Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 10 a.m. Tuesday, March 23, at the office of the Kansas State Board of Healing Arts, 235 S. Topeka Blvd., Topeka, to consider proposed changes in existing rule and regulation 100-47-1 of the Kansas State Board of Healing Arts on a permanent basis.

The following is a brief summary of the purpose of the proposed changes to the rule and regulation and the anticipated fiscal impact of each proposed change.

The proposed changes to K.A.R. 100-47-1 deal specifically with continuing education for physical therapists and physical therapist assistants.

Economic Impact: These regulations all relate to physical therapists and physical therapist assistants. The changes made are to clarify current rules and regulations. No economic impact from these amendments are expected.

Hazardous Waste Facility Permit

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment and Region VII of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency are providing public notice of the intent to revoke, modify and reissue the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act (RCRA) hazardous waste facility permit issued to the Systech Environmental Corporation, Fredonia. A draft permit has been prepared to address these actions and is available for public review.

Systech is a company wholly owned by the Lafarge Corporation. Systech operates a commercial hazardous waste storage facility at Fredonia. Lafarge owns and operates a cement plant located next to the Systech facility. Hazardous wastes are received, stored and blended into a hazardous waste derived fuel at the Systech facility. Systech transfers the hazardous waste derived fuel to the Lafarge cement plant where it is burned in cement kilns as supplemental fuel.

In 1984, two separate hazardous waste storage permits were issued for the operations at the Fredonia Systech facility—a state permit from KDHE and a federal permit from EPA. Both state and federal permits were issued because, at that time, Kansas had not yet received final authorization from EPA to implement the state's own hazardous waste program, in lieu of the federal program. On October 17, 1985, KDHE received final authorization from EPA, except for those portions of RCRA covered by the 1984 Hazardous and Solid Waste Amendments (HSWA). The EPA has retained authority for the HSWA provisions until such time as KDHE receives final authorization for these provisions.

In 1991, Systech requested a permit modification to add 24 new waste codes and to expand its hazardous waste container and tank storage facilities. The addition of the 24 new waste codes will allow Systech to manage wastes defined by a new regulatory procedure. Expansion of the hazardous waste storage facilities would increase the permitted container storage capacity from 26,620 to 303,600 gallons and increase the permitted tank storage capacity from 490,000 to 843,000. The total permitted hazardous waste storage capacity would be increased from 516,620 to 1,146,600 gallons.

Neither of the original permits contained HSWA provisions; therefore, having received final authorization, KDHE is now solely authorized to revoke, modify and re-issue both the original KDHE and EPA permits. The draft permit prepared to address the proposed modifications will, however, contain both HSWA and non-HSWA provisions. Therefore, issuance of the draft permit requires a joint KDHE/EPA action. KDHE's portion of the draft permit (Part I) covers the non-HSWA provisions. These include construction, operation and maintenance of the hazardous waste container and tank storage facilities. EPA's portion of the draft permit (Part II) covers the HSWA provisions which include

the land disposal restrictions, corrective action for releases from solid waste management units (SWMU), waste minimization, newly listed hazardous wastes and fugitive emissions from hazardous waste process units.

A 45-day public comment period (February 18 to April 5) has been established for this permitting action. During the public comment period, the administrative record, which includes the draft permit, the fact sheet, the Part B permit applications, and all relevant correspondence, will be available for public review during normal business hours at the following locations:

At the end of the public comment period, the KDHE secretary and the EPA-Region VII Director of Waste Management shall make a final decision on the draft permit. In making the final decision, the KDHE secretary and the EPA director will take into consideration all written comments received during the public comment period, all verbal comments made at the public hearing, and all KDHE/EPA hazardous waste rules, regulations and hazardous waste permitting policies. Notice of the final decision will be sent to the applicant and to all who submitted written comments or requested notice of the final decision.

Article 5.—CODE OF PROFESSIONAL CONDUCT

74-5-2. Definitions. The following definitions are applicable wherever such terminology is used in the rules of conduct: (a) "Board" means the Kansas state board of accountancy.

(b) "Certified public accountant," or "CPA," means a holder of a Kansas certificate as a certified public accountant and firms registered with the board to practice certified public accountancy.

(c) "Client" means any person or persons or any entity that retains a certified public accountant or a registered firm for the performance of professional services.

(d) "Enterprise" means any person or persons or entity, whether organized for profit or not, for which a certified public accountant provides services.

(e) "Firm" means a proprietorship, partnership or professional corporation or association engaged in the practice of public accounting.

(f) "Financial statements" means:

(1) the statements and related footnotes that purport to show financial position at a particular point in time or changes in financial position over a period of time;

(2) the statements which use a cash or other incomplete basis of accounting; and

(3) the balance sheets, statements of income, statements of retained earnings, statements of cash flow, and statements of changes in owners' equity. Incidental financial data included in management advisory services reports to support recommendations to a client and tax returns and supporting schedules do not, for this purpose, constitute financial statements. The required affidavit or signature on tax returns prepared by a certified public accountant shall not constitute an opinion regarding financial statements.

(g) "Practice of public accountancy" means offering to perform or performing for a client one or more types of services involving the use of accounting or auditing skills, or one or more types of management advisory

services, including financial planning, preparation of tax returns or furnishing of advice on tax matters, while stating or implying that one is a certified public accountant. Use of the term "public accountant" shall not be interpreted as implying that one is a "certified" public accountant.

(h) "Professional services" means any services performed or offered to be performed by a certified public accountant in the course of the practice of public accountancy.

(i) "Public communication" means a communication made in identical form to multiple persons or to the world at large, as by television, radio, motion picture, newspaper, pamphlet, mass mailing, letterhead, business card or directory.

(j) "Licensed municipal public accountant," or "LMPA," means a holder of a permit issued under the laws of Kansas to practice as a municipal public accountant.

(k) "Personal Financial Planning" means the ongoing process of designing financial strategies and making planning decisions that are intended to implement goals, including assisting clients by organizing data, performing analyses, providing suggestions and recommendations, assisting in decision making, and facilitating the implementation of planning decisions.

(l) "Contingent fee" is any fee established for the performance of any services pursuant to an arrangement in which no fee will be charged unless a specified finding or result is attained, or in which the amount of the fee is otherwise dependent upon the finding or result of such services. Fees fixed by courts or other public authorities, or in tax matters which are determined based on the results of judicial proceedings or the findings of governmental agencies are not regarded as being contingent.

(m) "Audit" means performing an independent examination of the financial information of any entity, irrespective of profit orientation, size and legal form, when such an examination is conducted to express an opinion thereon.

(n) "Review" means performing inquiry and analytical procedures that provide the accountant with a reasonable basis for expressing limited assurance that there are no material modifications that should be made to the statements in order for them to be in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles or, if applicable, with another comprehensive basis of accounting.

(o) "Compilation" means presenting information in the form of financial statements that is the representation of the client without undertaking to express any assurance on the statements. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1-202(c)(1), K.S.A. 75-1119(a); effective Jan. 1, 1974; amended May 1, 1978; amended May 1, 1979; amended May 1, 1985; amended July 22, 1991; amended July 13, 1992; amended April 5, 1993.)

The district reserves the right on the date of the award to, in its sole discretion, increase or decrease the total principal amount of the bonds, depending on the interest rates bid and the issue prices specified, in order to properly structure the escrow account for the bonds to be refunded. Principal maturities will be increased or decreased at the discretion of the district. The aggregate size of the issue may be increased or decreased by not more than \$27,500. The successful bidder may not withdraw its bid or change the interest rates bid as a result of any changes made to the principal amount of the bonds as described herein. The bonds will bear interest at rates to be determined when the bonds are sold as hereinafter provided, which interest will be payable semiannually on March 1 and September 1 in each year, beginning on September 1, 1993.

Place of Payment and Bond Registration

The principal of and interest on the bonds will be payable in lawful money of the United States of America by check or draft of the Kansas State Treasurer, Topeka, Kansas (the paying agent and bond registrar). The principal of the bonds will be payable at maturity or upon earlier redemption to the registered owners upon presentation and surrender of the bonds at the office of the paying agent. Interest on the bonds will be paid by check or draft mailed by the paying agent to the persons in whose names the bonds are registered on the registration books maintained by the bond registrar at the close of business on the record date for such interest, which shall be the 15th day (whether or not a business day) of the calendar month next preceding such interest payment date.

The district will pay for the fees of the bond registrar for registration and transfer of the bonds and will also pay for printing a reasonable supply of registered bond blanks. Any additional costs or fees that might be incurred in the secondary market, other than fees of the bond registrar, will be the responsibility of the bondholders.

Redemption of Bonds Prior to Maturity

At the option of the district, bonds maturing on September 1, 2002, and thereafter will be subject to redemption and payment prior to maturity on September 1, 2001, and thereafter in whole or in part on any interest payment date (bonds of less than a single maturity to be selected by lot in multiples of \$5,000 principal amount by the paying agent and bond registrar

in such equitable manner as it shall designate), at the principal amount thereof, plus accrued interest to the redemption date, without premium.

Whenever the district is to select the bonds for the purpose of redemption, it shall, in the case of bonds in denominations greater than \$5,000, if less than all of the bonds then outstanding are to be called for redemption, treat each \$5,000 of face value of each such fully registered bond as though it were a separate bond of the denomination of \$5,000.

If the district shall elect to call any bond for redemption and payment prior to the maturity thereof, the city shall give written notice of its intention to redeem and pay said bonds on a specified date, the same being described by number and maturity, said notice to be mailed by United States registered or certified mail addressed to the paying agent and bond registrar, and to the manager or managers of the underwriting account making the successful bid, each of said notices to be mailed at least 30 days prior to the redemption date. Thereafter, the paying agent and bond registrar will notify the owners of the bonds of the district's redemption call by United States mail, postage prepaid. If any bond be called for redemption and payment as aforesaid, all interest on such bond shall cease from and after the date for which such call is made, provided funds are available for its payment at the price hereinbefore specified.

Conditions of Bids

Proposals will be received on the bonds bearing such rate or rates of interest as may be specified by the bidders, subject to the following conditions: The same rate shall apply to all bonds of the same maturity. Each interest rate specified shall be a multiple of $\frac{1}{8}$ or $\frac{1}{20}$ of 1 percent. No interest rate shall exceed index of treasury bonds published by *The Bond Buyer*, successor to *MuniWeek*, in New York, New York, on the Monday next preceding the day on which the bonds are sold, plus 2 percent. The difference between the highest rate specified and the lowest rate specified shall not exceed 2 percent. No supplemental interest payments will be authorized. No bid of less than the principal amount of the bonds and accrued interest will be considered. Each bid shall specify the total interest cost to the district during the life of the bond issue on the basis of such bid, the premium, if any, offered by the bidder, and the net interest cost to the district on the basis of such bid. Each bid shall also specify the average annual net interest rate to the district on the basis of such bid. Bidders shall specify in the bid form the prices (exclusive of accrued interest), expressed as a dollar price, at which the bidder intends that each maturity amount of the bonds shall be initially offered to the public (the initial reoffering prices). The successful bidder will initially reoffer bonds maturing on and after September 1, 2002, at dollar prices equal to or greater than 100 percent of the principal amount of such bonds.

Basis of Award

The award of the bonds will be made on the basis of the lowest net interest cost to the district, which

will be determined by subtracting the amount of the premium bid, if any, from the total interest cost to the district. If there is any discrepancy between the net interest cost and the average annual net interest rate specified, the specified net interest cost shall govern and the interest rates specified in the bid shall be adjusted accordingly. If two or more proper bids providing for identical amounts for the lowest net interest cost are received, the district shall determine which bid, if any, shall be accepted, and its determination shall be final.

Security for the Bonds

The bonds will be general obligations of the district, payable as to both principal and interest from ad valorem taxes which may be levied, without limitation as to rate or amount on all the taxable tangible property, real and personal, within the territorial limits of the district.

Internal Revenue Code of 1986

The Internal Revenue Code of 1986 imposes requirements on the district which must be met subsequent to the issuance of the bonds by the district and, as a result, the city will and does hereby covenant that it will diligently undertake those steps necessary to maintain the tax-exempt status of the bonds. The district's failure to comply with such requirements could adversely affect the tax-exempt status of the bonds. Purchasers of the bonds should be aware that should the bonds lose their status as tax-exempt obligations as a result of the district's failure to comply with such requirements, the bonds are neither callable nor will the rate of interest on the bonds be adjusted to reflect such circumstances.

The code includes interest on tax-exempt obligations, such as the bonds, in the adjusted current earnings of certain corporations in the calculation of alternative minimum taxable income with certain other adjustments. Furthermore, Section 59A of the code, as added by the Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act of 1986, provides for a new environmental tax generally based on corporate alternative minimum taxable income. The amount of the tax is equal to 0.12 percent of the excess of alternative minimum taxable income, without regard to net operating losses and the deduction for this tax, over \$2 million. The environmental tax is imposed whether or not the taxpayer is subject to the alternative minimum tax. The environmental tax may subject certain bondowners to additional taxation for interest earned on the bonds.

The code also requires property and casualty insurance companies to reduce the amount of their deductible underwriting losses by a percentage of the amount of tax-exempt interest received or accrued on such obligations. With the exception of certain "qualified tax-exempt obligations," the code provides that banks and thrift institutions may not deduct any portion of the interest cost of purchasing or carrying tax-exempt obligations such as the bonds. Under Section 265 of the code, the bonds are not and, as such, will

not be designated by the district as "qualified tax-exempt obligations."

Legal Opinion

The bonds will be sold subject to the legal opinion of Nichols and Wolfe Chartered, Topeka, Kansas, bond counsel, whose approving legal opinion as to the validity of the bonds will be furnished and paid for by the district, printed on the bonds and delivered to the successful bidder when the bonds are delivered. Said opinion will also state that in the opinion of bond counsel, assuming continued compliance by the district with the provisions of the resolution authorizing the issuance of the bonds and the code, under existing law, the interest on the bonds is excludable from federal income taxation. Interest on the bonds will also be excludable from the computation of Kansas adjusted gross income.

Delivery and Payment

The district will pay for printing the bonds and will deliver the bonds, without cost to the successful bidder, properly prepared, executed and registered, on or about March 18, 1993, at such bank or trust company in the state of Kansas or greater Kansas City, Missouri, metropolitan area as may be specified by the successful bidder. Delivery elsewhere will be at the bidder's expense. Said bidder will also be furnished with a certified transcript of the proceedings evidencing the authorization and issuance of the bonds and the usual closing documents, including a certificate that there is no litigation pending or threatened at the time of delivery of the bonds affecting their validity and a certificate regarding the completeness and accuracy of the official statement. Payment for the bonds shall be made in Federal Reserve funds, immediately subject to use by the district. The denominations of the bonds and the names, addresses and Social Security or taxpayer identification numbers of the registered owners shall be submitted in writing by the successful bidder to the district and bond registrar not later than 3 p.m. C.S.T. on March 11, 1993. The district has authorized the preparation and disbursement of a preliminary official statement containing information relating to the bonds. The preliminary official statement comprises the final official statement required by Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

The preliminary official statement, when amended to include the interest rates specified by the purchaser and the price or yield at which the purchaser will re-offer the bonds to the public, together with any other information required by law, will constitute a "Final Official Statement" with respect to the bonds as that term is defined in Rule 15c2-12. No more than seven business days after the date of the sale, the district will provide without cost to the purchaser such reasonable number of printed copies of the final official statement and further copies, if desired, will be made available at the purchaser's expense. If the sale of the bonds are awarded to a syndicate, the district will designate the senior managing purchaser of the syndicates as its agent for purposes of distributing copies of the final official statement to each participating purchaser. Any purchaser executing and delivering a bid form with respect to the bonds agrees thereby that if the bid is accepted it shall accept such designation and shall enter into a contractual relationship with all participating purchasers for the purpose of assuring the receipt and distribution by each such participating purchaser of the final official statement.

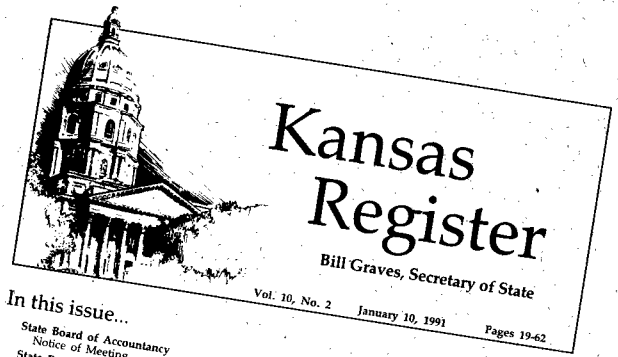
