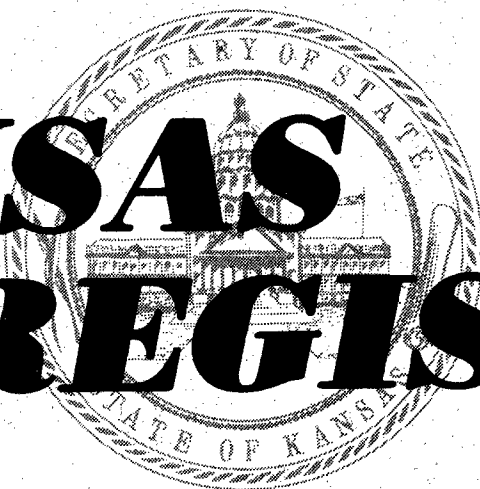

State Boards, Commissions and Authorities—Law Enforcement Training Center; Training Commission—Qualifications of Applicant for Training Course; Age. Kyle Smith, Counsel for the Law Enforcement Training Commission, Topeka, June 28, 1990.

The Kansas law enforcement training act, K.S.A. 74-5601 *et seq.*, does not currently require that a person attending a training course be 21 years of age. However, a person cannot be certified by the commission or perform law enforcement functions until he or she reaches age 21. Opinion No. 90-78

Taxation—Aggregate Tax Levy Limitations—Taxes Exempt from Aggregate Limitation; Recouping Lost Vehicle Tax Revenues. Shelby Smith, Secretary, Department of Administration, Topeka, June 28, 1990.

Section 6 of 1990 House Bill No. 2700, the tax lid law, should be interpreted to allow all taxing subdivisions to recoup lost motor vehicle tax revenues according to the formula stated therein. This amount should not be included in computing any aggregate or fund levy limitations under K.S.A. 79-5021 *et seq.*, as amended. Special Local Need Registration

Pursuant to 7 U.S.C. 136v, Fermenta ASC Corporation has filed an application for a special local need registration for Bravo 720 Fungicide. The purpose of the proposed special local need registration is to reduce the pre-harvest interval on dry beans treated with Bravo 720. The special local need registration application is based upon the alleged need for a product that offers superior protection of dry bean fields from serious disease problems. In order to obtain the necessary protection, the pre-harvest interval must be shortened from six weeks to the proposed 14 days. Residue data has been submitted with the application to support the claim that the current established tolerance of 0.1 ppm of chloralalonil will not be exceeded by the proposed application schedule.

Information submitted by the applicant is on file with the Kansas State Board of Agriculture.

Written comments, data, or other evidence in support of or in opposition to the proposed special local need registration may be submitted to Gary E. Boutz, Plant Health Division, Kansas State Board of Agriculture, 109 S.W. 9th, Topeka 66612, on or before August 13.

A public hearing will be conducted at 9:30 a.m. Monday, August 13, in the main conference room of the Kansas Department of Commerce, 400 S.W. 8th, 5th floor, Topeka, at which time all interested persons will have an opportunity to be heard regarding the adoption of proposed permanent rules and regulations of the Kansas Department of Commerce.

All interested persons may attend the hearing and will be given an opportunity to express comments either orally or in writing, or both. The period of at least 30 days notice constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving public comments on the proposed rules and regulations.

Written comments and requests for copies of the regulations and the complete economic impact statement should be sent to D. Grant MacKinnon, Export Finance Director, Trade Development Division, Kansas Department of Commerce, 400 S.W. 8th, Topeka 66603-3957, at or before the time of the hearing. If personal testimony is desired to be given at the hearing, prior notice to the department would be helpful in arranging the agenda. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentations to five minutes.

A summary of the proposed rules and regulations and the related economic impact statement is as follows:

K.A.R. 110-40-1 through 110-40-8. The regulations implement and interpret the Kansas export finance act, K.S.A. 1989 *Supp.* 74-5069 et. seq., by:

- (1) specifying under what conditions financial assistance will be available to exporters and in what forms the financial assistance can be provided;
- (2) providing for an application for financial assistance form which specifies the major items of information that will be required;
- (3) establishing an application procedure;
- (4) specifying the general terms and conditions under which financial assistance will be provided;
- (5) specifying the criteria to be utilized for approval of financial assistance;
- (6) establishing the responsibility for loan administration and servicing with the lender;
- (7) providing for a guarantee agreement.

The regulations do not impose costs on the Kansas Department of Commerce, other agencies or units, private citizens, nor consumers of any products or services. The Kansas Department of Commerce will, however, incur the expenses of administering the program. The beneficiaries of the program will be charged nominal statutory fees.

A public hearing will be conducted from 10 to 11 a.m. Wednesday, August 22, in the Department of Corrections' conference room, fourth floor, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed rules and regulations 44-6-101, 44-6-108a, 44-6-109, 44-6-110, 44-6-111, 44-6-112, 44-6-113, 44-6-114, 44-6-114a, 44-6-114b, 44-6-114c, 44-6-120, 44-6-121, 44-6-124, 44-6-125, 44-6-126, 44-6-134, 44-6-135, 44-6-135a, 44-6-136a, 44-6-143 and 44-7-104, of the Kansas Department of Corrections. These regulations will become effective 45 days after the publication in the *Kansas Register* unless a specific date is contained in the regulation. In addition, certain regulations may be revoked.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to Charles E. Simmons, Chief Legal Counsel, Kansas Department of Corrections, 900 S.W. Jackson, 4th Floor, Topeka 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations. In order to give all parties an opportunity to express their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit oral presentation to five minutes.

This 30-day notice constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations.

A summary of the regulations follows:

44-6-101. Defines terms used in regulations relating to the computation of sentence, parole eligibility, and good time credits.

44-6-108a to 44-6-114b. Will be revoked.

44-6-114c. Provides how computations will be made to determine an inmate's parole eligibility.

44-6-120. Provides the guidelines and time frames for applying good time credits to an inmate's record.

44-6-121. Clarifies the process of docketing inmates for parole hearings before the Kansas Parole Board.

44-6-124. Clarifies the process for awarding good time credits and brings the process into compliance with current statutes regarding amount available good time credits.

44-6-125. Clarifies the policy regarding restoration of forfeited good time credits.

44-6-126. Clarifies the policy regarding awarding of meritorious good time credits.

44-6-134. Clarifies how jail time credits will be applied in computing an inmate's sentence.

44-6-135. Provides policy for calculating prior penal credits and applying those credits when computing an inmate's sentence.

44-6-135a. Provides policy for calculating maximum sentence credit when computing an inmate's sentence.

44-6-136a. Provides policy for computing forfeited good time on parole and establishes rates for forfeiture.

44-6-143. Provides guidelines when sentences will be computed on consecutive basis.

44-7-104. Amends the inmate visitation guidelines to provide that all visitors are subject to search and that visitation privileges may be suspended for up to 90 days if a request for search is refused by the visitor.

These regulations, with the exception of K.A.R. 44-7-104, all involve the department's responsibility to administer sentences imposed against individuals who have been committed to the custody of the secretary of corrections. Statutory amendments in 1988 and 1989 have changed the formula for awarding good time credits with resulting changes in the computation of parole eligibility, maximum release date, consecutive sentences, and other aspects of the sentence computation process. The regulations are not estimated to have any economic impact on governmental units, persons subject to proposed rules and regulations, or the general public. The primary impact of the regulations will be to ensure the public and inmates that sentences are administered in a consistent manner and in accordance with applicable statutes.

The amendment to K.A.R. 44-7-104 is intended to better enable the department to provide for the internal security of correctional facilities by enhancing the ability to control the introduction of contraband. The regulations are not intended to have any economic impact on governmental units, persons subject to proposed rules and regulations or the general public.

A public hearing will be conducted at 7 p.m. Tuesday, August 14, at the Doubletree Hotel, Dallas Room, 10100 College Blvd., Overland Park, to consider the adoption and revocation of several departmental regulations. If necessary, the public hearing will continue at 9 a.m. Wednesday, August 15, in the Tuscon Room of the Doubletree Hotel. Regular duck and goose seasons for 1990 and 1991 based on federal frameworks will also be established. A workshop meeting on upcoming business and regulations will begin at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, August 14, in the Tuscon Room of the Doubletree Hotel. If necessary, the workshop will continue following the conclusion of the public hearing. The public also is invited to attend the workshop.

This 30-day notice period prior to the hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the regulations.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the chairman of the commission, Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks, Suite 502, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to express their views orally in regard to the adoption of the proposed regulations and the proposed revocations. During the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered by the commission as a basis for approving, amending or rejecting the proposed regulations and revocations.

The following is a brief summary of the regulations proposed for adoption and regulations proposed for revocation.

K.A.R. 115-30-2. Certificate-of-number and registration; application, temporary permits and expiration date. This proposed permanent regulation includes provisions of K.A.R. 23-11-3, which is proposed for revocation. Changes include authorizing vendor issuance of certificate of number and registration, issuance of temporary registrations only as a part of permanent registrations, and no longer requiring a certificate to be surrendered upon a change of address.

Economic Impact Summary: The change in the handling of temporary registrations is anticipated to result in a revenue loss of \$24,540 to the department, but would represent a similar savings to the public. Persons would be able to buy a permanent registration that would permit immediate boat use without having to buy a temporary registration. This would result in not issuing approximately 12,270 temporary registration permits annually.

K.A.R. 115-30-3. Personal flotation devices; requirements. This proposed permanent regulation contains provisions of K.A.R. 23-11-6, which is proposed for revocation. It establishes requirements for personal flotation devices (PFD) in conformance with U.S. Coast Guard regulations. Expanded use of type V PFD's is authorized. The term "readily accessible" is defined.

Economic Impact Summary: No economic impact is

anticipated as previous requirements for PFD's are continued.

K.A.R. 115-30-4. Fire extinguishers; requirements. This proposed permanent regulation contains provisions of K.A.R. 23-11-7 which is proposed for revocation. It establishes requirements for fire extinguishers in conformance with U.S. Coast Guard regulations. Changes are minor in nature, but were necessary to comply with Coast Guard regulations.

Economic Impact Summary: No significant economic impact is anticipated as the regulation generally continues current conditions.

K.A.R. 115-30-5. Boating; capacity plate and operation. This proposed permanent regulation contains provisions of K.A.R. 23-11-17, which is proposed for revocation. It prohibits the destruction or removal of a capacity plate and the operation of a vessel in excess of capacity plate limitations.

Economic Impact Summary: No economic impact will occur as these prohibitions currently exist.

K.A.R. 115-30-6. Boating, adoption by reference of certain code of federal regulations. This proposed permanent regulation will adopt by reference U.S. Coast Guard boating regulations covering weight capacity, persons capacity, horsepower capacity, backfire flame control and ventilation. These provisions currently exist in K.A.R. 23-11-8, 12 and 17 which are proposed for revocation.

Economic Impact Summary: No economic impact will occur as the federal requirements are similar to requirements in the regulations proposed for revocation.

K.A.R. 115-30-7. Boating, pilot rules. This proposed permanent regulation continues provisions of K.A.R. 23-11-13, which is proposed for revocation. It establishes rules-of-the-road for boating.

Economic Impact Summary: No economic impact will occur as the regulation basically provides the same rules-of-the-road as found in K.A.R. 23-11-13.

K.A.R. 115-30-8. Boating; accident reports. This proposed permanent regulation continues provisions of K.A.R. 23-11-16, which is proposed for revocation. It provides for accident reports on department supplied forms, time frame for submittal and authorizes a report to be filled out by other than the operator under certain circumstances.

Economic Impact Summary: No economic impact will occur as the regulation continues provisions of K.A.R. 23-11-16.

K.A.R. 115-30-9. Water event permit; application and requirements. This proposed permanent regulation basically continues provisions of K.A.R. 23-11-15, which is proposed for revocation. It provides an application procedure including safety measure considerations and establishes a permit duration. Provides that a special event permit shall satisfy water event requirements on department lands and waters.

Economic Impact Summary: A review loss to the department is anticipated as at one time a special event permit and a water event permit was required to use state parks. The amount of loss is unknown, but is not believed to be significant. It would represent a cost savings to the public.

K.A.R. 23-11-3. Certificate number and registration decals—expiration date. This permanent regulation exists under the discontinued agency 23 number. Subject matter of this regulation is contained in proposed regulation K.A.R. 115-30-2.

Economic Impact Summary: No economic impact will occur as a result of revocation.

K.A.R. 23-11-4. Owner change of address—certificate of number amended. This permanent regulation exists under the discontinued agency 23 number. Subject matter of this regulation is contained in proposed regulation K.A.R. 115-30-2.

Economic Impact Summary: No economic impact will occur as a result of revocation.

K.A.R. 23-11-6. Life saving equipment required. This permanent regulation exists under the discontinued agency 23 number. Subject matter of this regulation is contained in proposed regulation K.A.R. 115-30-3.

Economic Impact Summary: No economic impact will occur as a result of revocation.

K.A.R. 23-11-7. Fire extinguishers. This permanent regulation exists under the discontinued agency 23 number. Subject matter of this regulation is contained in proposed regulation K.A.R. 115-30-4.

Economic Impact Summary: No economic impact will occur as a result of revocation.

K.A.R. 23-11-8. Flame arresters. This permanent regulation exists under the discontinued agency 23 number. Subject matter of this regulation is contained in proposed regulation K.A.R. 115-30-6.

Economic Impact Summary: No economic impact will occur as a result of revocation.

K.A.R. 23-11-9. Exemption on registration and numbering. This permanent regulation exists under the discontinued agency 23 number. It provides a sailboat exemption from registration and numbering when used in regattas, races, etc. Such exemption is deemed not in compliance with state law or Coast Guard registration requirements.

Economic Impact Summary: Revocation will likely have an impact on some vessel owners who used regatta (water event) permits as a means to avoid registration and possible personal property taxation. The amount of impact is unknown. Some additional boat registration revenue will be received by the department, but the amount is unknown.

K.A.R. 23-11-12. Ventilation. This permanent regulation exists under the discontinued agency 23 number. Subject matter of this regulation is contained in proposed regulation K.A.R. 115-30-6.

Economic Impact Summary: No economic impact will occur as a result of revocation.

K.A.R. 23-11-13. Pilot rules. This permanent regulation exists under the discontinued agency 23 number. Subject matter of this regulation is contained in proposed regulation K.A.R. 115-30-7.

Economic Impact Summary: No economic impact will occur as a result of revocation.

K.A.R. 23-11-15. Regattas, races, water exhibitions and shows. This permanent regulation exists under the discontinued agency 23 number. Subject matter of this

regulation is contained in proposed regulation K.A.R. 115-30-9.

Economic Impact Summary: No economic impact will occur as a result of revocation.

K.A.R. 23-11-16. Written report of accident. This permanent regulation exists under the discontinued agency 23 number. Subject matter of this regulation is contained in proposed regulation K.A.R. 115-30-8.

Economic Impact Summary: No economic impact will occur as a result of revocation.

K.A.R. 23-11-17. Vessel: capacity determination. This permanent regulation exists under the discontinued agency 23 number. Subject matter of this regulation is contained in proposed regulations K.A.R. 115-30-5 and 6.

Economic Impact Summary: No economic impact will occur as a result of revocation.

A public hearing will be conducted at 1:30 p.m. Friday, August 17, in Room 108, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider adoption of K.A.R. 28-17-1, 28-17-3, 28-17-4, 28-17-5, 28-17-7, 28-17-12, 28-17-15, 28-17-19, and 28-17-20 as permanent rules and regulations of the Department of Health and Environment.

K.A.R. 28-17-1, 28-17-5, 28-17-15 and 28-17-19 are being revised to eliminate reference to the local registrar in accordance with H.B. 2756, as passed by the 1990 Legislature, and to clarify the existing regulations.

K.A.R. 28-17-3, 28-17-4, and 28-17-7 are being repealed in accordance with H.B. 2756, as passed by the 1990 Legislature.

K.A.R. 28-17-12 is being revised to increase the fee for filing a delayed certificate of birth from \$4 to \$6. Failure to increase this fee to \$6 was an oversight when other fees were increased in May 1988. The fiscal impact of this change would be minimal.

K.A.R. 28-17-20 represents the major amendment among these regulations. This regulation would eliminate the requirement that the Office of Vital Statistics staff retrieve outstanding copies of vital records when a change to a record is needed within the first 90 days of filing. Currently outstanding copies must be returned to the Office of Vital Statistics before the amendment can be made. If they cannot be returned, a new certificate must be initiated. This requirement serves no useful purpose and causes unnecessary delays, as retrieval of these copies requires time and effort on the part of its staff, the local registration official and the applicant awaiting the copies to transact personal business. Frequently, these delays cause serious hardships on the applicant.

The fiscal impact will be insignificant.

Article 15.—SELECTION FOR RESEARCH GRANTS

112-15-1. Definitions. (a) "Animal health officer" means the individual employed by the commission pursuant to K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8806.

(b) "Commission" means the Kansas racing commission appointed by the governor pursuant to K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8803.

(c) "Executive director" means the individual appointed by the governor pursuant to K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8805.

(d) "Kansas greyhound breeding development fund" means the fund created by K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8831.

(e) "Kansas horse breeding development fund" means the fund created by K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8829.

(f) "Official registering agency" means:

(1) for horses, the agency designated by the commission pursuant to K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8830 (b) and (c);

(2) for greyhounds, the agency designated by the commission pursuant to K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8832 (b) and (c).

(g) "Program period" means the period for which each program is funded with monies from the Kansas horse breeding development fund or the Kansas greyhound breeding development fund, normally 12 months (one fiscal year) unless special consideration is requested and approved. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8804; implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8829 and 74-8831; effective, T-112-7-2-90, July 2, 1990.)

112-15-2. Application deadlines. (a) Applications for grants during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1991, shall be submitted to the executive director on or before November 1, 1990. Applicants demonstrating need to the satisfaction of the grant committee may be granted emergency funding before the November 1 deadline.

(b) Beginning with the fiscal year July 1, 1991, through June 30, 1992, each grant application shall be submitted to the executive director no later than 60 days before the beginning of each fiscal year.

(c) Applications for receipt of unobligated grant monies remaining the Kansas horse breeding development fund or the Kansas greyhound breeding development fund after the initial annual grant pursuant to subsections (a) or (b) may be submitted at any time.

(d) The commission shall solicit grant proposals from interested applicants during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1991, by publishing notice of the application deadlines and procedures in the Kansas register on or before September 1, 1990. Beginning with the fiscal year July 1, 1991, through June 30, 1992, the commission shall solicit grant proposals from interested applicants by publishing notice of the application deadlines and procedures in the *Kansas Register* on or before March 1 of each fiscal year. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8804; implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8829 and 74-8831; effective, T-112-7-2-90, July 2, 1990.)

112-15-3. Application requirements. (a) Each grant application shall include:

- (1) a summary cover page;
 - (2) a program narrative;
 - (3) a budget summary;
 - (4) a budget narrative;
 - (5) certified assurances;
 - (6) an audit schedule; and
 - (7) a designation of the applicant's EEO contact.
- (b) Each summary cover page shall provide quick reference to important elements of the grant application.

- (c) Each program narrative shall address:
- (1) needs assessment and documentation;
 - (2) program expectations;
 - (3) program methodology;
 - (4) program monitoring and evaluations;
 - (5) audit concerns; and
 - (6) staffing patterns.
- (d) Each grant application shall relate to research conducted within the state of Kansas:
- (1) for horses, through institutions of higher education under the state board of regents, and
 - (2) for greyhounds, preferably through institutions of higher education under the state board of regents or in association with such institutions. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8804; implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8829 and 74-8831; effective, T-112-7-2-90, July 2, 1990.)

112-15-4. Application review. (a) Each grant application shall be evaluated using the following criteria:

- (1) the proposal's compliance with K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8829(b)(5) or implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8831(b)(2);
 - (2) the quality of the needs assessment and documentation in terms of proposed benefits to the horse and greyhound racing industries in Kansas;
 - (3) the record of successful implementation of research results in the breed industries by this or similar programs;
 - (4) the degree of breed industry support for the program;
 - (5) the adequacy of budget information;
 - (6) the efficacy of evaluative components, both programmatic and fiscal;
 - (7) any receipt of other financial assistance; and
 - (8) any other criteria stated by the commission in the notice published pursuant to K.A.R. 112-15-2(d).
- (b) the executive director may require an applicant to be present during the application review process to provide necessary clarification of the application. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8804; implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8829 and 74-8831; effective, T-112-7-2-90, July 2, 1990.)

112-15-5. Notification of decision. (a) Each applicant applying for grant funds before the fiscal year ending June 30, 1991, shall be notified in writing of the grant decision on or before December 1, 1990, except each applicant applying for grant funds pursuant to the emergency provisions of subsection (a) of K.A.R. 112-15-2 or pursuant to subsection (c) of K.A.R. 112-15-2 shall be notified not later than 15 days after the date on which the application is reviewed.

(b) Beginning with the fiscal year July 1, 1991, through June 30, 1992, each applicant shall be notified in writing of the grant decision not later than 30 days after the date on which the application is reviewed, except applicants applying for grant funds pursuant to subsection (c) of K.A.R. 112-15-2 shall be notified not later than 15 days after the date on which the application is reviewed. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8804; implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8829 and 74-8831; effective, T-112-7-2-90, July 2, 1990.)

112-15-6. Reporting requirements. (a) Each grant recipient shall submit to the executive director:

(1) quarterly expenditure reports providing fiscal information on expenditures during the previous three-month period; and

(2) a program narrative report providing a narrative description of program activities during the program period.

(b) Each grant recipient shall submit a quarterly expenditure report within 30 days after the close of each calendar quarter, on March 31, June 30, September 30 and December 31.

(c) Each grant recipient shall submit a program narrative report within 30 days after the close of the fiscal year.

(d) Each grant recipient shall submit to the executive director a sound research paper summarizing the research program and the results within 90 days after the close of the program period. Each research paper shall be prepared in a form suitable for publication.

(e) Each grant recipient shall submit to the executive director, at least 30 days before actual need, cash draw down reports to request advancement of approved grant funds.

(f) Each grant recipient shall maintain program receipts for a period of three years after the close of the program period. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8804; implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8829 and 74-8831; effective, T-112-7-2-90, July 2, 1990.)

112-15-7. Grant committees. (a) One committee of five persons, designated by the executive director, may assist the commission in determining research awards from the Kansas horse breeding development fund. The grant committee shall have a membership as follows:

- (1) One representative of the horse industry;
- (2) one representative of the official registering agency;
- (3) one representative identified by the commission;
- (4) the animal health officer; and
- (5) the executive director, who shall chair the committee.

(b) One committee of five persons, designated by the executive director, may assist the commission in determining research awards from the Kansas greyhound breeding development fund. The grant committee shall have a membership as follows:

- (1) One representative of the greyhound industry;
- (2) one representative of the official registering agency;
- (3) one representative identified by the commission;
- (4) the animal health officer; and

RegulationsArticle 2.—AMBULANCE SERVICES;
PERMITS AND REGULATIONS

109-2-5. Service permit. Each operator and attendant shall comply with the following requirements:

(a) Each service in a county which has been assigned to the emergency medical services communications system by the board and that operates vehicles which are required to have direct, two-way radio communications shall fully participate in the operation and maintenance of that communications system; and

(b) firearms shall not be worn or carried aboard an ambulance vehicle within the state while the ambulance vehicle is operating in any patient transport function. This prohibition shall apply whether the firearms are concealed or visible. However, the prohibition shall not apply to law enforcement officers as defined in K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-5602.

(c) Sanitation requirements.

(1) Smoking shall be prohibited in the patient and driver compartments at all times.

(2) The interior of the ambulance and the equipment within the ambulance shall be sanitary and maintained in good working order at all times, except when the vehicle has been placed "out of service."

(3) The ambulance equipment shall be constructed of smooth and easily cleanable materials.

(4) Freshly laundered linen or disposable linen shall be used on cots and pillows and linen shall be changed after each patient is transported.

(5) Clean linen storage shall be provided on each ambulance.

(6) Pillows and mattresses shall be kept clean and in good repair.

(7) Closable containers shall be provided for soiled supplies.

(8) The exterior of the ambulance shall be kept clean.

(9) Blankets and hand towels used in the ambulance shall be clean.

(10) Implements inserted into the patient's nose or mouth shall be properly stored and handled. Such implements shall be maintained in a sanitary condition.

(11) When an ambulance has been utilized to transport a patient known to the operator to have an infectious disease, the ambulance shall be cleaned and all contact surfaces shall be washed with soap and water and disinfected. The mattresses, pillows and blankets shall be cleaned in the same manner. The ambulance shall be placed "out of service" until a thorough cleansing is conducted.

(d) All equipment in the patient compartment shall be placed in cabinets or securely restrained while the vehicle is in motion.

(e) All ground ambulances shall receive a mechanical and safety inspection annually prior to November 1. A report of the inspection results shall be made on forms provided by the administrator. All deficiencies determined by the inspection shall be corrected prior to submitting the inspection form.

(f) The mechanical and safety inspection form shall be submitted to the board of emergency medical services with the application for ambulance vehicle licensure or renewal.

(g) All ground vehicles shall be parked in a completely enclosed building with interior heating to at least 50 degrees fahrenheit.

(h) When a vehicle is temporarily out of service, the service operator may apply to the administrator for a temporary license for a vehicle approved by the board. The vehicle shall meet all staffing and equipment requirements for the license type requested. This temporary license shall be valid for 30 days but may be renewed one time by the administrator.

(i) Communications requirements.

(1) A telephone with an advertised access number shall be available and answered by an attendant or other person. Answering machines shall not be permitted; and

(2) Attendants and drivers shall be at the station or in direct contact with the person who answers the telephone.

(j) A place of business shall be maintained at an identified street address where the permit is posted and service records are kept.

(k) Personnel requirements.

(1) The operator shall maintain a staff adequate to provide attendants for the level of permit held; and

(2) A call schedule shall be maintained which demonstrates the requirements of K.S.A. 65-6135 are met.

(l) Record keeping requirements.

(1) The operator shall maintain a record of each transport made on forms approved by the board and shall furnish copies of all completed forms to the board as the board may require; and

(2) The administrator may approve alternative methods of transmitting transport information to the board. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 65-6110; effective May 1, 1985; amended, T-88-24, July 15, 1987; amended May 1, 1988; amended Aug. 27, 1990.)

109-2-7. Classes of ambulance vehicles. Licenses shall be issued for three classes of ambulance vehicles in the state. These classes shall be known as type I, type II, and type V. Each ambulance vehicle operated by a service that has been issued a permit shall be licensed in accordance with the provisions set forth in these regulations.

(a) Each type I vehicle shall be:

(1) Equipped to provide emergency care as described in K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 65-6119;

(2) in compliance with all vehicle specifications and equipment requirements set forth in K.A.R. 109-2-8 (a), (b), (c), (d), and (f); and

(3) staffed with at least two attendants during patient transport, including at least one currently certified mobile intensive care technician. The second attendant may be either a currently certified emergency medical technician, emergency medical technician-intermediate, emergency medical technician-defibrillator, or mobile intensive care technician.

(b) Each type II vehicle shall be:

(1) In compliance with the vehicle specifications and equipment requirements set forth in K.A.R. 109-2-8 (a), (b), (c), and (d); and

(2) staffed with at least one currently certified emergency medical technician and one other person certified by the American heart association in "Course C," or the American Red Cross in "Professional Rescuer" and certified in basic first aid care by the American red cross on and after January 1, 1991. On and after January 1, 1992, the second person shall be a currently certified first responder or a currently certified attendant. An emergency medical technician, emergency medical technician-intermediate or emergency medical technician-defibrillator shall be in the patient compartment during patient transport.

(c) Each type V vehicle shall be:

(1) Dedicated for ambulance use and in compliance with the provisions of K.A.R. 109-2-11 or 109-2-12; and

(2) staffed with a driver or pilot and at least two attendants, one of whom shall be a licensed physician, a registered nurse, or a certified mobile intensive care technician. The second attendant shall be a licensed physician, a registered nurse, a certified mobile intensive care technician or a registered respiratory therapist. At least one attendant shall be certified in advanced cardiac life support or the equivalent approved by the board. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 65-6110 implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 65-6110 and 65-6135; effective May 1, 1985; amended May 1, 1987; amended, T-88-24, July 15, 1987; amended May 1, 1988; amended Aug. 27, 1990.)

Article 8—EXAMINATIONS

109-8-1. Examinations. (a) The examinations approved by the board for first responder certification and each level of attendant certification shall be the examinations approved by the board on November 2, 1990.

(b) Each applicant for certification shall obtain a minimum score of 70% on the written examination and shall demonstrate competency in all activities, authorized by statute, as evaluated by the administrator or the administrator's designee using criteria approved by the board.

(c) The written examination and each section of the practical examination may be taken a maximum of three times for any level of attendant and first responder certification during the period of eligibility specified in K.S.A. 65-6129. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 65-6110; effective, T-109-1-19-89, January 19, 1989; effective July 17, 1989; amended Aug. 27, 1990.)

Article 9.—INSTRUCTOR/COORDINATOR

109-9-1. Instructor-coordinator certification. (a) Each applicant for certification as an instructor-coordinator shall, upon application:

(1) Be certified for at least one year as an attendant;

(2) demonstrate at least one year of field experience with an ambulance service;

(3) make application to the board upon forms provided by the administrator; and

(4) have successfully completed an instructor-coordinator training program approved by the university of Kansas medical center before April 14, 1988, and have made application to the board no later than December 31, 1990, or a program approved by the board if completed after April 14, 1988.

(b) Each instructor-coordinator requesting endorsement by the board to instruct and coordinate any level of attendant certification and continuing education, other than crash injury management technician and emergency medical technician, shall upon application:

(1) Have been certified for at least one year as a mobile intensive care technician or at the level of certification for which the applicant is requesting endorsement; and

(2) have successfully completed an appropriate course of instruction approved by the university of Kansas medical center prior to April 14, 1988 or a course approved by the board if completed after that date.

(continued)

(c) The certificate shall be valid through December 31 of the year following the year in which it was initially issued and may be renewed thereafter for a period of one year if the instructor-coordinator completes the continuing education requirements prescribed by the board. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 65-6110; effective T-109-1-19-89, Jan. 19, 1989; effective July 17, 1989; amended Aug. 27, 1990.)

Article 10.—CURRICULA

109-10-1. Curriculum approval. (a) The approved curriculum for first responder programs shall be the department of transportation curriculum HS 900 026 as modified by the board and as in effect on January 1, 1989.

(b) The approved curriculum for crash injury management technician programs shall be the emergency medical training program of the board curriculum in effect on January 1, 1989.

(c) The approved curriculum for emergency medical technician programs shall be the department of transportation curriculum HS 900 073 as modified by the board and as in effect on January 1, 1989.

(d) The approved curriculum for emergency medical technician-intermediate programs shall be the department of transportation curriculum HS 900 091 in effect on January 1, 1989.

(e) The approved curriculum for emergency medical technician-defibrillator programs shall be the emergency medical training program of the board curriculum in effect on January 1, 1989.

(f) The approved curriculum for mobile intensive care technician programs shall be the department of transportation curriculum HS 900 089 as modified by the board and as in effect on January 1, 1989.

(g) The approved curriculum for instructor-coordinator programs shall be the department of transportation curriculum HS 900 086 in effect on January 1, 1989. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 65-6110 and 65-6111; implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 65-6111, 65-6129 and 65-6142; effective, T-109-1-19-89, January 19, 1989; effective July 17, 1989; amended Aug. 27, 1990.)

Article 12.—AUTOMATED DEFIBRILLATOR TRAINING PROGRAM

109-12-1. Automated defibrillator training program.

(a) The curriculum for training first responders, emergency medical technicians and emergency medical technicians-intermediate in the use of automated electronic defibrillators shall be the curriculum approved by the board on February 3, 1990.

(b) This program may be instructed by instructor-coordinators or training officers who have successfully completed an appropriate course of instruction approved by the board on March 3, 1989, and who are currently certified by the American Red Cross or American Heart Association as an instructor, instructor trainer or affiliate faculty.

(c) The instructor-coordinator or training officer shall submit an application to the administrator that includes the following:

- (1) The name, address, and telephone number of the instructor-coordinator or training officer;
- (2) the location of the course;
- (3) the name of the sponsoring organization;
- (4) the name, address, and telephone number of a contact person for the sponsoring organization;

(5) the name, address, and telephone number of the medical director;

(6) the dates the course will begin and end;

(7) the times and duration of scheduled classes; and

(8) the number of students anticipated;

(d) Approval as an instructor shall be valid through December 31 of the year following the year in which it was initially given and may be renewed thereafter for a period of one year if the approved instructor completes the continuing education requirements prescribed by the board.

(e) Each application shall be submitted not later than 15 days before the first scheduled class. Each incomplete application shall not be accepted.

(f) Each instructor shall, within 10 days of the last class session provide the administrator with a complete list of all students who successfully complete the training program. Successful completion shall be determined by the instructor.

(g) Each approved class may be monitored by the administrator or the administrator's designee.

(h) Students who successfully complete the training program shall be issued a certificate by the board. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 65-6149; effective July 17, 1989; amended July 27, 1990.)
