Automobiles and Other Vehicles—Uniform Act Regulating Traffic; Rules of the Road; Serious Traffic Offenses—Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol or Drugs; Sentencing. Lewis A. Heaven, Jr., Merrian City Attorney, Merriam, January 10, 1992.

Under the circumstances stated herein, municipal and district courts in Johnson County may sentence DUI offenders to a facility located in Wyandotte County. The mandatory imprisonment required by K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 8-1567, as amended, for second offenses may be partially served in a restrained environment such as the Kansas City weekend intervention program as long as the offender remains under the custody and control of law enforcement officials throughout the time the minimum sentence is being served. Schools—Organization, Powers and Finances of Boards of Education—Organization Order for Unified School District; Affirmative Action Contracting Program. Joseph W. Zima, Clerk and Counsel for Unified School District 501, Topeka, January 10, 1992.

A board of education for a unified school district may establish and implement an affirmative action contracting program. Any racial classification set forth in the program must be justified by a compelling governmental interest and the means chosen to effectuate the purpose for the program must be narrowly tailored to the achievement of that goal. Insurance—General Provisions—Insurance Coverage to Include Reimbursement or Indemnity for Services Performed by Optometrist, Dentist or Podiatrist. Representative Arthur W. Douville, 20th District, Overland Park, January 10, 1992.

An insurance plan covering a service that can be provided by two different licensed professionals cannot categorically deny reimbursement to one without violating K.S.A. 40-2,100 when (1) the service provided is covered by the contract; (2) the service provided is within the lawful scope of practice under the healing arts act; and (3) the service was provided by a podiatrist, optometrist or dentist within the lawful scope of his/her license. Opinion No. 92-6

Personal and Real Property—Real Estate Appraisers—Certification; When Required; Use of Title Without Certification. Jean Ducan, Administrative Officer, Kansas Real Estate Appraisal Board, Topeka, January 10, 1992.

K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 58-4101 et seq., as amended by L. 1991, ch. 164, prohibits persons who have not obtained a state issued certificate or license from assuming or using the title of state certified or licensed appraiser or any title, designation or abbreviation likely to create the impression of state certification. It is our opinion that the use of the title "Certified Kansas Appraiser" (CKA) creates the impression of state certification as a real estate appraiser; thus, such designation may not be used by persons unless they have in fact received a certificate from the state. Executive Order No. 91-148

Establishing the Governor's Commission on Housing and Homelessness

WHEREAS, a community's economic health is dependent upon good housing, good jobs and a good educational system; and

WHEREAS, a need exists to strengthen housing programs in Kansas and to increase the State's commitment to helping citizens obtain good housing; and

WHEREAS, the provisions of K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 74-5086, as amended, which provide for the Housing Concerns Advisory Committee, are due to expire on March 31, 1992; and

WHEREAS, involvement of both the public and private sector is needed in addressing housing issues in

our State; NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, there is hereby established the Governor's Commission on

Housing and Homelessness.

The Director of the Budget, the President of the Kansas Development Finance Authority, the Commissioner of Education and the Secretaries of the Departments of Aging, Commerce and Social and Rehabilitation Services shall be members of the Commission. Other members of the Commission and the Chairperson of the Commission will be designated by official commission of appointment of the Governor, certified by and filed with the Secretary of State.

Members of the Commission shall receive subsistence allowances, mileage and expenses as provided in K.S.A. 75-3223 and amendments thereto. Those members employed by a state agency shall be paid for these items by their respective agency and other members shall have these items paid by the Department of Commerce.

The Commission shall assist in the assessment of housing related needs, make recommendations as to housing related policies and legislation, and make periodic reports thereon to the Governor.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order 91-148 and shall be effective

immediately.

Executive Order No. 92-149

Directing the Implementation of Total Quality Management Within the Executive Branch of the State of Kansas

WHEREAS, Article 1, § 3 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas vests the supreme executive power of

the state in the governor; and

WHEREAS, Article 1, § 4 of the Constitution of the state vests in the Governor, the power to require information from the officers of the executive department, upon any subject related to their respective duties; and

WHEREAS, Total Quality Management is a structured concept for improving efficiency and productivity and has produced significant improvements in the pri-

vate and public sectors; and

WHEREAS, Total Quality Management has been refined to achieve the specific needs of state government, the implementation of this effort will be hereinafter referred to as Kansas Quality Management; and

WHEREAS, upon implementation, Kansas Quality Management will continuously improve service to constituents through a structured process that will:

1. More effectively utilize the talents of each state employee and thus increase productivity and efficiency, and

2. Enable a more prudent management of the state's financial, natural and human resources, and

3. Instill the highest ethical standards in state government.

NOW THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority vested in me as Governor of the State of Kansas, I hereby order:

I. The establishment of the Kansas Quality Management Council to oversee the uniform and successful implementation of Kansas Quality Management within the executive branch. This Council shall be chaired by the Secretary of Administration and shall initially consist of the Secretaries of Commerce, Revenue, Social and

Rehabilitation Services, Transportation and the Adjutant General. These agencies are hereby designated as the pilot agencies to initially participate in the implementation of Kansas Quality Management. The Kansas Quality Management Council shall be expanded to include the entire Cabinet as Kansas Quality Management is implemented in their respective agencies.

II. The establishment of the Kansas Quality Management Planning and Guidance Committee to formulate the state plan, goals and objectives, reporting procedures, awareness and training materials and a time frame for implementation within the other state agencies. This Committee shall be chaired by the Governor's Office of Efficiency Management and shall consist of representation from the Governor's Legislative Liaison office, the Division of Personnel Services and senior level representation from each of the five pilot agencies as designated in I above. This Committee shall report to the Kansas Quality Management Council as set forth above. This Committee shall also be expanded to include senior level representation from other agencies as Kansas Quality Management is implemented.

III. The administrative heads of state boards, commissions, agencies and institutions under my jurisdiction shall implement Kansas Quality Management within their respective organizations, consistent with the policies and planning

guidance to be subsequently issued.

IV. The implementation of Kansas Quality Management within authorized budget limitations.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 92-149 and shall be effective immediately.

Executive Order Establishing
The Governor's Interagency Coordinating
Committee on Substance Abuse

WHEREAS, Article 1, § 3 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas vests the supreme executive power of the state in the Governor; and

WHEREAS, the abuse of alcohol and other drugs costs Kansans approximately \$1 billion annually, and results in broken individuals, families, and communities; and

WHEREAS, alcohol and other drug abuse is closely associated with higher health care costs, child abuse, family violence, crime, automobile fatalities, truancy, and other problems; and

WHEREAS, a coordinated and comprehensive response by state criminal justice, education and treat-

ment agencies is required to effectively address the abuse of alcohol and other drug abuse problems in Kansas; and

WHEREAS, program and fiscal activities of Kansas state government efforts to combat abuse of alcohol and other drugs need to be communicated to Kansas citizens, as well as to federal, state and local governments;

NOW, THEREFORE, pursuant to authority vested in me as Governor and chief executive of the State of Kansas, I hereby order that the Interagency Coordinating Committee on Substance Abuse be formed and chaired by the Director of the Governor's Office of

Drug Abuse Programs.

The mission of the committee shall be to promote the development, implementation, maintenance, and evaluation of a coordinated interagency system in order to maximize resources and encourage partnerships both public and private for the purpose of empowering Kansans to eliminate the abuse of alcohol and other drugs.

The committee shall consist of:

- 1. Secretary of Administration
- 2. Secretary of Aging
- 3. Secretary of Commerce
- 4. Secretary of Corrections
- 5. Secretary of Health and Environment
- 6. Secretary of Human Resources
- 7. Secretary of Revenue
- 8. Secretary of Social and Rehabilitation Services
- 9. Secretary of Transportation
- 10. Secretary of Wildlife and Parks
- 11. Adjutant General
- 12. Chairman of the Parole Board
- 13. Superintendent of the Highway Patrol
- 14. Director of the Governor's Office of Drug Abuse Programs

The following state officials are requested to serve on the committee:

- 1. Commissioner of Education
- 2. Attorney General
- 3. Executive Director of the Human Rights
 Commission
- 4. Executive Director of Commission on Veteran's Affairs
- 5. Executive Director of the Kansas Board of Regents
- 6. Administrator of Emergency Medical Services

State officers or agency heads may appoint an individual to represent them on the committee.

This Order shall continue in full force and effect until the date any subsequent Executive Order with respect to the subject hereof is promulgated.

This document shall be filed with the Secretary of State as Executive Order No. 92-150 and shall become effective immediately.

Article 4.—ACCIDENT AND HEALTH INSURANCE

40-4-35. Medicare supplement policies; minimum standards; requirements. Sections 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 11, 12, 13 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, and appendices A and B of the national association of insurance commissioners' model regulation to implement the national association of insurance commissioners' medicare supplement insurance minimum standards, July 1991 edition, are hereby adopted by reference, subject to the following additions or exceptions:

(a) Section 3 is hereby amended to read as follows:

"B. This regulation shall not apply to:

(1) A policy or contract of one or more employers or labor organizations, or of the trustees of a fund established by one or more employers or labor organizations, or combination thereof, for employees or former employees, or a combination thereof, or for members or former members, or a combination thereof, of the labor organizations; and

(2) individual policies or contracts issued pursuant to a conversion privilege under a policy of contract of group or individual insurance when such group or individual policy or contract includes provisions which are inconsistent with the requirements of this

regulation."

(b) Section 3 is hereby amended by the addition of subsection C. which reads: "This regulation shall supersede any other Kansas administrative regulation to the extent the regulation or any provision of it is inconsistent with or contrary to this regulation."

(c) Section 7(A)(3) is hereby amended to read as follows: "A medicare supplement policy or certificate shall provide that benefits designed to cover cost sharing amounts under medicare will be changed automatically to coincide with any changes in the applicable medicare deductible amount and co-payment percentage factors. Subject to the requirements of section 14B of this regulation or any applicable statutory requirements, premiums may be modified to correspond with such changes."

(d) Section 7(B)(2) is hereby amended to read as follows: "Coverage for all of the medicare part A inpatient

hospital deductible amount."

(e) Section 8(A)(3) is hereby amended to read as follows: "A medicare supplement policy or certificate shall provide that benefits designed to cover cost sharing amounts under medicare will be changed automatically to coincide with any changes in the applicable medicare deductible amount and co-payment percentage factors. Subject to the requirements of section 14B of this regulation or any applicable statutory requirements, premiums may be modified to correspond with such changes."

(f) Section 15C is hereby amended to read as follows: "No issuer or other entity shall provide compensation to its agents or other producers and no agent or producer shall receive compensation greater than the renewal compensation payable by the replacing issuer on renewal policies or certificates if an existing policy

or certificate is replaced."

(g) Section 16(A)(5) is hereby amended to read as follows: "Medicare supplement policies or certificates shall have a notice prominently printed on the first page of the policy or certificate or attached thereto stating in substance that the policyholder or certificateholder shall have the right to return the policy or certificate within 30 days of its delivery and to have the premium refunded if, after examination of the policy or certificate, the insured person is not satisfied for any reason. Any refund made pursuant to this section shall be paid directly to the applicant by the insurer in a timely manner. Such notice shall be printed in not less than 10 point type and shall be printed in bold face type or in some other manner that distinguishes its from the print otherwise appearing in the policy.'

(h) Section 16(c) is hereby amended by the addition of the following: "(5) A description of policy provisions relating to renewability, cancellation or continuation of coverage, including any reservation of rights to change

premium.'

(6) The amount of premium for this policy. The premiums for the policy or certificate shall be shown separately from the premiums for any optional or supplemental riders. (7) The name and address of the insurance agent, or employee of the insurer who assumes responsibility for completing the outline."

(i) Section 17(E) is hereby amended by deletion of paragraphs (1) and (2) (applicable to preexisting con-

ditions) in their entirety.

(a)(3), or (a)(4); or

(2) have completed, prior to June 1, 1990, a formal

educational program of post-basic study and clinical experience which can be demonstrated by the applicant to have sufficiently prepared the applicant for practice in the category of advanced practice for which application is made. The applicant must show that the curriculum of the program is consistent with public health and safety policy and that it prepared individuals to perform acts generally recognized by the nursing profession as capable of being performed by persons with post-basic education in nursing.

(b) Each applicant for an occupation license shall apply in writing on the application form approved and

furnished by the commission.

(c) Each applicant for an occupation license acting as an employer shall submit proof of compliance with the workers compensation act of the state of Kansas,

K.S.A. 44-501 et seq.

(d) Each person who is appointed by an owner to act as an authorized agent shall secure an occupation license. Each authorized agent agreement form shall be filed with the commission. Each authorized agent shall perform for the owner only the duties that are subject of the authorized agent agreement form. Each authorized agent shall notify the commission in writing when the authorized agent agreement is terminated.

(e) Each applicant for an occupation license shall not knowingly provide false information on any occupation

license application form.

(f) Each applicant for an occupation license shall not fail to disclose any material fact on any occupation license application form.

(g) No person shall alter or attempt to alter any information contained on an occupation license badge.

(h) Each person who loses an occupation license shall immediately:

(1) notify the commission office at the racetrack facility;

(2) secure a duplicate license; and

(3) pay the required fee.

(i) Each required fee shall be paid when the occupation license is issued. Each occupation license issued by the commission shall be valid for the period commencing January 1 and terminating December 31 of the calendar year in which the occupation license is issued.

(j) Any applicant may be required to submit with the application at least two complete sets of fingerprint cards approved by the commission. If the fingerprints are not acceptable for processing, each applicant shall be required to resubmit fingerprint cards.

(k) Each applicant for an occupation license must be at least 16 years old. However, this provision shall not preclude dependent children under the age of 16 from working for a parent or guardian when the parent or guardian is licensed as a kennel owner, trainer or assistant trainer and approval has been obtained from the organization licensee. Each licensed trainer at a horse or greyhound racetrack facility or assistant trainer at a horse racetrack facility shall be at least 18 years of age. Each racing official, security employee and mutuel employee shall be at least 18 years of age.

(1) A trainer may waive the right to witness the collection of a test sample from a racing animal when the trainer's authorized representative witnessing the collection of the test sample is less than 18 years of age. The trainer shall execute a voluntary and knowing waiver of the right to witness the collection of the test sample prior to the time the trainer is licensed by the commission. Each trainer waiving the right to witness the collection of a test sample from a racing animal is estopped from later claiming any defect in the process of collecting and identifying the test sample.

(m) Each employer at a race track facility shall immediately notify the commission office at the racetrack facility and the organization licensee when a licensee's employment is terminated. Each employer shall make an effort to secure the employee's occupation license and, if the license is secured, shall deliver the license to the commission office at the racetrack facility. Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Thursday, February 27, in the Topeka-Shawnee County Health Agency auditorium, 1615 S.W. 8th, Topeka, to consider revocation of K.A.R. 28-16-29 and adoption of K.A.R. 28-16-30 (new) through 28-16-36 as permanent rules of the Department of Health and Environconcerning certification and training requirements for operators of public water supply systems and wastewater treatment facilities.

In proposed regulation 28-16-31, training requirements for all public water supply system and wastewater treatment facility operators, Class I through IV are increased from six hours every four years to 10 hours every two years. This is being proposed to help make operators aware of the increasingly complex regulations and more advanced technical requirements necessary for compliance. Over the past decade both potable water and wastewater treatment technology has become more complex, requiring better trained and more technically competent operators. This trend is projected to continue for at least the next decade. Even without the increased regulatory requirements there is a general public expectation and demand for better water to drink and better treated wastewater discharged to our Kansas waterways. These proposed regulations are designed to support an improved operator training and certification program.

Additionally, proposed regulation 28-16-35 will increase fees which have been static since 1975. These fees are used to partially cover the cost of administering examinations, issuing certificates of competency, managing the operator correspondence course, and providing reciprocity for operators from other states. The regulation change also provides two additional operator classes; an operator in training class and a small system class. Certificate renewals are proposed to be biannual rather than annual to reduce staff manpower requirements. The total income expected is approximately \$52,780 rather than the \$19,800 collected in FY 1991. Thus, the fiscal impact of this increase will

be approximately \$33,000.

The time period between the publication of this notice and the scheduled hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties also will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views, orally or in writing, concerning the adoption of the proposed regulations. In order to give all persons an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to limit oral presentations to five minutes.

Following the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered as the basis for making changes in these proposals.
