Opinion No. 90-73

State Boards, Commissions and Authorities—State Board of Agriculture—Secretary; Leave of Absence. Gary Hall, President, State Board of Agriculture, Topeka, June 14, 1990.

In our opinion, the decision to approve the secretary of agriculture's leave of absence lies within the discretion of the Board of Agriculture. In our opinion, service as a White House Fellow presents circumstances that overcome the presumption that employment outside the state is insufficient reason for approval of a leave of absence. Opinion No. 90-74

Taxation—Aggregate Tax Levy Limitations—Elimination of Intangibles Tax; Ability of City to Levy Property Taxes to Replace Intangibles Tax. Representative Michael O'Neal, 104th District, Hutchinson, June 15, 1990.

While at the time of the election to eliminate the intangibles tax in the city of Hutchinson the city was authorized to offset the lost revenues with property taxes notwithstanding the aggregate tax limit then in effect, the city currently does not have that authority. Thus, the city must either partially exempt itself from the provisions of the tax lid pursuant to K.S.A. 79-5036, as amended, or make application to the State Board of Tax Appeals pursuant to K.S.A. 79-5030 for authority to levy in excess of the limit. Opinion No. 90-75

Counties and County Officers—Fire Protection; Districts in Any County—Organization of Fire Districts; Governing Body of Fire District; Powers; Exclusion of Territory from Fire District; Extraterritorial Services; Fees. Vernon L. Steerman, Osborne County Attorney, Osborne, June 20, 1990.

It is our opinion that K.S.A. 19-3604 does not create a right to or dictate detachment from a fire district, but rather the statute permits the board of county commissioners to discretionarily adopt a resolution detaching land. Fire protection services to property located outside the boundaries of a fire district is not statutorily required and cannot be provided absent express or necessarily implied authority. Fees charged pursuant to an implied contract for requested fire protection responses or services to extraterritorial property may be based upon the actual cost of providing requested responses or services and, in specific instances, such costs may be equal to the taxes that would have been paid had the property been included in the fire district. Opinion No. 90-76

Taxation—Aggregate Tax Levy Limitations—Extension Council Levies. Ted D. Ayres, General Counsel, Kansas Board of Regents, Topeka, June 20, 1990.

County extension councils are not taxing subdivisions for purposes of the tax lid law (K.S.A. 79-5021 *et seq.*, as amended by 1990 House Bill No. 2700) and thus may not "charter" out of its provisions pursuant to K.S.A. 79-5036(c), as amended. However, the tax levy for an extension council is part of the county's levy and is thus subject to K.S.A. 79-5022(b), as amended. on Proposed
Administrative Regulations**

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Friday, August 10, in the hearing room at commission offices, 3400 Van Buren, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed permanent regulations of the Kansas Racing Commission. This 30-day notice constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on these proposed regulations.

A copy of the full text of the regulations and the economic impact statement may be reviewed or obtained at the commission office. The following is a summary of the proposed amendments.

K.A.R. 112-15-1. Definitions. The proposed regulation states definitions applicable to this chapter governing the racing commission's award of grants for horse and greyhound research.

K.A.R. 112-15-2. Application deadlines. The proposed regulation states deadlines applicable for grant applications during the start-up year and subsequent years.

K.A.R. 112-15-3. Application requirements. The proposed regulation states requirements that must be met by each applicant seeking a research grant from the commission.

K.A.R. 112-15-4. Application review. The proposed regulation states the criteria to be used by the commission in evaluating each grant application.

K.A.R. 112-15-5. Notification of decision. The proposed regulation states the deadlines for notifying applicants of grant decisions during the start-up year and subsequent years.

K.A.R. 112-15-6. Reporting requirements. The proposed regulation states the documentation that must be provided by each grant recipient to the executive director and the deadlines for those submissions.

K.A.R. 112-15-7. Grant committees. The proposed regulation designates the respective memberships of the committees who will assist the commission in selecting grant programs deserving of equine and greyhound research monies.

Economic impact for these related proposed regulations: The commission's grant application requirements will cause some, but it is not believed onerous, expense

to those who seek grant monies from the commission. Pursuant to K.S.A. 74-8829(b)(5), monies for equine research must be awarded through institutions of higher education under the State Board of Regents. Monies for greyhound research are not so limited pursuant to K.S.A. 74-8831(b)(2), but are confined to research conducted within Kansas "relating to the prevention of injury to and disease of greyhounds." Though parimutuel wagering is new to Kansas and the breakage and unclaimed winning ticket monies that contribute to the respective breed funds may vary depending on public acceptance, it is anticipated as much as \$400,000 may be available for greyhound research in one year's time. It is presently unknown what monies may be available for equine research.

Article 39.—LICENSURE OF ADULT CARE HOMES

28-39-81. (a) Each medication aide shall be a nurse aide or a qualified mental retardation professional as defined in 42 CFR 483.430(a) as published in the federal register, Vol. 53, No. 107, June 3, 1988, who has successfully completed a course in medication administration as prescribed by the secretary of the department of health and environment.

(b) With the exception of any person who holds a certificate inscribed with the word "limited," each nurse aide who has a Kansas certificate shall be eligible to enroll in a medication aide course.

(c) A qualified mental retardation professional who is not a nurse aide and has successfully completed a course in medication administration as prescribed by the secretary of the department of health and environment may administer medications only to residents in an intermediate care facility for the mentally retarded.

(d) The medication aide course shall be presented in accordance with the guidelines entitled "Kansas nursing home medication aide curriculum" prescribed by the Kansas department of health and environment in February, 1982. These guidelines are adopted by reference in this rule and regulation.

(e) The course may be provided by:

(1) Any community college, area vocational-technical school, or area vocational school accredited by the state board of education;

(2) Any proprietary school, as described in K.S.A. 72-4919, which has a certificate of approval from the state board of education;

(3) Any educational institution which is under the jurisdiction of the state board of regents; or

(4) Any educational institution accredited by a regional or national accrediting agency recognized and approved by the U.S. department of education or any other educational institution which would meet the requirements for such accreditation.

(f) The course shall be provided as classroom instruction. Correspondence courses shall not be acceptable. (Authorized by K.S.A. 75-5625; implementing K.S.A. 65-1, 120; effective May 1, 1984; amended Aug. 13, 1990.)

36-15-23. Motorcyclists' eye protection devices. Motorcyclists' eye protection devices shall consist of protective glasses, goggles or transparent face shields which are shatterproof and impact resistant. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 8-1598; effective May 1, 1981; amended May 1, 1983; amended Aug. 13, 1990.)

Article 26.—RAILROAD GRADE CROSSINGS

36-26-1. Railroad grade crossings; stopping required. (a) K.S.A. 8-1553 requires that the drivers of certain types of motor vehicles, before crossing at grade any track or tracks of a railroad, shall stop such vehicle within 50 feet but not less than 15 feet from the nearest rail of such railroad and while so stopped shall listen and look in both directions along such track for any approaching train, and for signals including active flashing light signals with or without gates or bells indicating the approach of a train, and shall not proceed until the driver can do so safely. After stopping as required and upon proceeding when it is safe to do so, the driver of any vehicle shall cross only in such gear of the vehicle that there will be no necessity for manually changing gears while traversing such crossing and the driver shall not manually shift gears while crossing the track or tracks. Following are the types of vehicles for which this regulation applies:

- (1) Every school or commercial bus;
- (2) every motor vehicle transporting any quantity of chlorine;
- (3) every motor vehicle which, in accordance with the regulations of the department of transportation, is required to be marked or placarded with one of the following markings:

- (A) Explosives A;
- (B) Explosives B;
- (C) Poison Gas;
- (D) Flammable solid W;
- (E) Radioactive;
- (F) Flammable;
- (G) Blasting agent;
- (H) Nonflammable gas;
- (I) Chlorine;
- (J) Poison;
- (K) Oxygen;
- (L) Flammable gas;
- (M) Combustible;
- (N) Flammable solid;
- (O) Oxidizer;
- (P) Organic peroxide;
- (Q) Corrosive; or
- (R) Dangerous;

(4) every cargo tank motor vehicle, whether loaded or empty, used for the transportation of any hazardous material as defined in 49 C.F.R. 170-189;

(continued)

(5) every cargo tank motor vehicle transporting a commodity which at the time of loading has a temperature above its flashpoint as determined by 49 C.F.R. 173.115;

(6) every cargo tank motor vehicle, whether loaded or empty, transporting any commodity under an exemption issued in accordance with 49 C.F.R. 107.101-107.123.

(b) Exceptions to the requirement for vehicles to stop at every railroad grade crossing shall be:

(1) Any railroad grade crossing at which traffic is controlled by a police officer or human flagman;

(2) any railroad grade crossing controlled by a functioning highway traffic signal transmitting a green indication which, under local law, permits the vehicle to proceed across the railroad tracks without slowing or stopping;

(3) any railroad grade crossing which has been abandoned or its use discontinued with track or tracks still in place with a sign reading "TRACKS OUT OF SERVICE";

(4) any industrial or spur line railroad grade crossing marked with a sign reading "EXEMPT." Such exempt signs shall be erected only by or with the consent of the appropriate state or local authority;

(5) a railroad grade crossing used exclusively for industrial switching purposes, within a business district defined in K.S.A. 8-1407, and amendments, thereto. This type of crossing shall also, as in the previous section (d), be marked with a sign reading "EXEMPT." (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 8-1553; effective May 1, 1976; amended May 1, 1983; amended May 1, 1984; amended May 1, 1989, amended Aug. 13, 1990.)

Article 4.—MASTER LEVEL PSYCHOLOGISTS

102-4-10. Continuing education. (a) Each applicant for renewal of registration shall have completed at least 25 continuing education hours in each two-year renewal period.

(b) One academic semester credit hour shall be equivalent to 15 continuing education hours.

(c) Each continuing education credit counting toward the required 25 hours shall be distributed over the following categories of activities so that at least two categories are represented, and with a maximum of 15 hours in category one, 10 hours in category two, and 10 hours in category three. These categories shall be:

(1) Category one.

(A) Activities that are sponsored, accredited or conducted by educational institutions, by professional associations, or by private institutions that are nationally or regionally accredited for training; or

(B) activities conducted by agencies and groups that do not meet the requirements of national or regional accreditation, if the content is clearly related to the enhancement of psychology skills and knowledge;

(2) Category two.

(A) presentation of courses, workshops, or other formal training activities, when the content is clearly related to the enhancement of psychology skills and knowledge. Continuing education credit shall be allowed only for the initial presentation. A maximum of five hours shall be allowed for providing supervision; or

(B) publications and professional presentations. Five hours may be claimed for each publication or book chapter authored by the applicant and five hours may be claimed for each scientific or professional paper presented; and

(3) Category three; non-supervised, self-programmed activities. Such activities include the following:

(A) Self-instruction. A maximum of five hours shall be allowed;

(B) participation in quality care, client or patient diagnosis review conferences, treatment utilization reviews, peer review, case consultation with another master level psychologist, or other quality assurance committees or activities. A maximum of five hours shall be allowed in this sub-category;

(C) participation in professional organizations, if the organization's goals are clearly related to the enhancement of psychology values, skills, and knowledge. Participation may include holding office or serving on committees of the organization. A maximum of five hours shall be allowed; and

(D) receiving personal psychotherapy that is provided by a licensed or certified mental health provider. A maximum of five hours shall be allowed for personal therapy.

(d) Each master level psychologist shall be responsible for maintaining personal continuing education records. Forms for the recording of continuing education activities shall be provided by the board and shall be used by the registrant for reporting continuing education activities. Personal records of participation in continuing education activities shall be submitted to the board at a time or at times specified by the board but not later than 60 days prior to the date the current registration expires.

(e) In determining whether a claimed continuing education activity will be allowed, the master level psychologist may be required by the board to demonstrate that the content was clearly related to psychology, or to verify that master level psychologist's participation in any claimed or reported activity. If a master level psychologist fails to comply with this requirement, the claimed credit may be disallowed by the board.

(f) Contractual agreements with sponsors of continuing education activities may be signed by the board.

(g) Each master level psychologist shall complete a program on professional ethics consisting of at least three hours of training. This program shall meet the requirements for inclusion in category one or, with prior approval of the board, in another category. The city has prepared a preliminary official statement relating to the bonds, copies of which may be obtained from the city or the city's financial advisor. The preliminary official statement is in a form "deemed final" by the city for the purpose of the Securities Exchange Commission's Rule 15c2-12(b)(1), but is subject to revision, amendment and completion in the final official statement. Upon the sale of the bonds, the city shall furnish the successful bidder with a reasonable number of copies of the final official statement, without additional cost, upon request. Copies of the final official statement in excess of a reasonable number may be ordered at the successful bidder's expense.

Sealed Bids

Sealed bids for the purchase of \$668,000 principal amount of General Obligation Bonds, Series A, 1990, of the city hereinafter described, will be received by the undersigned, city clerk of the city of Paola, Kansas, on behalf of the governing body of the city at City Hall, Paola, until 4:30 p.m. C.D.T. on Tuesday, July 10, 1990. All bids will be publicly opened and read at said time and place and will be acted upon by the city immediately thereafter. No oral or auction bids will be considered.

Bond Details

The bonds will consist of fully registered bonds without coupons in the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof, except one bond in the denomination of \$3,000. The bonds will be dated as of July 1, 1990, and will become due serially on November 1 in the years as follows:

The bonds will bear interest at rates to be determined when the bonds are sold as hereinafter provided, which interest will be payable semiannually on May 1 and November 1 in each year, beginning May 1, 1991.

Place of Payment and Bond Registration

The principal of and interest on the bonds will be payable in lawful money of the United States of America by check or draft of the Kansas State Treasurer, Topeka, Kansas (the paying agent and bond registrar). The principal of the bonds will be payable at maturity to the registered owners upon presentation and surrender of the bonds at the office of the paying agent. Interest on the bonds will be paid by check or draft mailed by the paying agent to the persons in whose names the bonds are registered on the registration books maintained by the bond registrar at the close of business on the record date for such interest, which shall be the fifteenth day (whether or not a business day) of the calendar month preceding such interest payment date.

The city will pay for the fees of the bond registrar for registration and transfer of the bonds and will also pay for printing a reasonable supply of registered bond blanks. Any additional costs or fees that might be incurred in the

secondary market, other than fees of the bond registrar, will be the responsibility of the bondholders.

Conditions of Bids

Proposals will be received for the bonds bearing such rate or rates of interest as may be specified by the bidders, subject to the following conditions: the same rate shall apply to all bonds of the same maturity. Each interest rate specified shall be a multiple of $\frac{1}{8}$ th or $\frac{1}{20}$ th of 1 percent. No interest rate shall exceed the index of treasury bonds published by the weekly *Muni Week* in New York, New York, on the Monday next preceding the day on which the bonds are sold, plus 2 percent. The difference between the highest rate specified and the lowest rate specified shall not exceed 2 percent. No supplemental interest payments will be authorized. No bid of less than the principal amount of the bonds and accrued interest will be considered. Each bid shall specify the total interest cost to the city during the life of the bond issue on the basis of such bid, the premium, if any, offered by the bidder, and the net interest cost to the city on the basis of such bid. Each bid shall also specify the average annual net interest rate to the city on the basis of such bid. Bidders shall specify in the bid form the prices (exclusive of accrued interest), expressed as a dollar price, at which the bidder intends that each maturity amount of the bonds shall be initially offered to the public (the initial reoffering prices).

Basis of Award

The award of the bonds will be made on the basis of the lowest net interest cost of the city, which will be determined by subtracting the amount of the premium bid, if any, from the total interest cost to the city. If there is any discrepancy between the net interest cost and the average annual net interest rate specified, the specified net interest cost shall govern and the interest rates specified in the bid shall be adjusted accordingly. If two or more proper bids providing for identical amounts for the lowest net interest cost are received, the city shall determine which bid, if any, shall be accepted, and its determination shall be final.

Authorization, Purpose and Security for the Bonds

The bonds are being authorized and issued to permanently finance a portion of the costs of street and sewer improvements in said city. The bonds will be general obligations of the city payable as to both principal and interest from ad valorem taxes that may be levied, without limitation as to rate or amount on all the taxable tangible property, real and personal, within the territorial limits of the city, pursuant to K.S.A. 12-685 to 12-687, both inclusive, K.S.A. 12-689 to 12-690, both inclusive, and K.S.A. 12-619 and K.S.A. 12-624.

Internal Revenue Code of 1986

The Internal Revenue Code of 1986 imposes requirements on the city that must be met subsequent to the issuance of the bonds by the city and, as a result, the city will and does hereby covenant that it will diligently undertake those steps necessary to maintain the tax-exempt status of the bonds. The city's failure to comply with such requirements could adversely affect the tax-exempt status of the bonds. Purchasers of the bonds should be aware that should the bonds lose their status

as tax-exempt obligations as a result of the city's failure to comply with such requirements, the bonds are neither callable nor will the rate of interest on the bonds be adjusted to reflect such circumstances.

The code includes interest on tax-exempt obligations, such as the bonds, in the adjusted net book income of certain corporations for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1986, and includes, through 1989, in the calculation of alternative minimum taxable income one-half of the excess of a corporation's adjusted net book income over its alternative minimum taxable income (determined without regard to this adjustment and prior to reduction for certain net operating losses). After 1989, the use of "book income" will be replaced by "adjusted current earnings," with certain other adjustments. Furthermore, Section 59A of the code, as added by the Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act of 1986, provides for a new environmental tax generally based on corporate alternative minimum taxable income. The amount of the tax is equal to 0.12 percent of the excess of alternative minimum taxable income, without regard to net operating losses and the deduction for this tax, over \$2 million. The environmental tax is imposed whether or not the tax payer is subject to the alternative minimum tax. The environmental tax, which is effective for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1986, may subject certain bondowners to additional taxation for interest earned on the bonds.

The code also requires property and casualty insurance companies, for taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 1987, to reduce the amount of their deductible underwriting losses by a percentage of the amount of tax-exempt interest received or accrued on obligations acquired after August 7, 1986.

With the exception of certain qualified tax-exempt obligations, the code provides that banks and thrift institutions may not deduct any portion of the interest cost of purchasing or carrying tax-exempt obligations such as the bonds if such interest cost is incurred in taxable years ending after December 31, 1986, with respect to obligations acquired after August 7, 1986. The city does intend to designate the bonds as qualified tax-exempt obligations under Section 265 of the code.

Legal Opinion

The bonds will be sold subject to the legal opinion of Nichols and Wolfe Chartered, Topeka, Kansas, bond counsel, whose approving legal opinion as to the validity of the bonds will be furnished and paid for by the city, printed on the bonds and delivered to the successful bidder when the bonds are delivered. Said opinion will also state that in the opinion of bond counsel, assuming continued compliance by the city with the provisions of the ordinance authorizing the issuance of the bonds and the code, under existing law, the interest on the bonds is exempt from federal income taxation. Interest on the bonds will also be excludable from the computation of Kansas adjusted gross income for taxable years commencing after December 31, 1987.

Delivery and Payment

The city will pay for printing the bonds and will deliver the bonds, without cost to the successful bidder, properly prepared, executed and registered on or prior to August

15, 1990, at such bank or trust company in the state of Kansas or greater Kansas City, Missouri, metropolitan area, as may be specified by the successful bidder. Delivery elsewhere will be the cost of the successful bidder. Said bidder will also be furnished with a certified transcript of the proceedings evidencing the authorization and issuance of the bonds and the usual closing documents, including a certificate that there is no litigation pending or threatened at the time of delivery of the bonds affecting their validity. Payment for the bonds shall be made in Federal Reserve funds, immediately subject to use by the city. The denominations of the bonds and the names, addresses and Social Security or taxpayer identification numbers of the registered owners shall be submitted in writing by the successful bidder to the city and bond registrar not later than 4 p.m. C.D.T. on July 25, 1990. In the absence of such information, the city will deliver bonds in the denomination of each maturity registered in the name of the successful bidder.

The successful bidder shall furnish the city by 4 p.m. C.D.T. on July 25, 1990, a certificate acceptable to the city's bond counsel to the effect that: (i) the successful bidder has made a bona fide public offering of the bonds at the initial reoffering prices; and (ii) a substantial amount of the bonds was sold to the public (excluding brokers and other intermediaries) at such initial reoffering prices. Such certificate shall state that: (1) it is made on the best knowledge, information and belief of the successful bidder; and (2) 10 percent or more in par amount of the bonds of each maturity was sold the public at or below the initial reoffering prices (such amount being sufficient to establish the sale of a "substantial amount" of the bonds).

Good Faith Deposit

Each bid shall be accompanied by a cashier's or certified check drawn on a bank located in the United States of America in the amount of \$13,360, payable to the order of the city to secure the city from any loss resulting from the failure of the bidder to comply with the terms of the bid. No interest will be paid upon the deposit made by the successful bidder. Said check shall be returned to the bidder if the bid is not accepted. If a bid is accepted, said check shall be held by the city until the bidder shall have complied with all of the terms and conditions of this notice, at which time said check shall be returned to the successful bidder or deducted from the purchase price at the option of the city. If a bid is accepted but the city shall fail to deliver the bonds to the bidder in accordance with the terms and conditions of this notice, said check shall be returned to the bidder. If a bid is accepted but

the bidder shall default in the performance of any of the terms and conditions of this notice, the proceeds of such check shall be forfeited to the city with the city reserving its right to pursue all remedies available to it as a result of such default by the bidder.

CUSIP Numbers

CUSIP identification numbers will be printed on the bonds, but neither the failure to print such number on any bond nor any error with respect thereto shall constitute cause for failure or refusal by the purchaser thereof to accept delivery of and pay for the bonds in accordance with the terms of this notice. All expenses in relation to the assignment and printing of CUSIP numbers on the bonds will be paid by the city.

Bid Forms

All bids must be made on forms that may be procured from the city clerk. No additions or alterations in such forms shall be made and any erasures may cause rejection of any bid. The city reserves the right to waive irregularities and to reject any or all bids.

Submission of Bids

Bids must be submitted in sealed envelopes addressed to the undersigned city clerk and marked "Proposal for the Purchase of General Obligation Bonds." Bids may be submitted by mail or delivered in person to the undersigned at Paola City Hall and must be received by the undersigned prior to 4:30 p.m. C.D.T. on Tuesday, July 10, 1990.

Assessed Valuation and Indebtedness

The total assessed valuation of the taxable tangible property (including motor vehicles) within the city for the year 1989 is \$20,502,167. The total general obligation bonded indebtedness of the city as of the date of the bonds, including the bonds, is \$4,103,000, including, as of the date of the bonds, temporary notes outstanding in the principal amount of \$745,000, of which \$668,000 will be retired out of the proceeds of the bonds herein offered for sale.

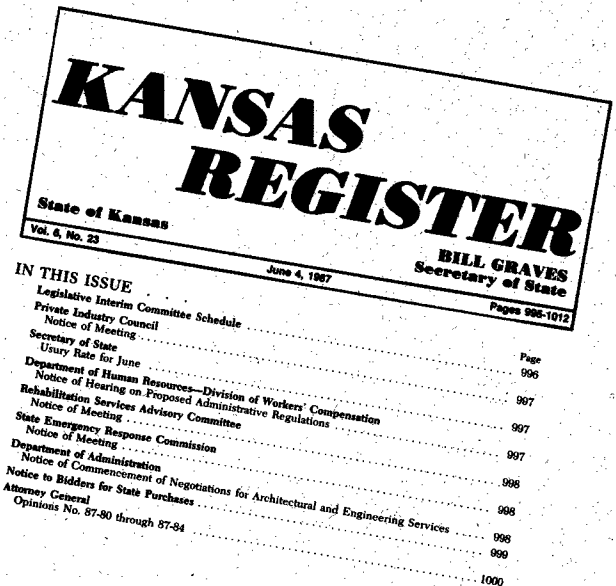
