## Legal Notice

A proposed rehabilitation project on rail lines leased by the Kansas Southwestern Railway in Kansas will be the subject of a public hearing to be conducted by the Kansas Department of Transportation at 9 a.m. Thursday, January 23, in KDOT's Thacher Building conference room, third floor, 217 E. 4th, Topeka. The proposal will be discussed as an update to the State Rail Plan.

The proposed rehabilitation project involves the Missouri Pacific Railroad (Union Pacific System) between Wichita and Hardtner, Kansas. The rail line is located in Sedgwick, Sumner, Harper and Barber counties. If added to the Rail Plan the project may be eligible for assistance under the federal government's Local Rail Freight Assistance Program.

Copies of the Updated Rail Plan will be available for public inspection and comment at the hearing or earlier by special request. Written and oral statements submitted at the hearing will be made a matter of record. Persons wishing to submit comments but unable to attend the hearing may write to John R. Scheirman, Chief of the Bureau of Rail Affairs, Kansas Department of Transportation, 217 E. 4th, Topeka 66603.

## Opinion No. 92-1

**Constitution of the State of Kansas—Miscellaneous—Lotteries; Indian Gaming Regulatory Act. Senator Edward F. Reilly, Jr., 3rd District, Leavenworth, January 2, 1992.**

If the legislature and the electorate choose to remove the constitutional authority for a state-owned and operated lottery, the types of class III games Indian tribes could conduct in this state pursuant to a compact would be limited to on-track parimutuel wagering on horse and dog races, as this would be the only permissible class III gaming anywhere in the state. A tribe may not conduct simulcasting/wagering operations pursuant to a compact or otherwise since such conduct is currently prohibited by state law. Statutorily prohibiting certain specific class III games, if across the board (*i.e.* no one, including the state, may conduct or participate in it), would foreclose the ability to include those specific games in a compact. 25 U.S.C. § 2719(d) specifically makes provisions of the Internal Revenue Code concerning the reporting and withholding of taxes on winnings applicable to Indian gaming operations.

As long as the state owns the business and has ultimate and complete control of the operation, article 15, section 3c of the constitution does not require that the state actually own the building or equipment used in a lottery operation. 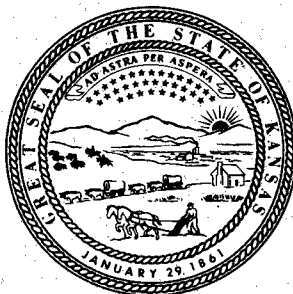

Applications for allocation of Private Activity Bond Authority will be accepted beginning Tuesday, January 21, for those qualified uses specified in Section 141 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, with the exception of qualified mortgage bonds. The state of Kansas currently receives \$150,000,000 of federal authority for the issuance of PABs on an annual basis. K.S.A. 74-5060 reserves portions of that total for the following qualified uses: student loan bonds (\$5,000,000), private use portion of government activity bonds (\$5,000,000), and qualified small issue bonds (\$25,000,000). The remainder is available for any qualified use which would include qualified mortgage bonds.

**Notice Concerning Kansas  
Retailers' Sales Tax**

K.S.A. 79-3603(h) imposes "a tax at the rate of 4.25% upon the gross receipts from the services of renting or leasing of tangible personal property. . ."

K.A.R. 92-21-17 states in part: "Local sales tax is applicable to the lease or rental of tangible personal property if the lease or rental is consummated in a county or city having a local sales tax. Local sales tax shall not apply if the lease or rental is not subject to state sales tax."

The leasing of tangible property, such as towels, linen, tablecloths, uniforms, etc., to a lessee within the state of Kansas, by a lessor who does not have a business location within the state of Kansas, is not subject to Kansas sales tax but is subject to Kansas compensating (use) tax, which effective July 1, 1989, is 4.25 percent. Conversely, the leasing of tangible personal property to a lessee within the state of Kansas, by a lessor who does have a business location within the state of Kansas, is subject to the Kansas state sales tax of 4.25 percent and any applicable local sales tax.

Regulation K.A.R. 92-19-55, regarding leases and rentals, reads in part:

" . . . (f) Sales tax shall be imposed on the total amount of each lease payment which lessee is obligated under the contract to pay to the lessor for continued use of the tangible personal property, with no deduction or exclusion from the lease price for insurance, taxes, service or maintenance contracts, handling charges, administration charges, late fees, repair or service charges, or any other charges regardless of how any contract, invoice or other evidence of the transaction is stated or computed and whether separately billed or segregated on the same bill."

Accordingly, the total cost of leasing the tangible personal property, including cleaning the tangible personal property, is subject to Kansas state/use tax, even if the soiled tangible personal property is cleaned outside of the state of Kansas.

Missouri laundries, dry cleaners, and linen suppliers who deliver their goods to and perform services for Kansas residents and who collect the Kansas sales/use tax from those Kansas residents will not be permitted to deduct from the Kansas sales/use tax collected, an amount equal to a percentage of sales/use taxes paid, to the state of Missouri by the Missouri laundries, dry cleaners, and linen suppliers, on items which are defined as "consumables" or "component parts" under the Kansas Sales Tax Act.

This notice revokes all prior policy directives and is effective January 1, 1992.

**Board of Examiners in Optometry**

**Notice of Hearing on Proposed  
Administrative Regulations**

A public hearing will be conducted at 8:30 a.m. Friday, February 21, in Suite 409, Capitol Tower, 400 S.W. 8th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing rules and regulations of the Kansas Board of Examiners in Optometry.

This 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the secretary-treasurer of the Kansas State Board of Examiners in Optometry, 403 N.W. Lyman Road, Topeka 66608. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

These regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. None of these regulations are mandated by federal law as a requirement for participating in or implementing a federally subsidized or assisted program. Copies of the regulations and the economic impact statement may be obtained by writing Frieden, Haynes & Forbes, 400 S.W. 8th, Suite 409, P.O. Box 639, Topeka 66601. A summary of proposed regulations and their economic impact follows.

**K.A.R. 65-4-1. Definitions:** This regulation provides functional definitions of terms used in other newly proposed regulations or amendments. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-4-2. Hearings Before the Board:** Amendments to this regulation modify the language of the existing regulation on this subject without making sub-

stantial substantive changes. These amendments will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-4-3. Fees:** This regulation complies with the requirements of the optometry law that the Board of Examiners in Optometry set certain licensing fees by regulation. This regulation will establish the cost to persons applying for licensure to practice optometry in Kansas by renewal, examination or reciprocity as follows:

The cost will be paid by the applicant. There was no less costly or less intrusive methods to comply with the optometry law, thus none were considered by the Board of Examiners in Optometry.

**K.A.R. 65-4-4. Notice to Board:** The optometry law requires a Kansas licensee to report to the Board of Examiners in Optometry adverse actions or findings made or taken against the licensee in administrative or judicial proceedings. This new regulation establishes that such notice is to be given within 20 days. This amendment will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-4-5. Professional Judgment:** This regulation clarifies some of the acts which would be deemed to constitute a licensee allowing a non-licensed person to interfere with or control the licensee's professional judgment, which is prohibited by the optometry law. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-5-1. Qualifications for Licensure by Examination:** This regulation establishes certain information, including information regarding prior disciplinary action, that must be supplied to the Board of Examiners in Optometry at the time of application for licensure by examination. This information is necessary to allow the board to determine if the applicant is qualified for licensure. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-5-2. Application for Licensure by Examination:** This regulation establishes that prior to 30 days before a scheduled examination an applicant for licensure by examination must supply, along with an appropriate application, materials including an academic transcript, the appropriate fee and appropriate references. The regulation also provides for holding an insufficient application for up to one year for supplementation. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-5-3. Examinations:** This regulation establishes the areas that will be "the general subject of the

oral or written examination administered by the Board of Examiners in Optometry." The regulation also indicates that after January 1, 1993, topics covered in the "national board examination" may be eliminated from the board's examination. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-5-4. Approved Schools or Colleges of Optometry:** The optometry law requires new applicants for licensure to practice optometry in Kansas be a graduate of a school or college of optometry approved by the Board of Examiners in Optometry. This regulation establishes that an "approved school or college of optometry" shall be one determined by the board to meet the standards of the University of Missouri—St. Louis School of Optometry as they existed on January 1, 1991. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-5-5. Renewal of License:** This regulation requires licensees to notify the Kansas Board of Examiners in Optometry of their current address. This regulation also provides that prior to May 31 of each year all licensees desiring to have their licenses renewed forward to the secretary-treasurer of the Kansas Board of Examiners in Optometry an appropriate application along with the required fee. The regulation provides that if the licensee does not comply, he or she will be notified and given until July to comply and pay an additional fee to avoid cancellation of his or her license. The regulation provides for licensees who have had their licenses cancelled applying for reinstatement. This regulation, along with K.A.R. 65-4-3, would require a licensee pay \$90 to renew his or her license prior to June 1 of each year. If the requirements for renewal are not met before July 1 but after June 1, an additional fee of \$250 must be paid by the licensee for his or her first late renewal. If the licensee again fails to meet the requirement for renewal by June 1 in a later year, the additional fee becomes \$300. For a person to obtain reinstatement of his or her license after cancellation for non-renewal, he or she would have to pay the renewal fee of \$90 plus the additional fee of \$250 or \$300 and any additional costs associated with the application for reinstatement. These costs are paid by the licensee. Establishment by the board of renewal fees is directed by the optometry law and thus no other means of achieving the purpose of the regulation were considered by the Board of Examiners in Optometry.

**K.A.R. 65-5-6. Continuing Education:** This regulation requires each licensee, except those who are recent optometry school graduates, earn 20 hours of approved continuing education each license renewal period. The regulation establishes certain types of education that may be used to fulfill the requirement. The regulation also indicates materials regarding a program that the board is being asked to approve may be submitted 60 days in advance. The regulation also establishes the requirements for a certificate of attendance at an educational program. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-5-7. Reciprocal Licenses:** This regulation establishes what information is to be included in an application for licensure by reciprocity. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-5-8. Reinstatement:** This regulation establishes the requirements for an application for reinstatement of a license that has been revoked by the Kansas Board of Examiners in Optometry. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-8-1. Examination and Adaptation Procedures:** The optometry law defines "unprofessional conduct," in part, to mean failure to maintain minimum standards for services provided by a licensee, as established by rules and regulations of the Board of Examiners in Optometry. This regulation establishes minimum standards for an eye examination, contact lens evaluation and contact lens adaptation. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-8-2. Instruments:** This regulation requires commonly accepted instrumentation and accurate and reliable methods be used to perform the procedures required in K.A.R. 65-8-1. The regulation also requires the results be recorded using commonly accepted measuring units and nomenclature. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-8-3. Records:** This regulation establishes certain information which must be included in a patient's records. The regulation also directs that required patient's records be kept for five years. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-8-4. Content of Prescription.** This regulation establishes what information must be included in a prescription for spectacle lenses, rigid contact lenses, soft contact lenses and all ophthalmic lenses. The regulation also prohibits a contact lens prescription from directing that the specifications be obtained from an existing lens without examination or conversion of a spectacle lens prescription. The regulation also establishes certain information which must be included in a prescription for a topical pharmaceutical drug. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-9-1. Use:** This regulation requires that for a licensee to practice under a trade name, the name and location must be approved by the Board of Examiners in Optometry. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-9-2. Application:** This regulation sets out the matters that must be included in any application for approval of a trade name. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-9-3. Approval:** This regulation provides for the type of trade names which will not be approved. The regulation provides for lapse of approval when a trade name is not used. The regulation also provides circumstances under which approval of a trade name can be revoked. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-9-4. Transfer:** This regulation requires approval by the Board of Examiners in Optometry for transfer of approval to use a trade name and the requirements for seeking approval of a transfer. The regulation also indicates that if the transfer is approved, the transferee is responsible for compliance with the applicable provisions of K.A.R. 65-9-1 et seq. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-9-5. Practice Under a Trade or Assumed Name:** This regulation establishes certain notification

requirements on each person who obtains approval of use of a trade name. The regulation also requires that when a trade name is used, the name of the licensee providing the services appear on the patient's record and the billing statement. This regulation also limits the use of the name of an inactive, removed or deceased licensee in a trade name. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-10-1. Practice Locations:** This regulation limits a licensee to deriving economic benefit from no more than three practice locations. The regulation requires the Board of Examiners in Optometry be notified when a licensee engages in the practice in a new practice location. The regulation requires an original license be displayed in each practice location. The regulation prohibits maintaining an office or practice location that implies an unlicensed person is engaged in the practice of optometry or that the licensee's practice is a part of the business of an unlicensed person. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-10-2. Unlawfully Maintaining an Office:** This regulation clarifies when an unlicensed person shall be deemed to be maintaining an office for the practice of optometry by bearing an expense of the office. The regulation also indicates an unlicensed person will be deemed to be maintaining an office for the practice of optometry if there are outward implications that a licensee is practicing as part of or in association with the business of an unlicensed person. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-10-3. Licensee Ownership of Franchised Business of Optical Dispensing:** This regulation provides that any franchise business of marketing ophthalmic goods or contact lenses a licensee may obtain shall be separate and apart from the licensee's practice of optometry. The regulation also clarifies the meaning of "separate and apart." This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-11-1. Responsibility.** This regulation indicates a licensee is responsible for advertising designed to benefit the licensee. The regulation also provides that a licensee will be presumed to have caused or approved advertising containing the licensee's name, trade name, office address, phone number or place of practice. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-11-2. Fraudulent Advertisement.** The optometry law defines "unprofessional conduct" to include using fraudulent advertising. This regulation clarifies types of advertising which shall be deemed fraudulent. This regulation will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 65-11-3. Associated Advertising:** This regulation indicates that except in certain circumstances, the signs and advertising of a licensee are to be separate and apart from those of another person, firm or corporation and shall not suggest association with any person, firm or corporation that does not exist. This regulation will have no economic impact.

Article 7.—MILK AND DAIRY PRODUCTS

**4-7-719. Additions.** (a) In item 10p appearing in section 7 of the grade A pasteurized milk ordinance adopted by reference in K.A.R. 4-7-716, the following language shall be inserted between the word "piping" and the final period: "however cottage cheese, cheese dressing, or cheese ingredients may be transported by other methods which protect the product from contamination."

(b) In item 18p appearing in section 7 of the grade A pasteurized milk ordinance adopted by reference in K.A.R. 4-7-716, the following language shall be inserted between the word "equipment" and the final period: "however cottage cheese, dry curd cottage cheese, and lowfat cottage cheese may be transported in sealed containers in a protected sanitary manner from one plant to another for creaming or packaging or both." (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 65-720n and 65-737a; effective May 1, 1980; amended Jan. 14, 1991; amended March 2, 1992.)

Article 8.—NOXIOUS WEEDS

**4-8-27. Adoption by reference.** (a) Control practices contained in the "official musk thistle control program" published by the Kansas state board of agriculture on November 1, 1991 are hereby adopted by reference and shall apply to the control and eradication of musk thistle in the state of Kansas.
