## Request for Proposals

The Advisory Committee on Juvenile Offender Programs and the Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services are seeking to fund one-time projects to assist counties in minimizing the numbers of juveniles placed in jails and lock-ups between now and the opening of the five regional detention facilities, or to assist counties in preparing for the regional services that will begin with the opening of the detention centers.

Most of the grants awarded as a result of this request will be funded from federal funds that are mandated to be expended for jail removal purposes. Therefore, applications should demonstrate that proposed services will further the goal of restricting the number of juveniles confined in adult jails and lock-ups.

Corporation for Change

Request for Proposals

Target V of the *Blueprint for Investing in the Future of Kansas Children and Families* calls for modification of the service delivery system. The 1991 Special Committee on Children's Initiatives of the Kansas Legislature and the subsequent work of the Corporation for Change, as well as an extensive national research, have revealed numerous barriers to the creation of preventive, community-based, family-centered, decategorized services for children and families. Among these barriers are confidentiality requirements, lack of adequate information systems, inflexible funding sources, federal regulations, state and local regulations, misinformation about regulations, ineffective interagency and intra-agency communication, and differing underlying values held by various service providers.

In an effort to remove these barriers, the Corporation for Change is making funds available to local planning councils, agencies and other interested parties to remove barriers to coordinated service delivery for children and families.

This grant program is intended to be as flexible as possible to facilitate community problem solving and to encourage creative initiatives. Examples of possible use of funds include preparation of applications for waivers to regulations, hiring trained negotiators to resolve conflicts, paying travel expenses of state level officials to explain state policies that are unclear, or purchase of training that can improve performance.

Eligibility

Local planning councils, departments of state government, public and nonprofit agencies, and other in-

terested parties who can demonstrate community support and the potential for effective barrier removal may apply for grants. Priority will be given to local planning councils.

Funding Period

The application process is open-ended. Grant application will be accepted until funding is exhausted, although funds should be expended by December 31, 1993.

Application Process

Organizations should submit an application that includes the following elements:

1. Identification of the specific barrier that needs to be removed.
2. Process by which the barrier was identified, including the individuals and organizations involved.
3. Identification of the agencies or individuals to be included in resolution of the barrier and documentation of their willingness to participate.
4. Detailed strategy for barrier removal.
5. Statement of expected results and criteria by which success will be measured.
6. Designation of responsible organization (fiscal agent) and documentation of community support.
7. Budget.

Evaluation Criteria

Criteria by which proposals will be evaluated include the following:

1. Nature of the barrier identified for problem solving. Existence of the barrier must be documented and shown to impede effective service delivery.
2. Probability that the barrier can be overcome. There must be a reasonable probability that the barrier can be removed with the suggested action. Some barriers are so serious that they cannot be eliminated at the local level. For example, a proposal to end categorical federal funding for children and families would not be given serious consideration because localities have little control over federal funding.
3. Quality of proposed activity.
4. Documentation of community support for barrier removal.

Funding Levels

Grant applications should not exceed \$3,000. Consideration will be given to larger proposals only in exceptional circumstances.

**Criminal Procedure—Criminal History Record Information—Dissemination of Criminal History Record Information; Disclosure of Court Findings of Guilt and Sentences Imposed.** Harold T. Walker, City Attorney, Kansas City, August 4, 1993.

Court records of public judicial proceedings are exempt from the definition of criminal history record information under K.S.A. 1992 Supp. 22-4701(b) (3). The sentencing information and guilty or not guilty findings are part of the court records and therefore open to the public, unless there is another statutory restriction available to close them. ## Opinion No. 93-104

**Public Health—Solid and Hazardous Waste; Solid Waste—Cities or Counties Authorized to Provide for Collection and Disposal of Solid Wastes or Contract Therefor; Fees; Adoption of Regulations and Standards; Ability to Charge Schools and Churches.** John J. Gillett, Wilson County Attorney, Fredonia, August 4, 1993.

Wilson County may assess a solid waste fee against owners of tax-exempt property who receive the service, as long as the fee is to cover the costs of the service and is not to subsidize the operation of the county in general. Cited herein: K.S.A. 65-3410. MJS

**State Boards, Commissions and Authorities—Kansas Homestead Rehabilitation Corporation—Status as a State Agency.** Senator Alicia L. Salisbury, 20th District, Topeka, August 4, 1993.

## Opinion No. 93-106

**Public Health—Controlled Substances; Forfeitures; Procedure—Forfeitures of Property Under K.S.A. 65-4135 or 65-4156; State Special Asset Forfeiture Fund; Authorized Expenditures.** Robert B. Davenport, Director, Kansas Bureau of Investigation, Topeka, August 6, 1993.

K.S.A. 65-4173(d) does not prohibit use of money in the state special asset forfeiture fund to supplement drug enforcement agent salaries and fringe benefits when federal grant money is insufficient to cover previously budgeted amounts. However, money in the fund cannot be used to reduce established state appropriations for the agency's operating budget. ## Opinion No. 93-107

**Elections—Election Expense Apportionment—Expenses Subject to Apportionment; Payment By County; Reimbursement; Basis for Apportionment.** Darrell E. Miller, Jewell County Attorney, Mankato, August 9, 1993.

The legislature has established an administrative procedure to be followed by governmental subdivisions aggrieved by a determination of the county election officer regarding apportionment of election expenses. Any governmental subdivision which fails to exhaust the remedies established under that procedure incurs the liability for the apportioned expenses as determined by the county election officer.

Apportionment of election expenses pursuant to K.S.A. 25-2201 is to occur only if all registered electors of a county are eligible to vote in an election conducted in the county. It is not required that all registered electors of the county be eligible to vote for the same public offices or questions. The convening of the standing committees which have been designated by the Legislative Coordinating Council as interim study committees between regular sessions of the legislature does not violate Article 2, Section 8 of the Kansas Constitution. Furthermore, the Legislative Coordinating Council has broad statutory power to dictate the subjects that the standing committees will study during the interim session and, consequently, standing committees are authorized to meet and consider whatever subjects have been authorized by the council. A public hearing will be conducted at 7 p.m. Wednesday, September 22, at the Quality Inn Motel, West 50 Highway, Emporia, to consider the adoption of a proposed addition to the existing rules and regulations of the Kansas Dental Board.

The period prior to the public hearing will permit a time for written public comments on the proposed regulation. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Kansas Dental Board, 3601 S.W. 29th, Suite 134, Topeka 66614. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulation during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

The regulation is proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of the proposed regulation and its economic impact follows.

**K.A.R. 71-1-18. Sterilization and infection control.** This new regulation serves to protect dental health care workers and dental patients from exposure to communicable diseases. The regulation follows closely the recommendations of the Centers for Disease Control, which are the accepted standards in this area.

Implementation of the prescribed safeguards will result in added operating costs in certain dental practices not presently in compliance, which costs may be passed on to dental patients. Such costs are insignificant in comparison to the private and governmental costs of treatment following disease transmission. There may be certain additional costs to the dental board and other governmental agencies or units in connection with enforcement procedures, but, again, such costs are insignificant in comparison with the threat of disease.

The proposed regulation provides minimal acceptable safeguards, and less costly and less intrusive procedures are not considered acceptable.

Artists passing the selection process must have demonstrated excellence in the production of their work, the ability to work in educational settings, good communication skills, the ability to work with diverse groups, and involvement in curriculum development and curriculum-based arts activities.

Acceptance for the roster is not a guarantee of employment. Final selection of an artist for a residency is the responsibility of the sponsoring organization. Sponsors apply to the commission each year for grants to help support consultancies. The artist is paid directly by the sponsoring organization at or above the rate established by the commission, with terms to be agreed upon between the artist and sponsor.

Roster artists are encouraged to seek and actively develop projects in collaboration with local sponsors. Roster artists also are encouraged to assist sponsors in grant-writing and project development.

In preparing their recommendations to the commission, the panelists will consider the quality of each applicant's work and whether it reflects continued, serious and exceptional aesthetic investigation; the artist's record of professional activity and achievement, and information included in the artist's statement.

Individual artists creating original work in any art discipline may apply to the Kansas Arts Commission for funding to assist them in achieving the next stage in the development in their careers.

Applications to the Professional Development Grant Program for fiscal year 1994 (July 1, 1993-June 30, 1994) will be accepted until 5 p.m. Monday, August 30, by which time all completed applications and support materials must be received in the commission office.

To be eligible, an artist must have been a Kansas resident since July 1, 1992, with the intention of residing in Kansas through June 30, 1994. Non-residents, undergraduate or graduate students, and interpretive artists not creating original work are not eligible.

Artists who have received professional development grants in previous years—either directly or as part of a collaboration with another professional development grant recipient—may not apply again. Previous recipients of Kansas artist fellowships are eligible, and artists may apply for both within the same year.

An artist may apply for a professional development grant from \$100 to no more than \$500 to cover up to 50 percent of the cost of a project or activity beginning no earlier than October 1, 1993, and completed no later than June 30, 1994.

Grants may be matched in cash or a combination of cash and documented in-kind services. A completed final report form must be submitted within 30 days of a project's completion. Grantees must provide documentation of their projects.

Grants may be awarded for projects undertaken by individual artists. The artist assumes all responsibility for the grant, including full federal income tax liability.

The grant applications will be evaluated by a panel of commissioners and arts professionals for projects. The commission will consider the panel recommendations and make the grant awards during the quarterly business meeting in November.

## Article 2.—LOTTERY RETAILERS

**111-2-2. Qualifications of lottery retailers.** (a) In addition to the qualifications and restrictions set forth in K.S.A. 74-8708 and amendments thereto, the executive director shall also consider the following factors in selecting lottery retailers:

(1) The sufficiency of existing retailers to serve the public interest.

(2) The current and potential sales volume of the applicant.

(3) The types of products, services, or entertainment offered at the applicant's place of business and their effect upon the credibility, integrity and reputation of the Kansas lottery.

(4) All locations from which Kansas lottery products will be sold in the state of Kansas.

(b) To sell instant or on-line lottery tickets, a retailer must have a current instant retailer certificate and must be actively engaged in the sale of at least one of the three most current instant games offered by the lottery unless approved by the executive director as a social environment establishment as defined in K.A.R. 111-6-1(1).

(c) Retailers whose business is seasonal may request that lottery ticket sales be suspended and their accounts placed on hold during the time the business is closed subject to approval by the executive director. During the seasonal period those businesses placed on hold will not be required to sell lottery tickets pursuant to subsection (b) above.

(d) In addition to the qualifying standards to be selected as a lottery retailer provided by K.S.A. 74-8708, and amendments thereto, the same qualifying standards may be required for employees of the applicant for a retailer certificate as deemed necessary by the executive director. ## Article 4.—INDIVIDUAL GAME RULES

**111-4-308. Name of drawing.** The Kansas Lottery shall conduct a series of drawings, entitled Heartland Park "Winners' Circle Drawings." The dates of the drawings shall coincide with the 1993 racing season at Heartland Park, 1805 SW 71st, Topeka, Kansas 66619. The dates and events at which the drawings shall take place are Sunday, August 1, 1993 at the Mello Yello 300 ASA Stock Car Race sponsored by E Z Shop. Rules applicable to the "Winners' Circle Drawings" are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-308 through 111-4-317. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-8-2-91, July 19, 1991; amended, T-111-9-20-91, Sept. 13, 1991; amended, T-111-7-30-93, July 23, 1993.)

(continued)

**111-4-311. Prizes.** The 10 winners selected at the "Winners' Circle Drawings" conducted pursuant to K.A.R. 111-4-308 *et seq.* shall each receive a prize of \$100. All prize awards are subject to lottery validation, set-offs and deductions provided by law. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-8-2-91, July 19, 1991; amended, T-111-9-20-91, Sept. 13, 1991; amended, T-111-7-30-93, July 23, 1993.)

**111-4-312. Entry into drawing.** Entry into the "Winners' Circle Drawing" is accomplished by the process detailed in the following subparagraphs:

- (a) Obtain a valid Kansas instant lottery ticket;
- (b) Determine if the ticket is a winning ticket in accordance with any instant game rules. If the ticket is a winning ticket, it is not eligible for "Winners' Circle Drawings" and shall be redeemed in accordance with the instant game rules;
- (c) If the ticket is a valid non-winning ticket, the ticket is eligible for winning the drawing and the holder of the ticket may enter the "Winners' Circle Drawings."
- (d) The holder of the non-winning ticket must complete the information form on the back of the ticket in a legible manner.
- (e) The holder of the ticket need not be present to win at the time of the "Winners' Circle Drawings";
- (f) There is no limit to the number of entries a participant may make but each participant may only win once.
- (g) For the events occurring on July 31, 1993 the drums shall open at 8:00 a.m. and close at 3:00 p.m. For events occurring on August 1, 1993, the drum will open at 8:00 a.m. and close at 3:00 p.m., or at a later time, immediately prior to the drawing, announced during the race.
- (h) The holder of the non-winning ticket must take each non-winning ticket with the information form on the back completed, to the location of either drum at the "Winners' Circle Drawings" and place it in the receptacle or drum provided by the lottery.
- (i) On Sunday, August 1, 1993, the Kansas lottery will sponsor its fourth "Winners' Circle Drawing." Players enter this drawing by placing non-winning tickets into either of two drums located inside the admission gate at Heartland Park. One drum will be located inside the admission gate in the concession area on the west side of the track, and the second will be near the pit area. Ten will be drawn from the combined contents of the two drums. Following validation by lottery security personnel the winners' names shall be announced.
- (j) Prior to Heartland Park drawing for prizes on August 1, 1993, set forth in K.A.R. 111-4-311 or 111-4-317, the contents of the drum shall be combined under the supervision of lottery security personnel present and the drawings shall be from the drum containing all the tickets. It shall be held at the lottery selling location near the pit area. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710(b); effective, T-111-8-2-91, July 19, 1991; amended, T-111-8-2-91, Aug. 23, 1991; amended, T-111-9-20-90, Sept. 13, 1991; amended, T-111-7-30-93, July 23, 1993.)

**111-4-313. Determination of "Winners' Circle Drawing" winners.** (a) The receptacle or drum shall be sealed and mixed to ensure random selection.

(b) The executive director shall designate one individual of his choice to participate in the selection process.

(c) The selection of the "Winners' Circle Drawing" winner shall be accomplished by the individual designated by the executive director, using a bare arm technique, removing only ten tickets from the receptacle at the location where entries were placed. Lottery security shall review the selected ticket to determine if the ticket is valid, the name stated on the information form located on the back of the selected ticket is legible. If the ticket is valid, the name is determined to be legible and the ticket is signed, the name shall be announced to the audience.

(d) The named person need not be present at the drawing, but must in any event provide proper identification in order to claim the "Winners' Circle Drawing" prize.

(e) The person whose ticket has been drawn from the receptacle or drum shall be determined the "Winners' Circle Drawing" winner.

(f) The winner shall be given a prize claim form to be completed and returned to the lottery.

(g) If the ticket is not valid, the name on the ticket is not legible, the person is not present or cannot provide proper identification the ticket drawn will be void and the selection process shall be repeated until a winner is selected. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-8-2-91, July 19, 1991; amended, T-111-7-30-93, July 23, 1993.)

#### Article 6.—ON-LINE GAMES

**111-6-5. Payment of prizes.** (a) Following the drawing for which an on-line ticket was purchased, and prior to the payment of any prize, the claimant shall present the winning on-line ticket to any on-line retailer, or any Kansas lottery office for validation.

(b) The procedure for payment of a single game prize of \$599, or less, except for a jackpot prize, is as follows:

(1) The holder of the ticket may present it to any on-line retailer. If the on-line retailer cannot validate the claim, or if the amount of the claim exceeds \$599, the claimant may obtain and complete a claim form and submit it with the ticket to the lottery by mail or in person. Upon validation of the ticket, the retailer shall immediately pay the holder of the ticket.

(2) Prizes payable by on-line retailers shall be paid during all normal business hours of the retailer, provided the on-line system is operational and claims can be validated.

(3) An on-line retailer may pay prizes in cash or by business check, certified check, or money order, or any combination thereof. An on-line retailer who pays a prize with a check which is dishonored may be subject to suspension or termination of its contract.

(c) To claim an on-line prize of more than \$599, the claimant shall obtain and complete a claim form and submit it with the winning ticket to the lottery's head-



quarters in Topeka by mail or in person. Prizes greater than \$599 can only be paid from the lottery's headquarters in Topeka. Upon determination that the ticket is a winning ticket, the lottery shall process for payment the amount due, less any withholding required by state and federal laws. The amount due shall be calculated according to the rules adopted for the particular on-line game. If the ticket is determined to be a non-winning ticket, the claim shall be denied and the claimant shall be promptly notified.

(d) If the claim is presented to a lottery regional office or to lottery headquarters, the claimant shall complete a claim form regardless of the prize amount and submit it with the winning ticket, either by mail or in person. Upon determination that the ticket is a winning ticket, the lottery shall present or mail a check to the claimant in payment of the amount due, less any withholding required by state and federal laws.

(e) All prizes must be claimed within 365 days including the first day of the game of the drawing in which the prize was won. In the event the final day of the 365-day period falls on a Sunday or a state holiday, the claim period will be extended to end on the next business day. Any prizes not claimed within the specified period shall be added to the prize pools of subsequent Kansas lottery games.

(f) If the ticket is determined to be a non-winning ticket, the claim shall be denied and the claimant shall be promptly notified. Non-winning tickets will not be returned to the claimant.

(g) A validated ticket shall be the only proof of a game play or plays, and the submission of a winning ticket to and receipt of the ticket by the lottery or its authorized retailer shall be the sole method of claiming a prize.

(h) Claims in excess of \$599 shall not be paid by lottery retailers. The lottery has no obligation to reimburse retailers paying claims in excess of \$599. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-89-4, Jan. 21, 1988; amended, T-111-12-21-90, Dec. 14, 1990; amended T-111-7-30-93, July 23, 1993.)

#### Article 7.—CASH LOTTO GAME RULES

**111-7-9. Claiming prizes; procedure and time period.** (a) Following the drawing for which a "Cash Lotto" ticket was purchased, and prior to the payment of any prize, each ticket shall be validated by any on-line retailer or any Kansas lottery office pursuant to this article.

(b) The procedure for payment of a prize on any single game ticket of \$599 or less, except for a jackpot prize, is as follows:

(1) The holder of a ticket purchased in Kansas may present the ticket to any on-line retailer. Upon validation of the ticket, the retailer shall immediately make payment of the prize to the holder. If the retailer cannot validate the claim, the claimant shall fill out a claim

form provided by the retailer and personally present or mail the completed form together with the ticket to any office of the Kansas lottery. If the claim is validated, then payment shall be made to the claimant by mail.

(2) The claimant may bring the signed ticket to any regional office of the Kansas lottery during the hours that the office is open to the public for business. Upon validation of the claim, and completion of a claim form, payment shall be processed for the claimant.

(3) The claimant may mail the ticket with a completed claim form in any envelope, to any office of the Kansas lottery. Claim forms may be obtained from any lottery retailer or any office of the Kansas lottery. Upon validation of the claim, payment shall be processed for the claimant.

If any evidence of alteration, mutilation, tear, or other ambiguity appear on the ticket, the retailer shall not make direct payment of a prize. The claimant shall submit a claim form with the ticket to the lottery.

(c) The procedure for the payment of a Cash Lotto prize on any single game ticket which totals \$600.00 or more, except for a jackpot prize, shall be as follows:

(1) The claimant may bring the signed ticket to any office of the Kansas lottery during the hours that the office is open to the public for business. Upon validation of the claim and completion of a claim form, payment shall be processed for the claimant.

(2) The claimant may mail the signed ticket with a completed claim form to any office of the Kansas lottery. Claim forms may be obtained from any lottery retailer or any office of the Kansas lottery. Upon validation of the claim, payment shall be processed for the claimant.

(d) The procedure for the payment of a jackpot or prize or for prizes won on the same ticket as a jackpot prize are as follows:

The claimant shall personally submit the signed ticket and a completed claim form to a Kansas regional or state lottery office. Jackpot prizes and prizes won on the same ticket as jackpot prizes shall not be claimed by mail.

(e) All prizes shall be claimed within 365 days of the date of the drawing in which the prize was won. Any prize or prizes not claimed within the time specified shall be forfeited. If a prize is claimed by mail, the ticket and claim form must actually be received by the lottery within the claim period. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710 and 84-8720; effective, T-89-25, May 24, 1988; amended, T-111-10-10-90, Sept. 15, 1990; amended, T-111-7-30-93, July 23, 1993.)

#### Article 9.—INDIVIDUAL PULL-TAB GAME RULES RULES FOR PULL TAB GAMES NO. 10 "CRISS CROSS"

**111-9-55. Name of game.** The Kansas Lottery shall conduct an instant pull-tab game entitled "Criss Cross" commencing on or after July 28, 1993. The specific rules for the "Criss Cross" game are contained in K.A.R. 111-9-55 through 11-9-60. Other applicable rules for the game may be found in K.A.R. 111-8-1 *et seq.* (Au-

thorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-7-30-93, July 23, 1993.)

**111-9-56. Definitions.** The following definitions shall apply to the "Criss Cross" pull-tab lottery game.

(a) "Ticket" means the Kansas Lottery instant pull-tab Game No. 10 "Criss Cross."

(b) "Play symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols or pictures printed on the front and under each tab on the back of each pull-tab ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this pull-tab game, the play symbols consist of pictures of the number "7," bells, clusters of cherries, plums, oranges, watermelons and lemons. All but lemons may be winning symbols. Various combinations of these symbols appear under each of the five tabs on the back of each ticket.

(c) "Carton" means a box of pull-tab tickets containing 2,400 tickets.

(d) "Carton serial number" is the 9-digit number appearing on the front of the ticket.

(e) "Quarter carton" means one-fourth of a carton containing 600 pull-tab tickets. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-7-30-93, July 23, 1993.)

**111-9-57. Determination of instant prize winners.**

Each tab on the back of the ticket is to be pulled open. If two symbols of a bell and one symbol of a "7," a cluster of cherries, a plum, an orange or a watermelon is printed horizontally, vertically, or diagonally under any tabs match any combination of winning symbols shown on the front of the ticket and are connected by a fluorescent red arrow, the player wins the prize(s) which corresponds to the symbols matched. On winning combinations the total amount won will appear under the left side of the tab as a fluorescent red arrow goes through the symbols. The prize amounts are as follows:

2 bells and one "7"	\$100.00
2 bells and one cluster of cherries	\$ 50.00
2 bells and one plum	\$ 25.00
2 bells and one orange	\$ 5.00
2 bells and one watermelon	\$ 1.00

**111-9-58. Number and value of prizes per carton of tickets.** The prize structure for each carton of "Criss Cross" instant pull-tab tickets is as follows:

**111-9-59. Validation requirements.** The following validation requirements shall apply to all winning instant pull-tab tickets:

(a) The three winning symbols which start with two bells must exactly match the winning symbols on the front of the ticket and appear in the same consecutive order horizontally, vertically, or diagonally.

(b) Each of the above winning combinations must be connected by a fluorescent red arrow.

(c) On any winning combination the amount won will appear under the tab immediately to the left of the symbol on the left of the three winning symbols.

(d) The ticket must pass all validation requirements as specified in K.A.R. 111-8-6. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-7-30-93, July 23, 1993.)

**111-9-60. Price.** The retail price of the tickets is \$1.00 per ticket. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710 and 74-8718(a); effective, T-111-7-30-93, July 23, 1993.)

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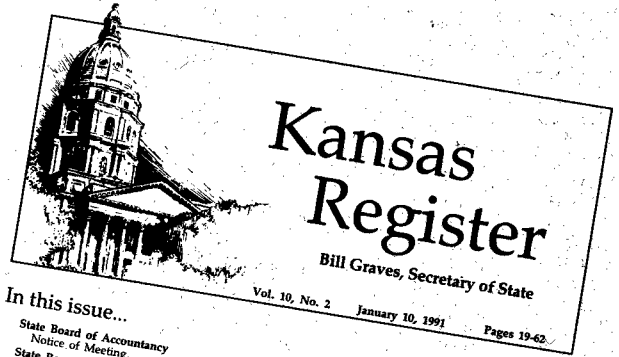
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
