Proposals will be issued upon request to all prospective bidders who have been prequalified by the Kansas Department of Transportation on the basis of financial condition, available construction equipment, and experience. Also, a statement of unearned contracts (Form No. 284) must be filed. There will be no discrimination against anyone because of race, age, religion, color, sex, handicap, or national origin in the award of contracts.

Each bidder shall file a sworn statement executed by or on behalf of the person, firm, association or corporation submitting the bid, certifying that such person, firm, association or corporation has not, either directly or indirectly, entered into any agreement, participated in any collusion, or otherwise taken any action in restraint of free competitive bidding in connection with the submitted bid. This sworn statement shall be in the form of an affidavit executed and sworn to by the bidder before a person who is authorized by the laws of the state to administer oaths. The required form of the affidavit will be provided by the state to each prospective bidder. Failure to submit the sworn statement as part of the bid-approval package will make the bid nonresponsive and not eligible for award consideration.

Plans and specifications for the projects may be examined at the office of the respective county clerk or at the KDOT district office responsible for the work.

In accordance with state regulations 28-16-57 through 63, 28-18-1 through 4, and the authority vested with the state by the administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, tentative permits have been prepared for discharges to the waters of the United States and the state of Kansas for the applicants described below. Compliance Schedule:

1. The waste management plan developed by Soil Conservation Service and approved by the department shall be adhered to as a condition of this permit. The plan calls for nutrient analysis of both liquid waste and sludges with application to meet crop nutrient needs. If wastes are not analyzed for nutrient content, wastewater shall be applied at not greater than one acre-inch per acre per year and settled sludge shall be applied at not greater than five tons/ac/year.
2. The runoff filtration system shall be installed by November 1, 1993.
3. Grass is to be established in the runoff filter May 1, 1994.

Written comments on the proposed determinations may be submitted to Bethel Spotts, Permit Clerk, or Dorothy Geisler (agricultural permits), Kansas Department of Health and Environment, Division of Environment, Bureau of Water, Forbes Field, Topeka 66620. All comments postmarked or received on or before August 29 will be considered in the formulation of final determinations regarding this public notice. Please refer to the appropriate public notice number (KS-AG-93-72/73) and the name of applicant as listed when preparing comments.

If no objections are received during the public notice period, the Secretary of Health and Environment will issue the final determinations. Temporary Administrative Regulations

Article 8.—SENIOR CARE ACT

26-8-1. Definitions. (a) "Activities of daily living (ADL's)" means personal functional activities required for continued well-being, essential for health and safety, including eating, drinking, dressing, grooming, bathing, personal hygiene, mobility, and bowel and bladder continence.

(b) "Area agency" or "area agency on aging" means the agency or organization within a planning and service area that has been designated by the secretary to develop, implement and administer a plan for the delivery of a comprehensive and coordinated system of services to older persons in the planning and service area.

(c) "Assisted living" means housing options which include boarding care homes, adult family homes, one to five bed adult care homes and intermediate personal care homes, as defined in K.S.A. 39-923 and K.S.A. 39-1501, and other similar options as designated by the secretary.

(d) "Attendant care services" means assistance with bathing, medication, dressing, personal appearance, feeding and toileting under the direction of a medical professional.

(e) "Care management services" means

(1) a service provided to a client, at the direction of the client or a family member of the client:

(A) by an individual who is trained or experienced in the case management skills that are required to deliver the services and coordination described in subparagraph (2); and

(B) to assess the needs, and to arrange, coordinate, and monitor an optimum package of services to meet the needs of the client; and

(2) includes services and coordination such as:

(A) comprehensive assessment of the client including the physical, psychological, and social needs;

(B) development and implementation of a service plan with the client to mobilize the formal and informal resources and services identified in the assessment to meet the needs of the client, including coordination of the resources and services:

(i) with any other plans that exist for various formal services, such as hospital discharge plans; and

(ii) with the information and assistance services provided under the Older Americans Act;

(C) coordination and monitoring of formal and informal service delivery, including coordination and monitoring to ensure that services specified in the plan are being provided;

(D) periodic reassessment and revision of the status of the client;

(i) the client; or

(ii) if necessary, a primary caregiver or family member of the client; and

(E) advocacy on behalf of the client for needed services or resources in accordance with the wishes of the client.

(f) "Chore services" means those services consisting of household chores, including heavy cleaning, yard and walk maintenance, which the older person is unable to perform independently and which do not require the services of a trained homemaker or other specialist.

(g) "Client" means any older person who meets eligibility standards established in K.A.R. 26-8-2 and who is being served by the senior care act program.

(h) "Custom Care" means an individually tailored part of a plan of services which is developed by an area agency on aging designated case manager, and which is not otherwise available. The area agency may contract for the service with an individual or a corporate service provider. Referral arrangements and fee-for-service contracts shall be developed between the area agency and the provider of custom care service, and these contracts shall be approved by the area agency on aging director.

(i) "Family" means one or more adults and children, if any, related by blood or law and residing in the same household. Where adults, other than spouses, reside together, each will be considered a separate family. Emancipated minors and children living under the

care of individuals not legally responsible for that care shall be considered one-person families.

(j) "Homemaker services" means those services providing assistance in housecleaning, laundry, essential shopping, errands and meal preparation, and which do not require trained personnel.

(k) "In-kind resources" means goods or services provided by an area agency on aging or a subgrantee and dedicated to expansion of senior care act services; such goods or services shall not include indirect costs of administration, except for direct supervision; such goods or services may include direct costs of screening and assessment and service delivery. Training to providers of direct services may also be included as an in-kind resource. The services of individual volunteers shall not be counted toward senior care act match unless the services are of a professional nature such as services provided by physician or a registered or practical nurse, or other professionals who have a background relative to the needs of the senior care act services. The services of any volunteer driver related to transportation services may also be acceptable match if that area agency offers transportation as a part of senior care act services.

(l) "Instrumental activities of daily living (IADL's)" means medical or functional aspects of daily living which, when the client is unable to perform them, would lead to a significant risk to health and safety unless services are provided, including meal preparation, shopping, medication monitoring or administration, housekeeping, money management, and telephone communication. Critical IADL's are shopping, meal preparation, medications, money management, and daily task planning.

(m) "personal emergency response services" means help in the event of an emergency secured by a high-risk patient through an electronic device.

(n) "Older person" means any person who is 60 years of age or older.

(o) "Residential repair" means activities to repair, maintain or renovate a residence or appliances.

(p) "Respite care" means short-term inpatient or outpatient care delivered to a client in place of the client's regular source of support.

(q) "Screening and assessment" means administering standard examinations, procedures or tests for the purpose of gathering information about an older person to determine need and eligibility for services. Information collected may include health status, financial status, ability to manage activities of daily living and instrumental activities of daily living, and information on current support systems.

(r) "Secretary" means the secretary of aging.

(s) "Senior care act" means K.S.A. 75-5926 through K.S.A. 75-5936, which establishes a program of in-home support services for eligible persons 60 years of age and older.

(t) "Start-up costs" means those expenses incurred in preparing for and initially incurred in offering a new service. Start up costs include equipment, training and outreach.

(u) "Transportation for care services" means services provided in order to take a client from one location to another for medical or respite care. (Authorized by and

- (g) residential repair services;
- (h) assisted living services;
- (i) custom care services; and

(b) Each applicant for an occupation license shall apply in writing on the application form approved and furnished by the commission.

(c) Each applicant for an occupation license acting as an employer shall submit proof of compliance with the workers compensation act of the state of Kansas, K.S.A. 44-501 *et seq.*

(d) Each person who is appointed by an owner to act as an authorized agent shall secure an occupation license. Each authorized agent agreement form shall be filed with the commission. Each authorized agent shall perform for the owner only the duties that are the subject of the authorized agent agreement form. Each authorized agent shall notify the commission in writing when the authorized agent agreement is terminated.

(e) Each applicant for an occupation license shall not knowingly provide false information on any occupation license application form.

(f) Each applicant for an occupation license shall not fail to disclose any material fact on any occupation license application form.

(g) No person shall alter or attempt to alter any information contained on an occupation license badge.

(h) Each person who loses an occupation license shall immediately:

(1) notify the commission office at the racetrack facility;

(2) secure a duplicate license; and

(3) pay the required fee.

(i) Each required fee shall be paid when the occupation license is issued. Each occupation license issued by the commission shall be valid for the period commencing January 1 and terminating December 31 of the calendar year in which the occupation license is issued.

(j) Any applicant may be required to submit with the application at least two complete sets of fingerprint cards approved by the commission. If the fingerprints

are not acceptable for processing, each applicant shall be required to resubmit fingerprint cards.

(k) Each applicant for an occupation license must be at least 16 years old. However, this provision shall not preclude dependent children under the age of 16 from working for a parent or guardian when the parent or guardian is licensed as a kennel owner, trainer or assistant trainer and approval has been obtained from the organization licensee. Each licensed trainer at a horse or greyhound racetrack facility or assistant trainer at a horse racetrack facility shall be at least 18 years of age. Each racing official, security employee and mutuel employee shall be at least 18 years of age.

(l) Each employer at a racetrack facility shall ensure that every employee is properly licensed and shall immediately notify the commission office at the racetrack facility and the organization licensee when a licensee's employment status changes or when an employee is terminated. Each employer shall make an effort to secure the employee's occupation license and, if the license is secured, shall deliver the license to the commission office at the racetrack facility. 112-4-24. Qualifications for amateur jockey. Each person granted an amateur jockey occupation license shall:

(a) be at least 16 years old;

(b) meet all qualification rules for membership to the amateur riders' club of the Americas (ARCAS) as currently contained in the membership application form amended in December 1992;

(c) hold a current amateur rider's license from ARSCAS and be a current member of ARSCAS;

(d) weigh no more than 142 pounds;

(e) not hold a current license as a jockey or apprentice jockey;

(f) submit proof of a satisfactory physical examination given by a person licensed to practice medicine and surgery within the previous 12 months. As required by K.A.R. 112-7-20 and K.A.R. 112-14-10, the physical examination shall include visual acuity and hearing examinations. A reexamination of any amateur jockey may be required by the commission or the stewards at any time. An amateur jockey may be prohibited from riding by the commission or the stewards until the jockey has successfully passed each examination;

(g) wear properly fastened safety helmets while mounted on a race horse within the enclosure or riding in a race; and

(h) meet all licensing requirements stated in these racing regulations. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1992 Supp. 74-8804; implementing K.S.A. 1992 Supp. 74-8816; effective, T-112-7-22-93, July 22, 1993.)

Article 6.—GOOD TIME CREDITS

44-6-124. Awarding good time. (a) For crimes, other than class A crimes, committed prior to July 1, 1993, an inmate may earn good time credits which will be subtracted from the minimum sentence in order to establish a parole eligibility date or the maximum sentence in order to establish the conditional release date.

(b) Good time credits may be earned and awarded only for time served on a sentence on and after the beginning date of the sentence. Good time credits shall not be awarded for any period of time served prior to the beginning date of sentence.

(c) Unless the application of good time credits would result in a release date earlier than the initial award date, the initial award of earned good time credits shall be made at the time of the inmate's first program classification review which falls 120 days or more after the inmate's admission to the custody of the secretary of corrections. The initial award of earned good time credits shall cover the period from the beginning date of the sentence to the date of the initial award but shall be based on the factors set forth in subsection (f) for the time period from admission to the custody of the secretary of corrections to the date of the initial award.

(d) Following the initial award, good time credits shall be awarded at each program classification review from credits available to be earned since the previous program classification review.

(e) If the entire allocation of good time credits is not awarded at a program classification review, no part of that allocation shall be awarded at a later date.

(f) The following factors shall be considered in determining whether an inmate has earned good time credits:

- (1) the inmate's performance in a work assignment;
- (2) the inmate's performance in a program assignment;
- (3) the inmate's maintenance of an appropriate personal and group living environment;
- (4) the inmate's participation in release planning activities;
- (5) the inmate's disciplinary record; and
- (6) other factors related to the inmate's general adjustment, performance, behavior, attitude, and overall demonstration of individual responsibility and accountability.

(g) An inmate's disciplinary record shall affect the earning of good time awards in the following manner.

(1) A guilty finding of a class I disciplinary offense shall result in the withholding of a minimum of 50% of the good time credits available for that program classification review period.

(2) A guilty finding of a class II disciplinary offense shall result in the withholding of a minimum of 25%

but not more than 50% of the good time credits available for that program classification review period.

(3) A guilty finding of a class III disciplinary offense shall result in the withholding of a minimum of 10% but not more than 25% of the good time credits available for that program classification review period. For purposes of this provision, summary judgments pursuant to K.A.R. 44-13-201b shall not be considered a guilty finding.

(4) In the event there are multiple disciplinary violations within a single disciplinary report, only the most serious violation for which the inmate was found guilty or pleads no contest shall be counted in determining the percentage of good time credits to withhold.

(5) The percentage of good time credits withheld during a program classification review period shall be cumulative but shall not exceed 100% of that available for that classification review period.

(6) A pattern of refusal by an inmate to constructively work or participate in assigned programs shall result in the withholding of 100% of the good time credits for that program classification review period, unless the inmate is determined by the facility health authority to be physically or mentally incapable of working or participating in a particular program or detail.

(h) Good time credits which are forfeited as a result of a penalty imposed for a disciplinary offense shall not be restored to an inmate. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1992 Supp. 22-3725, as amended by L. 1992, ch. 239, sec. 272; effective, T-84-32, Nov. 23, 1983; amended May 1, 1984; amended Nov. 12, 1990; amended Sept. 30, 1991; amended April 6, 1992; amended Sept. 13, 1993.)

44-6-146. Presumptive sentence good time credits.

(a) For crimes, other than off-grid crimes, committed on or after July 1, 1993, an inmate may earn good time credits which will be subtracted from the prison portion of the inmate's sentence, thereby resulting in an earlier release date from imprisonment.

(1) The maximum amount of good time which may be earned shall be limited to 20% of the term of imprisonment imposed by the court.

(2) The total amount of good time credits earned and retained by an inmate shall be added to the period of post-release supervision applicable to the inmate's sentence.

(b) Good time credits may be earned and awarded only for time served on a sentence on and after the beginning date of the sentence. Good time credits shall not be awarded for any period of time served prior to the beginning date of sentence.

(c) Unless the application of good time credits would result in a release date earlier than the initial award date, the initial award of earned good time credits shall be made at the time of the inmate's first program classification review which falls 120 days or more after the inmate's admission to the custody of the secretary of corrections. The initial award of earned good time credits shall cover the period from the beginning date of the sentence to the date of the initial award but shall

be based on the factors set forth in subsection (f) for the time period from admission to the custody of the secretary of corrections to the date of the initial award.

(d) Following the initial award, good time credits shall be awarded at each program classification review from credits available to be earned since the previous program classification review.

(e) If the entire allocation of good time credits is not awarded at a program classification review, no part of that allocation shall be awarded at a later date.

(f) The following factors shall be considered in determining whether an inmate has earned good time credits:

- (1) the inmate's performance in a work assignment;
- (2) the inmate's performance in a program assignment;
- (3) the inmate's maintenance of an appropriate personal and group living environment;
- (4) the inmate's participation in release planning activities;
- (5) the inmate's disciplinary record; and
- (6) other factors related to the inmate's general adjustment, performance, behavior, attitude, and overall demonstration of individual responsibility and accountability.

(g) An inmate's disciplinary record shall affect the earning of good time awards in the following manner:

(1) A guilty finding of a class I disciplinary offense shall result in the withholding of a minimum of 50% of the good time credits available for that program classification review period.

(2) A guilty finding of a class II disciplinary offense shall result in the withholding of a minimum of 25% but not more than 50% of the good time credits available for that program classification review period.

(3) A guilty finding of a class III disciplinary offense shall result in the withholding of a minimum of 10% but not more than 25% of the good time credits available for that program classification review period. For purposes of this provision, summary judgments pursuant to K.A.R. 44-13-201b shall not be considered a guilty finding.

(4) In the event there are multiple disciplinary violations within a single disciplinary report, only the most serious violation for which the inmate was found guilty or pleads no contest shall be counted in determining the percentage of good time credits to withhold.

(5) The percentage of good time credits withheld during a program classification review period shall be cumulative but shall not exceed 100% of that available for that classification review period.

(6) A pattern of refusal by an inmate to constructively work or participate in assigned programs shall result in the withholding of 100% of the good time credits for that program classification review period, unless the inmate is determined by the facility health authority to be physically or mentally incapable of working or participating in a particular program or detail.

(h) Good time credits which are forfeited as a result of a penalty imposed for a disciplinary offense shall not be restored to an inmate. (Authorized by and implementing L. 1992, ch. 239, sec. 22; effective Sept. 13, 1993.)

Article 7.—PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES

44-7-116. Release gratuity. (a) Definitions.

(1) The term "initial release" means the first time an inmate is released on an active Kansas sentence.

(2) The term "subsequent release" means the release of an inmate on an active Kansas sentence to parole, conditional release, post release supervision or upon expiration of a sentence when the release follows a period of incarceration based solely upon violation of conditions of prior release.

(b) Initial release.

(1) Upon initial release an inmate shall receive a cash payment of \$100.00 unless the inmate's trust account has a balance of \$500.00 or more at the time of release.

(2) An inmate's account shall be considered as having a balance of \$500.00 or more if at any time during the 30 days immediately preceding the inmate's release the account had a balance of \$500.00 or more. In the event the account had a balance of \$500.00 or more during this 30 day period, no gratuity shall be paid. Verification of previous account balances shall be through a reasonable search of the department of corrections' automated inter-facility accounting or inmate banking systems.

(3) Inmates who are engaged in any type of work release employment at the time of their initial release shall not be eligible to receive a gratuity payment.

(4) The deputy secretary for facility management may for good cause authorize an initial release gratuity of \$100.00 notwithstanding other provisions of this regulation.

(c) Subsequent release.

(1) Upon a subsequent release an inmate shall receive a gratuity payment of up to \$40.00 if the inmate's trust account balance is \$100.00 or less at the time of the inmate's release.

(2) Inmates who are engaged in any type of work release employment at the time of their subsequent release shall not be eligible to receive a gratuity payment.

(3) The total amount of all gratuity payments an inmate may receive over the life of an active sentence shall not exceed \$220.00 unless specifically authorized by the deputy secretary for facility management. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1992 Supp. 75-5211, as amended by 1993 H.B. 2129, §1; effective Sept. 13, 1993.)
