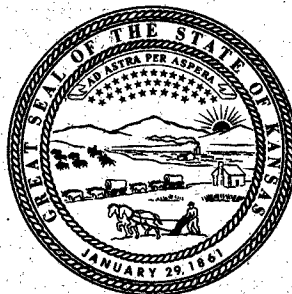

Request for Proposals

The Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services and the Advisory Committee on Juvenile Offender Programs are soliciting grant proposals from interested units of local government and public and private not-for-profit agencies that will assist communities to comply with state and federal laws relating to youth, juvenile offenders, and status offenders. Applications must be approved by local governing bodies.

The purpose of these projects is to promote improvements in the juvenile justice system and facilitate the most effective allocation of system resources; to promote community-based alternatives for each stage of a child's contact with the juvenile justice system, emphasizing options which are least restrictive and promote positive ties with the child's family, school, and community; and to promote programs which prevent or preclude minor, serious, and violent delinquency from occurring.

Projects may be developed to assist areas in complying with the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (JJDP) Act of 1974. These are: (1) the deinstitutionalization of status offenders, (2) sight and sound separation of juvenile and adult offenders, (3) removal of juveniles from adult jails and lock-ups, and (4) strategies to address the over-representation of minorities in the area juvenile justice system. Preference will be given to multi-jurisdictional projects.

Following are the major areas of project development:

- 1. Disproportionate minority confinement \$100,000
- 2. Alternatives to detention 166,900
- 3. Delinquency prevention 100,000
- 4. Serious crime 75,000

Disproportionate minority confinement projects should be designed to limit the overrepresentation of minority youth in the juvenile justice system. The projects

should be designed to strategically reduce the number of minorities in secure confinement, influence policy and procedures, and develop training and programs directed towards minority populations.

Alternatives to detention projects should be designed to limit the need for secure custody detention beds, reduce the numbers of juveniles held in adult jails and lock-ups, and expand community-based, nonsecure incarceration alternatives/intermediate sanctions, particularly for pre-adjudicatory juveniles.

Delinquency prevention projects should be designed to reduce the onset of delinquency among youth who might otherwise have begun on a pathway to serious, violent, and chronic delinquency.

Serious crime projects are to be designed to work with serious, chronic, and repeat juvenile offenders and be designed to reduce the likelihood that these youth will re-offend.

Place of Payment and Bond Registration

The principal of and interest on the bonds will be payable in lawful money of the United States of America by check or draft of the Kansas State Treasurer, Topeka, Kansas (the paying agent and bond registrar). Redemption of Bonds Prior to Maturity

Security for the Bonds

NURSE PRACTITIONERS**

60-11-104a. Protocol requirements; transmitting prescription orders. (a) Each written protocol pursuant to which an advanced registered nurse practitioner may transmit prescription orders shall:

(1) specify for each classification of disease or injury the corresponding class of drugs for which the advanced registered nurse practitioner is permitted to transmit a prescription order;

(2) be maintained in either a looseleaf notebook or a book of published protocols. The notebook or book of published protocols shall include a cover page containing:

(A) the names, telephone numbers and signatures of the advanced registered nurse practitioner and a responsible physician who has authorized the protocol; and

(B) the date protocol was adopted or last reviewed; and

(3) be kept at the advanced registered nurse practitioner's principal place of practice.

(b) An advanced registered nurse practitioner shall ensure that each protocol is reviewed by the advanced registered nurse practitioner and physician at least annually.

(c) Any prescription order transmitted in written form shall:

(1) include the name, address and telephone number of a responsible physician;

(2) be signed by the advanced registered nurse practitioner with the letters A.R.N.P.;

(3) not be for any controlled substance drug; and

(4) be from a class of drugs transmitted pursuant to protocol.

(d) An advanced registered nurse practitioner may orally transmit a prescription order pursuant to protocol for:

(1) a schedule II controlled substance in the case of an emergency situation as defined in K.A.R. 68-20-19(a); and

(2) a controlled substance listed in schedule III, IV, or V.

(e) Nothing in this regulation shall be construed to prohibit any registered nurse or licensed practical nurse or advanced registered nurse practitioner pursuant to a lawful direction of a person licensed to practice medicine and surgery or dentistry, or certified as an advanced registered nurse practitioner from conveying a prescription order orally, or from administering a drug.

(f) When used in this section, terms shall be construed to have the meanings set forth in the pharmacy act of the state of Kansas, K.S.A. 65-1626. (Authorized by K.S.A. 65-1129 and K.S.A. 65-1130; implementing K.S.A. 65-1130, effective, T-60-9-12-88, Sept. 12, 1988; effective Feb. 13, 1989; amended May 7, 1990; amended Jan. 3, 1995.)

Department of Transportation**Request for Comments**

The Kansas Department of Transportation requests comments on the amendment of the Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) for fiscal year 1995-1997 to include the Motorist Assistance Program.

The Kansas Highway Patrol (KHP) is introducing the Motorist Assistance Program in the Kansas City, Wichita and Topeka areas to assist stranded motorists. The goal of the program is to reduce the safety risk that stranded motorists create for other drivers, to reduce the risk of injury to the stranded motorists themselves and to increase the service provided by the Kansas Highway Patrol to stranded motorists. In addition, the program seeks to reduce congestion in the metro areas, particularly during the rush hours, by expediently removing stranded vehicles from the roadway. Safety in construction zones in the metro areas should be enhanced. This new program will be funded on a 20 percent/80 percent match basis between the KHP and KDOT. The KDOT portion will come from federal highway funds.

The amendment of the STIP requires a public comment period of 30 days. Article 5.—INMATE MANAGEMENT

44-5-115. Service fees. (a) Each inmate in the custody of the secretary of corrections shall be assessed a charge of one dollar each payroll period, not to exceed \$12.00 per year, as a fee for the facility administering the inmate's trust account. The facility shall be authorized to transfer the fee from each inmate's account from the balance existing on the first of each month. In the event an inmate has insufficient funds on the first of the month to cover this fee, the fee shall be transferred as soon as the inmate has sufficient funds in the account to cover the fee. All funds received by the facility pursuant to this provision shall be paid on a quarterly basis to the crime victims compensation fund.

(b) Every offender under the department's parole supervision, conditional release supervision, post-release supervision, and interstate compact parole and probation supervision in Kansas shall be assessed a supervision service fee of a maximum of 25 dollars per month. This fee shall be paid by the offenders to the department's designated collection agent(s). Payment of the fee shall be a condition of supervision. All fees shall be paid as directed by field service order and as instructed by the supervising parole officer. A portion of the supervision service fees collected shall be paid to the designated collection agent(s) according to the current service contract, if applicable. Twenty-five percent of the remaining amount collected shall be paid on an at least quarterly basis to the crime victims compensation fund. The remaining balance shall be paid to the department's general fees fund for the department's purchase or lease of enhanced parole supervision services or equipment such as electronic monitoring, drug screening, and surveillance services. The department shall establish criteria for the identification of indigent offenders who shall be exempt from this subsection of the regulation. Fees as authorized by subsection (d) of this regulation shall not be considered a portion of the monthly service fee.

(c) Each inmate in the custody of the secretary of corrections shall be assessed a fee of two dollars (\$2.00) for each primary visit initiated by the inmate to an institutional sick call. A primary visit is the initial visit for a specific complaint or condition. Inmates shall not be charged for medical visits initiated by medical or mental health staff, institution intake screenings, yearly physical examinations, reception evaluations, evaluations requested by the Kansas Parole Board, referrals to a consultant physician, infirmary care, emergency treatment, mental health group sessions, facility requested mental health evaluations, or follow-up visits initiated by medical staff. No inmate shall be refused medical treatment for financial reasons. In the event an inmate has insufficient funds to cover the medical fee, the fee shall be transferred as soon as the inmate has sufficient funds in the account to cover the balance of the fee.

(d) An offender shall be assessed a fee for each urinalysis test administered to them for the purpose of de-

termining use of illegal substances which has a positive result. The amount of the fee shall be adjusted from time to time to reflect the actual cost of administering such tests, including staff participation. Article 6.—GOOD TIME CREDITS

44-6-124. Awarding good time. (a) For crimes, other than class A crimes, committed prior to July 1, 1993, an inmate may earn good time credits which shall be subtracted from the minimum sentence in order to establish a parole eligibility date or the maximum sentence in order to establish the conditional release date.

(b) Good time credits may be earned and awarded only for time served on a sentence on and after the beginning date of the sentence. Good time credits shall not be awarded for any period of time served prior to the beginning date of sentence.

(c) Unless the application of good time credits would result in a release date earlier than the initial award date, the initial award of earned good time credits shall be made at the time of the inmate's first program classification review which falls 120 days or more after the inmate's admission to the custody of the secretary of corrections. The initial award of earned good time credits shall cover the period from the beginning date of the sentence to the date of the initial award but shall be based on the factors set forth in subsection (f) for the time period from admission to the custody of the secretary of corrections to the date of the initial award.

(d) Following the initial award, good time credits shall be awarded at each program classification review from credits available to be earned since the previous program classification review.

(e) If the entire allocation of good time credits is not awarded at a program classification review, part of that allocation shall not be awarded at a later date.

(f) The following factors shall be considered in determining whether an inmate has earned good time credits:

- (1) the inmate's performance in a work assignment;
- (2) the inmate's performance in a program assignment;
- (3) the inmate's maintenance of an appropriate personal and group living environment;
- (4) the inmate's participation in release planning activities;
- (5) the inmate's disciplinary record; and
- (6) other factors related to the inmate's general adjustment, performance, behavior, attitude, and overall demonstration of individual responsibility and accountability.

(g) An inmate's disciplinary record shall affect the earning of good time awards in the following manner.

(1) A guilty finding of a class I disciplinary offense shall result in the withholding of a minimum of 50% of the good time credits available for that program classification review period.

(2) A guilty finding of a class II disciplinary offense shall result in the withholding of a minimum of 25% but not more than 50% of the good time credits available for that program classification review period.

(continued)

(3) A guilty finding of a class III disciplinary offense shall result in the withholding of a minimum of 10% but not more than 25% of the good time credits available for that program classification review period. For purposes of this provision, summary judgments pursuant to K.A.R. 44-13-201b shall not be considered a guilty finding.

(4) In the event there are multiple disciplinary violations within a single disciplinary report, only the most serious violation for which the inmate was found guilty or pleads no contest shall be counted in determining the percentage of good time credits to withhold.

(5) The percentage of good time credits withheld during a program classification review period shall be cumulative but shall not exceed 100% of that available for that classification review period.

(6) A refusal by an inmate to constructively work or participate in assigned programs shall result in the withholding of 100% of the good time credits for that program classification review period, unless the inmate is determined by the facility health authority to be physically or mentally incapable of working or participating in a particular program or detail.

(7) An inmate's failure to cooperate in the development of an acceptable release plan shall result in the non-award of good time credits available to be earned during the 120 day period immediately preceding the inmate's projected or scheduled release date.

(h) Good time credits which are forfeited as a result of a penalty imposed for a disciplinary offense shall not be restored to an inmate. 44-6-142. Conditional release date. When computing the conditional release date, it shall be presumed that prior to March 1, 1995, 100% of the available good time credits were earned. On and after March 1, 1995, good time credits shall be awarded on an earned basis pursuant to K.A.R. 44-6-124 for the purpose of determining the conditional release date. The conditional release date shall be based on the controlling maximum sentence. No conditional release date shall be computed for a maximum sentence of life. (Authorized by K.S.A. 1993 Supp. 75-5210, 75-5251; implementing K.S.A. 22-3427, K.S.A. 1993 Supp. 21-4608, 22-3717, 75-5210, 75-5251; effective, T-84-32, Nov. 23, 1983; effective May 1, 1984; amended Sept. 30, 1991; amended Jan. 3, 1995.)

44-6-146. Presumptive sentence good time credits. (a) For crimes, other than off-grid crimes, committed on or after July 1, 1993, an inmate may earn good time credits which will be subtracted from the prison portion of the inmate's sentence, thereby resulting in an earlier release date from imprisonment.

(1) The maximum amount of good time which may be earned shall be limited to 20% of the term of imprisonment imposed by the court.

(2) The total amount of good time credits earned and retained by an inmate shall be added to the period of post-release supervision applicable to the inmate's sentence.

(b) Good time credits may be earned and awarded only for time served on a sentence on and after the beginning date of the sentence. Good time credits shall not be awarded for any period of time served prior to the beginning date of sentence.

(c) Unless the application of good time credits would result in a release date earlier than the initial award date, the initial award of earned good time credits shall be made at the time of the inmate's first program classification review which falls 120 days or more after the inmate's admission to the custody of the secretary of corrections. The initial award of earned good time credits shall cover the period from the beginning date of the sentence to the date of the initial award but shall be based on the factors set forth in subsection (f) for the time period from admission to the custody of the secretary of corrections to the date of the initial award.

(d) Following the initial award, good time credits shall be awarded at each program classification review from credits available to be earned since the previous program classification review.

(e) If the entire allocation of good time credits is not awarded at a program classification review, no part of that allocation shall be awarded at a later date.

(f) The following factors shall be considered in determining whether an inmate has earned good time credits:

- (1) the inmate's performance in a work assignment;
- (2) the inmate's performance in a program assignment;
- (3) the inmate's maintenance of an appropriate personal and group living environment;
- (4) the inmate's participation in release planning activities;
- (5) the inmate's disciplinary record; and
- (6) other factors related to the inmate's general adjustment, performance, behavior, attitude, and overall demonstration of individual responsibility and accountability.

(g) An inmate's disciplinary record shall affect the earning of good time awards in the following manner:

(1) A guilty finding of a class I disciplinary offense shall result in the withholding of a minimum of 50% of the good time credits available for that program classification review period.

(2) A guilty finding of a class II disciplinary offense shall result in the withholding of a minimum of 25% but not more than 50% of the good time credits available for that program classification review period.

(3) A guilty finding of a class III disciplinary offense shall result in the withholding of a minimum of 10% but not more than 25% of the good time credits available for that program classification review period. For purposes of this provision, summary judgments pursuant to K.A.R. 44-13-201b shall not be considered a guilty finding.

(4) In the event there are multiple disciplinary violations within a single disciplinary report, only the most serious violation for which the inmate was found guilty or pleads no contest shall be counted in determining the percentage of good time credits to withhold.

(5) The percentage of good time credits withheld during a program classification review period shall be cu-

mulative but shall not exceed 100% of that available for that classification review period.

(b) A refusal by an inmate to constructively work or participate in assigned programs shall result in the withholding of 100% of the good time credits for that program classification review period, unless the inmate is determined by the facility health authority to be physically or mentally incapable of working or participating in a particular program or detail.

(7) An inmate's failure to cooperate in the development of an acceptable release plan shall result in the non-award of good time credits available to be earned during the 120 day period immediately preceding the inmate's projected or scheduled release date.

(h) Good time credits which are forfeited as a result of a penalty imposed for a disciplinary offense shall not be restored to an inmate. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1993 Supp. 21-4722; effective Sept. 13, 1993, amended Jan. 3, 1995.)

Article 12.—CONDUCT AND PENALTIES

44-12-601. Mail. (a) Definitions.

(1) "Legal mail" means mail which affects the inmate's right to access to the courts or legal counsel. It includes letters between the inmate and any lawyer, a judge, a clerk of a court, or any intern or employee of legal services for prisoners.

(2) "Official mail" means any mail to an official of the state or federal government who has authority to control, or to obtain or conduct an investigation of, the custody or conditions of confinement of the inmate.

(3) "Privileged mail" means any mail between the inmate and the inmate's doctor.

(4) "Censor" means to remove or change any part or all of the correspondence or literature.

(5) "Read" means to read the contents of correspondence or literature to ascertain the content.

(6) "Inspect" means to open, shake out, look through, feel or otherwise check for contraband without reading or censoring.

(b) Inmates shall comply with the mail procedures and restrictions established by the order of the principal administrator of the facility. Failure to comply with mail procedures or restrictions, or circumventing or attempting to circumvent mail procedures or restrictions by any means, shall be prohibited. Any delivery of mail through an employee, volunteer, teacher, or any other person who is not authorized to perform functions related to the established mail handling system shall be prohibited.

(c) Contraband. Except as provided in subsection (r), items identified as contraband shall be dealt with as provided in subsections (i) and (j) and then either returned to the sender at the inmate's expense or destroyed, at the inmate's option. Items which are illegal under Kansas or U.S. law shall be seized and held as evidence for other law enforcement officers.

(d) Direct communication with officials. Outgoing official or legal mail sent by any inmate shall not be opened. However, if any inmate threatens or terrorizes any person through such mail, subsequent mail, including official or legal mail, from the inmate to the person threatened or terrorized may, at the request of that per-

son, be read and censored for a time period and to the extent necessary to remedy the abuse.

(e) Incoming mail which is clearly identified as legal, official, or privileged mail shall be opened only in the inmate's presence. Such mail shall be inspected for contraband but shall not be read or censored.

(f) Violation of mail regulations of the department of corrections, orders of the principal administrator, or the laws of Kansas or the United States may result in an investigation. Additional mail restrictions, sufficient to prevent the continuation or reoccurrence of the violation, may be placed upon the offender.

(g) Incoming or outgoing legal, official, or privileged mail shall not be censored or read unless a previous abuse of the right, or other good cause, is shown and documented. All other mail may be read by a designated official of the facility upon authorization by the principal administrator.

(h) All funds sent to inmates shall be in the form of a money order, a cashier's check, or a certified check.

(i) Any incoming or outgoing mail other than legal, official or privileged mail may be inspected at any time. Such mail may be censored only when there is reasonable belief that:

(1) there is a threat to institutional safety, order, or security;

(2) there is a threat to the safety and security of public officials or the general public; or

(3) the mail is being used in furtherance of illegal activities. Such mail may also be censored if it is obscene and the addressee, or the responsible parent or guardian of any addressee who is a minor, has filed with the principal administrator a written complaint regarding previous correspondence and a request that future correspondence be stopped.

(j) If any communication to or from an inmate is censored, the following procedures shall be conducted.

(1) Each inmate shall be given a written notice of the censorship and the reason for censorship without disclosing the censored material.

(2) Each inmate shall be given the name and address of the sender of incoming mail or the addressee of outgoing mail and the date the item was received in the mail room.

(3) The author of the censored correspondence shall be given a reasonable opportunity to protest that decision.

(4) Protests shall be referred to a prison official other than the person who originally disapproved the correspondence.

(k) Incoming bulk mail shall not be delivered unless each piece is individually addressed to the inmate by conviction name.

(l) Any outgoing first class letters may be sent to as many people and to whomever the inmate chooses, subject to the foregoing restrictions.

(m) Outgoing inmate mail shall bear the full conviction name, inmate number, and address of the sender and the name and address of the intended recipient. No other words, drawings, or messages shall be placed on the outside of the envelope or package by an inmate

except words describing the mail as being legal, official, privileged, or intended to aid postal officials in delivery of the item. Outgoing inmate mail shall be stamped by the institution to indicate that it was mailed from an institution operated by the department of corrections and that it has not been censored.

(n) The facility shall provide reasonable amounts of free writing paper and envelopes to all inmates, except those in a work release facility or employed by private industry. Inmates may also purchase stationery from the inmate canteen. The facility shall pay postage for the initial two pieces of first class domestic mail weighing one ounce or less each, per week, for each individual inmate, except those in a work release facility or employed by private industry. Postage for any such domestic mail in excess of two pieces per week shall be paid by the inmate. All postage for legal and official mail shall be paid by the institution or facility except for inmates in a work release facility or employed by private industry. The facility shall not pay postage for inmate groups or organizations.

(o) Inmates shall not correspond with any person who has filed a written objection to the correspondence with the principal administrator of the facility.

(1) The inmate shall be notified of the objection in writing when it is received, but need not be informed of the exact contents of the objection.

(2) In the instance of unwanted correspondence to a minor, the objection shall be filed by the parent or guardian of the minor.

(3) Orders shall be developed to prevent further correspondence from being sent to those who have filed an objection.

(4) This regulation shall not prevent an inmate from writing to the inmate's natural or adoptive child, unless the child was the victim of the crime for which the inmate is incarcerated and the person having legal custody of the child files a written objection with the principal administrator, and the inmate has not obtained a court order permitting such written communication with the child.

(p) Publications.

(1) Any inmate may receive books, newspapers, and periodicals except for those inmates assigned to the reception and diagnostic unit of the Topeka correctional facility for evaluation purposes. Only books, newspapers, or periodicals received directly from a publisher or a vendor shall be accepted.

(2) The procedures for censorship of mail listed in subsection (j) of this regulation shall be used for censorship of publications.

(3) Inmates shall have the option of having censored publications mailed out of the facility at their own expense, or discarded.

(4) Publications which are obscene or otherwise illegal, in whole or in part, or which meet, in whole or in part, the test for censorship of mail in subsection (i) of this regulation, shall not be allowed into the facility.

(5) On transfer between institutions or facilities, the inmate shall arrange change of address for newspapers and periodicals. Newspapers and periodicals shall not be forwarded for more than 30 days after the date of transfer.

(q) Packages. A procedure for the handling of packages, both incoming and outgoing, shall be established by order of the principal administrator.

(r) Violation of this regulation shall be a class II offense. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1993 Supp. 75-5210; effective May 1, 1980; amended May 1, 1981; amended May 1, 1984; amended May 1, 1986; amended May 1, 1988; amended April 20, 1992; amended Jan. 3, 1995.)

44-12-1202. Conviction of four offenses in six months. Upon conviction of the fourth offense of the same class within the immediate prior six month period, the hearing officer may impose a sentence for such fourth offense not greater than twice the maximum that can be imposed for an offense of that class. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1993 Supp. 75-5210; effective May 1, 1980; amended April 20, 1992; amended Jan. 3, 1995.)

44-12-1308. Disciplinary segregation; limits. Continuous confinement in disciplinary segregation for more than 30 days shall require the review and approval of the principal administrator. (Authorized by and implementing K.S.A. 1993 Supp. 75-5210; effective May 1, 1985; amended Jan. 3, 1995.)

Article 13.—DISCIPLINARY PROCEDURE

44-13-408. Representation by counsel or counsel substitute. (a) If the hearing officer finds that the charged inmate is incapable of representing himself or herself at any stage of the disciplinary hearing, the hearing officer shall appoint a staff member from an approved list to act as counsel substitute to assist the inmate at the disciplinary hearing and to question relevant witnesses. The principal administrator shall make available to the hearing officer a list of staff members available to assist the inmate as counsel substitute.

(b) Representation by Legal Services for Prisoners, Inc., or its designee, shall be permitted only in class I offense cases. Assistance in other cases shall be limited to counsel substitute, and shall be permitted only when the hearing officer finds that the inmate is not capable of effectively collecting and presenting evidence on the inmate's own behalf. If Legal Services for Prisoners, Inc., is not available, assistance by a counsel substitute shall be permitted in class I offense cases. If the inmate does not wish to be assisted by a counsel substitute when Legal Services for Prisoners, Inc., is not available, the hearing may proceed without legal counsel or counsel substitute unless the hearing officer finds the inmate incapable of proceeding on the inmate's own behalf.

(c) Counsel shall be considered not available in cases in which counsel fails or is not expected to appeal within three days, excluding Saturdays, Sundays, holidays, and authorized continuances.

(d) Counsel substitute shall mean a correctional staff member. Counsel substitute shall also include Legal Services for Prisoners, Inc., in any case where the hearing officer determines that the inmate is incapable of proceeding on the inmate's own behalf, and Legal Services for Prisoners, Inc., is available and willing to represent the inmate.

(e) Legal Services for Prisoners, Inc., may designate the University of Kansas law school defender project or Washburn university legal clinic by general designation for all members and participants of such programs on a continuing basis. When a bona fide conflict of interest exists, Legal Services for Prisoners, Inc., may designate a private attorney, on a case by case basis, with prior written approval by the secretary of corrections.

(f) In a class I case, if the inmate is represented by legal counsel, the officer also shall be permitted to have representation by legal counsel. The counsel shall be provided by the staff attorney of the facility if one is on staff, or by a department staff attorney, if available. 44-13-704. Administrative review. (a) In class I and II offense cases, within seven days after preparation of the record, excluding Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays, there shall be a review of the case, without the presentation of further arguments from either side, regarding compliance with the disciplinary procedure. The principal administrator shall:

- (1) approve the decision;
- (2) disapprove the decision;
- (3) amend the charge in accordance with the provisions of K.A.R. 44-13-202 and remand to the hearing officer;
- (4) disapprove the decision and dismiss the case;
- (5) reduce the penalty;
- (6) provide for disposition of personal property which has been found to be the subject of a violation of one or more disciplinary rules in accordance with K.A.R. 44-5-111; or
- (7) remand the case to the board or hearing officer and order a new hearing.

(b) The principal administrator shall notify the inmate of the results of the review without unnecessary delay, but in no case later than seven days after review of the record, excluding Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays. The date of review shall not be counted.

(c) In class III cases, where possible, the reviewer shall not be the principal administrator. The principal administrator shall designate an impartial employee of suitable rank and experience to do the review. A person who was the hearing officer shall not act as reviewing authority nor shall the reviewer be any person involved in the offense as witness or reporting officer.
