Cities and Municipalities—General Provisions—City Retailers' Sales Tax; Election. Michael G. Coash, El Dorado City Attorney, El Dorado, February 18, 1993.

A city can hold an election on the issue of continuing a retailers' sales tax which will sunset more than one year after the election. Cited herein: K.S.A. 1992 Supp. 12-187; 12-189; K.S.A. 12-191; 79-3607; K.S.A. 1971 Supp. 79-4426. MF

Automobiles and Other Vehicles—Uniform Act Regulating Traffic; Powers of State and Local Authorities—Regulations Governing Design and Operation of School Buses; Compliance with Federal Guidelines. Senator Sandy Praeger, 2nd District, Lawrence, February 22, 1993.

Highway safety program guideline 17 (23 C.F.R. 1204.4) dealing with pupil transportation safety and promulgated pursuant to the highway safety act of 1966, 23 U.S.C. § 401 *et seq.*, does not impose a federal mandate; it is a guideline that contains recommendations. Thus state regulations do not violate federal law by not requiring that students on small school buses [gross vehicle weight rating (GVWR) less than 10,000 pounds] use seat belts. Notice of Permanent Quarantine

Pine Shoot Beetle, *Tomicus piniperda* (L.)

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the pine shoot beetle, *Tomicus piniperda* (L.), is a plant pest as defined in K.S.A. 2-2113,

WHEREAS, it has been determined that the pine shoot beetle has been introduced, detected, and become established in certain states, and is not known to exist in Kansas,

WHEREAS, if the pine shoot beetle becomes established in Kansas, it will drastically and adversely affect the nursery and Christmas tree industries of this state.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Sam Brownback, Secretary of the State Board of Agriculture, pursuant to authority vested in me by K.S.A. 2-2117, hereby determine that quarantine action is necessary to prevent the introduction of this plant pest into the state of Kansas, and to prevent and retard the spread of this plant pest within this state. The Secretary does hereby immediately establish a permanent exterior quarantine of said pest to become effective immediately to prevent the establishment of the pine shoot beetle, *Tomicus piniperda* (L.), in the state of Kansas. Any movement of the pine shoot beetle, *Tomicus piniperda* (L.), into or across the state of Kansas is hereby prohibited.

Definitions:

All terms used within this quarantine shall have the meanings described to them in K.S.A. 2-2113 *et seq.* as amended and supplemented.

Regulated Areas:

1. The counties in the states listed below are hereby considered regulated areas due to the confirmed presence of the pine shoot beetle, *Tomicus piniperda* (L.).

Illinois: Kane and Will counties.
Indiana: Allen, Elkhart, Fulton, Jasper, Kosciusko, LaGrange, Lake, LaPorte, Marshall, Newton, Noble, Porter, Pulaski, St. Joseph, Starke, Stueben, Wells, and Whitley counties.

Michigan: Berrien, Cass, Monroe, and St. Joseph counties.
New York: Erie and Niagara counties.
Ohio: Ashland, Ashtabula, Cuyahoga, Geauga, Huron, Lake, Lorain, Mahoning, Medina, Portage, Richland, Summit, Trumbull, and Wayne counties.
Pennsylvania: Crawford, Erie, and Lawrence counties.

2. Any other county in the United States where the presence of the pine shoot beetle, *Tomicus piniperda* (L.), is confirmed.

Regulated Articles:

1. The pine shoot beetle, *Tomicus piniperda* (L.), in any living stage of development, including but not limited to egg, larvae or any other stage.
2. Live or cut plants of the genus *Pinus* spp., *Picea* spp., *Abies* spp., *Larix* spp.
3. Timber from the genus *Pinus* spp., *Picea* spp., *Abies* spp., or *Larix* spp. with bark intact.
4. Ornamental foliage from the genus *Pinus* spp., *Picea* spp., *Abies* spp., or *Larix* spp.
5. Any other article, product or thing capable of being a means of conveyance of the pine shoot beetle, *Tomicus piniperda* (L.), or any living stage of development when it is determined that such article presents a hazard, either actual or potential, for the spread of the pine shoot beetle, *Tomicus piniperda* (L.), and when the person in possession thereof has been so notified.

Any person who resists or impedes or otherwise hampers the Secretary of the State Board of Agriculture or the Secretary's authorized representative in carrying out the provisions of this quarantine or enforcing this quarantine shall be subject to criminal penalties as provided in the Kansas Plant and Pest Act (K.S.A. 2-2113 *et seq.* as amended and supplemented). Any duly authorized inspector or agent of the Secretary may enlist the aid of any law enforcement official to enforce and carry out the provisions of this quarantine and the provisions of the Plant-Pest Act in relations thereto.

Conditions of Movement of Regulated Articles:

Regulated articles are not allowed into Kansas from any regulated area, except:

1. Specimens of *Tomicus piniperda* (L.) may be moved into Kansas only if accompanied by a valid permit allowing such movement.

Effective Date of Quarantine:

This Order of Quarantine is effective upon the date signed by the Secretary of the State Board of Agriculture as set forth below and shall remain in effect until rescinded or modified by further order of the Secretary.

Permanent Administrative Regulations

Article 37.—OILFIELD CERTIFICATION PROGRAM

36-37.1. Definition section. (a) "Annual certification fee" means the monetary amount which each company must pay in order to become certified.

(b) "Annual certification permit" means the official form that allows operation of an OSR on state highways and which is valid only when signed by a representative of KDOT and the applicant.

(c) "Bridge analysis" means the evaluation process completed by KDOT bridge design section and staff to determine whether to allow movement of an OSR.

(d) "Holidays" means New Years Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day.

(e) "Inventory number" means the number which uniquely identifies that particular OSR as part of an applicant's inventory.

(f) "KDOT" means the Kansas department of transportation.

(g) "KHP" means Kansas highway patrol.

(h) "Local law enforcement agency" means the area police department or enforcement agency having the responsibility for enforcing the provisions of these regulations.

(i) "Oilfield servicing rig" means a vehicle, which is self-propelled and used in well servicing, well clean-out, and consisting in general of a mast, an engine for power, a draw works, and a chassis permanently constructed or assembled for such purposes. All equipment on the oilfield servicing rig shall be "reasonably non-divisible." An "oilfield servicing rig" shall hereafter be referred to as "OSR."

(j) "OSR certification" means the process each applicant must complete before being allowed to operate an OSR on any state maintained highway.

(k) "Place of business" means the location designated by an owner central to the operation of each OSR.

(l) "Reasonably non-divisible" shall, for the purpose of this section, mean all necessary tools to be used in the servicing of a well. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 8-1911; effective April 19, 1993.)

36-37.2. Violations. (a) The KHP and local law enforcement agencies shall enforce the provisions of these regulations.

(b) The KHP or local law enforcement agency shall halt the movement of an OSR and issue appropriate fines if it determines that:

(1) an OSR does not comply with these regulations;

(2) the annual certification permit cannot be produced; or

(3) further movement of the OSR will create an unsafe condition or may cause injury to the traveling public. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 8-1911; effective April 19, 1993.)

36-37.3. Requirements. (a) When an OSR exceeds the standards defined in K.S.A. 8-1902, 8-1904, 8-1908 and 8-1909, the applicant shall contact KDOT to obtain an annual certification permit before operating the OSR on any state highway.

(b) A certified OSR shall operate only within a 100-mile radius of the designated place of business.

(c) An OSR shall not be allowed to cross any posted bridge or structure which has been restricted to an axle, tandem, or gross weight that is less than the axle, tandem, or gross weight of the OSR.

(d) No OSR shall travel on the Interstate system.

(e) An oversize/overweight permit must be obtained by the owner of any OSR moving outside a 100-mile radius from its designated place of business or when moving an OSR which exceeds the maximum axle or gross weight allowed in these regulations.

(1) The owner of an OSR which moves outside the 100-mile radius from the designated place of business shall:

(A) Obtain an oversize/overweight permit form from KDOT;

(B) Provide the information listed on the form;

(C) Obtain approval from KDOT for the move; and

(D) Pay the appropriate permit fee.

If approval is by telephone, a copy of the oversize/overweight permit and the permit fee must be mailed to KDOT within 24 hours. A return trip shall be allowed on the original OSR permit, if the move can be made within seven calendar days.

(2) An OSR exceeding the axle or gross weights specified in these regulations must make a written request to KDOT for a bridge analysis.

(A) The analysis shall be completed and approval granted before the OSR can be permitted movement on any state highway.

(B) A bridge analysis shall not be required for the return trip, provided that:

(continued)

(i) The gross weight of the OSR has not changed significantly;

(ii) The route used for the return trip is the same as the route originally used by the OSR to reach the worksite; and

(iii) The return trip is made within 60 days.

The owner of the OSR shall contact the area or district engineer before moving to determine the condition of the route, to furnish the engineer with the time and date of the move and to receive final approval.

(3) Authorizations for oversize/overweight permits are limited to seven calendar days.

(4) An oversize/overweight permit shall not be renewed. If additional time is necessary, a new oversize/overweight permit shall be purchased.

(5) Issuance of an oversize/overweight permit shall not affect the status of any prior OSR certification which has been issued to the owner of the OSR.

(6) Deviation from the route shown on the oversize/overweight permit shall not be permitted, except that marked detours shall be considered part of the original permit.

(7) No oversize/overweight permit shall be modified after it has been issued.

(g) An OSR shall be allowed to operate on Saturdays as part of its regular operation. Movement of an OSR on Sundays and holidays shall be limited to the crossing of state highways at intersections.

(h) No OSR may pass under or cross any structure, bridge overpass or underpass without a minimum clearance of six inches from any part of such structure, bridge overpass or underpass.

(i) An overweight OSR shall not be allowed to cross any posted bridge or structure which has been restricted to an axle, tandem or gross weight that is less than the axle, tandem or gross weight of the OSR.

(j) Acceptance of the annual certification permit or of any oversize/overweight permit by the applicant shall be evidence the applicant assures full compliance with all requirements contained in K.S.A. 8-1911 and these regulations.

(k) Every OSR is subject to periodic inspections at the discretion of KDOT, KHP or the local law enforcement agency.

(l) Each annual certification permit or oversize/overweight permit shall be issued to a specific OSR and applicant, and shall not be transferable to another owner or OSR.

(m) A valid copy of the annual certification permit and any authorized oversize/overweight permit shall be carried in the OSR.

(n) The annual certification permit remains valid for one year.

(o) All axles shall be permanently fastened to the OSR.

(p) Each axle shall be secured in such a fashion to the OSR which eliminates all possibility of any axle being raised or lowered during movement of the OSR.

(q) The tires for an added axle shall be the same size and type as those on the nearest axle.

(r) All pressure-controlling devices shall be located outside the cab of the OSR and shall not be accessible to the driver while inside the cab of the OSR.

(s) Each axle of a tandem or triple configuration of an OSR shall always carry a proportional amount of weight. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 8-1911; effective April 19, 1993.)

36-37-4. Insurance requirements. (a) An applicant shall have all motor vehicle liability insurance coverages as required by federal, state and local law for the type of vehicle for which certification is sought.

(b) All insurance requirements shall be in force as of the date of certification and maintained after that date for the period covered by the certification.

(c) The applicant shall furnish proof of insurance upon demand by the KDOT or local law enforcement agency.

(d) Failure to maintain required coverages shall result in revocation of the certificate. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 8-1911; effective April 19, 1993.)

36-37-5. Fees. (a) Fees associated with the "oilfield certification" program shall be those established in K.S.A. 8-1911.

(b) No refunds or adjusting of fees received by the KDOT shall be permitted. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 8-1911; effective April 19, 1993.)

36-37-6. Weight limitations. (a) The maximum axle weights allowed for an annual certification shall be:

- (1) 24,000 pounds for single axles;
- (2) 49,000 pounds for tandem axles; and
- (3) 60,000 pounds for tridem axles.

(b) The maximum gross weights allowed for an annual certification shall be:

- (1) 89,000 pounds for four axles;
- (2) 95,000 pounds for five axles;
- (3) 110,000 pounds for six axles; and
- (4) 120,000 pounds for seven axles or more. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 8-1911; effective April 19, 1993.)

Article 38.—MULTI-JURISDICTIONAL OVERSIZE, OVERWEIGHT PERMIT PROGRAM

36-38-1. Special limitations. A permit for travel in those states included in the multi-state agreement of the Multi-Jurisdictional Oversize/Overweight program of the Mississippi Valley region may be issued by the secretary or the secretary's designee. Permits issued in accordance with the multi-state agreement shall be issued only on the form approved by the permit officials of each state. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 8-1911; 68-404; effective April 19, 1993.)

36-38-2. Adoption of standards. The Kansas department of transportation adopts by reference the standards established in the General Conditions of the Multi-jurisdictional Oversize/Overweight program. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 8-1911; 68-404; effective April 19, 1993.)

Article 16.—CHARTER APPLICATIONS

17-16-8. Statements in support or opposition of an application. (a) In the published notice concerning the investigating subcommittee hearing in the community where the proposed bank or trust company is to be located, and in the notice furnished to any interested party, there shall be a notice statement that any interested party may submit in writing a statement in support of or opposing the application. Any statement of support or opposition shall be filed in the office of the state bank commissioner not later than ten days after the completion of the local hearing conducted by the investigating subcommittee.

(b) The applicant shall be notified of the receipt of any statement, and, at the expense of the applicant, furnished a copy. The applicant shall be entitled to respond to any such statement, either in writing or by personal appearance before the state banking board. All responses shall be written and submitted within ten days following the date the applicant was furnished copies of the statement. Unless expressly waived by an applicant, the public hearing shall be deemed incomplete until those ten days for response have passed. Article 21.—INTERSTATE BANKING

17-21-2. Applications. A bank holding company located in a state contiguous to this state or in the state of Arkansas or Iowa, with the approval of the Office of the State Bank Commissioner, may acquire control of one or more Kansas banks or bank holding companies. A bank holding company located in a state contiguous to this state or in the state of Arkansas or Iowa, with respect to each bank or bank holding company acquisition, shall file a separate application with the commissioner requesting prior approval of the acquisition. A separate application and fee shall be filed for each bank to be acquired. Any additional costs of the application shall be borne by the applicant holding company. RULES FOR INSTANT GAME NO. 53
"DOUBLE YOUR LUCK"

111-4-466. Name of game. The Kansas lottery shall conduct an instant winner lottery game entitled "Double Your Luck" commencing on March 3, 1993. The specific rules for the "Double Your Luck" game are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-466 through 111-4-469. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-2-23-93, Feb. 19, 1993.)

111-4-467. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "Double Your Luck" instant lottery game:

(a) "Game symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the game symbols are printed in black ink in WGI Symbol Font 15. A game symbol appears in each of six play spots within the play area. Each game symbol for this instant game is one of the following: \$1.00 - \$5.00 - 25.00 - \$2500 - \$5000 - image of a clover.

(b) "Game symbol captions" are the words or portions of words, letters or numbers printed beneath each game symbol in the play area and are used to repeat or explain the game symbol. The game symbol caption associated with each game symbol is as follows:

(d) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. For this instant game, the book-ticket number is an 8-digit book number followed by a dash and then a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000 and end with 299. The book-ticket number is printed in black ink on the front of each instant game ticket.

(e) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid

by the retailer. In this instant game, the retailer validation code is a two letter code printed and appearing in two of six varying locations among the game symbols. The codes and their meanings are as follows: CC = \$1.00; DD = \$2.00; KK = \$5.00; BB = \$10.00; RR = \$25.00. 111-4-468. Determination of Instant Prize Winners. An instant prize winner is determined for this instant game when the player removes or "scratches off" the removable layer of material covering the play area to reveal the six game symbols and captions. This is a match three (3) of six (6) game which includes a doubler. If three (3) of the six (6) concealed prize amounts match, the player wins the amount shown. If two (2) of the six (6) concealed prize amounts match and a doubler symbol is found, the player wins double the prize amount. No ticket will be eligible to win more than one prize. Article 5.—KANSAS LOTTO AMERICA GAME RULES

111-5-28. Prize Payments; Annuitized and Cash Prizes. (a) Grand prizes shall be paid with per winner annuities. If an annuity has a cash value of less than \$250,000, the MUSL board, in its sole discretion, may elect to pay the cash value of the annuity. All annuitized prizes shall be paid annually in twenty equal payments with the initial payment being made in cash, to be followed by nineteen payments funded by the annuity. The initial payment of an annuitized prize shall not be made by a party lottery until after the fifteenth calendar day following the drawing.

(b) In the event of the death of a lottery winner during the payment period, the MUSL Board, in its sole discretion, upon the petition of the estate of the lottery winner to the Kansas lottery may accelerate the payment of all of the remaining lottery proceeds to the estate. If the MUSL Board makes such a determination, then securities and/or cash held for the deceased lottery winner, which represents the present

(continued)

value of that portion of the future lottery payments that are to be accelerated, shall be distributed to the estate. The valuation of the securities and determination of the present value of the accelerated lottery payments shall be at the sole discretion of the MUSL Board.

(c) All prizes, other than grand prizes, shall be paid in cash through the party lottery which sold the winning ticket(s). A party lottery may begin paying cash prizes after receiving authorization to pay from the MUSL central office.

(d) Annuitized payments of the grand prize or a share of the grand prize may be rounded to facilitate the purchase of an appropriate funding mechanism. Breakage on a grand prize win shall be added to the first cash payment to the winner or winners. Prizes which, under these rules, may become single-payment, pari-mutuel prizes, may be rounded down so that prizes can be paid in multiples of whole dollars. Breakage resulting from rounding these prizes shall be carried forward to the prize pool for the next drawing.

(e) If the grand prize is not won in a drawing, the prize money allocated for the grand prize shall roll over and be added to the grand prize pool for the following drawing.

(f) The MUSL board may offer guaranteed minimum grand prize amounts or minimum increases in the grand prize amount between drawings or make other changes in the allocation of prize money where the MUSL board finds that it would be in the best interest of the game. Changes in the allocation of prize money shall be designed to retain approximately the same prize allocation percentages, over a year's time, set out in these rules. Minimum guaranteed prizes or increases may be waived if the alternate funding mechanism set out in K.A.R. 111-5-26 becomes necessary.

(g) The holder of a winning ticket may win only one prize per board in connection with the winning numbers drawn, and shall be entitled only to the prize won by those numbers in the highest matching prize category.

(h) All prizes must be claimed within 365 days of the day of the drawing in which the prize was won. In the event the final day of the 365-day period falls on a Saturday, a Sunday or a state holiday, the claim period will be extended to end on the next business day. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-8710; implementing K.S.A. 74-8710 and 74-8731; effective, T-111-3-5-92, Feb. 21, 1992; amended, T-111-3-24-92, March 20, 1992; amended, T-111-2-23-93, Feb. 19, 1993.)

111-5-34. Entry of Plays. Plays may only be entered manually using the lottery terminal keypad or touch screen or by means of a play slip provided by the lottery and hand-marked by the player or by such other means approved by the lottery. Retailers shall not permit the use of facsimiles of play slips, copies of play slips, or other materials that are inserted into the terminal's play slip reader that are not printed or approved by the lottery. Retailers shall not permit any device to be connected to a lottery terminal to enter plays, except as approved by the lottery. (Authorized

by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-2-23-93, Feb. 19, 1993.)

Article 9.—INDIVIDUAL PULL-TAB GAME RULES

RULES FOR PULL TAB GAMES NO. 9 "DOUBLE DIAMOND"

111-9-49. Name of Game. The Kansas Lottery shall conduct an instant pull-tab game entitled "Double Diamond" commencing on March 18, 1993. The specific rules for the "Double Diamond" game are contained in K.A.R. 111-9-49 through 111-9-54. Other applicable rules for the game may be found in K.A.R. 111-8-1 *et seq.* (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-2-23-93, Feb. 19, 1993.)

111-9-50. Definitions. The following definitions shall apply to the "Double Diamond" pull-tab lottery game.

(a) "Ticket" means the Kansas Lottery instant pull-tab Game No. 9 "Double Diamond."

(b) "Play symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols or pictures printed on the front and under each tab on the back of each pull-tab ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this pull-tab game, the play symbols consist of pictures of double diamonds, diamonds, the number "7," bars, clusters of cherries, bells, watermelons and oranges. Two diamonds and one of each of a double diamond, a "7," three bars, two bars, one bar and a cluster of cherries appear on the top six horizontal rows on the front of each ticket. Three of each of bells, watermelons, oranges and cherries appear in the "Bonus Pulls" area on the lower part of the front of each ticket. Various combinations of these symbols appear under each of the five tabs on the back of each ticket.

(c) "Carton" means a box of pull-tab tickets containing 2,400 tickets.

(d) "Carton serial number" is the 9-digit number appearing on the front of the ticket.

(e) "Quarter carton" means one-fourth of a carton containing 600 pull-tab tickets. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-2-23-93, Feb. 19, 1993.)

111-9-51. Determination of Instant Prize Winners. Each tab on the back of the ticket is to be pulled open. If three symbols printed horizontally, vertically, or diagonally under any tabs match any combination of winning symbols shown above the "Bonus Pulls" area on the front of the ticket and are connected by a fluorescent orange arrow, the player wins the prize(s) which corresponds to the symbols matched. If three matching symbols shown in the "Bonus Pulls" area on the front of the ticket appear horizontally under any tab, the player wins the prize(s) which corresponds to the symbols matched. On "Bonus Pulls" winning combinations the word "WIN" will appear under the tab as a fluorescent orange overprint over the left and center symbol. The prize amounts are as follows:

(b) Each of the above winning combinations must be connected by a fluorescent orange arrow.

(c) "Bonus Pull" winners appearing under a tab must have three identical symbols appearing horizontally which correspond with the symbols on one of the horizontal rows of symbols under "Bonus Pulls" on the front of the ticket.

(d) Each "Bonus Pull" winning combination will have the word "WIN" appear as a fluorescent orange overprint over the left and center symbol.

(e) On any winning combination the amount won will appear immediately to the left of the symbol on the left of the three winning symbols.

(f) The ticket must pass all validation requirements as specified in K.A.R. 111-8-6. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-2-23-93, Feb. 19, 1993.)

A form for physician statement and signature is available at the University Police Department and the office of Handicapped Services, located at Grace Wilkie, East. All vehicles parked in WSU designated Handicapped parking areas must display a current WSU Handicapped parking permit or any Handicapped parking permit issued in accordance with K.S.A. 8-161 and 8-1,125.

Article 4.16—Handicap Parking Permits: (Proposed Regulation)

All vehicles parked in WSU designated Handicapped parking areas must display a current WSU Handicapped parking permit or any Handicapped parking permit issued in accordance with K.S.A. 8-161 and 8-1,125. Handicap parking permits are available for any faculty, staff or student with permanent or temporary physical handicaps. Requests for such permits shall be forwarded to the Resource Center for Independence for approval, specifying whether temporary or permanent. A form for physician statement and signature is available at the University Police Department and the Resource Center for Independence located at Grace Wilkie, East. The Police Department will issue temporary Handicapped parking permits for a maximum period of seven days.

A public hearing will be conducted at 3 p.m. Thursday, April 15, in the Parking Department Conference Room, 1501 Irving Hill Road, University of Kansas, Lawrence, concerning the adoption by the Board of Regents of regulations governing traffic and parking on the roads, street, driveways, and parking facilities at the University of Kansas. The following is a summary of the substance of the rules and proposed changes:

1. General Regulations. The current regulations specify who is subject to these rules and regulations, that all vehicles must have a valid parking permit, and hours of access to the central campus. The proposed amendment will change the method of application of the campus access pass from permanently applying a sticker to a rearview mirror hanger.

2. Definitions. The current regulations specify, for the purpose of these regulations, the definitions of student, faculty, staff, visitors, dormitory visitor, medical parking needs, handicap parking, moped and motorcycle parking. The proposed amendment will clarify that those with valid handicap designators may park in any otherwise unreserved legal stall.

3. Visitor Parking. The current regulations specify conditions under which visitors may legally park at the University of Kansas. No amendments are proposed.

4. Parking Permits. The current regulations establish procedures pertaining to parking permits and the types of permits available. The proposed amendments will change the method of application for vehicle permits from permanently applied stickers to rearview mirror hangers; will alter the section on sold or traded vehicles since the mirror hanger may be moved from vehicle to vehicle; will strike reference to JRP; will add a separate permit category for Jayhawker Towers; will change all reference of "dormitory" to "residence hall"; will eliminate section 4.5 Carpooling/Multiple Car Permits; and will add a new category of permit called "Childcare Load" valid for 20 minutes for the purpose of loading and unloading children at campus day care centers and preschools with the exception of Hilltop.

5. Student, Faculty, and Staff Parking. The current regulations establish procedures by which parking permits for vehicles may be obtained and appealed, and procedures for new employees. No amendments are proposed.

6. Permit Fees. The current regulations specify the fees charged for parking permits. The proposed amendment will increase the blue permit to \$85, the red permit to \$70, the yellow permit to \$53, the All Dormitory (Residence Hall) permit to \$35, and the service permit to \$110. The carpool permit will be eliminated. The JRP permit will be eliminated. The charge

for any hooded meter will be a straight \$4. A new permit "Childcare Load" will cost \$10 a semester and \$20 annually. There will be a clarification in 6.3 regarding where visitor permits are valid.

7. Control of Parking Lots and Zones. The current regulations specify times and locations for parking restrictions at the University of Kansas. The proposed amendment will change the current evening restrictions in lots 13, 18, 35, the north half of 37, and 41 to 7:30 p.m. for faculty/staff permits. Lots 2 and 14 will no longer have an evening restriction. Evening restrictions will be added to lots 21 and the rectangular slab portion of lot 12 until 7:30 p.m. Saturday restrictions will be lifted on all blue zones. Jayhawker Towers will have a new restriction honoring only a Jayhawker Towers (JT) permit. All JT lots with the exception of the top level of 110 and the "DM" portion of 109 will be 24 hours restricted. The aforementioned lots will open up from 5 p.m. to 8 a.m. each day to all other valid permits. Reference to dormitory lots will be changed to residence hall lots. Reference to JRP will be removed. Lots 107 and 122 will be added to the Alumni Place list of two lots.

8. Violations. The current regulations specify violations for which a vehicle may be ticketed and the cost of such violations. The proposed amendment will add to Group I, #1 "No Valid Permit" violations that vehicles may be towed from posted towaway zones.

9. Payment of Fees for Violations. The current regulations specify the method and procedure for payment of violation notices, late payment, what constitutes excessive violations and consequences, of excessive violations, and towing and impoundment procedures. The proposed amendment will add that vehicles with Group I, #1 "No Valid Permit" violations in posted towaway zones, may be removed from campus.

10. Appeal of Violations Notices. The current regulations establish the procedures for appeals from a charge of misuse of parking area. No amendments are proposed.

11. Statutory Authorization. The current regulations establish the authorization of the Board of Regents to promulgate regulations for the control of parking and traffic on the University of Kansas campus and to establish misuse fees for violations of the regulations. No amendments are proposed.

Interested persons will be given reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views concerning the adoption of the proposed amendments to the existing regulations. Written comments may also be submitted prior to the hearing. Written comments or a request for a copy of the proposed regulations and a copy of the financial impact statement of such changes should be submitted to Raymond K. A public hearing will be conducted at 4 p.m. Tuesday, April 13, at the Overman Student Center, Pittsburg State University, Pittsburg, concerning the adoption by the Board of Regents of regulations governing traffic and parking on the roads, streets, driveways and parking facilities at Pittsburg State University.

The parking fee structure is proposed to be changed so that each student is charged per credit hour rather than by the academic year. A summary of the proposed changes are as follows:

II. PERMITS FOR PARKING

All campus parking shall be restricted to vehicles with permits which authorize parking in a specific area. Application may be made for a non-transferable parking permit at the University Police and Parking Services Office. A fee shall be charged for the issuance of that parking permit and shall be good for the duration of the school year for which it is issued or for a lesser period of time if so designated. Faculty/Staff shall be charged a fee for the issuance of their parking permit. Parking fees for students (graduate students included) are included in student fees. Permits shall be good for the duration of the school year for which it is issued or for a lesser period of time if so designated.

Prior to selling or trading a vehicle, all University parking stickers shall be removed. The person to whom a permit was issued shall be presumed to be responsible for all violations of University traffic and parking regulations identified with that vehicle permit, unless such presumption is overcome during the course of an appeal filed in accordance with Section X. Parking Appeals or an appeal otherwise provided by law.

Permit Fees

Student parking costs are included in student fees. Students are charged a parking fee of \$1.00 per credit hour for the first six (6) hours. Seven (7) or more hours is a flat fee of \$7.00 per semester.

The following permit fees shall be charged to Faculty/staff:

Motorcycle Permits . . . \$12 \$14 academic year, \$10 \$12 spring semester or \$10 \$12 summer session

Blue zone . . . \$19 \$23 academic year, \$16 \$20 spring semester or \$16 \$20 summer session

Red zone . . . \$38 \$45 academic year, \$31 \$40 spring semester or \$31 \$40 summer session

Brown zone . . . \$12 \$14 academic year, \$10 \$12 spring semester or \$10 \$12 summer session

Gold zone . . . \$38 \$45 academic year, \$31 \$40 spring semester or \$31 \$40 summer session

Orange zone . . . \$13 per semester

Students, faculty and staff must meet guidelines set up by the Parking Committee to purchase parking permits. Persons who have purchased a parking permit for a vehicle may receive (charge \$2.00) a new permit for a replacement vehicle if identifiable remnants of the original permit are presented to the University Police and Parking Services Office. If no identifiable remnants are returned, the cost shall be the zone cost fee.

Parking Permit Priorities and Use

Availability of permits for each zone shall be on the basis of priorities established by the Parking Committee. Permits for Blue and Gold zones shall be available to students, faculty and staff on the basis of priorities established by the Parking Committee. Brown zone parking shall be available generally to students, faculty and staff. Orange zone parking is specifically for residents of Bowen, Trout, Tanner, Nation, and Dellinger Halls, and, specifically, to residents of Bowen, Tanner, and Trout Halls, Orange zone parking shall be for students residing in Nation, and Dellinger Halls, who have signed up for a drawing for these spaces and whose names are drawn. Red zone permits shall be issued on the basis of priorities established by the Parking Committee. Blue zone permits are valid in the Blue and Brown zones. Red zone permits are issued for one specified Red zone area and are not valid in other Red zones. Red permits (excluding the north parking lot at the Newman Center) are also valid in the Brown zone. Gold zone permits are valid in the Gold and Brown zones. Orange permits are valid in the Orange and Brown zones.

IV. ENFORCEMENT OF PARKING REGULATIONS

Parking regulations go into effect the first day of classes each semester, summer session, short course, seminar, or workshop. Zone parking restrictions shall be in force Monday through Friday in zones Blue and Brown from 7:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. to 5:30 p.m., vacation periods excluded. Regulations shall be in effect twenty-four (24) hours a day, seven (7) days a week for the following: Red zones, Orange zone, Gold lot, service zones, sidewalks, visitor zones, state car zones, and all yellow zones, crosswalks, fire lanes, loading zones, and handicapped parking spaces.

Senate Sub. for House Sub. for HOUSE BILL No. 2023

AN ACT concerning tribal-state gaming compacts; providing procedures for negotiating and entering such compacts.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. As used in this act:

(a) "Class III gaming" has the meaning provided by the Indian gaming regulatory act (25 U.S.C. 2701 et seq.).

(b) "Gaming compact" means a tribal-state compact regarding class III gaming as provided by section 11 of the Indian gaming regulatory act (25 U.S.C. 2710).

Sec. 2. (a) Any request by a tribe for negotiation of a gaming compact with the state of Kansas, including a request for renegotiation of an existing gaming compact, received on or after the effective date of this act shall be submitted in writing to the governor.

(b) The governor or the governor's designated representatives are authorized to negotiate gaming compacts on behalf of the state of Kansas. At the conclusion of negotiations, the governor shall submit the proposed compact to the joint committee on gaming compacts for the joint committee's recommendations as to approval or modification of the proposed compact.

(c) If the joint committee recommends modification of a proposed compact submitted by the governor, the governor or the governor's representatives may resume negotiations in accordance with the joint committee's recommendations and the modified proposed compact shall be submitted to the joint committee in the same manner as the original proposed compact. Within 5 days after receiving the joint committee's recommended modifications, the governor shall notify the joint committee, in writing, as to whether or not the governor has resumed negotiations. Within 10 days after receipt of notice that the governor has not resumed negotiations, or if the governor fails to notify the joint committee that the governor has resumed negotiations, the joint committee shall vote to recommend approval or rejection of the proposed compact or shall vote to make no recommendation on the proposed compact.

(d) (1) If the legislature is in session when the joint committee on gaming compacts votes to recommend approval or rejection of a proposed compact or votes to make no recommendation on a proposed compact, as authorized by this section, the joint committee shall introduce in each house of the legislature, within five days after the joint committee's vote, a resolution approving the proposed compact as submitted by the governor. Each resolution shall be accompanied by the report of the joint committee recommending that the resolution be adopted or not be adopted or reporting the resolution without recommendation. If, within 10 days after introduction of the resolutions, a majority of the members of each house votes to adopt the resolution introduced in such house, the proposed compact shall be considered to have been approved by the legislature and the governor is authorized to execute the compact on behalf of the state. Each house of the legislature shall vote on the resolution introduced in such house within 10 days after introduction unless the other house has already voted against adoption of the resolution introduced in such other house.

(2) If the legislature is not in session when the joint committee on gaming compacts votes to recommend approval or rejection of a proposed compact or votes to make no recommendation on a proposed compact, as authorized by this section, the joint committee

shall notify the legislative coordinating council of the joint committee's action within five days after such action. If, within 30 days after receiving such notice, the legislative coordinating council votes, by a vote of five members of the council, to approve the proposed compact, the compact shall be considered to have been approved by the legislative coordinating council and the governor is authorized to execute the compact on behalf of the state.

(3) Neither the legislature nor the legislative coordinating council has the authority to amend or otherwise modify any proposed gaming compact.

(e) The attorney general shall be the legal counsel for the governor or the governor's representatives in negotiating a gaming compact under this section and for the joint committee on gaming compacts in reviewing proposed compacts.

(f) A gaming compact negotiated on behalf of the state under this section shall contain:

(1) A provision recognizing the right of each party to the compact to request that the compact be renegotiated or replaced by a new compact, including the right of the legislature by concurrent resolution to request renegotiation or replacement of the compact, and providing the terms under which either party, including the legislature, may request a renegotiation or the negotiation of a new compact; and

(2) a provision that, in the event of a request for a renegotiation or a new compact, the existing compact will remain in effect until renegotiated or replaced.

(g) The governor, or the governor's designated representatives, and the attorney general shall report to the joint committee on gaming compacts, at such times as requested by the joint committee, regarding gaming compacts negotiated and prospective negotiations.

Sec. 3. (a) There is hereby established the joint committee on gaming compacts, which shall consist of three senators and three members of the house of representatives. Of the senators, two shall be appointed by the president of the senate and one by the minority leader of the senate. Of the members of the house of representatives, two shall be appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives and one by the minority leader of the house of representatives.

(b) The joint committee on gaming compacts:

(1) May establish and transmit to the governor proposed guidelines reflecting the public policies and state interests, as embodied in the constitution, statutes and case law of the state of Kansas, consistent with the Indian gaming regulatory act (25 U.S.C. 2701 et seq.), that the joint committee will consider in reviewing proposed compacts;

(2) may recommend to the governor that any gaming compact provide for the imposition and collection of state sales and excise taxes on sales of nongaming goods and services to persons other than tribal members and imposition and collection of state income tax on revenues derived from sales of nongaming goods and services;

(3) may hold public hearings on proposed gaming compacts submitted to the joint committee by the governor; and

(4) shall, in accordance with section 2, recommend modification of proposed gaming compacts submitted by the governor and introduce resolutions approving proposed gaming compacts submitted by the governor and recommend that such resolutions be adopted or be not adopted, or report such resolutions without recommendation, and notify the governor, in writing, of the joint committee's action.

(c) The president of the senate shall designate a senator member to be chairperson of the joint committee on gaming compacts in even-numbered years and the vice-chairperson in odd-numbered years. The speaker of the house of representatives shall designate a representative member to be chairperson of the committee in odd-numbered years and the vice-chairperson in even-numbered years. The vice-chairperson shall exercise all of the powers of the chairperson in the absence of the chairperson.

(d) A quorum of the joint committee on gaming compacts shall be four. Actions of the joint committee recommending that a resolution approving a proposed compact be adopted or not be adopted shall be only on the affirmative vote of four or more members of the joint committee, at least two of whom shall be senators and at least two of whom shall be members of the house of representatives. Action of the joint committee to report without recommendation a resolution approving a compact may be on the affirmative vote of any three or more members of the committee. All other actions of

the joint committee may be taken by a majority of those present when there is a quorum.

(e) The joint committee on gaming compacts may meet at any time and at any place within the state on the call of the chairperson.

(f) The provisions of the acts contained in article 12 of chapter 46 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated, and amendments thereto, applicable to special committees shall apply to the joint committee on gaming compacts to the extent that the same do not conflict with the specific provisions of this act applicable to the joint committee.

(g) In accordance with K.S.A. 46-1204 and amendments thereto, the legislative coordinating council may provide for such professional

services as may be requested by the joint committee on gaming compacts.

(h) The joint committee on gaming compacts may introduce such legislation as it considers necessary in performing its functions.

Sec. 4. If any provision of this act or the application thereof to any person or circumstances is held invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions or applications of this act which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application. To this end the provisions of this act are severable.

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

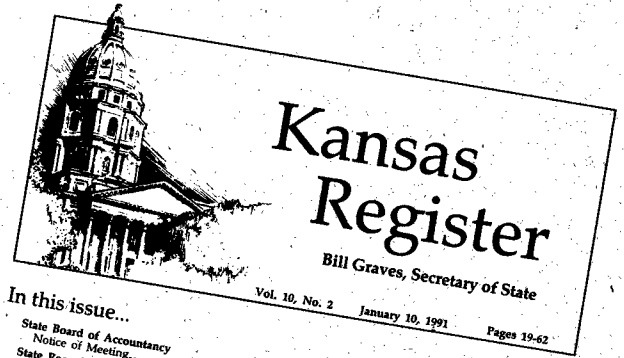
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
