K.A.R. 74-4-7. Continuing Education Requirements. Amended to allow instructors to obtain credit for preparation time to present programs.

K.A.R. 74-5-2. Definitions. Under Code of Professional Conduct (ethics) to define "Personal Financial Planning" and "Contingent Fees."

K.A.R. 74-5-103. Commissions and Referral Fees. To allow CPAs to accept and pay such fees under limited conditions with written disclosure and, if attained, additional credentials in financial planning.

K.A.R. 74-5-104. Contingent Fees. To allow CPAs to accept under certain specified conditions if written disclosure made to clients.

K.A.R. 74-5-202. Auditing Standards. Annual update to reflect the most current issues of the AICPA Generally Accepted Auditing Standards.

K.A.R. 74-5-203. Accounting Principles. Annual update to reflect the most current issues of the FASB Generally Accepted Accounting Principles.

Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct**Advisory Opinion No. 92-1 (Amended)**

Written February 27, 1992, to Thomas J. Burgardt, Cahilan, Brown, Burgardt & Wurst, Garden City.

This opinion is in response to your letter of January 9, 1992, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct.

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as county counselor for Finney County. You advise us that a county commissioner is considering accepting a position on the Kansas Highway Commission.

You ask whether the commissioner can serve in both positions at the same time.

We note at the outset that the commissioner's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* and K.S.A. 75-4301 *et seq.* Thus, whether some other law applies to your question is not covered by this opinion.

It is our opinion that nothing in either of the above statutes precludes the service in both positions at the same time. However, he must abstain from actions on contracts between the two entities.

Advisory Opinion No. 92-5

Written February 27, 1992, to The Honorable Tim Shallenburger, State Representative, Baxter Springs.

This opinion is in response to your letter of February 11, 1992, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*).

We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction on this matter is limited to the application of the above statute. Thus, whether some other common law or statutory system applies to your question is not covered by this opinion.

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as a state representative. You advise us that the Kansas Association of School Boards has provided free of charge to the Legislature a conference room to hold a legislative hearing on school finance proposals. Clearly, the KASB has a significant interest in the outcome of the hearings.

You ask whether under K.S.A. 46-237 it is permissible for KASB to provide the gift of the room to the Legislature.

K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 46-237(c) states:

No person licensed, inspected or regulated by a state agency shall offer, pay, give or make any economic opportunity, gift, loan, gratuity, special discount, favor, hospitality, or service having an aggregate value of \$40 or more in any calendar year to such agency or any state officer or employee of that agency.

From a review of this section, it is our opinion that only subsection (c) could apply to this situation be-

cause the gift is being given to the agency, not individual members thereof. In addition, since the Legislature does not license, inspect or regulate KASB, it is our view that this subsection does not apply.

In summary, it is our opinion that nothing in K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* prohibits the situation you have described.

Advisory Opinion No. 92-6

Written February 27, 1992, to Bert Cantwell, Superintendent, Kansas Highway Patrol, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of January 14, 1992, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct.

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as Superintendent of the Kansas Highway Patrol. You advise us that the Kansas Highway Patrol has been approached by Shoney's Restaurants with a proposal to provide teddy bears for K.H.P. troopers to carry in their patrol cars to give to children who have been involved in automobile accidents or other traumatic incidents. These teddy bears would have a sweater type garment on, which says "Shoney's" across the front.

There would be no cost to the state of Kansas regarding this project and the Highway Patrol would not be involved in promoting Shoney's Restaurants other than the writing on the teddy bear's costume. This would be a statewide project, available to all troopers. You ask whether the situation you have described is permissible.

We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* to your questions. Thus, on the issue of application of some other criminal statute or the commercialization of a state agency, we direct you to the Attorney General's office.

Having reviewed K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* in its entirety, we find no provision in that body of law prohibiting the situation you have described.

Advisory Opinion No. 92-7

Written February 27, 1992, to Dede Smith, Spring Hill.

This opinion is in response to your letter of January 29, 1992, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct.

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as a city council member of the city of Spring Hill and an employee of the Johnson County Airport Commission. You advise us that the Airport Commission is an agency of Johnson County, Kansas, pursuant to K.S.A. 3-302.

You are a salaried employee of the Airport Commission and your compensation exceeds \$2,000.00 per year. You serve as the executive assistant to the director of the commission. Your job description basically consists of secretarial and administrative functions. Specifically this includes secretarial activities, attending commission meetings and the preparation of minutes of the open meetings. You do not routinely attend

executive sessions of the Airport Commission. Your functions do not include the exercise of "sovereign powers" nor do you participate in decisions or otherwise determine how public policy is to be shaped.

Recently the Airport Commission has solicited proposals from various entities for the supply of water to the Airport Commission. The city of Spring Hill has submitted a proposal to the Airport Commission for a long-term contract. The water supply contract is to be based upon evaluating proposals and not on a competitive bid basis. The rate charged for the water supply is contemplated to be on a negotiated basis also. Executive sessions are contemplated to be necessary for the evaluation of the contract proposals with legal counsel.

Several issues arise with respect to your relationship both as a city council member and employee of the Airport Commission with respect to contract negotiations which are as follows:

1. Does a conflict arise if you as an employee or council member, attend executive sessions conducted by either entity pertaining to the contemplated contracts?
2. As an employee obviously you do not have voting rights with respect to the commission; but as a city council member, would a conflict arise if you would vote for or against the proposed contract on behalf of the city of Spring Hill, Kansas?
3. As both a city council member and an employee you would have access to confidential information that would pertain to the Public Records Act. Would the access to such information constitute a conflict of interest?

We note at the outset that the commission's jurisdiction on your questions is limited to K.S.A. 75-4301 *et seq.* Thus, whether some other statutory system or common law theory, such as incompatibility of offices, applies to your question is not covered by this opinion.

K.S.A. 75-4304 is the only section of the act which might apply to your questions. As a threshold for application of that section, an individual must be employed by or hold a "substantial interest" in a "person or business." This commission has consistently held that municipal and quasi-municipal corporations are not a "person or business." Thus, the above act does not apply to the situation you have described.

We note in closing that under the state level conflicts law relating to state agencies, a different outcome would be reached since under K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* "business" is defined to include governmental agencies.

Advisory Opinion No. 92-8

Written February 27, 1992, to Myron K. Cleveland, Washington.

This opinion is in response to your letter of December 10, 1991, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct.

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as a trooper for the Kansas Highway Patrol.

You state that recent law changes allow uniformed members of the patrol to pursue secondary employment upon approval with certain restrictions. You advise us that you intend to operate a tow service.

You ask if the operation of a tow service during your employment as trooper is permissible.

We first note that we have no jurisdiction over the approval and restrictions on the types of employments that are permissible and express no opinion thereon. For that approval you must turn to the Superintendent of the Highway Patrol and the rules, regulations and policies adopted by the patrol concerning K.S.A. 74-2113 and other relevant statutes.

We can say under K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* that it would be impermissible for you to participate in the making of any contracts between the patrol and the tow service or for you to license, regulate and inspect the tow service on the behalf of the patrol. Thus, for example, it would be inappropriate for you to use your own tow service to tow the patrol vehicle assigned to you.

Advisory Opinion No. 92-9

Written February 27, 1992, to Carl M. Anderson, Assistant Attorney General, Kansas Lottery, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of November 7, 1991, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the conflict of interest laws (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*)

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as an Assistant Attorney General assigned to provide services to the Kansas Lottery. You ask whether the executive director of the Lottery may serve as a consultant or be employed outside of the state agency so long as such service is provided outside of state time and facilities.

We have reviewed K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* in its entirety and it is our opinion so long as:

- 1) No confidential state information is used;
- 2) the fee charged is reasonable in the market place;
- 3) the entity he consults with or is employed by has no contracts with the Lottery; and
- 4) the entity he consults with or is employed by is not licensed, regulated or inspected by the Lottery

that the situation you describe is generally permissible. We would suggest that before a position is actually accepted, this commission be advised again on the specific factual situation.

We note in closing that our opinion is strictly limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* We express no views on whether some other law may apply and refer you to the Attorney General for his assistance before proceeding further.

19-40-5. **Contract.** This regulation has been added to clarify that the term "contract" excludes agreements to pay membership dues to organizations when the primary purpose of the organization is to provide publications and educational material to a state agency or to promote state interests.

A public hearing will be conducted at 10:30 a.m. Tuesday, April 21, in the first floor hearing room of the State Corporation Commission, 1500 S.W. Arrowhead Road, Topeka, to consider proposed changes in existing administrative rules and regulations of the commission.

The 30-day notice period from the date of this publication to the date of the public hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearings to the executive director of the commission at the address above.

All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views orally in regard to adoption of the proposed amendments. Following the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered by the commission as a basis for making amendments to the proposed changes.

The following is a brief summary of the purpose of the proposed changes to the regulations and the anticipated fiscal impact of each proposed change:

K.A.R. 82-4-1. Definitions. The amendment to this regulation in section (h) is being made to adopt the federal regulation definition of "express carrier" to reduce confusion and clarify the definition between state and federal rules. The amendment to section (u) des-

ignates what is a "commercial motor vehicle." There is no economic impact associated with these changes.

K.A.R. 82-4-3. Motor Carrier Safety Regulations. The amendment to section (a) of this regulation is intended to bring the safety regulations applicable to vehicles operating under the jurisdiction of the State Corporation Commission into conformity with federal regulations. In addition, the amendment cites the February 1, 1991, effective date of the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations which are being adopted by reference. The amendment to subsection (c)(5) is being made to clarify the term "regional federal highway administrator."

This regulation is being amended to include a new subsection, (a)(12), dealing with procedures for transportation work place drug testing programs for interstate motor carriers only. 49 CFR Part 40. There is no economic impact associated with this amendment.

K.A.R. 82-4-20. Transportation of hazardous materials by motor vehicles. The amendment in section (a) cites the October 1, 1990, effective date of the federal hazardous materials regulations which are being adopted. The amendment also adds 49 CFR Part 180 which will be effective September 1, 1992. This amendment, 49 CFR Part 180, is being adopted because the cargo tank requirements have been removed from the existing federal regulations and consolidated in Part 180. This amendment will affect only intrastate motor carriers, with no anticipated economic impact.

K.A.R. 82-4-27c. Applications for transfer for purpose of change in the form of business organization or name change of a motor carrier. This regulation is being split in two parts for clarification of two distinct concepts. Applications for transfer for purpose of change in the form of business organization will be governed by K.A.R. 82-4-27c. Applications for transfer for purposes of name change of a motor carrier will be governed by K.A.R. 82-4-27g. There is no economic impact associated with these amendments.

K.A.R. 82-4-27e. Application to merge or consolidate intrastate common or contract authority; or to acquire control or management of an intrastate common or contract motor carrier operation. The purpose of this amendment is to update the regulation and to avoid any possibility of being preempted by federal regulations or federal case law. In addition, it explicitly makes the distinction regarding requirements between mergers, consolidations or acquisition of control or management that have not received approval or been exempted by the Interstate Commerce Commission from those that have received approval or been exempted by the Interstate Commerce Commission. There is no economic impact associated with this amendment.

**Permanent Administrative
Regulations**

Article 6.—PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE

66-6-1. Seal. (a) Each licensee shall purchase a seal of the design approved by the board and shall forward a facsimile of the seal to the office of the board as proof of compliance with K.S.A. 74-7023.

(b) Failure of any licensee to comply with this requirement within 90 days from date of issuance of that person's license shall be cause for the suspension of that license, in accordance with K.A.R. 66-13-1.

(c) Final plans, specifications, plats, documents, legal descriptions, and reports prepared by each licensee shall be stamped with the licensee's seal, and the licensee shall sign the licensee's name across the seal.

(d) Final plans, specifications, plats, documents, and reports prepared by a corporate entity in Kansas shall bear the seal of the licensee registered in Kansas who is responsible for the technical profession in which the corporation has been authorized to practice. The licensee shall sign the licensee's name across the seal.

(e) All architects shall endeavor to take all practical measures to ensure that drawings and specifications are not utilized for projects not contemplated at the

time of the completion of the drawings and specifications.

(1) Drawings and specifications as instruments of service are and shall remain the property of the architect whether the project for which they are made is executed or not.

(2) The owner shall be permitted to retain copies, including reproducible copies, of drawings and specifications for information and reference in connection with the owner's use and occupancy of the project.

(3) The drawings and specifications shall not be used by the owner on any other projects, for additions to the contemplated project, or for completion of this project if the architect is not in default, except by agreement in writing and with appropriate compensation to the architect. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7023; effective May 1, 1978; amended May 1, 1984; amended May 1, 1985; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-6-3. Preamble to rules of professional conduct.

In order to establish and maintain a high standard of integrity, skills and practice in the technical professions, and to safeguard the life, health, property, and welfare of the public, the following rules of professional conduct shall be binding upon every person holding a license to practice in any of the technical professions and on all partnerships or corporations or other legal entities authorized to offer or perform professional services in the state of Kansas. Each licensee shall be familiar with the provisions of K.A.R. 66-6-4. Such knowledge shall encompass the understanding that the practice of a technical profession is a privilege, as opposed to a right. The licensee shall be truthful, forthright and candid in any statements or written response to the board or its representatives on matters pertaining to professional conduct. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-7013; effective May 1, 1978; amended May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-6-4. Rules of professional conduct. (a) For the purposes of this regulation, "licensee" means any architect, landscape architect, land surveyor or professional engineer licensed by the board of technical professions.

(b) If any licensee's judgment is overruled under circumstances in which the safety, health or welfare of the public is endangered, the licensee shall inform the employer or client of the possible consequences and the licensee shall notify the authority who issued the building permit or otherwise has jurisdiction.

(c) No licensee shall advertise to perform or undertake to perform assignments when not qualified by education or experience in the specific technical field of the profession involved.

(d) Any licensee may accept an assignment requiring education or experience outside of the licensee's field of competence, but only to the extent that the services are restricted to those phases of the project in which the licensee is qualified. All other phases of that project shall be performed by licensed associates, licensed consultants, or employees who are otherwise qualified by virtue of their education or experience.

(e) Except as provided in K.S.A. 74-7023(b), no licensee shall affix a personal signature, seal or both to any plan or document dealing with subject matter which is outside of the licensee's field of competence by virtue of education or experience. Additionally, no licensee shall affix a personal signature, seal or both to any plan or document except after completion of a detailed review and evaluation of the documents.

(f) Where the competence of any licensee to perform an assignment in a specific technical field is at issue, the board may require the licensee to pass an appropriate examination.

(g) In all professional reports, statements and testimony, each licensee shall:

(1) be completely objective and truthful; and

(2) shall include all relevant and pertinent information

(h) When serving as an expert or technical witness before any court, commission or other tribunal, each licensee shall express only opinions founded on:

(1) an adequate knowledge of the facts at issue;

(2) a background of technical competence in the subject matter; and

(3) an actual, good-faith belief of the accuracy and propriety of the licensee's testimony.

(i) If a licensee issues any statements, criticisms, or arguments on public policy matters which are inspired or paid for by an interested party or parties, those comments shall be prefaced by and include disclosure of:

(1) the identities of the party or parties on whose behalf the licensee is speaking; and

(2) the existence of any pecuniary interest of the licensee.

(j) Each licensee shall disclose all known or potential conflicts of interest to employers or clients by promptly informing them of any business association, interest, or any other circumstances which could influence that licensee's judgment or the quality of the licensee's services.

(k) No licensee shall accept compensation, financial or otherwise, from more than one party for services on the same project or for services pertaining to the same project, unless the circumstances are fully disclosed and agreed to by all interested parties.

(l) No licensee shall solicit or accept financial or other valuable consideration, directly or indirectly, from:

(1) material or equipment suppliers for specifying their products; or

(2) contractors, their agents, or other parties in connection with work for employers or clients for which the licensee is responsible.

(m) No licensee shall solicit a contract from a governmental body on which a principal or officer of the licensee's organization serves as a member, except upon public disclosure of all pertinent facts and circumstances and consent of the appropriate public authority.

(n) No licensee shall offer, directly or indirectly, to pay a commission or other consideration or to make

(continued)

a political contribution or other gift in order to secure work, except for payment made to an employment agency for its services.

(o) In all contacts with prospective or existing clients or employers, each licensee shall accurately represent the licensee's qualifications and the scope of the licensee's responsibility in connection with work for which the licensee is claiming credit.

(p) No licensee shall associate with, or permit the use of the licensee's personal name or firm name in, a business venture by any person or firm which the licensee knows, or has reason to believe is engaging in:

(1) business or professional practice of a fraudulent or dishonest nature; or

(2) a violation of K.S.A. 74-7001 *et seq.* or the rules and regulations promulgated and adopted by the board.

(q) Each licensee with knowledge of any alleged violation of any of the rules of professional conduct shall:

(1) report the alleged violation to the board; and

(2) cooperate with the board in furnishing information or any assistance that may be required.

(r) No licensee shall assist any person in applying for registration when the licensee knows that person to be unqualified in respect to education, training, experience or character.

(s) Conviction of a felony or the revocation or suspension of a professional license by another jurisdiction, if for a cause which in the state of Kansas would constitute a violation of Kansas law or of these regulations, shall be grounds for a charge of violation of these regulations. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-7013; effective May 1, 1978; amended May 1, 1984; amended May 1, 1985; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-6-6. Renewal of licenses and certificates of authorization. (a) Each licensee whose last name begins with one of the letters A through L shall receive a notice of renewal in even-numbered years. Each licensee whose last name begins with one of the letters M through Z shall receive a notice of renewal in odd-numbered years. A written notice shall be sent by the board to each licensee during the appropriate renewal year, and not later than the following dates:

(b) A written notice shall be sent by the board to each corporation holding a certificate of authorization to practice a technical profession not later than November 30 of even-numbered years.

(c) The notice shall state the amount of the renewal fee fixed by the board, as provided by K.S.A. 74-7025, and the penalty provisions for delinquency. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7025; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-6-7. Penalty provisions for delinquency. Any individual or corporation failing to pay the renewal fee within 60 calendar days from the date of first written renewal notice sent by the board shall be assessed a

penalty in accordance with K.S.A. 74-7025. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7025; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-6-8. Second renewal notice. Any individual or corporation failing to pay the renewal fee within 60 days from the date of first written renewal notice shall be sent, not later than 75 calendar days from the date of the first written renewal notice, a second written renewal notice. The second written renewal notice shall state the renewal fee together with the penalty that is owed and shall further advise that if that fee and penalty is not paid within 150 calendar days from date of issuance of first written renewal notice, the individual's license or the corporation's authorization will be cancelled, in accordance with K.A.R. 66-13-1. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7025; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-6-9. Revocation of license or certificate of authorization. (a) If any individual or corporation fails to pay the renewal fee and penalty within 150 calendar days from the date of the first written renewal notice, the individual's license or the corporation's authorization shall be revoked, in accordance with K.A.R. 66-13-1.

(b) A new license may be obtained in the manner prescribed for new applicants, unless the original license is reinstated by the board for good cause shown and upon payment of the penalty and all delinquent fees owed at the time of reinstatement. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7025; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 1, 1985; amended May 4, 1992.)

Article 7.—APPLICATIONS

66-7-1. Applications; transcript and references required. In addition to the appropriate, completed application form, each applicant shall also supply:

(a) an official transcript to verify any educational credit; and

(b) verification of any practical experience for which credit is claimed on reference forms approved by the board and forwarded directly to the board office by the individual providing the reference. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7018; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-7-2. Application for certificate of authorization. (a) A separate application shall be submitted for each technical profession for which a corporation wishes to become authorized.

(b) Each application submitted by a foreign corporation shall be accompanied by:

(1) a certificate of good standing;

(2) a copy of the articles of incorporation;

(3) a copy of the most recent annual report filed with the state of domicile of the corporation; and

(4) a copy of the certificate of authority to do business in the state of Kansas from the Kansas secretary of state.

(c) Each application submitted by a domestic corporation shall be accompanied by:

- (1) a copy of the articles of incorporation; and
 (2) a copy of the most recent annual report filed with the Kansas secretary of state. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7036; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

Article 8.—EXAMINATIONS

66-8-1. Residence required for examination. (a) An examination for an original license to practice architecture, engineering or land surveying shall be given by the board to actual residents of the state of Kansas.

(b) An examination for an original license to practice landscape architecture may be given by the board to residents and nonresidents of the state of Kansas.

(c) Examinations of candidates who have been admitted to an examination by another state board may be proctored by the Kansas board. The candidate may be assessed a \$100 fee for such proctoring. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7017; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-8-2. Architectural examination. (a) The written examination required by K.S.A. 74-7017 shall be the architectural registration examination as prepared by the national council of architectural registration boards (NCARB).

(b) The examination shall be graded by the NCARB, subject to approval by the board.

(c) Each applicant who has passed a portion or portions of previous registration examinations shall be granted transfer credits in accordance with the rules recommended by the NCARB and approved by the board. These rules are available from the board upon request.

(d) Each applicant for a professional license shall take and pass all sections of the architectural examination and meet the architectural experience requirements under K.S.A. 74-7019. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7017; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 1, 1985; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-8-3. Engineering examinations. (a) The written examination required by K.S.A. 74-7017 shall be the national council of examiners for engineering and surveying (NCEES) examination consisting of an engineering fundamentals section and a professional licensee practice section.

(b) The examination shall be graded by the NCEES, subject to approval by the board.

(c) Each applicant who has passed a portion or portions of previous registration examinations shall be granted transfer credits in accordance with the rules recommended by the NCEES and approved by the board. These rules are available from the board upon request.

(d) Each applicant for a professional license shall take and pass the section on engineering fundamentals and meet the professional engineering experience requirements under K.S.A. 74-7021 before the applicant may take the section on licensee practice. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7017; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-8-4. Land surveyor examinations. (a) The written examination required by K.S.A. 74-7017 shall include:

(1) the national council of examiners for engineering and surveying (NCEES) examinations covering:

(A) the fundamentals of land surveying; and
 (B) the principles and practices of land surveying; and

(2) an examination covering Kansas land surveying laws and practices.

(b) The examinations shall be graded by the NCEES, subject to approval by the board.

(c) Each applicant who has passed a portion or portions of previous registration examinations shall be granted transfer credits in accordance with the rules recommended by the NCEES and approved by the board. These rules are available from the board upon request.

(d) Each applicant for a professional license for land surveying shall be required to take and pass all sections of the land surveying examinations and meet the land surveying experience requirements under K.S.A. 74-7022. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7017; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-8-5. Landscape architectural examinations. (a) The written examination required by K.S.A. 74-7017 shall be:

(1) the landscape architect registration examination as prepared by the national council of landscape architectural registration boards (CLARB); and

(2) the Kansas plant material identification examination.

(b) The examination shall be graded by the CLARB, subject to approval by the board.

(c) Each applicant who has passed a portion or portions of previous registration examinations shall be granted transfer credits in accordance with the rules recommended by the CLARB and approved by the board. These rules are available from the board upon request.

(d) Each applicant for a professional license shall be required to take and pass all sections of the landscape architecture examinations and to meet the landscape architectural experience requirements under K.S.A. 74-7020. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7017; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-8-6. Repeat examinations. Any applicant for a professional license who fails the written examination may take subsequent examinations or re-examinations, if a letter of intent to retake is filed with the board at least 60 days prior to the date of the subsequent examination. Each applicant shall be required to submit the appropriate fee with the letter of intent. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7018; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

Article 9.—EDUCATION

66-9-1. Architectural curriculum approved by the board. "An architectural curriculum approved by the
 (continued)

board" means a curriculum accredited by the national architectural accreditation board (NAAB). (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7019; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-9-2. Landscape architectural curriculum approved by the board. "A landscape architectural curriculum approved by the board" means:

(a) any landscape architectural curriculum accredited by the landscape architectural accreditation board of the American society of landscape architects; or

(b) any four or five-year, non-accredited landscape architectural curriculum which has been reviewed and found to be acceptable by this board. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7020; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-9-3. Approved engineering curriculum. "An approved engineering curriculum" means:

(a) an engineering or engineering technology curriculum accredited by the accreditation board for engineering and technology (ABET); or

(b) any non-accredited four-year engineering or engineering technology curriculum which requires the completion of the same basic course work as does an accredited degree. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7021; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-9-4. Engineering curriculum approved by the board. "An engineering curriculum approved by the board" means an engineering curriculum accredited by the accreditation board for engineering and technology (ABET). (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 74-7022; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

Article 10.—EXPERIENCE

66-10-1. Architectural experience required of a graduate of an accredited architectural curriculum. Each applicant who is a graduate of an accredited architectural curriculum, as defined by K.A.R. 66-9-1, shall complete the intern development program (IDP) as defined in the "IDP Guidelines: Intern Development Program, 1991-1992," as published in July, 1991. Beginning January 1, 1994, each applicant shall provide a completed and bound record of architectural experience transmitted by the national council of architectural registration boards (NCARB). (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7019; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-10-2. Architectural experience required of an applicant who is not a graduate of an accredited architectural curriculum. Each applicant for an architectural license under K.S.A. 74-7019(a)(2) shall be required to verify a record of architectural experience of eight years completed through the intern development program (IDP) as defined in the "IDP Guidelines: Intern Development Program, 1991-1992," as published in July, 1991. Beginning January 1, 1994, each applicant shall provide a completed and bound record of architectural experience transmitted by the national council of architectural registration boards (NCARB). (Author-

ized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7019; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-10-3. Architectural experience required of a reciprocity applicant. Each architectural reciprocity applicant shall provide a record of architectural experience compiled, evaluated, and certified by the national council of architectural registration boards (NCARB), for approval by the board. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7019; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 1, 1985; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-10-4. Experience in landscape architecture work of a grade and character satisfactory to the board. (a) The required work experience shall expose the applicant to all phases of work integral to the practice of landscape architecture.

(b) Landscape architectural work shall:

(1) fall within the definition of "the practice of landscape architecture" under K.S.A. 74-7003(g); and

(2) be verified by the employer or former employer.

(c) A master's degree in landscape architecture may equal one year of credit toward the two-year experience requirement for a graduate of an accredited, four-year curriculum in landscape architecture.

(d) Each applicant who is a graduate of an accredited, master's level curriculum in landscape architecture as the first professional degree shall be considered by the board to be equivalent to a graduate of a five-year curriculum and shall meet the experience requirements of that curriculum as specified in K.S.A. 74-7020(b). (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7020; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 1, 1985; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-10-5. Engineering experience required of a graduate of an approved engineering curriculum. Each graduate of an approved engineering curriculum, as defined by K.A.R. 66-9-3, shall be required to provide a verified record of engineering experience of:

(a) four years, if a graduate of an accredited engineering curriculum;

(b) five years, if a graduate of a non-accredited engineering curriculum;

(c) eight years, if a graduate of an accredited four-year engineering technology curriculum; or

(d) nine years, if a graduate of a non-accredited four-year engineering technology curriculum. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7021; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-10-6. Engineering experience required of a graduate in a four-year curriculum other than engineering. (a) Each graduate of a curriculum considered by the board to be related to engineering, including architecture, landscape architecture, land surveying, mathematics, chemistry or physics, shall provide a verified record of nine years of engineering experience.

(b) Each graduate of a four-year curriculum not related to engineering shall verify a record of 12 years of engineering experience. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7021; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 1, 1985; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-10-7. Engineering experience required of a graduate of a two-year engineering technology curriculum. Each graduate of a two-year engineering technology curriculum shall provide a verified record of 10 years of engineering experience. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7021; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-10-8. Engineering experience required of a non-graduate. Each applicant for an engineering license under K.S.A. 74-7021(a)(2) who has no acceptable educational credit shall provide a verified record of 12 years of engineering experience. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7021; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-10-9. Experience in engineering work of a character which is satisfactory to the board. (a) The required work experience shall be verified and expose the applicant to all phases of work integral to the discipline of engineering in which the applicant claims qualification to practice.

(b) Engineering work experience shall:

(1) fall within the definition of "the practice of engineering" as defined by K.S.A. 74-7003(i);

(2) be directly supervised and verified by a licensed, professional engineer for work performed after May 1, 1988; except that direct supervision of a licensed, professional engineer is not required of the employees of any person, firm or corporation not offering services in the technical professions to the public;

(c) The following guidelines shall be used to assign credit for work experience:

(1) The education and experience evaluations by previous boards or other state boards may be accepted for work experience prior to the fundamentals of engineering examination. The applicant shall demonstrate four years of acceptable experience.

(2) Credit may be given for 50% of the verified work experience obtained through a co-op engineering program approved by a school or university with an accredited engineering curriculum. Credit for this work experience shall not exceed one year.

(3) One year of credit toward the experience requirement may be given for a master's degree in engineering.

(4) Teaching engineering in a college or university which offers an approved engineering curriculum of four years or more may be considered engineering experience.

(d) The applicant shall supply at least three references from licensed professional engineers who are familiar with the applicant's engineering experience. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7021; effective May 1, 1984; amended April 19, 1990; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-10-10. Surveying experience required of a graduate of an accredited engineering curriculum. Each graduate of an accredited engineering curriculum, as defined by K.A.R. 66-9-4, shall provide a verified record of two years of progressive land surveying experience, as defined in K.A.R. 66-10-12. (Authorized

by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7022; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-10-11. Surveying experience required of an applicant who is not a graduate of an accredited engineering curriculum. Each applicant for land surveyor license under K.S.A. 74-7022(c) who is not a graduate of an accredited engineering curriculum, as defined by K.A.R. 66-9-4, shall provide a verified record of two years of basic land surveying experience and four years of progressive land surveying experience, as defined in K.A.R. 66-10-12. If the applicant can provide a record of surveying and related technical education courses, including mathematics and drafting, that applicant may be given credit for 0.5 years of experience in basic land surveying for every 15 semester hours in such educational courses. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7022; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-10-12. Surveying experience of a character satisfactory to the board. (a) Land surveying experience shall:

(1) fall within the definition of "the practice of land surveying" as defined by K.S.A. 74-7003(k);

(2) be under the direct supervision of a licensed land surveyor for work performed after May 1, 1988; and

(3) be verified by the employer or former employer of the applicant and either a licensed professional engineer, land surveyor or architect.

(b) The following guidelines shall be used to assign credit for work experience:

(1) No basic surveying experience shall consist of actual land surveying experience.

(2) Progressive land surveying experience shall include each of the following five elements of professional land surveying: research; legal principles and reconciliation; documentation, land information systems and monumentation; computations and analysis; and measurements and locations.

(3) Land surveying experience normally identified with engineering projects, including construction staking, curb and gutter projects, sanitary sewers and design surveys for highways or bridges other than those that relate to right-of-way surveys, shall not be considered progressive land surveying experience. This experience, however, may be considered by the board as basic land surveying experience.

(4) Teaching experience in land surveying courses in an accredited engineering or land surveying curriculum may be considered as equal to one year of basic land surveying experience. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7022; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

Article 11.—INTERN ENGINEER CERTIFICATION

66-11-1. Intern engineer defined. "Intern engineer" means an individual who has:

(a) taken and passed the eight-hour written examination in the fundamentals of engineering as administered by the National Council of Examiners for Engineering and Surveying (NCEES); and

(continued)

(b) been issued an engineer-in-training or intern engineer certificate. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7021; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-11-2. Admittance requirements for fundamentals of engineering examination. Each applicant who meets one or more of the following requirements may be admitted to the fundamentals of engineering examination as administered by NCEES:

(a) any student in an accredited engineering curriculum who is in the last semester of that student's education; or

(b) any graduate of an accredited engineering curriculum; or

(c) any applicant whose record verifies a combination of education and experience of a character satisfactory to the board. In evaluating an applicant's record the board shall determine whether, based on the applicant's educational background, the applicant would require no more than four years additional engineering experience for admittance to the principles and practice of engineering examination. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7021; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

66-11-3. Subsequent application for professional engineer. Any certified intern engineer may apply for a professional engineer's license when the intern engineer has acquired four or more years of experience in engineering work of a character which is satisfactory to the board if:

(a) the intern engineer applies within 10 years from the date of engineer-in-training or intern engineer certification; or

(b) the intern engineer is certified by another state board and possesses an unexpired certificate issued as a result of having passed an eight-hour examination in engineering fundamentals and applies within 10 years from the date of intern engineer certification by that other state board. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 74-7021; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 4, 1992.)

Article 12.—MINIMUM STANDARDS FOR THE PRACTICE OF LAND SURVEYING

66-12-1. Minimum standards for the practice of land surveying. (a) The board hereby adopts by reference as rules and regulations of the board:

(1) the "American land title association surveys" (ALTA), as adopted by the board of direction, American congress on surveying and mapping on September 16, 1988 and the American land title association on October 19, 1988; and

(2) the "Kansas minimum standards for boundary surveys," standard of practice number one; and "minimum standards for mortgagee title inspections" (MTI's), as adopted by the Kansas society of land surveyors on August 18, 1990, except the preface and scope sections of the Kansas minimum standards for boundary surveys, standard of practice number one are deleted.

(b) A suggested work order form for the completion of land surveying services is available from the board. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-7013; implementing K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 74-7037; effective May 4, 1992.)

Article 13.—ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURES

66-13-1. Types of hearings. (a) Hearings and procedures of the board shall be in accordance with the hearings and procedures established by the Kansas administrative procedure act.

(b) Summary adjudicate proceedings pursuant to K.S.A. 1990 Supp. 77-537 to 77-542, inclusive, and amendments thereto may be used for the following types of action:

(1) denials of initial license, permit, registration or certificate;

(2) cancellation for failure to renew a license, permit, registration or certificate;

(3) cease and desist orders, enforcement orders based on stipulations, public or private censures, warnings, reprimands, restrictions, fines or suspensions for violations of any laws administered by the board or rules and regulations promulgated thereunder.

(c) Any party who disagrees with and is subject to a summary adjudicative action may request that the proceedings be converted to a conference adjudicative proceeding or a formal adjudicative proceeding. Upon the request the summary proceeding shall be converted to the appropriate proceeding available under the Kansas administrative procedure act or rules and regulations promulgated thereunder.

(d) The order issued pursuant to subsection (b) of this regulation shall contain a notice informing the persons who are subject to the order that a request for review or conversion must be made within 15 days.

(e) The presiding officer for summary adjudicative proceedings may be the executive secretary or the executive secretary's designee.

(f) Conference adjudicative proceedings pursuant to K.S.A. 77-533, 77-534 and 77-535 of the Kansas administrative procedure act may be used for actions in which:

(1) there is no disputed issue of material fact; or

(2) the parties agree to a conference adjudicative proceeding.

(g) All other proceedings, except those which are emergency adjudicative proceedings, or which have been initiated as or converted to conference or summary adjudicative proceedings, shall be formal adjudicative proceedings. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-7013; effective May 4, 1992.)

111-4-384. Name of game. The Kansas Lottery shall conduct an instant winner lottery game entitled "Cash Roulette" commencing on March 12, 1992. The specific rules for the "Cash Roulette" game are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-384 through 111-4-387. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992.)

111-4-385. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "Cash Roulette" instant lottery game:

(a) "Game symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the game symbols are printed in black ink in 15 pt. Archer. A game symbol appears in each of six play spots within the play area. Each game symbol for this instant game is one of the following: Free—\$2.00—\$5.00—10.00—\$25.00—\$250\$.

(b) "Game symbol captions" are the words or portions of words, letters or numbers printed beneath each game symbol in the play area and are used to repeat or explain the game symbol. The game symbol caption associated with each game symbol is as follows:

(c) "Ticket validation number" means a unique number appearing on each ticket which is used to validate winning tickets. For this instant game, the ticket validation number is a 10-digit number which appears under the "Void If Removed" spot on the front of each instant ticket.

(d) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. For this instant game, the book-ticket number is an 8-digit book number followed by a dash and then a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000 and end with 299. The book-ticket number is printed in black ink on the front of each instant game ticket.

(e) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. In this instant game, the retailer validation code is a two letter code printed and appearing in two of six varying locations among the game symbols. The codes and their meanings are as follows: AA=FREE TICKET; DD=\$2.00; KK=\$5.00; BB=\$10.00; RR=\$25.00. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992.)

111-4-386. Determination of Instant Prize Winners. An instant prize winner is determined for this instant game when the player removes or "scratches off" the removable layer of material in the shape of a roulette wheel covering the play area to reveal the six game symbols and captions. Under the top of the play area marked "YOUR NUMBER" the player's number will appear. If the player's number matches any of the six numbers appearing in the play area the player wins the amount appearing in the center of the play area. No ticket will be eligible to win more than one prize. The prizes a play may win are as follows:

Article 5.—KANSAS LOTTO AMERICA GAME RULES

111-5-12. Prize Pool; Reserve Fund. (a) The prize pool for all prize categories shall consist of 45% of each drawing period's Lotto America sales until the grand prize is funded to the annuitized amount guaranteed by the MUSL board. When the grand prize fund reaches the guaranteed annuitized amount, then 43% of Lotto America sales from all participating lotteries shall be added to the prize pool; and two per cent of Lotto America sales from all participating lotteries shall be placed in the prize reserve fund until the prize reserve fund exceeds the amount specified by the MUSL board. When the prize reserve fund exceeds the designated amount, the excess shall become part of the prize pool. Any amount remaining in a prize pool at the end of this game shall be carried forward to a replacement prize reserve account or expended for prizes in a manner as directed by the MUSL board.

(b) When the grand prize is not won in the drawing the prize money allocated for the grand prize shall roll over and be added to the grand prize pool for the following drawing. Any amount remaining in prize reserve accounts at the end of this game shall be carried forward to a replacement prize reserve account or expended for prizes in a manner as directed by the MUSL board.

(c) A cap of 80 million dollars shall be placed on the grand prize. Funds allocated to the grand prize in excess of the amount needed to fund an 80 million dollar annuity shall be held to fund the next grand prize which is less than 80 million dollars. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710; implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710 and 74-8731; effective, T-89-4, Jan. 21, 1988; amended, T-111-1-27-89, Jan. 26, 1989; amended, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992.)

111-5-21. Multi-Draw. (a) In addition to a single play involving two boards for each \$1.00, a player may also have his or her selections entered in multiple drawings. Multi-draw tickets must be purchased for consecutive drawings beginning with the next drawing. This is done by marking one of the multi-draw

boxes designated by 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, or 10 on the play slip. The additional draw period(s) for which the ticket is valid will then appear on the computer generated ticket given to the player by the retailer.

(b) A player must pay an additional \$1.00 per two (2) boards for each additional drawing in which he or she wishes to play.

(c) Starting September 13, 1989, unless one of the multi-draw boxes is marked and the additional amount paid, the play will only be eligible for the current drawing up to 7:59 p.m. the day of the drawing.

(d) A player may purchase only the same numbers on the same boards for multiple drawings.

(e) Sales of multi-draw tickets shall cease 7:59 p.m. on March 14, 1992. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-2-10-89, Feb. 10, 1989; amended, T-111-8-25-89, Aug. 18, 1989; amended, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992.)

111-5-22. Name of the Game; Rules and Regulations. The Kansas lottery shall conduct a lotto game entitled "Lotto America's Powerball" conducted twice weekly on Wednesdays and Saturdays beginning April 19, 1992 at 6:00 a.m.

The rules and regulations for "Lotto America's Powerball" game are contained in K.A.R. 111-5-22 through 111-5-33, and applicable generic rules are contained in K.A.R. 111-6-1 *et seq.* (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992.)

111-5-23. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "Lotto America's Powerball" game:

(a) "Computer pick" means the random selection of two-digit numbers by the computer system, which appear on a ticket and are played by a player in the game.

(b) "Drawing" means the formal process of selecting winning numbers which determine the number of winners for each prize level of the game.

(c) "Game board" or "boards" means that area of the play slip which contains two sets of numbered squares to be marked by the player, each set containing 45 squares, number one through 45.

(d) "Game ticket" or "ticket" means a computer generated ticket issued by a terminal to a person as a receipt for the combination a person has selected.

(e) "MUSL" means the Multi-State Lottery Association, a government-benefit association wholly owned and operated by the party lotteries.

(f) "MUSL Board" means the governing body of the MUSL which is comprised of the chief executive officer of each party lottery.

(g) "On-line lottery game" means a lottery game in which each player selects numbers out of a larger predetermined set or sets of numbers.

(h) "Party Lottery" means a state lottery or lottery of a political subdivision or entity which has joined the MUSL.

(i) "Play" means the six numbers from one through 45 which appear on a ticket as a single lettered selection and are to be played by a player in the game.

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(k) "Play slip" means a card used in marking a player's game plays and containing one or more boards.

(l) "Retailer" or "agent" means a person or entity authorized by the Kansas lottery to sell lottery tickets.

(m) "Set prize" means a prize that is advertised to be paid by a single cash payment and, except in rare instances, outlined in these rules, will be equal to the prize amount established by the MUSL Board for the prize level.

(n) "Terminal" means a device authorized by a party lottery to function in an on-line, interactive mode with the lottery's computer system for the purpose of issuing lottery tickets and entering, receiving and processing lottery transactions, including purchases, validating tickets and transmitting reports.

(o) "Validation" or "validate" means the process of determining whether a ticket presented for a prize is a winning ticket.

(p) "Winning numbers" means the six numbers between one and 45 randomly selected at each drawing which shall be used to determine winning plays contained on a game ticket. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992.)

111-5-24. Game Description; Retail Sale of Tickets. (a) "Lotto America's Powerball" is a five out of 45 plus one out of 45 on-line lottery game which pays the grand prize in an annuitized pari-mutuel basis and, except as provided in these rules all other prizes on a set cash basis. To play "Powerball" a player shall select five different numbers between one and 45 and one additional number between one and 45 for input into a terminal. The additional number may be the same as one of the first five numbers selected by the player.

(b) A "Powerball" game ticket shall sell for one dollar.

(c) Tickets shall not be sold to any person under the age of 18 years. Each retailer may require a person purchasing tickets to produce proof of age.

(d) Each ticket shall be purchased either from a terminal operated by a retailer or from a terminal operated by the player. If a ticket is purchased from a retailer, the player may select a set of five numbers and one additional number by:

- (1) communicating the six numbers to the retailer;
- (2) marking six numbered squares in any one game board on a play slip and submitting the play slip to the retailer; or
- (3) requesting a "computer pick" from the retailer. The retailer shall then issue a ticket from the terminal containing the selected set or sets of numbers, each of which constitutes a game play.

Tickets may be purchased from a player-activated terminal by use of a touch screen or by inserting a play slip into the terminal.

(e) A validated ticket shall be the only proof of a game play or plays. The only method of claiming a prize or prizes shall be the submission of the winning ticket to and receipt of the ticket by the lottery or its authorized agent. A play slip shall have no pecuniary

or prize value and shall not be used as evidence of a ticket purchase or of numbers selected.

(f) A ticket shall not be voided or cancelled by returning the ticket to the selling retailer, including tickets that are printed in error.

(g) Each player shall be responsible for verifying the accuracy of the game play or plays and other data printed on the ticket. The placing of plays is done at the player's own risk through the on-line retailer who is deemed to be acting on behalf of the player in entering the play or plays. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710; implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710 and 74-8718; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992.)

111-5-25. Prize Pool; Reserve Account. (a) The prize pool for all prize categories shall consist of 50% of each drawing period's sales until the grand prize is funded to the annuitized amount guaranteed by the MUSL board. Any amount remaining in the prize pool at the end of this game shall be carried forward to a replacement game or expended in a manner as directed by the MUSL board.

(b) When the grand prize fund reaches the annuitized amount guaranteed by the MUSL board, two per cent of sales shall be placed in trust in one or more prize reserve accounts until the prize reserve accounts reach the amount designated by the MUSL board. When the prize reserve accounts exceed the designated amount, the excess shall become part of the prize pool. Any amount remaining in prize reserve accounts at the end of this game shall be carried forward to a replacement prize reserve account or expended in a manner as directed by the MUSL board. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710; implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710 and 74-8731; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992.)

111-5-26. Expected Prize Payout Pari-mutuel Prizes. (a) The grand prize shall be determined on a pari-mutuel basis. Except as provided in these rules, all other prizes awarded shall be paid as set cash prizes with the following expected prize payout percentages:

(b) The prize money allocated to the grand prize

category shall be divided equally by the number of game boards winning the grand prize.

(c) The prize pool percentage allocated to the set prizes (the cash prizes of \$100,000 or less) shall be carried forward to subsequent draws if all or a portion of it is not needed to pay the set prizes awarded in the current draw. If the total of the set prizes awarded in a drawing exceeds the percentage of the prize pool allocated to the set prizes, then the amount needed to fund the set prizes awarded shall be drawn from the following sources, in the following order: (1) the amount allocated to the set prizes and carried forward from previous draws, if any; (2) an amount from the prize reserve account, if available, not to exceed twenty million dollars (\$20,000,000) per drawing. If, after these sources are depleted, there are not sufficient funds to pay the set prizes awarded, then the highest set prize shall become a pari-mutuel prize. If the highest set prize, when paid on a pari-mutuel basis, drops to or below the next highest set prize and there are still not sufficient funds to pay the remaining set prizes awarded, then the next highest set prize shall become a pari-mutuel prize. This procedure shall continue down through all set prize levels, if necessary, until all set prize levels become pari-mutuel prize levels. In that instance the money available from the funding sources listed in this rule shall be divided among the winning plays in proportion to their respective prize percentages. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992.)

111-5-27. Probability of Winning. (a) The following table sets forth the probability of winning and the probable distribution of winners in and among each prize category based upon the total number of possible combinations in Powerball:

(b) The grand prize amount is estimated using a 20-year deferred-payment factor of 1.95. The amount does not include the prize reserve account deduction or any other deductions, if any. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992.)

111-5-28. Prize Payments; Annuitized and Cash Prizes. (a) Grand prizes shall be paid with per winner annuities. If an annuity has a cash value of less than \$250,000, the MUSL board, in its sole discretion, may elect to pay the cash value of the annuity. All annui-

tized prizes shall be paid in twenty equal payments with the initial payment being made in cash, to be followed by nineteen payments funded by the annuity. The initial payment of an annuitized prize shall not be made by a party lottery until after the fifteenth calendar day following the drawing.

(b) All prizes, other than grand prizes, shall be paid in cash through the party lottery which sold the winning ticket(s). A party lottery may begin paying cash prizes after receiving authorization to pay from the MUSL central office.

(c) Annuitized payments of the grand prize or a share of the grand prize may be rounded to facilitate the purchase of an appropriate funding mechanism. Breakage on a grand prize win shall be added to the first cash payment to the winner or winners. Prizes which, under these rules, may become single-payment, pari-mutuel prizes, may be rounded down so that prizes can be paid in multiples of whole dollars. Breakage resulting from rounding these prizes shall be carried forward to the prize pool for the next drawing.

(d) If the grand prize is not won in a drawing, the prize money allocated for the grand prize shall roll over and be added to the grand prize pool for the following drawing.

(e) The MUSL board may offer guaranteed minimum grand prize amounts or minimum increases in the grand prize amount between drawings or make other changes in the allocation of prize money where the MUSL board finds that it would be in the best interest of the game. Changes in the allocation of prize money shall be designed to retain approximately the same prize allocation percentages, over a year's time, set out in these rules. Minimum guaranteed prizes or increases may be waived if the alternate funding mechanism set out in K.A.R. 111-5-26 becomes necessary.

(f) The holder of a winning ticket may win only one prize per board in connection with the winning numbers drawn, and shall be entitled only to the prize won by those numbers in the highest matching prize category.

(g) All prizes must be claimed within 365 days of the day of the drawing in which the prize was won. In the event the final day of the 365-day period falls on a Sunday or a state holiday, the claim period will be extended to end on the next business day. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710; implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710 and 74-8731; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992.)

111-5-29. Ticket Validation Requirements. To be a valid ticket and eligible to receive a prize, a multi-state lottery (MUSL) ticket shall satisfy all the requirements established by the Kansas lottery for validation of winning tickets sold through its on-line system and any other validation requirements established by the MUSL board. The MUSL and the Kansas lottery shall not be responsible for tickets which are altered in any manner. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992.)

111-5-30. Claiming Prizes; Procedure and Time Period. (a) Prior to the payment of any prize, each
(continued)

ticket shall be validated by the retailer or lottery office pursuant to this act.

(b) The procedure for payment of a "Powerball" prize on any single game ticket of \$599 or less, except for a grand prize, are as follows:

(1) The claimant of a ticket purchased in Kansas may present the ticket to any Kansas lottery on-line retailer. Upon validation of the ticket, the retailer shall immediately make payment for the prize to the claimant. If the retailer cannot validate the claim, the claimant shall fill out a claim form provided by the retailer and personally present or mail the completed form together with the ticket to any office of the Kansas lottery. If the claim is validated, then payment shall be made to the claimant by mail.

(2) The claimant may bring the signed ticket to any regional office of the Kansas lottery during the hours that the office is open to the public for business. Upon validation of the claim, and completion of a claim form, payment shall be processed for the claimant.

(3) The claimant may mail the ticket with a completed claim form in any envelope, except an official grand prize envelope, to any office of the Kansas lottery. Claim forms may be obtained from any lottery retailer or any office of the Kansas lottery. Upon validation of the claim, payment shall be processed for the claimant.

If any evidence of alteration, mutilation, tear, or other ambiguity appear on the ticket, the retailer shall not make direct payment of a prize. The claimant shall submit a claim form with the ticket to the lottery.

(c) The procedure for the payment of a Lotto America prize on any single game ticket which totals \$600.00 or more, except for a grand prize, shall be as follows:

(1) The claimant may bring the signed ticket to any office of the Kansas lottery during the hours that the office is open to the public for business. Upon validation of the claim and completion of a claim form, payment shall be processed for the claimant.

(2) The claimant may mail the signed ticket with a completed claim form to any office of the Kansas lottery. Claim forms may be obtained from any lottery retailer or any office of the Kansas lottery. Upon validation of the claim, payment shall be processed for the claimant.

(d) The procedure for the payment of a grand prize or for prizes won on the same ticket as a grand prize are as follows:

(1) The claimant shall personally submit the signed ticket and a completed claim form to a Kansas regional or state lottery office. Grand prizes and prizes won on the same ticket as grand prize shall not be claimed by mail.

(e) All prizes shall be claimed within 365 days of the drawing in which the prize was won. Any prize or prizes not claimed within the time specified shall be forfeited. If a prize is claimed by mail, the ticket and claim form must actually be received by the lottery within the claim period. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710; implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710 and 74-8720; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992.)

111-5-31. Ticket Responsibility. (a) Until such time as a signature is placed on the back of a ticket in the area designated for a signature, a ticket shall be owned by the holder of the ticket. When a signature

is placed on a ticket in the place designated, the person whose signature appears in that area shall be the owner of the ticket and shall be entitled to any prize attributable thereto.

(b) If the signature of more than one person appears on the back of the ticket in the designated place, the lottery shall make payment to the person presenting the ticket whose signature appears on both the ticket and the winner claim form. If all persons whose signatures appear in the appropriate space cannot identify one person to whom payment should be made, the lottery shall keep the prize until a determination of entitlement is made by the parties. In no event shall more than one person be entitled to a particular prize.

(c) The MUSL and Kansas lottery shall not be responsible for lost or stolen tickets. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710; implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710 and 74-8720; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992.)

111-5-32. Ineligible Players. (a) All provisions of K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8718 and K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8719, and amendments thereto, apply to "Lotto America's Powerball" game.

(b) A ticket or share issued by the MUSL or any of its party lotteries shall not be purchased by, and a prize won by any such ticket or share shall not be paid to:

(1) a MUSL employee, officer or director,

(2) a contractor or consultant under agreement with the MUSL to review the MUSL audit and security procedures, or

(3) an immediate family member of an individual described in subsections (1) and (2) and residing in the same household. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710; implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8718 and 74-8719; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992.)

111-5-33. Multi-Draw. (a) In addition to a single play for each \$1.00, a player may also have his or her selections entered in multiple drawings. Multi-draw tickets must be purchased for consecutive drawings beginning with the next drawing. This is done by marking one of the multi-draw boxes designated by 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 or 10 on the play slip. The additional draw period(s) for which the ticket is valid will then appear on the computer generated ticket given to the player by the retailer.

(b) A player must pay an additional \$1.00 per play for each additional drawing in which he or she wishes to play.

(c) Unless one of the multi-draw boxes is marked and the additional amount paid, the play will only be eligible for the current drawing up to 8:59 p.m. the day of the drawing.

(d) A player may purchase only the same numbers on the same boards for multiple drawings. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992.)

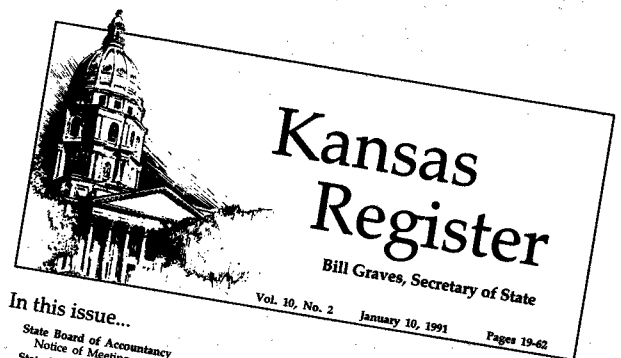
