Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 9 a.m. Thursday, March 17, in the Kansas State Historical Society Auditorium, 120 W. 10th, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in four existing rules and regulations and the adoption of six new regulations of the Division of Water Resources.

This 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Chief Engineer, Division of Water Resources, Kansas State Board of Agriculture, 901 S. Kansas Ave., 2nd Floor, Topeka 66612-1283. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

These new and amended regulations are proposed for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of proposed regulations and their economic impact follows:

**5-1-1. Definitions.** This regulation amends the definition of "battery of wells," "household purposes," "industrial use," "irrigation use," "municipal

use" and "stockwatering use." Definitions of "primary well," "safe-yield," "standby well," "term permit" and "water use correspondent" have been added. This regulation is not expected to result in a significant fiscal impact to governmental entities or to water users.

**5-1-2. Standby well.** This new regulation sets standards for a "standby well." This regulation is not expected to result in a significant fiscal impact to governmental entities or to water users.

**5-3-4a. Hearing prior to approval of application.** The amendment to this regulation primarily deleted a reference to a hearing procedure that was changed by statute. The amendment slightly broadens criteria for hearings on a new application to appropriate water. This regulation is not expected to result in a significant fiscal impact to governmental entities or to water users.

**5-3-5e. Meters and other measuring devices.** This new regulation requires that whenever a flow meter has been required, the owner report the beginning and ending meter readings on the annual water user report. It further requires meters to be maintained properly and allows the chief engineer to require the owner to pay the expense of testing the meter for accuracy no more than once in any one calendar year. The owner will also be required to notify the chief engineer whenever a meter is replaced. The option of the chief engineer requiring the owner to test the accuracy of the meter on a periodic basis will have the effect of allowing additional spot testing of meter accuracy to be done. It is estimated that each meter test paid for by the owner will cost approximately \$85 to \$225, depending on what type of test is necessary to check the accuracy of a meter in a particular installation.

**5-4-4. Well spacing.** This new regulation sets well spacing requirements for all areas that were previously not set by regulation or intensive groundwater use control area orders. This regulation currently implements existing policy except for the lower cretaceous aquifer. In the confined lower cretaceous aquifer, the proposed spacing between wells will be four miles unless the applicant can demonstrate to the satisfaction of the chief engineer that a lesser spacing will be adequate to prevent impairment. This regulation is not expected to result in a significant fiscal impact to governmental entities or to water users, unless it causes water users' applications to be denied or modified. Engineering work to justify a closer well spacing could be a significant cost to the applicant.

**5-7-1. Due and sufficient cause for non-use.** This regulation is being amended to add additional circumstances which shall be considered due and sufficient cause under the abandonment statute, K.S.A. 82a-718. The additional circumstances added include enrollment in certain multi-year federal or state conservation programs; enrollment in the water right conservation program; placement of the point of diversion in a standby status; physical problems with the point of diversion, distribution system, place of use or the operator; and conditions beyond the control of the owner which prevent access to the authorized place of use or point of

diversion as long as the owner is taking reasonable affirmative action to gain access and use of an alternate source of supply. The regulation also clarifies that once a verified report of the chief engineer is made a matter of record at an abandonment hearing which establishes non-use of a water right for three or more successive years, the water right owner shall have the burden of showing that there have not been three or more successive years of non-use without due and sufficient cause. This regulation is not expected to result in a significant fiscal impact to governmental entities or to water users. The number of abandonment hearings might be decreased because of the additional reasons constituting due and sufficient cause.

**5-7-3. Hearing.** The hearing procedure for abandonment hearings was revoked because the act has been placed under the Kansas Administrative Procedures Act by statute. This regulation is not expected to result in a significant fiscal impact to governmental entities or to water users.

**5-7-4. Water rights conservation program.** This new regulation sets forth the procedure for enrollment in the Water Rights Conservation Program. Successful enrollment in the plan for a period of five to ten years shall guarantee that as long as the contract is not broken, all of the years for which a water right is duly enrolled in the Water Rights Conservation Program shall constitute due and sufficient cause in any abandonment proceeding. This regulation will allow water right owners who wish to conserve water in areas of the state that are closed to new appropriation, or in other areas where the chief engineer deems it to be in the public interest, to sign up their water rights in the program, to not use those water rights for the period of enrollment, and to be guaranteed the water rights will not be lost for abandonment during that period. This regulation is not expected to result in a significant fiscal impact to governmental entities. Water users who enroll in the program will see significant savings in costs of operation and possible hearing costs.

**5-11-1 and 5-11-2. Definitions, determination of significant benefits in an assurance district.** These regulations set forth a procedure whereby an assurance district member who is no longer receiving significant benefits from the district may be removed as a member. These regulations are not expected to result in a significant fiscal impact to governmental entities. A water user which is removed from a district will be relieved of the financial obligation incurred as a result of membership.

**Public Health—Controlled Substances; Forfeitures; Procedure—Forfeitures of Property Under K.S.A. 65-4135 or 65-4156; State Special Asset Forfeiture Fund; Authorized Expenditures; Use for Matching Funds.** Brent Bengtson, Director, Governor's Office of Drug Abuse Programs, Topeka, January 20, 1994.

Money in local special law enforcement trust funds or the state special asset forfeiture fund may be used to provide matching funds to obtain federal grants for law enforcement purposes, as long as such use does not replace or reduce amounts previously budgeted or appropriated by the local or state government for that purpose. ## Opinion No. 94-7

**Cities and Municipalities—Code for Municipal Courts; Proceedings After Arrest and Prior to Trial—Municipal Diversion Agreements.**

**Public Records, Documents and Information—Records Open to Public—Provisions of Diversion Agreements.** Robert J. Watson, Overland Park City Attorney, Overland Park, January 27, 1994.

The Kansas open records act (KORA) declares that public records are generally open to the public unless mandatorily or permissibly closed by law. A diversion agreement entered into by the city prosecutor and a first-time DUI offender is a public record for purposes of the KORA. There is no express language in the municipal diversion statutes to make the terms of diversion agreements confidential. Further, there is no exception applicable to DUI diversion agreements under K.S.A. 1992 Supp. 45-221. The DUI diversion agreements are not criminal history record information, which generally is closed to the public, according to the definition in K.S.A. 1992 Supp. 22-4701. Therefore, DUI diversion agreements maintained by public agencies are public records which must be disclosed upon request. **Taxation—Property Valuation, Equalizing Assessments, Appraisers and Assessment of Property—Contracts for Assistance in Collecting Taxes.** Senator Alfred Ramirez, 5th District, Bonner Springs; Senator Carolyn Tillotson, 3rd District, Leavenworth; Representative Clyde D. Graeber, 41st District, Leavenworth; Representative L. Candy Ruff, 40th District, Leavenworth; Representative Kenny A. Wilk, 42nd District, Lansing, January 27, 1994.

Counties are authorized under K.S.A. 19-425 to hire experts to assist in the proper assessment of personal property. Contracts for such purposes are not void as against public policy even if there is no stated cap on the amount of contingency fees to be paid for such services. A county may agree to base the fee for such services on the amount of tax revenues collected without the acquiescence of other taxing subdivisions interested in the taxes. A county may request issuance of subpoenas for records or documents reasonably believed to be useful in identifying and determining the value of property located within the county. A county has no authority, however, to forgive any penalties imposed pursuant to K.S.A. 1993 Supp. 79-1427a. **Criminal Procedure—Criminal History Record Information—Restrictions on Dissemination of Criminal History Record Information; Penalties; Waiver. Representative Jim D. Garner, 11th District, Coffeyville, January 27, 1994.**

Generally, criminal history record information is not open to the public and disclosure is restricted by statute. However, persons may request conviction records on individuals from a criminal justice agency, and the agency may discretionarily disclose the requested records. This 30-day notice period prior to the hearing constitutes a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations.

All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the chairman of the commission, Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks, Suite 502, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity at the hearing to express their views orally in regard to the adoption of the proposed regulations. During the hearing, all written and oral comments submitted by interested parties will be considered by the commission as a basis for approving, amending and approving, or rejecting the proposed regulations.

The regulations to be heard during the regulatory hearing portion of the meeting are as follows:

**K.A.R. 115-4-6. Deer; management units.** This permanent regulation is proposed for amendment. The amendment performs an adjustment to the boundary between units 12 and 14.

**Economic Impact Summary:** The amendment will have no economic impact.

**K.A.R. 115-4-7. Elk, legal equipment, taking methods, and general provisions.** This permanent regulation is proposed for amendment. The waiting period between certain types of elk hunting permits is proposed for adjustment.

**K.A.R. 115-25-5. Turkey; fall season bag limit and permits.** This proposed exempt regulation will establish the fall archery and firearm turkey hunting seasons, hunting units, permit allowances, and bag limits. Application dates are included. A new firearms unit is proposed in northeast Kansas.

**Economic Impact Summary:** The department will realize revenue based on the number of permits actually issued. Certain businesses will benefit from sportsmen hunting turkeys. Revenue to the department represents a cost to sportsmen; however, such cost is voluntary for sportsmen.

**K.A.R. 115-25-7. Antelope; open season, bag limit and permits.** This proposed exempt regulation will establish the fall archery and firearms antelope seasons, hunting units, permits allowances and bag limits. Application dates are included.

**Economic Impact Summary:** The department will realize revenue based on the number of permits actually issued. Certain businesses will benefit from sportsmen hunting antelope. Revenue to the department represents a cost to sportsmen; however, such cost is voluntary for sportsmen.

**K.A.R. 115-25-8. Elk; open season, bag limit and permits.** This proposed exempt regulation will establish the fall elk hunting season, hunting areas, permit allowances, and bag limits. Application dates are included.

**Economic Impact Summary:** The department will realize revenue based on the number of permits actually issued. Certain businesses will benefit from sportsmen hunting elk. Revenue to the department represents a cost to sportsmen; however, such cost is voluntary for sportsmen.

**K.A.R. 115-25-9. Deer; regular open season, bag limit and permits.** This proposed exempt regulation will establish the regular fall archery and firearm deer seasons and bag limits. Application dates are included.

**Economic Impact Summary:** The department will realize revenue based on the number of permits actually issued after authorized numbers are established by secretary's orders. Certain businesses will benefit from sportsmen hunting deer. Revenue to the department represents a cost to sportsmen; however, such cost is voluntary for sportsmen.

**K.A.R. 115-30-10. Personal watercraft, definition, requirements and restrictions.** This proposed new permanent regulation defines a personal watercraft and addresses the wearing of PFD's, use of lanyards, time of operation, operational restrictions and minimum age of operators. The hearing on this regulation is continued from the January 20, 1994, public hearing in Topeka.

**Economic Impact Summary:** No economic impact is anticipated.

Regulations****Article 2.—TERMS DEFINED**

**105-2-1. Definitions.** Unless the context otherwise requires, terms used in K.A.R. 105-1-1 et seq., forms and instructions shall have the following meanings:

(a) "Board" means the state board of indigents' defense services.

(b) "Director" means the state director of indigents' defense services appointed by the board.

(c) "District" means judicial district.

(d) "Legal representation" means representation of indigent defendants by a qualified and effective attorney, as well as transcript preparation and other related defense services by investigators, expert witnesses and others when requested by the attorney and properly approved in accordance with K.A.R. 105-7-1, 105-7-2 and 105-7-3.

(e) "Panel" means the list of qualified attorneys in a county or region who are eligible for appointment or assignment to represent indigent defendants and voluntarily request to be considered for appointment or assignment.

(f) "Regional public defender" means an attorney selected and employed on full-time basis by the board to provide quality legal representation to indigent defendants in an assigned region of the state and to administer the assignment panel within that region, pursuant to K.S.A. 1993 Supp. 22-4501, et seq.

(g) "State appellate defender" means an attorney selected and employed on a full-time basis by the board to provide appellate representation to indigent defendants in the appellate courts of Kansas.

(h) "Trial counsel" means an attorney or public defender appointed or assigned under the terms of these regulations to provide legal representation to indigent defendants in the district courts of Kansas and as provided by K.A.R. 105-3-9.

(i) "Conflicts attorney office" means the office designated by the board to provide indigent felony and related defense services for cases that cannot be handled by the regional public defender office due to potential conflicts of interest.

(j) "Assigned counsel or attorney" means a panel attorney who has entered into a contract to provide representation for nonconflict cases appointed to the

*(continued)*

regional defender or conflicts cases appointed to the conflicts office and who has been assigned by the regional public defender or conflicts office to represent the indigent defendant.

(k) "Appointed counsel or attorney" means a panel attorney appointed by the court to represent an indigent defendant in a case in which the regional public defender has a conflict of interest and neither the regional public defender nor the designated conflicts office is able to undertake representation.

(l) "Region" means an area of the state designated by K.A.R. 105-10-1a. (Authorized by K.S.A. 22-4522; implementing K.S.A. 22-4522; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 1, 1985; amended May 1, 1986; amended Oct. 31, 1988; amended March 28, 1994.)

### Article 3.—APPOINTED ATTORNEYS

**105-3-11. Conflict cases.** (a) If a conflict of interest will not permit the regional public defender to represent a defendant and a conflicts office has not been designated for that county, the court shall appoint a qualified attorney from the panel. Each court-appointed attorney in conflict cases shall work independently of the regional public defender.

(b) Requests for investigative, expert and other services by court-appointed attorneys shall be made in accordance with K.A.R. 105-7-1. (Authorized by K.S.A. 22-4501 and 22-4522; implementing K.S.A. 22-4503 and 22-4522; effective March 28, 1994.)

### Article 5.—ATTORNEY COMPENSATION

**105-5-2. Rates of compensation.** (a) Each appointed counsel shall be compensated at the rate of \$50 per hour.

(b) Assigned counsel shall be compensated at the rate or rates established and set forth in the contract between the board and the assigned counsel. (Authorized by K.S.A. 22-4507 and 22-4522; implementing K.S.A. 22-4507; effective May 1, 1984; amended May 1, 1988; amended, T-105-6-13-88, July 1, 1988; amended Oct. 31, 1988; amended July 1, 1993; amended, T-105-6-15-93, July 1, 1993; amended Aug. 16, 1993; amended March 28, 1994.)

### Article 10.—SYSTEMS FOR PROVIDING LEGAL DEFENSE SERVICES FOR INDIGENT PERSONS

**105-10-1.** (Authorized by K.S.A. 22-4501 and 22-4522; implementing K.S.A. 22-4503 and 22-4522; effective, T-86-33, Oct. 23, 1985; effective May 1, 1986; amended Nov. 1, 1988; amended, T-105-6-22-89, June 22, 1989; amended Oct. 30, 1989; revoked March 28, 1994.)

**105-10-1a. Public defender systems at the trial level.** (a) Except as provided in K.A.R. 105-3-11, each regional public defender office shall provide all indigent felony and related defense services at the trial level in each region of the state, as follows:

(1) Region 1 shall consist of the 15th, 16th, 17th, 23rd, 24th, 25th and 26th judicial districts;

(2) region 2 shall consist of the 9th, 13th, 18th, 19th, 27th and 30th judicial districts;

(3) region 3 shall consist of the 8th, 12th, 20th, 21st and 28th judicial districts;

(4) region 4 shall consist of the 4th, 6th, 10th, 11th, 14th and 31st judicial districts;

(5) region 5 shall consist of the 2nd, 3rd, 5th, 7th and 22nd judicial districts; and

(6) region 6 shall consist of the 1st and 29th judicial districts.

(b) If the director has provided notice pursuant to K.A.R. 105-10-3 to the administrative judge of the judicial district in which a case is filed of the board's designation of a conflicts office for a county, the designated conflicts attorney office shall be appointed and shall provide indigent felony and related defense services at the trial level for those cases that cannot be handled by the regional public defender office due to potential conflicts of interest, with the exception of those cases which the designated conflicts attorney office cannot handle due to a potential conflict of interest.

(c) Each trial court shall appoint the regional public defender to provide felony defense services in all felony and other cases set forth in K.A.R. 105-1-1(a) with the following exceptions:

(1) If K.A.R. 105-10-2 requires the appointment of the state appellate defender;

(2) if a conflict of interest will not permit the regional public defender to represent the defendant and the conflicts attorney office is not available; or

(3) if the regional public defender office withdraws from the case or declines the case as provided in K.A.R. 105-21-3.

(d) If one of the exceptions stated above prevents the appointment of the regional public defender, the court shall appoint an attorney as provided in K.A.R. 105-3-11 on a form approved by the board. (Authorized by K.S.A. 22-4501 and 22-4522; implementing K.S.A. 22-4503 and 22-4522; effective March 28, 1994.)

**105-10-3. Implementation schedule for regional public defender system.** (a) The district court judge shall appoint the regional defender, or any other attorney under the system established by the board, to represent all persons entitled to counsel under K.S.A. 22-4503 who have not, prior to the system implementation date, had counsel appointed in the action pending before the court. The system implementation date in a particular county shall be the date provided in written notice by the director to the following persons:

(1) the chief justice of the Kansas supreme court;

(2) the judicial administrator for the Kansas unified judicial branch;

(3) the departmental justices assigned to the district courts within the region; and

(4) the district court administrative judges within the region.

(b) The district court judge shall appoint the regional defender, or any other attorney under the system established by the board, to represent any persons entitled to counsel under K.S.A. 22-4503 who have, prior to the system implementation date, had counsel appointed in the action pending before the court if appointed private counsel withdraws or is removed for the case subsequent to the implementation date.

(c) The district court judge shall appoint the regional defender to cases with matters pending prior to notice

of the change in the indigents' defense system if the regional defender requests the appointment and appointed private counsel does not object.

(d) The district court judge may appoint the regional defender to cases with matters pending prior to notice of the change in the indigents' defense system if it is the judgement of the court that it is in the best interests of the defendant to do so and provided that the regional defender consents to the appointment.

(e) Until notice is given pursuant to the provisions of this regulation that a county falls within a regional defender district, the district court judge has discretion to appoint counsel under the previously existing system for the county or district. (Authorized by K.S.A. 22-4501 and 22-4522; implementing K.S.A. 22-4503 and 22-4522; effective March 28, 1994.)

**105-10-4. Notification of designation of conflicts office.** (a) The director shall provide notice of the board's designation of a conflicts office to the administrative judge of the judicial district by certified letter, return receipt requested, at least 30 calendar days prior to the time the designation becomes effective. The notice shall include:

- (1) the county for which such office is designated as the conflicts office;
- (2) the effective date of the designation; and
- (3) the name, address and phone number of the designated conflicts office.

(b) If the written notice of designation of a conflicts office is received at a date less than 30 calendar days prior to the effective date of designation contained in the notice, the effective date of designation will be 30 calendar days after the actual receipt of the written notice of the designation.

(c) If the board changes the designated conflicts office for a particular county, the board shall provide written notice to the administrative judge of the judicial district 10 calendar days prior to the effective date of the change, by certified letter, return receipt requested. The notice shall state:

- (1) the effective date of the change;
- (2) the name, address and phone number of the new conflicts office; and
- (3) the manner in which current open cases are to be handled. (Authorized by K.S.A. 22-4501 and 22-4522; implementing K.S.A. 22-4503 and 22-4522; effective March 28, 1994.)

**105-10-5. Assigned counsel contracts.** The regional public defender, the state appellate defender and the designated conflicts office may, upon written authorization by the director, contract for services with qualified attorneys to undertake representation of indigent defendants to which their office has been appointed. (Authorized by K.S.A. 22-4501 and 22-4522; implementing K.S.A. 22-4522 and 22-4523; effective March 28, 1994.)

Article 1.—GENERAL

**40-1-22. Insurance policies; change of name or merger of an insurance company; assumption of risk endorsements; requirements.** (a) The assuming company shall attach to each policy an "assumption of risk" endorsement that displays the name and address of the assuming company when any outstanding policy of insurance issued to a resident of Kansas is affected by:

- (1) a change in the name of the issuing company;
  - (2) a merger, consolidation or similar transaction involving the issuing company;
  - (3) a change of domicile in which policy liability is assumed by another company; or
  - (4) an assumption reinsurance agreement.
- (b) The "assumption of risk" endorsement shall be approved by the commissioner of insurance before issuance to residents of the state of Kansas.

(c) An "assumption of risk" endorsement originating from an assumption reinsurance agreement shall not:

- (1) require the insured to take affirmative action to reject the substitution of one insurer for another; or
- (2) state that failure to reject such substitution or the continued payment of premium will constitute acceptance of the substitution. (Authorized by K.S.A. 40-103; implementing K.S.A. 40-221(a), 40-309, 40-510, 40-1220, 40-1221, 40-1222; effective Jan. 1, 1967; amended May 1, 1979; amended May 1, 1986; amended March 28, 1994.)

Article 3.—FIRE AND CASUALTY INSURANCE

**40-3-47. Fire and casualty insurance; rating organizations; filing of final rates prohibited; kinds of insurance affected.** (a) On and after the respective dates specified herein, rating organizations shall develop and file only prospective loss costs for the kinds of insurance, coverages or situations identified or described in paragraphs (1) through (6) of this subsection.

(1) July 1, 1991, multiple line, indivisible premium residential policies and endorsement forms comprising what is commonly identified as the homeowners policy program.

(2) June 1, 1991, automobile insurance on privately owned or leased private passenger automobiles and other motor vehicles provided under what is commonly known as a personal automobile policy.

(3) June 1, 1991, multiple line, indivisible premium commercial policies comprising what is commonly identified as the business owners program.

(4) March 1, 1993, all other fire, marine and inland marine insurance and allied lines of insurance to which K.S.A. 40-925 et seq. applies, except rates, rules and forms filed by the following rating organizations:

- (A) factory mutual service bureau;

(continued)

- (B) midwest rating and service bureau, inc.;
- (C) mill and elevator rating bureau; and
- (D) national crop insurance services, inc.
- (5) March 1, 1993, all other casualty insurance, including fidelity, surety and guarantee bonds to which K.S.A. 40-1111 et seq. applies, except rates, rules and forms filed by the national council on compensation insurance.
- (6) July 1, 1994, rates, rules and forms filed by the national council on compensation insurance.

(b) With respect to the filing of prospective loss costs and supplementary rating information by rating organizations and insurers respectively, the procedures referenced in K.A.R. 40-3-46(b) shall apply. (Authorized by K.S.A. 40-103 and K.S.A. 1992 Supp. 40-928a and 40-1113c; implementing K.S.A. 1992 Supp. 40-928a and 40-1113c; effective May 6, 1991; amended Feb. 8, 1993; amended March 28, 1994.)
