The Kansas Department of Transportation is seeking qualified consultant engineering firms for the following project. Responses must be received by June 16 for the consultant engineering firm to be considered. Seven signed copies of responses must be mailed to Jim L. **Project: 70-85 K 2610-01; Saline County Beginning at the Lincoln/Saline county line and extending east 12.9 km (8.0 miles)**

The scope of the work is to prepare roadway plans for pavement and shoulder reconstruction based on the existing four-lane divided roadway. The scope may also include extension of culverts, additional right-of-way and upgrading guard fence to current standards. The bridge design work and surveys are to be provided by KDOT. Pre-construction completion is scheduled for August 1996. Estimated construction cost is \$21,218,000.

From firms expressing interest, the Consultant Selection Committee will select a list of the most highly qualified (not less than three and not more than five) and invite them to attend a pre-proposal conference. Firms not selected will be notified by letter.

The Negotiating Committee, appointed by the Secretary of Transportation, will conduct discussion with firms invited to the pre-proposal conference and select one firm with which to negotiate a contract. After a contract has been awarded, the remaining firms not selected will be notified by letter.

It is the policy of KDOT to use the following criteria as the basis for selection of engineering consultant firms:

1. Size and professional qualification.
2. Experience of staff.
3. Location of firm with respect to proposed project.
4. Work load of firm.
5. Firm's performance record.

Notice of Hearing on Proposed  
Administrative Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 3 p.m. Monday, July 11, in Room 108 of the Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka, to consider the adoption of proposed changes in existing rules and regulations.

The 30-day notice of the public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed rules and regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the executive administrator of the Board of Nursing, Room 551-S, Landon State Office Building, 900 S.W. Jackson, Topeka 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing.

A summary of proposed regulations and their economic impact follows.

K.A.R. 60-16-101 through 60-16-105 are new regulations implementing HB 2602, which was passed this last legislative session. The bill sets up the parameters of education and practice for licensed practical nurses administering intravenous fluid therapy.

**K.A.R. 60-16-101. Definitions.** Intravenous fluid therapy and competency examination are defined.

**K.A.R. 60-16-102. Scope of practice for licensed practical nurse and intravenous fluid therapy.** Limited and expanded scopes of intravenous fluid therapy are detailed in this regulation. Certain practices are prohibited and are listed.

**K.A.R. 60-16-103. Approval procedure.** Licensed practical nurses performing expanded intravenous fluid therapy will have to be certified by July 1, 1995. All certifi-

icates issued will be through the educational programs. The mechanism for how the board will approve education programs is outlined in this regulation.

**K.A.R. 60-16-104. Standards for course; competency examination.** The board will approve education programs if standards are met as prescribed by this regulation. Competency examination standards are also listed.

**K.A.R. 60-16-105. Advisory committee.** An advisory committee to the board will be established and consist of two board members and five non-board members. The purpose of the committee is for continuing input on the status of licensed practical nurses and intravenous fluid therapy.

There will be some economic impact on licensed practical nurses. Nurses already administering intravenous fluid therapy in an expanded practice will have an opportunity to take a competency examination. Others who wish to practice in the expanded role will have to take a 48-hour course and pass the competency examination. There will be an expense to the licensee and possibly to the employer.

Although there has been no position funded, the board anticipates additional workload which cannot be fully handled by current staffing.

**K.A.R. 60-11-104a. Protocols requirements; transmitting prescription orders in writing.** Advanced registered nurse practitioners write prescriptions for clients by transmitting the order from a protocol approved by a physician. Some requirements in the procedures have been deleted. The changes in this regulation are to update the protocol procedures to be more flexible for both the advanced registered nurse practitioner and the physician. Time and money will be saved for both the advanced registered nurse practitioner and the physician. There will be no economic impact on the board.

**K.A.R. 60-9-109. Exceptions.** The exceptions to continuing nursing education (CNE) requirements have been expanded to allow some individuals to get CNE hours by independent study. There have been some requests from nurses who have family situations or medical problems which prohibit them going to CNE courses. The board could approve independent study for such circumstances. This change should have a positive economic effect for nurses with minimal additional time for the board.

**K.A.R. 60-3-102. Duplicate of annual license.** The license is no longer issued on an annual basis so a change needs to be made. Also, no fee will be charged to duplicate a license if the license has been stolen. The changes in the regulation should have minimal economic effect on nurses and the board.

## Public Notice

Changes in methods and standards for setting medicated payment rates for nursing facilities (NFs) and NFs-Mental Health (NFs-MH) services for the limitation/payment period beginning July 1, 1994, include the setting of upper cost center payment limits; the full implementation of the case mix payment system; and the inflation application on salaries and benefits. With these exceptions, all other features of the payment system shall remain.

The upper payment limits for the cost centers will be set using the following:

Administration	120% of the median
Plant Operating	130% of the median
Room and Board	130% of the median
Health Care	125% of the median

The rates will include the full case mix adjustment. There will no longer be the phased in rates or hold harmless provisions. The health care cost center base limit, calculated for a case mix of one, will be adjusted for each facility's average case mix index.

Salaries and benefits that were previously inflated by the estimated inflation factor will now be inflated by both the historic and estimated inflation factors. Costs receiving inflation will get both historic and estimated inflation; therefore, these factors will be combined. This combined inflation factor will be applied in determining both the new upper payment limits for the cost centers and the per diem payment rate for each facility.

The expected estimated annual aggregate increase in expenditures for state fiscal year 1995 is \$9 million. Of this amount, the changes in the methods and standards resulted in an estimated \$1 million additional expenditures over the previous methods and standards.

The agency is changing its methods and standards to continue to assure that payment rates are reasonable and adequate to meet the costs which must be incurred by the efficiently and economically operated facilities to provide services in conformity with applicable state and federal laws, regulations and quality and safety standards.

(b) Each applicant shall file affidavits verifying experience claimed on forms prescribed by the board. Experience documentation in the form of reports or file memoranda to support the claim for experience may be requested by the board.

(c) Acceptable appraisal experience shall include:

#### Article 6.—CONTINUING EDUCATION

**117-6-1. Continuing education; renewal requirements.** (a) The continuing education requirement for renewal of a license or certificate for the licensed, residential and general classifications shall be the equivalent of 10 classroom hours of instruction. Beginning July 1, 1994, an appraiser who obtains more than the required 10 classroom hours of continuing education during the licensure year may carry forward up to 10 classroom hours into each of the following two licensure years. The maximum number of hours which may be carried forward in this manner shall not exceed 20 classroom hours.

(b) An appraiser shall not receive continuing education credit for a course for which the appraiser received credit toward the original classroom hour requirement pursuant to K.A.R. 117-2-1, 117-3-1 or 117-4-1. However, if a licensed or certified appraiser receives credit for a course to apply toward a higher classification, the appraiser may also receive continuing education credit for the course if it is approved by the board.

(c) Continuing education credit may also be granted for participation, other than as a student, in appraisal educational processes and programs. Examples of activities for which credit may be granted are teaching, program development, authorship of textbooks, or similar activities which are determined by the board to be equivalent to obtaining continuing education.

(d) At the completion of each continuing education course, each appraiser shall present a certificate of completion for each course for which credit is requested.

(e) If any appraiser requests credit pursuant to subsection (c) of this regulation, the appraiser shall submit a detailed description of such activities with the application for renewal on a form obtained from the board.

(f) A nonresident of Kansas may receive credit for courses approved by the state of residence by submitting certificates of completion and evidence that each course for which credit is requested was approved by the state of residence. Evidence of renewal of an equivalent license or certificate by a nonresident's state of residence may be recognized by the board as meeting the education requirement for renewal of the nonresident's Kansas license or certificate. #### Notice of Hearing on Proposed Administrative Regulations

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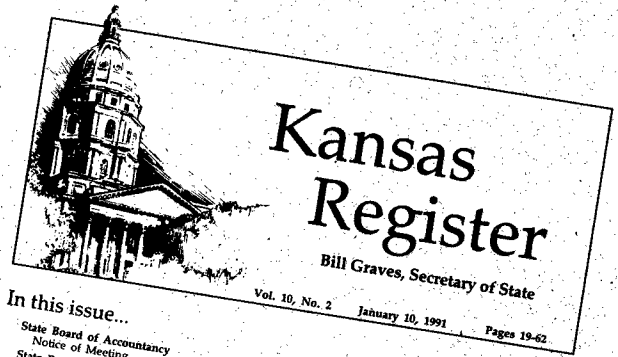
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
