Notice to Public Transportation Providers

The Kansas Department of Transportation, Office of Public Transportation, is accepting funding requests to purchase vehicles and equipment under Section 16 of the Federal Transit Act Amendments of 1991.

Eligible applicants for Section 16 funds must be private nonprofit organizations that have been incorporated and registered with the Secretary of State to do business in Kansas.

In addition, KDOT also will be accepting requests to provide operating assistance and/or vehicles for transportation services to elderly persons, persons with disabilities and the general public under Section 18 of the federal funding act.

Eligible applicants for Section 18 funds must be local units of government, Indian tribes, private nonprofit organizations or private operators contracting through any of these parties. These applicants also must be registered with the Secretary of State to do business in Kansas.

A total of approximately \$500,000 will be available in Section 16 funds for federal fiscal year 1993. The federal share of eligible capital cost will not exceed 70 percent of the net cost of each project; the applicant share shall be 30 percent of the net cost of the project.

A total of approximately \$1.8 million will be available in Section 18 funds for FY 1993. The federal share of eligible capital costs will not exceed 70 percent of the net cost of each project; the applicant share will be 30 percent of the net cost of the project. The federal share of operating costs will not exceed 40 percent of the net cost of the project. The applicant share of operating cost will be no less than 60 percent of the net cost of the project.

Requests must be received by KDOT on or before July 31. Requests after that date will not be accepted. KDOT is not responsible for lost, delayed, misdirected, illegible or mutilated post cards. Notice to Consulting Engineers

The Kansas Department of Transportation is seeking qualified consultant engineering firms for the following 10 packages of projects. Responses must be received by July 16 for any or all projects for which the consultant engineering firm wishes to be considered. Seven signed copies of responses need to be mailed to Al Cathcart, P.E., Project Control Engineer, Office of Engineering Support, Kansas Department of Transportation, 7th Floor, Docking State Office Building, Topeka 66612.

All projects will have surveys completed by others and will be provided to the consultant engineering firms, with the exception of packages 7, 8, 9 and 10, where KDOT may require the consultant to provide design surveys. Items such as seeding and erosion control, right-of-way procurement activities, geology, permit development, traffic data, utility and railroad agreement efforts, et al. may require consultant firm involvement. It has been established that all pavement marking, lighting, traffic signals, traffic control and permanent signing plans necessary will be designed

by consultant engineering firms. Information on other activities that will be performed by either KDOT or the consultant will be established and furnished to the consultant engineering firms who are short listed by the KDOT Selection Committee prior to interview by the KDOT Negotiating Committee.

It should be noted that packages 7, 8 and 9 will include highway location efforts and that package number 10 will be a location study only.

Note: Package 1 through 6 are on the Southeast Kansas Corridor.

Package #1—Project No. 96-37 K-3293-02—Grading and bridges and Project No. 96-37 K-3293-02—Surfacing. FY 95 Greenwood County

K-96, from five miles east of the east junction of K-99 east to the Greenwood/Wilson county line. Project scope is 10.0 miles of new two-lane construction on parallel alignment with seven new bridges.

Package #2—Project No. 96-103 K-3294-01—Grading and bridges and Project No. 96-103 K-3294-02—Surfacing. FY 96 Wilson County

K-96, from the Greenwood/Wilson county line east and southeast to the junction of K-47 east of Fredonia. Project scope is 12.0 miles of new two-lane construction on parallel and new alignment with four new bridges.

Package #3—Project No. 96-103 K-3295-01—Grading and bridges and Project No. 96-103 K-3295-02—Surfacing. FY 96 Wilson County

K-96, from the junction of K-47 southeast to the Wilson/Montgomery county line. Project scope is 12.6 miles of new two-lane construction on new alignment with two new bridges.

Package #4—Project No. 96-63 K-4892-01—Grading and bridges (9) and Project No. 96-63 K-4892-02—Surfacing and bridges (2) on U.S. 160. FY 97 Montgomery County

K-96, from the Wilson/Montgomery county line south and east to the Montgomery/Labette county line. Project scope is 11.8 miles of new two-lane construction on new alignment with 11 new bridges.

Package #5—Project No. 160-50 K-4891-01—Grading and bridges (5) and Project No. 160-50 K-4891-02—Surfacing and bridges (2). FY 97 Labette County

From the Montgomery/Labette county line east to 3.3 miles west of the west city limits of Parsons. Project scope is 9.2 miles of new two-lane construction on parallel and off-set alignment with seven new bridges.

Package #6—Project No. 160-50 K-3301-01—Grading, bridges and surfacing and Project No. 160-50 K-3302-01—Grading and surfacing. FY 97 Labette County

Project No. K-3301-01 is from 3.3 miles west of the west city limits of Parsons east to the west city limits of Parsons. Project K-3302-01 is from the east urban area boundary of Parsons east to FAS 1137. These projects represent 7.3 miles of new two-lane reconstruction and rehabilitation with one bridge replaced and three bridges upgraded.

Note: Packages 7 through 10 are FHWA demonstration projects programmed for preliminary engineering.

Package #7—Project No. 81-15 K-4956-01—Preliminary engineering. FY 94 Cloud County

U.S. 81, from just south of Concordia north 11.7 miles to the Cloud/Republic county line. This project includes a location study for the Concordia bypass. Project scope is for a four-lane configuration with construction of two new lanes adjacent to the existing two lanes.

Package #8—Project No. 81-79 K-5021-01—Preliminary engineering. FY 94 Republic County

U.S. 81, from the Cloud/Republic county line north 11.1 miles. Project scope is a four-lane configuration with construction of two new lanes adjacent to the existing two lanes. Location work is necessary in this project.

Package #9—Project No. 81-79 K-5022-01—Preliminary engineering. FY 94 Republic County

U.S. 81, from U.S. 36 north 13.5 miles to just south of the Nebraska state line. Location work is necessary in this project. Project scope is for a four-lane configuration with construction of two new lanes adjacent to the existing two lanes.

Package #10—Project No. 96-78 K-5046-01—Preliminary engineering, FY 92 Reno County

K-96, southwest bypass of Hutchinson and Hutchinson South, from a point on U.S. 50 west of the U.S. 50/K-17 interchange north and northwest to a point on K-96 southeast of Nickerson. The scope of work for this project is a location study.

From firms expressing interest, the Consultant Selection Committee will select a list of the most highly qualified (not less than three, nor more than five) and invite them to attend a preproposal conference. Firms not selected will be notified by letter.

The Negotiation Committee, appointed by the Secretary of Transportation, will conduct discussions with firms invited to the preproposal conference and select one firm with which to negotiate a contract. After a contract has been awarded, the remaining firms will be notified by letter.

It is the policy of KDOT to use the following criteria as the basis for selection of consultant engineering firms:

1. Size and professional qualifications.
2. Experience of staff.
3. Location of firm with respect to proposed project.
4. Work load of firm.
5. Firm's performance record.

Attorney General**Opinion No. 92-79**

Taxation—Kansas Retailers' Sales Tax—1992 H.B. No. 2892; Tax on Certain Construction Services; Computation. Representative Clyde Graeber, 41st District, Leavenworth, June 18, 1992.

To the extent connected with the service of installing or applying tangible personal property in original construction, profit and overhead passed on as a cost to the consumer for such service are properly taxable. Cited herein: K.S.A. 79-3602, as amended by 1992 H.B. No. 2892; K.S.A. 79-3603, as amended by 1992 H.B. No. 2892. JLM

Opinion No. 92-80

Criminal Procedure—Search and Seizure—Authorized Installation or Use of a Private Trap and Trace Device; Telephonic Devices. Senator August Bogina, Jr., 10th District, Shawnee, June 22, 1992.

A "caller ID" service provided by a telephone company to a customer who subscribes to the service is essentially a trap and trace device which enables the person receiving the phone call to view the telephone number of the incoming call prior to answering the phone. Such devices are generally prohibited without a court order under K.S.A. 22-2525. However, as caller ID service is provided only at the customer's request, it would fall under the exception to the prohibition in K.S.A. 22-2525(c) as the user of the service has clearly consented and indeed subscribed to such service. Therefore, a caller ID service would not violate Kansas law. Cited herein: K.S.A. 22-2525; 22-2529. KGS

Opinion No. 92-81

Elections—Independent and Other Nomination Certificates; Terms of Office; Filling Vacancies—Independent Nominations; Requirements; Party Affiliation; Party Candidacy; Petitions. Senator Eric R. Yost, 30th District, Wichita, June 24, 1992.

No person who has declared and retains a political party affiliation in accordance with K.S.A. 25-3301 is eligible to accept an independent nomination for office. A person who is affiliated with a political party may, 14 days prior to the primary election, change the person's party or voter affiliation. If the person timely changes to an unaffiliated status, the person may accept an independent nomination provided the independent nomination petitions are properly filed pursuant to K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 25-305, as amended by 1992 House Bill No. 3213. A person who files as a partisan candidate in the primary election and who maintains such candidacy may not file as an independent candidate in the general election immediately following. A person who has filed as a partisan candidate in a primary election may, after withdrawing such candidacy and timely changing to an unaffiliated status, file as an independent candidate in the general election.

The United States District Court for the district of Kansas has determined that K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 25-303, as amended by 1992 Senate Bill No. 789, requires only that signers of independent nomination petitions reside in the same county and election district of the office sought. This requirement does not restrict circulators to their home county and election district. The circulators may seek signatures anywhere in the state, but the signers must reside in the same county and election district as the circulators. While a qualified elector who is circulating an independent nomination petition is restricted to collecting signatures of those persons residing in that area intersected by the county and the election district in which the qualified elector resides, the candidate may collect signatures of persons residing anywhere within the election district. Opinion No. 92-82

Schools—Miscellaneous Provisions—Early Retirement Incentive Programs; Establishment Authorized; Classification of School Personnel; Constitutionality of Program. Representative Kenneth R. King, 77th District, Leon, June 30, 1992.

The early retirement incentive program developed by the Board of Education for Unified School District No. 490, available only to certified personnel of the district, does not establish a classification which would result in a violation of the equal protection clauses of the United States or Kansas constitutions. Sealed Bids

Sealed bids for the purchase of \$560,000 principal amount of General Obligation Bonds, Series 1992-B, of the city hereinafter described, will be received by the undersigned, the city administrator of the city of Lansing, Kansas, on behalf of the governing body of the city at City Hall, 800 First Terrace, Lansing, KS 66043, until 11 a.m. C.D.T. on Thursday, July 16, 1992. All bids will be publicly opened and read at said time and place and will be acted upon by the governing body of the city at its regularly scheduled meeting of said day at 7:30 p.m. at city hall. No oral or auction bids will be considered.

Bond Details

The bonds will consist of fully registered bonds without coupons in the denomination of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof. The bonds will be dated August 1, 1992, and will become due serially on November 1 in the years as follows:

The bonds will bear interest at rates to be determined when the bonds are sold as hereinafter provided, which interest will be payable semiannually on May 1 and November 1 in each year, beginning on May 1, 1993.

Place of Payment and Bond Registration

The principal of and interest on the bonds will be payable in lawful money of the United States of America by check or draft of the Kansas State Treasurer, Topeka, Kansas (the paying agent and bond registrar). The principal of the bonds will be payable at maturity or upon earlier redemption to the registered owners upon presentation and surrender of the bonds at the office of the paying agent. Interest on the bonds will be paid by check or draft mailed by the paying agent to the persons in whose names the bonds are registered on the registration books maintained by the bond registrar at the close of business on the record date for such interest, which shall be the 15th day (whether or not a business day) of the calendar month next preceding such interest payment date.

The city will pay for the fees of the bond registrar for registration and transfer of the bonds and will also

pay for printing a reasonable supply of registered bond blanks. Any additional costs or fees that might be incurred in the secondary market, other than fees of the bond registrar, will be the responsibility of the bondholders.

Redemption of Bonds Prior to Maturity

At the option of the city, bonds maturing on November 1, 2000, and thereafter will be subject to redemption and payment prior to maturity on November 1, 1999, and thereafter in whole or in part on any interest payment date (bonds of less than a single maturity to be selected by lot in multiples of \$5,000 principal amount by the paying agent and bond registrar in such equitable manner as it shall designate), at the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest to the redemption date, without premium.

Whenever the city is to select the bonds for the purpose of redemption, it shall, in the case of bonds in denominations greater than \$5,000, if less than all of the bonds then outstanding are to be called for redemption, treat each \$5,000 of face value of each such fully registered bond as though it were a separate bond of the denomination of \$5,000.

If the city shall elect to call any bond for redemption and payment prior to the maturity thereof, the city shall give written notice of its intention to redeem and pay said bonds on a specified date, the same being described by number and maturity, said notice to be mailed by United States certified mail to the paying agent and bond registrar and to the manager or managers of the underwriting account making the successful bid, each of said notices to be mailed at least 30 days prior to the redemption date. Thereafter, the paying agent and bond registrar will notify the registered owners of the bonds of the city's redemption call by United States mail, postage prepaid. If any bond be called for redemption and payment as aforesaid, all interest on such bond shall cease from and after the date for which such call is made, provided funds are available for its payment at the price hereinbefore specified.

Conditions of Bids

Proposals will be received on the bonds bearing such rate or rates of interest as may be specified by the bidders, subject to the following conditions: The same rate shall apply to all bonds of the same maturity. Each interest rate specified shall be a multiple of 1/8 or 1/10 of 1 percent. No interest rate shall exceed the index of treasury bonds published by *The Bond Buyer* in New York, New York, on the Monday next preceding the day on which the bonds are sold, plus 2 percent. No supplemental interest payments will be authorized. No bid of less than the aggregate principal amount of the bonds and accrued interest will be considered. Each bid shall specify the total interest cost to the city during the life of the bond issue on the basis of such bid, the premium, if any, offered by the bidder, and the net interest cost to the city on the basis of such bid. Each bid shall also specify the annual net interest rate to the city on the basis of such bid. Bidders shall specify in the bid form the prices (exclu-

sive of accrued interest), expressed as a dollar price, at which the bidder intends that each maturity amount of the bonds shall be initially offered to the public (the initial reoffering prices).

Basis of Award

The award of the bonds will be made on the basis of the lowest net interest cost to the city, which will be determined by subtracting the amount of the premium bid, if any, from the total interest cost to the city. If there is any discrepancy between the net interest cost and the average annual net interest rate specified, the specified net interest cost shall govern and the interest rates specified in the bid shall be adjusted accordingly. If two or more proper bids providing for identical amounts for the lowest net interest cost are received, the city shall determine which bid, if any, shall be accepted, and its determination shall be final.

Authorization, Purpose and Security for the Bonds

The bonds are being authorized and issued to permanently finance various internal improvements to the city. The bonds will be general obligations of the city and, to the extent other legally available and unencumbered funds of the city are not available therefor, are payable as to both principal and interest from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limitation upon all the taxable tangible property, real and personal, within the territorial limits of the city.

Internal Revenue Code of 1986

The Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, imposes requirements on the city which must be met subsequent to the issuance of the bonds by the city and, as a result, the city will and does hereby covenant that it will diligently undertake those steps necessary to maintain the exclusion of the interest earned on the bonds from gross income to the owners thereof. The city's failure to comply with such requirements could adversely affect the tax-exempt status of the bonds. Purchasers of the bonds should be aware that should the bonds lose their status as tax-exempt obligations as a result of the city's failure to comply with such requirements, the bonds are neither callable nor will the rate of interest on the bonds be adjusted to reflect such circumstances.

The code includes interest on tax-exempt obligations, such as the bonds, in the adjusted current earnings of certain corporations in the calculation of alternative minimum taxable income with certain other adjustments. Furthermore, Section 59A of the code, as added by the Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act of 1986, provides for a new environmental tax generally based on corporate alternative minimum taxable income. The environmental tax is imposed whether or not the taxpayer is subject to the alternative minimum tax. The environmental tax may subject certain bondowners to additional taxation for interest earned on the bonds.

The code also requires property and casualty insurance companies, for taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 1987, to reduce the amount of their de-

ductible underwriting losses by a percentage of the amount of tax-exempt interest received or accrued on obligations acquired after August 7, 1986.

With the exception of certain "qualified tax-exempt obligations," the code provides that banks and thrift institutions may not deduct any portion of the interest cost of purchasing or carrying tax-exempt obligations such as the bonds if such interest cost is incurred in taxable years ending after December 31, 1986, with respect to obligations acquired after August 7, 1986. The city does intend to designate the bonds as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" under Section 265 of the code.

Legal Opinion

The bonds will be sold subject to the legal opinion of Perry & Hamill, Overland Park, Kansas, bond counsel, whose approving legal opinion as to the validity of the bonds will be furnished and paid for by the city, printed on the bonds and delivered to the successful bidder when the bonds are delivered. Said opinion will also state that in the opinion of bond counsel, assuming continued compliance by the city with the provisions of the ordinance authorizing the issuance of the bonds and the code, under existing law, the interest on the bonds is excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes. Under present law, interest on the bonds is also excludable from the computation of Kansas adjusted gross income for taxable years commencing after December 31, 1987.

Delivery and Payment

The city will pay for printing the bonds and will deliver the bonds, without cost to the successful bidder, properly prepared, executed and registered, on or about August 6, 1992, at such bank or trust company in the state of Kansas or the greater Kansas City, Missouri, metropolitan area as may be specified by the successful bidder. Delivery elsewhere will be at the bidder's expense. Said bidder will also be furnished with a certified transcript of the proceedings evidencing the authorization and issuance of the bonds and the usual closing documents, including a certificate that there is no litigation pending or threatened at the time of delivery of the bonds affecting their validity and a certificate regarding the completeness and accuracy of the official statement. Payment for the bonds shall be made in Federal Reserve funds, immediately subject to use by the city. The denominations of the bonds and the names, addresses and Social Security or taxpayer identification numbers of the registered owners shall be submitted in writing by the successful bidder to the city and bond registrar not later than 4 p.m. C.D.T. on July 25, 1992. In the absence of such information, the city will deliver bonds in the denomination of each maturity registered in the name of the successful bidder.

The successful bidder shall furnish the city by 4 p.m. on July 25, 1992, a certificate acceptable to the city's bond counsel to the effect that (i) the successful bidder has made a bona fide public offering of the bonds at the initial reoffering prices, and (ii) a substantial

amount of the bonds was sold to the public (excluding brokers and other intermediaries) at such initial reoffering prices. Such certificate shall state that (1) it is made on the best knowledge, information and belief of the successful bidder, and (2) 10 percent or more in par amount of the bonds of each maturity was sold to the public at or below the initial reoffering prices (such amount being sufficient to establish the sale of a "substantial amount" of the bonds).

Good Faith Deposit

Each bid shall be accompanied by a cashier's or certified check drawn on a bank located in the United States of America in the amount of \$11,200 (2 percent of aggregate principal amount of bonds) payable to the order of the city to secure the city from any loss resulting from the failure of the bidder to comply with the terms of the bid. No interest will be paid upon the deposit made by the successful bidder. Said check shall be returned to the bidder if the bid is not accepted. If a bid is accepted, said check shall be held by the city until the bidder shall have complied with all of the terms and conditions of this notice, at which time said check shall, at the option of the city, be returned to the successful bidder or deducted from the purchase price. If a bid is accepted but the city shall fail to deliver the bonds to the bidder in accordance with the terms and conditions of this notice, said check shall be returned to the bidder. If a bid is accepted but the bidder shall default in the performance of any of the terms and conditions of this notice, the proceeds of such check shall be forfeited to the city and the city reserves the right to pursue any consequential damages as a result of such default.

CUSIP Numbers

CUSIP identification numbers will be printed on the bonds, but neither the failure to print such number on any bond nor any error with respect thereto shall constitute cause for failure or refusal by the purchaser thereof to accept delivery of and pay for the bonds in accordance with the terms of this notice. All original expenses in relation to the assignment and printing of CUSIP numbers on the bonds will be paid by the city.

Bid Forms

All bids must be made on forms which may be procured from the city clerk. No additions or alterations in such forms shall be made and any erasures may cause rejection of any bid. The city reserves the right to waive irregularities and to reject any or all bids.

Submission of Bids

Bids must be submitted in sealed envelopes addressed to the undersigned city clerk and marked "Proposal for the Purchase of General Obligation Bonds, Series-A." Bids may be submitted by mail or delivered in person to the undersigned at city hall and must be received by the undersigned prior to 11 a.m. C.D.T. July 16, 1992.

Date and Delivery of Preliminary and Final Official Statement

The city has authorized the preparation and disbursement of a preliminary official statement contain-

ing information relating to the bonds. The preliminary official statement, when amended to include the interest rates specified by the purchaser and the price or yield at which the purchaser will re-offer the bonds to the public, together with any other information required by law, will constitute a "Final Official Statement" with respect to the bonds as that term is defined in SEC Rule 15c2-12. No more than seven business days after the date of the sale, the city will provide without cost to the purchaser a reasonable number of printed copies of the final official statement and further copies, if desired, will be made available at the purchaser's expense. If the sale of the bonds are awarded to a syndicate, the city will designate the senior managing purchaser of the syndicate as its agent for purposes of distributing copies of the final official statement to each participating purchaser. Any purchaser executing and delivering a bid form with respect to the bonds agrees thereby that if the bid is accepted it shall accept such designation and shall enter into a contractual relationship with all participating purchasers for the purpose of assuring the receipt and distribution by each such participating purchaser of the final official statement.

The city will deliver to the purchaser on the date of delivery of the bonds a certificate executed by the mayor and the city clerk to the effect that the final official statement, as of the date of delivery of the bonds, does not contain any untrue statement of a material fact or omit to state a material fact necessary to make the statements made, in the light of the circumstances in which they are made, not misleading.

Assessed Valuation and Indebtedness

The total assessed valuation of the taxable tangible property within the city for the year is \$23,360,210. The total general obligation bonded indebtedness of the city as of the date of the bonds, including the bonds, is \$1,965,000 (which amount includes the city's General Obligation Refunding Bonds, Series 1992-A, outstanding in the aggregate principal amount of \$1,060,000). In accordance with the financial advisor's agreement with the city, the financial advisor will either be submitting a bid or participating in a group submitting a bid for the purchase of the bonds.

Article 4.—INDIVIDUAL GAME RULES

RULES FOR INSTANT GAME NO. 45
"SUNFLOWER DOUBLER"

111-4-429. Name of Game. The Kansas Lottery shall conduct an instant winner lottery game entitled "Sunflower Doubler" commencing on June 19, 1992. Each ticket is a segment of a montage which is completed over six tickets. The specific rules for the "Sunflower Doubler" game are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-429 through 111-4-432. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-6-16-92, June 10, 1992.)

111-4-430. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "Sunflower Doubler" instant lottery game:

(a) "Game symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the game symbols are printed in black ink in 15 pt. Archer. A game symbol appears in each of six play spots within the play area. Each game symbol for this instant game is one of the following: FREE - \$1. - \$5.⁰⁰ - 25.⁰⁰ - 50.⁰⁰ - \$2500 - \$5000 - image of sunflower.

(b) "Game symbol captions" are the words or portions of words, letters or numbers printed beneath each game symbol in the play area and are used to repeat or explain the game symbol. The game symbol caption associated with each game symbol is as follows:

(c) "Ticket validation number" means a unique number appearing on each ticket which is used to validate winning tickets. For this instant game, the ticket validation number is a 10-digit number which appears below the game symbols under the removable covering in the play area on the front of each instant ticket.

(d) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. For this instant game, the book-ticket number is an 8-digit book number followed by a dash and then a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000 and end with 299. The book-ticket number

is printed in black ink on the front of each instant game ticket.

(e) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. In this instant game, the retailer validation code is a two letter code printed and appearing in two of six varying locations among the game symbols. The codes and their meanings are as follows: AA = FREE; CC = \$1.00; DD = \$2.00; KK = \$5.00; BB = \$10.00; RR = \$25.00. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 74-8710; effective, T-111-6-16-92, June 10, 1992.)

111-4-431. Determination of Instant Prize Winners. An instant prize winner is determined for this instant game when the player removed or "scratches off" the removable layer of material covering the play area to reveal the six game symbols and captions. This is a match three (3) of six (6) game which includes a doubler. If three (3) of the six (6) concealed prize amounts match, the player wins the amount shown. Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 1.—KANSAS STATE HISTORICAL SOCIETY DEACCESSIONING ACT

118-1-1. Removal of property from the collection holdings of the state historical society. (a) Disposition of certain holdings in the state archives that is regulated by K.S.A. 75-3501 et seq., and K.S.A. 45-401 et seq., shall not be subject to these regulations.

(b) The disposition of unassociated funerary objects, sacred objects, and objects of cultural patrimony shall not be subject to these regulations. The federal legislation entitled "Native American graves protection and repatriation act," 104 Stat. 3048, section two, subsection (3), paragraphs (B), (C), and (D), and subsection (13), and sections six and seven, as in effect on November 16, 1990, are adopted by reference.

(c) Definitions.

(1) "Collection holdings or properties" are historical materials, including architectural drawings, art works, artifacts, audio-visual materials, books, computer tapes or discs, governmental records, manuscripts, maps, newspapers, pamphlets, periodicals, photographs, and other tangible objects held for public use by the state historical society as the trustee of the state.

(2) "Deaccession" means to formally remove property from the state historical society collection holdings by following established professional procedures.

(3) "Deed of gift or accession record" means the legal document describing the property and transferring the title for that property to the state historical society.

(4) "Disposition" is to transfer or terminate title to and physical custody of property removed from the state historical society collection holdings.

(5) "Documentation" is recorded information held by the society pertaining to the property, including

but not limited to its history, condition, changes in ownership or custody, use in research or education, and disposition.

(6) "Donation" means to surrender physical possession and title to property for which no compensation, monetary or otherwise, is received.

(7) "Historical material" is tangible property that has historical or scientific value or significance to researchers or the general public.

(8) "Professional procedures" are those utilized by the state historical society staff based on professional training and experience which are considered ethical, legal, responsible, and which are generally accepted by other professionals in that field. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 75-2701; effective Aug. 24, 1992.)

118-1-2. Review committee. A committee shall review the property being considered for removal from the collection holdings of the society. This committee shall be known as the deaccession review committee.

(a) The deaccession review committee shall consist of the following professionals who are not society staff members: one archivist; one historian; one archeologist; one museum professional; one librarian; and one genealogist.

(b) The deaccession review committee shall also include the executive director of the society and the assistant executive director of the society.

(1) The executive director of the society or the executive director's designee shall function as chairperson of the deaccession review committee.

(2) The assistant executive director of the society shall function as secretary to the committee.

(c) Each deaccession review committee member shall be appointed to a renewable two-year term. Appointments to the deaccession review committee shall be made by the Kansas State Historical Society, Inc., executive committee based upon recommendations from the society's executive director and the general public.

(d) The deaccession review committee shall meet upon call of the chairperson. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 75-2701; effective Aug. 24, 1992.)

118-1-3. Types of property. Property to be considered for removal from the society's collection holdings is defined as follows:

(a) "Duplicate properties" are two or more tangible objects of the collection holdings which are identical or nearly identical in physical characteristics or informational content, and which are deemed by established professional standards and institutional needs and programs to be of limited value or use due to that duplication;

(b) "Property outside of the society's scope of collections" is that property which does not fall into subject areas for research, reference and other educational purposes as outlined by K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 75-2701, K.S.A. 75-2702, K.S.A. 75-2703, K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 75-2704, and the mission statement adopted by the state historical society;

(continued)

(c) "Property with insufficient research, educational, or exhibit value" is property:

(1) which lacks sufficient background information to be of use; or

(2) (A) which through accident, vandalism, natural disaster or deterioration because of age, environment, or inherent vice has become embrittled, discolored, or misshapen beyond being useful for research, reference or other educational purposes; and

(B) which cannot be repaired or conserved through reasonable expenditures of time, materials and money; and

(C) is considered to be damaged or deteriorated property;

(d) "Hazardous property," is property composed of or containing materials which by nature or through the process of deterioration present an environmental or health hazard to state historical society patrons, visitors, staff, volunteers, physical plant or collection holdings. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 75-2701; effective Aug. 24, 1992.)

118-1-4. Procedures for removal of property from the society collection holdings. The manner of disposition of property from society collections holdings shall be in the best interests of the state historical society and the public it serves and represents in owning the property. Property to be considered for removal from collection holdings shall undergo the following procedures:

(a) The society staff member responsible for the property shall assemble documentation relating to the property being considered for removal. This documentation may include deeds of gift or accession records, contracts, photographs, signed authorizations, correspondence, or advertisements. The staff member responsible for the property shall establish clear title to the property subject to the provisions of K.S.A. 58-4001 through 58-4013. For manuscript materials and images of art works this may apply to the tangible property rights only. The society shall not remove from collection holdings property for which the donor has taken a charitable donation tax deduction except in accordance with federal tax law and regulations, unless the property presents a clear and present hazard to society staff, patrons, visitors, volunteers, collection holdings, or physical plant. In the course of normal processing of collections, duplicates and extraneous materials may be removed and are exempt from deaccessioning procedures.

(b) When property which has been donated by an individual is being considered for removal from the society's collection holdings within 20 years of the donation, reasonable effort shall be made to notify the donor or the donor's immediate family of this decision.

(c) If original historical materials have been micrographically or electronically recorded, and the original materials are being considered for removal from the collection holdings, then the recorded copies must meet the following criteria:

(1) The micrographic form shall have three copies: one security negative; one copy negative or positive; and one reference copy. Electronically recorded copies

shall be made according to established standards. The security negative may remain in the possession of an outside vendor who has performed the micrographic reproduction and retains the security negative.

(2) Before removal of the original historical materials from the collection holdings, a properly trained person shall inspect the micrographic copies to determine that they are satisfactory substitutes for the originals. This shall include refilming or appropriate treatment for re-dox and other forms of deterioration.

(3) The security copies shall be periodically inspected for deterioration, and that deterioration shall be controlled.

(4) The internal committees for collection review shall review the property being considered for removal from the collection holdings of that division. A list of property agreed upon for removal shall be forwarded to the society's assistant executive director.

(e) The deaccession review committee shall review the property being recommended for removal from the collection holdings.

(1) The society's assistant executive director shall provide to the deaccession review committee members a list of property being considered for removal from the society's collection holdings. The society's assistant executive director shall also provide public notice of the availability of that list for public review. Accompanying this list to deaccession review committee members shall be appropriate documentation and rationale for removal of the property from the collection holdings. This list shall include a mail ballot to be returned to the society's assistant executive director within 30 days of receipt. For each item on the list there shall be two choices: deaccession review committee members may either authorize the item for deaccession or defer the item for discussion at a meeting of the deaccession review committee. A unanimous vote by mail ballot returned by the due date shall be required to authorize property for deaccession from the society's collection holdings.

(2) A meeting of the deaccession review committee shall be called by the society's assistant executive director to discuss that property deferred on the mail ballot. Five members shall constitute a quorum. The deaccession review committee shall reach a two-thirds majority agreement of members present before property may be removed from the society's collection holdings. When a two-thirds majority agreement cannot be reached to remove property, the property shall be retained in the society's collection holdings.

(f) Property determined by the deaccession review committee to be appropriate for removal from the society's collection holdings shall be disposed of by one of the following methods. Guidelines for these choices shall be specified in the state historical society's collection development policies. Preference shall be for the property to remain in public ownership or domain. Options are not prioritized and include the following:

(1) Hazardous property shall be disposed of according to existing state and federal laws or guidelines from appropriate state and federal regulatory agencies.

(2) Kansas newspapers shall be offered to historical or genealogical societies or other appropriate institutions or individuals of the county or area in which the newspaper was originally published. If competing entities are requesting newspapers and the matter cannot be resolved locally, the deaccession review committee shall make the final decision.

(3) When possible, property may be traded to a public or private institution or individual for property the society wishes to obtain. The guidelines for acquisition are specified in the state historical society collection development policies.

(4) Property may be offered for donation or sale to Kansas libraries, museums, archives, historical and genealogical societies, educational institutions, and other not-for-profit repositories for historical materials, public or private.

(5) When appropriate, property may be offered for donation or sale to out-of-state libraries, museums, archives, historical and genealogical societies, educational institutions, and other not-for-profit repositories for historical materials, public or private.

(6) Property may be sold to the general public.
 (7) Property not disposed of by trade, donation, or sale may be destroyed by burning, shredding, recycling, depository in a landfill, or by other methods.

(8) Documentation relating to the property removed from the collection holdings shall be amended to include the date and method of disposition. The documentation shall be accessible upon request during the society's regular business hours. Some donor information may be restricted as provided for in K.S.A. 45-221, subsection (a)(8).

(9) Property offered for sale to the general public may not be purchased by society employees or officers or deaccession review committee members. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 75-2701; effective Aug. 24, 1992.)

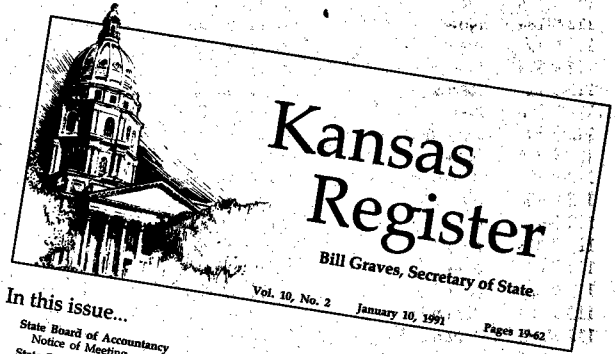
