Notice of Salary Assistance Program and Workshop

Local arts agencies wanting to hire an executive director or expand an existing position are invited by the Kansas Arts Commission to submit applications to the Salary Assistance Program.

"First-time" pertains to qualified organizations not having a paid executive director position within the prior two years (1992 and 1993).

"Expanded" pertains to qualified organizations which are increasing the salary and responsibilities of an existing executive director position.

A "local arts agency" is defined as a publicly accountable community organization or an agency of city or county government which primarily provides cultural planning and development through financial support, services or other multi-disciplinary programs for a variety of arts organizations and/or individual artists and the community as a whole. Generally, only one local arts agency serves a community.

The deadline for Salary Assistance Program applications to be received in the commission office is 5 p.m. Wednesday, September 15. One-year budgets and long-range organizational plans are required.

The Salary Assistance Program is funded by a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts, a federal agency. This two-year program provides salary, benefits, and travel support to local arts agencies. First-year grants cover up to 50 percent of salary, benefits and travel expenses for a new or expanded executive director position, with second-year grants providing up to 25 percent of these expenses.

Requirements for funding emphasize involvement by the boards of directors, including development of a cultural assessment of the community, to be followed by a plan of action and three- to five-year outline of programming designed to expand community involvement and professional development in the agency. Members of the boards and the commission's program coordinator develop the local organization's objectives.

Minors—Kansas Code for Care of Children; Matters Prior to Filing Petition—Mandatory Abuse Reporting Statute. Nannette L. Kemmerly-Weber, Allen County Attorney, Iola, July 6, 1993.

Persons listed in K.S.A. 1992 Supp. 38-1522 are required to notify the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services (SRS), or a law enforcement agency if SRS is closed, if they have reason to suspect that a child has been sexually abused regardless whether the alleged perpetrator resides in the child's home. A mandated reporter who refuses to notify SRS because of a promise extracted by the victim or the victim's family violates the law and subjects himself or herself to criminal prosecution. Notice of Grassroots Cultural Development Program

Organizations in Kansas may apply to the Grassroots Cultural Development Program of the Kansas Arts Commission for assistance in developing arts programming for underserved populations in rural, multi-cultural or other communities, including institutions, correctional facilities and providers of services to persons with special needs.

The 1994 Grassroots Cultural Development Program includes three main components: Cultural Activity Grants, Consultant/Technical Assistance Grants, and Multiple-Year Cultural Development Grants.

Applications for annual Cultural Activity Grants must be submitted to the commission at least six weeks prior to the arts activity and will be accepted until May 1, 1994, or as long as funds remain available. These grants provide up to 75 percent, not to exceed \$1,000, in support for community cultural arts activities and events.

Consultant/Technical Assistance Grants enable organizations to access professional expertise with a small local investment. Applicants should provide travel expenses for the consultant or person providing technical assistance. Upon approval of the application, the commission provides a two-to-one match.

Multiple-Year Cultural Development Grants allow maximum requests for 50 percent support, not to exceed \$4,000, for the current year; and 25 percent support, not to exceed \$2,000, for the next year. All applications for Multiple-Year Cultural Development Grants must be received in the commission office by 5 p.m. Monday, August 23.

Underserved rural, multi-cultural, and community service organizations may apply for any of the components in the Grassroots Cultural Development Program. Persons with special communication needs may utilize the Kansas Relay Service, 1-800-766-3777.

The rural arts circuit rider, a traveling technical assistant, is available throughout the year to visit underserved communities upon request to work with arts organizers, educators and artists. The circuit rider and arts program coordinators at the commission office offer on-site advice about getting started, planning events, filling out grant forms, seeking advice from other experienced arts organizers, evaluation programs, etc.

Applications for allocation of Private Activity Bond (PAB) authority are now being accepted for those uses defined as qualified "small issue" bonds by the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, and amendments thereof. Provisions in the federal law allowing the use of PAB authority for "small issue" bonds and single-family housing purposes sunset on June 30, 1992. Kansas Arts Commission**Notice of Design Arts/Capital Aid
Grant Program**

Organizations in Kansas communities may apply to the Design Arts/Capital Aid Program of the Kansas Arts Commission for assistance in planning, developing and equipping cultural facilities. The Design Arts/Capital Aid Program offers assistance for projects or portions of projects that take place during fiscal year 1994 (July 1, 1993-June 30, 1994). Not-for-profit, incorporated, tax-exempt organizations or public agencies are eligible to apply.

The five program components are:

Accessibility Transition Planning Grants cover partial costs of developing an accessibility transition plan. These grants of up to \$5,000 must be matched one-to-one with cash revenue not used to match any other KAC grant.

Arts Facilities Planning Grants support such activities as conducting community arts needs assessments,

studying structural and space feasibility, or planning for program expansion in relation to development of arts facilities. These grants of up to a maximum of \$5,000 must be matched one-to-one with cash revenue not used to match any other KAC grant.

Capital Aid Grants for arts facilities are intended to assist with the acquisition of buildings or real property, funding of renovations or improvements involving structural change, and purchases of equipment related to arts programs. Grants may not be used for office or computer equipment. A priority will be given to projects that improve accessibility for persons with disabilities.

Grants up to a maximum of \$25,000 may be requested, but every state dollar must be matched with \$2 of local cash revenue. Revenue used to match other KAC grants may not be used as matching funds. Organizations that have received Capital Aid grants in past years may apply this fiscal year.

Accessibility Needs Assessments are non-matching grants provided by the KAC to pay the costs of audits of arts facilities to determine accessibility to all persons in their communities. The audits will be one step that an organization may take to guide them as they plan for compliance with federal and state laws that mandate a minimum standard of accessibility in all public buildings.

Only not-for-profit tax-exempt Kansas organizations and public agencies that own facilities used for arts programs are eligible.

The commission will award grants on a first-come, first-served basis until reserved funds are gone. Grants will be in amounts equal to the accessibility auditor's fee, up to a maximum of \$1,000. The local organizations will identify accessibility auditors in their area and schedule the audits of their facilities.

Design Arts Consultants Pool Grants are offered on a first-come, first-served basis until available funds are exhausted. An applicant may request support from the KAC to use one or more design consultants for up to 10 days.

Applications for the Accessibility Transition Planning, Arts Facilities Planning and Capital Aid grants must be received in the commission office by 5 p.m. August 20. Applications for Accessibility Needs Assessment and Consultants Pool grants will be accepted through the year. Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

The Kansas Department of Health and Environment will conduct a public hearing at 1:30 p.m. Monday, August 16, in Classroom A of the Kansas Museum of History, 6425 S.W. 6th, Topeka. KDHE staff will be available at the hearing. The purpose of this public hearing is to consider adoption of proposed new temporary and permanent regulations K.A.R. 28-29-98 and K.A.R. 28-29-99.

New temporary and permanent regulation K.A.R. 28-29-98 adopts federal regulations contained in 40 CFR Part 258. These regulations are commonly referred to as Subtitle D, and pertain to management of municipal solid waste landfills (MSWLFs). New temporary and permanent regulation K.A.R. 28-29-99 establishes the implementation dates of K.A.R. 28-29-98 for financial assurance requirements for all landfills, and for all parts other than financial assurance for MSWLFs receiving less than 100 tons per day of municipal solid waste.

By adopting 40 CFR Part 258, Kansas can become authorized by the EPA to be the regulatory authority of landfills in the state. If Kansas chose not to become authorized to manage the MSWLF program, the EPA and third parties would manage the program. Thus, the economic impact of MSWLF compliance is not increased by adopting K.A.R. 28-29-98.

In addition to adopting 40 CFR Part 258, however, K.A.R. 28-29-98 modifies the list of parameters required for monitoring at MSWLFs by 40 CFR Part 258. The federal regulation allows an approved state to modify the list of parameters. The modified list of parameters has a lower cost than those promulgated in the federal regulation. Therefore, there should be a cost savings of approximately \$150,000 statewide on an annual basis by adopting K.A.R. 28-29-98.

K.A.R. 28-29-99 establishes an implementation schedule by the requirements adopted in K.A.R. 28-29-99. This is the same schedule proposed by the EPA. Therefore, there should be no additional economic impact by adopting K.A.R. 28-29-99.

K.A.R. 28-44-28 prescribes payment methods for fees and K.A.R. 28-44-29 establishes annual fees and registrations that will be required for the use of certain above ground storage tanks. The fee is proposed to be \$10 per tank per year, and it will be applied to tanks which contain hazardous materials or petroleum products. Owners of the tanks will also be required to furnish the department with information concerning the tanks, including their size, location, construction details, and product stored in the tanks.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be held at 10 a.m. Tuesday, August 17, in the third floor conference room of the Kansas Insurance Department, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed permanent regulations of the Kansas Insurance Department.

Copies of the full text of the regulations and the economic impact statements may be obtained by writing to the Commissioner of Insurance, 420 S.W. 9th, Topeka 66612. The following is a summary of the regulations and the economic impact statements:

40-1-39: This is a new regulation that expands the prohibition against unilateral additions of coverage to all lines of insurers. Revocation of the same current regulation, K.A.R. 40-3-10, applicable only to fire and casualty insurance, is being proposed as a companion change.

Adoption of this regulation should have no economic impact on insurers or this department. Accident and health and life insurance consumers will benefit economically because insurers will not be able to add coverage and related charges without the consent of the insured.

40-1-40: This is a new regulation that replaces existing K.A.R. 40-3-48, the revocation of which is also being proposed. The new regulation constitutes a relocation of 40-3-48 so its provisions will apply to all managing general agents (MGAs) as opposed to only those transacting fire and casualty insurance.

This regulation should have no economic impact on this department, insurers, or managing general agents. Although its application is extended to MGAs transacting life and health insurance, essentially the same requirements have been previously imposed on a case-by-case basis.

40-1-41: This is a new regulation that imposes specific standards on the payments and reimbursements permitted under a management agreement or contract. This regulation may have an adverse economic impact on persons who enter into management agreements or contracts with insurance companies. However, such impact is not quantifiable and is an expected regulatory result.

The regulation will have no economic impact on consumers or this department other than the indirect and intangible savings that result from enhanced insurer solvency.

40-2-23: This is a new regulation imposing disclosure requirements and restrictions on premium financing arrangements applicable to preneed funeral contracts. This regulation will probably entail some additional administrative expense on the part of insurers and those who market life insurance or annuities used to fund preneed funeral contracts. The extent of this additional expense cannot be calculated but will not outweigh the consumer benefit that will result. The

regulation will have minimal economic impact on the Insurance Department.

40-3-10: This regulation is being replaced by K.A.R. 40-1-39. Revocation of this regulation will have no economic impact on insurers, agents, consumers or the Insurance Department.

40-3-32: This regulation is being editorially amended to correct an erroneous reference to K.S.A. 75-4109. The amendment to this regulation will have no economic impact on insurers, agents, consumers or the Insurance Department.

40-3-33: This regulation relates to the F.A.I.R. Plan and is being amended to recognize the merger of the Independent Insurance Agents of Kansas and the Professional Insurance Agents of Kansas. Numerous other editorial changes are incorporated to improve its organization, style, orthography, and grammar. The amendments to this regulation will have no economic impact on insurers, agents, consumers or the Insurance Department.

40-3-48: See comments on 40-1-40.

40-3-50: This is a new regulation which will prohibit the imposition of fees or other conditions by rating organizations on insureds or their authorized representatives for information relevant to the composition of an individual insured's insurance premium.

Adoption of this regulation will have an adverse economic impact on insurance rating organizations that now charge for this information, and consumers now required to pay for the information will benefit. On an overall basis, however, the revenue lost by rating organizations may result in greater administrative costs being borne by all insureds, but any such result would be minimal.

The regulation will have no economic impact on the Insurance Department.

40-4-2: This regulation relates to accident and sickness insurance written on a franchise basis. The proposed amendment would reduce the minimum number of employees required to qualify under a franchise arrangement from 5 to 3. This is consistent with the change in the group statutes enacted by the 1993 Legislature.

The amendment to this regulation will have no significant direct economic impact on insurers, agents, consumers or the Insurance Department. However, the ability to sell and buy more policies of insurance on a franchise basis will be an advantage to insurers, agents and consumers.

40-5-12: This is a new regulation prohibiting the termination of credit insurance coverage unless the policy or certificate is actually cancelled, the consumer is notified and the unearned premium is refunded. This regulation will have a favorable economic impact on credit insurance consumers and creditors in the relatively few instances where default on a loan or some other event terminated coverage without the knowledge of either the lender or borrower. It will have no economic impact on the Insurance Department.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Commissioner of Insurance at the address above. The period of time between the date of publication of this notice and the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing.

Article 39.—RAIL SERVICE
ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

36-39-1. Priorities for loan guarantee applications.

(a) Compliance with the following criteria shall increase the priority standing of an application for a loan guarantee:

(1) the rail lines affected have less than five million gross tons per mile annually;

(2) the application demonstrates a higher benefit-to-cost ratio than the minimum ratio required by statute and regulation;

(3) the application demonstrates that operations will be made more efficient by raising the minimum operating speed to one of the following F.R.A. classes:

(A) F.R.A. class one to F.R.A. class two; or

(B) F.R.A. class two to F.R.A. class three;

(4) the application demonstrates a positive statewide or regional economic impact;

(5) the application demonstrates that the project for which funding is sought will result in road or highway maintenance cost savings for state and local governmental entities; and

(6) the application demonstrates the commitment of capital, or the guarantee of a set amount of rail traffic by local shippers, governmental entities or other interested parties, to the applicant for the continued operations of rail service for which a loan guarantee is sought. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 75-5050, 75-5046; implementing 75-5040; effective Aug. 30, 1993.)

36-39-2. Definitions. As used in this article, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this regulation.

(a) "Applicant" means any qualified entity which submits an application to the secretary for a loan guarantee.

(b) "Commission" means the interstate commerce commission.

(c) "Facilities" means:

(1) track, roadbed, and related structures, including rail, ties, ballast, other track materials, grading, tunnels, bridges, trestles, culverts, repair shops, connect-

ing tracks, and public improvements used or usable for rail service operations;

(2) signals and interlockers; and

(3) terminal or yard facilities, including trailer-on-flat car and container-on-flatcar terminals, railroad terminal and switching facilities, and service to express companies and railroads and their shippers.

(d) "F.R.A." means federal railroad administration of the United States department of transportation.

(e) "Lender" means the obligee, holder or creditor under an obligation, except that when a bank or trust company is acting as agent or trustee for such an obligee, holder or creditor, pursuant to an agreement to which the obligor is a part, the term refers to such bank or trust company.

(f) "Loan guarantee" means a guarantee by the state of Kansas to pay off the remaining principal of a specific loan under the terms of K.A.R. 36-39-3.

(g) "Obligation" means a loan, note, conditional sale agreement, security agreement or other obligation issued or granted to finance or refinance facilities acquisition, construction, rehabilitation or improvement.

(h) "Obligor" means the debtor under an obligation, including the original debtor and any successor or assignee of such debtor who is approved by the secretary.

(i) "Qualified entity" means any railroad holding an interstate commerce commission certificate, a port authority established in accordance with Kansas law or any legal entity that obtains an interstate commerce commission certificate within six months after qualifying for a loan guarantee.

(j) "Secretary" means the secretary of the Kansas department of transportation, or the secretary's designee. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 75-5046, 75-5050; implementing 75-5046, 75-5047, 75-5048, 75-5049; effective Aug. 30, 1993.)

36-39-3. Requirements and conditions for application for a loan guarantee. (a) The original and 10 copies of each application shall be filed with the secretary by a qualified entity and its lender.

(b) The amount of obligations requested by any applicant to be guaranteed shall not exceed \$5,000,000 annually. If, at the time of application, loan guarantees have previously been approved by the legislature or state finance council during the same fiscal year, the amount requested shall not exceed the difference of \$5,000,000 and the amounts previously approved during that fiscal year. The sum of the amounts sought in each fiscal year, including any outstanding loan guarantees previously approved pursuant to K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 75-5046, shall not exceed \$20,000,000.

(c) The applicant and lender shall acknowledge in the application that obligations of the state of Kansas resulting from the approval of an application shall be limited to payment of the remaining principal of the specific loan after lenders have exhausted all other available remedies against obligor.

(d) Each application shall include:

(1) the full and correct name, principal business address, telephone number and facsimile number of the applicant;

(2) the date of the applicant's incorporation, or organization if not a corporation, and the name of the government, state, or territory under the laws of which it was incorporated or organized. If the applicant is a partnership, association or other form of organization other than a corporation, a full description of the organization shall be furnished;

(3) the name, title, and address of the person to whom correspondence regarding the application should be addressed;

(4) a certified copy of proposed or executed loan agreements, including related agreements or other documents, and detailed descriptions of the loan guarantee, including:

(A) the total amount of the loan to be guaranteed;

(B) a description of all facilities included in or directly affected by the proposed project, the physical condition of such facilities and a description of the project;

(C) each part of the sub-part into which the project may reasonably be divided and the priority and schedule of expenditures for each part or sub-part;

(D) the estimated timing of the expenditure of the proceeds of the loan;

(E) a statement of whether the project involves another railroad or other participant, through joint execution, coordination, or otherwise. To be included is a description of the relative participation of the applicant and the other railroad or participant, including a statement of the financing arrangements of each participant, the portion of the work to be performed by each participant and the contemplated level of usage of the facility by each participant when the work is completed, along with a statement by a responsible officer or official of the other railroad or participant that the information provided reflects their agreement on these matters;

(F) the effective date of the loan;

(G) a schedule of repayment of the principal and interest;

(H) a description of the security to be offered the secretary in connection with any loan guarantee, including a description of the priority of this loan in relation to other liens or security interests on the property that is designated as security, the applicant's opinion of the value of this security, and the basis for the opinion;

(I) a description of the lender's security and remedies against the obligor or any other parties before the state of Kansas is obligated to pay any defaulted loan; and

(i) if the loan for which a guarantee is sought is outstanding, the effective interest rate of the loan for which a loan guarantee is sought; or

(ii) if the applicant has discussed with a potential lender the terms of a loan guarantee to be issued, the proposed effective rate of interest.

(5) a statement, in summary form, showing financial obligations to or claims against the state of Kansas or obligations for which the state of Kansas is guarantor, if any. Such statements shall be made by the applicant,

any affiliated corporate entity of the applicant or the applicant's parent, and shall describe:

(A) the status of any and all claims under litigation; and

(B) any other debts or guarantees existing between the applicant and the state of Kansas, including the name of the department or agency involved in such loans, claims or other debts;

(6) an analysis which includes:

(A) a statement that the financing is justified by present and future demand for rail services, that the financing will meet existing needs for such services and that the project will provide shippers with improved service. Supporting evidence shall be submitted with the statement, including copies of all market analyses and studies which have been performed to determine present and future demand for rail services;

(B) a description of the impact of the financing upon the projected traffic to be originated, terminated, or carried by the obligor for at least the five years immediately following completion of the project;

(C) a five year *pro forma* statement of cash flow attributable to the project; and

(D) a description of any other benefit which would accrue to the applicant from the proceeds of the obligation;

(7) a business plan, with supporting evidence, showing:

(A) that the applicant is financially capable of acquiring, rehabilitating, or improving facilities in an efficient and economical manner;

(B) that the ratio of benefits-to-costs for any project funded by such guaranteed loan shall be greater than one. The benefit-to-cost methodology to be used for this determination will be the most recent standard benefit-to-cost methodology approved by the F.R.A.;

(C) that the applicant shall submit audited financial statements, prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles, for the past two annual accounting periods;

(D) any car supply agreements and the estimated rail traffic;

(E) a balance sheet, income statement, statement of changes in financial position or statement of cash flows, notes to financial statements, operating plans and appraisals of the assets to be acquired;

(F) that the applicant has been turned down by a lending institution and that adequate funding for the proposed project is not otherwise available on terms that would make the proposed project financially feasible, in the absence of a state loan guarantee; and

(G) a written opinion from bond counsel that the guarantee of such loan by the secretary would not adversely affect the rating of bonds issued pursuant to K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 68-2314 *et seq.*, and amendments thereto;

(8) a statement, with supporting evidence, that the financing will improve the ability of the applicant to transport freight;

(9) a statement describing the maintenance program for the applicant's entire rail system and the planned

maintenance program for the facilities financed by the proceeds of the obligation;

(10) from each existing lender or proposed prospective lender a statement which includes:

(A) the lender's full and correct name, principal business address, telephone number and facsimile number;

(B) references to applicable provisions of law, the lender's charter and other governing instruments that confer authority on the lender to accept the obligation;

(C) a copy of the loan agreement between the lender and the applicant;

(D) a brief statement of the circumstances and negotiations leading to the agreement by the lender to accept the proposed obligation;

(E) a copy of the lender's determination that the loan would not be economically feasible without the proposed loan guarantee;

(F) a statement of the nature and extent of any affiliation or business relationship between the existing or prospective lender and any of its directors, partners or principal executive officers, with the applicant and any of its directors, partners, or principal executive officers or with any person whose name is required to be furnished under this article; and

(G) a full and complete statement of all sums to be given to the lender in connection with the proposed obligation, including:

(i) the name and address of each person to whom any payment has been made or will be made and nature of any affiliation, association or prior business relationship between any person named in this paragraph and the lender or any of its directors, partners, or officers;

(ii) the amount of the cash payment or the nature and value of other consideration; and

(iii) any condition upon the obligation of the obligee to make any payment;

(11) a hazardous waste assessment report on the rail lines for which a loan guarantee is requested;

(12) a certificate of title to prove the applicant has the legal ability to allow its property to be encumbered;

(13) proof of liability insurance in effect in the amount of \$5,000,000 per occurrence;

(14) an opinion from applicant's counsel that applicant is legally authorized to make this application and has no outstanding litigation or impediment that would impair its ability to perform the obligation;

(15) an acknowledgement by the applicant that the secretary may conduct a pre-audit of applicant's accounting system to determine if the system is adequate to isolate and accumulate project costs; and

(16) any additional information that the applicant deems appropriate to convey a full and complete understanding of the project and its impact or to otherwise assist the secretary in making a determination. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 75-5046; implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 75-5046 and 75-5047; effective Aug. 30, 1993.)

36-39-4. Forms. The applicant shall file an application on the forms provided by Kansas department

of transportation labeled and assembled using the following format:

(a) application summary;

(b) exhibit "A," description of applicant;

(c) exhibit "B," description of project;

(d) exhibit "C," description of cost benefit ratio;

(e) exhibit "D," pro forma cash flow statement;

(f) exhibit "E," rehabilitation, repair and construction cost estimate;

(g) exhibit "F," historic and current financial statements;

(h) exhibit "G," identification of officers and directors;

(i) exhibit "H," shipper/receiver surveys;

(j) exhibit "I," lender's information; and

(k) exhibit "J," miscellaneous. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 75-5046; effective Aug. 30, 1993.)

36-39-5. Pre-application conference. A pre-application conference shall be held between the prospective applicant and department of transportation staff before an application for a loan guarantee is filed. The proposed project shall be reviewed and guidance given to the prospective applicant on how to proceed. Applications shall not be filed sooner than 30 days after the pre-application conference. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 75-5046; effective Aug. 30, 1993.)

36-39-6. Rail service financial assistance; loans and grants. (a) Compliance with the criteria in K.A.R. 36-39-1(a) shall increase the priority standing of an application for a loan for railroad financing, acquisition and rehabilitation in the state of Kansas.

(b) Monies to be loaned shall originate from federal railroad administration funds awarded on a discretionary basis by the F.R.A. through the local rail freight assistance act.

(c) Application for loans shall meet the requirements of 49 C.F.R. 266 (1979) and 49 U.S.C.A. App. § 1654 (1990) unless projects have been previously evaluated in a Kansas rail plan or rail plan update.

(d) All funds loaned shall be repaid to the department of transportation within 10 years or less with an interest rate established in the loan agreement between the Secretary and applicant that is equal to or less than the federal discount rate charged to depository institutions as published in the "Wall Street Journal" on the date of the application.

(e) Applications are to be in the form prescribed by the Kansas department of transportation.

(f) Monies for grants will come from the federal railroad administration funds available through the local rail freight assistance act.

(g) Grant applications shall meet the requirements of 49 C.F.R. 266 (1979) and 49 U.S.C.A. App. § 1654 (1990) unless the project has been previously evaluated in a Kansas rail plan or rail plan update. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1991 Supp. 75-5050; implementing 75-5048 and 75-5049; effective Aug. 30, 1993.)

Article 10.—CURRICULA

109-10-2. Sponsoring organization. (a) Each first responder's and attendant's initial course of instruction shall identify a sponsoring organization.

(b) Each sponsoring organization shall:

(1) submit an organizational plan to the administrator as part of the application for course approval;

(2) provide facilities, instructional materials, faculty, equipment, and other resources necessary for the course in accordance with Kansas administrative regulations, board policy, and the organization's stated purpose;

(3) provide a course syllabus for each training course for which approval is requested describing:

(A) a summary of the course goals and objectives;

(B) student pre-requisites, if any, for admission into the training course;

(C) instructional and other materials required of each student;

(D) student fees;

(E) student attendance policies;

(F) student examination policies;

(G) student requirements for successful course completion;

(H) a description of the clinical and field training requirements;

(I) student and participant safety policies;

(J) state requirements for certification;

(K) student dress code requirements;

(L) student progress conferences;

(M) student evaluation policies;

(N) student discipline policies;

(O) student policies concerning equipment use; and

(P) faculty used in the training program, their credentials, and their role in conducting the training program;

(4) provide a medical advisor for the training program;

(5) conduct an evaluation of the course;

(6) maintain records of each approved initial course of instruction as defined in K.A.R. 109-9-5 (a)(4); and

(7) provide a letter accepting responsibility as the sponsoring organization of the training course.

(c) The organizational plan of the sponsoring organization shall:

(1) name the sponsoring organization;

(2) include a statement of philosophy and purpose of the sponsoring organization;

(3) name the administrative officer of the sponsoring organization who is directly responsible for the training course;

(4) name the qualified instructor-coordinator selected to coordinate the training course and state which level of the course they will coordinate;

(5) provide documentation of a current agreement with a physician licensed to practice medicine and surgery to function as the medical advisor of the training course. This agreement shall clearly identify the levels of training which the physician agrees to serve as medical advisor and the expiration date of the agreement;

(6) provide documentation of a current agreement with a hospital to provide clinical training. This agreement shall clearly identify the levels of training which the hospital agrees to provide, any restraints placed on the students or faculty while functioning in the clinical facilities, and the expiration date of the clinical agreement;

(7) provide documentation of a current agreement with a pre-hospital emergency medical service organization. This agreement shall clearly identify the levels of training which the emergency medical service agrees to provide, any restraints placed on the students or faculty, and the expiration date of the agreement;

(8) include a copy of the course evaluation used for the course;

(9) describe records which will be maintained, how long the records will be maintained, and where the records will be maintained;

(10) provide a list of equipment and supplies that is available for each course; and

(11) describe how certified attendants desiring to audit any individual class session for continuing education credit will be issued credit.

(d) In the absence of a sponsoring organization, the instructor-coordinator requesting course approval shall clearly state in the application that the instructor-coordinator will assume the responsibilities of the sponsoring organization and the instructor-coordinator shall fulfill all requirements of the sponsoring organization. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-6110; effective Aug. 30, 1993.)

Redemption of Bonds Prior to Maturity

The bonds will not be subject to redemption and payment prior to maturity.

Conditions of Bids

Proposals will be received on the bonds bearing such rate or rates of interest as may be specified by the bidders, subject to the following conditions: The same rate shall apply to all bonds of the same maturity. Each interest rate specified shall be a multiple of $\frac{1}{8}$ or $\frac{1}{20}$ of one percent. No interest rate shall exceed the index of treasury bonds published by *The Bond Buyer*, successor to *Muniweek* in New York, New York, on the Monday next preceding the day on which the bonds are sold, plus 2 percent. The difference between the highest rate specified and the lowest rate specified shall not exceed 2 percent. No supplemental interest payments will be authorized. No bid of less than the principal amount of the bonds and accrued interest will be considered. Each bid shall specify the total interest cost to the county during the life of the bond issue on the basis of such bid, the premium, if any, offered by the bidder, and the net interest cost to the county on the basis of such bid. Each bid shall also specify the average annual net interest rate to the county on the basis of such bid. Bidders shall specify in the bid form the prices (exclusive of accrued interest), expressed as a dollar price, at which the bidder intends that each maturity amount of the bonds shall be initially offered to the public (the initial reoffering prices).

Basis of Award

The award of the bonds will be made on the basis of the lowest net interest cost to the county, which will be determined by subtracting the amount of the premium bid, if any, from the total interest cost to the county. If there is any discrepancy between the net interest cost and the average annual net interest rate specified, the specified net interest cost shall govern and the interest rates specified in the bid shall be adjusted accordingly. If two or more proper bids providing for identical amounts for the lowest net interest cost are received, the county shall determine which bid, if any, shall be accepted, and its determination shall be final.

Security for the Bonds

The bonds will be general obligations of the county payable as to both principal and interest in part from special assessments levied upon specially benefitted property and, if not so paid, from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limitation upon all the taxable tangible property, real and personal, within the territorial limits of the county. The balance of the principal of and interest on the bonds is payable from ad valorem taxes which may be levied, without limitation as to rate or amount on all the taxable tangible prop-

erty, real and personal, within the territorial limits of the county.

Internal Revenue Code of 1986

The Internal Revenue Code of 1986 imposes requirements on the county which must be met subsequent to the issuance of the bonds by the county and, as a result, the county will and does hereby covenant that it will diligently undertake those steps necessary to maintain the tax-exempt status of the bonds. The county's failure to comply with such requirements could adversely affect the tax-exempt status of the bonds. Purchasers of the bonds should be aware that should the bonds lose their status as tax-exempt obligations as a result of the county's failure to comply with such requirements, the bonds are neither callable nor will the rate of interest on the bonds be adjusted to reflect such circumstances.

The code includes interest on tax-exempt obligations, such as the bonds, in the adjusted current earnings of certain corporations in the calculation of alternative minimum taxable income, with certain other adjustment. Furthermore, Section 59A of the code, as added by the Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act of 1986, provides for an environmental tax generally based on corporate alternative minimum taxable income. The amount of the tax is equal to 0.12 percent of the excess of alternative minimum taxable income, without regard to net operating losses and the deduction for this tax, over \$2 million. The environmental tax is imposed whether or not the taxpayer is subject to the alternative minimum tax. The environmental tax may subject certain bondowners to additional taxation for interest earned on the bonds.

The code also requires property and casualty insurance companies to reduce the amount of their deductible underwriting losses by a percentage of the amount of tax-exempt interest received or accrued on such obligations. With the exception of certain "qualified tax-exempt obligations," the code provides that banks and thrift institutions may not deduct any portion of the interest cost of purchasing or carrying tax-exempt obligations such as the bonds. The county does intend to designate the bonds as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" under Section 265 of the code.

Legal Opinion

The bonds will be sold subject to the legal opinion of Nichols and Wolfe Chartered, Topeka, Kansas, bond counsel, whose approving legal opinion as to the validity of the bonds will be furnished and paid for by the county, printed on the bonds and delivered to the successful bidder when the bonds are delivered. Said opinion will also state that in the opinion of bond counsel, assuming continued compliance by the county with the provisions of the resolution authorizing the issuance of the bonds and the code, under existing law, the interest on the bonds is exempt from federal income taxation. Interest on the bonds will also be excluded from the computation of Kansas adjusted gross income.

Delivery and Payment

The county will pay for printing the bonds and will deliver the bonds, without cost to the successful bidder, properly prepared, executed and registered, on or about August 19, 1993, at such bank or trust company in the contiguous United States of America as may be specified by the successful bidder. Said bidder will also be furnished with a certified transcript of the proceedings evidencing the authorization and issuance of the bonds and the usual closing documents, including a certificate that there is no litigation pending or threatened at the time of delivery of the bonds affecting their validity and a certificate regarding the completeness and accuracy of the official statement. Payment for the bonds shall be made in Federal Reserve funds, immediately subject to use by the county. Such certificate shall state that (1) it is made on the best knowledge, information and belief of the successful bidder, and (2) 10 percent or more in par amount of the bonds of each maturity was sold to the public at or below the initial reoffering prices (such amount being sufficient to establish the sale of a "substantial amount" of the bonds).

Good Faith Deposit

Each bid shall be accompanied by a cashier's or certified check drawn on a bank located in the United States of America in the amount of \$17,880, payable to the order of the county to secure the county from any loss resulting from the failure of the bidder to comply with the terms of the bid. No interest will be paid upon the deposit made by the successful bidder. Said check shall be returned to the bidder if the bid is not accepted. If a bid is accepted, said check shall be held by the county until the bidder shall have complied with all of the terms and conditions of this notice, at which time said check shall, at the option of the county, be returned to the successful bidder or deducted from the purchase price. If a bid is accepted but the county shall fail to deliver the bonds to the bidder in accordance with the terms and conditions of this notice, said check shall be returned to the bidder. If a bid is accepted but the bidder shall default in the performance of any of the terms and conditions of this notice, the proceeds of such check shall be forfeited to the county, and the county reserves the right to pursue any consequential damages as a result of such default.

CUSIP Numbers

CUSIP identification numbers will be printed on the bonds, but neither the failure to print such number on any bond nor any error with respect thereto shall constitute cause for failure or refusal by the purchaser thereof to accept delivery of and pay for the bonds in accordance with the terms of this notice. All expenses in relation to the assignment and printing of CUSIP numbers on the bonds will be paid by the county.

Bid Forms

All bids must be made on forms which may be procured from the county clerk. No additions or alterations in such forms shall be made and any erasures may cause rejection of any bid. The county reserves the right to waive irregularities and to reject any or all bids.

Submission of Bids

Bids must be submitted in sealed envelopes addressed to the undersigned county clerk and marked "Proposal for the Purchase of General Obligation Bonds." Bids may be submitted by mail or delivered in person to the undersigned at Riley County Courthouse and must be received by the undersigned prior to 11 a.m. C.D.T., on July 22, 1993.

Date and Delivery of Preliminary and Final Official Statement

The county has authorized the preparation and disbursement of a preliminary official statement containing information relating to the bonds. The preliminary official statement comprises the final official statement required by Rule 15c2-12 of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

The preliminary official statement, when amended to include the interest rates specified by the purchaser and the price or yield at which the purchaser will reoffer the bonds to the public, together with any other information required by law, will constitute a "Final Official Statement" with respect to the bonds as that term is defined in Rule 15c2-12. No more than seven business days after the date of the sale, the county will provide without cost to the purchaser such reasonable number of printed copies of the final official statement, and further copies, if desired, will be made available at the purchaser's expense. If the sale of the bonds is awarded to a syndicate, the county will designate the senior managing purchaser of the syndicate as its agent for purposes of distributing copies of the final official statement to each participating purchaser. Any purchaser executing and delivering a bid form with respect to the bonds agrees thereby that if the bid is accepted it shall accept such designation and shall enter into a contractual relationship with all participating purchasers for the purpose of assuring the receipt and distribution by each such participating purchaser of the final official statement.

The county will deliver to the purchaser on the date of delivery of the bonds a certificate executed by the chairman and the county clerk to the effect that the final official statement, as of the date of delivery of the bonds, does not contain any untrue statement of

a material fact or omit to state a material fact necessary to make the statements made, in the light of the circumstances in which they are made, not misleading.

Copies of the county's preliminary official statement relating to the bonds may be obtained from the county clerk.

Assessed Valuation and Indebtedness

The total assessed valuation of the taxable tangible property within the county for the year 1992 is \$194,549,523. The total general obligation bonded indebtedness of the county as of the date of the bonds,

including the bonds, is \$4,357,460, including, as of the date of the bonds, temporary notes outstanding in the principal amount of \$3,079,255, of which \$930,000 will be retired out of the proceeds of the bonds herein offered for sale.

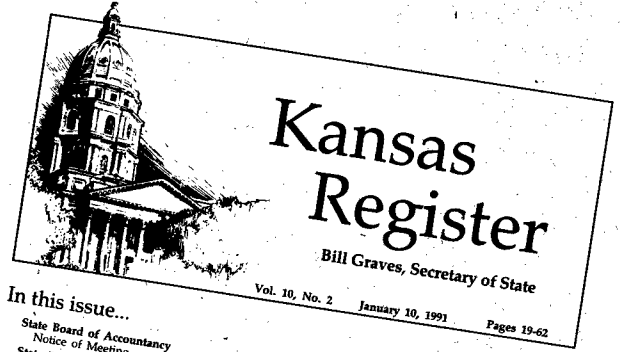
