Attorney General**Opinion No. 92-18**

Constitution of the State of Kansas—Public Institutions and Welfare—Aged and Infirm Persons; Financial Aid; State and County Participation. Representative Anthony Hensley, 58th District, Topeka, February 7, 1992.

Article 7, section 4 of the Kansas Constitution, standing alone, does not impose a mandatory duty on the counties or the state to provide assistance to Kansans who because of age, infirmity, or other misfortune cannot meet their own needs. It does, however, require the legislature to enact statutes which enable the counties to provide assistance. Once the legislature has enacted these statutes, the county has a duty to provide the prescribed assistance. Cited herein: Kan. Const., Art. 7, § 4. MJS

Board of Education**Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations**

The State Board of Education will conduct a public hearing at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 14, in the library of Shawnee Heights High School (9-10 Building), 4141 Shawnee Heights Road, Tecumseh, to consider amendments to Kansas Administrative Regulations 91-12-23 and 91-12-61. These proposed regulations concern special education. The following is a summary of the substance of the proposed regulations and a summary of their anticipated economic impact.

K.A.R. 91-12-23 concerns the granting of waivers from regulatory requirements. The current regulation only allows a waiver of regulations for class size or caseload, age range, and personnel. Flexibility in other areas, such as identification of exceptional students, is needed to facilitate implementation of quality performance accreditation. No fiscal impact is expected.

K.A.R. 91-12-61 concerns the supervision of paraprofessionals. The regulation is being revised to decrease the frequency of supervision required for occupational and physical therapists and speech/language clinicians. Current practice shows that twice-a-week supervision of paraprofessionals by occupational therapists, physical therapists, and speech/language clinicians is neither necessary nor cost effective. The costs for local education agencies should be reduced because they will not be required to hire additional therapists and clinicians.

All interested persons will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views or arguments, either orally or in writing, in regard to the proposed regulations. In addition, the period of public notice hereby provided constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. Such written comments may be submitted to the secretary of the board at the address above. The hearing shall be conducted in compliance with the public hearing procedures of the board.

Notice Concerning Kansas
Retailers' Sales Tax

K.S.A. 79-3606(q) exempts from sales tax "all sales of drugs, as defined by K.S.A. 65-1626 and amendments thereto, dispensed pursuant to a prescription order, as defined by K.S.A. 65-1626 and amendments thereto, by a licensed practitioner."

The Kansas Department of Revenue has determined that sales of drugs, as defined by K.S.A. 65-1626, to a person licensed to practice the healing arts, to include dentistry, optometry, and veterinary medicine, for said person's inventory or for use in the performance of his or her professional services would fall within the exemption under K.S.A. 79-3606(q). Therefore, such sales of drugs to licensed practitioners would be exempt from Kansas state and local sales tax.

Additionally, the provisions of K.S.A. 79-3606(q) would also exempt from sales tax the sale of drugs, as defined by K.S.A. 65-1626, when dispensed pursuant to a prescription order by a person licensed to practice the healing arts, to include dentistry, optometry and veterinary medicine.

This notice supersedes all previous Kansas Department of Revenue rulings, opinions, and decisions regarding the purchase and sale of "drugs" to and by veterinarians, and shall be effective on or after January 1, 1992. See Kansas Department of Revenue, *Revenue Ruling 19-87-1*.

Notice Concerning Kansas
Retailers' Sales Tax

The Kansas Department of Revenue has been asked whether the retail sales of memberships which permit the holder thereof admittance to a retail outlet for the purpose of purchasing tangible personal property at a discount would be subject to the Kansas retailers' sales tax.

K.S.A. 79-3603(e) imposes a sales tax "upon the gross receipts received from the sale of admissions to any place providing amusement, entertainment or recreation services including admissions to state, county, district and local fairs, but such tax shall not be levied and collected upon the gross receipts from fees and charges by political subdivisions of the state of Kansas for participation in sports, games and other recreational activities or from sales of admissions to any cultural and historical event which occurs triennially."

The Director of Taxation has determined that K.S.A. 79-3603(e) does not impose sales tax on the retail sale of memberships which permit the holder thereof admittance to a retail outlet for the purpose of purchasing tangible personal property at a discount.

A public hearing will be conducted at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, March 24, in the Department of Revenue conference room, second floor, Docking State Office Building, 915 S.W. Harrison, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed rules and regulations and changes to existing rules and regulations of the Department of Revenue.

This 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the General Counsel, Department of Revenue, 2nd Floor, Docking State Office Building, Topeka 66612-1588. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing.

These regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 92-12-112. Sales factor numerator; assignment of sales of a corporation which is a member of a unitary group of corporations. This proposed regulation implements a change in the accounting method of computation of Kansas sales for purposes of the sales factor of the corporate income tax apportionment formula. It bases sales factor throwback under K.S.A. 79-3286(b)(2) on the activities of all unitary group members as opposed to only the member making the interstate sale.

There are negligible additional administrative costs to the Department of Revenue, because this regulation slightly increases the number of corporate income tax-paying entities in Kansas. However, the total number of returns to be processed may well be decreasing as more groups of unitary corporations begin to file single returns under K.A.R. 92-12-110. There are no additional costs to other governmental agencies or units or to corporate income taxpayers.

There will be no change to overall corporate income tax revenues as a result of this regulation. A Kansas manufacturer will tend to have a smaller Kansas apportionment percentage, income and tax. Manufacturers which deliver goods into Kansas will tend to have a larger Kansas apportionment percentage, income and tax. These two opposite trends will generally result in no net change in revenue. Most taxpayers are not affected by this regulation.

K.A.R. 92-51-34. License plates; extension of time for new issuance. Amendments to this regulation extend the issuance of license plates from 1993 to 1994. The amendments would reduce expenditures for the Department of Revenue for FY 92 from \$3,804,757 to \$1,075,292. There is no economic impact to the general public.

K.A.R. 92-52-9. Definition of moving violation. This regulation provides a definition of moving violation, and amendments to this regulation designate moving violations as required by K.S.A. 8-249 and deletes violations under Chapter 8, Articles 17 and 19. There is no economic impact to governmental agencies or the general public.

K.A.R. 92-52-9a. Moving violations; suspension or restriction of driving privileges. This proposed regulation provides guidelines for the suspension of driver's licenses for excessive moving violations and establishes uniformity in the administration of the suspension of driver's licenses pursuant to K.S.A. 8-255(a)(2). There is no economic impact to governmental agencies or the general public.

K.A.R. 93-5-1. Valuation notices; physical inspection of property. This proposed regulation defines "physical inspection" for property valuation purposes. There is no economic impact to governmental agencies or the general public.

Article 6.—GOOD TIME CREDITS

44-6-120. Application of good time to record. (a) 360-day year. For the purpose of earning, awarding and applying good time credits, the year shall be calculated as a 360-day period with each month being 30 days in length.

(b) Following recommendation by the unit team and the approval of the warden or designee, good time credits shall be applied to the official inmate record by the records officer of the facility.

(c) Good time credits shall be applied to the inmate's record:

(1) At the initial inmate program classification, 100% of good time credits shall be awarded for the period from the sentence begins date to the date of the program classification, unless there is written documentation in the inmate's record of maladjustment prior to the date of the program classification;

(2) every 120 days;

(3) upon completion of parole eligibility requirement;

(4) upon notification of the parole board's decision.

(d) Application only to minimum until parole eligibility.

(1) Good time credit awards and forfeitures shall be applied only to the minimum sentence until the parole eligibility has been reached.

(2) However, meritorious good time shall be applied simultaneously to both the minimum and maximum sentence.

(3) After parole eligibility has been reached, no further good time credit of any kind shall be awarded on the minimum.

(4) After parole eligibility, all subsequent forfeitures of good time credits shall be utilized to adjust the conditional release date. The inmate shall be considered as proceeding toward the conditional release date following parole eligibility or a parole hearing, subject to any order of the Kansas parole board in passing or continuing the case.

(e) Unit team running tally. The unit team shall keep a running tally of the good time credits earned and awarded, less any good time credits forfeited by disciplinary action.

(f) Records; form and manner set by secretary. Records shall be maintained in a form and manner established by internal management policy and procedure (IMPP) of the secretary. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 75-5210, 75-5251; implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 21-4608, K.S.A. 22-3427; K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 22-3717, as amended by L. 1991, ch. 94, § 1; K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 75-5210, 75-5251; effective, T-84-32, Nov. 23, 1983; amended May 1, 1984; amended Nov. 12, 1990; amended Sept. 30, 1991; amended April 6, 1992.)

44-6-124. Awarding good time. (a) Award each

program classification period; one opportunity to earn good time; guidelines for granting and denying good time.

(1) Good time credits shall be awarded at every program classification designated for that purpose from credits available to be earned for the period since the previous program classification.

(2) All or any part of the credits allocated for that period may be awarded. For time covered by jail credit or prior penal credit, the good time credits shall be presumed to have been earned unless there is written documentation of maladjustment on the part of the inmate prior to the date of the initial program classification.

(3) If the entire allocation of good time credit is not awarded at any program classification, no part of that allocation shall be awarded at a later date. The inmate shall be permitted only one opportunity to earn the good time credits available for each separate period.

(b) For parole eligibility, award of good time credits shall be limited as follows:

(1) Inmates with no class I offenses during the program classification period shall receive at least 50% of the good time credits allocated for that period.

(2) Inmates with no class I or II offenses during the program classification period shall receive at least 60% of the good time credits allocated for that period.

(3) Inmates with no class I, II or III offenses during the program classification period shall receive at least 70% of the good time credits allocated for that period.

(4) Inmates with no class I, II, III or IV offenses during the program classification period shall receive at least 80% of the good time credits allocated for that period.

(5) The balance of the credits above the percentages listed in paragraphs (a)(1) to (a)(4) shall be awarded by the unit team based on factors of good work, behavior, and other performance factors related to effective rehabilitation of the inmate.

(c) Award at discretion of unit team and based on merit. The unit team may refuse to award all or part of that portion of the credits over which it has discretion for:

(1) misbehavior;

(2) poor work;

(3) malingering in educational programs; or

(4) any other relevant reasons determined, explained and documented by the unit team. Inability to work or participate in programs due to legitimate health problems or for other reasons beyond the inmate's control shall not be considered grounds standing alone, for refusing to award good time credits.

(d) In the event a new sentence is imposed against an inmate, good time credits earned on a prior sentence shall not be applied to the subsequent sentence computation for that inmate. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 75-5210, 75-5251; implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 21-4608, K.S.A. 22-3427; K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 22-3717, as amended by L. 1991, ch. 94, § 1; K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 75-5210, 75-5251; effective, T-84-32, Nov. 23, 1983; amended May 1, 1984; amended Nov. 12, 1990; amended Sept. 30, 1991; amended April 6, 1992.)

44-6-125. Good time forfeitures not restored; exceptions; limits; parole. (a) After May 1, 1981, no good time restored. For all inmates, good time which was forfeited on and after May 1, 1981 shall not be restored at a later date. The warden may request an exception in order that standards of basic fairness, equity and justice may be met. In such a case, the warden shall show good cause for restoration of good time credits, in writing, to the secretary or the secretary's designee. Restoration of good time credits by exception shall be granted only upon written approval by the secretary or the secretary's designee. Good time forfeited prior to the first effective date of this regulation, May 15, 1980, may be restored in accordance with the secretary of corrections' policies and procedures then in force and effect.

(b) Forfeit only on minimum until parole eligibility. Prior to parole eligibility, forfeited good time credits shall be subtracted from the amount of good time credits earned toward the parole eligibility only, and not from those credits used to create the conditional release date. After parole eligibility is established, subsequent forfeited credits shall be subtracted from the credits used to form the conditional release date.

(c) Forfeitures limited to awards; no extension of maximum. Good time credits shall not be forfeited in an amount in excess of the good time previously earned and awarded. In cases of a new sentence conviction, disciplinary offenses occurring prior to the effective date of the new sentence which result in the forfeiture of good time credits shall not be applied to the computation. In no case shall forfeiture of good time extend the controlling maximum sentence nor shall it interfere with or bypass any statutorily fixed parole eligibility that is not controlled by good time credits.

(d) No parole eligibility if forfeited time remains unserved. If good time credits on the term have been forfeited, an inmate shall not be eligible for parole until the inmate has served the time which otherwise would have been subtracted from the term by the application of the credits, or has obtained a restoration of those credits.

(e) Forfeitures made by disciplinary process. Forfeiture of good time credits may be ordered by the disciplinary board or hearing officer as a penalty for the inmate's commission of certain offenses as set out in K.A.R. 44-12-1 *et seq.* and 44-13-1 *et seq.* (Authorized by K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 75-5210, 75-5251; implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 21-4608, K.S.A. 22-3427; K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 22-3717, as amended by L. 1991, ch. 94, § 1; K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 75-5210, 75-5251; effective, T-84-32, Nov. 23, 1983; amended May 1, 1984; amended Nov. 12, 1990; amended April 6, 1992.)

44-6-135. Prior penal credit. (a) Prior penal credit shall be computed and applied by department of corrections' personnel.

(b) To compute prior penal credit for court releases, the effective date of the sentence shall be subtracted from the date of the final disposition of the court by release on probation, appeal bond, or vacating of the sentence. Pre-sentence evaluation time spent at the

Topeka correctional facility or any other facility designated by the secretary of corrections shall not be considered as prior penal credit, but shall be considered jail credit.

(c) To compute prior penal credit for an aggregate sentence, the sentence begins date of the earlier, controlling minimum sentence date shall be subtracted from the release date and applied as follows:

(1) The actual time incarcerated, not exceeding an amount equal to the previous minimum sentence less the maximum amount of good time credit that could have been earned under the law in effect at the time, shall be the prior penal credit available.

(2) The prior penal credit for a mandatory minimum sentence imposed prior to July 1, 1982 shall be restricted to a total credit equal to the actual time served prior to July 1, 1982, and the remaining minimum time to serve less all good time credits which could have been earned after July 1, 1982.

(3) The prior penal credit for a life sentence shall not exceed 15 years or the aggregated 15 years. The remainder of the credit shall be credited as maximum sentence credit.

(4) Accelerated parole eligibility dates under K.S.A. 1988 Supp. 22-3725 shall be credited to May 19, 1988 if the accelerated date was prior to the effective parole eligibility date under that statute.

(5) Accelerated parole eligibility dates under K.S.A. 1989 Supp. 22-3725 shall be credited to August 1, 1989 if the accelerated parole eligibility date was prior to the effective date of that statute.

(6) Parole eligibilities between July 1974 and January 1979, which were established at the discretion of the secretary of corrections upon attainment of the lowest minimum custody status, shall be credited with the actual time served from the sentence begins date of the earlier controlling minimum sentence. This credit shall not exceed the maximum amount of good time credits provided by K.A.R. 44-6-116 that could have been earned on the minimum sentence.

(d) Computations of prior penal credit shall be subject to the provisions of K.A.R. 44-6-134, 44-6-136, 44-6-137, and 44-6-138. 28-31-8a. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-3431, as amended by L. 1987, Ch. 295, Sec. 6; effective, T-85-42, Dec. 19, 1984; effective May 1, 1985; amended May 1, 1987; amended May 1, 1988; revoked April 6, 1992.)

28-31-10a. Off-site hazardous waste treatment fees. (a) Each off-site hazardous waste treatment facility shall pay a fee proportionate to the quantity of hazardous waste treated. This fee shall be based upon the following schedule:

| Type of Facility | Fee |
|---|--|
| Treatment | \$10 per ton — not to exceed a total of \$200,000 per year for any single facility |
| Treatment for material or energy recovery | \$.50 per ton — not to exceed a total of \$50,000 per year for any single facility |

For the purpose of calculating these fees, the term:

(1) "treatment" shall mean an off-site facility that is regulated as a hazardous waste treatment facility under the provisions of 40 CFR 264 or 265 as in effect on July 1, 1991;

(2) "treatment for energy recovery" shall apply only to the burning of hazardous wastes in a boiler or industrial furnace and only when the waste being burned contains a minimum heat value of 5,000 BTU per pound; and

(3) "treatment for material recovery" shall apply only to the treatment of hazardous wastes in a boiler or industrial furnace and only when the wastes have a heat value not greater than 5,000 BTU per pound and a total organic content not greater than 500 parts per million and are used as a legitimate substitute for a raw material to produce a marketable product.

(b) Payment of the treatment fees assessed under subsection (a) of this regulation shall be made quarterly. The quarterly fee shall be paid on or before the 15th day of April, July, October, and January for the preceding three month period ending the last day of March, June, September, and December.

(c) Each treatment fee payment shall be:

(1) made by check or money order made payable to the "Kansas department of health and environment — attention: environmental permit fund"; and

(2) accompanied by a form, furnished by the department and completed by the facility operator. The form shall state the total weight of hazardous wastes treated during the reporting period and shall provide sufficient information to verify findings that a treatment process qualified as material or energy recovery. With the exception of certain "qualified tax-exempt obligations," the code provides that banks and thrift institutions may not deduct any portion of

the interest cost of purchasing or carrying tax-exempt obligations such as the bonds. The city does intend to designate the bonds as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" under Section 265 of the code.

Legal Opinion

The bonds will be sold subject to the legal opinion of Nichols and Wolfe Chartered, Topeka, Kansas, bond counsel, whose approving legal opinion as to the validity of the bonds will be furnished and paid for by the city, printed on the bonds and delivered to the successful bidder when the bonds are delivered. Said opinion will also state that in the opinion of bond counsel, assuming continued compliance by the city with the provisions of the ordinance authorizing the issuance of the bonds and the code, under existing law, the interest on the bonds is excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes. Interest on the bonds will also be excludable from the computation of Kansas adjusted gross income.

Delivery and Payment

The city will pay for printing the bonds and will deliver the bonds, without cost to the successful bidder, properly prepared, executed and registered, on or about April 9, 1992, at such bank or trust company in the state of Kansas or the greater Kansas City, Missouri, metropolitan area as may be specified by the successful bidder. Delivery elsewhere will be at the expense of the successful bidder. Said bidder will also be furnished with a certified transcript of the proceedings evidencing the authorization and issuance of the bonds and the usual closing documents, including a certificate that there is no litigation pending or threatened at the time of delivery of the bonds affecting their validity and a certificate regarding the completeness and accuracy of the official statement. Payment for the bonds shall be made in Federal Reserve funds, immediately subject to use by the city. The denominations of the bonds and the names, addresses and Social Security or taxpayer identification numbers of the registered owners shall be submitted in writing by the successful bidder to the city and bond registrar not later than 4 p.m. C.S.T. on March 23, 1992. In the absence of such information, the city will deliver bonds in the denomination of each maturity registered in the name of the successful bidder.

The successful bidder shall furnish the city by 4 p.m. C.S.T. on March 23, 1992, a certificate acceptable to the city's bond counsel to the effect that: (i) the successful bidder has made a bona fide public offering of the bonds at the initial reoffering prices, and (ii) a substantial amount of the bonds was sold to the public (excluding brokers and other intermediaries) at such initial reoffering prices. Such certificate shall state that: (1) it is made on the best knowledge, information and belief of the successful bidder, and (2) 10 percent or more in par amount of the bonds of each maturity was sold to the public at or below the initial reoffering prices (such amount being sufficient to establish the sale of a "substantial amount" of the bonds).

Good Faith Deposit

Each bid shall be accompanied by a cashier's or cer-

tified check drawn on a bank located in the United States of America in the amount of \$15,800, payable to the order of the city to secure the city from any loss resulting from the failure of the bidder to comply with the terms of the bid. No interest will be paid upon the deposit made by the successful bidder. Said check shall be returned to the bidder if the bid is not accepted. If a bid is accepted, said check shall be held by the city until the bidder shall have complied with all of the terms and conditions of this notice, at which time said check shall, at the option of the city, be returned to the successful bidder or deducted from the purchase price. If a bid is accepted but the city shall fail to deliver the bonds to the bidder in accordance with the terms and conditions of this notice, said check shall be returned to the bidder. If a bid is accepted but the bidder shall default in the performance of any of the terms and conditions of this notice, the proceeds of such check shall be forfeited to the city, and the city reserves the right to pursue any consequential damages available to it as a result of such default.

CUSIP Numbers

CUSIP identification numbers will be printed on the bonds, but neither the failure to print such number on any bond nor any error with respect thereto shall constitute cause for failure or refusal by the purchaser thereof to accept delivery of and pay for the bonds in accordance with the terms of this notice. All expenses in relation to the assignment and printing of CUSIP numbers on the bonds will be paid by the city.

Bid Forms

All bids must be made on forms which may be procured from the city clerk. No additions or alterations in such forms shall be made and any erasures may cause rejection of any bid. The city reserves the right to waive irregularities and to reject any or all bids.

Submission of Bids

Bids must be submitted in sealed envelopes addressed to the undersigned city clerk and marked "Proposal for the Purchase of General Obligation Bonds." Bids may be submitted by mail or delivered in person to the undersigned at city hall and must be received by the undersigned prior to 2 p.m. C.S.T. on Tuesday, March 10, 1992.

Date and Delivery of Preliminary and Final Official Statement

The city has authorized the preparation and disbursement of a preliminary official statement containing information relating to the bonds. The preliminary official statement comprises the final official statement required by Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

The preliminary official statement, when amended to include the interest rates specified by the purchaser and the price or yield at which the purchaser will reoffer the bonds to the public, together with any other information required by law, will constitute a "Final Official Statement" with respect to the bonds as that term is defined in Rule 15c2-12. No more than seven business days after the date of the sale, the city will

provide without cost to the underwriter such reasonable number of printed copies of the final official statement and further copies, if desired, will be made available at the purchaser's expense. If the sale of the bonds are awarded to a syndicate, the city will designate the senior managing purchaser of the syndicate as its agent for purposes of distributing copies of the final official statement to each participating purchaser. Any purchaser executing and delivering a bid form with respect to the bonds agrees thereby that if the bid is accepted it shall accept such designation and shall enter into a contractual relationship with all participating purchasers for the purpose of assuring the receipt and distribution by each such participating purchaser of the final official statement.

The city will deliver to the purchaser on the date of delivery of the bonds a certificate executed by the mayor and the city clerk to the effect that the final official statement, as of the date of delivery of the bonds, does not contain any untrue statement of a material fact or omit to state a material fact necessary to make the statements made, in the light of the circumstances in which they are made, not misleading.

Assessed Valuation and Indebtedness

The total assessed valuation of the taxable tangible property (including motor vehicles) within the city as of August 25, 1991, is \$59,035,802. The total general obligation bonded indebtedness of the city as of the date of the bonds, including the bonds, is \$6,976,316, including, as of the date of the bonds, temporary notes outstanding in the principal amount of \$1,095,000, of which \$800,000 will be retired out of the proceeds of the bonds herein offered for sale, with the balance being payable from other legally available and unencumbered funds of the city.

SENATE BILL No. 489

AN ACT relating to records of the division of vehicles; concerning fees charged for information from such records; amending K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-2012 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-2012 is hereby amended to read as follows: 74-2012. (a) All records of the division of vehicles relating to the physical or mental condition of any person or to expungement shall be confidential. Records of the division relating to diversion agreements for the purposes of K.S.A. 8-1567, 12-4415 and 22-2908, and amendments thereto, shall be confidential and shall be disclosed by direct computer access only to: (1) A city, county or district attorney, for the purpose of determining a person's eligibility for diversion; (2) a municipal or district court, for the purpose of using the record in connection with any matter before the court; (3) a law enforcement agency, for the purpose of supplying the record to a person authorized to obtain it under (1) or (2); or (4) an employer when a person is required to retain a commercial driver's license due to the nature of such person's employment.

All other records of the division of vehicles shall be subject to the provisions of the open records act except as otherwise provided by this section.

(b) Lists of persons' names and addresses contained in or derived from records of the division of vehicles shall not be sold, given or received for the purposes prohibited by K.S.A. 21-3914, and amendments thereto, except that:

(1) The director of vehicles may provide to a requesting party, and a requesting party may receive, such a list and accompanying information from public records of the division upon written certification that the requesting party shall use the list solely for the purpose of: (A) Assisting manufacturers of motor vehicles in compiling statistical reports or in notifying owners of vehicles believed to: (i) Have safety-related defects, (ii) fail to comply with emission standards or (iii) have any defect to be remedied at the expense of the manufacturer; or (B) assisting an insurer authorized to do business in this state, or the insurer's authorized agent, in processing an application for, or renewal or cancellation of, a motor vehicle liability insurance policy.

(2) Any law enforcement agency of this state which has access to public records of the division may furnish to a requesting party, and a requesting party may receive, such a list and accompanying information from such records upon written certification that the requesting party shall use the list solely for the purpose of assisting an insurer authorized to do business in this state, or the insurer's authorized agent, in processing an application for, or renewal or cancellation of, a motor vehicle liability insurance policy.

(c) If a law enforcement agency of this state furnishes information to a requesting party pursuant to subsection (b)(2), the law enforcement agency shall charge the fee prescribed by the secretary of revenue and approved by the director of accounts and reports pursuant to subsection (c)(5) of K.S.A. 45-219, and amendments thereto, for any copies furnished and may charge an additional fee to be retained by the law enforcement agency to cover its cost of providing such copies. The fee prescribed pursuant to subsection (c)(5) of K.S.A. 45-219, and amendments thereto, shall be paid monthly to the secretary of revenue.

(d) The secretary of revenue, the secretary's agents or employees, the director of vehicles or the director's agents or employees shall not be liable for damages caused by any negligent or wrongful act or omission of a law enforcement agency in furnishing any information obtained from records of the division of vehicles.

(e) A fee in an amount fixed by the secretary of revenue and approved by the director of accounts and reports pursuant to subsection (c)(5) of K.S.A. 45-219, and amendments thereto, of not less than \$2 for each request for information in the public records of the division concerning any vehicle or licensed driver shall be charged by the division, except that the director may charge a lesser fee pursuant to a contract between the secretary of revenue and any person to whom the director is authorized to furnish information under subsection (b), and such fee shall not be less than the minimum fee established under this subsection and shall not be

less than the cost of production or reproduction of any information requested. Of the amount charged for each such fee Except for the fees charged pursuant to a contract for title and registration records on vehicles authorized by this subsection, \$1 shall be credited to the highway patrol training center fund for each fee charged.

(f) The secretary of revenue may adopt such rules and regulations as are necessary to implement the provisions of this section.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-2012 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

DEPARTMENT OF SOCIAL AND REHABILITATION SERVICES

(a) There is appropriated for the above agency from the following special revenue fund all moneys now or hereafter lawfully credited to and available in such fund, except that expenditures other than refunds authorized by law shall not exceed the following:

Provided, That all receipts resulting from payments under title XIX of the federal social security act to any of the institutions under mental health and retardation services may be credited to this fund: *Provided further*, That the moneys in this fund may be used for transfers to state institutions under the jurisdiction of mental health and retardation services, for expenditures for contractual services to provide for collecting additional payments under title XVIII and title XIX of the federal social security act, for expenditures for annual premium surcharges required to be paid to the health care stabilization fund, and for transfers to the social welfare fund.

(b) On the effective date of this act, the appropriation made by section 2(b) of chapter 11 of the 1991 Session Laws of Kansas for the department of social and rehabilitation services of all moneys lawfully credited to and available in the institutional receipts from title XIX — federal fund is hereby lapsed.

(c) On the effective date of this act, or as soon thereafter as moneys are available, the director of accounts and reports may transfer, in one or more amounts, from the institutional receipts from title XIX — federal fund to the social welfare fund the amount specified by the secretary of social and rehabilitation services.

(d) The director of accounts and reports shall not make the transfer directed to be made by section 2(e) of chapter 11 of the 1991 Session Laws of Kansas from the institutional receipts from title XIX — federal fund to the social welfare fund.

Sec. 3.

LARNED STATE HOSPITAL

(a) On the effective date of this act, or as soon thereafter as moneys are available, the director of accounts and reports may transfer, in one or more amounts, from the institutional receipts from the title XIX — federal fund of the department of social and rehabilitation services to the title XIX fund of Larned state hospital the amount specified by the secretary of social and rehabilitation services.

(b) The director of accounts and reports shall not make the transfer directed to be made by section 4(c) of chapter 11 of the 1991 Session Laws of Kansas from the institutional receipts from title XIX — federal fund of the department of social and rehabilitation services to the title XIX fund of Larned state hospital.

(c) The director of accounts and reports may transfer, in one or more amounts, from the title XIX fund of Larned state hospital to

the social welfare fund of the department of social and rehabilitation services the amount specified by the superintendent and any such transfer shall be in addition to any expenditure limitation imposed on the title XIX fund of Larned state hospital.

Sec. 4.

OSAWATOMIE STATE HOSPITAL

(a) On the effective date of this act, or as soon thereafter as moneys are available, the director of accounts and reports may transfer, in one or more amounts, from the institutional receipts from the title XIX — federal fund of the department of social and rehabilitation services to the title XIX fund of Osawatomi state hospital the amount specified by the secretary of social and rehabilitation services.

(b) The director of accounts and reports shall not make the transfer directed to be made by section 5(c) of chapter 11 of the 1991 Session Laws of Kansas from the institutional receipts from title XIX — federal fund of the department of social and rehabilitation services to the title XIX fund of Osawatomi state hospital.

(c) The director of accounts and reports may transfer, in one or more amounts, from the title XIX fund of Osawatomi state hospital to the social welfare fund of the department of social and rehabilitation services the amount specified by the superintendent and any such transfer shall be in addition to any expenditure limitation imposed on the title XIX fund of Osawatomi state hospital.

Sec. 5.

RAINBOW MENTAL HEALTH FACILITY

(a) On the effective date of this act, or as soon thereafter as moneys are available, the director of accounts and reports may transfer, in one or more amounts, from the institutional receipts from the title XIX — federal fund of the department of social and rehabilitation services to the title XIX fund of Rainbow mental health facility the amount specified by the secretary of social and rehabilitation services.

(b) The director of accounts and reports shall not make the transfer directed to be made by section 7(c) of chapter 11 of the 1991 Session Laws of Kansas from the institutional receipts from title XIX — federal fund of the department of social and rehabilitation services to the title XIX fund of Rainbow mental health facility.

(c) The director of accounts and reports may transfer, in one or more amounts, from the title XIX fund of Rainbow mental health facility to the social welfare fund of the department of social and rehabilitation services the amount specified by the superintendent and any such transfer shall be in addition to any expenditure limitation imposed on the title XIX fund of Rainbow mental health facility.

Sec. 6.

TOPEKA STATE HOSPITAL

(a) On the effective date of this act, or as soon thereafter as moneys are available, the director of accounts and reports may transfer, in one or more amounts, from the institutional receipts from the title XIX — federal fund of the department of social and rehabilitation services to the title XIX fund of Topeka state hospital the amount specified by the secretary of social and rehabilitation services.

(b) The director of accounts and reports shall not make the transfer directed to be made by section 8(c) of chapter 11 of the 1991 Session Laws of Kansas from the institutional receipts from title XIX — federal fund of the department of social and rehabilitation services to the title XIX fund of Topeka state hospital.

(c) The director of accounts and reports may transfer, in one or more amounts, from the title XIX fund of Topeka state hospital to the social welfare fund of the department of social and rehabilitation services the amount specified by the superintendent and any such transfer shall be in addition to any expenditure limitation imposed on the title XIX fund of Topeka state hospital.

Sec. 7. *Appeals to exceed limitations.* Upon written application to the governor and approval of the state finance council, expenditures from special revenue funds may exceed the amounts specified in this act.

Sec. 8. *Effective date.* This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

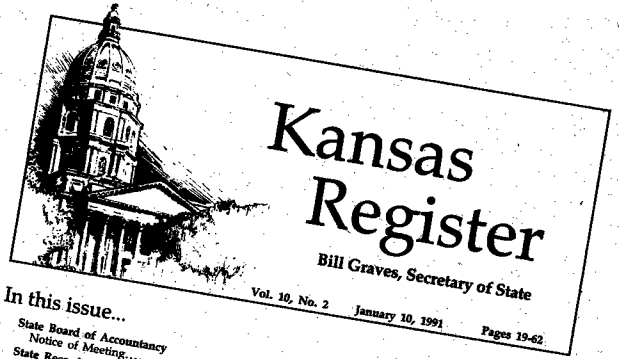
