Family and Children Trust Fund Solicitation

Application kits will be available for the programs listed below from the SRS area offices beginning December 17:

Program I—Continuation Grants

The programs currently receiving first, second or third year trust fund grants are eligible to apply for second, third or fourth year grants. All of these applicants will be subject to the trust fund guidelines being issued December 17. Each program will be notified of the maximum amount of funds available to them in 1991.

Program II—New Community Based Child Abuse and Neglect and Family Abuse Prevention Grants

Approximately five to 10 new programs will be funded in dollar amounts ranging from \$500 to \$20,000, with one exception up to \$30,000 for an extraordinary, innovative or exceptional proposal.

Applications for Program I and Program II must be submitted to SRS no later than 5 p.m. February 22. Late applications will not be considered. Final award decisions will be made by the Children and Youth Advisory Committee. Successful applicants will be notified about June 14.

The secretary of the Kansas Department of Health and Environment is proposing to issue a permit in accordance with K.A.R. 28-19-14 (permits required) to D & K Environmental, 2508 Carriage Lane, Garden City, to install and operate a portable, rotary soil-remediation incinerator at the Union Carbide Plant 997, 1 mile east of the Colorado state line and 3 miles north of State Highway 51.

This portable soil-remediation equipment has two burners and is designed to burn hydrocarbons in contaminated soil at a rate of 60,000 pounds of soil per hour. A fabric filter is installed to collect dust in the exhaust gases from the incinerator.

The Kansas Department of Transportation is seeking qualified consultant engineering firms for the following six packages of projects. Responses must be received by December 27 for any or all projects for which the consultant engineering firm wishes to be considered. Seven signed copies of responses need to be mailed to Al Cathcart, P.E., Project Control Engineer, Office of Engineering Support, K.D.O.T., 7th Floor, Docking State Office Building, Topeka 66612.

All projects will require surveys to be completed by the consulting engineering firm. Items such as seeding and erosion control, right of way procurement activities, geology, permit development, traffic data, utility and railroad agreement efforts, etc., may require consultant firm involvement. It has been established that all pavement marking, lighting, traffic signals, traffic control plans and permanent signing plans necessary will be designed by the consultant. Reconstruct I-470 from Burlingame Road eastward to the I-470/U.S. 75 connection at Topeka Boulevard including the existing KTA/I-470 connection. Project length approximately 1.1 miles.

Shawnee—75-89 K-3371-02 SE (FY 94) and 75-89 K-3371-03 SE (FY 95)—Construct a new U.S. 75 bypass on a previously acquired U.S. 75 bypass corridor alignment from the end of the existing four-lane freeway south of Topeka northwesterly to a point on the existing U.S. 75 bypass corridor at 49th Street. Project No. 75-89 K-3371-02 will be for grading, bridge construction, and necessary additional right of way procurement. Project No. 75-89 K-3371-03 will be for surfacing, signing, lighting and pavement marking. Project length approximately 5.5 miles.

Shawnee—75-89 K-4341-01 MM (FY 95)—Reconstruct U.S. 75 from 0.7 mile northeast of U.S. 24, north 3.7 miles to a point 0.65 mile south of the end of the four-lane divided section at 62nd Street. The proposed regulations and their economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 60-3-105. Reinstatement of lapsed license. This regulation allows additional allowances for the professional or practical nurse who is applying to reinstate the license. For the nurse returning to Kansas, the continuing education requirement would be waived if the individual had been working in another state. A temporary permit could be given to the Kansas nurse who wishes to return to work but does not meet the continuing education requirement. In both situations, the applicant would be able to return to work immediately. This should have a positive impact in that the nurse may work.

There would be no economic impact on the Board of Nursing.

K.A.R. 60-8-101. Schedule of fees. There are several fee increases proposed. Fees have been raised to be similar to those fees paid by practical nurses who have equivalent education requirements and salary structures. A new fee has been added for examination and repeat of examination. The Board of Nursing prepares the licensure examination for mental health technicians while the licensure examination is prepared for professional and practical nurses by the National Council of State Boards of Nursing. A separate fee is paid by the applicant for the national licensure examination. No fee had been previously charged to the mental health technician. The \$20 fee for approximately 60 applicants per year (\$1200) would minimally cover the expenses of the mental health technician committee to write the examination. This fee increase should have minimal impact on applicants. The increase in revenue to the agency would offset cost for preparation of the examination.

Increase in the license renewal by \$5 would be a minimal increase for the licensee. It would be a \$7,500 increase in agency revenues every two years.

An increase in the reinstatement fee by \$10 would not have much economic impact since there are very few reinstatements in this group.

Because of the number of changes in K.A.R. 60-9-101

through 60-9-104, those regulations are to be revoked and replaced by K.A.R. 60-9-105 through 60-9-109. These regulations refer to continuing education for nurses.

K.A.R. 60-9-105. Definitions. This regulation expands previous definitions to be more inclusive and specific. Refinement of the definitions is intended to assist providers and consumers of continuing nursing education to understand and follow the regulation.

K.A.R. 60-9-106. License renewal. The regulation has been expanded to be more specific for the individual professional or practical nurse in meeting continuing education requirements for license renewal. Independent study hours were expanded from six to 12. Individual approval of courses could be granted retroactively with the change in this regulation.

K.A.R. 60-9-107. Approval of continuing nursing education. Continuing nursing education must be approved by the Board of Nursing as earlier established. Guidelines for providership approval have been rewritten into regulation. Minimum standards for education and experience were established for those individuals responsible for the continuing education providerships. This regulation delineates requirements for providers of continuing nursing education.

K.A.R. 60-9-108. Approval of out-of-state offerings. This regulation allows credit for those licensees attending offerings out-of-state.

K.A.R. 60-9-109. Exceptions. A specific regulation has been written to define under what conditions continuing education for license renewal is not required. The only change from previous policy or regulation is that an individual completing a refresher course will not be required to complete 30 hours of continuing education in addition to the refresher course.

Although there has been major revision in the regulations for continuing nursing education, there should be minimum economic impact for professional and practical nurses. With more specific definition and explanation of continuing education for both the consumer and provider, there should be a reduction of unacceptable continuing education hours. Expanding on the number of hours of independent study should assist those who have difficulty in attaining continuing education hours.

Although there may be some additional workload for review of individual courses, there should be no economic impact on the Board of Nursing. With reassignment of workloads, there is enough staff to handle any minimal increases which might be stimulated by these regulations.

Because of the number of changes in K.A.R. 60-11-110 and 60-11-111, those regulations are to be revoked and replaced by K.A.R. 60-11-112 through 60-11-119. These regulations refer to temporary certification to practice, reinstatement of certification, continuing education, and fees for advanced registered nurse practitioners.

K.A.R. 60-11-112. Continuing education definitions.

K.A.R. 60-11-113. Certification renewal.

K.A.R. 60-11-114. Approval of advanced registered nurse practitioner continuing education.

K.A.R. 60-11-115. Approval of out-of-state offerings.

K.A.R. 60-11-116. Reinstatement of certification.

K.A.R. 60-11-117. Exceptions.

K.A.R. 60-11-118. Temporary certification to practice.

K.A.R. 60-11-112 through 60-11-118 are equivalent to

proposed regulations for registered nurse anesthetists, K.A.R. 60-13-109 through 60-13-115.

K.A.R. 60-11-119. Payment of fees. There is no change in the fee structure for advanced registered nurse practitioners.

Although there has been a major revision in the regulations for continuing nursing education, there should be minimum economic impact for advanced registered nurse practitioners. With more specific definition and explanation of continuing education for both the consumer and provider, there should be a reduction of unacceptable continuing education hours. Expanding on the number of hours of independent study should assist those who have difficulty in attaining continuing education hours.

Although there may be some additional workload for review of individual courses, there would be no economic impact on the Board of Nursing. With reassignment of workloads, there is enough staff to handle any minimal increases which might be stimulated by changes in these regulations.

Because there is no increase in fees, there would be no change in agency revenues.

Because of the number of changes in K.A.R. 60-12-101 through 60-12-104, those regulations are to be revoked and replaced by K.A.R. 60-12-105 through 60-12-109. These regulations refer to continuing education for licensed mental health technicians.

K.A.R. 60-12-105. Definitions. This regulation expands previous definitions to be more inclusive and specific. Refinement of the definitions is intended to assist providers and consumers of continuing mental health technician education to understand and follow said regulation.

K.A.R. 60-12-106. License renewal. The regulation has been expanded to be more specific for the individual licensed mental health technician in meeting continuing education requirements for license renewal. Independent study hours were expanded from six to 12. Individual approval of courses could be granted retroactively with the change in this regulation. The number of continuing education hours has been increased from 20 to 30 hours every two years.

K.A.R. 60-12-107. Approval of continuing mental health technician education. Continuing mental health technician education must be approved by the Board of Nursing as earlier established. Guidelines for providership approval have been rewritten into regulation. Minimum standards for education and experience were established for those individuals responsible for the continuing education providerships. This regulation delineates requirements for providers of continuing mental health technician education.

K.A.R. 60-12-108. Approval of out-of-state offerings. This regulation has been added to provide credit for those licensees attending offerings out-of-state.

K.A.R. 60-12-109. Exceptions. A specific regulation has been written to define under what conditions continuing education for license renewal is not required.

Although there has been major revision in the regulations for continuing mental health technician education, there may be some economic impact for the mental health technician due to increasing the number of contact hours needed for renewal. With more specific definition and

(continued)

explanation of continuing education for both the consumer and provider, there should be a reduction of unacceptable continuing education hours. Expanding on the number of hours of independent study should assist those who have difficulty in attaining continuing education hours.

Although there may be some additional workload for review of individual courses, there would be no economic impact on the Board of Nursing. With reassignment of workloads, there is enough staff to handle any minimal increases which might be stimulated by these regulations. If some licensees do not renew their licenses due to increase in expenditures to attain continuing education hours, there could be some reduction in Board of Nursing revenues.

Because of the number of changes in K.A.R. 60-13-105 through 60-13-108, those regulations are to be revoked and will be replaced by K.A.R. 60-13-109 through 60-9-115. These regulations refer to temporary authorization to practice, reinstatement of authorization, and continuing education for registered nurse anesthetists.

K.A.R. 60-13-101. Payment of fees. Application for reinstatement of lapsed authorization to practice as a registered nurse anesthetist was increased by \$10. Previous reinstatement fee was the same as the renewal fee. The \$10 difference is equivalent to that for the registered nurse.

K.A.R. 60-13-109. Temporary authorization to practice by examination or endorsement. This regulation expands previous regulation to allow registered nurse anesthetists a temporary permit for 180 days for clinical practice while attending refresher courses.

K.A.R. 60-13-110. Reinstatement of authorization. This regulation allows additional allowances for the nurse anesthetist who is applying to reinstate the authorization. The applicant who has been working out-of-state may reinstate with no continuing education hours. The applicant who has been living in Kansas but lapsed for more than one year may obtain a temporary permit while completing continuing education requirements.

K.A.R. 60-13-111. Continuing education definitions.

K.A.R. 60-13-112. Authorization renewal.

K.A.R. 60-13-113. Approval of registered nurse anesthetist continuing education.

K.A.R. 60-13-114. Approval of out-of-state offerings.

K.A.R. 60-13-115. Exceptions.

K.A.R. 60-13-111 through 60-13-115 are equivalent to the continuing education requirements for professional nurses.

Although there has been a major revision in the regulations for continuing nursing education, there should be minimum economic impact for registered nurse anesthetists. With more specific definition and explanation of continuing education for both the consumer and provider, there should be a reduction of unacceptable continuing education hours. Expanding on the number of hours of independent study should assist those who have difficulty in attaining continuing education hours.

Although there may be some additional workload for review of individual courses, there would be no economic impact on the Board of Nursing. With reassignment of workloads, there is enough staff to handle any minimal increases which might be stimulated by these regulations.

An increase in the reinstatement fees for registered nurse anesthetists should have minimal effect on the licensee. Because of a small number of reinstatements, there would be no significant increase in agency revenues.

(b) With each pack of "Holiday Bonus" tickets ordered, each retailer will receive one entry card which will be a pre-addressed postcard that the retailer will fill out and mail back to the Kansas lottery. Article 1.—LIFE INSURANCE

40-2-20. Life insurance; accelerated benefits; requirements and restrictions. (a) As used in this regulation, these terms shall have the following meanings:

(1) "Accelerated benefits" means benefits, other than those considered long-term care benefits as defined and regulated pursuant to K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 40-2225 et seq., payable under an individual or group life insurance or annuity contract:

(A) To a policyowner or certificate holder, during the lifetime of the insured for the occurrence of a qualifying event; and

(B) which reduce the death benefit otherwise payable under the life insurance contract, excluding accidental death and other ancillary benefits.

(2) "Qualifying event" means one or more of the following:

(A) A medical condition which a health care provider predicts will result in a limited life expectancy of 24 months or less;

(B) a medical condition which has required or requires extraordinary medical intervention including, but not limited to, a major organ transplant or continuous artificial life support, without which the insured would die; or

(C) a medical condition which medical evidence indicates would, in the absence of extraordinary medical intervention, result in a limited life expectancy of 24 months or less. Such conditions may include, but are not limited to, one or more of the following:

(i) Coronary artery disease resulting in an acute infarction or requiring surgery;

(ii) permanent neurological deficit resulting from cerebral vascular accident;

(iii) end stage renal failure;

(iv) any condition which usually requires continuous confinement in an eligible institution as defined in the contract if the insured is expected to remain there for the rest of the insured's life; or

(v) any other qualifying event approved by the commissioner.

(3) "Commissioner" means the commissioner of insurance, state of Kansas.

(b) Each accelerated benefit shall have a title printed on or attached to the first page of the policy or rider. The title shall describe the coverage provided and shall be followed or accompanied by a description of the coverage which contains the phrase "accelerated benefit" or words of similar import.

(c) Each applicant shall be given a summary of the accelerated benefit provisions at or before the time an application is completed. In the case of group policies, each certificate holder shall be given a copy of the summary with their certificate. This summary shall include:

(1) a brief description of the accelerated benefit and definitions of the conditions or occurrences that would result in payment of the benefit;

(2) the existence and amount of any separately identifiable premium for the accelerated benefit and a description of any charge for administrative expense;

(3) a generic illustration numerically demonstrating the effect of the payment of a benefit on cash values, death benefits, premiums, policy loans and policy liens;

(4) a statement that receipt of the accelerated benefit could be taxable;

(5) a statement that receipt of accelerated benefits may affect medicaid eligibility; and

(6) an acknowledgement, signed and dated by the agent and the applicant for the group or individual coverage, that the summary has been furnished. A direct response insurer shall incorporate the summary and acknowledgement vehicle in the application or attach them thereto.

(d) If the accelerated benefit is offered without an additional premium, a separate written explanation of how the benefit is funded shall be filed with the commissioner and included with the summary.

(e) Each time an accelerated benefit is requested the individual policyowner or group certificate holder shall be given a summary. This summary shall include statements:

(1) warning that receipt of the accelerated benefit could be taxable and that assistance from a tax advisor is suggested; and

(2) showing the effect the payment of the benefit will have on cash values, accumulation accounts, death benefits, premiums, policy loans and policy liens.

(f) Each time an accelerated benefit option is exercised the policyowner and certificate holder shall be given an endorsement, rider or schedule page which reflects any revisions to cash values, death benefits, accumulation accounts, premiums, policy loans, policy liens and any other values that change as a result of the payment or payments.

(g) Insurers shall not unfairly discriminate among insureds with different or similar qualifying events. Insurers shall not apply any additional conditions to the payment of the accelerated benefits other than those conditions specified in the policy or rider.

(h) Accelerated benefits shall be funded either by:

(1) requiring the policyowner to pay an additional premium;

(2) utilizing the present value of the face amount of the policy if:

(A) the present value calculation is based on an actuarial discount appropriate to the policy design; and

(B) the interest rate used in the present value calculation is no greater than the maximum loan rate specified on currently issued policies; or

(3) accruing an interest charge on the amount of the accelerated benefits at an interest rate no greater than the loan rate on currently issued policies.

(i) When an accelerated benefit is payable, no greater than a pro-rata reduction in the cash value shall be made, except where the payment of the accelerated benefits and any accrued interest may be treated as a lien against the death benefit of the policy or rider. Therefore, access to the cash value may be restricted to any excess of the cash value over the sum of any other outstanding loans, and the lien and access to additional policy loans may be limited to the difference between the cash value and the sum of the lien and any other outstanding policy loans

on the policy under which the accelerated benefits were paid.

(j)(1) Payment of an accelerated benefit may be applied toward repaying a pro-rata portion of any outstanding policy loan; or

(2) if the payment is considered a lien as provided in (i), the insurance company may require any accelerated death benefit payment to be applied toward repaying the portion of any other outstanding policy loan which causes the sum of the accelerated death benefit and policy loan to exceed the cash value.

(k) The death benefit shall not be reduced more than the amount of the accelerated benefits after adjustment for any actuarial discount or accrued interest as provided in (h) plus any administrative expense charge required by policies providing accelerated benefits without additional premium charge as disclosed on the summary required by (c).

(l) The accidental death benefit, if any, in a policy or rider shall not be affected by the payment of an accelerated benefit.

(m) The valuation method and assumptions used to produce the accelerated benefit provisions shall be filed with the insurance department with the related policy form or rider. The assumptions shall reflect the statutory mortality and interest rate assumptions for the life insurance provisions and appropriate assumptions for the other provisions incorporated in the policy or rider.

(n) The accelerated benefit provision shall become effective on the effective date of the policy or rider and no waiting periods of more than 30 days may be imposed on the insured's rights under the provision if a qualifying event has occurred and the accelerated benefit is otherwise payable. (Authorized by K.S.A. 40-103 and K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 40-401, as amended by L. 1990, Ch. 164, Sec. 1; implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 40-401, as amended by L. 1990, Ch. 164, Sec. 1; effective, T-40-11-29-90, Nov. 29, 1990.)

33-2-2. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1982 Supp. 74-4509b; effective Jan. 1, 1966; amended Jan. 1, 1974; amended E-77-35, July 1, 1976; amended Feb. 15, 1977; amended May 1, 1980; amended, T-88-39, Nov. 23, 1982; amended May 1, 1983; revoked Jan. 28, 1991.)

Article 2.—FEES, REGISTRATIONS AND OTHER CHARGES

115-2-3. Other fees and charges. (a) The following fees and charges shall be in effect for state parks and for other designated areas for which the fees and charges are required:

(b) Each overnight camping permit and youth group camping permit shall be valid only for the state park or other area for which purchased and shall expire at 2:00 p.m. on the date specified in the permit. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-807 and K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-988 as amended by L. 1990, Chapter 139, section 2; effective Jan. 22, 1990; amended Jan. 28, 1991.)

Article 21.—COMMERCIAL GUIDES

115-21-1. Guides; permit application, examination, and restrictions. (a) Each application for a commercial guide permit or an associate guide permit shall be on forms provided by the department and the guide permit fee as prescribed under K.A.R. 115-2-1 shall accompany each application. In addition to information required by L. 1990, Chapter 141, section 1, each applicant shall provide the following:

- (1) proof of completion of the following courses:
 - (A) current certification in red cross or comparable first aid and cardio-pulmonary resuscitation training;
 - (B) department approved boat safety training, if a boat is used as a part of the guiding service; and
 - (C) department approved hunter education training, if hunting is a part of the guiding service; and
- (2) the commercial guide or associate guide permit number if the application is for a permit renewal or permit revision.

(b) To be listed in an annual directory of Kansas guides, an applicant for a commercial guide permit shall sign the approval section on the permit application.

(c) Each applicant for a guide permit shall take a department administered guide examination. The written examination shall cover basic knowledge of:

- (1) hunting or fishing skills or both;
- (2) hunting or fishing safety or both;
- (3) first aid;

(continued)

(4) laws and regulations; and
 (5) boating safety, if a boat is used in the hunting or fishing guide service.

(d) Each guide permit shall be restricted to hunting or fishing guide services, the use of a boat in the guide service, or any combination thereof. This will be determined by the examination sections taken and passed by the applicant.

(e) Each renewal application for a guide permit shall be submitted to the department not later than December 1 of the current permit year.

(f) Each applicant for renewal of a guide permit shall pass an examination at least once every three years as a condition of permit renewal.

(g) All examinations shall be administered at a department office.

(h) A score of 75 percent shall be the minimum passing score for each section of the guide examination taken.

(i) Any applicant failing an examination or any section of an examination may reapply after 30 days.

(j) Any guide permit restricted to authorize only hunting or fishing guide services or each guide permit that does not authorize the use of a boat may be revised at any time. Any permittee desiring a revision of their current permit may submit an application on forms supplied by the department and by passing the proper written examination.

(k) A current red cross or comparable first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation certification shall be required as a prerequisite to the examination requirements of subsection (f) for each permittee. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-807 and L. 1990, Chapter 141, section 1; implementing L. 1990, Chapter 141, section 1; effective Jan. 28, 1991.)

115-21.2. Guides; reporting requirements. (a) Each commercial guide permittee shall submit an annual report on forms supplied by the department. Each report shall contain the following information:

(1) the name, address and permit number of the permittee;

(2) for each day, the name and license number of resident and nonresident individuals guided for hunting or fishing or both;

(3) for each day, a listing of the department land and water areas used while providing guide services for hunting or fishing or both; and

(4) other information as required by the secretary.

(b) Each commercial guide permittee shall submit interim reports to the department that contain elements of subsection (a) when requested by the secretary. Such reports shall cover specific hunting or fishing activities and shall be due within deadlines established by the secretary.

(c) Failure to submit a requested interim report by the established deadline shall result in permit suspension until the interim report has been received by the department.

(d) Each report submitted by a commercial guide permittee shall include all guiding activity of all associate guides employed by the commercial guide permittee.

(e) Each annual report shall be complete through December 31 of the permit year and shall be due to the department not later than January 15 of the following year.

(f) A renewed commercial guide permit or a renewed associate guide permit shall be suspended at 5:00 p.m. on January 15 of the permit renewal year if the annual report for the previous permit year is not received by the department by January 15 of that permit year. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-807 and L. 1990, Chapter 141, section 1; implementing L. 1990, Chapter 141, section 1; effective Jan. 28, 1991.)

Article 30.—BOATING

115-30.9. Water event permit; application and requirements. (a) A water event permit shall be required for any event as described in K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-1149. A special event permit issued under K.A.R. 115-8-21 shall satisfy the requirement for a water event permit on department lands and waters if processed in compliance with provisions of subsections (b) and (d) of K.A.R. 115-30-9.

(b) Any person may apply to the secretary for a water event permit. The application shall be on forms provided by the department and each applicant shall provide the following information:

(1) the name of the applicant;

(2) the address of the applicant;

(3) the location of the event;

(4) the date and time of the event;

(5) a description of the event;

(6) estimated number of boats and individuals participating;

(7) a description of safety measures to be utilized for the protection of the public and water event participants including, but not limited to:

(A) traffic control;

(B) lifeguards;

(C) patrol boats equipped with life saving equipment;

(D) first aid equipment; and

(E) fire extinguishers;

(8) written approval for the event from the controlling authority of the water to be used; and

(9) other information as required by the secretary.

(c) Each water event permit application may include multiple events if the events to be covered under the water event permit are all conducted on the same area or body of water.

(d) Each application for a water event shall be submitted not less than 30 days prior to the proposed event.

(e) A water event permit shall be valid for the period of time as specified in the permit, but shall not extend beyond December 31 of the year in which the water event permit was issued.

(f) A water event involving 25 or fewer participants shall not require payment of the water event permit fee.

(g) Each water event shall be conducted in conformance with conditions established by the department in the water event permit. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 32-1149; effective Jan. 28, 1991.)

Article 1.—CERTIFICATE REGULATIONS

91-1-34. Special education supervisor/coordinator.

(a) Each applicant for a special education supervisor/coordinator endorsement shall have completed a state-approved graduate degree program, the requirements for a special education subject area endorsement and two years of experience in one or more special education subject areas.

(b) A state-approved special education supervisor/coordinator program shall consist of a course of study requiring each student to demonstrate knowledge of:

(1) procedures to develop and select curricula, instructional methods and media by:

(A) explaining the relationship between instructional objectives and curriculum developed or selected to attain them;

(B) identifying the sources of influence upon curriculum development and selection;

(C) developing a curriculum unit meeting the instructional objectives;

(D) describing a variety of instructional methods that can be used with exceptional pupils;

(E) applying an instructional method to an instructional objective;

(F) using media as a part of the instructional process;

(G) planning a series of objectives to complete a program of curriculum study and development; and

(H) describing the procedures required to establish and maintain an instructional resource center;

(2) staff support system development and operation by:

(A) explaining procedures to improve communication between and among staff members;

(B) eliciting information from others about issues related to the improvement of instructional programs and using the information to plan new approaches to instruction;

(C) describing a procedure to assist staff members with program planning and problem-solving skills;

(D) developing and implementing a plan for assessing program needs;

(E) conducting a staff developing workshop that is related to program needs; and

(F) describing procedures to assist staff members in applying the knowledge and skills acquired through staff development activities;

(3) human relations and consultation skills by:

(A) explaining the function of consultation in a supervisor/coordinator's role;

(B) describing components of the consultation process;

(C) developing a consultation plan to assist staff members, individually and in groups; and

(D) displaying individual and group conferencing techniques;

(4) instructional program evaluation by:

(A) developing a plan to instruct staff in the use of a peer supervision system;

(B) describing the procedures used to implement a clinical supervision program;

(C) explaining how a supervisor/coordinator can collaborate with staff members to develop performance evaluation procedures consistent with role descriptions;

(D) planning a procedure for formative and summary evaluations of instructional programs; and

(E) describing approaches for interpreting and communicating instructional program evaluation information; and

(5) program management activities by:

(A) describing procedures for the selection, orientation and assignment of staff members;

(B) describing the supervisor/coordinator's role in planning and implementing comprehensive instructional services;

(C) developing a system to coordinate assignment of teacher education students to directed teaching, practicum, and other related experiences;

(D) planning a way to use research results to improve instructional programs;

(E) developing a plan for the acquisition and distribution of instructional media;

(F) designing a budget to provide instructional services for pupils in one of the special educational subject areas; and

(G) explaining how to use evaluation data to improve instruction. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective (temporary) January 8, 1982; (permanent) May 1, 1982; amended May 1, 1986; amended Jan. 28, 1991.)

91-1-62. This regulation shall be revoked July 1, 1991. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas constitution; effective (temporary) January 8, 1982; (permanent) May 1, 1982; amended May 1, 1986; revoked Jan. 28, 1991.)

91-1-153. Renewal of a vocational certificate or endorsement with inservice education points. (a) An applicant holding a three or five-year vocational certificate or endorsement and employed by a local education agency having a state-approved inservice education plan may renew a vocational certificate or endorsement with inservice education points.

(b) Renewal of a three or five-year vocational certificate or endorsement based upon inservice education points shall require:

(1) For any applicant without an advanced degree, experiences worth at least 160 inservice education points during the prior five-year period, which shall include 80 points attributable to college or university credit; and

(2) for any individual with an advanced degree, experiences worth 120 inservice education points during the prior five-year period.

(c) An application for renewal based on inservice education shall be accompanied by verification by the governing body of a local education agency that the inservice credit is valid for renewal.

(d) This method of renewal shall be in addition to other avenues of renewal specified in state board regulations. (Authorized by and implementing Article 6, Section 2(a) of the Kansas Constitution; effective Jan. 28, 1991.)

Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Friday, January 18, in the hearing room at commission offices, 3400 Van Buren, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed permanent regulations of the Kansas Racing Commission. This 30-day notice constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on these proposed regulations.

A copy of the full text of the regulations and the economic impact statement may be reviewed or obtained at the commission office. The following is a summary of the proposed amendments.

K.A.R. 112-4-14b. Trainer responsibility. The proposed regulation states greyhound conditions for which

the trainer will be held responsible unless the trainer can show otherwise by a preponderance of evidence.

Economic impact: None known.

K.A.R. 112-4-21. Kennel name registration. The proposed regulation states restrictions and disclosures applicable to the registration of kennel names.

Economic impact: Minimal administrative cost to the commission but none for the licensees.

K.A.R. 112-6-1. Racetrack officials. The proposed amendment to this existing permanent regulation clarifies that each racing secretary, director of racing and mutuel manager shall be employees of and accountable to the organization licensee as required by the Kansas Constitution.

Economic impact: None.

K.A.R. 112-6-2. Commission officials, racing judges. The proposed amendments to this existing permanent regulation state when one racing judge may leave the judges' stand to supervise a racing-related matter and provides for the emergency appointment of a racing judge in the case of vacancy. The proposed amendments also bring the hearing provisions in compliance with the Kansas administrative procedure act.

Economic impact: None known.

K.A.R. 112-6-3. Director of racing. The proposed amendment to this existing permanent regulation resolves a conflict between the section amended and K.A.R. 112-6-2(c), which provides the organization licensee fills vacancies among racetrack officials subject to the approval of the racing judges.

Economic impact: None.

K.A.R. 112-6-4. The paddock judge and the kennel master. The proposed amendment to this existing permanent regulation specifically identifies which individuals may enter the lock-out kennels. No individual may enter the lock-out kennel unaccompanied.

Economic impact: None.

K.A.R. 112-6-5. Clerk of scales. The proposed amendment to this existing permanent regulation eliminates the requirement that the scales be checked for accuracy by a certified person every 30 days. Instead, the organization licensee must provide a certified weight for the use of any interested person.

Economic impact: Some savings in inspection costs for organization licensee.

K.A.R. 112-6-8. The racing secretary. The proposed amendment to this existing permanent regulation states a "reasonableness" standard applies to the racing secretary's duty to inspect licensee documentation for compliance with racing laws. The racing secretary is not an insurer of document authenticity.

Economic impact: None.

K.A.R. 112-7-6. Registration and eligibility. The proposed amendments to this existing permanent regulation state a requirement for a negative Coggins test before a horse may be entered or started in a race and eliminate a prohibition on clocker wagering, which was moved to the appropriate racing regulation.

Economic impact: The cost of a Coggins test is estimated at about \$10-12 for Kansas horse owners.

K.A.R. 112-8-3. Entries. The proposed amendments to this existing permanent regulation are primarily clean-up measures to improve syntax. One proposed amendment

states the blind draw for post position may be conducted in the presence of the chief racing judge's designee if the chief racing judge is not present.

Economic impact: None.

K.A.R. 112-8-4. Withdrawals and scratches. The proposed amendment to this existing permanent regulation states restrictions on withdrawals after post positions are drawn. Some scratches formerly required before the printing of the official program may be avoided under the proposed amendment.

Economic impact: None.

K.A.R. 112-8-5. Schooling. The proposed amendments to this existing permanent regulation are primarily clean-up to improve syntax. One amendment states schooling requirements for greyhounds that check while racing.

Economic impact: None.

K.A.R. 112-8-8. Weights, weighing and weigh-in. One proposed amendment to this existing permanent regulation states the requirements for a second weigh-in. Another proposed amendment states which individuals may enter the lock-out kennel, consistent with K.A.R. 112-6-4.

Economic impact: The second weigh-in amendment would work a significant savings in construction costs for the racetrack because the licensee may re-use the existing lock-out kennels and existing crates if more than a 13 race performance is approved by the commission. Construction costs for the original lock-out kennels in Kansas were approximately \$100,000, and greyhound crates approximately \$80 apiece.

K.A.R. 112-8-10. Rules of the race. The proposed amendments to this existing permanent regulation are primarily clean-up to improve syntax. One proposed amendment states a race shall be declared a "no race" if a greyhound competes while wearing the wrong blanket.

Economic impact: A declaration of "no race" requires a refunding of wagers to track patrons. "No races" are to be avoided; however, the integrity of racing depends on proper identification of the racing animals, and a blanket violation is considered serious.

K.A.R. 112-10-34. Drugs or medication, greyhound. The proposed amendments to this existing permanent regulation state a classification of positive tests and appropriate penalties therefor. The existing regulation is restructured to improve organization.

Economic impact: None.

K.A.R. 112-10-35. Testing. The proposed amendments to this existing permanent regulation are primarily clean-up to improve syntax. One amendment removes the requirement mandating the presence of a trainer, owner or authorized representatives when samples are taken.

Economic impact: None.

K.A.R. 112-12-12. Registration of horses dropped before January 1, 1990. The proposed amendment to this existing permanent regulation states the conditions whereby a lessee may register a Kansas-bred horse.

Economic impact: The commission's official registering agency believes the registration of leased, and otherwise qualifying Kansas-breds, will enhance participation in the program with resulting benefits to economic development.

K.A.R. 112-13-2. Kansas-whelped program, certification. The proposed amendment to this existing permanent regulation states when the executive committee of the

registering agency may extend time for filing of the whelping report.

Economic impact: None.

K.A.R. 112-13-4. Greyhound breakage distribution for open stakes. This proposed regulation states the requirements for the organization licensee's breakage open stakes account, the monthly report and payouts.

Economic impact: None.

K.A.R. 112-13-5. Greyhound breakage distribution for purses. This proposed regulation states the requirements for the organization licensee's breakage purse supplement account, the monthly report and payouts.

Economic impact: None.

There will be an economic impact on pharmacists, the Board of Pharmacy, and the state of Kansas. For pharmacists, the fee to maintain a Kansas license will increase \$20. For the Board of Pharmacy, the increase will result in \$44,800 additional revenues in the pharmacy fee fund. For the state of Kansas, the increase will result in \$11,200 additional revenues in the general revenue fund. There is no other anticipated economic impact.

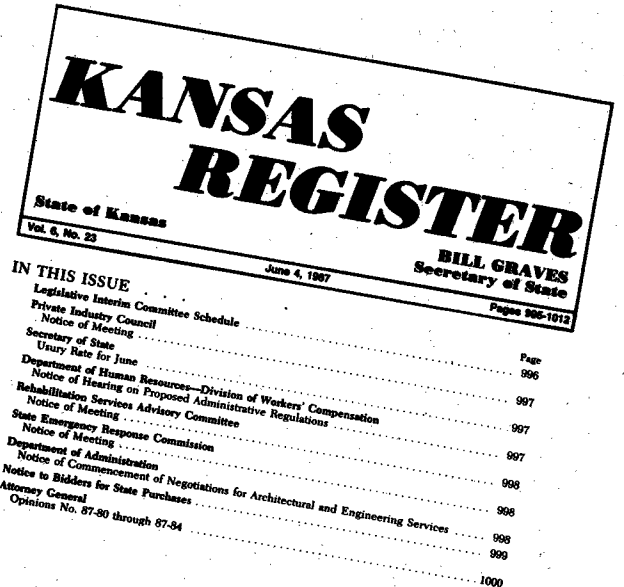
