Each bidder shall file a sworn statement executed by or on behalf of the person, firm, association or corporation submitting the bid, certifying that such person, firm, association or corporation has not, either directly or indirectly, entered into any agreement, participated in any collusion, or otherwise taken any action in restraint of free competitive bidding in connection with the submitted bid. This sworn statement shall be in the form of an affidavit executed and sworn to by the bidder before a person who is authorized by the laws of the state to administer oaths. The required form of the affidavit will be provided by the state to each prospective bidder. Failure to submit the sworn statement as part of the bid-approval package will make the bid nonresponsive and not eligible for award consideration.

Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct

Advisory Opinion No. 91-34

Written September 26, 1991, to Melvin Snoke, Larned.

This opinion is in response to your letter of June 11, 1991, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the conflict of interest laws.

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as a Drivers License Examiner I whose major responsibilities include testing and issuing licenses and filing necessary reports in Topeka.

You advise us that you have had several part-time jobs and are considering purchasing a small acreage with a house.

You ask whether the conflict of interest law prohibits the part-time incomes or possible rent on investment income you have described.

We have reviewed the act in its entirety and assuming the transactions are all commercially reasonable, i.e., you are paying and being paid reasonable amounts, that under these circumstances there are no violations of the conflict laws.

Advisory Opinion No. 91-35

Written September 26, 1991, to the Honorable Janis Lee, State Senator, Kensington.

This opinion is in response to your letter of August 15, 1991, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the conflict of interest laws.

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as a state senator.

You tell us you have been serving on the Performance Measures and Standards Workgroup at the request of the State Board of Education for the past several months. The new federal Carl Perkins legislation mandates that all states develop performance measures and standards for all vocational education in order to continue eligibility for federal funds. You were asked to serve on this workgroup because of your tenure as chairperson of the Evaluation Committee (from 1983 to 1988) for the Kansas Council on Employment and Training. You usually meet one or two days per month for a working session of eight to nine hours each, plus you each do a lot of reading of materials in between each session.

You are reimbursed by the State Department of Education for your work on this workgroup. For your sessions prior to July 1, 1991, they have paid your mileage to each meeting, actual cost of your motel room, per diem, plus a \$25 consultation fee per day of actual meeting, which they have labeled an honorarium. Any time you spend for this workshop takes away from your regular employment and is not reimbursable from the state as a legislative activity.

You also state that you have been appointed by the Governor to serve as chairperson of the Kansas Council on Employment and Training. It is traditional for all

members serving on the council to be reimbursed for mileage and per diem.

You ask whether the new ethics legislation allows you to be reimbursed for these services in the manner you have described.

As a general rule the recent amendments to the ethics laws deal with greater restrictions on the amounts state officers and employees may receive from entities with special interests. And while state agencies certainly have special interests in relationship to legislative activity, it is our opinion that a specific section of the law deals with the situation where a legislator serves on a state board and receives the same compensation as all other members of the board.

K.S.A. 46-233(b) states:

No individual shall, while a legislator or within one year after the expiration of a term as a legislator, be interested pecuniarily, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the state, which contract is funded in whole or in part by any appropriation or is authorized by any law passed during such term, except that the prohibition of this subsection (b) shall not apply to any contract interest in relation to which a disclosure statement is filed as provided by K.S.A. 46-239.

Thus, it is our opinion since you are not receiving legislative pay for these services, so long as the disclosure statement is filed, that the situations you have described are permissible.

Advisory Opinion No. 91-36

Written September 26, 1991, to the Honorable Kerry Patrick, State Representative, Leawood.

This opinion is in response to your letter of August 17, 1991, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the reporting of substantial interests.

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as a state representative.

You advise us that you have the right to acquire an amount of stock in a Kansas corporation in which you would be a minority stockholder for a sum of money which is greater than \$5,000. You are also providing some general non-legal advice to the corporation for no consideration or compensation. The only economic interest that you have is the option to invest a significant sum of money in the corporation at some time in the future.

You ask whether a stock option constitutes a "substantial interest" in the firm on which you hold the option.

K.S.A. 46-229(a) defines "substantial interest" in part to mean:

If an individual or an individual's spouse, either individually or collectively, has owned within the preceding 12 months a legal or equitable interest exceeding \$5,000 or 5% of any business, whichever is less, the individual has a substantial interest in that business.

The operative language is whether a stock option

constitutes "having owned a legal or equitable interest." In our view, the purpose of this section is to advance disclosure of important financial interests. Thus we believe the term "equitable" includes stock options and they must be reported as such.

Advisory Opinion No. 91-37

Written September 26, 1991, to William W. Sneed, Gehrt & Roberts, Chartered, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of September 4, 1991, in which you request clarification of Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct Opinion No. 91-33 and 91-21.

In Opinion No. 91-33, this commission decided that the new amendments to K.S.A. 46-237 limited the amount a person licensed, regulated or inspected by a state agency could give to an employee of the agency to \$40 in a calendar year, including the provision of hospitality in the form of food and beverage in the \$40 limit.

We understand you to ask whether the hospitality inclusion in the \$40 threshold also applies to trade associations and lobbyists for a specific regulated, licensed or inspected entity.

It is our opinion, so long as the funds expended by a trade association come from its general fund, and since it is not itself regulated, licensed or inspected, that the hospitality inclusion in the \$40 threshold is not legislatively mandated. Thus, while the gift limitation of \$40 still applies, expenditures for hospitality are not included.

A lobbyist on the other hand is clearly an agent of his or her employer and when the funding of the hospitality is traceable to a particular employer, it is included in the \$40 threshold.

You also raise questions concerning Opinion No. 91-21. We have directed our staff to obtain further information from you and we will respond to those issues in a separate opinion.

Advisory Opinion No. 91-38

Written October 17, 1991, William W. Sneed, Gehrt & Roberts, Chartered, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of September 4, 1991, in which you request clarification concerning Opinion No. 91-33. A portion of your questions were answered in Opinion No. 91-37. In this opinion we take up the remaining question.

As we understand your remaining question, you ask if a speech is being given, may the state officer or employee receive a free meal provided at or near the time of the speech.

K.S.A. 46-237(f) states:

No state officer or employee shall accept any payment of honoraria for any speaking engagement except that a member of the state legislature or a part-time officer or employee of the executive branch of government shall be allowed to receive reimbursement in the preparation for and the making of a presentation at a speaking engagement in an amount fixed by the Kansas commission on governmental standards and conduct prior to the

acceptance of the speaking engagement. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit the reimbursement of state officers and employees for reasonable expenses incurred in attending seminars, conferences and other speaking engagements.

Since the section would permit a reasonable expense for a meal to be reimbursed, it makes no sense to preclude the meal from being directly provided and we so rule. Please keep in mind that this rule applies only to the provision of a meal that is reasonable and necessary for the giving of the speech. Other meals or registration fees that provide for extraneous privileges such as golf or tennis fees are not permissible if the value exceeds \$40.

Advisory Opinion No. 91-39

Written November 21, 1991, to all interested persons:

This opinion is issued by the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the issue of the acceptance by state officers and employees of fees for giving speeches. Please note this opinion does not relate to legislators or part-time state employees.

Chapter 150, Section 26(f) of the 1991 *Session Laws of Kansas* states:

No state officer or employee shall accept any payment of honoraria for any speaking engagement except that a member of the state legislature or a part-time officer or employee of the executive branch of government shall be allowed to receive reimbursement in the preparation for and the making of a presentation at a speaking engagement in an amount fixed by the Kansas commission on governmental standards and conduct prior to the acceptance of the speaking engagement. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit the reimbursement of state officers and employees for reasonable expenses incurred in attending seminars, conferences and other speaking engagements.

The question is the definition to be given to the word "honoraria."

Historically, an "honoraria" was the fee given to a barrister in England. Since barristers did not charge a fee but rather received a donation from their client, the term came to mean an amount received for a service where no amount was agreed upon in advance.

Obviously this definition cannot be what the legislature had in mind, since the entire section could be avoided by just agreeing on an amount of compensation up front. Also, we believe the word has historically developed into a well understood meaning in the governmental context and that an "honoraria" is:

Any amount paid to a state officer or employee for giving a speech when the primary reason the state officer or employee was invited to give the speech was because of his or her position in state government.

In determining the primary purpose, factors to be considered include:

(1) The importance of position in state government of the state officer or employee. Thus, if a person is

in a major policy making position, it is likely that the acceptance of honoraria is prohibited;

(2) Whether the grantor of the honoraria has a special interest concerning the duties of the state officer or employee;

(3) Whether the speech deals with scientific or technical data within the area of expertise of the state officer or employee's knowledge, as opposed to whether the speech deals with aspects of the duties of the state officer or employee.

Advisory Opinion No. 91-40

Written November 21, 1991, to the Honorable Phil Kline, State Representative, Overland Park.

This opinion is in response to your letter of November 4, 1991, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*).

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as a state representative. You state you hold a substantial interest in Shafer, Kline & Warren, P.A.

You ask under what circumstances the company can contract with the state and what are your disclosure requirements.

1991 *Session Laws of Kansas*, Chapter 150, Section 25(b) states:

No individual shall, while a legislator or within one year after the expiration of a term as legislator, be interested pecuniarily, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the state, which contract is funded in whole or in part by any appropriation or is authorized by any law passed during such term, except that the prohibition of this subsection (b) shall not apply to any contract interest in relation to which a disclosure statement is filed as provided by K.S.A. 46-239, and amendments thereto.

Thus, it is permissible for your firm to contract with the state so long as the statement required by the 1991 *Session Laws of Kansas*, Chapter 150, Section 27, is properly filed. There are no additional disclosure requirements.

Advisory Opinion No. 91-41

Written December 17, 1991, to A. J. Kotich, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of October 31, 1991, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the conflict of interests law.

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as an attorney for the Department of Human Resources. You indicate that the Kansas Bankers Association has asked you to conduct a seminar concerning the American Disabilities Act and the Kansas Act Against Discrimination. You would take annual leave to conduct the seminar and would be paid by the Kansas Bankers Association for your presentation.

You ask whether you may accept a fee for the presentation. As you are aware K.S.A. 46-237(f) states:

No state officer or employee shall accept any pay-

ment of honoraria for any speaking engagement except that a member of the state legislature or a part-time officer or employee of the executive branch of government shall be allowed to receive reimbursement in the preparation for and the making of a presentation at a speaking engagement in an amount fixed by the Kansas commission on governmental standards and conduct prior to the acceptance of the speaking engagement. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit the reimbursement of state officers and employees for reasonable expenses incurred in attending seminars, conferences and other speaking engagements.

The question in applying this section is the definition to be given to the term "honoraria." In Opinion No. 91-39, this commission defined "honoraria" as follows:

Any amount paid to a state officer or employee for giving a speech when the primary reason the state officer or employee was invited to give the speech was because of his or her position in state government. In determining the primary purpose, factors to be considered include: (1) The importance of position in state government of the state officer or employee. Thus, if a person is in a major policy making position, it is likely that the acceptance of honoraria is prohibited; (2) Whether the grantor of the honoraria has a special interest concerning the duties of the state officer or employee; (3) Whether the speech deals with scientific or technical data within the area of expertise of the state officer or employee's knowledge, as opposed to whether the speech deals with aspects of the duties of the state officer or employee.

Applying this language to your situation, we understand you are a staff attorney and not the chief legal counsel for the department. We also understand that your duties do not include contracting with banks, regulating banks, inspecting banks, hearing cases concerning banks, or involvement with the banking industry in any other significant matter. Last, it is our understanding that you will be providing a legitimate service involving technical data. Thus, it is our opinion that the situation you describe will not constitute the receipt of an "honoraria" and is therefore permissible.

Advisory Opinion No. 91-42

Written December 17, 1991, to the Honorable Tim Shallenburger, State Representative, Baxter Springs.

This opinion is in response to your letter of December 11, 1991, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct.

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as a state representative. You advise us that you are currently employed by Kansas Information Consortium (KIC) as a sales manager regarding telecommunications products. KIC was selected by competitive bid to provide services to the Information Network of Kansas, a quasi-governmental agency. You indicate that your duties with KIC do not include negotiations with state agencies.

You ask whether there is any conflict of interest between your employment and your position as a state legislator.

K.S.A. 46-233(b) is the only section of the conflict law that might apply to your situation. That section states: "No individual shall, while a legislator or within one year after the expiration of a term as legislator, be interested pecuniarily, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the state, which contract is funded in whole or in part by any appropriation or is authorized by any law passed during such term, except that the prohibition of this subsection (b) shall not apply to any contract interest in relation to which a disclosure statement is filed as provided by K.S.A. 46-239, and amendments thereto.

It is our opinion, so long as you file the required disclosure statement, that the situation you have described is permissible.

Advisory Opinion No. 91-43

Written December 17, 1991, to all interested persons:

This opinion is issued by the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct pursuant to K.S.A. 46-254 on its own motion to determine the extent of acceptable gifts of travel to state officers and employees from persons with special interests.

As background it should be noted that 1991 *Session Laws of Kansas*, Chapter 150, Section 26(a) & (b) generally set a \$40 limit in a calendar year on the amount of any gift to a state officer or employee from a person with a special interest. 1991 *Session Laws of Kansas*, Chapter 150, Section 26(d) exempts from these two subsections the following:

Hospitality in the form of recreation, food and beverage are presumed not to be given to influence a state officer or employee in the performance of such officer's or employee's official duties or prospective official duties, except when a particular course of official action is to be followed as a condition thereon. For the purposes of this subsection, the term recreation shall not include the providing or the payment of the cost of transportation or lodging.

The issue for determination in this opinion is the costs to be assessed when a lobbyist takes a state officer or employee to an excepted recreation activity by personal automobile. For example, what costs are assessed when a lobbyist takes a legislator from Topeka to Kansas City for a Royals or Chiefs game.

In our opinion, costs associated with travel by automobile are not easily subject to valuation when more than one person is using the vehicle for transportation. Thus, we will not assess a value to these costs when they are associated with the provision of recreation, so long as the travel is provided by a personally owned or operated motor vehicle of the donor. This provision shall not apply to vehicles rented or leased for the specific event.

A summary of the proposed pesticide management plan is as follows:

The proposed pesticide management plan includes the following components: management and conservation practices, education, monitoring, research, enforcement and evaluation. A summary of these components is as follows:

1. Management and conservation practices concern the use, application, handling or loading of atrazine near any public or private water supply, on any cropland or non-cropland, rates of application of atrazine, the creation and maintenance of buffer zones or similar strips around streams or other riparian areas, the creation of field borders, and the encouragement of maintaining current prohibitions on the use of atrazine on state and federal lands within the proposed district.
2. Education of the people within and/or affected by the proposed pesticide management area regarding the proper use, handling, loading and application of atrazine.
3. The Kansas State Board of Agriculture proposes implementation of a program to monitor the use, handling, loading and application of atrazine within the pesticide management area.
4. The Kansas State Board of Agriculture proposes conducting studies and research to ascertain ways of controlling and minimizing the introduction of atrazine into waters of the state of Kansas.
5. The Kansas State Board of Agriculture will enforce the provisions of the pesticide management area as provided by law.
6. The test results of atrazine levels in the pesticide management area would be evaluated at least annually to determine what additional changes, if any, are needed.

All interested persons may attend the hearing and will be given an opportunity to express comments either orally or in writing, or both. If it is not possible for a person to be present, that person may submit written comments to the secretary of the State Board of Agriculture, 901 S. Kansas Ave., Topeka 66601-1280 on or before March 15, 1992. If you intend to present testimony at the hearing in person or by counsel, prior written notice to the secretary would be helpful in arranging the agenda.

Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 4.—OCCUPATION AND CONCESSIONAIRE LICENSES

112-4-4. Certain prohibited licenses. (a) The stewards or racing judges, with the approval of the commission, may prohibit an applicant from holding an occupation license when, in the opinion of the stewards or racing judges, a conflict of interest is created that reflects adversely on the honesty and integrity of racing.

(b) No commission-licensed veterinarian, racing official, or photo finish operator shall be licensed as an owner.

(c) No commission-licensed jockey, assistant starter, jockey room attendant or valet shall be licensed as a horse owner.

(d) No commission-licensed leadout or patrol judge shall be licensed as a greyhound owner.

(e) No person shall be licensed in any capacity that may constitute a licensing conflict. The fact that persons are married shall not, in and of itself, constitute a licensing conflict. If the stewards or racing judges are concerned that a conflict of interest may exist, they shall conduct a hearing concerning the potential conflict. They shall draft findings of fact and issue a licensing recommendation to the commission concerning the potential conflict. 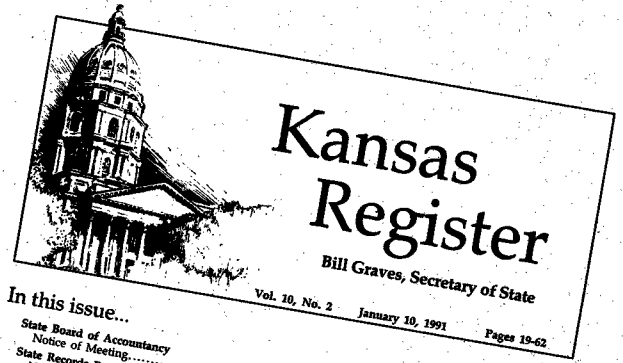
