The State Board of Education will conduct two public hearings to consider the draft of the Kansas State Plan for Vocational Education for fiscal years 1995-1996. One will be at 1:30 p.m. Monday, March 7, in the auditorium of the Central Vocational Building, 324 N. Emporia, Wichita. The other hearing will be at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, March 8, in the board room of the Kansas State Education Building, 120 E. 10th, Topeka.

In developing the plan, the state has performed those activities prescribed in Section 114 of the Carl D. Perkins Vocational and Technical Education Act Amendments of 1990. Additionally, the plan provides those assurances called for under the act and sets forth or describes those additional items required under the act. The plan also sets forth the planned use of federal funds available for vocational education and the criteria the State Board of Education will use in approving applications of eligible recipients and allocating funds made available under the act to such recipients.

The Kansas Council on Employment and Training and the Kansas Council on Vocational Education have provided input to the plan. The plan will be submitted to the secretary of the board following adoption by the board and certification of such action by the Kansas Commissioner of Education. The plan is to become effective July 1, 1994.

The existing facility has the capacity for approximately 9,000 swine. Wastewater Control Facilities: Wastewater will be impounded for subsequent application to agricultural land for beneficial use. Wastewater storage capacity is provided in excess of minimum requirements.

Compliance Schedule: A livestock waste management plan for the facility shall be developed. ## Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct

### Advisory Opinion No. 94-1

Written January 19, 1994, to Mike Ahlers, Rehabilitation Manager II, KVRC, Salina.

This opinion is in response to your letter of September 23, 1993, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards and Conduct concerning the state conflict of interests law (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*).

#### Factual Statement

We understand that you request this opinion in your capacity as a Rehabilitation Manager II for the Kansas Vocational Rehabilitation Center (KVRC) in Salina, Kansas. KVRC provides vocational assessment to persons with disabilities from all over Kansas. You are under the Kansas Rehabilitation Services umbrella and funded with matched federal dollars. Your primary customers are KRS counselors. You have, however, also provided services to private vendors and other SRS divisions, such as Employment Preparation Services (KanWork). You are not involved in direct testing or assessment of consumers, although you do a great deal of training for counselors.

Effective October 1, 1993, KVRC has decided that, due to budget and resource constraints, it will no longer provide assessment services to private vendors. This basically translates to workers compensation cases and private rehabilitation counselors. This decision was made after your budget was approved at an "A" level, and KVRC had said that if it were funded at "A" then it would eliminate private referrals. The decision was supported by your administrator and the commissioner.

You state that since you have notified private vendors of the agency's decision, you have been deluged with frustrations, negative comments, and private offers. You see the potential to set up a private office, purchasing an answering machine, test equipment, etc., to operate as a small business in the evenings and on weekends.

You also tell us that the contacts that were originally established did come from your course of work. There are other options for many of the vendors, but they like the work done by you. You acknowledge that your supervisor is opposed to your working with private vendors providing assessment services that supplant KVRC's (no longer available) assessment.

#### Question

Is it permissible under K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* for you to establish the part-time business you have described on off-duty hours when the business contacts were developed in your state position and the business will deal with services formerly offered by the state?

#### Opinion

We have reviewed K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* in its entirety and find only three sections of this act that might apply to your situation.

K.S.A. 46-241 states:

No state officer or employee shall disclose or use confidential information acquired in the course of his or her official duties in order to further his or her own economic interest or those of any other person.

K.S.A. 46-238 states:

No state officer or employee or candidate for state office or associated person shall charge to or accept from a person known to have a special interest a price, fee, compensation or other consideration for the sale or lease of any property or the furnishing of services which is substantially in excess of that which other persons in the same business or profession would charge in the ordinary course of business.

K.S.A. 46-286 states:

(a) No state officer or employee, in the officer's or employee's official capacity, shall participate directly in the licensure, inspection or administration or enforcement of any regulation or in any contract with any outside organization with which the officer or employee holds a position.

(b) This section shall not apply to appointed or elected members of a state board, council or commission, except that no member of such board, council or commission shall participate in any license, inspection or contract on behalf of their state board, council or commission with any outside organization with which such member is associated or the holding of a position as a member of an advisory board, council or commission of an outside organization or of a position of a voluntary or charitable nature if the advisory, voluntary or charitable position is taken without remuneration other than reimbursement or necessary and actual expenses.

From a review of those sections, it is our opinion that it is permissible for you to establish the business you have described, but it is clear that you may not use confidential information acquired in the course of your official duties in the business. The price charged must be reasonable. You may not participate in licensing, regulating, inspecting or making contracts on behalf of the state with the business. Otherwise, we find no additional restrictions in K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*

In closing, we note that you have requested an opinion concerning two other individuals and they will need to seek their own opinions from us. In addition, our opinion is limited to the application of K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.* and does not cover other state or federal laws or administrative agency rules or policies.

### Advisory Opinion No. 94-2

Written January 19, 1994, to Thomas Sim IV, Administrator, Plant Protection and Weed Control Section, Plant Health Division, Department of Agriculture, Topeka.

This opinion is in response to your letter of December 28, 1993, in which you request an opinion from the Kansas Commission on Governmental Standards

and Conduct concerning the state conflict of interest law (K.S.A. 46-215 *et seq.*).

#### Factual Statement

We understand you request this opinion in your capacity as Administrator, Plant Protection and Weed Control Section, Plant Health Division of the Department of Agriculture.

You advise us that in the past the state has paid for the state chief apiary inspector to attend the annual meeting of the Apiary Inspectors of America (AIA). This year the meeting will be held in Ohio. Department funding for the trip was cut in the last budget.

The state chief apiary inspector has regularly attended AIA meetings in the past. Attendance at this meeting allows the state apiary inspection program to obtain the latest scientific and regulatory information regarding apiary science. Much of the meeting is technical in nature. The state apiary inspection program is the sole source of apiary technical and educational information in Kansas. In addition, the current chief inspector for Kansas is currently serving as AIA treasurer and a member of the AIA executive committee.

You also advise us that the Kansas Honey Producers Association has offered to fund a portion of the out-of-state trip for the chief inspector.

#### Question

You ask whether the Kansas Honey Producers Association may provide partial funding for the chief inspector's trip to the AIA annual meeting?

#### Opinion

Two sections of the act may apply to your question. K.S.A. 46-237(a) states:

No state officer or employee or candidate for state office shall accept, or agree to accept any economic opportunity, gift, loan, gratuity, special discount, favor, hospitality, or service having an aggregate value of \$40 or more in any calendar year from any one person known to have a special interest, under circumstances where such person knows or should know that a major purpose of the donor is to influence such person in the performance of their official duties or prospective official duties.

K.S.A. 46-237(c) states:

No person licensed, inspected or regulated by a state agency shall offer, pay, give or make any economic opportunity, gift, loan, gratuity, special discount, favor, hospitality, or service having an aggregate value of \$40 or more in any calendar year to such agency or any state officer or employee of that agency.

Since the Kansas Honey Producers Association itself is not licensed, inspected or regulated by the state agency, the prohibitions in K.S.A. 46-237(c) do not apply here. Please note a different outcome would be reached if individual members of the association who are licensed, inspected or regulated were to offer to pay for the trip.

The question then turns to the application of K.S.A. 46-237(a). In K.A.R. 19-40-3a (b)(2)(a) "gift" was de-

finied to exclude, "goods or services which are provided to a state agency which does not license, inspect nor regulate the giver and are used to benefit the state as a whole." In this case, where the state agency would have paid for the trip and the trip serves as a valid state interest, it is our opinion that the state official is not receiving a gift but rather the state is and it benefits the state as a whole. Thus, the donation described does not violate K.S.A. 46-237(a).

#### Authority, Purpose and Security

The bonds are being issued pursuant to K.S.A. 12-1736 et seq. for the purpose of paying the cost of certain municipal community building-library (public building) improvements. The bonds and the interest thereon will constitute general obligations of the city, payable from ad valorem taxes which may be levied without limitation as to rate or amount upon all the taxable, tangible property, real and personal, within the territorial limits of the city. Bidders are further advised of other funds which will be used to pay said principal and interest.

#### Additional Security

The city has entered into a written and binding agreement with the Srader Foundation by which said foundation will annually donate and transfer to the

city a portion of the funds said foundation receives from the Milton A. Srader Charitable Remainder Unitrust, the annual contributions from said foundation under said agreement shall be an amount equal to at least \$30,000 of the amount paid to the Srader Foundation under the Milton A. Srader Charitable Remainder Unitrust. Upon the termination of the Milton A. Srader Charitable Remainder Unitrust and the implementation of the Milton A. Srader Charitable Trust, the annual amount shall be greater of \$30,000 or 75 percent of the amount paid to the Srader Foundation under "The Milton A. Srader Charitable Trust," and which contributions shall be used by the city to pay part of the annual debt service requirements of said bonds. The Milton A. Srader Charitable Trust is a perpetual trust and the contributions therefrom will be made to the city for as long as any of said bonds are outstanding. In the highly unlikely event that for whatever reason the contributions from said Milton A. Srader Charitable Trust or the Milton A. Srader Charitable Remainder Unitrust shall be less than those anticipated, the city is obligated pursuant to K.S.A. 10-113 to annually levy a tax upon all of the taxable tangible property within the city to pay the debt service requirements of the next installment of principal and interest on said bonds. If a bid is accepted, said check or the proceeds thereof will be held by the city until the bidder has complied with all of the terms and conditions of this notice. If a bid is accepted but the city fails to deliver the bonds to the bidder in accordance with the terms and conditions of this notice, said check or the proceeds thereof will be returned to the bidder. If a bid is accepted but the bidder defaults in the performance of any of the terms and conditions of this notice, the proceeds of such check will be retained by the city as and for liquidated damages. No interest will be paid upon the successful bidder's good faith check.

#### Basis of Award

The award of the bonds will be made on the basis of the lowest net interest cost to the city, which will be determined by subtracting the amount of the premium bid, if any, from the total interest cost to the

city. If there is any discrepancy between the net interest cost and the average annual net interest rate specified, the specified net interest cost shall govern and the interest rates specified in the bid shall be adjusted accordingly. If two or more proper bids providing for identical amounts for the lowest net interest cost are received, the city council will determine which bid, if any, will be accepted, and its determination is final. The city reserves the right to reject any and all bids and to waive any irregularities in a submitted bid. Any bid received after 7 p.m. on the date of sale will be returned to the bidder unopened.

#### Bid Forms

All bids must be made on forms which may be procured from the city clerk or from bond counsel. No additions or alterations in such forms shall be made and any erasures may cause rejection of any bid.

#### Submission of Bids

Bids must be submitted in sealed envelopes addressed to the undersigned city clerk of the city of Smith Center and marked "Proposal for General Obligation Public Building Bonds." Bids may be submitted by mail or delivered in person to the undersigned at the city's office in the city hall and must be received by the undersigned prior to 7 p.m. C.S.T. on February 14, 1994.

#### CUSIP Numbers

It is anticipated that CUSIP identification numbers will be printed on or assigned to the bonds, but neither the failure to print such number on or assign such number to any bond nor any error with respect thereto will constitute cause for failure or refusal by the purchaser thereof to accept delivery of and pay for the bonds in accordance with the terms of the purchase contract. All expenses in relation to the assignment and printing of CUSIP numbers on the bonds will be paid by the city. The successful bidder shall make the application for said CUSIP numbers.

#### Delivery and Payment

The city will pay for printing the bonds and will deliver the same properly prepared, executed and registered without cost to the successful bidder on or before March 28, 1994, at such bank or trust company in the state of Kansas or Kansas City, Missouri, as may be specified by the successful bidder. Delivery elsewhere will be made at the expense of the successful bidder. The successful bidder will be furnished with a certified transcript of the proceedings evidencing the authorization and issuance of the bonds and the usual closing documents, including a certificate that there is no litigation pending or threatened at the time of delivery of the bonds affecting their validity.

Payment for the bonds shall be made in Federal Reserve funds, immediately subject to use by the city. The denominations of the bonds and the names, addresses and social security or taxpayer identification numbers of the registered owners shall be submitted in writing by the successful bidder to the city and bond registrar not later than 10 a.m. C.S.T. on March 8, 1994. In the absence of such information, the city will



deliver bonds in the denomination of each maturity registered in the name of the successful bidder.

The successful bidder shall furnish the city by 10 a.m. C.S.T. on March 11, 1994, a certificate acceptable to the city's bond counsel to the effect that (i) the successful bidder has made a bona fide public offering of the bonds at the initial reoffering prices (if the bidder intends to offer the bonds to the public); and (ii) a substantial amount of the bonds was sold to the public (excluding brokers and other intermediaries) at such initial reoffering prices. Such certificate shall state that (1) it is made on the best knowledge, information and belief of the successful bidder, and (2) 10 percent or more in par amount of the bonds of each maturity was sold to the public at or below the initial reoffering prices (such amount being sufficient to establish the sale of a "substantial amount" of the bonds).

**Official Statement**

The city has prepared an informational statement dated February 1, 1994, copies of which may be obtained from the city clerk or from bond counsel. Upon the sale of the bonds, the city will furnish the successful bidder with a reasonable number of copies thereof without additional cost upon request. Additional copies may be ordered at the successful bidder's expense.

**Assessed Valuation and Indebtedness**

The total assessed valuation of the taxable, tangible property within the city, for the year 1994, is as follows:

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The total general obligation bonded indebtedness of the city as of the date of the bonds, including the bonds being sold, is \$1,205. The city currently has no outstanding temporary notes.

**Approval of Bonds**

The bonds will be sold subject to the legal opinion of Fred W. Rausch, Jr., Topeka, Kansas, bond counsel, whose approving legal opinion as to the validity of the bonds will be furnished and paid for by the city, printed on the bonds and delivered to the successful bidder as and when the bonds are delivered.

**Opinion of Bond Counsel and Internal Revenue Code of 1986 as Amended**

The Internal Revenue Code of 1986 as amended imposes requirements on the city that must be met subsequent to the issuance of the bonds by the city and, as a result, the city will and does hereby covenant that it will diligently undertake those steps necessary to maintain the tax-exempt status of the bonds. The city's failure to comply with such requirements could adversely affect the tax-exempt status of the bonds. Purchasers of the bonds should be aware that should the bonds lose their status as tax-exempt obligations as a result of the city's failure to comply with such requirements, the bonds are neither callable nor will the rate of interest on the bonds be adjusted to reflect such circumstances.

The code includes interest on tax-exempt obligations, such as the bonds, in the adjusted current earnings of certain corporations.

With the exception of certain "qualified tax-exempt obligations," the code provides that banks and thrift institutions may not deduct any portion of the interest cost of purchasing or carrying tax-exempt obligations such as the bonds if such interest cost is incurred in taxable years ending after December 31, 1986, with respect to obligations acquired after August 7, 1986. The city does intend to designate the bonds as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" under Section 265 of the code.

Bond counsel expresses no opinion regarding other federal tax consequences arising with respect to the bonds.

The bonds are exempt from intangible personal property taxes levied by Kansas counties, cities or townships. Interest on the bonds is excluded from the computation of Kansas adjusted gross income for taxable years commencing after December 31, 1987.

**Bonds Not to be Rated**

The bonds will not be rated by Standard & Poor's Corporation or Moody's Investors Service, Inc., or by any other bond rating service.

RULES FOR INSTANT GAME NO. 68  
"BEAT THE DEALER"

**111-4-543. Name of game.** The Kansas Lottery shall conduct an instant winner lottery game entitled "Beat the Dealer" commencing on or after February 14, 1994. The specific rules for the "Beat the Dealer" game are contained in K.A.R. 111-3-1 *et seq.* and 111-4-543 through 111-4-546. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-1-25-94, Jan. 21, 1994.)

**111-4-544. Definitions.** The following definitions shall apply to the "Beat the Dealer" instant lottery game:

(a) "Game symbols" are the numbers, letters, symbols, or pictures printed in the play area of each instant game ticket and which determine if the ticket bearer is entitled to a prize. In this instant game, the game symbols are printed in black ink in "WGI Symbol Font 10" with matching captions in "WGI Cap Font." A game symbol appears in each of six play spots within the play area. Each game symbol for this instant game is one of the following: \$1.<sup>00</sup> - \$5.<sup>00</sup> - 10.<sup>00</sup> - \$100\$ - \$500\$ - 12 - 13 - 14 - 15 - 16 - 17 - 19 - 20 - 21.

(b) "Game symbol captions" are the words or portions of words printed beneath each game symbol in the play area and are used to repeat or explain the game symbol. The game symbol caption associated with each game symbol is as follows:

(c) "Ticket validation number" means a unique number appearing on each ticket which is used to validate winning tickets. For this instant game, the ticket validation number is a 10-digit number which appears on the front of each instant ticket and will be covered by latex.

(d) "Book-ticket number" means the unique number appearing on each ticket which includes the number of the book from which it was removed and the serially assigned number of the ticket within that book. For this instant game, the book-ticket number is an 8-digit book number followed by a dash and then a 3-digit ticket number. The ticket numbers in each book start with 000 and end with 299. The book-ticket number is printed in black ink on the bottom portion of the front of each instant game ticket.

(e) "Retailer validation code" means the small letters found under removable covering in the play area of each instant game ticket. The retailer uses this code to verify and validate winners which are to be paid by the retailer. In this instant game, the retailer vali-

date code is a two letter code printed and appearing in two of five varying locations among the game symbols. The codes and their meanings are as follows: CC = \$1.00; DD = \$2.00; EE = \$3.00; KK = \$5.00; BB = \$10.00; GG = \$15.00. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 74-8710; effective, T-111-1-25-94, Jan. 21, 1994.)

**111-4-545. Determination of instant prize winners.** An instant prize winner is determined in this "beat the dealer" instant game when the player "scratches off" the removable layer of material covering the play area to reveal the four separate games, entitle "GAME 1," "GAME 2," "GAME 3," and "GAME 4," and "DEALER'S" representing the dealers hand. Under each game is a game symbol number and under each number a game symbol dollar amount appears. Under "DEALER'S" a game symbol number appears. If a player's game symbol number is higher than the "DEALER'S" for any game the player wins the amount shown immediately below that game. (Authorized by K.S.A. 74-8710(b), (c) & (i); implementing K.S.A. 74-8710(b), (c) & (i) and 74-8720(b) & (d); effective, T-111-1-25-94, Jan. 21, 1994.)

**111-4-546. Number and value of instant prizes.** (a) There will be approximately 2,400,000 tickets ordered for this instant game. The expected number and value of the instant prizes are as follows:

(d) "National ambient air quality standard," "national primary ambient air quality standard" and "national secondary ambient air quality standard" mean those standards promulgated at 40 CFR Part 50, as in effect on July 1, 1989, which are adopted by reference.

(e) "Temporary" means, in relation to the emissions from a source, that the emissions will not occur at a particular location for a period of more than two years unless a longer time is approved by the secretary or an authorized representative of the secretary.

(f) "State" means the state of Kansas. Sources affecting federal class I areas.** (a) If the emissions from any proposed major stationary source or major modification subject to K.A.R. 28-19-17 through K.A.R. 28-19-17q will affect any federal class I area, a copy of the permit application for the source or modification shall be immediately transmitted by the secretary or an authorized representative of

the secretary to the administrator of the U.S. environmental protection agency. The administrator shall also be notified of every action taken relative to consideration of this application.

(b) For purposes of issuing and enforcing the permit, 40 CFR 52.21(p), as in effect on June 3, 1993, is adopted by reference. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-3005, as amended by L. 1993, Ch. 13, Sec. 3; implementing K.S.A. 65-3008, as amended by L. 1993, Ch. 13, Sec. 5; 65-3010; effective June 8, 1992; amended March 21, 1994.)

Article 29.—SOLID WASTE  
MANAGEMENT

**28-29-6a. Public notice of permit actions, public comment period, and public hearings.** (a) Public notice and comment period.

(1) Scope and timing. A public notice shall be given by the department when a municipal solid waste land-fill permit action has been proposed under K.A.R. 28-29-6 or when a public hearing has been scheduled pursuant to subsection (b) of this regulation.

(A) Public notice shall be required for a draft permit or any proposed significant modifications to a permit by the department.

(B) Public notice shall be required for any public hearing on a permit action.

(C) A public notice shall not be required when suspension, denial or revocation, or non-significant modification of a permit is proposed by the department.

(D) A public notice may describe more than one permit action or hearing.

(E) Each public notice shall be published not less than 30 days prior to the hearing or proposed action.

(2) Procedures.

(A) Each public notice shall be published in the Kansas register.

(B) Where a proposed action or hearing may generate significant local interest, a public notice shall also be published in a newspaper having major circulation in the vicinity of the proposed action or hearing.

(3) Contents of public notice. Each public notice issued under this regulation shall contain the following information:

(A) The name and address of the office processing the permit action for which notice is being given;

(B) the name and location of the facility for which the permit action is proposed;

(C) a map of the facility for which the permit action is proposed;

(D) a brief description of the activity to be conducted at the facility for which the permit action is proposed;

(E) the name, address, and telephone number of the person from whom interested persons may obtain or review additional information;

(F) the time and place of any hearing that will be held; and

(continued)

(G) a brief description of the comment procedures outlined in subsections (b) and (c) of this regulation.

(b) Public comments. During the public comment period provided in subsection (a) of this regulation, any interested person may submit written comments. All comments, except those concerning determinations by local government units that the proposed permit action conforms with the official plan, shall become a part of the permit record and shall be considered in making a final decision on the proposed permit action.

(c) Public hearings. If the department determines there is sufficient local interest in a proposed permit action, a public hearing may be scheduled. All written and verbal comments received during a public hearing provided in subsection (a) of this regulation shall become a part of the permit record and be considered in making a final decision on the proposed permit action.

(d) Response to comments. A response to comments shall be issued at the time any final permit decision is issued. The response shall be available to the public and shall:

(1) Specify what, if any, changes were made to the proposed action as a result of public comment; and

(2) briefly respond to any significant comments received during the public comment period. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-3406; amended by L. 1993, Ch. 274, Sec. 2; implementing K.S.A. 65-3401; effective March 21, 1994.)

#### Article 46.—UNDERGROUND INJECTION CONTROL REGULATIONS

**28-46-1. General provisions.** (a) Any reference in these rules and regulations to standards, procedures, or requirements of 40 CFR Parts 124, 136, 144, 145, 146 or 261, shall constitute a full adoption by reference of the part, subpart and paragraph so referenced, including any notes, charts and appendices, unless otherwise specifically stated in these rules and regulations. The materials referenced are available at the Kansas department of health and environment, Topeka, Kansas.

(b) When used in any provision adopted from 40 CFR Parts 124, 136, 144, 145, 146 or 261, references to "the United States" shall mean the state of Kansas, "environmental protection agency" shall mean the Kansas department of health and environment, and "administrator," "regional administrator," or "director" shall mean the secretary of the department of health and environment.

(c) When existing Kansas statutory and regulatory authority is more stringent than the regulations adopted in subsection (a), the Kansas requirements shall prevail. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-171d; effective May 1, 1982; amended, T-86-47, Dec. 19, 1985; amended May 1, 1986; amended March 21, 1994.)

**28-46-2. Definitions.** (a) 40 CFR 124.2; 40 CFR 144.3, 40 CFR 144.61, 40 CFR 146.3, and 40 CFR 146.61(b), as in effect on April 1, 1993, are adopted by reference.

(b) "Cone of impression" means the mound in the potentiometric surface of the receiving formation in the vicinity of the injection well.

(c) "Cone of influence" means that area around the well within which increased injection pressures caused by injection into the well would be sufficient to drive fluids into an underground source of drinking water (USDW).

(d) "Fracture pressure" means that wellhead pressure which may cause vertical or horizontal fracturing of rock along a well bore.

(e) "Injection well" means a well into which fluids are being injected.

(f) "Injection well facility" means all land, structures, appurtenances or improvements on which one or more injection wells are located, and that are within the same well field or project.

(g) "Major facility" means, in lieu of the definition in 40 CFR 124.2 and 144.3, a facility capable of producing hazardous waste identified or listed by the secretary under K.A.R. 28-31-3.

(h) "Major permit" means a permit for the underground injection of wastes produced by or stored on a major facility.

(i) "Maximum allowable injection pressure" means the maximum wellhead pressure not to be exceeded as a permit condition, as opposed to fracture pressure.

(j) "Secretary" means the secretary of the Kansas department of health and environment or duly authorized designee. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-171d; effective May 1, 1982; amended, T-83-49, Dec. 22, 1982; amended May 1, 1983; amended, T-86-47, Dec. 19, 1985; amended May 1, 1986; amended March 21, 1994.)

**28-46-3. Classification of injection wells.** 40 CFR 144.6 and 40 CFR 146.5, as in effect on April 1, 1993, are adopted by reference. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-171d; effective May 1, 1982; amended, T-83-49, Dec. 22, 1982; amended May 1, 1983; amended, T-86-47, Dec. 19, 1985; amended May 1, 1986; amended March 21, 1994.)

**28-46-5. Application for injection well permits.** 40 CFR 124.3 and 40 CFR 144.31, as in effect on April 1, 1993, are adopted by reference. In addition, the provisions of K.S.A. 65-3437, which relate to hazardous waste injection wells shall be applicable to class I hazardous waste injection wells. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-171d; effective May 1, 1982; amended, T-83-49, Dec. 22, 1982; amended May 1, 1983; amended, T-86-47, Dec. 19, 1985; amended May 1, 1986; amended March 21, 1994.)

**28-46-6. Conditions applicable to all permits.** 40 CFR 144.51(a) through (p), as in effect on April 1, 1993, are adopted by reference. (b) Class III permits shall be issued for a period up to the operating life of the facility.

(c) Each permit shall be reviewed at least once every five years to determine whether it should be modified, revoked and reissued, or terminated, with the exception of permits for class I hazardous waste injection wells which shall be reviewed at least annually to determine whether they should be modified, revoked and reissued, or terminated.

(d) Modification of permits shall not include extension of the maximum duration specified in subsection (a). At the end of the permit term, application shall be filed for a new permit. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-171d; effective May 1, 1982; amended, T-86-47, Dec. 19, 1985; amended May 1, 1986; amended May 1, 1987; amended March 21, 1994.)

**28-46-11. Schedules of compliance.** 40 CFR 144.53, as in effect on April 1, 1993, is adopted by reference. **28-46-24. Requirements for wells injecting hazardous wastes.** 40 CFR 144.14, as in effect on April 1, 1993, is adopted by reference. In addition to 40 CFR 144.14, the following requirements shall be applicable to class I hazardous waste injection wells.

(a) Liability coverage and long-term assurances. Insurance requirements, closure and post-closure requirements, and financial requirements shall be met by compliance with K.A.R. 28-31-8(a). Higher amounts for insurance, bonds or their equivalent may be required by the secretary.

(b) Injection fluids received from multiple generators. Hazardous waste injection wells shall be subject to the requirements in K.A.R. 28-31-8(d).

(c) Disclosure statement. Each applicant shall be subject to the requirements in K.A.R. 28-31-9(c).

(d) Monitoring fees. The monitoring fee schedule shall be as specified in K.A.R. 28-31-10(c).

(e) Pretreatment requirements. Prior to hazardous waste injection, the fluids shall meet minimum pretreatment requirements that are set by the secretary. To the extent feasible, pretreatment shall render the injected fluid compatible with the injection well tubing and casing and with the disposal formation. In setting minimum pretreatment requirements, the secretary shall consider values 100 times greater than the applicable drinking water standards and values 100 times greater than the applicable  $10^{-5}$  cancer risk levels, or other values necessary to prevent contamination of underground drinking water supplies, to protect the public health, and to take into account environmental considerations. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-171d; effective May 1, 1982; amended, T-83-49, Dec. 22, 1982; amended May 1, 1983; amended, T-86-47, Dec. 19, 1985; amended May 1, 1986; amended March 21, 1994.)

**28-46-26. Authorization to continue to inject into class V wells.** A class V injection well shall be authorized to operate until regulations concerning that class of injection wells are adopted provided the requirements of 40 CFR 144.12, as in effect on April 1, 1993, are satisfied. **28-46-28. Establishing maximum injection pressure.** (a) A maximum allowable injection pressure for each injection well shall be established by the secretary as a permit condition.

(b)(1) All class I wells operating on other than gravity flow shall be prohibited.

(2) In the case of gravity flow, the positive wellhead pressure for a class I well shall not exceed 35 pounds per square inch gauge.

(c) For all wells, the maximum operating pressure shall not be allowed to exceed fracture pressure, except during the development of fractures for well stimulation operations, or during the development of solution-mined wells as defined in K.A.R. 28-43-2(c). (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-171d; effective May 1, 1982; amended, T-86-47, Dec. 19, 1985; amended May 1, 1986; amended March 21, 1994.)

**28-46-29. Construction requirements.** 40 CFR 146.12 and 40 CFR 146.65, governing class I wells; and 40 CFR 146.32, governing class III wells, as in effect on April 1, 1993, are adopted by reference. **28-46-30. Operating, monitoring and reporting requirements.** 40 CFR 146.13, 40 CFR 146.67, 40 CFR 146.68 and 40 CFR 146.69, regulating class I wells and 40 CFR 146.33, regulating class III wells, as in effect on April 1, 1993, are adopted by reference. In addition to 40 CFR 144.14 and CFR 146.70, the following requirements are applicable to each class I hazardous waste injection well. (a) Records of the continuously monitored parameters shall be maintained in addition to the monthly average, minimum and maximum values of the following parameters:

- (1) injection pressure;
- (2) flow rate;
- (3) injection volume; and
- (4) annular pressure.

(b) Monitoring results shall be reported to the department on a monthly basis.

(c) The necessary number of monitoring wells in appropriate geologic zones for early detection of contaminant migration shall be determined by the secretary. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-171d; effective May 1, 1982; amended, T-83-49, Dec. 22, 1982; amended May 1, 1983; amended, T-86-47, Dec. 19, 1985; amended May 1, 1986; amended March 21, 1994.)

**28-46-31. Information to be considered by the secretary.** 40 CFR 146.14, 40 CFR 146.62, 40 CFR 146.66, 40 CFR 146.70 and 40 CFR Part 144 Subpart F, for class I wells and 40 CFR 146.34, for class III wells, as in effect on April 1, 1993, are adopted by reference. In addition to 40 CFR 146.14, 40 CFR 146.62, 40 CFR 146.66, 40 CFR 146.70 and 40 CFR Part 144 Subpart F, the following shall be applicable to class I hazardous waste injection wells:

(a) The provisions of K.S.A. 65-3439, as it relates to hazardous waste injection wells shall be applicable to class I hazardous waste injection wells.

(b) Each applicant shall be responsible for providing all available information necessary for the secretary to determine that well injection of the hazardous waste

liquid in question is the most reasonable method of disposal after all other options have been considered.

(1) Factors to be considered in determining the most reasonable method shall include those set forth in K.S.A. 65-3439(d).

(2) All factors considered shall be documented in a detailed report in the format required by the secretary.

(c) The location of each abandoned oil and gas well and exploratory hole within the area of review shall be determined through a detailed record search and field survey.

(1) An interview with those responsible for drilling, producing, plugging, or witnessing the activities shall be a part of the record.

(2) The results of the survey shall be documented in a report in the format required by the secretary.

(3) A map geographically documenting the location of all the holes and abandoned wells within the area of review shall be included as a part of the report. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-171d; effective May 1, 1982; amended, T-83-49, Dec. 22, 1982; amended May 1, 1983; amended, T-86-47, Dec. 19, 1985; amended May 1, 1986; amended March 21, 1994.)

**28-46-32. Area of review.** (a) The area of review for each class I hazardous waste injection well shall be no less than 2½ miles or shall extend to the limits of the calculated cone of influence, whichever is greater.

(b) The area of review for each class I non-hazardous waste injection well shall be no less than one mile or shall extend to the limits of the calculated cone of influence, whichever is greater.

(c) The area of review for each class III injection well shall be no less than ¼ mile.

(d) The area of review for each class V injection well shall be no less than ¼ mile. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-171d; effective May 1, 1982; amended, T-86-47, Dec. 19, 1985; amended May 1, 1986; amended May 1, 1987; amended March 21, 1994.)

**28-46-33. Mechanical integrity testing.** (a) A mechanical integrity test consisting of a pressure test with a liquid to evaluate the absence of a significant leak in the casing, tubing or packer and a test to determine the absence of significant fluid movement through vertical channels adjacent to the wellbore shall be required of each class I and class III permittee on each injection well at least once every five years.

(1) For class I hazardous waste injection wells, the mechanical integrity shall be demonstrated by the permittee by:

(A) conducting a pressure test with a liquid of the casing, tubing and packer at least annually and whenever there has been a well workover;

(B) conducting a test of the bottom-hole cement by use of an approved radioactive survey at least annually;

(C) conducting a temperature, noise or oxygen activation log to test for movement of fluid along the borehole at least once every five years; and

(D) conducting a casing inspection log at least once every five years.

(2) The test for class I non-hazardous waste injection wells shall be conducted in accordance with 40 CFR 146.8, as in effect on April 1, 1993.

(3) The test for class III injection wells shall be conducted in accordance with 40 CFR 146.8, as in effect on April 1, 1993, except the casing shall be pressure tested by the use of a mechanical packer or retrievable plug; and the test for class I hazardous waste injection wells shall be conducted in accordance with 40 CFR 146.8 and 40 CFR 146.68(d) as in effect on April 1, 1993.

(b) The permittee shall be notified at least 30 days in advance by the secretary that a mechanical integrity test must be performed, or a permittee may notify the secretary that a voluntary mechanical integrity test will be performed at least 14 days in advance of the test.

(c) The permittee shall be required to cease injection operations immediately and to conduct a mechanical integrity test approved by the secretary if the secretary believes that, due to an apparent problem, the continued use of an injection well constitutes a threat to human health or to waters of the state. Injection operations shall not be resumed until:

(1) the test has been conducted;

(2) it has been demonstrated to the satisfaction of the secretary that the well has mechanical integrity; and

(3) authorization to use the well has been given by the secretary.

(d) A qualified state inspector shall be provided by the secretary to witness all of the pressure mechanical integrity tests performed.

(e) The permittee shall submit results of all mechanical integrity tests to the secretary, in writing, within 30 days after the test has been conducted.

(f) 40 CFR 144.51(p), as in effect on April 1, 1993, is adopted by reference. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-171d; effective May 1, 1982; amended, T-83-49, Dec. 22, 1982; amended May 1, 1983; amended, T-86-47, Dec. 19, 1985; amended May 1, 1986; amended March 21, 1994.)

**28-46-43. **28-46-44. Sampling and analysis techniques.** (a) Sampling and analysis shall be performed in accordance with the techniques prescribed in 40 CFR part 136, as in effect on April 1, 1993, which is adopted by reference.

(b) Where 40 CFR part 136 does not contain sampling and analytical techniques for the parameter in question, or where it is determined by the secretary that the part 136 sampling and analytical techniques are inappropriate for the parameter in question, sampling and analysis shall be performed using validated analytical methods or other appropriate sampling and analytical procedures approved by the secretary.

(c) Alternate sampling and analytical techniques suggested by the permittee or other persons will be considered by the secretary. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 65-171d; effective March 21, 1994.)

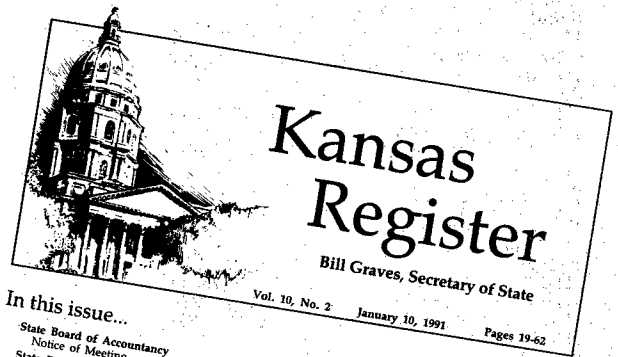
