## Article 2.—FACILITIES MANAGEMENT

**44-2-103. Trafficking in contraband.** (a) A person, including an employee, inmate, visitor, or volunteer shall not, without the consent of the warden: (1) introduce or attempt to introduce any item into or upon the grounds of a correctional facility;

(2) take, send, or attempt to take or send any item from any correctional facility;

(3) possess any item in any correctional facility; or

(4) distribute any item within a correctional facility.

(b) "Any item," as used in subsection (a), shall include but not be limited to the following:

(1) Guns or firearms of any type, or the components, diagrams, or plans thereof;

(2) ammunition, explosives, or the diagrams, formulas or plans thereof;

(3) knives, tools, and materials such as sandpaper, whet stones or similar items used to make such knives or tools;

(4) hazardous or poisonous chemicals, flammable liquids and gases or formulas thereof;

(5) escape paraphernalia such as ropes, grappling hooks, hacksaw blades, jewelers' wire, bar spreaders, maps, lock picks, handcuff keys, or similar devices which could be used to aid an escape;

(6) identification documents or individual photographs of the inmate of the style suitable for the production of identification documents;

(7) documents, plans, diagrams, or schematics that refer to secure electrical systems, escape alarms, overhead lighting, facility power supply, gate operations, body alarms, radio communications, and similar systems;

(8) narcotics or other controlled substances, including any synthetic narcotic, drug, stimulant, sleeping pill, barbiturate, or medicine, prescription or non-prescription, which was not dispensed or approved by the facility health authority. Medicines dispensed or approved by the health authority shall be considered contraband if not consumed or utilized in the manner prescribed;

(9) intoxicants, including but not limited to liquor or alcoholic beverages;

(10) currency, in the form of paper, checks, money orders, coins, stamps or similar instruments with monetary value;

(11) hypodermic needles, hypodermic syringes, nasal inhalers or other devices or any component thereof which could be used to inject substances into the body;

(12) food items;

(13) cameras, recording devices, one or two-way transmitting devices, and similar devices and components thereof, including tapes, batteries, and film; or

(14) letters, notes, books, or other written commu-

## Opinion No. 93-64

**Counties and County Officers—County Commissioners; Powers and Duties—Powers of Board of Commissioners; Authority Over Employees of County Sheriff, Clerk, Treasurer, and Register of Deeds; Limitation of Personnel Action.** Leonard J. Dix, Rooks County Attorney, Stockton, May 10, 1993.

County clerks, treasurers, sheriffs and registers of deeds have power and authority in personnel decisions over their employees. However, their actions shall be subject to the personnel policies and procedures and pay plans established by the board of county commissioners and any applicable collective bargaining agreements or civil service system and the budget. Appointment of the undersheriff is exclusively vested in the sheriff. Attorney General Opinion No. 81-287 is withdrawn to the extent set forth herein. ## Opinion No. 93-65

**Cities and Municipalities—Emergency Telephone Services—Cellular Telephones; County Home Rule Power.** Craig D. Cox, Harvey County Counselor, Newton, May 10, 1993.

## Opinion No. 93-66

**Minors—Kansas Code for Care of Children—Health Services; Consent for Medical Treatment by Parents with Certain Religious Beliefs.** Donna L. Whiteman, Secretary, Kansas Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services, Topeka, May 11, 1993.

K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 38-1513(a)(2) can be interpreted to authorize the court to take into consideration a parent's religious objections in determining whether to order medical treatment for a child who is a ward of the court. In spite of the deference to a parent with certain religious beliefs, the code for care of children treats all children the same in terms of the reporting, investigation, and treatment of such children regardless of their parents' religious beliefs. The Secretary of Health and Environment is proposing to issue an air emission source construction permit in accordance with K.A.R. 28-19-14 (permits required) to O'Brien Rock Company, Inc. to erect and operate a portable ready-mixed concrete plant.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed  
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Tuesday, June 22, in the SRS Staff Development Conference Room, 300 S.W. Oakley, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing rules and regulations on a permanent basis. This 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Secretary of Health and Environment, Landon State Office Building, Room 901, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present

their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

These regulations are scheduled to become effective August 16, 1993. A summary of the proposed regulations and their economic impact follows.

Article 1.—DISEASES

**28-1-18.** Notification of state department of health by laboratories of positive reaction to tests for certain diseases. This regulation is being amended to add two notifiable conditions: blood lead level greater than or equal to 10 micrograms per deciliter for persons less than 18 years of age and greater than or equal to 25 micrograms per deciliter for persons 18 years of age or older and CD4+ T-lymphocyte count of less than 200 per microliter or a CD4+ T-lymphocyte percent of total lymphocytes less than 14. Five diseases are being deleted from the list of notifiable diseases: diphtheria, haemophilus influenza type B invasive disease, meningococcal meningitis, poliomyelitis and typhoid fever.

Economic Impact: The additional cost of reporting two new conditions is expected to be offset by the deletion of five diseases from the list of notifiable diseases.

Article 17.—DIVISION OF VITAL STATISTICS

**28-17-6.** Fees for copies and searches. This regulation is being amended to increase the fee for certified copies of a death, marriage, divorce or stillbirth record to \$10 for the first copy and \$5 for each additional copy of the same record ordered at the same time. This fee is necessitated by the passage of HB 2008 during the 1993 Legislative Session which states that \$3 of each certified copy fee for the first copy of a death certificate and \$1 for each fee for each additional copy of the same death certificate requested at the same time shall be remitted to the state treasury and credited to the district coroners fund created by Section 17 of HB 2008.

The fee for certified copies of birth certificates was raised to \$10 and \$5 in 1992, therefore, KDHE is including marriages, divorces and stillbirths in the proposed fee increase to make all fees consistent.

Economic Impact: The increased fee will be paid by applicants needing a certified copies of a death, marriage or divorce record. The fee increase will generate approximately \$238,000, of which approximately \$223,000 would be transferred to the district coroners fund.

**28-17-20.** Corrections to certificates and records. The regulation is being amended to allow acceptance of a document created prior to the tenth birthday of the individual desiring a birth certificate amendment rather than the seventh birthday. This change will assure the individual access to census information which is frequently needed to substantiate an amendment.

Economic Impact: None.

**28-23-82.** Food supplies, food protection, food storage, and food preparation, and food display.

**28-36-21. Food care.** The Kansas Department of Health and Environment has adopted food service establishment regulations based on recommendations of the United States Food and Drug Administration. As a result of information regarding foodborne illnesses caused by *E. coli* 0157:H7, the Food and Drug Administration recommended all states increase the required cooking temperature for ground beef to 155°F.

Amendments to K.A.R. 28-23-82 and K.A.R. 28-36-21 will increase the required cooking temperature of ground beef prepared in food service establishments in Kansas to 155°F.

Economic Impact: None

If you are a child in the custody of SRS as a result of a CINC petition, or a child who is the subject of a report of suspected child abuse and/or neglect and all parties having an interest in said proceeding and the Kansas child welfare system in Kansas, this notice is for you.

This case was filed in Shawnee County District Court in 1989 alleging that SRS failed to provide services to children in the Kansas Child in Need of Care (CINC)

Program, and to children who are the subject of allegations of abuse and/or neglect, and their families. In 1990, the Court allowed the case to go forward as a "class action" and defined the class as all children in Kansas who were in SRS CINC custody or who were at risk of being in custody.

An agreement has been reached by the parties in the case. Accordingly a hearing is scheduled for June 18, 1993, at 2:00 p.m., Third Judicial District, Shawnee County Courthouse, 200 SE 7th St., Topeka, Kansas 66603 in the courtroom of District Judge James P. Buchele, to determine whether said agreement should be approved by the Court.

This hearing will not address the placement of any particular individual child in foster care, any particular report of abuse or neglect, or the provision of services in any particular case. This hearing will not directly affect or address any pending CINC proceeding.

Very briefly, the Proposed Agreement does the following:

1. Provides for a system of protective services, including screening, investigation, and completion of complaints of suspected child abuse or neglect.
2. Provides for a system of services to prevent out-of-home placement.
3. Provides for a system for the development and review of case plans for children in custody.
4. Provides for the assessment of placement needs, tracking of placement resources, and placement of children in needed placements.
5. Provides for the assessment of the needs for services for children in SRS custody and services to meet the assessed needs, maintenance of the current services level, and visitation services in accordance with specified frequencies.
6. Provides for a specific time frame for adoption planning for children in SRS custody and efforts to assure a sufficient number of adoptive homes.
7. Provides that SRS develop new guidelines for the number of children or families that can be assigned to individual SRS workers and then provides that SRS maintain sufficient staff to comply with those guidelines and to implement the entire agreement.
8. Provides for the development of competency-based training system for SRS social worker staff, foster parents and prospective adoptive parents.
9. Provides for the development, implementation and maintenance of an integrated, automated information system that is timely and accurate.
10. Provides for an independent monitor to measure and report compliance with the agreement.
11. Provides for termination of the agreement on December 31, 1997, if compliance at the 90% level is attained and maintained.
12. Provides for enforcement and dispute resolution through mediation prior to requesting court involvement. The agreement will not be a court order but instead will be a legally binding agreement between the parties.
13. Provides recognition of the limitation on governmental resources by providing certain defenses and

limitations governing the need for additional funding or funding reductions.

14. Provides that both the plaintiffs and SRS reserve the right to seek pre-settlement attorney's fees, expenses, and costs, and waive the right to seek reimbursement for post-settlement expenses and most post-settlement fees.

Copies of the Proposed Agreement are available at any SRS Office for class members and their Guardian Ad Litem and parents without charge. Other interested parties may obtain a copy at any SRS Office for ten cents per page or at the Shawnee County Courthouse Clerk's Office at fifty cents per page.

## SENATE BILL No. 125

AN ACT concerning liability of officers and directors of certain financial institutions.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. Except for persons who are executive officers, an officer or director of a bank or national banking association shall have no personal liability to the bank, association or its stockholders for monetary damages for breach of duty as an officer or director, except that such liability shall not be eliminated for: (a) Any breach of the officer's or director's duty of loyalty to the bank, association or its stockholders; (b) acts or omissions which constitute willful or gross and wanton negligent breach of the officer's or director's duty of care; (c) acts in violation of K.S.A. 9-910, 9-911 or 9-912 and amendments thereto; or (d) any transaction from which the officer or director derived an improper personal benefit. For purposes of this section, "executive officer" means the chairperson of the board, the president, each vice president, the cashier, the secretary and the treasurer of a bank or national banking association, unless such officer is excluded by resolution of the board of directors or by the bylaws of the bank or national banking association from participation in the policymaking functions of the bank or national banking association, and the officer does not actually participate in the policymaking functions of the bank or national banking association.

Sec. 2. Except for persons who are executive officers, an officer or director of a savings and loan association, federal savings association or federal savings bank shall have no personal liability to the savings and loan association, federal savings association or federal savings bank or its members or stockholders for monetary damages for breach of duty as an officer or director, except that such liability shall not be eliminated for: (a) Any breach of the officer's or director's duty of loyalty to the association or bank, its members or stockholders; (b) acts or omissions which constitute willful or gross and wanton negligent breach of the officer's or director's duty of care; (c) acts in violation of K.S.A. 17-5412, 17-5811 and 17-5812 and amendments thereto; or (d) any transaction from which the officer or director derived an improper personal benefit. For purposes of this section, "executive officer" means the chairperson of the board, the president, each vice president, the cashier, the secretary and the treasurer of a savings and loan association, federal savings association or federal savings bank, unless such officer is excluded by resolution of the board of directors or by the bylaws of the savings and loan association, federal savings association or federal savings bank from participation in the policymaking functions of the savings and loan association, federal savings association or federal savings bank, and the officer does not actually participate in the policymaking functions of the savings and loan association, federal savings association or federal savings bank.

Sec. 3. Except for persons who are executive officers, an officer or director of a credit union or federal credit union shall have no personal liability to the credit union or federal credit union or its members for monetary damages for breach of duty as an officer or director, except that such liability shall not be eliminated for: (a) Any breach of the officer's or director's duty of loyalty to the credit union or its members; (b) acts or omissions which constitute willful or gross and wanton negligent breach of the officer's or director's duty of care; (c) acts in violation of K.S.A. 17-2209 and amendments thereto; or (d) any transaction from which the officer or director

derived an improper personal benefit. For purposes of this section, "executive officer" means the chairperson of the board, the president, each vice president, the cashier, the secretary and the treasurer of a credit union or federal credit union, unless such officer is excluded by resolution of the board of directors or by the bylaws of the credit union or federal credit union from participation in the policymaking functions of the credit union or federal credit union, and the officer does not actually participate in the policymaking functions of the credit union or federal credit union.

Sec. 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

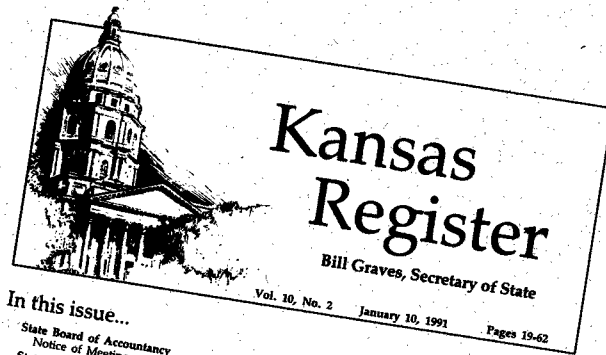
