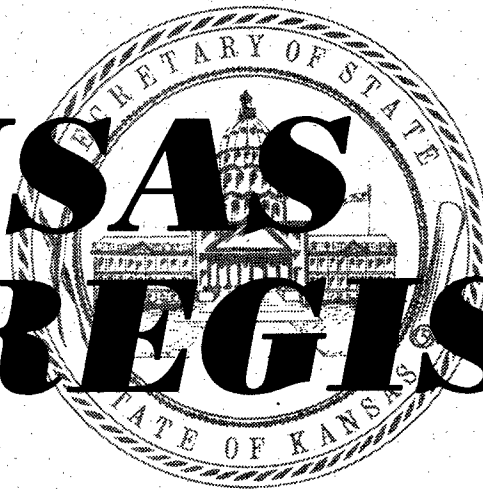

The Kansas Arts Commission has scheduled a workshop for members of teams from Kansas school districts engaged in planning comprehensive programs in arts education and for representatives of school districts intending to enter the Planning Education in the Arts in Kansas (PEAK) program.

The PEAK workshop will be on Saturday, November 17, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Salina Arts & Humanities Commission office on the second floor of the Smoky Hill Museum, 211 W. Iron, Salina.

The workshop leader will be Mary Sundet-Jones, a private consultant who has worked in the arts and arts education field for nine years, the last five as coordinator of the Minnesota Comprehensive Arts Planning Program, regarded as a national model. Ms. Sundet-Jones will instruct participants on how to lead their local teams through the planning process.

The PEAK program is a new planning initiative in fiscal year 1991. PEAK provides grants to school districts, including reservation schools, to assist in developing three-to-five-year arts curriculum plans. Before applying, a school district must have assembled a planning team consisting of school administrators, teachers, and community people. Seven school districts currently are PEAK participants.

Funding for PEAK is provided by the Kansas Legislature and through the Arts In Schools Basic Education Grant program of the National Endowment for the Arts, a federal agency.

Administrative Regulations**

A public hearing will be conducted at 1 p.m. Monday, November 26, in the Golden Harvest Room of the Hutchinson Holidome, 1400 N. Lorraine, Hutchinson, to consider the adoption of proposed regulations of the Real Estate Appraisal Board.

This 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Real Estate Appraisal Board, Room 501, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka 66612-1220. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

The regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows.

Regulation 117-1-1 contains definitions. Regulations 117-2-1 and 117-2-2 establish qualification criteria for the residential real estate appraisal classification. Regulations 117-3-1 and 117-3-2 establish qualification criteria for the general real estate appraisal classification.

The cost of obtaining the required education is estimated at an average of \$1,400 per applicant. Other governmental units, private citizens and consumers will not be affected by the regulations.

Regulations 117-6-1, 117-6-2 and 117-6-3 pertain to continuing education requirements. The cost of obtaining the required education for each renewal is estimated at \$100. The cost to sponsors who offer approved courses is estimated at \$7,500. Other governmental units, private cit-

izens and consumers will not be affected by the regulations.

Regulation 117-7-1 establishes fees at the statutory maximum.

Administrative Regulations**

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Tuesday, November 27, in the third floor conference room of the Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of a proposed temporary regulation, K.A.R. 40-2-20, of the Kansas Insurance Department.

Copies of the full text of the regulation and the economic impact statement may be obtained by writing to the Commissioner of Insurance, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka 66612. The following is a summary of the regulation and the economic impact statement:

K.A.R. 40-2-20 is a new regulation which is being proposed to implement 1990 House Bill No. 2723. This legislation permits life insurance companies to develop and sell products in Kansas that provide for accelerating the payment of life or annuity benefits in advance of the time they would otherwise be payable.

The proposed legislation defines various terms including the definition of "qualifying event." It also establishes certain disclosure requirements and imposes appropriate limitations on the manner in which accelerated benefits may be funded and calculated.

Insurers electing to develop and/or provide an accelerated benefit option will incur some additional costs as a result of the disclosure requirements included in this regulation. Since the development, marketing and purchase of such products is entirely optional, it is not possible to quantify this expense on insurers, and the regulation imposes no obligation or expense on consumers. Processing the filings made with the Insurance Department by those insurers electing to make the accelerated benefits option available in Kansas can be accommodated by existing staff. Therefore, neither the law or regulation will have an administrative impact.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Commissioner of Insurance at the address above. The period of time between the date of publication of this notice and the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulation. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing.

**Article 17.—WILDLIFE, COMMERCIAL USES AUTHORIZED**

**115-17-6. Commercial mussel permit; permit application and requirements, authority, reports, general provisions and permit revocation.** (a) Except as authorized by K.A.R. 115-17-3, a commercial mussel permit shall be required for the harvest of mussels for commercial purposes, or for the sale, purchase for resale or export of mussels.

(b) Any person may apply to the secretary for a commercial mussel permit. The application shall be on forms provided by the department and each applicant shall provide the following information:

- (1) the name of the applicant;
- (2) the address and telephone number of the applicant;
- (3) the business locations and telephone numbers of the applicant;
- (4) the location for mussel storage and processing; and
- (5) other information as required by the secretary.

(c) Each permittee shall maintain a current record of activity and shall submit quarterly reports to the department on forms provided by the department. The reports shall be submitted not later than 15 days following the

end of the quarter for which the reports are prepared. A permit shall not be renewed until all reports due have been received by the department.

(d) The records and reports shall include the following information:

- (1) the name of the permittee;
- (2) the address and telephone number of the permittee;
- (3) the permit number of the permittee;
- (4) the total weight or total shell weight of each mussel species harvested;
- (5) the total weight or total shell weight of each mussel species purchased or sold including:

(A) a separate entry for each purchase or sale stating the total weight or total shell weight of each mussel species purchased or sold;

(B) the date of each purchase or sale;

(C) the name, address and permit number of the person from whom the mussels were purchased or to whom the mussels were sold; and

(D) the name of the state where harvested; and

(6) other information as required by the secretary.

(e) A commercial mussel permittee shall only sell mussels to or buy mussels from the following:

(1) a commercial mussel permittee; or

(2) a person legally authorized to purchase or sell mussels.

(f) Any person may purchase mussels from a commercial mussel permittee if the mussels are not purchased for resale or sold.

(g) In addition to other penalties prescribed by law, a commercial mussel application or permit may be revoked or not issued by the secretary if:

(1) the application is incomplete or contains false information;

(2) the permittee fails to meet permit requirements or violates permit conditions; or

(3) the permittee violates any provision of law, rules or regulations related to the commercial use of mussels.

(g) Each commercial mussel permit shall expire on December 31 of the year for which the permit was issued.

(h) This regulation shall be effective January 1, 1991. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-807 and K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-941; implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-807, K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-941 and K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-1002; effective Jan. 1, 1991.)

**115-17-7. Commercial harvest of mussels; legal species, seasons, size restrictions, daily limits and possession limits.** (a) All species of mussels may be commercially harvested, except no species of mussel listed in K.A.R. 115-15-1 or K.A.R. 115-15-2 shall be harvested.

(b) The season for commercial harvest of mussels shall be year round.

(c) All mussels with shells less than three inches at the largest diameter shall be immediately returned unharmed to the water from which removed, except all sizes of Asian clam, *Corbicula* species, may be harvested.

(d) There shall be no maximum daily or possession limits for mussels.

(e) This regulation shall be effective January 1, 1991. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-807 and K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-941; implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-807,

K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-941 and K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-1002; effective Jan. 1, 1991.)

**115-17-8. Commercial harvest of mussels; legal equipment, taking methods and general provisions.** (a) Legal equipment and taking methods permitted for commercial harvest of mussels shall be:

(1) by hand; and

(2) by other methods as approved by the department.

(b) General provisions.

(1) Boats with or without mechanical propulsion methods may be used.

(2) Depth recording or fish locating devices may be used.

(3) Underwater breathing equipment may be used while taking mussels, if a diver's flag is prominently displayed while using the underwater breathing equipment.

(4) Holding bags, holding baskets and holding cages may be used, provided the name and permit number of the permittee is attached to each.

(c) This regulation shall be effective January 1, 1991. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-807 and K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-941; implementing K.S.A. Supp. 32-807, K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-941 and K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-1002; effective Jan. 1, 1991.)

**115-17-9. Commercial harvest of mussels; open areas.** (a) All waters of the state shall be open for commercial harvest of mussels except:

(1) department-owned lands and waters;

(2) federal and state sanctuaries;

(3) Fall River from the county road ford located 1.2 miles east of state highway K-96, 3.2 miles south of Fredonia, Kansas, downstream to the Dun Dam located 2.5 miles west and 2.25 miles north of Neodesha, Kansas, a total of 9.89 stream miles including 3.27 impounded miles;

(4) Verdigris River from the Whitehair bridge located 2.5 miles east of federal highway US-75 on the Wilson-Montgomery county line road, downstream to the Montgomery county road bridge located 1.47 miles east of Sycamore, Kansas, a total of 6.66 stream miles; and

(5) Neosho River from the Neosho Falls dam, at Neosho Falls, Kansas, downstream to the mouth of Rock Creek in the NW 1/4, NW 1/4, Section 11, T24S, R17E, Woodson County, Kansas, a total of 3.35 stream miles;

## Article 3.—INSTANT GAME RULES

**111-3-1. Definitions.** The following definitions apply to all instant ticket games: (a) "Bare arm technique" means a type of drawing in which the person drawing the winning ticket from the receptacle wears a short-sleeved (sleeve not extending past the elbow) or a no-sleeve shirt which exposes the drawer's bare arm.

(b) "Book" means a pack of fanfolded instant game tickets which are attached to each other by perforations, which perforations the retailer tears when selling a ticket from the book. The books are packed in plastic shrink-wrapping which shall be removed by the retailer so that the retailer can apply the retailer's name and number to each ticket prior to sale. Each book shall consist of 300 instant game tickets fanfolded by fives.

(c) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. The book-ticket number is a book number followed by a dash and then a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000 and end with 299. The book-ticket number is printed in gray/black ink on the bottom right portion of the front of each instant game ticket.

(d) "Claimant" means a holder of a ticket who presents it for payment of a prize.

(e) "Drum" means a container which can be sealed and rotated for the purpose of mixing, and into which "Kansas Lottery Entry Envelopes" are placed for the purpose of drawing the preliminary and final "Grand Prize Drawing" winner.

(f) "Executive director" means the executive director of the Kansas lottery, or the person designated by the executive director.

(g) "Instant game" means a lottery game in which a ticket is purchased by a player and the player can immediately determine whether he or she has won a prize by removing the removable covering on the ticket and comparing the exposed play numbers or symbols with those specified as winners in the published game rules for that instant game.

(h) "Participant" means any person, player, or contestant participating in a lottery game and anyone designated by a prize winner to appear on his or her behalf for any lottery game including the Grand Prize Drawing and the "Televised Draw Show." In the event the prize winner or his or her designee fails to appear for the Grand Prize Drawing or "Televised Draw Show," the executive director shall designate an adult who may be a member of his staff to participate on behalf of the non-appearing prize winner. Any prize won by a participant appearing through a designee shall be payable to and delivered to the prize winner as provided by these rules and regulations.

(i) "Play area" is the portion of the front of each instant game ticket where the play symbols appear. It is covered

by a removable layer of material which is intended to be removed ("scratched off") by the player to reveal the play symbols.

(j) "Play symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket holder is entitled to a prize.

(k) "Play symbols captions" are the words or portions of words printed beneath each play symbol in the play area and are used to repeat or explain the play symbol. The play symbol caption associated with each play symbol is designated by the rules of the game.

(l) Prize Tiers:

(1) "Low-tier prize" means a lottery instant game prize not exceeding \$25.00.

(2) "Mid-tier prize" means a lottery instant game prize of more than \$25.00 but not exceeding \$599.99.

(3) "High-tier prize" means a lottery instant game prize in excess of \$599.99.

(m) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer.

(n) "Special event" means a drawing or other method of awarding an additional prize or prizes within a group of lottery instant game winners as defined by the rules for a particular instant game.

(o) "Ticket holder" means the person who has possession of the ticket.

(p) "Ticket validation number" means a unique number appearing on each ticket which is used to validate winning tickets. The ticket validation number appears under the removable covering on the front of each instant ticket. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-88-39, Oct. 15, 1987; amended, T-89-7, Feb. 26, 1988; amended, T-115-12-28-89, Dec. 21, 1989; amended, T-111-10-10-90, Sept. 15, 1990.)

**111-3-16. Disputes.** In the event of a dispute between a ticket holder and the Kansas lottery concerning any instant winner lottery game, and the drawings associated with any instant game, the executive director has the authority to determine the facts underlying the dispute and to pay a prize to the holder of a valid winning lottery ticket. If the investigation of the dispute is inconclusive, the executive director may, solely at his or her option, reimburse the ticket holder for the cost of the disputed ticket. If the investigation of the dispute determines facts in favor of the Kansas lottery, the executive director shall deny any claim relating to the dispute. **111-4-233. Name of Game.** The Kansas Lottery shall conduct an instant winner lottery game entitled "Holiday Bonus" commencing on November 22, 1990. The specific rules for the "Holiday Bonus" are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-233 through 111-4-236. (Au-



thorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-10-10-90, Sept. 15, 1990.)

**111-4-234. Definitions.** The following definitions shall apply to the "Holiday Bonus" instant lottery game:

(a) "Play symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the play symbols are printed in black ink in 10 pt. Archer. A play symbol appears in each of eight play spots within each game in the play area. Each play symbol for this instant game is one of the following: \$1.00 - \$3.00 - \$6.00 - \$13.00 - \$20.00 - \$100.

(b) "Play symbol captions" are the words or portions of words printed beneath each play symbol in the play area and are used to repeat or explain the play symbol. The play symbol caption associated with each play symbol is as follows:

(d) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. For this instant game, the book-ticket number is an 8-digit book number followed by a dash and then a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000 and end with 299. The book-ticket number is printed in black ink on the front of each instant game ticket.

(e) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. In this instant game, the retailer validation code is a two letter code printed and appearing in two of six varying locations among the play symbols. The codes and their meanings are as follows: CC = \$1.00; EE = \$3.00; HH = \$6.00; TT = \$13.00; NN = \$20.00. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-10-10-90, Sept. 15, 1990.)

**111-4-235. Determination of Instant Prize Winners.** An instant prize winner is determined for this instant game when the player removes or "scratches off" the removable layer of material covering the play area to reveal the six play symbols and captions. This is a match three (3) of eight (8) game. If three (3) of the eight (8) concealed prize amounts match, the player wins the amount shown. No ticket will be eligible to win more than one prize. Prizes a player may win are as follows:

(d) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. For this instant game, the book-ticket number is an 8-digit book number followed by a dash and then a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000 and end with 299. The book-ticket number is printed in black ink on the front of each instant game ticket.

(e) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. In this instant game, the retailer validation code is a two letter code printed and appearing in two of nine varying locations among the play symbols. The codes and their meanings are as follows: AA = free ticket; QQ = two free tickets; EE = \$3.00; KK = \$5.00; HH = \$6.00; BB = \$10.00; FF = \$11.00; WW = \$22.00. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-10-10-90, Sept. 15, 1990.)

(b) The executive director may terminate the sale of tickets prior to the complete sale of all tickets. In this event, the number and value of prizes will be approximately proportional to the number of tickets actually sold.

(c) All prizes are subject to deductions provided by law. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8710(b), (c) & (f); implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 74-8710(b), (c) & (f) and 74-8720; effective, T-11-10-10-90, Sept. 15, 1990.)

Article 6.—ON-LINE GAMES

**111-6-1. Definitions.** (a) All definitions contained in the Kansas Lottery Act (K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 74-8701 *et seq.*) and lottery regulations are hereby incorporated by reference unless otherwise indicated.

(b) "On-line Game" means a lottery game in which a player selects a combination of numbers or symbols, the type of game and amount of play, and the drawing date(s) by use of a computer. In return for paying the appropriate fee, the player receives a computer-generated ticket with the player's selection printed on it. The Kansas lottery (lottery) will conduct a drawing to determine the winning combination in accordance with the rules of the specific game being played. (c) "On-line Retailer" means a person or business authorized by the Lottery to sell on-line tickets.

(d) "On-line Terminal (OLT)" means the computer hardware by which an on-line retailer or player enters the combination selected by the player and by which on-line tickets are generated and claims are validated.

(e) "On-line Ticket" means a computer-generated ticket issued by an on-line terminal to a player as a receipt for the combination a player had selected. That ticket shall be the only acceptable evidence of the combination of numbers or symbols selected.

(f) "Drawing" means the procedure determined by the Director by which the Lottery selects the winning combination in accordance with the rules of the game. Drawings are open to the public, and are required to be witnessed by a representative of an independent certified public accounting firm. Furthermore, the equipment used in any drawing must be inspected by a representative of the independent certified public accounting firm and an

**111-4-231. #### Article 7.—CASH LOTTO GAME RULES

**111-7-9. Claiming Prizes; Procedure and Time Period.** (a) Prior to the payment of any prize, each ticket shall be validated by the retailer or lottery office pursuant to this article.

(b) The procedure for payment of a "Cash Lotto" prize on any single game ticket, except for a jackpot prize, is as follows:

(1) The holder of a ticket purchased in Kansas may present the ticket to any Cash Lotto retailer. Upon validation of the ticket, the retailer shall immediately make payment of the prize to the holder. If the retailer cannot validate the claim, the claimant shall fill out a claim form provided by the retailer and personally present or mail the completed form together with the ticket to any office of the Kansas Lottery. If the claim is validated, then payment shall be made to the claimant by mail.

(2) The claimant may bring the signed ticket to any regional office of the Kansas lottery during the hours that the office is open to the public for business. Upon validation of the claim, and completion of a claim form, payment shall be processed for the claimant.

(3) The claimant may mail the ticket with a completed claim form in any envelope, except an official grand prize envelope, to any office of the Kansas lottery. Claim forms may be obtained from any lottery retailer or any office of the Kansas lottery. Upon validation of the claim, payment shall be processed for the claimant.

If any evidence of alteration, mutilation, tear, or other ambiguity appear on the ticket, the retailer shall not make direct payment of a prize. The claimant shall submit a claim form with the ticket to the lottery.

(c) The procedure for the payment of a jackpot prize or for prizes won on the same ticket as a jackpot prize are as follows:

The claimant shall personally submit the signed ticket and a completed claim form to a Kansas regional or state lottery office. Jackpot prizes and prizes won on the same ticket as jackpot prizes shall not be claimed by mail.

(d) All prizes shall be claimed within one year of the drawing in which the prize was won. Any prize or prizes not claimed within the time specified shall be forfeited. If a prize is claimed by mail, the ticket and claim form must actually be received by the lottery within the claim period. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1987 Supp. 74-8710 and 74-8720; effective, T-89-25, May 24, 1988; amended, T-111-10-10-90, Sept. 15, 1990.)

At the close of the hearing the board will take a formal action on the proposed regulations.

The following is a brief summary of the proposed amendments to the permanent regulations and the temporary regulations.

**K.A.R. 102-1-13.** This permanent regulation is proposed for amendment and for temporary regulation to increase psychology licensure application, renewal and reinstatement fees from \$100 to \$130.

**Economic Impact Summary:** These fee increases are necessary to enable the board to continue to meet its mandated administrative responsibility to protect the public health and welfare. The fees generated from these increases are estimated to total additional revenue of \$504 in FY'91 and \$10,248 in FY'92 in the board's fee fund, and \$126 in FY'91 and \$2,562 in FY'92 in the state general fund. The fee increases will go into effect upon approval of the temporary regulation.

**K.A.R. 102-2-1a.** This permanent social work regulation is proposed for amendments to clarify definitions used within the regulations.

**Economic Impact Summary:** There should be no economic impact to the board, the licensees or the general public.

**K.A.R. 102-2-2a.** This permanent social work regulation is proposed for amendments to clarify the licensure application process.

**Economic Impact Summary:** There should be no economic impact to the agency, the licensees or the general public.

**K.A.R. 102-2-3.** This permanent regulation is proposed for amendments in the permanent, and temporary regulation to increase social work licensure examination fees from \$70 to \$125, and application, renewal and reinstatement

ment fees as follows: LASW and LBSW from \$70 to \$90; LMSW from \$70 to \$95; and LSCSW from \$70 to \$100.

The fees generated from these increases are estimated to total additional revenue of \$18,380 in FY'91 and \$42,392 in FY'92 in the board's fee fund, and \$4,595 in FY'91 and \$10,598 in FY'92 in the state general fund. The fee increases will go into effect upon approval of the temporary regulation.

**K.A.R. 102-2-4a.** This permanent social work regulation is proposed for amendments to further clarify what constitutes acceptable forms of continuing education required of licensed social workers to enable them to renew their licenses.

**Economic Impact Summary:** There should be minimal economic impact to the board, the licensees or the general public.

**K.A.R. 102-2-7.** This permanent social work regulation is proposed for amendments to further clarify what constitutes unprofessional conduct.

**Economic Impact Summary:** There should be minimal economic impact to the board, the licensees or the general public.

**K.A.R. 102-2-8.** This permanent social work regulation is proposed for amendments to further clarify supervision requirements for both licensed social workers and non-licensed individuals who assist in the delivery of social services under the supervision of licensed social workers.

**Economic Impact Summary:** There should be minimal economic impact to the board, the licensees or the general public.

**K.A.R. 102-2-12.** This permanent social work regulation is proposed for amendments to further clarify the qualifications for licensure at the specialist clinical social work level.

**Economic Impact Summary:** There should be minimal economic impact to the board, the licensees or the general public.

**K.A.R. 102-3-1.** This permanent professional counselor regulation is proposed for amendments to further clarify definitions used within the regulations.

**K.A.R. 102-3-3.** This permanent professional counselor regulation is proposed for amendments to further clarify the educational requirements for registration.

**Economic Impact Summary:** There should be minimal economic impact to the board, the registrants or the general public.

**K.A.R. 102-3-4.** This permanent professional counselor regulation is proposed for amendments to further clarify the registration application process.

**Economic Impact Summary:** There should be minimal economic impact to the board, the registrants or the general public.

**K.A.R. 102-3-5.** This permanent professional counselor regulation is proposed for amendments to further clarify the examination requirement for registration.

**Economic Impact Summary:** These fee increases are necessary to enable the board to continue to meet its mandated administrative responsibility to protect the public health and welfare. The fees generated from these increases are estimated to total additional revenue of \$500 in FY'91 and \$5,780 in FY'92 in the board's fee fund, and \$125 in FY'91 and \$1,445 in FY'92 in the state general fund. The fee increases will go into effect upon approval of the temporary regulation.

**K.A.R. 102-4-4.** This permanent registered master's level psychologist regulation is proposed for amendments to add the length of time applications will be held prior to expiration and to require applicants with transcripts from outside the United States to have an officially translated English copy of the transcript and supporting documents.
