low-Level Radioactive Waste Compact; State Liability. Representative John D. McClure, 106th District, Glen Elder, March 22, 1990.

The construction of an interstate compact approved by Congress is a federal question. In determining whether a state has waived its constitutional protection from liability under the Eleventh Amendment of the United States Constitution, waiver will be found only where stated by the most express language or by such overwhelming implications from the text of the compact that no room is left for any other reasonable construction. Such a waiver is not indicated within the provisions of the central interstate low-level radioactive waste compact. However, because the Central Interstate Low-level Radioactive Waste Commission established under the compact is not a state agency for Eleventh Amendment purposes, the Eleventh Amendment protection will not be extended to the commission. If a judgment is awarded against the commission, the only state money obtainable would be the \$25,000 each member state pays annually to fund the commission until it becomes self-sustaining. Opinion No. 90-34A

Public Health—Central Interstate Low-Level Radioactive Waste Compact—Central Interstate Low-Level Radioactive Waste Compact; State Liability. Representative John D. McClure, 106th District, Glen Elder, March 26, 1990.

Attorney General Opinion No. 90-34 addresses only the question of the state of Kansas' liability in a private lawsuit for damages caused by the operation of a regional low-

level radioactive waste disposal facility. The opinion does not address the Kansas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana agreement to assist Nebraska in covering its costs associated with a disposal facility as provided for in Art. III(d) of the central interstate low-level radioactive waste compact. Such assistance, rendered to Nebraska pursuant to Art. III(d), would be required under the terms of the compact. Opinion No. 90-35

Public Health—Uniform Vital Statistics Act—Adoption Cases—Change of Date of Birth on Birth Certificate of Adopted Child. Mary Kathleen Babcock, Attorney at Law, Board of Education of U.S.D. 259, Wichita, March 23, 1990.

The adoption of a child creates a new domestic relations status of parent and child. Adoptions and the legal consequences of adoption are controlled by statute. A district court does not have statutory authority to alter the adopted child's birth date in the final order of adoption. Public Health—Social Workers—Licensure; Delegating Licensing Function. Mary Ann Gabel, Executive Director, Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board, Topeka, March 23, 1990.

The Behavioral Sciences Regulatory Board may delegate to its staff the task of issuing licenses to practice social work if there is no discretion involved in completing the ministerial task. If executive/legislative discretion must be applied, such delegation is proper when attended with adequate safeguards and standards to guide the exercise of discretion. If issuing or denying a license involves the exercise of discretion as it pertains to personal fitness, the determination of fitness may be delegated provided there is an avenue for relief through an appellate process. Counties and County Officers—Sewer Districts—Improvement and Service Districts; Creation of District by Petition; Contents. Henry R. Blase, Sedgwick County Counselor, Wichita, March 27, 1990.

Petition provisions set forth in K.S.A. 19-27a01 are sufficient to ensure valid petitions submitted in accordance with their terms. The woodworking shop has two moulders, three saws, two shapers and one sander. A fabric filter is provided to collect dust generated in the operation of this machinery. Particulate matter is the pollutant of concern. Opacity of visible emissions from any point at the plant is limited to 20 percent.

If any bond be called for redemption and payment as aforesaid, all interest on such bond shall cease from and after the date for which such call is made, provided funds are available for its payment at the price hereinbefore specified.

Conditions of Bids

Proposals will be received on the bonds bearing such rate or rates of interest as may be specified by the bidders, subject to the following conditions: The same rate shall apply to all bonds of the same maturity. Each interest rate specified shall be a multiple of $\frac{1}{8}$ or $\frac{1}{20}$ of 1 percent. Bidders shall specify in the bid form the prices (exclusive of accrued interest), expressed as a dollar price, at which the bidder intends that each maturity amount of the bonds shall be initially offered to the public (the initial reoffering prices).

Basis of Award

The award of the bonds will be made on the basis of the lowest net interest cost to the city, which will be determined by subtracting the amount of the premium bid, if any, from the total interest cost to the city. If there is any discrepancy between the net interest cost and the average annual net interest rate specified, the specified net interest cost shall govern and the interest rates specified in the bid shall be adjusted accordingly. The bonds will be general obligations of the city payable as to both principal and interest, payable from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limitation as to rate or amount on all the taxable tangible property, real and personal, within the territorial limits of the city.

Internal Revenue Code of 1986

In the opinion of Nichols and Wolfe Chartered, bond counsel, under existing law, the interest on the bonds is excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes, except as follows:

(a) Interest on a bond during any period while it is held by a "substantial user" of the facilities financed by the bonds or a "related person" within the meaning of Section 147(a) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, will be includable in gross income; and

(b) interest on the bonds may become includable in gross income if the tenant or another person takes action after the date of issuance of the bonds that causes either the \$10,000,000 limitation set forth in Section 144(a) (4) of the code or the \$40,000,000 limitation set forth in Section 144(a) (10) of the code to be exceeded. In the case of a violation of the \$40,000,000 limit, interest on

the bonds would be includable in gross income retroactive to the date of issuance of the bonds.

Furthermore, interest on the bonds is an item of tax preference for purposes of the federal alternative minimum tax imposed on individuals and corporations. In addition, bond counsel's opinion as to tax exemption is subject to the condition that the city comply with all requirements of the code that must be satisfied subsequent to the issuance of the bonds in order that interest thereon continue to be excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes. The city has covenanted to comply with such requirements. Failure to comply with certain of such requirements may cause the inclusion of interest on the bonds in federal gross income retroactive to the date of issuance of the bonds. The city's failure to comply with such requirements could adversely affect the tax-exempt status of the bonds. Purchasers of the bonds should be aware that should the bonds lose their status as tax-exempt obligations as a result the city's failure to comply with such requirements, the bonds are neither callable nor will the rate of interest on the bonds be adjusted to reflect such circumstances. Bond counsel expresses no opinion regarding other federal tax consequences arising with respect to the bonds.

Prospective purchasers of the bonds should be aware that: (i) Section 265 of the code denies a deduction for interest on indebtedness incurred or continued to purchase or carry the bonds, or, in the case of a financial institution, that portion of such institution's interest expense allocable to interest on the bonds; (ii) with respect to insurance companies subject to the tax imposed by Section 831 of the code, Section 832(b) (5) (B) (i) reduces the deduction for loss reserves by 15 percent of the sum of certain items, including interest on the bonds; (iii) for taxable years beginning before January 1, 1992, interest on the bonds earned by some corporations could be subject to the environmental tax imposed by Section 59A of the code; (iv) interest on the bonds earned by certain foreign corporations doing business in the United States could be subject to a branch profits tax imposed by Section 884 of the code; (v) passive investment income, including interest on the bonds, may be subject to federal income taxation under Section 1375 of the code for Subchapter S corporations that have Subchapter C earnings and profits at the close of the taxable year, if greater than 25 percent of the gross receipts of such Subchapter S corporation is passive investment income; and (vi) Section 86 of the code requires recipients of certain Social Security and certain Railroad Retirement benefits to take into account, in determining gross income, receipts or accruals of interest on the bonds. These categories of bondowners should consult their own tax advisors as to the applicability of these consequences.

Legal Opinion

The bonds will be sold subject to the legal opinion of Nichols and Wolfe Chartered, Topeka, Kansas, bond counsel, whose approving legal opinion as to the validity of the bonds will be furnished and paid for by the city, printed on the bonds and delivered to the successful bidder when the bonds are delivered. Said opinion will also state that in the opinion of bond counsel, assuming continued compliance by the city with the provisions of the

ordinance authorizing the issuance of the bonds, the interest on the bonds is excluded from the computation of Kansas adjusted gross income for taxable years commencing after December 31, 1987.

Delivery and Payment

The city will pay for printing the bonds and will deliver the bonds, without cost to the successful bidder, properly prepared, executed and registered, on or about May 10, 1990, at such bank or trust company in the state of Kansas or the greater Kansas City, Missouri, metropolitan area. Article 3.—INSTANT GAME RULES

111-3-12. Determination of Instant Prize Winners.

The following subparagraphs specify how an instant prize winner is determined for instant games:

(a) The player must remove or "scratch off" the removable layer of material covering the play area to reveal the six play symbols and captions. If any three play symbols match, the player wins the prize designated by the rules of the game.

(b) In any event, only the highest instant prize shall be paid on a given ticket.

(c) Once a player has collected a prize from a retailer, the player shall not be entitled to any other prize even if the prize paid by the retailer was less than the prize actually entitled to.

(d) Only play symbols are used for determination of entitlement to instant prizes. Play symbol captions, validation numbers, agent validation codes, book-ticket numbers, any portion of the display printing and any extraneous materials are not play symbols and shall not be usable or playable to win instant prizes.

(e) In all events, the determination of instant prize winners shall be subject to the general ticket validation requirements set forth in K.A.R. 111-3-13 and the requirements set forth on the back of each instant game ticket.

(f) An instant ticket is a bearer instrument until signed on the back by the owner. The prize payable for an unsigned instant ticket shall be paid to the bearer thereof unless the ticket has been signed on the back. Once a ticket has been signed on the back, any prize payable for such ticket shall be paid to the apparent owner of the ticket as evidenced by such signature.

(g) No particular prize may be paid more than once.

(h) All instant prizes not including those associated with the televised draw show, must be claimed within 180 days of the game start date including day of game start as announced by the executive director. Any instant prize not claimed by such date and in the manner specified on the back of each ticket shall be forfeited. If a claim is to be mailed to the lottery, the envelope containing the winning ticket and the claim form, must be postmarked within the 180-day limit noted above.

(i) The right of any person to a prize shall not be assignable, except that payment of any prize may be paid to the estate of a deceased prize winner or to a person designated pursuant to an appropriate judicial order. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-8710 (b), (c), & (i); implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-8710 (b), (c) & (i) and 74-8720 (b) & (d); effective, T-89-4, Jan. 21, 1988; amended, T-111-4-13-89, April 13, 1989; amended, T-111-3-14-90, March 2, 1990.)

RULES FOR INSTANT GAME NO. 20
"JOKER'S WILD II"

111-4-205. Name of Game. The Kansas lottery shall conduct an instant winner lottery game entitled "Joker's Wild II" commencing on March 15, 1990. The specific rules for the "Joker's Wild II" are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-205 through 111-4-208. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-14-90, March 2, 1990.)

111-4-206. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "Joker's Wild II" instant lottery game:
(a) "Play symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the play symbols are printed in black ink in 18 pt. Ealing. A play symbol appears in each of five play spots within the play area. Each play symbol for this instant game is one of the following: "9," "10," "J," "Q," "K," "A," or a joker.

(b) "Play symbol captions" are the words or portions of words printed beneath each play symbol in the play area and are used to repeat or explain the play symbol. The play symbol caption associated with each play symbol is as follows:

A	ACE
Joker	JKR

(c) "Ticket validation number" means a unique number appearing on each ticket which is used to validate winning tickets. For this instant game, the ticket validation number is a 10-digit number which appears on the front of each instant ticket and will be covered by latex.

(d) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. For this instant game, the book-ticket number is an 8-digit book number followed by a dash and then a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000 and end with 299. The book-ticket number is printed in black ink on the front of each instant game ticket.

(e) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. In this instant game, the retailer validation code is a two letter code printed and appearing in two of five varying locations among the play symbols in either Game 1 or Game 2. The codes and their meanings are as follows: AA = FREE; DD = \$2.00; KK = \$4.00; JJ = \$10.00; NN = \$20.00. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-14-90, March 2, 1990.)

111-4-207. Determination of Instant Prize Winners. An instant prize winner is determined for this instant game when the player removes or "scratches off" the removable layer of material covering the play area to reveal the five play symbols and captions. If any three play symbols match, or if two matching symbols and a Joker symbol appear, the player wins the following prize:

Article 5.—KANSAS LOTTO AMERICA GAME RULES

111-5-11. Game Description; Retail Sale of Tickets.

(a) "Lotto America" is a six out of 54 lotto game which pays prizes on a pari-mutuel basis. Each player selects two sets of six different numbers between one and 54 for input into a terminal.

(b) A "Lotto America" game ticket shall sell for one dollar.

(c) Tickets shall not be sold to any person under the age of 18 years. Each retailer may require a person purchasing tickets to produce proof of age.

(d) Each ticket shall be purchased either from a terminal operated by a retailer or from a terminal operated by the player. If a ticket is purchased from a retailer, the player may select each set by:

(1) communicating the six numbers to the retailer;

(2) marking six numbered squares in any one game board on a play slip and submitting the play slip to the retailer; or

(3) requesting a "computer pick" from the retailer.

The retailer shall then issue a ticket from the terminal containing the selected set or sets of numbers, each of which constitutes a game play.

Tickets may be purchased from a player-activated terminal by use of a touch screen or by inserting a play slip into the terminal.

(e) A validated ticket shall be the only proof of a game play or plays. The only method of claiming a prize or prizes shall be the submission of the winning ticket to and receipt of the ticket by the lottery or its authorized agent. A pay slip shall have no pecuniary or prize value and shall not be used as evidence of a ticket purchase or of numbers selected.

(f) A ticket shall not be voided or cancelled by returning the ticket to the selling retailer, including tickets that are printed in error.

(g) Each player shall be responsible for verifying the accuracy of the game play or plays and other data printed on the ticket. The placing of plays is done at the player's own risk through the on-line retailer who is deemed to be acting on behalf of the player in entering the play or plays. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8710; implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8710 and 74-8718; effective, T-89-4, Jan. 21, 1988; amended, T-111-1-27-89, January 26, 1989; amended, T-111-3-14-90, March 2, 1990.)

Article 7.—CASH LOTTO GAME RULES

111-7-3. Game Description; Retail Sale of Tickets.

(a) Cash Lotto is a twice weekly six (6) of thirty-three (33) Lotto game which pays prizes for correctly picking six (6) of six (6) numbers on a pari-mutuel basis with a minimum guaranteed prize of Twenty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) and set prizes of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) for picking five (5) of six (6) numbers, and Ten Dollars (\$10.00) for picking four (4) of six (6) numbers correctly.

(b) To play Cash Lotto, a player shall select a set of six (6) different numbers between one (01) and thirty-three (33), for input into a terminal. Tickets may be pur-

chased from a terminal operated by a retailer (i.e., a clerk-activated terminal). When purchased from a retailer, the player may select each two (2) sets of numbers by: 1) communicating the numbers to the retailer; 2) by marking two, or four, six, eight or ten boards with six (6) numbers on each play slip and submitting the play slip to the retailer; or 3) requesting a quick pick from the retailer.

The retailer will then issue a ticket from the terminal containing the selected sets of numbers, each of which constitutes a game play. Should a player submit a play slip on which one or more boards are marked to indicate number selections and one or more other boards indicate quick pick, the system shall follow the player's intentions as marked on the play slip.

(c) A validated ticket shall be the only proof of a game play or plays, and the submission of a winning ticket to and the receipt of the ticket by the Lottery or its authorized retailer shall be the sole method of claiming a prize or prizes. A play slip has no pecuniary or prize value and shall not constitute evidence of ticket purchase or of numbers selected.

(d) A ticket may not be voided or cancelled by returning the ticket to the selling retailers, including tickets that are printed in error.

(e) Drawings will be conducted twice weekly, on Wednesdays and Saturdays between 8:15 p.m. and 9:00 p.m. central time (CT) after the game is closed, and the external auditor has verified that the game is closed, under conditions and procedures promulgated by the executive director of the lottery.

(f) It shall be the sole responsibility of the player to verify the accuracy of the game plays and other data printed on the ticket. The placing of plays is done at the player's own risk through the on-line retailer who is acting on behalf of the player in entering the plays. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8710, effective, T-89-25, May 31, 1988; amended, T-111-11-2-89, Oct. 27, 1989; amended, T-111-3-14-89, March 2, 1990.)

Article 8.—PULL-TAB INSTANT TICKET GENERIC RULES

111-8-3. Ticket Sales. (a) The price of a pull-tab ticket shall not exceed \$1.00.

(b) Tickets shall be sold only by retailers with current instant ticket certificates or valid on-premise cereal malt beverage, liquor or bingo licenses (or whose subcontractors or lessees have valid on-premise cereal malt beverage, liquor or bingo licenses) and who have entered contracts for pull-tab certificates issued by the Kansas Lottery. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8710; and implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8710; and 74-8718; effective, T-111-9-13-88, Sept. 6, 1988; amended, T-111-5-5-89, May 5, 1989; amended, T-111-3-14-90, March 2, 1990.)

Article 7.—NON-POINT SOURCE POLLUTION CONTROL FUND

11-7-1. Definitions. (a) "Best management practices" means a wide range of practices and management procedures, including, but not limited to, resource management systems as defined by the soil conservation service for the control of non-point source pollution.

(b) "Commission" means the state conservation commission.

(c) "Conservation district" means a subdivision of state government with its own governing body created under K.S.A. 2-1901 et seq. as a special purpose district to develop and carry out soil and water conservation programs within its boundaries.

(d) "Critical or targeted water resources" means water resources that have been identified as exceptional and vulnerable.

(e) "Exceptional value water resources" means a public water supply impoundment and associated tributary watershed, or a recharge area or groundwater capture zone of a public water supply well field, or a sole source aquifer, or a flowing stream and tributary watershed above a public water supply diversion, or a flowing stream and tributary watershed that sustains or supports habitats of threatened and endangered species, or a flowing stream and tributary watershed above highest valued fishery resources, or a flowing stream and tributary watershed above reaches having habitat of aquatic species in need of conservation, or a flowing stream and tributary watershed above high valued recreation areas.

(f) "KDHE" means the Kansas department of health and environment.

(g) "Local non-point source pollution management plan" means locally developed long-range comprehensive plan for the non-point source pollution control in the watershed or hydrologic unit.

(h) "Local management plan" means the local non-point source pollution management plan.

(i) "Non-point source pollution" means any pollution source that is not required to hold a national pollution discharge system permit and includes pollution whose sources cannot be pinpointed and can best be controlled by proper soil, water and land management and other management practices.

(j) "Project work plan" means a detailed plan for a proposed project that is identified in the approved local non-point source pollution management plan.

(k) "Sponsor" means a political subdivision of the state that has agreed to participate in the development and implementation of the local management plan.

(l) "Vulnerable water resources" means water resources that have a high probability of being contaminated. Factors that contribute to vulnerability include: infiltration recharge, vadose zone characteristics, depth to water table, topography, soil characteristics, pollutant source concentration, pollutant characteristics, groundwater, surface

water, precipitation, runoff, land cover and proximity of pollution to stream or lake. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 82a-903; effective May 21, 1990).

11-7-2. Local non-point source pollution management plan. (a) The conservation district responsibility, with assistance from sponsors or co-sponsors, shall be to coordinate the development and submission of a comprehensive local non-point source pollution management plan. Local, state and federal agencies and the private sector shall be invited to assist in the development of the management plan.

(b) The management plan submitted to the commission shall include pollution reduction goals, description and location of area included in the plan, description of problems and potential problems, description of proposed solutions, evaluation and monitoring, estimated costs, source of funding, implementation schedule and a list of participants in the development of the plan.

(c) The management plan shall be submitted by November 15th to the commission.

(d) An administrative review by the commission and a technical review by the KDHE will be done to determine if the management plan is consistent with the state non-point source pollution assessment report and management plan.

(e) The conservation district will be notified in writing of the status of the local non-point source pollution management plan. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 82a-903; effective May 21, 1990.)

11-7-3. Project work plan. (a) The conservation district shall coordinate the development and submission of a project work plan to request funds to implement all or part of an approved management plan or to report the implementation of a non-point source pollution control project that does not require additional state assistance.

(b) The project work plan submitted to the commission shall consist of six copies of:

- (1) SCC-NPS form 2—project work plan
- (2) SCC-NPS form 3—implementation project
- (3) SCC-NPS form 4—summary of funding

(c) A project work plan requesting state assistance shall be submitted to the commission by December 15th to be eligible for inclusion in the next year's budget request.

(d) Approval of a project work plan requesting state funds will include consideration of the completeness of the plan, consistency with the approved local non-point source pollution management plan, and recommendation from KDHE as to technical aspects of the plan.

(e) Approved project work plans requesting funding will be prioritized using the following criteria and rating values:

- (1) Addresses one of the water resources included in the state non-point source pollution management plan and assessment report:
 - (A) Critical or targeted water resources 35
 - (B) Exceptional value water resources 30
 - (C) Vulnerable water resources 25
- (2) Contains implementation schedule to provide measurable results in three to five years 15
- (3) Local initiatives 15
- (4) Utilization of existing state and federal programs 15

(5) Administration of the project to assure successful completion 20

(f) Approved project work plans shall be funded in order of priority from the available non-point source pollution control funds or, when funds are not available, included, in priority order, in the commission's budget request for the next fiscal year. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 82a-903; effective May 21, 1990.)

11-7-4. Project work plan amendment. (a) An amendment to the project work plan shall be submitted to the commission for review.

(b) An amendment that does not involve funding will be reviewed and forwarded to the Kansas department of health and environment to be included in the project work plan file.

(c) An amendment that involves a funding increase and is approved shall be either:

(1) Funded from available non-point source pollution control funds; or

(2) Included as a line item in the commission budget request for the next fiscal year.

(d) An amendment that involves a funding increase and is not approved shall be returned with the reason for disapproval. The disapproval may be appealed in writing or by requesting a hearing with the state conservation commission. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 82a-903; effective May 21, 1990.)

11-7-5. Annual review and status report. An annual review and status report of the implementation progress as of November 15th shall be submitted to arrive at the state conservation commission office no later than December 15th. The report shall be submitted on scc-nps form 5, annual review and status report. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 82a-903; effective May 21, 1990.)

11-7-6. Disbursement of funds. When funds are available for the approved project work plan, the sponsor or co-sponsor shall submit, or cause to be submitted, an application for specific elements of the plan. The application shall be on forms prescribed by the commission. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 82a-951; effective May 21, 1990.)

11-7-7. State contract. (a) Annual and long-term contracts shall be available.

(b) The length of the long-term contract shall be recommended by the applicant with final determination by the commission.

(c) An annual status review of the progress of the long-term contract shall be submitted to the commission by June 1st of each year until the contract is complete or terminated. (Authorized by K.S.A. 82a-903; implementing K.S.A. 82a-951; effective May 21, 1990.)

11-7-8. Partial payments. Partial payments of appropriated state funds shall be made no more than once each month. The applicant shall request the partial payment on forms prescribed by the commission. All claims shall be documented as directed by the commission. (Authorized by K.S.A. 82a-903; implementing K.S.A. 82a-951; effective May 21, 1990.)

11-7-9. Final payment. Final disbursement of funds

due on the contract shall be made upon submission of request for payment on forms prescribed by the commission. Certification that the project is complete and that it meets all the requirements of the contract shall be required before payment of funds. (Authorized by K.S.A. 82a-903; implementing K.S.A. 82a-951; effective May 21, 1990.)

11-7-10. Maintenance. (a) The sponsor shall provide a maintenance plan for the completed project that includes who shall be responsible for maintenance, inspection, enforcement and financing.

(b) Maintenance of the completed best management practice shall be for the design life or useful life, whichever is the longer.

(c) Corrective maintenance or repair shall be done as needed by the applicant.

(d) When a recipient of state funds is found to be in non-compliance with the maintenance policies agreed to in the contract, the recipient shall repay those state funds to the state on a pro-rated basis as determined in the contractual agreement. SENATE BILL No. 574

AN ACT repealing K.S.A. 25-3802, 25-3806, 25-3810 and 25-3811 and K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 25-3803, 25-3804 and 25-3805 relating to political parties.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 25-3802, 25-3806, 25-3810 and 25-3811 and K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 25-3803, 25-3804 and 25-3805 are hereby repealed.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the *Kansas register*.

SENATE BILL No. 565

AN ACT relating to elections; concerning absentee ballots; amending K.S.A. 25-1120 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 25-1120 is hereby amended to read as follows: 25-1120. When the names to appear on ballots are definitely known and not later than 20 days prior to any primary, general or question submitted election each county election officer shall cause to be prepared such number of absentee ballots and ballot envelopes as in the election officer's judgment are necessary to carry out the requirements of this act. Such ballots shall contain the names and cities of residence of all persons who are candidates for all national, state, county, city, township and school offices, which names may be written, typewritten or printed. On the same line with each candidate's name shall be a square in the ordinary form, or parentheses in which the voter can place a cross or check mark. In the case of elections required by law to be conducted on a partisan basis, such ballot shall indicate the political party of each candidate.

The county election officer of any county may number such absentee ballots. If the county election officer of any county elects to prepare absentee ballots and ballot envelopes without identifying consecutive numbers, such officer shall prepare and distribute such ballots and envelopes in accordance with a plan approved by the secretary of state. If the county election officer elects to number such ballots, all absentee ballots shall be consecutively numbered, and the ballot envelope for each ballot shall bear the same number as the ballot. The ballot envelope shall also bear a printed form of declaration in substance as follows:

"I _____ do hereby declare that I marked the enclosed ballot and that such ballot was enclosed and sealed in this envelope by me. My legal residence is in the _____ precinct, _____ township, (or, in the _____ precinct of the _____ ward, _____ street in the city of _____), in the county of _____, state of Kansas.
(Signed) _____"

The ballot envelope to be used for voting by a former precinct resident shall also state the place of former residence of the voter and the date of removal therefrom to the voter's present residence.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 25-1120 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the *Kansas register*.

HOUSE BILL No. 2652

AN ACT relating to insurance; concerning licensing of agents and penalties for failure to provide information to the commissioner of insurance; amending K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 40-240 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 40-240 is hereby amended to read as follows: 40-240. (a) Any person desiring as agent to engage in the insurance business, as herein set out, shall apply to the commissioner of insurance of this state, in the manner hereinafter prescribed, for an insurance agent's license, authorizing such agent to engage in and transact such business. The applicant for such license shall file with the commissioner of insurance such applicant's written application for a license authorizing the applicant to engage in the insurance business and the applicant shall make sworn answers to such interrogatories as the commissioner of insurance may require on uniform forms and supplements prepared by the commissioner. A nonrefundable fee in the amount of \$20 shall accompany such application. Such applicant, if an individual, shall establish:

(1) That the applicant is a graduate of an accredited four-year high school or its equivalent. This requirement shall not apply to any person holding a valid agent's license as of July 1, 1971, or a full-time student enrolled in an accredited high school in this state while and to the extent such student is participating in an insurance project sponsored by a bona fide junior achievement program; and
(2) that the applicant is of good business reputation and is worthy of a license.

(b) Corporations, associations, partnerships, sole proprietorships and other legal entities acting as insurance agents and holding a direct agency appointment from an insurance company or companies are required to obtain an insurance agent's license. Application for such license shall be made to the commissioner on a form prescribed by such commissioner. Before granting the license, the commissioner shall determine that:

(1) Each officer, director, partner and employee of the applicant who is acting as an insurance agent is licensed as an insurance agent;
(2) the applicant has disclosed to the insurance department all officers, directors and partners whether or not they are licensed as insurance agents;

(3) the applicant has disclosed to the insurance department all officers, directors, partners and employees who are licensed as insurance agents; and

(4) the applicant has designated a licensed officer, employee, partner or other person to be responsible for the organization's compliance with the insurance laws and rules and regulations of this state.

(c) The insurance department may require any documents reasonably necessary to verify the information contained in the application.

(d) (1) Agents licensed pursuant to subsection (b) shall advise the commissioner of any officers, directors, partners or employees who are licensed as individual insurance agents and are not disclosed at the time application is made for a license within 15 30 working days of their affiliation with the licensee. Failure to provide the commissioner with such information shall subject the licensee to a monetary penalty of \$10 per day for each working day the required information is late subject to a maximum of \$300 \$50 per person per licensing year.

(2) Officers, directors, partners or employees disclosed at the time of the original application or reported thereafter whose affiliation with the licensee is terminated shall be reported to the commissioner within 30 days of the effective date of termination. Failure to report such termination shall subject the licensee to the penalty prescribed in paragraph (1) of this subsection.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 40-240 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force on and after May 1, 1990, and its publication in the *Kansas register*.

HOUSE BILL No. 2960

AN ACT concerning school districts; relating to certain expenditures; amending K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 72-6760 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 72-6760 is hereby amended to read as follows: 72-6760. (a) No expenditure involving an amount greater than \$10,000 for construction, reconstruction or remodeling or for the purchase of materials, goods or wares shall be made by the board of education of any school district except:

(1) upon sealed proposals, and to the lowest responsible bidder; or
(2) upon inspection of the file or record of bids and bidders required by K.S.A. 75-3740, and amendments thereto, to be maintained by the director of purchases, to a bidder whose name is a part of such file or record.

(b) The provisions of subsection (a) do not apply to expenditures by a board of education for the purchase of:

(1) Products required to be purchased under the provisions of K.S.A. 75-3317 to 75-3322, inclusive, and amendments thereto;

(2) educational materials directly related to curriculum and secured by copyright;

(3) motor fuels required to provide or furnish transportation; and

(4) perishable foods and foodstuffs required for operation of a school lunch program;

(5) articles, products or services that are produced, manufactured or provided by inmates under the prison-made goods act of Kansas;

(6) services, materials, goods or wares required for reconstructing, remodeling, repairing or equipping buildings when such purchase has been necessitated by the occurrence of a loss against which the board of education has purchased property or casualty insurance; and

(7) materials, goods, wares or services which are purchased.

(A) From vendors who have entered into contracts with the state director of purchases pursuant to state purchasing statutes for purchases by state agencies; and

(B) under the same pricing provisions established in the state contracts, subject to agreement of the vendor to honor the state contract prices.

(c) Whenever the board of education of any school district lets bids for the purchase of materials, goods or wares and bids are submitted by bidders domiciled within the school district and by bidders domiciled outside the school district and the low bid is submitted by a bidder domiciled outside the school district, the school district domiciliary which submitted the lowest bid may be deemed the preferred bidder and awarded the bid if:

(1) The quality, suitability and usability of the materials, goods or wares are equal; and

(2) the amount of the bid of the school district domiciliary is not more than 1% greater than the amount of the low bid; and

(3) the school district domiciliary agrees to meet the low bid by filing a written agreement to that effect within 72 hours after receiving notification of being deemed the preferred bidder.

(d) The provisions of subsection (c) do not apply to expenditures for construction, reconstruction or remodeling.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 72-6760 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

HOUSE BILL No. 2875

AN ACT concerning the state fair board; dedicating a specific self-insurance reserve within the state emergency fund for certain financed capital improvements; authorizing certain transfers from the state emergency fund; amending K.S.A. 75-3712 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

New Section 1. (a) Moneys in the state emergency fund in the amount of \$250,000 are hereby specifically dedicated as a self-insurance fund for the state fair board in conjunction with the provisions of the financing of the Kansas development finance authority in the form of bonds issued on March 1, 1989, for improvements to the grandstand at the state fair as authorized by the provisions of K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 2-223 and amendments thereto. The moneys in such self-insurance fund shall remain dedicated for such purpose for the remainder of the ten-year term of such bonds and as prescribed by this section.

(b) Except as otherwise provided in this act or by appropriation act of the legislature, moneys in such self-insurance fund of the state emergency fund may be used only for the purpose of repairing, constructing or replacing the property consisting of the improvements to the grandstand of the state fair and any furnishings, equipment or other property thereof which is under the care, custody and control of the state fair board when the original of any such property has been damaged, destroyed, stolen or otherwise lost by casualty, and which loss or any part thereof was not covered by insurance in a commercial insurance company. Moneys in such self-insurance fund may be expended for any auxiliary purpose, such as, but not limited to, business interruption losses, as are required under the bond covenants of the bonds issued on March 1, 1989, for the improvements to the grandstand at the state fair, except that third-party liability or employee casualty losses may not be paid from such self-insurance fund and no waiver of governmental immunity shall exist which will permit payment of any liability of such self-insurance fund except as specifically authorized by this section.

(c) The self-insurance fund established in the state emergency fund shall be administered by the state finance council. No expenditures shall be made from the moneys in such self-insurance fund, except that transfers may be made to the state fair capital improvements fund established by K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 2-223 and amendments thereto for expenditure for the purposes specified in subsection (b). Upon authorization by the chairperson of the state finance council for a purpose authorized by this section, the director of accounts and reports shall transfer the amount specified by the chairperson, of not to exceed \$250,000, from the self-insurance fund established by this section in the state emergency fund to the state fair capital improvements fund.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 75-3712 is hereby amended to read as follows: 75-3712. The state emergency fund is hereby continued in the state treasury for the use of the state finance council created by K.S.A. 75-3708 and amendments thereto for the purposes and within the limitations prescribed by K.S.A. 75-3713 and through 75-3714 and amendments thereto and by section 1 and amendments thereto.

Sec. 3. K.S.A. 75-3712 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

HOUSE BILL No. 2674

AN ACT concerning Kansas state university of agriculture and applied science; authorizing the donation of certain art objects to the Deines cultural center.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. (a) The president of Kansas state university of agriculture and applied science, for and on behalf of the university, is hereby authorized to donate to the Deines cultural center, Russell, Kansas, an art objects collection which was acquired by the university from the family of E. Hubert Deines. The collection of art objects referred to in this section consists of seven original black and white prints made by E. Hubert Deines and entitled as follows:

- (1) February Magic;
- (2) Light and Shadow Transformation;
- (3) Phantom of Drought;
- (4) Shrine of the Virgin;
- (5) Stillness at Brush Creek;
- (6) The Passing of the Leaves; and
- (7) Primitive Mother.

(b) The president of the university is further authorized to donate to the Deines cultural center any original print or prints, other than those specified in subsection (a), which were made by E. Hubert Deines and which the officer in charge of collections of art objects at the university may find in the possession of the university.

(c) No other law of this state relating to the disposition of art objects collections by state educational institutions shall apply to the donation or donations made under the authority conferred by this section.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the *Kansas register*.

SENATE BILL No. 474

AN ACT relating to captive insurance companies; concerning pure captive insurance companies insuring risks of certain aircraft manufacturers and affiliated companies; amending K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 40-4301, 40-4303 and 40-4311 and repealing the existing sections.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 40-4301 is hereby amended to read as follows: 40-4301. As used in this act, unless the context requires otherwise:

(a) "Affiliated company" means any company in the same corporate system as a parent, an industrial insured, or a member organization by virtue of common ownership, control, operation or management.

(b) "Aircraft captive insurance company" means any pure captive insurance company which is formed under the provisions of this act by a corporation or an affiliated company of a corporation engaged in the manufacture of aircraft and having its principal place of business within the state of Kansas and which insures only risks in the same corporate system.

(c) "Captive insurance company" means any pure captive insurance company or industrial insured captive insurance company formed under the provisions of this act.

(d) "Commissioner" means the commissioner of insurance.

(e) "Industrial insured" means an insured:

(1) Who procures the insurance of any risk or risks by use of the services of a full-time employee acting as an insurance manager or buyer;

(2) whose aggregate annual premiums for the kinds of insurance total at least \$50,000;

(3) who has at least 25 full-time employees;

(4) whose principal activity consists of the manufacture of a product or products; and

(5) who contributes not less than \$10,000 to the capital or surplus of the industrial insured captive insurance company that insures its risks. Such contribution shall be in the form of cash which may be returned at such time as the risks of the industrial insured cease to be insured by the captive insurance company.

(f) "Industrial insured captive insurance company" means any

company that insures risks of the industrial insureds that comprise the industrial insured group, and their affiliated companies.

(g) "Industrial insured group" means any group of not more than 10 industrial insureds in the same or similar line of business that:

(1) Collectively owns, controls or holds with power to vote all of the outstanding voting securities of an industrial insured captive insurance company incorporated as a stock insurer; or

(2) collectively has complete voting control over an industrial insured captive insurance company incorporated as a mutual insurer; or

(3) is created under the product liability risk retention act of 1981 (U.S. Public Law 97-45), as amended by the risk retention act of 1986, as a corporation or other limited liability association taxable as a stock insurance company or a mutual insurer under the laws of the state of Kansas:

(A) Whose primary activity consists of assuming and spreading all, or any portion, of the product liability or completed operations liability risk exposure of its group members;

(B) which is organized for the primary purpose of conducting the activity described in subdivision (A) of this section;

(C) which does not exclude any person from membership in the group solely to provide for members of such group a competitive advantage over such a person; and

(D) which is composed of members each of whose principal activity consists of the manufacture, design, importation, distribution, packaging, labeling, lease or sale of a product or products.

(h) "Parent" means a corporation, partnership or individual that directly or indirectly owns, controls or holds with power to vote more than 50% of the outstanding voting securities of a pure captive insurance company.

(i) "Pure captive insurance company" means any company that insures risks of its parent and affiliated companies.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 40-4303 is hereby amended to read as follows: 40-4303. The word "captive" shall be incorporated into the name of every captive insurance company organized under the laws of this state, *except that an aircraft captive insurance company incorporating the word "air" or "aircraft" into its name shall not be required to incorporate the word "captive" into its name.* No captive insurance company shall adopt a name that is the same, deceptively similar or likely to be confused with or mistaken for any other existing business name registered in the state of Kansas.

Sec. 3. K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 40-4311 is hereby amended to read as follows: 40-4311. (a) Any captive insurance company may provide reinsurance, comprised in articles 9 and 11 of chapter 40 of the *Kansas Statutes Annotated* as limited by subsection (a)(3) of K.S.A. 1988 1989 Supp. 40-4302, and amendments thereto on risks ceded by any other captive insurance company.

(b) Any risks or portions of risks of any captive insurance company that is reinsured shall be ceded to an insurance company that is authorized to transact business in this state or that has been approved by the commissioner. A captive insurance company may take credit for reserves on risks or portions of risks ceded. The commissioner may require any other documents, financial information or other evidence that such a reinsurer will be able to provide adequate security for its financial obligations. The commissioner may deny authorization or impose any limitations on the activities of a reinsurer that, in such commissioner's judgment, are necessary and proper to provide adequate security for the ceding captive insurance company and for the protection and consequent benefit of the public at large.

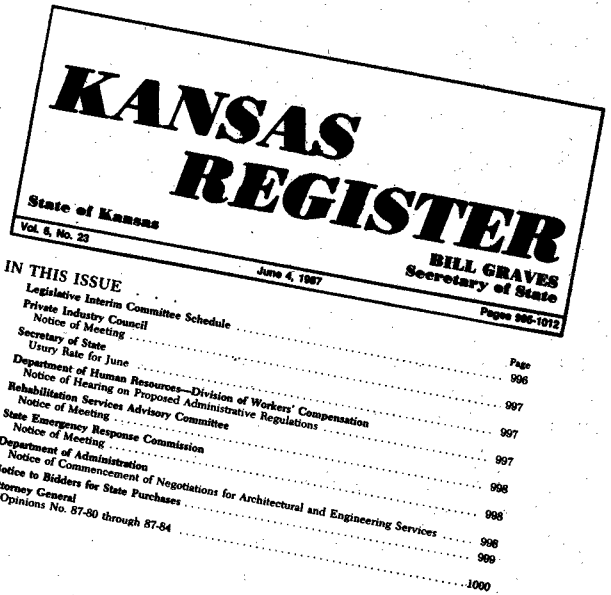
(c) Any aircraft captive insurance company may provide reinsurance, comprised in articles 9 and 11 of chapter 40 of the *Kansas Statutes Annotated* as limited by subsection (a)(3) of K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 40-4302, and amendments thereto, on risks ceded by an insurance company which is an affiliated company and is authorized to transact business in the state of Kansas, if the requirements of either paragraph (1) or (2) of subsection (b) of K.S.A. 40-221a, and amendments thereto, are met by the ceding insurer with respect to the reinsurance provided by the aircraft captive.

Sec. 4. K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 40-4301, 40-4303 and 40-4311 are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the *Kansas register*.

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
