This 30-day notice of public hearing shall constitute a public comment period for the purpose of receiving written public comments on the proposed regulations. All interested parties may submit written comments prior to the hearing to the Kansas Real Estate Appraisal Board, Columbian Title Building, 820 S. Quincy, Suite 314, Topeka, 66612. All interested parties will be given a reasonable opportunity to present their views orally on the adoption of the proposed regulations during the hearing. In order to give all parties an opportunity to present their views, it may be necessary to request each participant to limit any oral presentation to five minutes.

The proposed regulation amendments are for adoption on a permanent basis. A summary of the proposed amendments to the regulations and economic impact follows:

K.A.R. 117-2-2, 117-3-2 and 117-4-2. The purpose of the amended regulations is to limit the number of hours received for experience credit received from a specialty type of appraising. This change would assist the board to more efficiently review experience credit to meet federal requirements. There is no anticipated fiscal impact on the appraisers, other governmental units, private citizens or state agencies.

Request for Proposals

The Department of Social and Rehabilitation Services and the Advisory Committee on Juvenile Offender Programs are soliciting grant proposals from interested units of local government and public and private not-for-profit agencies that will assist communities in developing local delinquency prevention programs which will reduce the likelihood that youth will enter the juvenile justice system.

The purpose of this project is to promote collaborative, community efforts designed to create comprehensive, community strategic plans which will reduce delinquency behaviors. Communities must develop a three-year plan that addresses known risk factors and incorporates a risk-focused model of delinquency prevention. A local prevention planning board (PPB) is required to oversee the development and implementation of the three-year plan in the region served. Multi-jurisdictional projects will be given priority.

Applicant jurisdictions must demonstrate compliance with the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974 (JJDPA) to be eligible for funding under Title V of the JJDPA.

A 50 percent cash or in-kind contribution match is required for Title V, JJDPA funding. Projects may be awarded for 12 months with additional annual funding dependent upon the continuation of the federal program. Current available funding, through federal fiscal year (FFY) 1994 Title V funding, is \$121,600. More than one project may be funded in each of the Regional Prevention Areas. Coordination with the local Regional Prevention Centers is encouraged. RFPs must be approved by the county commission in the area to be served.

A public hearing will be conducted at 3 p.m. Wednesday April 5, in the Parking Department conference room, 1501 Irving Hill Road, University of Kansas, Lawrence, concerning the adoption by the Board of Regents of regulations governing traffic and parking on the roads, streets, driveways, and parking facilities at the University of Kansas. The following is a summary of the substance of the rules and proposed changes:

1. General Regulations. The current regulations specify who is subject to these rules and regulations, that all vehicles must have a valid parking permit, and the hours of access to the central campus. No amendments are proposed.

2. Definitions. The current regulations specify, for the purpose of these regulations, the definitions of student, faculty, staff, visitors, residence hall visitor, medical parking needs, handicap parking, moped and motorcycle

parking. No amendments are proposed.

3. Visitor Parking. The current regulations specify conditions under which visitors may legally park at the University of Kansas. No amendments are proposed.

4. Parking Permits. The current regulations establish procedures pertaining to parking permits and the types of permits available. No amendments are proposed.

5. Student, Faculty, and Staff Parking. The current regulations establish procedures by which parking permits for vehicles may be obtained and appealed, and procedures for new employees. No amendments are proposed.

6. Permit Fees. The current regulations specify the fees charged for parking permits. No amendments are

proposed

7. Control of Parking Lots and Zones. The current regulations specify times and locations for parking restrictions at the University of Kansas. No amendments are proposed.

8. Violations. The current regulations specify violations for which a vehicle may be ticketed and the cost of

such violations. No amendments are proposed.

9. Payment of Fees for Violations. The current regulations specify the method and procedure for payment of violation notices, late payment, what constitutes excessive violations and consequences of excessive violations, and towing and impoundment procedures. No amendments are proposed.

10. Appeal of Violation Notices. The current regulations establish the procedures for appeals from a charge of misuse of parking area. No amendments are proposed.

11. Statutory Authorization. The current regulations establish the authorization of the Board of Regents to promulgate regulations for the control of parking and traffic on the University of Kansas campus and to establish misuse fees for violations of the regulations. No amendments are proposed.

Interested persons will be given reasonable opportunity at the hearing to present their views concerning the adoption of the proposed amendments to the existing regulations. Written comments also may be submitted prior to the hearing. Written comments or a request for a copy of the proposed regulations and a copy of the financial impact statement of such changes should be submitted to Raymond K. Notice of Hearing on Proposed Traffic Regulations

A public hearing will be conducted at 1 p.m. Tuesday, April 11, in Room G010 of Wahl Hall East Auditorium, University of Kansas Medical Center, Kansas City, concerning the adoption by the Board of Regents of regulations governing traffic and parking on the roads, streets, driveways and parking facilities at the University of Kansas Medical Center.

1. Student, Faculty, Employee and Staff Parking. The current regulations specify that the university maintains various types of parking to meet the needs of faculty, staff, employees and students. The proposed amendment will add a Campus After Hours Permit, which will allow parking in all color zones during off-peak hours of 4 p.m. to 7 a.m. Monday through Friday and 24 hours on weekends and holidays.

New Employees—Currently a new employee may receive a courtesy parking permit for the yellow zone upon presentation of an appointment letter from Personnel Services. This permit is issued depending upon the availability of space and is valid until the receipt of the first paycheck. In addition, the proposed amendment provides, when surface parking permits are not available, one month of free parking (on a space available basis) on

the top deck of the Olathe Garage.

Carpool Permit—The current regulation states that each vehicle in the carpool shall be issued a permit identifying the vehicle as a car pool. The fee for the purchase of the carpool is the cost of the color zone permit plus an additional charge per vehicle. The proposed amendment recommends the fee for the purchase of a carpool permit be discounted 50 percent from the cost of a color zone permit plus an additional charge per vehicle.

2. Patient, Visitor and Special Restricted Parking Areas. The current regulations specify that classifications of parking permits are subject to modification. The parking classifications and parking privileges are shown for the Kansas City campus only. All zones are posted by signs showing color codes. Notice of Available Federal Funding for Adult Education

Pursuant to assurances as set out in the amended Kansas State Plan for Adult Education, notification of available federal funding for four programs is announced. These funds are authorized by Sections 322 and 353 of the Adult Education Act (P.L. 100-297).

Section 322 of the Adult Education Act provides federal financial assistance to states to assist and expand existing programs and to develop new programs for adults whose lack of basic skills:

(a) renders them unemployable;

(b) keeps them, whether employed or unemployed, from functioning independently in society, and

(c) severely reduces their ability to have a positive effect on the literacy of their children.

Two grant programs are available under Section 322. The Basic Program Grant provides eligible entities direct and equitable access to federal funds provided under Section 322. The eligible entities are local education agencies, public or private nonprofit agencies, community-based organizations, correctional education agencies, postsecondary educational institutions, and institutions which serve educationally disadvantaged adults. Applications will be accepted until May 10 for grants under this section.

The Gateway Grant program is available only to public housing authorities. These are competitive two-year grants for literacy programs and related activities. Any public housing authority that receives a grant shall consult with local adult education providers in conducting programs and activities with assistance provided under the grant. Applications will be accepted until May 10 for grants under this program.

Two grant programs are also available under Section 353. Staff Development Grant applications are a necessary companion to the applications for a Section 322 Basic Grant Program. No Section 322 Basic Grant Program will be approved without an approved Section 353 Staff Development Grant application. Staff Development Grants must address the following priorities established by the

Adult Education Act:

(a) training for full-time professional adult educators;

(b) training for minority educators;

(c) training for educators of adults with limited Eng-

lish proficiency; and

(d) training teachers to recognize and more effectively serve illiterate individuals with learning disabilities and individuals who have a reading ability below the fifth grade level.

Applications will be accepted until May 10 for grants

under this program.

In addition, mini-grants of up to \$500 are available under Section 353 for research and special demonstration projects. Proposals for these projects should address the federal and state staff developmental priorities. Applications will be accepted until December 30 for grants under this program.

The bonds will bear interest at rates to be determined when the bonds are sold as hereinafter provided, which interest will be payable semiannually on March 1 and September 1 in each year, beginning on September 1, 1995.

Place of Payment and Bond Registration

The principal of and interest on the bonds will be payable in lawful money of the United States of America by check or draft of the Kansas State Treasurer, Topeka, Kansas (the paying agent and bond registrar). The principal of the bonds will be payable at maturity to the registered owners upon presentation and surrender of the bonds at the office of the paying agent. Interest on the bonds will be paid by check or draft mailed by the paying agent to the persons in whose names the bonds are registered on the registration books maintained by the bond registrar at the close of business on the record date for such interest, which shall be the 15th day (whether or not a business day) of the calendar month next preceding such interest payment date.

The city will pay the fees of the bond registrar for registration and transfer of the bonds and will also pay for printing a reasonable supply of registered bond blanks. Any additional costs or fees that might be incurred in the secondary market, other than fees of the bond registrar, will be the responsibility of the bondholders.

Optional Municipal Bond Insurance

The city will apply for municipal bond insurance relating to the bonds. If approved for municipal bond insurance, the bonds may be purchased with or without such insurance at the option of the successful bidder. The premium for such insurance and any relating rating fee will be paid for by the successful bidder.

Conditions of Bids

Proposals will be received on the bonds bearing such rate or rates of interest as may be specified by the bidders, subject to the following conditions: The same rate shall apply to all bonds of the same maturity. Each interest rate specified shall be a multiple of 1/8 or 1/20 of 1 percent. No interest rate shall exceed the index of treasury bonds published by The Bond Buyer in New York, New York, on the Monday next preceding the day on which the bonds are sold, plus 2 percent. The difference between the highest rate specified and the lowest rate specified shall not exceed 2 percent. No supplemental interest payments will be authorized. No bid of less than the principal amount of the bonds and accrued interest will be considered. Each bid shall specify the total interest cost to the city during the life of the bond issue on the basis of such bid, the premium, if any, offered by the bidder, and the net interest cost to the city on the basis of such bid. Each bid shall also specify the average annual net interest rate to the city on the basis of such bid. Bidders shall specify in the bid form the prices (exclusive of accrued interest), expressed as a dollar price, at which the bidder intends that each maturity amount of the bonds shall be initially offered to the public (the initial reoffering prices).

Basis of Award

The award of the bonds will be made on the basis of the lowest net interest cost to the city, which will be determined by subtracting the amount of the premium bid, if any, from the total interest cost to the city. If there is any discrepancy between the net interest cost and the average annual net interest rate specified, the specified net interest cost shall govern and the interest rates specified in the bid shall be adjusted accordingly. If two or more proper bids providing for identical amounts for the lowest net interest cost are received, the city shall determine which bid, if any, shall be accepted, and its determination shall be final.

Security for the Bonds

Although the city intends to pay debt service on the bonds, at least in part, from the revenues of a sales tax levied by the city, there is neither an assurance of the sufficiency of such revenues for such purposes nor is there a pledge of such revenues as security for the bonds. Accordingly, the bonds will be general obligations of the city payable as to both principal and interest from ad valorem taxes which may be levied, as required, without limitation as to rate or amount on all the taxable tangible property, real and personal, within the territorial limits of the city.

Internal Revenue Code of 1986

The Internal Revenue Code of 1986 imposes requirements on the city which must be met subsequent to the issuance of the bonds by the city and, as a result, the city will and does hereby covenant that it will diligently undertake those steps necessary to maintain the tax-exempt status of the bonds. The city's failure to comply with such requirements could adversely affect the tax-exempt status of the bonds. Purchasers of the bonds should be aware that should the bonds lose their status as tax-exempt obligations as a result of the city's failure to comply with such requirements, the bonds are neither callable nor will the rate of interest on the bonds be adjusted to reflect such circumstances.

The code includes interest on tax-exempt obligations, such as the bonds, in the adjusted current earnings of certain corporations in the calculation of alternative minimum taxable income with certain other adjustments. Furthermore, Section 59A of the code, as added by the Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act of 1986, provides for a new environmental tax generally based on corporate alternative minimum taxable income. The amount of tax is equal to 0.12 percent of the excess of alternative minimum taxable income, without regard to net operating losses and the deduction for this tax, over \$2 million. The environmental tax is imposed whether or not the taxpayer is subject to the alternative minimum tax. The environmental tax may subject certain bondowners to additional taxation for interest earned on the bonds.

The code also requires property and casualty insurance companies to reduce the amount of their deductible underwriting losses by a percentage of the amount of tax-exempt interest received or accrued on obligations. With the exception of certain "qualified tax-exempt obligations," the code provides that banks and thrift institutions may not deduct any portion of the interest cost of purchasing or carrying tax-exempt obligations such as the bonds. The city does not intend to designate the bonds as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" under Section 265 of the code.

Legal Opinion

The bonds will be sold subject to the legal opinion of Nichols and Wolfe Chartered, Topeka, Kansas, bond counsel, whose approving legal opinion as to the validity of the bonds will be furnished and paid for by the city, printed on the bonds and delivered to the successful bidder when the bonds are delivered. Said opinion will also state that in the opinion of bond counsel, assuming continued compliance by the city with the provisions of the ordinance authorizing the issuance of the bonds and the code, under existing law, the interest on the bonds is excludable from gross income for federal income tax purposes. Interest on the bonds may also be excludable from the computation of Kansas adjusted gross income.

Delivery and Payment

The city will pay for printing the bonds and will deliver the bonds, without cost to the successful bidder, properly prepared, executed and registered, on or about March 30, 1995, at such bank or trust company in the state of Kansas or the greater Kansas City, Missouri, metropolitan area as may be specified by the successful bidder. Delivery elsewhere will be at the bidder's expense. Said bidder will also be furnished with a certified transcript of the proceedings evidencing the authorization and issuance of the bonds and the usual closing documents, including a certificate that there is no litigation pending or threatened at the time of delivery of the bonds affecting their validity and a certificate regarding the completeness and accuracy of the official statement. Article 5.—EXEMPTIONS

81-5-12. Solicitations of interest prior to the filing of the registration statement. (a) An offer, but not a sale,

- of a security made by or on behalf of an issuer for the sole purpose of soliciting an indication of interest in receiving a prospectus (or its equivalent) for such security shall be exempt under K.S.A. 1993 Supp. 17-1262(m), as amended by L. 1994, ch. 42, § 3, if all of the following conditions are satisfied.
- (1) The issuer shall be a business entity organized under the laws of the state of Kansas having, both before and upon completion of the offering, its principal office and a majority of its full-time employees located in this state.
- (2) At least 80 percent of the net proceeds from the offering shall be used in connection with the operations of the issuer in this state.
- (3) The issuer shall be engaged in or shall propose to engage in a business other than petroleum exploration or production, mining, or other extractive industries and shall not be a "blind pool" offering or other offering for which the specific business or properties cannot now be described.
- (4) The offerer shall intend to register the security in this state and conduct its offering pursuant to section 3(a)(11) of the securities act of 1933, or pursuant to either regulation A or rule 504 of regulation D, as promulgated by the securities and exchange commission, as in effect on December 1, 1994, which are hereby adopted by reference.
- (5) Ten business days prior to the initial solicitation of interest under this rule, the offerer shall file with the commissioner a solicitation of interest form along with any other materials to be used to conduct solicitations of interest, including, but not limited to, the script of any broadcast to be made and a copy of any notice to be published.
- (6) Five business days prior to usage, the offerer shall file with the commissioner any amendments to the foregoing materials or additional materials to be used to conduct solicitations of interest, except for materials provided to a particular offeree pursuant to a request by that offeree.
- (7) No solicitation of interest form, script, advertisement, or other material which the offerer has been notified by the commissioner not to distribute shall be used to solicit indications of interest.
- (8) Except for scripted broadcasts and published notices, the offerer shall not communicate with any offeree about the contemplated offering unless the offeree is provided with the most current solicitation of interest form at or before the time of the communication or within five days from the communication.

(9) During the solicitation of interest period, the offerer shall not solicit or accept money or a commitment to purchase securities.

(10) No sale shall be made until seven days after the delivery of a prospectus to the purchaser.

(11) The offerer shall not know, and in the exercise of reasonable care could not know, that the issuer or any of its officers, directors, 10 percent shareholders, or promoters:

(A) have filed a registration statement which is the subject of a currently effective registration stop order en-

tered pursuant to any federal or state securities law within five years prior to the filing of the solicitation of interest form;

(B) have been convicted, within five years prior to the filing of the solicitation of interest form, of any felony or misdemeanor in connection with the offer, purchase, or sale of any security, or of any felony involving fraud or deceit, including, but not limited to, forgery, embezzlement, obtaining money under false pretenses, larceny, or conspiracy to defraud;

(C) are currently subject to any federal or state administrative enforcement order or judgment entered by any state securities administrator or the securities and exchange commission within five years prior to the filing

of the solicitation of interest form;

(D) are subject to any federal or state administrative enforcement order or judgment in which fraud or deceit, including, but not limited to, making untrue statements of material facts and omitting to state material facts, was found, and the order or judgment was entered within five years prior to the filing of the solicitation of interest form;

(E) are subject to any federal or state administrative enforcement order or judgment which prohibits, denies, or revokes the use of any exemption from tegistration in connection with the offer, purchase, or sale of securities;

Or)

- (F) are currently subject to any order, judgment, or decree of any court of competent jurisdiction that temporarily, preliminarily, or permanently restrains or enjoins such party from engaging in or continuing any conduct or practice in connection with the purchase or sale of any security, or involving the making of any false filing with the state, entered within five years prior to the filing of the solicitation of interest form.
- (b) The prohibitions of paragraphs (a)(11)(A), (B), (C), (D), (E), and (F) shall not apply if the person subject to the disqualification is duly licensed or registered to conduct securities-related business in the state in which the administrative order or judgment was entered against such person, or if the broker-dealer employing such person is licensed or registered in Kansas and the form BD filed in Kansas discloses the order, conviction, judgment, or decree relating to such person.

(c) A person disqualified under paragraph (a)(11) shall not act in any capacity other than that for which the per-

son is licensed or registered.

(d) Disqualification pursuant to paragraph (a)(11) shall be automatically waived if the agency which created the basis for disqualification determines upon a showing of good cause that it is not necessary under the circumstances that the exemption be denied.

(e) A failure to comply with any condition of subsection (a) of this regulation shall not result in the loss of the exemption for any offer to a particular individual or en-

tity if the offerer shows:

(1) the failure to comply did not pertain to a condition directly intended to protect that particular individual or entity:

(2) the failure to comply was insignificant with respect

to the offering as a whole; and

(3) a good faith and reasonable attempt was made to comply with all applicable conditions of subsection (a).

(f) Where an exemption is established only through reliance upon subsection (b) of this regulation, the failure to comply shall nonetheless be a violation of the act, actionable by the commissioner under K.S.A. 17-1266, and shall constitute grounds for denying or revoking the exemption as to a specific security or transaction.

(g) The offerer shall comply with the requirements set forth below. Failure to comply shall not result in the loss of the exemption, but shall be a violation of the act, actionable by the commissioner under K.S.A. 17-1266, and shall constitute grounds for denying or revoking the ex-

emption as to a specific security or transaction.

(1) Any published notice or script for broadcast shall contain at least the identity of the chief executive officer of the issuer, a brief and general description of its business and products, and the following legends:

(A) "NO MONEY OR OTHER CONSIDERATION IS BEING SOLICITED AND NONE WILL BE ACCEPTED";

(B) "NO SALES OF THE SECURITIES WILL BE MADE OR COMMITMENT TO PURCHASE ACCEPTED UNTIL DELIVERY OF AN OFFERING CIRCULAR THAT INCLUDES COMPLETE INFORMATION ABOUT THE ISSUER AND THE OFFERING";

(C) "AN INDICATION OF INTEREST MADE BY A PROSPECTIVE INVESTOR INVOLVES NO OBLIGATION OR COMMITMENT OF ANY KIND"; and

- (D) "THIS OFFER IS BEING MADE PURSUANT TO AN EXEMPTION FROM REGISTRATION UNDER THE FEDERAL AND STATE SECURITIES LAWS. NO SALE MAY BE MADE UNTIL THE OFFERING STATEMENT IS QUALIFIED BY THE SECURITIES AND EXCHANGE COMMISSION AND IS REGISTERED IN THIS STATE."
- (2) All communications with prospective investors made in reliance on this regulation shall cease after a registration statement is filed in this state, and no sale may be made until at least 20 calendar days after the last communication made in reliance on this regulation.
- (3) A preliminary prospectus or its equivalent may only be used in connection with an offering for which indications of interest have been solicited under this rule if the offering is conducted by a registered broker-dealer.

(h) Upon application by the offerer and the showing of good cause, any condition of this exemption may be

waived in writing by the commissioner.

(i) Compliance or attempted compliance with this regulation, or the absence of any objection or order by the commissioner with respect to any offer of securities undertaken pursuant to this regulation, shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any condition of the regulation nor deemed to be a confirmation by the commissioner of the availability of this regulation.

(j) Offers made in reliance on this regulation shall not result in a violation of the registration requirements by virtue of being integrated with subsequent offers or sales of securities unless such subsequent offers and sales would be integrated under federal securities laws.

(k) Issuers on whose behalf indications of interest are solicited under this rule may not make offers or sales in reliance on K.S.A. 1993 Supp. 17-1262(a) or (l), as amended by L. 1994, Ch. 42, § 3, or K.A.R. 81-5-6, until six months after the last communication with a prospective investor made pursuant to this regulation. AN ACT concerning the central interstate low-level radioactive waste commission; amending K.S.A. 65-34a02 and repealing the existing section.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas:

Section 1. K.S.A. 65-34a02 is hereby amended to read as follows: 65-34a02. (a) The member of the central interstate low-level radioactive waste commission representing the state of Kansas shall be the secretary of the department of health and environment. The director of the division of environment of the department of health and environment shall act as alternate to the secretary and the alternate to such member shall be appointed by the governor, subject to confirmation by the senate as provided in K.S.A. 75-4315b and amendments thereto. The member and alternate shall serve at the pleasure of the governor.

(b) Subject to the limitations of appropriations, the Kansas commission member and alternate, if not state employees, shall receive compensation in amounts established by the governor. In addition, when attending meetings of the commission or a subcommittee of the commission approved by the commission, the member and alternate shall be paid subsistence allowances, mileage and other expenses as provided in K.S.A.

(c) The department of health and environment and the attorney general shall provide clerical, technical and legal staff assistance as requested by the Kansas commission member or the member's alternate.

Sec. 2. K.S.A. 65-34a02 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the Kansas register.

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
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
