for Technical Services

Notice is hereby given of the commencement of negotiations for air and water balancing services of mechanical systems and infrared scans for state construction projects for the six-month period from July 1, 1991, to December 31, 1991.

Interested individuals or firms in the balancing field must be certified by the National Environmental Balancing Bureau or the Associated Air Balance Council. Said individuals or firms must be engaged in balancing work on a full-time basis. Balance agencies which are of the same parent company as the designers or contractors of a particular project will not be considered for that project.

Interested individuals or firms in the infrared scan field must be an independent testing company using trained personnel who work full time on infrared testing projects. Personnel shall be familiar with the operation of the infrared camera and capable of analyzing the results. Townships and Township Officers—Hospitals and Health Care Facilities; Hospitals—Lease of Hospital Property; Oil/Gas Lease; Operating Expenses of Oil/Gas Well. H. Douglas Pfalzgraf, General Counsel, Attica District Hospital, Wellington, June 20, 1991.

Under the facts presented, the board of a hospital district organized under K.S.A. 80-2501 *et seq.*, which has become a working interest owner pursuant to the terms of an oil and gas lease, has the authority to expend hospital monies, not otherwise committed, for payment of oil and gas well expenses. As used in K.S.A. 12-3013, the word "electors" means persons who were qualified electors at the time they signed the petition requesting the referendum and does not mean that they had to be qualified electors at the time of the preceding regular city election. Additionally, pursuant to K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 25-3601, the sufficiency of each signature and the number thereof on a petition filed pursuant to K.S.A. 12-3013 shall be determined by the county election officer. The definition of the term "sewage" contained in K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 65-164(b) is narrower than the definition of "pollutant" as set forth in 33 U.S.C.A. § 1362(b) (West 1986). The requirements for citizen intervention in certain environmental enforcement proceedings contained in K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 65-170e do not comply with the minimum federal standards for intervention promulgated by the Environmental Protection Agency at 40 C.F.R. § 123.27(e). Pursuant to federal regulation, a unified school district is required to identify friable and nonfriable asbestos containing material (ACM) in buildings the school district leases, owns, or otherwise uses as school buildings. The school district has the option of removing, encapsulating or enclosing ACM, such election being partially dependent on the condition of the ACM. If ACM has been placed within a school building as building material, the school district is not liable under CERCLA for costs incurred by a future party-in-interest in removing the ACM from the building. 5-24-2. Allowable Withdrawals. (a) Except as set forth in subsection (b) below, all applications for a permit to appropriate water for beneficial use and all applications for a change in the point of diversion filed on permits with a priority date on or after February 16, 1990, shall be subject to the following criteria:

(1) The sum of the proposed appropriation, the vested rights, prior appropriation rights and earlier priority applications legally described within the area of consideration shall not exceed the calculated quantity of annual recharge received by the aquifer underlying the area of consideration. The quantity authorized on all prior permits, certificates, and vested rights and the quantity requested on prior applications shall be used to calculate the sum of prior appropriations.

(2) All limitation clauses listed on permits and certificates shall be considered to be in force.

(3) In the case of an application for change in the point of diversion, referred to above, all applications with a priority earlier than the priority established by the filing of the application for change shall be included in the analysis.

(4) The allowable annual appropriation shall be calculated using the formula $Q = AR/12$ where:

(A) Q is the allowable annual appropriation in acre-feet per year.

(B) A is the area of consideration consisting of the area which includes each 10-acre tract located entirely within or intersected by a two-mile radius circle whose center is the center of the smallest discernable tract wherein the proposed well is to be located. The smallest discernable tract shall be the tract described in the application for permit to appropriate water and shall not be larger than a nominally described section of land nor smaller than a 10-acre tract of land.

(C) R is the average annual recharge in inches per year.

RegulationsArticle 3.—PRODUCTION AND CONSERVATION
OF OIL AND GAS

82-3-307. Gas conservation assessment. An assessment to pay the conservation division expenses, and other costs in connection with the administration of the gas conservation regulations not otherwise provided for, shall be made as follows:

(a) A charge of 4.3 mills shall be assessed on each 1,000 cubic feet of gas sold or marketed each month. The assessment shall apply only to the first purchaser of gas.

(b) The first purchaser of the production, shall, before paying for the production, deduct an amount equal to the assessment for every 1,000 cubic feet of gas produced and removed from the lease each month. The purchaser shall remit the amounts deducted to the conservation division of the commission at the same time, and for the same period, as the purchaser makes regular gas payments.

(c) The remittances may be made each month in a single check, if the purchaser desires. No accounting by the purchaser shall be required except to show all deductions on the regular payment statements to producers and royalty owners or other interested parties.

(d) The assessment established by the commission shall not apply to gas that is being returned to the ground for repressuring purposes within the field, but shall apply to gas that is produced and removed from the lease and returned to the ground for storage purposes. (5) The value of .5 inch per year shall be used for the purpose of considering recharge, including natural recharge and return flow from irrigation, unless site-specific information is available.

(6) If a portion of the area of consideration is outside the district boundary, the district will request all available information on water rights from the division of water resources, and the evaluation shall be conducted as though the entire area of consideration was within the district boundary. In the event a portion of the area of consideration is outside the state of Kansas, that portion of the area of consideration shall be excluded from the analysis.

(7) If the perimeter of the area under consideration intersects a group of wells authorized under prior applications, permits, certificates or vested rights, a reasonable quantity of water shall be assigned to each well based upon the best available information.

(b) The following applications are not subject to this allowable withdrawal regulation:

(1) Applications for a permit to appropriate water for domestic use;

(2) applications for a permit to appropriate water by means of covering wells withdrawing water from non-Ogallala aquifers;

(3) applications for temporary permits;

(4) applications for change in point of diversion if the well has been drilled, cased and test pumped, or if the diversion works have been completed and a notice of proof was timely filed with the chief engineer under the original approval of application and permit to proceed; and

(5) Applications for a permit to appropriate water requesting a quantity of water equal to or less than that quantity of water which will be conjunctively reduced from the currently available quantity under an existing water right or water rights within one-half mile of the proposed point of diversion. Prior to the reduction, the existing water right or water rights shall be reviewed and adjusted to reflect recent historical beneficial use. Factors used to determine recent historical beneficial use shall include, but not be limited to:

(A) reported water usage;

(B) cropping patterns, system type, and consumptive use requirements for irrigation, if applicable;

(C) reasonable use;

(D) waste of water violations; and

(E) non-pumpage or reduced pumpage without due and sufficient cause.

(c) Applications for a permit to appropriate water by means of well(s) requesting 25 acre-feet or less for reasonable small water use needs shall be approved on a case-by-case basis as determined by the board with the approval of the chief engineer.

(d) Exceptions to this regulation may be granted on an individual basis by recommendation of the board and with the approval of the chief engineer. The board may require the applicant to submit additional information as it deems necessary in order to make a determination that the exception will not impair existing rights nor prejudicially and unreasonably affect the

public interest. (Authorized by K.S.A. 82a-1028(o); implementing K.S.A. 82a-1028(n); effective May 1, 1983; amended May 1, 1985; amended May 1, 1987; amended Aug. 19, 1991.)

5-24-5. Allowable appropriation—reasonable use.

The following guidelines shall be used to determine if a proposed appropriation of groundwater is reasonable for the intended use. (a) Irrigation use. No application for irrigation use shall be allowed more than the amount of water in acre-feet which exceeds:

(1) An average of two acre-feet per acre on the land proposed to be irrigated; or

(2) The reasonable needs of the applicant. In determining the amount of water deemed reasonable on an application for irrigation use, consideration shall be given to:

(A) Irrigation system design;

(B) Tailwater control methods;

(C) Well yield(s);

(D) Cropping patterns;

(E) Soil type; and

(F) Any other information necessary to evaluate the proposed use of water.

(b) Municipal use. In determining the amount of water deemed reasonable on an application for municipal use, the following criteria shall be used:

(1) The amount for population shall be based on a population projection for the ensuing 20 years. If population projection data is not available, the 20-year projected population shall be determined by extending present population for 20 years at one and one-half percent per year increase. The total amount reasonable for population shall then be determined by increasing present per capita use by 10% and multiplying that figure by the projected population.

(2) The present and projected industrial use for a 20-year-period shall also be considered.

(c) Stockwater use. For cattle, the amount of water totaling 15 gallons per head per day for the projected five-year maximum stock population shall be considered reasonable. Additional quantities for other than stock drinking purposes may be considered on a case-by-case basis.

(d) Other uses. All applications for any other use shall be reviewed to determine if the amount and rate of diversion requested are reasonable for the intended use.

(e) Exceptions to this regulation may be granted on an individual basis by recommendation of the board in conjunction with the chief engineer. The board may require the applicant to submit additional information as it deems necessary in order to make a determination that the exception will not prejudicially and unreasonably affect the public interest. Executive Appointments

Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Tuesday, August 6, in the Staff Development Center conference room, 300 S.W. Oakley, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing rules and regulations on a permanent basis.

This 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Acting Secretary of Social and Rehabilitation Services, Room 603-N, Docking State Office Building, 915 Harrison, Topeka 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

These permanent regulations are proposed for adoption and are scheduled to become effective October 1, 1991. A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows.

Article 10.—ADULT CARE HOME PROGRAM

30-10-200. Intermediate care facilities for mentally retarded (ICF's-MR) definitions. This regulation is being reorganized so that the definitions are in alphabetical order and to make the following changes:

(q) Defines the level of care model which will be the basis for the establishment of direct service reimbursement limits.

(r) The definition for mental retardation adds a reference to the 1983 American association of mental deficiency classifications.

(x) Updates the definition of persons with related conditions to more closely match the federal definition of developmental disability.

30-10-207. ICF-MR inspection of care and utilization review. This regulation is being amended to specify that the utilization review team determines the ongoing appropriateness of ICF-MR placements.

30-10-208. ICF-MR personal needs fund. This regulation is being amended to:

(a)(6) Indicate that it is the responsibility of the interdisciplinary team to determine if the client is incapable of managing his or her personal needs funds should the client not have a legal representative; and

(i) indicate that the surety bond for the personal needs fund must be in the name of the provider and must be sufficient to secure the highest quarterly balance from the previous year.

30-10-210. ICF-MR reimbursement. This regulation is being amended as follows:

(a)(2)(A) Initial eligibility for ICF-MR level services will be determined based on a screening completed by the agency or its designee.

(a)(2)(B) Continued eligibility for ICF-MR level services will be determined by a professional review of the client by the utilization review team of the department of health and environment.

(b)(1) Durable medical equipment, medical supplies and other items listed under this section shall be considered routine.

(b)(1)(BB), (FF) and (II) Occupational therapy, physical therapy and speech therapy services will be considered routine to the extent that they are not already provided through medicaid or medikan.

30-10-211. ICF-MR financial data. This regulation is being amended to reference a revised financial and statistical report which require ICF's-MR to provide data showing the actual costs of day care programs and stipulates that any provider who fails to provide any documents requested by the agency may be suspended from the ICF-MR program.

30-10-212. ICF-MR heavy care. This regulation is being amended to require providers to show heavy care income as a provider adjustment on the individual line item of benefit in the cost report. Heavy care costs shall not be included as a component when calculating the final rate for the facility.

30-10-213. ICF-MR cost reports. This regulation is being amended as follows:

(a)(1) Clarifies that a non-owner operator must have a provider agreement and that all ICF's-MR must submit a detailed depreciation schedule.

(a)(2) Specifies that central office costs must be reported consistently, based on generally accepted accounting principles.

Further clarifications, wording changes and a new financial and statistical report form are included in this regulation.

30-10-214. ICF-MR rates of reimbursement. This regulation is being amended as follows:

(a)(1) ICF-MR reimbursement limits shall be established based on the level of care of the clients.

(a)(2) Ownership allowance shall be determined as follows:

(A) All ICF's-MR initially certified prior to July 1, 1991 shall be held to established property fees.

(B) All ICF's-MR certified on or after July 1, 1991 shall be subject to an absolute cap on ownership costs.

(a)(3) Per diem rates for ICF-MR cost centers shall be determined as follows:

(A)(i) Direct services based on facility size and level of care. Direct services shall include the room and board and habilitation cost centers.

(A)(ii) Administrative costs based on facility size.

(A)(iii) Plant operating based on total allowable costs.

(B) Caps will be reviewed annually for reasonableness.

(a)(4) Rates will be established using a factor for inflation. The rate will be the actual allowable costs or the absolute cost center limits whichever is less.

(e)(2) The agency may approve a new projected cost report for a new provider if it is certified by the department of health and environment that the care of the clients are at risk.

(d) The provision which allowed a facility which is changing from a different level of care to be placed on projected status has been deleted.

(h) Projected cost report to meet survey requirements section has been deleted.

(i) Determination of rates for ICF-MR providers re-entering the medicaid program has been deleted.

Some word changes and clarifications have been made in this regulation.

30-10-215. ICF-MR rates; effective dates. This regulation has been amended to clarify requirements in this regulation and to indicate that all projected cost reports for new providers must be approved by the agency.

30-10-217. ICF-MR reserve days. This regulation is being amended to provide a technical correction in subsection (c) and indicate that approval of reserve days is permissive and not required on the part of the agency.

30-10-218. ICF-MR non-reimbursable costs. This regulation is being amended to make the related expenses of airplanes and the costs incurred through providing services to a bed made available through involuntary discharge of a client without prior authorization, as determined by the Kansas department of health and environment, non-reimbursable.

30-10-219. ICF-MR costs allowed with limitations. This regulation is being amended to allow start-up costs of a facility with the following limitations: Administrative salaries shall be limited to three months prior to licensing, other employee salaries shall be limited to one month prior to licensing.

30-10-220. ICF-MR revenues. This regulation is being amended to provide that excess revenue received for services of an agency shall be distributed to the entire agency based on generally accepted accounting principles. Other clarifications are included in this regulation.

30-10-221. ICF-MR compensation of owners, spouses, related parties and administrators. This regulation is being amended to provide technical corrections.

30-10-226. ICF-MR reimbursement for nurse aide training for FY 1990. This regulation is being revoked.

Economic Impact: The anticipated total cost for the proposed changes in the above regulations 30-10-200 through 30-10-221 is \$1,500,000 (\$618,750 state general funds).

This 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of Social and Rehabilitation Services, Room 603-N, Docking State Office Building, 915 Harrison, Topeka 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

These regulations are proposed for adoption and are scheduled to become effective August 30, 1991. A summary of proposed regulations and their economic impact follows.

The phrase "Federal Mandate" following an item indicates that the change is required by federal policy. Optional changes in regulations related to federal programs are subject to approval by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Article 4.—PUBLIC ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

30-4-58. Potential employment. This regulation is being revoked. As the General Assistance program has been restricted to covering those persons with barriers to employment, these provisions are no longer relevant to eligibility.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

30-4-63. KanWork program requirements. This regulation is being amended to adopt the temporary changes previously made on July 1, 1991 and further modify the regulation to restrict the provisions to the Aid to Families with Dependent Children (ADC) program since the GA program has been restricted to serving persons with barriers to employment.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

This regulation is being further amended regarding the exemption for children. While children under age 16 continue to be exempt, those who are age 16, 17, or 18 and who attend full-time an elementary, secondary, or vocational-technical school shall be exempt if the schooling is not a required KanWork activity. For persons age 18, the exemption shall only apply if the person can be reasonably expected to complete the program before attaining age 19. (Federal mandate.)

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

This regulation is being further amended to delete reference to KanWork and potential employment penalties for GA clients.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

30-4-64. Work program requirements. This regulation is being amended to adopt the temporary changes previously made on July 1, 1991 and further modify the regulation to restrict the provisions to the ADC program since the GA program has been restricted to serving persons with barriers to employment.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

This regulation is being further amended regarding the exemption for children. While children under age 16 continue to be exempt, those who are age 16, 17, or 18 and who attend full-time an elementary, secondary, or vocational-technical school shall be exempt if the schooling is not a required KanWork activity. For persons age 18, the exemption shall only apply if the person can be reasonably expected to complete the program before attaining age 19. (Federal Mandate.)

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

This regulation is being further amended to delete reference to KanWork and potential employment penalties for GA clients.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

30-4-85a. Eligibility factors specific to the EA program. This regulation is being revoked as the Emergency Assistance program is being eliminated. This change is necessary for the agency to stay within its FY 1992 appropriations.

Economic Impact: It is estimated that the elimination of the EA program will result in total savings of \$486,338 (\$243,169 state general funds).

30-4-90. Eligibility factors specific to the general assistance (GA) program. This regulation is being amended to adopt the changes regarding presumptive determinations for persons being released from the extended care unit at the Kansas state penitentiary previously adopted on a temporary basis effective July 1, 1991 and to further restrict the GA program to:

1. Parents who are living with their minor children;
2. persons who have a physical or mental disability which constitutes a substantial handicap to employment and is expected to last at least six months from the date of onset. Persons whose primary diagnosis is one of substance abuse will not qualify under this pro-

vision unless a secondary condition exists which meets the disability criteria of this provision in its own right;

3. persons who are mentally retarded;
4. persons required at home to care for another disabled family member; and
5. women who are pregnant and are expected to be eligible for APW.

Only persons who meet the disability criteria in items 2 and 3 above and pregnant women shall be eligible for a cash payment. All other persons will be ineligible for any benefits other than medical assistance. Cash payments will be limited to six months in any 12 consecutive months. Assistance may be extended beyond this time period for persons who have applied for SSI benefits but whose final disability determination is still pending. Such changes are necessary for the agency to stay within its FY 1992 appropriations.

Economic Impact: It is estimated that the GA program changes will result in total savings of \$2,863,711 (all state general funds) in FY 1992.

30-4-100. Payment standards for budgetary requirements in the ADC, ADC-FC, APW, GA and GA-FC programs. This regulation is being amended to decrease the percentage of need provided to single adults and childless couples in the GA program from 80% to 77% of need. This change is necessary for the agency to stay within its FY 1992 appropriations. Other technical changes have been made.

Economic Impact: It is expected that this reduction will result in total savings of \$226,951 (all state general funds).

30-4-122a. Special allowances for EA. This regulation is being revoked due to the elimination of the EA program.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-85a.

Article 5.—PROVIDER PARTICIPATION, SCOPE OF SERVICES, AND REIMBURSEMENTS FOR THE MEDICAID (MEDICAL ASSISTANCE) PROGRAM

30-5-58. Definitions. This regulation is being amended to add new definitions relating to medicaid home- and community-based services for persons with head injury trauma and for persons with mental retardation or other developmental disabilities. The text of the definitions is set forth below:

"Medicaid home- and community-based services for persons with head injury trauma (HCBS/HI)" means services provided in accordance with a federally-approved waiver to the Kansas medicaid state plan that are designed to be alternatives to services in head injury rehabilitation facilities to individuals with external, traumatic head injuries.

"Medicaid home- and community-based services for persons with mental retardation or other developmental disabilities (HCBS/MRDD)" means services provided in accordance with a federally-approved waiver to the Kansas medicaid state plan that are designed to be alternatives to services otherwise provided in intermediate care facilities for the mentally retarded (ICF/MR) to individuals who have mental retardation or other developmental disabilities.

"Mental retardation" means significantly subaverage intellectual functioning which:

- (A) Is manifested before age 22; and
- (B) is evidenced by:
 - (i) A score of 70 or below on any standardized measure of intelligence; and
 - (ii) concurrently existing deficits in adaptive behavior.

"Other developmental disabilities" means a condition or illness which:

- (A) Is manifested before age 22;
- (B) may reasonably be expected to continue indefinitely;
- (C) results in substantial limitations in any three or more of the following areas of life functioning:
 - (i) Self-care;
 - (ii) understanding and the use of language;
 - (iii) learning and adapting;
 - (iv) mobility;
 - (v) self-direction in setting goals and undertaking activities to accomplish those goals;
 - (vi) living independently; or
 - (vii) economic self-sufficiency; and
- (D) reflects the need for a combination and sequence of special, interdisciplinary or generic care, treatment or other services which are of extended or lifelong duration and are individually planned and coordinated.

"Traumatic head injury" means non-degenerative, structural brain damage resulting in residual deficits and disability which have been acquired by external physical injury.

Economic Impact: None. See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-5-78 and 30-5-79.

30-5-70. Payment of medical expenses for eligible recipients. This regulation is being amended to add a section which non-covers nursing facility and ICF/MR services for individuals who do not meet the financial provisions of K.A.R. 30-6-53(d). The financial provisions require persons in nursing facilities to have no more in total monthly gross income than 300 percent of the one-person benefit level in the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) Program. Persons who are ineligible under this provision may qualify for medical assistance for other than nursing facility services based on independent living rules. This change is necessary for the Department to stay within its FY 1992 appropriations.

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-6-53.

30-5-78. Scope of and reimbursement for home- and community-based services for persons with head injury trauma. The Secretary is proposing a new regulation that will give authority for a federally-approved waiver of medicaid eligibility for persons with head injury trauma. The text of the regulation is set forth below:

30-5-78. Scope of and reimbursement for home- and community-based services for persons with head injury trauma. The scope of home- and community-based services for persons with head injury trauma shall consist of those services provided under the au-

(continued)

thority of the applicable federally-approved model waiver to the Kansas medicaid state plan. (a) Recipients of services provided pursuant to this waiver shall be capable of benefitting from rehabilitation by demonstrating improvement.

(b) Home- and community-based services shall be provided in accordance with a plan of care written by a licensed social worker or registered nurse and approved by the Kansas department of social and rehabilitation services. Prior to the development of any plan to provide services, the need for services shall be determined by an individualized assessment of the prospective recipient by a provider enrolled in the program.

(c) Mandatory services shall include:

(1) Case management services, up to a maximum of 116 hours per calendar year; and

(2) transitional living skills training, up to a maximum of seven four-hour days per week.

(d) Optional services may include one or more of the following:

(1) Rehabilitation therapies consisting of:

(A) Occupational therapy;

(B) physical therapy;

(C) speech-language therapy;

(D) cognitive therapy;

(E) behavioral therapy; or

(F) substance abuse therapy;

(2) medical alert rental and one-time installation costs;

(3) night support, up to a maximum of 12 hours but no less than eight hours per night;

(4) medical attendant care, which shall be reviewed by a registered nurse every 60 days;

(5) non-medical attendant care, with prior authorization by the case manager; or

(6) medical equipment and supplies not otherwise covered under the Kansas medicaid state plan, with prior authorization by the case manager.

(e) Reimbursement for home- and community-based services for persons with head injury trauma shall be based upon reasonable fees as related to customary charges, except that no fee shall be paid in excess of the range maximum. The effective date of this regulation shall be August 30, 1991.

Economic Impact: It is estimated that \$271,353 (\$115,732 state general funds) will be saved through this regulation change and the establishment of this waiver.

30-5-79. Scope of and reimbursement for home- and community-based services for persons with mental retardation or other developmental disabilities. The Secretary is proposing a new regulation that will give authority for a federally-approved waiver of medicaid services for persons with mental retardation or other developmental disabilities. The text of the regulation is set forth below:

30-5-79. Scope of and reimbursement for home- and community-based services for persons with mental retardation or other developmental disabilities. The scope of home- and community-based services for persons with mental retardation or other developmental

disabilities shall consist of those services provided under the authority of the applicable federally-approved waiver to the Kansas medicaid state plan. (a) Prior to the development of any plan to provide services, the need for services shall be determined by an individualized assessment of the prospective recipient by a provider of community-based screening services.

(b) Home- and community-based services shall be provided in accordance with an individualized, written plan of care approved in writing by the Kansas department of social and rehabilitation services. Each annual review and amendment of this plan shall be approved in the same fashion. This plan shall:

(1) Be based on needs identified during the screening assessment;

(2) specify each service to be provided and why each service was selected, or how each service will address any specific need identified by the assessment;

(3) specify the frequency, and within what limits, each service shall be provided;

(4) specify what other support services are required and the plan for obtaining them;

(5) be prepared in consultation with the recipient and the recipient's guardian, if one has been appointed;

(6) be approved in writing by the recipient or the recipient's guardian, as appropriate; and

(7) be reviewed at least annually and updated as necessary.

(c) Reimbursement for home- and community-based services for persons with mental retardation or other developmental disabilities shall be based upon reasonable fees as related to customary charges, except that no fee shall be paid in excess of the range maximum. The effective date of this regulation shall be August 30, 1991.

Economic Impact: It is estimated that the current 522 recipients and 426 additional individuals will receive services under the provisions of this regulation resulting in increased expenditures of \$9,400,000 (\$4,000,000 state general funds). However, without this regulation and the associated waiver, these individuals would be served through more costly institutional placement. The net result is an estimated cost avoidance of \$10,109,000 through this regulation.

30-5-101. Scope of chiropractic services. This regulation is being amended to eliminate chiropractic services for those individuals not participating in the Kan Be Healthy Program.

Economic Impact: There will be a savings of \$538 (\$227 state general funds) as a result of this regulation change.

30-5-102. Scope of optometric and optical services. This regulation is being amended to eliminate optometric and optical services for those individuals not participating in the Kan Be Healthy Program.

Economic Impact: There will be a savings of \$589,990 (\$249,566 state general funds) as a result of this regulation change.

30-5-103. Scope of podiatric services. This regulation is being amended to eliminate podiatric services for

those individuals not participating in the Kan Be Healthy Program.

Economic Impact: There will be a savings of \$16,228 (\$6,865 state general funds) as a result of this regulation change.

30-5-104. Scope of psychological services. This regulation is being amended to eliminate psychological services for those individuals not participating in the Kan Be Healthy Program.

Economic Impact: There will be a savings of \$426,463 (\$180,394 state general funds) as a result of this regulation change.

30-5-105. Scope of hearing services. This regulation is being amended to eliminate hearing services for those individuals not participating in the Kan Be Healthy Program.

Economic Impact: There will be a savings of \$198,839 (\$84,109 state general funds) as a result of this regulation change.

30-5-110. Scope of partial hospitalization programs. This regulation is being amended to eliminate partial hospitalization not provided by community mental health centers.

Economic Impact: There will be a savings of \$1,254,000 (\$534,831 state general funds) as a result of this regulation change.

Article 6.—MEDICAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM—CLIENTS' ELIGIBILITY FOR PARTICIPATION

30-6-63. Financial eligibility. This regulation is being amended to limit financial eligibility for medical assistance for payment of nursing facility care to persons whose total monthly gross income does not exceed 300% of the one person benefit level in the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program. Persons who are ineligible under this provision may qualify for medical assistance for other than nursing facility care based on independent living rules. This income provision shall not, however, be applicable to persons in a nursing facility as of September 1, 1991 provided they continue to reside there and otherwise remain financially eligible for assistance. This change is necessary for the agency to stay within its FY 1992 appropriations.

Economic Impact: It is expected that this change would result in loss of nursing facility coverage for approximately 445 persons at a savings of \$174,236 (\$77,099 state general funds) for FY 1992 or \$232,314 (\$102,799) on an annualized basis. However, because the Department has exempted current residents from this income limit, the savings in FY 1992 and subsequent years will be greatly diminished. The annual estimated savings will not be fully realized until currently affected residents have all been discharged.

This regulation is being further amended to incorporate a definition of patient liability the term shall be defined as the amount the individual is required to pay towards the cost of care an individual receives in an institutional arrangement. This is a technical change only.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

This regulation is being further amended to delete the requirement that charges for long-term care in an

approved facility are allowable only up to the agency rate for purposes of meeting the spenddown or patient liability of an individual.

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

30-6-65. Automatic eligibles. This regulation is being amended to provide medical assistance to persons not receiving GA due to the new criteria in K.A.R. 30-4-90(a)(5) or the six-month payment limitation in 30-4-90(c).

Economic Impact: See the economic impact statement for K.A.R. 30-4-90.

30-6-74. Persons whose needs are to be considered with the needs of the ADC child. This regulation is being revoked as the needs of the parents or other caretaker relatives of an ADC child will no longer be covered in the medical assistance program related to ADC. This change is necessary for the agency to stay within its FY 1992 appropriations.

Economic Impact: It is estimated that this change will result in total savings of approximately \$5.9 million (\$2.4 million state general funds) in FY 1992 or \$7.9 million (\$3.2 million state general funds) on an annualized basis.

30-6-106. General rules for consideration of resources, including real property, personal property, and income. This regulation is being amended to clarify that the monthly community spouse income allowance is to be deducted from the income of the institutionalized spouse under the division of assets provisions in determining the amount of patient liability for persons in institutional living arrangements or spenddown for persons in home- and community-based services arrangements. (Federal Mandate.)

Economic Impact: This change is not expected to have any discernible economic impact.

Article 10.—ADULT CARE HOME PROGRAM

30-10-1a. Nursing facility program definitions. This regulation is being amended to delete the definition of "heavy care" which was eliminated as a service on July 1, 1991.

Economic Impact: None.

112-16-8. Presiding officer.
112-16-9. Hearing procedure.
112-16-10. Evidence.
112-16-11. Orders.
112-16-12. Service of order.
112-16-13. Fines.
112-16-14. Appeal, stewards' and racing judges' hearings.

There is no known economic impact; however, it is anticipated the simplified procedures may mean some savings of expense for licensees, who will be able to appear immediately before the racing judges and stewards during the race meeting and not after, when most would probably have to travel long distances to attend a hearing.

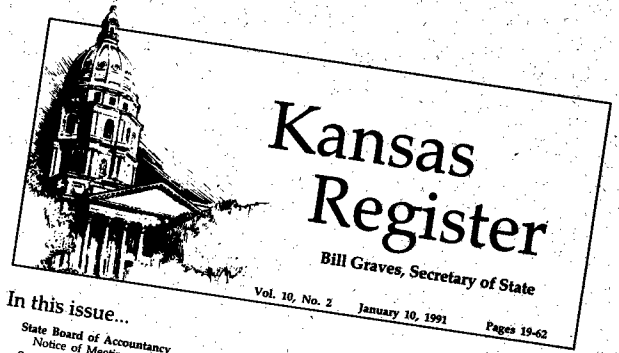
