Notice of Hearing on Proposed
Administrative Regulations

The State Board of Accountancy has scheduled a public hearing concerning proposed amendments to four administrative regulations at 2 p.m. Wednesday, April 24, in Conference Room 108, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka. The amendments being proposed are as follows:

K.A.R. 74-2-7: Setting out what the educational requirements will be to sit for the CPA examination and become certified in Kansas effective July 1, 1997, when the 150-hour requirement enacted by K.S.A. 1-302a takes effect. The reason for this amendment now is to allow the state's colleges and universities to plan their future curriculums. The main fiscal impact will be on candidates seeking to become CPAs in Kansas as they will be required to take an additional year of college beyond their baccalaureate degree to qualify. There may be some fiscal impact on smaller proprietary colleges in Kansas if they wish to add faculty or classes so their graduates may qualify, rather than having them transfer to state universities to obtain the final year of course work. The board could experience a fiscal impact in fiscal 1998 if the first year the law is effective the number of initial exam candidates is down. However, should that happen, both revenue and expenditures would be offset by corresponding amounts.

K.A.R. 74-4-6: Setting out what the additional education requirements under the master's degree pro-

grams will be to obtain a permit (license) to practice as a CPA in Kansas with reduced public accounting experience after the 150-hour law goes into effect July 1, 1997. Enactment of the amendment is not expected to cause any major fiscal impact on candidates, colleges or the board as it is similar to what is already required.

K.A.R. 74-5-2: Adding "financial planning" to the definition of what is the "practice of public accounting" under the code of ethics for CPAs. This is something the board has been including for several years by policy. No fiscal impact is expected on anyone by enactment of this amendment.

K.A.R. 74-5-403: Amending the advertising regulation to state that the board would not consider it misleading for a CPA to use a specialty designation which is approved by the American Institute of CPA's Specialization Accreditation Board. No fiscal or economic impact is expected on anyone as a result of this amendment.

Public Notice

A total of \$6.6 million is now available through the Kansas Criminal Justice Anti-Drug Grant Program to assist Kansas criminal justice agencies in the war against illicit drugs. The \$6.6 million figure includes 75 percent funds from the U.S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance, and 25 percent required local matching funds.

Cities, counties, and state agencies are eligible to apply for these funds for both supply and demand reduction projects, including multi-jurisdictional task forces, school-based demand reduction education by law enforcement officers, and other innovative, expanded, or specialized enforcement, investigative, prosecutorial, defender, judicial, and treatment programs.

Grants operate on a reimbursement basis; the 25 percent local matching funds (cash match) must be available at the onset of the project.

Applications must be submitted by 5 p.m. May 1 to the address listed below. Grant awards will be announced around June 1. The project period will be from July 1, 1991, through June 30, 1992.

Waters and Watercourses—Groundwater Management Districts—Annual Meetings of Eligible Voters; Organization Meeting to Elect Initial Board of Directors. Jeffery A. Mason, Counsel for Northwest Kansas Groundwater Management District No. 4, Goodland, March 6, 1991.

The groundwater management districts act, K.S.A. 82a-1020 *et seq.*, has no set procedure for postponing a meeting and/or hearing for which publication notice is statutorily required. Methods that effectuate the public policy of user decision-making are appropriate. Cited herein: K.S.A. 82a-1020 *et seq.*; K.S.A. 82a-1026; 82-1029; 82a-1030. GE

The Kansas State Board of Nursing may issue policy statements to promote improved nursing standards. Such statements are not rules, and do not have the force and effect of law, unless promulgated pursuant to the rules and regulations filing act. State Boards, Commissions and Authorities—Crime Victims Compensation Board—Claims for Compensation; Conditions; Limitations. Betty A. Bomar, Director, Crime Victims Compensation Board, Topeka, March 6, 1991.

The Crime Victims Compensation Board may award compensation to claimants for economic loss resulting from incidents of criminally injurious conduct occurring within one year prior to the filing of a claim with the board. In order to award compensation, the board must find that the criminally injurious conduct was reported to a law enforcement officer within 72 hours after its occurrence or that good cause existed for failure to report the criminally injurious conduct within that time. State Departments; Public Officers and Employees—Public Officers and Employees; Miscellaneous Provisions—Appointment of Acting State Officers to Certain Positions; Qualifications; Senate Confirmation. Senator Audrey Langworthy, 7th District, Mission, March 6, 1991.

An acting officer is a temporary placeholder who occupies a position only until a permanent appoint-

ment is made; certain acting officers are statutorily limited to a term not to exceed 12 months. Absent legislation to the contrary, an acting appointee need not meet the same statutory requirements to qualify for a position as are required for a permanent appointee. Generally, an acting appointee should not be confirmed by the senate as such confirmation is the final step in completing a permanent appointment. Cited herein: K.S.A. 75-4315a; 75-4315b; 75-5203. Real estate mortgages and deeds must be acknowledged in accordance with the provisions of K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 58-2211, and K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 53-601 does not authorize use of an unsworn written declaration in lieu of such an acknowledgment. On the other hand, an unsworn written declaration may be used instead of a sworn verification on a mechanic's lien statement filed under K.S.A. 60-1102. Legislature—State Governmental Ethics—Contingent Fees for Lobbying Prohibited; Privatization Pledge. Senator Eric R. Yost, 30th District, Wichita, March 8, 1991.

Funds conferred upon a candidate for the office of state legislator only after the candidate pledges to "get [] rid of the Bureaucratic Welfare State [sic]" or return the funds constitutes a contingent fee for lobbying. K.S.A. 46-267 prohibits payment or acceptance of contingent fees for lobbying. If the candidate should prove successful in seeking the office of state legislator, acceptance of funds subject to the pledge may result in a violation of K.S.A. 46-232, as no state officer is permitted to lobby his own state agency, including the legislature, if he accepts compensation specifically attributable to such lobbying. Notice of Arts in Education Funding Panel Meeting

The Education Panel of the Kansas Arts Commission will meet Monday, March 25, to review applications to the Arts In Education (AIE) Program for grant support of residencies and Arts in Basic Education grants in fiscal year 1992 (July 1, 1991-June 30, 1992).

The panel will convene at 10:30 a.m. in the Salina Arts Center, 242 S. Santa Fe, in downtown Salina. Meetings of the Kansas Arts Commission and of its funding panels are open to public observation.

The recommendations of the panel will be presented to the commission for action during the quarterly business meeting later this spring.

Kansas schools and community organizations interested in sponsoring AIE residencies beginning in FY 92 or in obtaining grants for programs that advance the arts as part of basic education had until March 1, 1991, to apply for funding support. Artists interested in participating in residencies during 1991-92 had until February 1, 1991, to apply.

Residencies may last for two weeks, one month, one semester, one year (nine months), or up to three years. Opportunities are available in the visual arts, folk arts, music, theatre, dance, creative writing, film/video, and architecture/design.

Qualified artists are chosen by commission advisory panels and remain eligible for three years. Selections are based upon the quality of each applicant's work, educational background, experience in classroom situations, and professional background.

The AIE Program is administered by the Kansas Arts Commission, with cooperation from the Kansas State Department of Education. Its goals for Kansas students, from pre-school through 12th grade, are to provide substantial arts education experiences and to make the arts a basic part of the curriculum.

Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 3.—FIRE AND CASUALTY INSURANCE

40-3-46. Fire and casualty insurance; rating organizations; prospective loss costs; requirements; definitions. (a) For purposes of this regulation, the following definitions shall apply:

(1) "Expenses" means that portion of a rate attributable to acquisition, field supervision, collection expenses, general expenses, taxes, licenses, and fees.

(2) "Rate" means the cost of insurance per exposure unit, whether expressed as a single number or as a prospective loss cost with an adjustment to account for the treatment of expenses, profit and variations in loss experience, prior to any application of individual risk variations based on loss or expense considerations. The term "rate" does not include minimum premiums.

(3) "Developed losses" means losses, including loss adjustment expenses, that are modified using standard actuarial techniques to eliminate the effect of differences between current payment or reserve estimates and the amount needed to provide actual ultimate loss and loss adjustment expense payments.

(4) "Loss trending" means any procedure for projecting developed losses to the average date of loss for the period during which the policies are to be effective.

(5) "Rating organization" means an organization licensed to transact business in Kansas pursuant to K.S.A. 40-930 or 40-1114, or both.

(6) "Prospective loss costs" shall have the meaning ascribed to it by L. 1990, ch. 154, sections 1(b) and 2(b).

(7) "Prospective loss cost reference filing" means

prospective loss costs filed by a rating organization which an insurance company utilizes to satisfy its obligation to comply with K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 40-928 or 40-1113.

(8) "Commissioner" means the commissioner of insurance, state of Kansas.

(b) On and after July 1, 1991, an insurer may satisfy its obligation to make the filings required by K.S.A. 40-926 et seq. or K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 40-1111 et seq. for the kinds of insurance to which K.A.R. 40-3-47 applies by referencing the prospective loss costs filed by a licensed rating organization and by completing and filing the information required by the March 20, 1990 edition of the national association of insurance commissioners prospective loss costs filing procedures and completing the reference filing forms titled "insurer rate filing adoption of rating organization prospective loss costs reference filing adoption form" and "insurer rate filing adoption of rating organization prospective loss costs summary of supporting information form." (Authorized by K.S.A. 40-103 and L. 1990, Ch. 154, Secs. 1 and 2; implementing L. 1990, Ch. 154, Secs. 1 and 2; effective May 6, 1991.)

40-3-47. Fire and casualty insurance; rating organizations; filing of final rates prohibited; kinds of insurance affected. (a) On and after the respective dates specified herein, rating organizations shall develop and file only prospective loss costs for the kinds of insurance, coverages or situations identified or described in subsections (1) through (3) of this section.

(1) July 1, 1991, multiple line, indivisible premium residential policies and endorsement forms comprising what is commonly identified as the homeowners policy program.

(2) June 1, 1991, automobile insurance on privately owned or leased private passenger automobiles and other motor vehicles provided under what is commonly known as a personal automobile policy.

(3) June 1, 1991, multiple line, indivisible premium commercial policies comprising what is commonly identified as the businessowners program.

(b) With respect to the filing of prospective loss costs and supplementary rating information by rating organizations and insurers respectively, the procedures referenced in K.A.R. 40-3-46(b) shall apply. 1-9-7a. Military leave; voluntary or involuntary service in the Armed Forces. (a) Subject to the additional requirements and limitations of Title 38, U.S. Code, Chapter 43, each permanent, probationary, or conditional employee in the classified service, excluding any employee on a temporary or emergency appointment, who enlists or is drafted into the armed forces of the United States shall be granted military leave without pay when the request includes an appropriate military order to cover the length of the employee's active service.

Any person on military leave, as mentioned above, who applies to the appointing authority for permission to return to the classified service within 90 days after receiving a discharge from the military service under honorable conditions, or from hospitalization, shall:

(1) if the person is qualified to perform the duties of the former position, be restored to that position or to a similar position with like status and salary in the same geographic location, as determined pursuant to K.A.R. 1-5-11;

(2) if the person is not qualified to perform the duties of the former position by reason of disability sustained during such service, but is qualified to perform the duties of any other position, be offered employment in the same geographic location in a position comparable in status and salary to the former position; or

(3) if the agency's circumstances have so changed as to make it unreasonable to offer the person a position under either paragraph (1) or (2) above, appeal to the secretary of administration for appropriate placement.

(b) Military leave shall be counted as part of the employee's length of service as prescribed in K.A.R. 1-2-46. Sick leave and vacation leave shall not be earned or accrued during a period of military leave without pay.

(c) Reenlistment or continuation of active duty beyond the time prescribed by Title 38, U.S. Code, Chapter 43, shall be considered a voluntary resignation from military leave status. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 75-3747; effective May 1, 1985; amended, T-1-3-14-91, March 14, 1991.)

60-11-103. Qualifications of advanced registered nurse practitioners. (a) To be certified as an advanced registered nurse practitioner in the category of nurse clinician or nurse practitioner, nurse anesthetist, or nurse midwife, each applicant shall:

(1) have graduated from a formal, post-basic nursing education program located or offered in Kansas that has been approved by the board and that prepares the nurse to function in the expanded role for which application is made;

(2) have graduated from a formal, post-basic nursing education program which is not located or offered in Kansas but which is determined by the board to meet the standards for program approval established by K.A.R. 60-11-108;

(3) have graduated from a formal, post-basic nursing education program which is no longer in existence but which is determined by the board to meet standards at least as stringent as required for program approval by the board as of the time of graduation; or

(4) hold a current certificate of authority to practice as an advanced registered nurse practitioner in the category for which application is made, issued by another board of nursing which requires completion of a program meeting standards equal to or greater than those established by K.A.R. 60-11-108.

(b) To be certified as an advanced registered nurse practitioner in the category of clinical nurse specialist, each applicant shall hold a master's degree in a nursing clinical area which prepares the nurse to function in the expanded role, and:

(1) Meet the requirement of paragraph (a) (1), (a) (2), (a) (3), or (a) (4); or

(2) have completed, prior to June 1, 1990, a formal educational program of post-basic study and clinical experience which can be demonstrated by the applicant to have sufficiently prepared the applicant for practice in the category of advanced practice for which application is made. The applicant must show that the program is consistent with the public health and safety and that it prepared individuals to perform acts generally recognized by the nursing profession as capable of being performed by persons with post-basic education in nursing. Article 2.—LIFE INSURANCE

40-2-20. Life insurance; accelerated benefits; requirements and restrictions. (a) As used in this regulation, these terms shall have the following meanings:

(1) "Accelerated benefits" means benefits, other than those considered long-term care benefits as defined and regulated pursuant to K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 40-2225 et seq., payable under an individual or group life insurance or annuity contract:

(A) To a policyowner or certificate holder, during the lifetime of the insured for the occurrence of a qualifying event; and

(B) which reduce the death benefit otherwise payable under the life insurance contract, excluding accidental death and other ancillary benefits.

(2) "Qualifying event" means one or more of the following:

(A) A medical condition which a health care provider predicts will result in a limited life expectancy of 24 months or less;

(B) a medical condition which has required or requires extraordinary medical intervention including, but not limited to, a major organ transplant or continuous artificial life support, without which the insured would die; or

(C) a medical condition which medical evidence indicates would, in the absence of extraordinary medical intervention, result in a limited life expectancy of 24 months or less. Such conditions may include, but are not limited to, one or more of the following:

(i) Coronary artery disease resulting in an acute infarction or requiring surgery;

(ii) permanent neurological deficit resulting from cerebral vascular accident;

(iii) end stage renal failure;

(iv) any condition which usually requires continuous confinement in an eligible institution as defined in the contract if the insured is expected to remain there for the rest of the insured's life; or

(v) any other qualifying event approved by the commissioner.

(3) "Commissioner" means the commissioner of insurance, state of Kansas.

(b) Each accelerated benefit shall have a title printed on or attached to the first page of the policy or rider. The title shall describe the coverage provided and shall be followed or accompanied by a description of the coverage which contains the phrase "accelerated benefit" or words of similar import.

(c) Each applicant shall be given a summary of the accelerated benefit provisions at or before the time an application is completed. In the case of group policies, each certificate holder shall be given a copy of the summary with their certificate. This summary shall include:

(1) a brief description of the accelerated benefit and

definitions of the conditions or occurrences that would result in payment of the benefit;

(2) the existence and amount of any separately identifiable premium for the accelerated benefit and a description of any charge for administrative expense;

(3) a generic illustration numerically demonstrating the effect of the payment of a benefit on cash values, death benefits, premiums, policy loans and policy liens;

(4) a statement that receipt of the accelerated benefit could be taxable;

(5) a statement that receipt of accelerated benefits may affect medicaid eligibility; and

(6) an acknowledgement, signed and dated by the agent and the applicant for the group or individual coverage, that the summary has been furnished. A direct response insurer shall incorporate the summary and acknowledgement vehicle in the application or attach them thereto.

(d) If the accelerated benefit is offered without an additional premium, a separate written explanation of how the benefit is funded shall be filed with the commissioner and included with the summary.

(g) Each time an accelerated benefit is requested the individual policyowner or group certificate holder shall be given a summary. This summary shall include statements:

(1) warning that receipt of the accelerated benefit could be taxable and that assistance from a tax advisor is suggested; and

(2) showing the effect the payment of the benefit will have on cash values, accumulation accounts, death benefits, premiums, policy loans and policy liens;

(f) Each time an accelerated benefit option is exercised the policyowner and certificate holder shall be given an endorsement, rider or schedule page which reflects any revisions to cash values, death benefits, accumulation accounts, premiums, policy loans, policy liens and any other values that change as a result of the payment or payments.

(g) Insurers shall not unfairly discriminate among insureds with different or similar qualifying events. Insurers shall not apply any additional conditions to the payment of the accelerated benefits other than those conditions specified in the policy or rider.

(h) Accelerated benefits shall be funded either by:

(1) requiring the policyowner to pay an additional premium;

(2) utilizing the present value of the face amount of the policy if:

(A) the present value calculation is based on an actuarial discount appropriate to the policy design; and

(B) the interest rate used in the present value calculation is no greater than the maximum loan rate specified on currently issued policies; or

(3) accruing an interest charge on the amount of the accelerated benefits at an interest rate no greater than the loan rate on currently issued policies.

(i) When an accelerated benefit is payable, no greater than a pro-rata reduction in the cash value shall be made, except where the payment of the accelerated benefits and any accrued interest may be treated as a

(continued)

lien against the death benefit of the policy or rider. Therefore, access to the cash value may be restricted to any excess of the cash value over the sum of any other outstanding loans, and the lien and access to additional policy loans may be limited to the difference between the cash value and the sum of the lien and any other outstanding policy loans on the policy under which the accelerated benefits were paid.

(j)(1) Payment of an accelerated benefit may be applied toward repaying a pro rata portion of any outstanding policy loan; or

(2) if the payment is considered a lien as provided in (i), the insurance company may require any accelerated death benefit payment to be applied toward repaying the portion of any other outstanding policy loan which causes the sum of the accelerated death benefit and policy loan to exceed the cash value.

(k) The death benefit shall not be reduced more than the amount of the accelerated benefits after adjustment for any actuarial discount or accrued interest as provided in (h) plus any administrative expense charge required by policies providing accelerated benefits without additional premium charge as disclosed on the summary required by (c).

(l) The accidental death benefit, if any, in a policy or rider shall not be affected by the payment of an accelerated benefit.

(m) The valuation method and assumptions used to produce the accelerated benefit provisions shall be filed with the insurance department with the related policy form or rider. The assumptions shall reflect the statutory mortality and interest rate assumptions for the life insurance provisions and appropriate assumptions for the other provisions incorporated in the policy or rider.

(n) The accelerated benefit provision shall become effective on the effective date of the policy or rider and no waiting periods of more than 30 days may be imposed on the insured's rights under the provision if a qualifying event has occurred and the accelerated benefit is otherwise payable.

(o) This temporary regulation shall expire as of the effective date of the permanent regulation of the same number or the expiration of 120 days whichever is earlier. Payment of Principal and Interest

The Kansas State Treasurer shall serve as the bond registrar and paying agent for the bonds, and the principal of the bonds shall be payable upon surrender at the paying agent's principal offices in the city of Topeka, Kansas. Interest shall be paid by the mailing of a check or draft of the paying agent to the registered owners of the bonds.

Security for the Bonds

The bonds and the interest thereon shall constitute general obligations of the city, and the full faith, credit and resources of the city shall be pledged to the payment thereof. The city shall be obligated to levy ad valorem taxes without limitation as to rate or amount upon all of the taxable tangible property within the territorial limits of the city for the purpose of paying the bonds and the interest thereon.

Delivery of the Bonds

The bonds, duly printed, executed and registered, shall be furnished and delivered at the expense of the city to the successful bidder, or at its direction, on or about Thursday, April 18, 1991, at such bank or trust company or other qualified depository in the state of Kansas or Kansas City, Missouri, as may be specified by the successful bidder. HOUSE BILL No. 2026

AN ACT concerning rural water districts; relating to the dissolution thereof; amending K.S.A. 82a-629 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 82a-629 is hereby amended to read as follows: 82a-629. Whenever a petition signed by $\frac{3}{4}$ of the subscribers and benefit unit owners in any district organized under the provisions of this act, and acts amendatory and supplemental K.S.A. 82a-612 et seq., and amendments thereto, is presented to the board of county commissioners stating that all of the district's debts and obligations have been fully paid; that the board of directors has not held a meeting for more than six months prior to the date of signing the petition; and that the district is not functioning, and will probably shall continue to be inoperative, the board of county commissioners shall make findings thereon. If the board of county commissioners finds the allegations in the petition to be true, the board shall provide for the disposition, including the method therefor, of any property owned by the district and for the apportionment of the proceeds thereof together with any other moneys belonging to the district among the subscribers and benefit unit owners of the district and to an adjoining rural water district or to any other political subdivision of the state. No money, property or the proceeds thereof shall be distributed to any private interests. The board of county commissioners shall thereupon issue a certificate stating that the allegations in the petition are true and declaring the district dissolved. The board of county commissioners shall make full minutes of the hearing in its journal and deliver such certificate to the secretary of the district. The secretary of the district shall, within 30 days thereafter, shall deliver all records, maps, plans and files to the county clerk, and thereupon the district shall be dissolved.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 82a-629 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

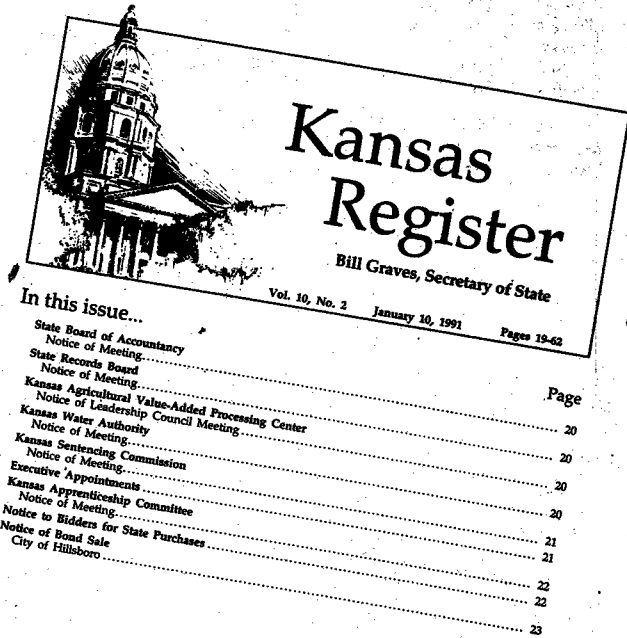
